## An amazing twist of fate for relay, vaulter

**KEWASKUM-** Responding with an effort that even amazed their coaches, the members of Kewaskum's boys 4x100 relay were victorious in

last Thursday's Division 2 Sectional here. The result is a trip to the WIAA State Track and Field competition at UW-LaCrosse where they will now be expected to bring home one of the top places.

Another "rags-to-riches"

story involved pole vaulter Joey Wollner, who injured his knee in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Championships and managed a fourth and final qualifying spot — with an effort of 11 feet — in the regional competition, leading into the sectional.

The extra three days were just what Wollner needed to heal, and he came up with a season-best and personal-best 13 feet (13-0) to place third in the event to earn his spot in the state competition.

"Who would have even thought it," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said to one of his assistants, Jason Meinen, after the relay unit turned a time of 43 and .71 seconds (43.71) on their home track. I would have thought it would have been the 4x200 (going to state)."

The 4x200 didn't event make it to the sectionals, however, as its anchor man threw the baton at the end of the race at North Fond du Lac, and the team was disqualified.

That definitely was a low point in the season.

Thursday's effort was euphoria. "I told them 'You're backs are up to the wall,'" Gosa said. "They focused ... They ran the way we knew they could be running."

Eric Perkins led off the event and made up some of the stagger, then came Ted Wollner who gave the

## District to hire intervention coach to oversee RtI

*Consistent low test WKCE scores one reason for hire*

With the Response to Intervention (RTI) strategy -- a process for achieving higher levels of academic and behavioral success for all students -- in use in the Kewaskum School District, administrators will begin advertising in the near future for an Intervention Coach (IC).

This district-based professional will have the responsibility of coaching teachers on implementation of student interventions, ranging from struggling students to gifted and talented (GT) students, in grades K-12, with an emphasis on elementary-school students. The IC, a school district employee, supervised directly by the district's Curriculum Director Darcy Budnik, will work closely with Budnik, as well as with the pupil services director, school psychologist and reading specialists to guide services to individual teachers.

According to Budnik, the job description for the Intervention Coach will be posted on WECAN (Wisconsin Education Career Access Network).

"The impetus for the RTI process is that we want to see improvement," Budnik said.

She noted that one of the reasons for using RTI strategies is that reading and math scores on the third, fifth and eighth-grade levels on the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE) are lower this year than last year.

"However, it's important to remember that last year's eighth-graders are not the same students as this year's eighth-graders," Budnik said, adding that the WKCE is given to students in third through eighth grades, as well as those in 10th grade.

In reading, third grade scores declined by 1.3 percent; fifth-grade scores by 9.1 percent, sixth-grade scores, by .9 percent, and eighth-grade scores, by 14.1 percent.

In math, fifth-grade scores reflected a 3.4 percent decline, sixth-grade scores, a 2.3 percent decline, eighth-grade scores, a 5.1 percent decline and 10th grade scores, a 3.2 percent decline.

## Milestone anniversaries reached by area four veterans

Raise the flag with the stars and stripes at a meeting of the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 384, and four of its members will be on their feet in a flash. They have done so for a combined 230 years.

Bob Staehler (60 years), John Tessar (60), Bernard "Barney" Strobel (60) and Cornelius Beisbier (50) were recently presented plaques for their longevity and commitment to the Legion.

Three of the veterans, Tessar, Strobel and Beisbier were in the US Army, while Staehler served in the US Navy for four years, first in a fighter squadron in Jacksonville, Florida, then in Military Air Transport, hauling coal and all kinds of supplies into Berlin. Staehler's final two years were spent on the aircraft carrier, Midway.

"I was the Flight Deck Director," Staehler said, explaining, "It was kind of a dangerous job." Timing is essential for catching planes on carriers, according to Staehler, who said, "The

hook grabs the cable, and that's what slows them (planes) down. If you miss, there are barriers ... The biggest problem is fire."

When asked if he was ever injured, Staehler said, "A little bit, nothing serious."

Over the years, both Staehler and Tessar served a post commanders and sergeants or arms.

Tessar was drafted in July of 1951. "I went to Arkansas for basic training, and then went to Korea. Other draftees from the area in 1951 were Bob Rauhen of West Bend and William Schmidt of Kewaskum, but after basic training, the three all went in different directions.

