*Seitz sets state record for largest carp bagged by bow fisherman*

## One for the record book, the one that didn't get away

The "big one" did not get away from Zack Seitz.

Bow fishing with his two buddies, Nic Gerhartz and Matt Nelson, the night of May 25th, Seitz landed a 59-pound common carp from Long Lake.

It turns out the fish is not only the biggest Seitz has ever shot— he's had 30-40 pounders in the past — but it is also the largest carp ever brought in by a bow fisherman in the state of Wisconsin.

Seitz, a recent graduate of Kewaskum High School, has always enjoyed fishing and hunting. In fact, he says, "I love just about anything outdoors," which had led him to the decision to study Conservation Law Enforcement at UW-Stevens Point in the fall.

Seitz started bow fishing about three years ago and says the activity

can be done night or day, from the shore or a boat.

"My friends and I call it "schwacking," because that's the sound the arrow makes when it hits the fish.

But back to the story about the fish.

On this particular night, about 11 p.m., the three, who call themselves Team Schwach n' sack, took a boat to spend a couple hours doing the thing they love best — bow fishing. "We had a generator and three, 300-watt halogen lights ... you can see pretty well," Seitz said, indicating the evening started out with one of the others getting the first shot with his bow but missed.

Now it was Seitz's turn, and he saw two fairly good sized carp not too far from the boat. Then "a big glowing shape" came into view, according to Seitz, who said it was a foot or so under the surface and just five yards from the boat.

"That caught my attention, so I

decided not to shoot at the ones that were close," he said. Using an Oneida Bow with an AMS retriever reel and a 100-pound test line, Seitz let the arrow fly, and he hit the bulls eye.

For those who think carp are not the most energetic fish, Seitz said, "They can be pretty fast when you shoot them," and this one was, waging better than a five-minute battle with his human enemy.

"It was real strong," Seitz said, adding, "I couldn't pull too hard because I thought the line would break or the arrow would fall out."

Seitz came away as the winner, and now the three had to join forces to get the giant fish in the boat. "I grabbed the gill plate," Seitz said, reporting Gerhartz was lifting the fish by the arrow while Nelson used the gaff hook.

"It was over half the width of the boat," Seitz said. As one could imagine, "We were all pretty excited."

Soon thereafter, the three decided

to call it a night, not because of the giant carp but because a thunderstorm appeared to be heading in their

"Thank you to the faculty, community members, family and friends for supporting us throughout our years," stated Wendelborn.







While Seitz officially did the shooting of the 46-inch fish, he was quick to point out, "It was a team effort. I wouldn't have shot it without them."





## Computer-adapted program targets reading and math weaknesses

This coming fall, Kewaskum School District officials will start using a new tool to assess student needs. The STAR assessment, a computer-adapted test for math and reading, will provide results within hours for educators who are investigating if students need educational interventions.

The exam will be used to test first through tenth-grade students and will be given three times each year -- fall, winter and spring. The assessments from the STAR test will measure students' growth individually, as a class and on a grade level.

The district will fund the STAR assessment tool, with a price tag of \$45,500 for three years of service, through its curriculum budget.

According to Curriculum Director Darcy Budnik, "Teachers will be able to use the specific results of STAR testing to meet individual student needs for intervention or enrichment."

"Students who might be receiving additional help can be assessed more frequently to monitor growth and to make changes as needed," she said. "It is immediate feedback to monitor and upgrade curriculum, instruction and student interventions."

The STAR assessments are being used in conjunction with Response to Intervention (RtI) strategies -- the processes currently in action for achieving higher levels of academic and behavioral success for all students in the district.

Since results from the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE) scores in reading and math for this year's third, fifth and eighth-graders were lower than last year's scores, district officials believe the STAR assessments will enable them to better target areas in which students need to improve.

"STAR assessment results will assist teachers in making specific student instructional interventions and/or additional challenges for students during the intervention periods [the 30-45 minute time frames, three times per week, for students throughout the district, as of this coming fall], as well as during regular classroom instruction," Budnik explained.

She noted that district officials reviewed seven different assessments in reading and math and decided upon the STAR assessment.

