FFA Officers visit Washington D.C.

Two students from KHS took the trip of a lifetime. Savannah Dei, VP and Lindsay Weber, Treasurer, of the FFA attended an annual Washington Leadership Conference (WLC), a 5-day workshop held in Washington D.C.

When FFA advisor, Kris Beaver, asked if anyone wanted to attend the WLC, Dei and Weber knew instantly they did. Dei's older sister, Katelyn, went in 2007 and urged her sister to attend if ever given the chance. The pair left on June 18 and returned June 24.

Students at the conference attended large group sessions and split into smaller community groups, such as Legacies and Commanders for more personalized sessions. Within the community setting, students were given an archive to write goals, strengths and what they want to advocate for agriculture. Each day the conference focused on one specific

agenda item.

Each night the students had reflections to talk about what they learned and what happens after. "One of the reflections," Dei states, "We had to write a letter to ourselves that will be sent out in the next year. Mine was 2 pages long because I wrote out everything that I believed in and what I think I could do in the next year to make the FFA better."

Students were also given a legacy key by a past national FFA officer. The legacy key symbolized the release of everything the student believes in. Students also prepared a LTS (Live to Serve) Plan to outline how the student can fix a local need by creating a service. The LTS is a personalized strategy students can take home to start these services into their community.

With her LTS designed for advocacy, Dei discussed her idea of a family fun night to talk about the FFA. The FFA does more than agricultural related things such as helping the Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic. Dei

states, "I learned that agriculture is so much more than farmers. It is everything we do."

One night, students were split into income level groups ranging from wealthy to poverty. Out of the 350 people, 250 had the poverty card and had to eat rice and beans while sitting on the floor. "Everybody thought, this is a joke right?" Dei said. "We were told, this is your dinner. If you don't eat it, you don't eat tonight."

In reflecting about the experience, Dei said, "It was really life changing when you realize in the world there are people that cannot afford this stuff." The experience caused some students at the conference to change their LTS from advocacy to addressing poverty. Service day was the last day where students serviced the FFA. Together they packed 40,000 meals in bags, packed into boxes and filled four to five pallets to be shipped to children in starving countries. Dei found it a

Fire Chiefs Assoc. and Office of Emergency Management issue Fire Danger Advisory

WEST BEND - Due to the extremely dry conditions throughout Washington County, the Washington County Fire Chiefs Association and the Washington County Office of Emergency Management are jointly issuing a Fire Danger Advisory. All residents of the county are being asked to refrain from any type of outdoor burning and/or use of fireworks or other types of incendiary devices. With the lack of recent rainfall, conditions are very conducive to rapid fire spread and extreme fire behavior.

From the Washington County Chiefs perspective, all open flames and ignition sources in the outdoors should be avoided. If any outdoor controlled burning needs to be done, it should be pre-approved by your local Fire Department and directly supervised by Fire Department personnel. With the 4th of July holiday approaching; the celebration with ground and aerial fireworks displays can cause quick spreading fires that get out of control rapidly.

These types of preventable emergencies can cause undue stress on local Fire Departments and their resources. The extreme temperatures forecast for the next few days further tax responders and increase the number needed to respond to each incident. Residents must be aware of the dangers associated with the use of fireworks in these extremely dry and sensitive conditions and are urged to consider fire safe alternative ways to celebrate our country's Independence Holiday.

The Washington County Fire Chiefs Association is asking all residents to please follow these precautions so everyone can enjoy a fire safe holiday. They should be followed until conditions improve and adequate precipitation restores the ground cover.

If people have any questions regarding this advisory, they should contact their local Fire Department.

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Kewaskum Police department gets new wheels

Last month signaled yet another change at the Kewaskum Police Department as the village took delivery of their new 2013 police squad car. The change was two-fold as both the color and model of the car changed.

The model change was unavoidable as Ford stopped making the popular Crown Victoria Police Interceptor and built the Interceptor on what is believed to be Ford Taurus frame. As far as color, Police Chief Tom Bishop thought it was time Kewaskum had a change from its past pastel blue colored vehicles.

The new Interceptor has a 3.5L V6 engine and is front-wheel drive. The previous Crown Victoria models were

rear-wheel drive and had a powerful V8 engine. The Interceptor is also lighter than its predecessor.

"Although I liked the power we were able to achieve out of a V8 engine, I am hopeful that we will be able to save some money with the V6 in regards to gas prices. Plus, the V6 still has enough power and speed to meet our needs," Chief Bishop stated.