"I was a Fuel Artillery Forward Observer," Tessar said, indicating this meant he observed the enemy for the artillery, and, yes, there was danger involved on the hills where the observations took place. "Every day," he said, adding, "We had incoming rounds coming in."

After spending four months being an observer, Tessar switched to being a squad leader for six months.

An interesting sideline about the

Tessar family is that all four brothers, Wayland, John, Allen and Tom were in the service, and their mother, Lorinda, was the founder of the VFW Women in West Bend. "She was a charter member," he said, noting his mother lived until she was two months shy of her 102nd birthday.

Strobel was drafted in June, 1945, a year after he had been deferred to work on the family farm.

"I stayed in the states most of the time," Strobel said, reporting he was assigned to Camp McCoy in Sparta, WI., and bases in Texas, Kentucky and Missouri.

When he was at McCoy, periodically Strobel would earn a weekend pass and drive his '38 Chevy home for a visit and some fun.

Most of his time in the service was spent testing equipment, including guns and "shoes we had to wear while we were marching."

Beisbier was in the Army from 1953 to 1955. "I went to school in Japan, and from there I went to Korea for about 13






Bob Staehler and John Tessar were both honored for 60 years of continuous membership in the American Legion.

Budnik emphasized that WKCE scores reflected strengths too. In reading, fourth-grade scores rose by 7.7 percent, seventh-grade scores, by 9 percent, and 10th grade scores were at the same level this year as last year.

Math scores increased by 3.9 percent for third graders and by 6.6 percent for fourth and seventh-graders.

The RtI strategies will serve all students, providing interventions for those who are struggling and will provide additional challenges for students needing enrichment. The IC will be involved with administrators, teachers and support staff to help facilitate the process.

The Intervention Coach has three primary responsibilities:

**Staff professional development:** The IC is responsible for facilitating building-based training for problem solving and RtI skills. The IC will work collaboratively with building principals to develop and implement an RtI professional-development agenda for the year.

**Technical assistance:** The IC provides technical assistance to principals, teachers and paraprofessionals to facilitate student interventions. Technical assistance includes classroom observation and feedback, modeling, data collection and other supportive assistance necessary to implement the RtI process. The IC will also serve as a consultant to the Student Intervention Teams.

**Data collection and management:** The IC serves as the data coach to facilitate the management and interpretation of data necessary to develop, implement and evaluate tier 1, 2, and 3 interventions. The IC will write and manage the GT student enrichment plans.

Applicants for for the position must have earned a Wisconsin teaching license and preferably have five or more years of teaching and/or instructional coaching experience. The person hired will be expected to possess excellent interpersonal communication, listening, facilitation, and adult-education teaching skills. He or she must also possess extensive knowledge of RtI and research-based instructional and behavioral interventions.

The hiring process will begin with phone interview screenings. "We will then narrow down the pool of applicants," Budnik noted.

The next step will be personal interviews with a team comprised of administrators, teachers, parents and other community members.

Personal references will then be checked. "We may have the applicants do a lesson or demonstrate a process for us," Budnik said.

For example, if student Jane Doe were having a problem solving compound fractions, the applicant would demonstrate how he or she would work with the teacher involved to suggest intervention strategies.

Following that process, "I would make a recommendation regarding which applicant to hire, to in-coming Superintendent Jim Smasal, and, upon his approval he would forward the recommendation to the school board," Budnik explained.

The person hired to fill the position will earn a total salary and benefit package of up to \$70,000, with about 25 to 30 percent of that being benefits.

The position is cost-neutral. Funds from other students services, currently provided in the district, are being consolidated and reallocated in order to fund the Intervention Coach's salary and benefit package.

## Forest needs volunteer help

The Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit covers almost 30,000 acres and has approximately 900,000 visitors annually. With all this land to cover and with all those visitors, the forest staff needs some extra help with a variety of tasks.

Are you a people person? If you answered yes, they are looking for you to help staff the front desk at the Ice Age Visitor Center, which is located half mile west of Dundee. Volunteers are also needed to give four to five hours on Saturdays and/or Sundays from May through October. The hours would be from 11:00 am until 3:00 or 4:00 pm. Volunteers would greet forest visitors, help them get orientated to the forest and assist with selling Friends of the Kettle Moraine merchandise. Training will be offered and volunteers will work side-by-side with a forest employee.