"It is one of many that has been reviewed by the National Center on Ranking of 'convincing evidence' in all categories, such as classification, accuracy, validity and reliability, while being a relatively short test to administer -- approximately 30 minutes per test," she said.

The benefit of test results within hours of taking the STAR assessments is definitely a win-win situation. Budnik noted that students take the WKCE in fall, but results are not received until the following spring. "Many refer to these as autopsy results," she said.

However, with the STAR results being so immediate, staff members can begin planning interventions quickly.

Budnik stressed that a key to student success is parental involvement. "Parents will receive a STAR achievement report for their child and be able to monitor growth," she said. "The specific student skills outlined in the report will help parents know what to focus on with their child, as well as the skills to communicate with his or her teacher about."

Feedback from other school districts using the STAR assessment is encouraging. "Slinger is currently using it with first through ninth-graders three times per year," Budnik noted. "While it is a new assessment tool for them, they are finding success using it and plan to expand to upper grades to better target interventions."

Dr. Lu Karl, curriculum director for the Barron Area School District, commended STAR. "It has had an amazingly positive influence on our teachers' ability to interpret and use student test scores to inform instruction," he said. "I have never seen an educational product get used by individual teachers as much as this product."

The district will also share the assessment tool with Holy Trinity School in Kewaskum. Holy Trinity will pay the district for their use.



### VILLAGE BOARD MEETING

MAY 21, 2012

7:00 P.M.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Richard Knoebel, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch Norman Kufahl, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Jerry Gilles, Chad Cook and Stephanie Justmann. Members from the community and the news media were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on May 17, 2012. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Mike Berger to approve the minutes from the May 7, 2012 meeting, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reported a storage room at the fire department is being converted into sleeping quarters that can be used by the out of town ambulance personnel while they are on duty. Fire Chief Groeschel advised the Board almost all the labor was being provided by members of the

Department in their spare time to save the Village money.

Police Chief Thomas Bishop reported the new squad car has been delivered.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles:

1. Reported on the waste hauler information he obtained. He reviewed the revenues that were received from 2005 to 2011. The drop in revenue appeared to indicate the increase in sewer rates 2008-2010 priced the village out of the business of receiving waste from holding tank haulers. The pros and cons of pricing the service more competitively were discussed including: offering a 10% discount, testing to determine strength of waste received, the sewer utility's 1.6 million dollar debt to the general fund, the risk to the plant posed by accepting outside waste and the utility's ability to match the prices charged by other communities. The proponents for reducing the price of accepting hauled waste argued the price reduction would only need to cover variable costs to generate additional revenue for the sewer utility because the fixed costs are already being paid by the sewer utility. Consensus was to not continue with the idea of lowering fees to waste haulers.

2. Reported on the Department of Public Works annual report. Director Gilles explained the idea of establishing goals for a Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Plans for asphalt replacement and maintenance for 30 or 40 years including cost per foot each year was evaluated. The plan provided for road work to be on a revolving schedule so that sections of asphalt are replaced or maintained on a yearly basis. Director Gilles also reviewed the money that has been budgeted for the Main Street/Hwy 28 project. The costs for street outlay, lighting, sidewalk and aesthetics. The water and sewer utility costs were also reviewed.

Administrator Matt Heiser reported:

1. IT work has recently been completed in the Municipal Building. A new computer and printer have been installed at the front desk, a new back-up battery has been purchased and a new server for the network has been installed. The old server will be installed at the fire department.

2. Reviewed the recent court ruling on Acts 10/32. There has been a stay placed on the requirement of unions to recertify

annually; the recent court ruling did not place a stay on the requirement for union dues to be deducted from payroll checks. The current laws are in flux.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the Recall Primary held on May 8, 2012. The election workers were Elizabeth Hallen, Darlene Walls, Elizabeth Bellin, Elvira Nigh, Steve Baker, Nancy Harris, Karen Schaub, Patrick McFadden, Shirley Koth and Eileen Petri. There were 1117 voters and no incidents were reported. Clerk Justmann also announced the Board of Review has been scheduled for May 30th from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the next meeting has been scheduled for May 22, 2012.

