Shed at Elbe Farm lost in early morning blaze Friday

The flames and smoke of a burning shed storing equipment and hay/straw were visible from several miles away. A total of nine fire departments assisted Fillmore Firefighters extinguish the blaze.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of the structure fire at the Christopher Elbe farmstead, 8262 Orchard Valley Road around 4:40 a.m. on Friday, June 15. The original 911 call came from an employee on the farm. The dispatch center also received several 911 calls from nearby residents and passing motorists.

The structure was a 4,800 square foot metal pole shed. The shed contained two tractors as well as a large amount of hay and straw. The barn and its contents are being considered a total loss. The damage estimate is in excess of \$340,000. The fire also caused some minor damage to a new home under construction that was located next to the pole barn. There were no injuries to people or animals as a result of this fire.

The Fillmore Fire Department was assisted by the Boltonville, Fredonia, Jackson, Kewaskum, Newburg, Random Lake, Silver Creek, Waubeka, and West Bend Fire Departments.

The cause and origin of the fire is still under investigation by the Washington County Sheriff's Office.

Balanced school budget to be voted on Monday

The Kewaskum Board of Education creatively eliminated their near one-million dollar budget deficit last week Monday after months of deliberations. A formal vote, to move the budget for approval at the Annual Meeting will be taken at Monday's special board meeting.

Entering the meeting with \$159,000 still to be eliminated, board members sharpened their pencils and erased items from the 2012-'13 budget proposal.

The removal of KTV, the district's cable television channel was where action began first. The removal of KTV saw a savings of \$23,188, which was largely the two part-time employees who oversaw the program. Interim Superintendent of Schools David Ewald, explained the channel is viewed by eight to nine people and has the involvement of just one KHS student.

Board member Troy Hanson agreed with the removal of KTV but said he wanted to see something offered for KHS students interested in digital production in the future.

The board along with Ewald threw out the idea of outsourcing cleaning, reducing cleaning at Wayne and Farmington and eliminating of part-time janitor position. Previously, it was believed to save the district \$176,700.

Some reductions and changes were made to the technology budget. Technology Coordinator Jane Lazarevic reduced her budget increase to \$192,853 from \$215,597.

Lazarevic stated she was able to complete some of the projects with funds from the 2011-'12 budget. Those projects roughly include, upgrading the networks at KHS and the district office to wireless as well as installing the infrastructure for wireless connectivity; purchasing new computers for KMS and making network improvements to the network

at the district office.

At the May 8 meeting the position of Buildings and Grounds Manager was eliminated. At the June 11 meeting, the Board approved the concept of restructuring the staffing of the Department of Building and Grounds taking into consideration the previous elimination of the Manager position for a projected total savings of \$115,000.

With \$142,201 to be eliminated, Ewald advised the board that there is a budget surplus projected for the fiscal year ending this month. That surplus is projected to be between \$342,000 and \$413,000. He suggested making the budget whole by using a portion of that surplus. He further suggested placing a portion into fund balance to cover projected shortfalls in the 2013-'14 budget.

The Annual Meeting will be Monday, August 27, in the Kewaskum Theatre at KHS.

Flight for Life responds to Farmington crash

TOWN of FARMINGTON- A Farmington man was flighted to Froedtert Hospital after a Wednesday afternoon crash. That crash shut down County Highway H for two-hours on June 13.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of a two-vehicle, roll-over style accident, at 11:58 a.m. on County Road H at Orchard Valley Road. Deputies and personnel from Fillmore and Newburg Fire Department's were subsequently dispatched to the scene.

According to Lt. Robert Stuesser of The Washington County Sheriff's Office, upon arrival of rescue personnel, it was believed that Jacob D. Guttman, 21, of the town of Farmington had sustained significant injuries after being ejected from his vehicle. As a result, Paramedics from the West Bend Fire Department and Flight for Life were requested to the scene. After being treated by on-scene emergency medical personnel, the Farmington man was subsequently flown to Froedtert Hospital with serious injuries. The operator of the second vehicle, Erick D. Laning, 35, of Rosendale, was treated at the scene and subsequently transported by the Kewaskum EMS

to Aurora Medical Center in Hartford with non-life threatening injuries.

A preliminary investigation into the cause of the accident revealed that both men had been operating west-bound on County Road H in the area of Orchard Valley Rd., when Laning's pick-up was struck on the passenger side by the farm truck driven by Guttman as he attempted

a pass on the right. After the initial impact, the farm truck rolled onto its side ejecting Guttman who was not wearing his seatbelt. There were no passengers in either vehicle.

The exact cause of the accident remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Office. Both men are believed to have been released from area hospitals.