They could use you as a Trail Stewards to help keep staff alert to the maintenance needs and unique natural happenings on "their trails." Volunteers would sign up for a trail or specific trail loop/section on which to be a Trail Steward. They would inform the forest staff of any maintenance needs like downed trees or vandalized signs. They would also inform the staff of

what flowers are blooming, what birds/animals were sighted and what other unique finds were found. This information would then be posted at the Ice Age Visitor Center.

They're also looking for nature enthusiasts who enjoy sharing their love and knowledge of nature with people of all ages, but especially children. They are continuing summer Saturday morning programs from 10:00 to 11:00 am at both Mauthe Lake and Long Lake Recreation Areas. This year the theme is "Discover Nature's Secrets." The volunteer will help children complete one of the first four activities in the new Wisconsin Explorers booklets. Help is also needed in delivering the weekend Drop In at the Beach programs where volunteers will work side by side with a forest naturalist. Another area where volunteers are needed is with our special events throughout the year. Training and on-going support is provided for all volunteer naturalists who need to be at least 16 years old.



# Role-model fire chief laid to rest

When a pillar of a community, such as Raymond Dornacker, 66, town of Barton resident, passes, the ripple effects of his absence are impossible to measure.

His family members, friends, and fellow members of the Kohlsville Volunteer Fire Department verified that fact in their comments about Ray, who passed away May 19, due to small-cell lung cancer, which had spread to his bones and liver. Ray's condition was diagnosed in January 2011, and he underwent many radiation and chemotherapy treatments.

He was a dedicated, 39-year member of the fire department, and chief of the department for the past 20 years. He was a member also of the Washington County Fire Chiefs' Association.

Service to his country and community were second nature to Ray, who enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1966, served in Vietnam during the Vietnam War, and was honorably discharged in 1968.

He met his wife Lois, nee Rosenthal, prior to joining the service. "He and my brothers were friends," Lois said. "Ray went to Kewaskum High School, and I went to high school in West Bend."

Ray returned home from service on Jan 11, 1968. "I saw him that day at Steve & Mary's, a minor bar [now the Amerahn,] Lois added. "I gave him a hug, and we were together from then on."

They were married April 19, 1969, at St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Town of Addison. They have one daughter, Tina (James) Hergges and two granddaughters -- Chelsea, 16, and Hailey, 13.

Lois affirmed that she and her late husband were soul mates. "I was very confident of his love and his faith, as he entered God's kingdom," she said.

Ray was dedicated to his home and family and to the Kohlsville Fire Department and his church.

"He was very committed and dedicated to his home and family," she said. "He

seldom missed any of his granddaughters' games and spent a lot of time with them from day to day."

Chelsea, a student at Kewaskum High School, is on the school's basketball team and on a softball team with a youth league in Allenton. Her sister Hailey, a Kewaskum Middle School student, is on the basketball, volleyball, and track teams at school, as well as on a Washington County-based soccer team.

Chelsea and Hailey lovingly referred to their grandpa as "Geezer." "The nickname started with a joke, when Chelsea was born, and it stuck," Lois recalled. "He loved it."

"One of my granddaughters' happiest memories with their 'Geezer' was coming to our home and riding through the woods on our six-seater Kawasaki Mule, a small utility vehicle," she said.

Lois affirmed that Ray was a hard worker and 100 percent devoted to all his endeavors. "He worked hard, and he played hard," she said, noting that he enjoyed bowling and golfing, and they loved to travel, including several cruises to various locations and trips throughout the state to Fire Chiefs' Conventions.

"He never hesitated to get involved when someone needed his help," Lois pointed out. "He seemed to be able to juggle everything."

Ray's daughter Tina echoed her mother's statements, commending her father for his dedication to his family.

"As a grandfather, he had a very, very active part in his granddaughters' daily lives," Tina said. "He had a great sense of humor and loved to have a good time. His family loved him very much."

As for his interactions with friends and acquaintances, Tina noted, "A lot of people saw him as a leader."

"Despite the many challenges with his disease he lived life to the fullest without complaint and sought no sympathy," stated his sister, Aggie Legate.

In addition to the countless hours Ray dedicated to the Kohlsville Fire Department, as

chief, First Responder officer, in action on fire calls, and working for annual fundraising events, he was a member and president of the church council of St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church. He also assisted in maintaining the church and cemetery grounds.

According to Rev. Paul Reede, pastor of the congregation, "Ray was very faithful in everything."

"Going to church was extremely important to him," the pastor said. "He worked for his church a lot and was always willing to help out, mowing the lawn and helping to repair things in the church. He was an extremely good role model for everyone."