Norman Kufahl representative for the Library Board reported on the May 14, 2012 meeting.

Matt Heiser, representative for the Mid-Moraine, reported on the May 9, 2012 Legislative Committee meeting. The topic of the meeting was preparing a priority list of municipal topics to be addressed at a state level. The next Dinner meeting will be hosted by the Village of Slinger on May 23, 2012.

Motion by Richard Knoebel to adopt Ordinance #12-05 Repeal and Recreate Section 10-2 of Chapter 10 of the Municipal Code (Noisy Animals or Fowl), second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried. (Vol. 2, pg. 863)

Discussion and possible action on a request to grant "No Parking" during business hours on Midland Avenue by 202 Forest Avenue. The request comes from Kewaskum Frozen Foods to have no parking on the west side of Midland Avenue from the alley to the intersection with Forest Avenue. Semi-trailers that make deliveries or are picking up product are having trouble entering the alley to access Kewaskum Frozen Foods. A resident opposed to this idea expressed concerns including a perception that there are not many semi-trailers entering the alley, very seldom are cars parked on the street, the need for parking spaces for the funeral home and communication with the neighbors could possibly resolve this issue. Chad Cook reported he had discussed the request with the funeral home and they were comfortable with it as long as it could end by 3 pm. Board members asked the



# Indians kick off week with eight-game winning streak

Kewaskum's baseball team came into this week riding an eight-game winning streak ready to face off with the only other team left undefeated in conference.

The Indians' pitching, hitting and defense have each shown flashes of brilliance all season. Brad Boegel has nearly tossed a no-hitter, the offense can explode and the defense can be airtight.

After losing their first game of the season, the Indians haven't lost since. Tuesday was scheduled to be a benchmark, playing at Sheboygan Falls. The Falcons came in 6-0 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and Kewaskum 5-0.

"They've got a pretty good ball club," said Coach Doug Gonring.

Against New Holstein on Monday, the Indians beat down their conference rival for the second time in less than a week, this time 15-2 on the road in five innings.

Gonring calls his team's spurts of spectacular playing fast.

"Tonight we played really fast," he said. "We hustled on and off."

Tony Gonring had three hits and three RBIs. Brett Boegel had two doubles and three RBIs, and Brandon Chapman had one hit and three RBIs. Leadoff hitter Sam Olla was 2-for-3 and scored three times.

The Indians racked up 12 hits in the five-inning game called due to the 10-run mercy rule.

"We did well. We played really well tonight," said Coach Gonring.

He'd like to see more of that effort and execution.

"A little bit here and there and the more that we do it, the better we are," he said.

Kewaskum has played fast parts of its last several games. When it hasn't, it's had enough to get by.

June 8: Kewaskum 5, Southeast Wisconsin Christian Homeschool Athletics 3

Kewaskum built a 5-0 lead after scoring three in the first and two in the sixth, before the Saints made a run in the seventh inning with a couple of bloop hits. The Indians shut the door after a three-run rally, beating a team that has given the Indians trouble in recent years.

Garrett Yahr pitched four innings for the victory, whiffing three. Junior Zach Hedlund went the final three.

"That was a real good baseball game," said Gonring.

June 7: Kewaskum 4, Campbellsport 0

Brad Boegel went six innings and whiffed eight while walking three against the adjacent EWC rival. Hedlund pitched the final inning of the combined three-hitter.

Chapman, Kewaskum's senior catcher, was 2-for-4 at the plate.

"We didn't play as fast that day. We had really good pitching with Brad on the mound," said Gonring.

June 6: Kewaskum 12, New Holstein 2 (6 innings)

Chapman was having a bad go of baseball before the game even started.

"In batting practice I wasn't hitting very good," he said.

But Gonring told him lousy BP can quickly turn around after the umpire yells "Play ball." Kewaskum's 300-game winning coach was right again. The Indians gave up two runs

in the top of the first. Yahr made a diving stop at third and threw to first for the third out.

"That play in the first inning saved a run. That was a great defensive play," Gonring said.