Ottery free on \$5,000 signature bond after initial appearance

WINNEBAGO COUNTY- Carly Ottery, the teenage driver charged in a crash that killed three Campbellsport High School students back in February made her first appearance in court Tuesday morning, June 19. After the initial appearance Ottery was released on a \$5,000 signature bond. She is due back in court in July.

The crash happened just north of Highway 67 in the Township of Ashford on Saturday, February 4th. Sabrina Stahl, Katie Berg and Caitlin Scannell all died from their injuries. Ottery and five other students were hurt.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff said in February that speed and failure to wear seat belts were factors in the crash. Alcohol was not believed to be a factor in this crash.

A crash reconstruction expert estimated the Chevy Tahoe was traveling between 103

and 109 miles per hour at time when Ottery lost control of the vehicle.

Minutes after the crash, Ottery is said to have told a Fond du Lac County Sheriff's deputy she hit a "dip" on Beechnut Road that "makes your belly drop" before the vehicle became airborne.

Ottery is also alleged to have said her speed caused her to lose control of the Tahoe, saying "I was driving fast because it was cool," adding that she was a "stupid (expletive) teenager." Ottery also allegedly said the passengers "weren't wearing their seat belts, and that's why they flew so (expletive) far out of the car."

Ottery was charged with three counts of homicide by negligent operation of a vehicle. If convicted, she faces up to ten years in prison and \$25,000 in fines for each charge.

Excellence in Nursing Award Presented to Gina Wilson, RN

Froedtert Health St. Joseph's Hospital has announced that Gina Wilson, RN, breast care navigator, has been awarded the 2012 Excellence in Nursing Award. For each of the past eight years, the hospital has presented one nurse with the Excellence in Nursing Award. Registered nurses are nominated based on demonstrated excellence in their area of practice and in the delivery of quality care to patients and their families. They role model teamwork and demonstrate leadership skills that positively influence patient care.

Gina established a process for women who have mastectomies to receive a post-op camisole before they leave the hospital. These camisoles are given to each mastectomy patient and have a soft prosthesis so women can leave the hospital with a symmetrical shape. In cooperation with the rehab department and surgeons, Gina helped establish a program for all women receiving lumpectomy or mastectomy with a lymph node procedure, educating about lymphedema, scar mobilization and post-op

exercises. Her expertise includes providing detailed information and education for patients and their families before surgery, during and after and provides information on local programs that are available for each patient.

Instrumental in bringing the Look Good Feel Better program to the hospital, Gina organizes this quarterly support group by bringing in speakers to providing information on topic such as: nutrition, exercise, hormonal therapy and stress reduction. In her free time, Gina attends the University of Wisconsin Cardinal Stritch BSN completion program. Her caring spirit and quality exceptional patient commitment are recognized by her peers every day.

Campbellsport man injured in bike crash in critical condition

TOWN of KEWASKUM - A Campbellsport man remains in critical condition at Froedtert Hospital after a crash Saturday. The multi-vehicle wreck involved an SUV and three motorcycles on June 16. The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of the crash at 11:38 a.m. on State Road 28 east at Kettle Moraine Drive. Kewaskum Fire Department and EMS arrived on the scene shortly after deputies arrived.

It is believed the crash unfolded after Matthew Smolinski, 25, was traveling westbound, cresting an incline on Highway 28 and impacted

an SUV driven by DeAnn S. Mathson, 46, who was ahead of Smolinski, stopped, making a legal, left turn onto Kettle Moraine Drive.

Upon impact, Smolinski was ejected from his motorcycle. The motorcycle ended up in the eastbound lane and was struck by an eastbound motorcycle. A third motorcycle was able to avoid the crash and ended up in the ditch.

The motorcycle operators were Troy J. Hodorff, 50 of Van Dyne and Valerie J. Parsons, 43, of Montello. Neither had life threatening injuries but Parsons was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend.

Flight for Life was

dispatched to the scene for Smolinski, however due to weather conditions they were grounded. He was subsequently transported by the Kewaskum EMS to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee. Hospital officials listed him in critical condition as of Tuesday afternoon.

The crash continues to be investigated by Washington County Sheriff's Office. They noted alcohol was not involved in the crash. Neither motorcycle operator was wearing a helmet.



A Fast That Lasts Retreat

Kewaskum has another reason to be proud of our youth. A couple of months ago, Christian Bocher, Sarah and Josh Guillaume, Jake Keller, Mikaela Rabe, Alaina Rosenthal, Anne Reike and Berit Kirkegaard were accompanied by Pastor Eric and Laura Kirkegaard and John Kletti to "A Fast That Lasts." This is an annual event that is hosted by Plymouth United Church of Christ in Milwaukee. It shows the participants what it means to be hungry and that hunger and poverty isn't just in Third World Countries, but is all around us. There were five other Milwaukee area UCC churches that joined in the experience.