Ray's fellow firefighters agreed. Ray joined the fire department, which serves the Town of Wayne and eight sections of the Town of Barton, in August 1973. He served as second assistant fire chief from 1987-91 and was elected chief in 1992.

Curt Martin, first Assistant Fire Chief and long-time member of the department, spent many hours with his friend Ray, not only fighting fires, but doing volunteer work at the church and golfing when they had some spare hours, after work. Ray had been employed as a machinist at Mercury Marine in Fond du Lac for just short of 40 years, retiring in 2008.

Curt recalled an event that occurred two years ago, while he and Ray were attending the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs' Convention, held that year in La Crosse.

"We went for a walk," he said. "I have a tattoo on my arm and was wearing a tank top. We walked past a tattoo parlor for kids. I said, 'I want you to get a tattoo,'" Curt said.

"So Ray got a [removable] dragon tattoo, and when we got back to the hotel, he showed the tattoo to some of the guests there, and we had a lot of laughs."

Ray and Curt shared many hours fighting fires. Curt spoke of a fire that occurred last year, while he and Ray, along with Dave Beck, captain of the Kohlsville Fire Department, and Todd Steger, the department's second assistant fire chief, were attending a radio training session at the Washington County Sheriff's Department in West Bend.

"Our pagers went off, and Ray said, 'Let's get going,'" Curt noted.

Ironically, the fire was at Beck's farm on Highway 28 and County Road W. "We had to call in the Kewaskum and Allenton Fire Departments for full assistance, until we were able to get there," Curt said, adding that the Becks lost an old barn, but the departments on duty were able to save the rest of the buildings.

Curt lauded Ray and his wife Lois, another First Responder for the Kohlsville Fire Department, for their assistance in organizing the department's annual Appreciation Night, held in October, for all the volunteers who assist with the fire department's two annual fund raisers.

"Ray and Lois plan for the catering, entertainment and setting up for the event," Curt said, adding that the department's annual fundraisers consist of a pizza sale in March and an event, known as "The Smoker," with raffles and door prizes, in April.

Regarding the pizza sale, volunteers make and sell pizzas on a Friday and Saturday, at the firehouse. "Last year, we made 5,500 pizzas," Curt noted.

One bright spot for Ray this year was spearheading the fire department's purchase of a new, 2012 Pierce Fire Engine, with a six-man cab, for \$450,000. A wet-down ceremony for the new engine was slated for May 30.

Todd Steger in addition to serving as second assistant chief for the Kohlsville Fire Department for the past 26 years, is also a First Responder. He considered Ray a treasured friend. "Ray was very unique," he said. "He served as an usher at my wedding."

"When my father died 14 years ago, Ray took me under his wing and was a mentor. He was always there, when I needed him.

"We attended Fire Chiefs' conventions together and did other things together. We each bought outdoor wood stoves, and we helped one another put them in."

Another firefighter and First Responder, Tim Herman, looked up to Ray also. "In emergencies, Ray liked to get there as quickly as possible in order to get the job done," he said. "He was concerned about

the safety of the firefighters and the bystanders at fires. He was a good organizer and enjoyed doing what he was doing. He did his fire department work well."

Curt Martin's brother Aaron Martin, yet another firefighter for the past 18 years, serves the department as a pump operator and exterior firefighter.

Choking back tears, Aaron said, "Ray was like a second dad to me. He taught me a lot of things. When I started, I was learning how to run the pump. Ray gave me pointers on how to make sure the pump was running correctly."

Aaron remembered an incident in which Ray had changed the oil in his car and had accidentally left a rag under the hood. "We were called to go to a house for a small fire, and it was a fire in Ray's car," he said. "We put the fire out. Ray took a lot of flack about that.

"Ray was a great man," Aaron noted. "He really did the community and his country a good service. He was a good example. I'm very happy I knew him."

John Breuer, chief of the Allenton Fire Department, is also gratified for the memories of times he and his wife Diane spent with Ray and Lois, traveling to and from the annual Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs' Convention, held in June.

"Ray and I met 22 years ago and became good friends and colleagues," he said. "We always looked forward to going to the convention together. It was a learning environment, and we always brought something back. Our wives were good friends too.

"Ray was very knowledgeable and easy-going," he added. "The considerable age difference between the two of us was not an issue.

"His fellow members on the department had a great rapport and love for Ray," John said. "You could see that at the wake and funeral.

