Towns of Farmington, Scott issue burning bans Burning not an issue for Kewaskum

With the drought forcing some surrounding townships to institute burning bans, Kewaskum residents should be on alert. At the village board meeting on July 16, Fire Chief, Mark Groeschel, wanted board members input regarding a burning ban for the village.

At the Washington County fire chiefs meeting, Groeschel learned about 50% of municipalities (townships, villages and cities) have issued burning bans. The DNR has issued burning bans, but Kewaskum is not included in those areas.

Washington County issued a burning advisory on June 28. Drought conditions are conducive to rapid fire spread as well as extreme fire behavior. The towns of Kewaskum and of Wayne have not issued a ban, but have urged residents to use caution.

Town of Scott issued a burning ban on July 9 and Town of Farmington on July 28. Penalties vary, dependent upon whether the fire is intentional or accidental, and based off municipality ordinances and fire codes.

"We haven't had a problem yet, but that is not to say it's not going to happen," Groeschel stated.

According to village ordinance, residents can have recreational fires such as grills, as long as the fire is contained and can be extinguished if necessary, such as a water hose. A burning ban would not affect recreational fires.

A burning ban would make it illegal to have open flames including outdoor fireplaces, fire pits, burning lawn waste, open campfires or using personal fireworks. Burning bans remain in effect until further notice off weather and fire department recommendations.

Drought conditions have not impacted the village's water supply, but a substantial fire could force the fire department to tap into village supply. Fires outside the village limits require drafting from rivers, streams or other natural water sources. Decreased water levels would force fire department using village supply.

Village municipal code states the fire chief has the authority to issue a ban. Village board members trust Groeschel to make the decision despite other municipalities require burning bans to come from the governing body.

Drought conditions are similar to those in 1988. Potential problems are not limited to agriculture, but also to residential property damage from fire loss. Groeschel monitors conditions daily. He asks residents to use common sense and please refrain from open burning. If anyone has questions or concerns regarding burning, please contact your local fire department.

Brettingen leads Warriors to a perfect season

They moved to a new site this season, but Kewaskum's Stefanie Brettingen and her Wisconsin Warrior teammates are still playing their same old winning style football in the Independent Women's Football League.

"Our owner wanted to get a bigger market for us," Brettingen, the team's standout quarterback said last week, explaining the team's move from Kenosha to Greendale High School.

The move is certainly more convenient for Brettingen, who is managing the McDonald's restaurant in Grafton. Still the main thing on Brettingen's mind at this point is moving her team along to the championship of the league.

First up was the Phoenix

Phantomz, who the Warriors played on June 30th. By finishing with a perfect mark of 8-0 in the Midwest Division, which includes the Rockford Riveters, the Iowa Crush, the Madison Cougars and the Minnesota Vixen, the Warriors earned home field advantage for the two games leading up to the title game, which will be played in Round Rock, Texas, which is situated close to Austin.

Madison was really the only team to give the Warriors a run for their money, with the second game ending up at 14-12 in the Warriors favor.

In that contest, the game was tied at 6-6 at intermission, then early in the fourth quarter the Cougars took a 12-6 lead but missed the 2-point conversion try.

Following the kickoff, the Warriors went to work offensively and were

quite efficient, using the no huddle offense even though there was lots of time remaining.

"We moved the ball right down the field," Brettingen said, reporting when the Warriors reached the 30-yard line, she hooked up with Shawn Burrow from Milwaukee for a TD pass. "She (Burrow) caught the touchdown and the 2-point conversion."

The touchdown came with seven minutes remaining, so the Warriors still had some work to do on defense, and there were some anxious moments until the Cougars fumbled on the Warrior 30-yard line. "We recovered and ran out the clock," Brettingen said, indicating the first game between the same teams was also pretty close with the Warriors winning 16-0.





KEWASKUM- In 2007, Seung-Hui Cho opened fire on fellow classmates at Virginia Tech for seven and one-half minutes and averaged four shots with three dead every minute. On Saturday, July 14, Kewaskum Police received rapid response training at Kewaskum High School to protect our community against such threats.

Washington County Sheriff Lt. Martin Schulteis, who is also a member of the S.W.A. T. team trained at Fair Park Elementary in West Bend back in April. After hearing about it, Chief Tom Bishop inquired and arranged for similar training for Kewaskum's police force, so the village "can have faith that their local police department is ready to respond to an active shooter situation if needed."

Schulteis began the training with a safety check to prevent accidental injury. Afterward, he presented a power point presentation to discuss key elements of training. In an active shooter situation, officers need to be prepared to act aggressively with speed and make quick decisions.

"It is no longer permissible to be standing outside setting up a perimeter waiting for a S.W.A.T. team to come," Schulteis said, "To wait is contrary to our obligation to uphold and serve." The longer an officer waits for back-up, more people die.

Active shooter incidents share common traits including: they are well planned attacks, include unpredictable behavior, have pre-incident signs, they occur in target rich environments like schools, mass murder is the goal, they take about 10 minutes, shooters have no escape plan, and nine out of 10 shooters are suicidal.

The average age of a shooter is 14 and one-half years of age. "You (an officer) have to be mentally prepared

to take a central nervous system shot on a 14-year-old and immediately stop his aggressive actions," Schulteis said, "You are stopping a threat."