His first time putting a squad car together, he received help from Officer Kevin Kohn. Chief Bishop stated the Crown Victoria came prewired for radios and other accessories, the Interceptor did not so there was a bit of a learning curve. The department was also required to purchase a new partition and new radio mounting brackets. It took about two days to ready

the vehicle for patrol.

Kewaskum purchases a new vehicle each year. The new vehicle serves as the unmarked squad, the marked squad is sold and the old unmarked squad gets its graphics. Chief Bishop stated he hopes next year to mark the black Interceptor with green and white graphics similar to the color scheme used by the School District.

Kewaskum leases its police vehicles. The price for the new squad was \$27,580.

Kewaskum and Slinger Police Departments are the only local departments to begin using the new Ford Interceptor. Washington County Sheriff's Department uses the Chevrolet Impala while Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department used Crown Victoria.

In addition, many community members and twelve chamber ambassadors attended the event. Following the ribbon cutting, attendees toured the new facility and enjoyed a light lunch.

WEST BEND- The August 15 community open house, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., at the new Kraemer Cancer Center, located on the St. Joseph's Hospital campus, will include a tour of the expanded Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics on the first floor, as well as a tour of the cancer center.

Both the new Kraemer Cancer Center and the expanded Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics, open July 9. Scott Flynn, clinical manager for Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics, explained the new Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics, currently on the hospital campus, will expand clinic space from 2,500 square feet to more than 18,000 square feet.

Specialties being added are internal medicine and colorectal surgery services. Specialties that are expanding are: plastic and reconstructive surgery, including cosmetic surgery; infectious diseases and electrophysiology.

Currently, the clinic offers the expertise of The Medical College specialists in cardiology, electrophysiology, infectious diseases, plastic and reconstructive surgery, urogynecology, urology, urologic oncology, vascular surgery and physical medicine and rehabilitation for spasticity -- increased muscle tone or stiffness, leading to uncontrolled, awkward movements.

With the expanded specialty services, area residents have local access to leading medical experts in all of these

specialties. Patients also have direct access, when needed, to the resources of Froedtert & The Medical College of Wisconsin, the only academic medical center in Southeastern Wisconsin. The Medical College of Wisconsin physicians work closely with local physicians and hospital staff.

"By expanding our facility's services, the Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics will offer patients convenient access to highly specialized care from The Medical College physicians right here in their own community," said Mark Lodes, M.D., chief medical officer, Froedtert & The Medical College Clinical Ventures Group, in a news release.

Medical College of Wisconsin physicians perform surgical procedures at St. Joseph's Hospital and utilize lab, radiology and other ancillary services at the hospital. They provide consults and collaborate with community physicians to provide comprehensive and coordinated care.

The new Specialty Clinics are divided into three major pods or separate sections -- urology, with eight exam rooms; cardiology, with six exam rooms; and internal medicine, with eight exam rooms. The current Specialty Clinics have just eight exam rooms, while the new clinic will expand to 22 exam rooms.

Other key physical features of the new Specialty Clinics include: a treatment room; procedure suite; consultation room; large reception area, with views of the prairie; complimentary refreshments for patients and their family members; new patient check-out area and a

call center, staffed with nurses and certified medical assistants.

Construction of the \$18 million Kraemer Cancer Center, including the Froedtert & The Medical College Specialty Clinics at St. Joseph's Hospital began in April 2011 and was completed in May 2012. CG Schmidt Inc., Milwaukee, provided general contractor services, with Zimmerman Architectural Studios Inc., the project architectural firm.

The Froedtert & The Medical College of Wisconsin Specialty Clinics opened on the campus of St. Joseph's Hospital in February 2009. The addition of Medical College specialists to the community for the first time enabled area residents to have more choices and access to physicians from Southeastern Wisconsin's only academic medical center.

The opening of the Specialty Clinics was a sign of the innovative academic-community partnership, established in July 2008, with the affiliation of St. Joseph's Hospital with Froedtert Health.

Since 2009, the Specialty Clinics have continued to grow in the types of specialties offered, number of physicians, physician availability and patient volume.

H-E-K Scholarship Scramble to feature 5 person teams

The Hon-E-Kor Golf Scholarship Committee has changed the format of this year's fundraising outing to benefit the KHS golf program. This year's scramble style outing will allow five person, co-ed teams.

The committee will be hosting the third annual Scholarship Scramble with the help of the KHS boys and girls golf teams to fund an annual golf scholarship. The recipient of the H-E-K Family Golf Scholarship will be announced and awarded that night. The fundraiser not only benefits the scholarship recipient, but local high school golf programs as well.