"When Ray took a turn for the worst a couple weeks ago, it was the hardest thing to hear him say he would not be able to go to the convention this year."

Ray is not attending the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs' Convention this year, but Ray, from all accounts, is smiling down from a glorious convention in a Higher Kingdom.


## What's the Buzz with Native Pollinators?



## KHS retirees reflect on long, productive careers in education

Three veteran educators will finally leave the hallowed halls of Kewaskum High School retiring at the end of the school year. Their dedication to their profession spanned multiple decades touching the lives of

thousands of students.

**Glenn Eichstedt**

Glenn Eichstedt started his prep career at Kewaskum High School and finishes his career at the same place this spring after working 34 years in the field of education.

A 1972 grad at KHS where he was a three-sport athlete, Eichstedt first enrolled at UW-Eau Claire where he studied for two years and played basketball. It was there he took a course in political science which later determined social studies was what he would major in and become "my vehicle to be a teacher and a coach."

Eichstedt transferred to UW-Oshkosh to finish his studies and there he played basketball for Bob White. In his first game on a holiday tournament at UW-Oshkosh, he ended up playing against his brother, Clark, who was a standout at St. Norbert College.

"He scored like 30 points against us ... by half, he had a lot of those points, so he coach put me in" to guard him, Eichstedt said, recalling how the coach figured Glenn would know all his brother's moves. While he might have slowed Clark down a little, he still made the all-tournament team.

After graduation, Eichstedt landed a job at Abbotsford High School (1978-86) where he taught and coached boys basketball, first as an assistant coach and the last four years as a head coach. Then he moved to Lomira (1986-89) where he was the girls basketball coach, assistant football coach and head golf coach.

"My very first golf match, I coached was against Kewaskum High ... I can remember Joe (Harlow, Glenn's high school football and golf coach) helping me through the procedures."

A year later, in 1988, Eichstedt's golf team finished fourth in D2 at the state tourney.

In the fall of 1989, he took a job at KHS and has been here for 23 years, working to interest KHS students in government issues. He also spent countless hours coaching boys basketball, girls basketball and golf for the

14 years.

Eichstedt and his wife Jackie, his high school sweetheart, live in Brownsville. They are the parents of Erin, a guidance counselor in Edgerton, Adam, the sports director for a radio station in Spirit Lake, Iowa, and Angie, who just received her Sign Language Interpretation certification from UW-Milwaukee.

Eichstedt plans to continue working for the Wisconsin PGA, teaching golf lessons to youth in Milwaukee, and he is going to supervise the marshals at the upcoming Women's Open that will be held at Blackwolf Run in Kohler.

Past that, he is keeping open and says, "When I get to September, I want to know I'm retired."

**Therese "Frau" Rosenthal**

For the past 31 years at Kewaskum High School, Therese Rosenthal has been affectionally known as "Frau." She's actually taught at KHS for 32 years — she started in 1980 — but with the elimination of German classes, she only taught english this past year.

Rosenthal recalls her interest in German originating when she was a freshman at West Bend High School, noting her National Geographic magazines stimulated an interest in other countries, cultures and languages.

Rosenthal didn't know if this interest could eventually lead to full time employment so she majored in English in college with a minor in German.

Her first job took her to Mishicot for two years, then she saw there was an opening at Kewaskum, which was closer to home.

At KHS, "anytime there was less than a full time position, I would pick up an english class, Rosenthal said, noting eventually the enrollment in German increased to a point where she even had an overload class.

Especially gratifying for Rosenthal was the fact she was able to initiate a program where she brought German students to KHS for three weeks in the fall, and take Kewaskum students to Germany for travel and study.

"My son was in kindergarten (1992) when I started the exchange program," Rosenthal said, remember how she was the lone chaperone for a couple trips until one year a student got pretty sick. After that, there were always two chaperones.

Not only did the students benefit from these trips, but, "I became more fluent (speaking German)," Rosenthal said. "These trips made my stay here really good," praising the support she received from the community, Board of Education and the staff to make them possible.

To this day, Rosenthal hears of cases where the KHS students developed lasting friendships with the German

students. "They would say I'm still in contact with my German partner." One case that comes to mind is Rachel Chambers, who became the godmother to the baby of her German exchange student.

There were years when Rosenthal taught German 4 or 5 at the same time, at first using the one-room school approach, going back and forth to the two groups, and then teaching the German 4 curriculum one semester and German 5 the next.