In the bottom of the first, Olla hit a two-strike single over the second baseman's head, and Chapman came up with one out.

It wasn't long before he cracked a fly ball that carried well over the left field fence. Yahr later smashed an RBI double to left center that reached the fence. The Indians were up, 3-2, and never trailed again.

Three runs came on a play Gonring hasn't remembered seeing in his long career.

With the bases juiced and no outs after the Huskies intentionally walked Brad Boegel, up stepped Chapman. This time he didn't have to swing the bat.

A passed ball had Brett Boegel take off from third and slide home. The catcher's throw from the backstop to the pitcher sailed to nobody in particular, and as Huskies chased the ball in the outfield, the Indians kept running.

By the time the play was over, Kewaskum cleared the bases and led, 9-2. Chapman calmly stroked a single down the third base line.

"When you think you've seen everything..." said Gonring.

Nick Banks had an RBI groundout in the bottom of the sixth for the 10-run margin that ended the game.

Chapman ended up 2-for-3. Olla was 3-for-3 and scored three times, and Yahr was 2-for-4 with two doubles.

Corey Burdick started and pitched two innings. Yahr went the next three and got the win, whiffing five. Brett Boegel pitched the sixth and struck out two.

The Indians' top four hitters have so far been deadly this season. Olla knows all he has to do is find a way to get to first, what with Boegel, Chapman and Yahr coming next.

"If you get on base it's like every time you're going to score," he said.

Yahr knows his role, being at the back end of the bashers.

"Being the 4-hole hitter I've got to be more aggressive," he said.

On the mound with a lead, Yahr said he doesn't want to mess around.

"Take a little off and just throw strikes," he said. "Let 'em hit it and let the defense do their job."

After Falls, the Indians host Franklin on Thursday and Kiel on Friday. On Monday, Plymouth comes to town, and on Tuesday the Indians play at New Berlin West.

# Seniors take tennis team to a higher level

The word success hasn't often been used in connection with the play of the Kewaskum High School tennis team ... until this spring.

Under the direction of coach Matt Fehlhaber, the Indians charged their way to a fourth place finish in the 10-team Eastern Wisconsin Conference, had two players earn all-EWC honors and two also advanced to the WIAA Division 2 sectionals before being eliminated from further competition.

So what was the different between a usual sixth, to ninth place finish and this year's success?

According to Fehlhaber, it was a new and improved attitude, especially by the senior class, along with an improved work ethic during the off season.

"Most of the seniors this year have really taken tennis seriously," the veteran coach said, indicating this meant lessons, equipment upgrades and off season tournament play. Like chemists in a lab, the players learned these were the ingredients to having a very successful season, including a huge win over Sheboygan Falls.

Letter winners announced by Fehlhaber included seniors — Joel Turk, Cody Wegner, Kyle Tessar, Justin Steiner, Tyler Craig, Erik Hofmaier and Matt Hrica; juniors — Till Mueller and Ray Beaupre; and freshmen — Mitchell Engelman and Bille Lehmann.

Turk, Wegner, Tessar and Steiner manned the Nos. 1-4 singles spots on the team and all had six wins or more against conference foes, led by Tessar, who was 8-1 at No. 3. Going up against the toughest players in the league, Turk finished at 6-3 while Wegner and Steiner came away with solid 7-2 records.

"In 13 total seasons (between boys and girls) I never had a player qualify for All-EWC due to the nation of our conference" with powerhouses such as Kohler, Two Rivers, Sheboygan Falls and Roncalli," Fehlhaber said. "We were usually fighting to be the best of the lower division."

The wait for a top individual is now over as Wegner made second team and Steiner honorable mention. "These are huge testaments to the time and effort these boys have put in," Fehlhaber said, adding Turk would have gotten fourth place overall at No. 1 if the conference went that far, which is "significant in our conference."

Tessar also barely missed an individual honor. Finishing in a three-way tie at his spot out, he lost out when the coaches picked out names of a hat to award the remaining

medals. He was recognized by the coaches for his play, however.

Manitowoc Roncalli dominated the first team with five picks, and added one more on the second. The Jets won the EWC title, amassing 58 points, with Two Rivers second at 47, Plymouth third with 46, and the Indians next with 40, one point ahead of Kohler.