They started the day at a warehouse in Waukesha where they packed meal bags for the people of Haiti. One bag feeds a family of four and consisted of rice, freeze dried vegetables, a protein source and a vitamin source. They were packaged in special bags that were heat sealed, then boxed and made ready for shipping. Our youth packed approximately 2000 bags. The organization that coordinates the food packs is World Wide Hunger Relief. The group was able to sample the finished product so that they could taste the food that the families in Haiti would be eating if they were the lucky ones.

In the afternoon, they headed back to Plymouth Church and split into teams. The teams went out into various neighborhoods collecting food

for the Milwaukee Hunger Task Force. A large quantity of food was collected. Then each team was instructed to go to certain grocery stores to buy \$20.00 in nutritious food for a family of four for one day. The stores varied in size from a small corner store to the big box stores. They found the food at the smaller stores to be more expensive and not as fresh and had fewer options to choose from. The food at the larger store was cheaper and of better quality, but the stores weren't always accessible by the city bus. The teams met back at the church to compare the amount of food purchased and the difference in quality and quantity of food based on the location and type of store. They were able to make better choices at the larger stores and were quite limited at the corner stores where less fortunate people have to shop because of lack of transportation availability.

Now, even though this was supposed to be "a fast," dinner was provided. Five of the kids representing the wealthy group were given a full meal, sat at a table with plates, silverware and even flowers. Then, there were about 20 kids representing the lower middle class and they were given rice, bread and milk but they didn't have a table to eat at, just a chair and a bowl and spoon to eat with. Then the last group of about 25 kids represented the lower class. They were given a small bowl of rice and some water. They had to eat on the floor and use their fingers

to eat. This dinner seemed unfair to the groups that didn't have the full meal but taught everyone how it really is, all around the world.

This retreat proved to be very insightful to our youth on how fortunate they are to have food on their table for every meal and that they don't have to worry about where they'll find their next meal. We're also hoping that this will encourage our youth to participate to help others in need.





UW-WC Tuition will increase \$247

Annual tuition at UW-Washington County (UW-WC) will increase by \$247, to a total of \$4,750, for in-state students following the approval Thursday of a 5.5 percent tuition increase for all campuses by the University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents.

"Even with this increase, UW-WC remains the best value in the UW System," said Dr. Alan Paul Price, CEO and dean of UW-WC. "A student could save between \$4,500 and \$10,000 by completing the first two years at UW-WC before transferring to one of the UW four-year campuses to complete a bachelor's degree."

The average annual in-state tuition at four-year UW institutions will be \$6,939, an increase of \$396 from 2011-12. In-state tuition at UW-Madison will rise to \$9,273 (\$10,379 with fees) and at UW-Milwaukee tuition will be \$8,091 (\$9,181 with fees). Student fees vary by campus.

Price said the tuition hike will cover only a part

of the cuts to the university budget imposed by the State Legislature. The university lost \$316 million in state revenue cuts over the two-year budget period. Tuition increases are expected to raise \$110 million.

"I regret having to pass a portion of these cuts on to students and their families because I know they also are struggling," said Price. "We are working hard to keep higher education affordable in Washington County without reducing quality."

UW-WC is a member of the UW Colleges, the UW System's network of 13 freshman/sophomore campuses and UW Colleges Online that offer an Associate of Arts and Sciences degree and prepare students of all ages and backgrounds for baccalaureate and professional programs. UW-WC enrolled over 1,100 students in 2011-12. in-law, Sara Bazalak.



William Berres, Town of Farmington, one of the oldest settlers of the county, passed away at his home on April 14, at the age of 66.





They hadn't lost a home conference game since 2009.

But Monday was different for the Kewaskum Indians. The baseball team only managed three hits in an 8-5 loss against

Plymouth, snapping their 12-game winning streak and making the Eastern Wisconsin Conference race a little tighter.

"They're the better team today. I just don't think we were ready to play," said Coach Doug Gonring.

Kewaskum slipped to 12-2 on the season, 7-1 in the EWC,

just ahead of Sheboygan Falls at 7-2 and Plymouth at 5-2.

The Indians' best chances to score came in the fourth inning, when the Panthers turned an inning-ending double play with the bases loaded, and the sixth, when Kewaskum's 2-3-4 hitters all made outs, scoring one run while leadoff hitter Sam Olla got in a rundown before being tagged out between second and third.