Rosenthal also put on some pretty special German dinners at the school. "My record was 140 people," she said, reporting she and some of the students would begin preparing the food a couple days in advance. "It was kind of a celebration of being in German," she said.

Rosenthal still loves cooking, something she plans to do in her retirement along with cross country skiing, downhill skiing and other outdoor activities.

And she may dabble in German tutoring or doing other work with the language. "It's not like I'm going to be on a beach somewhere," she said kiddingly.

**Mary Koch**

Students at KHS have loved the classes Mary Koch taught for the past 16 years because

in some, they get to sample the delicacies they make.

Koch's career route took her through Florida and Ohio before making the 16-year stop in Kewaskum. Her field of Family and Consumer Science has also seen a great deal of change, first in the name — it was once Home Economics Education — and then in the offerings, which spans to include Child Care, Health, Hospitality and Tourism, Interior Design, Food Service and Production, Single Living, Foods, Creative Foods, and Sewing, which, unfortunately, is no longer offered at KHS.

"We have a club that's built around it (Family and Consumer Science)," Koch went on, indicating the group is called Family, Career and Community Leaders of America.

Food classes are filled at KHS, and the majority of students in them are boys, Koch said, indicating, "They're here because they're hungry. In addition to satisfying their hunger, the foods students are also immediately after they finish the course.


Koch started her teaching career in Sarasota, Florida, then moved to Mansfield, Ohio where she worked for the Tappan Company as a test kitchen supervisor. The next stop was Thurston Appliances where she taught classes for then the newest kitchen craze, the microwave. "I was 'Mary Microwave,'" Koch said.

Koch also had a job with the UW-Extension as a Summer Home Economist, then she worked for the West Bend School District, took off 11 years to raise her children, and got back in the field when she was hired by the Kewaskum School District.

Especially fulfilling for Koch was having former students tell her how useful her classes were for them, like the young woman who reported her boss

took employees out to a fancy restaurant and she knew exactly what to use for each course. "Manners speak louder than people realize," Koch said.

Concerning what she will do in her retirement, Koch said may

go back to judging for the state and county fairs, something she is certified to do but hasn't been involved in since her husband became ill and eventually passed away.

"My goals are to visit more of the National Parks," she went on, explaining this is something their family (son Matt and daughter Karla) did together before they went on to college.

In anticipation of her trip, Koch said she went out and bought a new tent. The new retiree also plans to continue skiing, another family tradition which her children now participate in on the Colorado slopes. Both live there now.

Koch is also having her 1972 Ford Mustang overhauled and plans to enter it in car shows this summer.

"I've had a long, happy career," Koch said. "It's a pleasure serving the families of Kewaskum High School."

# Memorial Day remembered in Kewaskum, Farmington




Kewaskum's American Legion Post leads off the annual Memorial Day on Monday.

Patriotism beat precipitation this year at Kewaskum and Farmington's traditional Memorial Day ceremonies.

Village administrator Mathew Heiser, who turned out to be the keynote speaker at Kewaskum's ceremony when the scheduled speaker couldn't make it, compared Kewaskum to 120 mutineers who helped shape American history nearly 150 years ago.

Col. Joshua Chamberlain of Maine was readying troops to head into what would be the Battle of Gettysburg when he got these 120 experienced, spent men dumped on him. They had already fought in 11 engagements, served their required two years, had their unit disbanded and figured they'd go home.

Not so, said the military. Despite being put in shackles and denied food to try and

break their spirit, the men wouldn't agree to fight.

In stepped Chamberlain. Heiser said he reminded the group why it was they were there - "most of us came because it was the right thing to do" - and reminded them of their cause.

"What we're fighting for in the end, we're fighting for each other," said Heiser in reciting Chamberlain's words.

All but three of the 120 decided to fight, and the 20th Maine played a pivotal role in the Battle of Gettysburg, said Heiser.

Kewaskum, he said, can relate, as a proud community with "sacrifice and dedicating oneself to the good of all.

"These are the values Memorial Day is all about," he said.

Chamberlain went on to brigadier general and later the governor of Maine.

A list of Kewaskum's 33 war dead from the Civil War to Vietnam was read, a wreath

was placed at the American Legion, the annual 21-gun salute was held and high school band member Angela Pamperin played "Taps." High schooler Melanie Biertzer recited the Gettysburg Address and classmate Brittany Duarte read "In Flanders Field."