The Scholarship Scramble will take place Saturday, August 4 at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club in Kewaskum. Registration will begin at 1:00 p.m. with a shotgun start at 2:00 p.m. The day will conclude with a delicious buffet style dinner will begin around 7:00 p.m. and the recognition and awards program at around 8:00

p.m.

The event will be a five-person mixed (co-ed) team competition using a select drive scramble with a modified Stableford Scoring system (points rather than scores in respect to par). The change from the previous format is to encourage greater participation in the 18-hole annual fundraising event. Candy Tree owner Chris Jung stated, "It was very fun to have the kids here. They were full of questions, from how did I get in the business to how many customers I get a day."

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
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



It wasn't more batting practice or an adjustment in their hitting style.

No, it was a game of kickball that helped loosen up Kewaskum's baseball team and bring the bats back.

The Indians in the past week went 2-1 in conference (2-2 overall) to remain atop the Eastern Wisconsin Conference along with Sheboygan Falls. This week determines the conference champion as both

teams are tied with two losses. Plymouth is right behind with three, and Kewaskum was scheduled to play at Plymouth Monday and at Falls on Thursday.

After a 2-1 loss in their second straight pitching duel with Falls on Monday (the first was a 1-0 victory last month), Coach Doug Gonring scheduled a game of kickball for Wednesday's practice.

"At some point you have to make it fun. Make 'em giggle," he said.

It's an annual event for Gonring, who used to schedule softball games. This year he switched to kickball. It was a barefoot game next to the field with junior varsity taking on varsity. Coach Casey Scheel even played and got laid out once.

The Indians responded with two straight conference wins by a combined score of 31-1.

"I think everybody was uptight," said Garrett Yahr after a 14-1 win over Kiel on Friday.

Indeed, it seemed the Indians were in mid-season doldrums and pressing somewhat. After winning 12 straight, their bats quieted, which had a direct impact on team enthusiasm and performance.

Now, with their third straight conference title within their grasp, Kewaskum is back to having more fun. In the team huddle before the Kiel game, the Indians chanted "loose" in unison before taking the field. Kewaskum sprayed balls to all fields in slamming 13 hits and took full advantage of six Kiel errors in cruising to the five-inning shortened victory. Seven hits came in the bottom of the fourth that yielded seven runs.

Tony Gonring went 2-for-2 with two RBIs and a walk. Yahr, Brad Boegel, Sam Olla and Brandon Chapman each went 2-for-3 and had two RBIs. Olla had two doubles and Chapman one. Ethan Vetter, usually a courtesy runner for Chapman, got a base hit to center and scored twice.

"They finally hit the ball," said Coach Gonring. "They started to go the opposite way and they actually started to have fun."

"We're starting to see the ball better and starting to hit the ball hard," said Yahr.

Corey Burdick pitched the first three innings and allowed one run, whiffing one and walking three. Zach Hedlund got the win by pitching the fourth inning. Jake Hardy finished up with two strikeouts.

Against Two Rivers the day before, Kewaskum scored two touchdowns and a field goal for a 17-0 thrashing.

Gonring was 3-for-3 with a double and three RBIs. Olla was 3-for-4 with two RBIs. Boegel was 2-for-5 with a home run and three knocked in. Yahr

was 2-for-3 with a double and Austin Goeden 1-for-2 with a triple and three RBIs.

Hedlund pitched two innings, whiffing two and walking one. Hardy pitched three and got the win, whiffing six and walking two.

On Saturday in a non-conference game against Marquette, the Indians lost, 9-4. Marquette scored three runs in the sixth and five in the seventh.

Gonring was 2-for-3 with an RBI. Boegel was 1-for-3 with a solo homer.

Boegel pitched three innings and allowed three hits and whiffed two. Yahr pitched two, allowing one hit and one run, whiffing two and walking one. Hardy pitched 2/3 of an inning and allowed five runs, walking two. Gonring pitched one inning and gave up three runs, waling and whiffing two each in taking the loss. Burdick pitched one third of an inning. Kewaskum was 18-5 and 13-2 in the EWC headed into the final week of the regular season. After the two biggies against title contenders Plymouth (12-3) and Sheboygan Falls (12-2) - and the only other teams in the EWC above .500 - the Indians host Campbellsport on Friday in the finale.

They earned a no. 1 seed and thus get a bye in the first round of the playoffs, meaning they don't play until July 13. Gonring has expressed frustration with the WIAA's scheduling and in figuring out how to keep the team fresh. They host the winner of Howards Grove and New Holstein.

Two more wins the following Monday, July 16, at sectional host Sheboygan Falls, sends the Indians to the state tournament at Concordia.