Standings are determined by individual team wins, with the maximum score being 63 points.

In the series leading to the state tournament, KHS had Turk and Steiner advanced to the sectional for the second year in a row. Turk lost to Scott Wall of Green Bay Notre Dame, who is a perennial state player. Turk's name was submitted as a special qualifier, but the spot went to another player.

Steiner also drew a Notre Dame player and lost, but he won his match for third place over a Xavier player 7-6, 6-1.

The No. 2 doubles team of Beaupre and Tyler Craig, Wegner at No. 2 and Tessar at No. 3 all lost vs. strong Two Rivers players and were eliminated from further competition.

Concerning the big, first-ever win over Sheboygan Falls, Fehlhaber said, "This year we were deeper in singles, winning at all four spots and adding a win at No. 3 doubles, turned the tables on the Falcons. The coach called the win "fairly resounding."

Another first this season was the match win by Tessar over Roncalli, and Fehlhaber indicated his team lost to Kohler and Plymouth by 3-4 margins, best-ever finishers against those teams and eventually the Indians finished ahead of Kohler in the team standing by one point.

"Next year will be tough as we are graduating eight out of 10 varsity players," the coach said, but by the younger players seeing the success the seniors had this year he believes "In two or three years, we could be right back to the level of success we enjoyed this year."

# KHS grad Reicher has a clear vision of his future

For those in need of coaching on the topic of setting and achieving goals, Kewaskum High School senior A.J. Reicher, son of Karen and Keith Reicher and brother of Jenny Reicher, 16, is the young man to consult.

A.J. who is legally blind, graduated from Kewaskum High School Summa cum Laude (with highest honors), having maintained a 4.0 grade-point average. He aspires to become an actuary, working for an insurance firm, using statistics to calculate risks for individuals, in setting their insurance rates. He will enter Concordia University in Mequon in fall to begin working on a Bachelor of Science degree in actuarial studies.

A.J.'s family resides in the town of Auburn. His father will drive him to and from Mequon for classes five days per week.

Regarding his high achievement of receiving all A's in his high school studies, including six Advanced Placement courses, A.J. said, "I'm glad I got through it. It was hard work."

A. J. is able to read enlarged

print, and he has learned to use a white cane, a device that those who are visually impaired use as a mobility tool and as a courtesy to alert others about their visual challenges.

While he was in high school, A.J. took six Advanced Placement (college-level) courses -- English, statistics, U.S. history, calculus, macro economics and human geography. Provided he earns high enough scores on the national exams for all of these courses, he will have earned 18 college credits, three credits for each course.

For extra-curricular activities, he was a member of the school's National Honor Society, a member of the mock trial team, and participated in track during his freshman and sophomore years.

As a seventh-grader at Kewaskum Middle School, A.J. entered a geography contest sponsored by the National Geographic Society and held in Madison. He placed fifth at the state level.

His favorite teacher was Dan Ross, his high school history teacher. "I had him for four classes," A.J. noted. "He is a very

inspiring teacher and always encouraged me to keep working at my studies and to work to achieve my goals.

A.J. excelled as a Cub Scout and Boy Scout too, achieving the prestigious rank of Eagle Scout in March 2009. For his Eagle Scout project, he and his assistants landscaped the grounds behind Kewaskum High School.

This summer he will serve on the camp staff at Gardner

Dam Scout Camp at White Lake, about 30 miles east of Antigo.

His mother said she is very proud of A.J.'s achievement. "No matter what he does, he always has a positive outlook, always wanting to do his best, even when it takes longer than it does for students without disabilities," she said. "He puts his best foot forward."

A.J.'s father agreed. "I am very proud of him for what he

has done," Keith said. "My wife and I both wanted him to be independent and a producer in society. He would never have turned in a B paper, but always strived to be better than that. He has that drive.

"He has done a very good job and rarely complains. A.J. is a good kid who gives 110 percent," Keith noted, adding that their daughter, a KHS junior, also has maintained a 4.0 GPA to date.