\*\*\*\*

FILLMORE - Music by era was the theme of the annual ceremony at Turner Hall organized by the Farmington Historical Society.

A letter from Civil War soldier and Kewaskum resident Wilhem Ramthun to his brother was read, describing some of the horrors of war in the mid-1800s like getting the measles, having clothes deducted from their pay and coming under sniper fire. Ramthun died in the Battle of Gettysburg and is buried there.

Robert Kreuzer played four marching tunes on his Irish whistle. To commemorate World War II music, Connie Schulist played cello and

Ellie Baldus the flute to Guy Lombardo's "The Band Played On."

To honor those from the Korean War, students Rachel Doak, Anna and Elizabeth Cantrall sang "The Price of Freedom."

Bruce Braidigan played guitar and sang "The Green Grass of Home" and "Fightn' Side of Me" to commemorate those in the Vietnam War.

To honor the Iraq and Afghanistan soldiers a letter was read from soldier Rachel Bosveld, a 2002 Waupun graduate, to her mother. Bosveld said she dodged bullets, got little sleep and ate nasty food but was thrilled she got to drive a tank. She got a Purple Heart for being in an

accident with eight others in her platoon.

Bosveld was excited because as of Oct. 20, 2003, it was 18 days to her birthday.

That birthday celebration didn't happen. Bosveld was killed in a mortar attack at a Baghdad police station on Oct. 26.

Shannon Smith sang "Amazing Grace," a popular selection at military funerals.

The 100 or so in attendance then proceeded outside and put flowers from a wreath on graves of soldiers in the cemetery next to the hall. The wreath had one flower for each of the 67 soldiers buried there, keeping alive a longtime tradition in the community.





Chief Bishop announced the Washington County Law Enforcement Memorial is scheduled for Tuesday, May 8, 2012 at 7:00 p.m. at the Washington County Fair Grounds. Chief Bishop also reported 10 applicants have been interviewed and ranked by the Police and Fire Commission for the part-time officer positions. He is in the processes of conducting the final interviews. There were 94 applicants that applied for the two part-time positions.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles:

1. Gave an update on the WisDOT process to obtain Temporary Limited Easements (LTE) for the Hwy 28/Main Street project.

2. Reported on the regulations that govern the water and sewer utilities. On the federal level regulations are governed by the Environmental Protection Agency. The Athletic Association will also be constructing a storage building to be financed through fund raising efforts.

Where optical scan voting is used, the elector may fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate for whom he or she intends to vote. The elector may only vote once for each office. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote,

and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

**WHERE TOUCH SCREEN VOTING SYSTEMS ARE USED**  
The elector shall select the candidate for whom he or she intends to vote by touching the candidate's name or using the keypad. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

After an official Touch Screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual bearing assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

# Changes made to baseball season; Gonring excited

Kewaskum's baseball team has some of its stars back, but it's a different game this season.

The summer season was cut by one week, already adding to the delay in fielding a full team due to spring sports still finishing up.

"Practice time was vital. We had to practice at 5:30 in the morning just to get a full squad," said Coach Doug Gonring. "I think we're going to have some stumbling blocks until we get a full squad."

Nonetheless, two-time first team all-state pitcher/first baseman Brad Boegel is back for his senior season, bringing his power and clutch hitting with him.

So is star shortstop and speedy leadoff hitter Sam Olla.

Those two will anchor a team that has gone 34-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference the past two seasons, each time cruising to the conference crown.

Also back are centerfielder Tony Gonring and his left-handed bat, catcher Brandon Chapman and third baseman Garrett Yahr - all seniors.

"We're set with older kids. It's just repetition now and getting to see as many things as they have to stay ahead," said Gonring.

Pitchers include Boegel, Tony Gonring, sophomores Brett Boegel and Zach Hedlund, and juniors Mike Holt and Corey Burdick.

"Zach Hedlund really is an impressive young player that I hope gets as much confidence as he needs," said Gonring.

Nick Banks, Brett Boegel and Jake Hardy will be in the outfield, with Burdick vetter some second base. Ethan Vetter backs up Chapman behind the plate.

Speed and effort look to be strengths so far.

"We're a pretty good hustling team. If we run hard and put pressure on people - just because we run to first base hard I think we could make some people make mistakes," said Gonring. "If we force people to throw behind bases sometimes - we could put ourselves in position to be very successful."