Gonring was discouraged by Kewaskum's four errors and even more mental mistakes, both defensively and offensively. Hitters, he said, didn't adjust to put the ball in play.

"We hit more foul balls than any other team in the country, and we hit 'em hard," he said.

The loss came at the end of a few-game stretch in which Gonring said the team was lucky to have won three of its last four games.

The Indians survived five errors in hanging on.

Boegel was 3-for-4 with two home runs and three RBIs. Brandon Chapman was 2-for-4 with a double and Yahr 2-for-3. Zach Hedlund pitched 1 1/3 innings for the victory, striking out one and walking one. Gonring got the save, whiffing one in one inning. Kewaskum used four pitchers.

June 12: Kewaskum 1, Sheboygan Falls 0

A pitching classic between Brad Boegel and Cole Heili was decided on a suicide squeeze in the top of the seventh.

Yahr led off the inning with a walk, nearly striking out on a check swing, followed by Gonring being hit by a pitch.

Burdick moved runners to second and third with a sacrifice

bunt.

Goeden, already with one strike, showed bunt for the first time in the at-bat and laid a beautiful ball down the first baseline. Yahr scored without a throw.

Goeden said Coach Gonring may call for the squeeze, and he executed it.

The game had all the playoff intensity of two conference leaders. At the time, Kewaskum was undefeated in the EWC and Falls had one loss.

Marquardt named co-conference player of the year

The Indians returned the conference player of the year and a couple of solid seniors. Beyond that, going into the

season Coach Jeff Gosse said there were questions with this year's softball team.

Gosse knew he had junior Jenny Reicher, last year's Eastern Wisconsin Conference Player of the Year on the EWC title-winning team. And junior Erica

Chesak at catcher, perhaps the next most-important position. She was to take over for first team all-conference player Abby Amerling, who graduated.

It didn't take long before one of the two he planned on counting on most went down. In the third game of the season, Chesak injured both her ankles and only made a brief return, re-injuring one in her first game back, forcing her to sit the rest of the year.

On a team in which youth already was prevalent, plan B was put into place. First team all-conference third baseman Michele Marquardt would move to her other position behind the plate.

Freshman McKenzie Rosenthal took over at third base.

It wasn't how Gosse exactly drew it up, and he didn't expect the result, either.

Marquardt led the team in average - nearly hitting .500 - RBIs and doubles.

She was named co-conference player of the year.

Rosenthal turned out to be one of the most solid defenders in the conference, only committing three errors all year. She's already been pegged as leader of the infield next season when she moves to shortstop.

Rosenthal will take over for Caitlin Rinzel, who shattered the school's single-season stolen base record with 28. The old

record was 24.

After splitting doubleheaders with conference contenders Waupun and Plymouth in a one-week stretch, the Indians were in the thick of the EWC title race again. If they won out, they'd at least share the crown with Waupun.

But a lack of timely hitting led to a one-run loss at Two Rivers, and Kewaskum finished 10-4, tied for third. Kewaskum beat Brown Deer in the playoffs, 10-0, before losing to Kettle Moraine Lutheran, 2-0, while the late-season hitting slump continued.

As much as his team's physical gifts, Gosse was happy with how varsity players welcomed the freshmen like Rosenthal and a few others.

"Great chemistry of this whole group," he said.

It turned out catcher was the Indians' deepest position as Rinzel filled in to spell Marquardt now and then.

"Down to our third-string catcher and we didn't miss a beat," he said.

Reicher ended up hitting .458 and was second on the team in RBIs with 21 and second in doubles with nine.

It was her work on the mound that made her stand out even more. She led the conference in strikeouts, was second in earned run average and second in wins.

Reicher whiffed 129 this

season, allowed 1.46 runs per game and racked up a 13-5 record. She was named the team's defensive player of the year.

Other first team all-conference players included outfielder Danielle Rodenkirch, who had some clutch hits against top competition this season. She was fourth on the team with 13 RBIs and only struck out seven times.

Rinzel was named second team all-conference for her solid fielding and speed. She was most annoying on the base paths, even stealing home once to help the Indians win a tournament. Despite her base running prowess, pitchers often put her on for free. She led the team with 29 walks.

Kewaskum finished 16-5 overall.

"We had a really good season," said Gosse. "At the beginning of the year I didn't know what to expect."

He got excellence.

Kewaskum's junior varsity finished 8-10 in what Coach Jason Last said was the best offensive team he ever had. Gosse - per usual, if you ask Last - kept taking his players due to injuries - once forcing a forfeit because there were so few left.

"It was a fun season, a very fun season," he said. "We never had the same team but the girls came together."