The Indians are 1-1 on the season, dropping a 6-3 game against West Bend East and beating Germantown, 8-4. Brad Boegel already has a home run, double and three RBIs. Olla and Brett Boegel have two hits apiece.

Team goals remain the same.

"Our goal every year is to win the conference and I think that's truly the outlook of a great team and a good program," said Gonring. "You win your conference and you go every day and play as hard as you can."

Once the postseason arrives, anything can happen in a one-game tournament. Six more wins takes the state title this year, down from seven in years past.

"Gotta have all the baseball gods on your side," Gonring said.

So far the scheduling gods have not looked on the Indians with favor. Saturday's game against West Bend West was rained out and with the shortened season there's little time to reschedule.

Gonring already had to reschedule a doubleheader against Two Rivers from Tuesday to June 21 because he couldn't field a full team due to spring sports.

The season is now packed in, putting pressure on pitching depth and health.

"We've got seven games in six days in one week," said Gonring. "Hopefully nobody gets hurt."

But Gonring is excited.

"We have a good core of senior kids and hopefully they can korr the younger kids into get them playing championship baseball early," he said.

Sectionals this year have been changed, moving Kewaskum out of the West Bend area, which could help since East and West have been the two teams that ended the Indians' season the past two seasons. This year, the Indians mostly face off with their conference rivals.

The state tournament this season has moved from Stevens Point to Capco Field in Mequon, home of Concordia and the new summer league team owned by Robin Yount called the Lakeshore Chinooks. Kewaskum gets a shot to play there on Saturday at 4 p.m. against Nicolet.

# Newcomers struggle in EWC debut

**NEW HOLSTEIN-** As far as the Kewaskum's golf team is concerned, the 2012 season officially came to a close on May 22, but two individuals qualified to play in the Division 2 sectional (May 29th) at Jefferson.

Yes, one of them is senior Tony Gonring, who had a 4-over-par 76, the fourth best card in the regional held at the Badger Creek Golf Course and topped all the individuals from teams that did not advance.

Gonring had only one six on his entire scorecard, firing a 37 on the front nine and a 39 on the back.

"I was putting very well and my chipping was spot on," Gonring, who also played in the sectional as a sophomore, said Monday, indicating the short game bailed him out of a few errant iron shots and penalty strokes on No. 11 and 18..

Junior Mike Holt also moved on by virtue of his steady 43-42-85, which was fourth among those from the non-qualifying teams and 13th overall.

As expected, Sheboygan Falls, the Eastern Wisconsin Conference champion, captured

the team title, posting a four-man total of 322, nine strokes ahead of host New Holstein, which had a 331. Also advancing to the sectional were Kettle Moraine Lutheran, with its 335; and Campbellsport, with a 337.

Kewaskum finished fifth, one place out of the running, with a 344. Then came Random Lake, 362; Kiel, 365; Oostburg, 375; Chilton, 382; and Howards Grove, 401.

Coach Glenn Eichstedt had indicated a score somewhere in the 330s would be needed to qualify for sectional, and he was right on the money.

Eichstedt didn't anticipate Dan Bohn would come in with a 93. Bohn started off OK, posting a 44 on the front side but ran into trouble almost immediately on the back, taking an eight on No. 10. From then on, he appeared a bit out of sync and finished with a 49.

Nick Banks was the other counter. He had nines of 46 and 44 for a 90.

Gonring and Holt played practice rounds at the Koshkonong Mounds GC in Fort Atkinson on Friday. Gonring called the front nine "challenging" and said to score well, "I'm going to have to aim for specific areas."

The back is more open, according to Gonring, who said, "I believe I can get a birdie on the back" to make up any bogeys on the front.

The two did not keep score, rather, "We were just hitting different clubs," Gonring said.

Concerning what it might take to qualify for state, Gonring said, "It's going to be windy tomorrow, so it looks like somewhere in the 70s will get through."

The top two out of eight participating teams and top three individuals from the non-qualifying teams gain berths in the WIAA State Tournament, which will be held at University Ridge GC near Verona June 4-5.

Gonring has already decided he will attend Carthage College in the fall and plans to play golf there. "They're very competitive," Gonring said. "(This year) They took second in their conference in Chicago.

"It will be interesting to see where I can go with golf," Gonring went on, noting for now he plans to study engineering at Carthage, but that could change. Carthage is an NCAA D3 school and participates in the College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin (CCIW) Conference.