Kewaskum police officers trained in teams in three different drills to utilize in final simulated hostage scenes. Officers were required to wear full armor, because FX marking rounds were used as simulated gunfire and could cause injury.

First, teams learned how to move through hallways to locate a threat by deputies Jesse Williams and Buck Robertson of the Washington County Sheriff S.W.A.T team.

Next, Schulteis guided each team through the tactics used to resolve a hostage situation with the aid of Kewaskum auxiliary police officer, Simon Kemp, who played the role of hostage. Deputy Mike Anderson of the Washington County Sheriff's Department and Charles Vanderheiden, a firearms instructor, guided each team through rescue and carry techniques as well as stairwell clearing.

In the event such an incident occurs in a Kewaskum school, members of Washington County S.W.A.T team would assist Kewaskum officers. If all law enforcement officers are trained the same, officers from multiple districts could work together without problems.

"You may have to risk your life," stated Schulteis, "This is an active situation, and we may take casualties, but sound tactics and practice put you at the advantage."

All Kewaskum police officers took part in the training. The Sheriff's Department assigned a deputy to the village to handle calls while the training occurred. Kewaskum's new part-time officers were not at the training, but both had already received training prior.

Instructors thought the training went well, despite Kewaskum having never trained for it. Since the officers

only had four hours of training, Chief Bishop would like officers to rapid response train on an annual basis. Training works for other locations such as a business.

According to National Center for Education Statistics, homicides in school settings have decreased significantly over the years making schools one of the safest places for children.

Kewaskum officer Barry Granrath, currently serves as the school district police liai-

son. He is on site at the high school and travels to district schools in the village as well. However the Board of Education recently voted to not renew the contract with the village in October that would end the position in the future.

"If we ever had an active shooter situation in our high school, we are fortunate to have an officer in the school as that officer would be the first to respond. Seconds count in these situations and having an

Rapid response training may never be used here in Kewaskum, but with shootings killing more students than fire, Chief Bishop wants to ensure the safety of the community against all threats. "The chance is realistic and we need to be prepared for it," Bishop states.





TOWN of BARTON- In January 1947, a recognized landmark for local farmers planted its seeds. West Bend Elevator celebrated 65 years of successful family business over the weekend.

When John Kratz returned home from military service, he worked at Thiel's Feed Mill in Slinger. A business man in the making, he knew there wasn't enough room for two mills, and began to look for different locations to start a similar business.

"I was three when my mom and dad bought the business," Joyce Gonring, the only child of the Kratzs, remembers. "Thiel was one of the people that helped him buy the business." Dave Gonring, Joyce's husband, joined the company in 1957 and continued the story. "He [Kratz] went to all banks, and they all turned him down. His boss [Thiel] and two farmers financed him."

Originally West Bend Elevator was off Highway 33, near downtown West Bend. Knowing the business would not survive downtown, Kratz began acquiring land one parcel at a time in the area known today as the northwest corner of Highway 45 and county Highway D.

In 1966, Kratz began building the West Bend Elevator. Seven parcels later, on June 27-28, 1980, West Bend Elevator celebrated its grand opening. Today they service not only Washington County, but Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Dodge, and Sheboygan counties as well.

"Once we got out here, it was a big step," Dave Gonring said, "Our customers had trouble crossing the railroad tracks in West Bend. It took a long time

to go across the tracks, because they were always switching trains."

West Bend Elevator is more than a grain and feed elevator. "It really concerning to us we have been here over 65 years and people don't know what we do," Joyce Gonring said. "We try to advertise as much as we can."

The elevator services 400 farm customers on average, mainly dairy (90%). The remaining 10% account for beef, hog, horse, poultry and other small animals. Consultants retain customer service standards with frequent trips to customers for problem solving.

Services offered by West Bend Elevator include feed, salt, nutritional services, hobby farm supplies, bulk delivery, grain storage up to 350,000 bushels, and landscaping supplies. Mary Jo Otten, daughter of Dave and Joyce, defines the variety as a hand with fingers representing feed, grain, store, salt, and landscape. "We need all five to survive."

With the talents of landscape designer, Sherry Boedeker, full service landscape installation is available. The store offers a variety of birdseed (manufactured on premises since 1980), pet supplies, a tack store and unique gifts. Small livestock- chickens, ducks, and turkeys- are available in spring and special order thereafter.

"When customers come in they can get advice on how to use the products," Mike Otten, President of West Bend Elevator, commented, "Come into the store and people will be able to give them advice on how to use these particular products." Items purchased have free delivery.

"They have gone out their way to take care of their customers," says Bob Pick, a

customer, "They handle them like part of the family."

With farmer clientele, the company remains involved in local 4-H and FFA groups and attends livestock auctions in four neighboring counties. Mike Yahr, an employee, works with Campbellsport High School's agriculture class to raise animals.

West Bend Elevator's success is not just family, but great employees working with the family. "We try to treat them all as family," Joyce Gonring expressed, "As anyone who owns a business knows, if you

don't have good employees, you don't succeed."

As for the future, the company wants to expand current services, "We are always looking to expand in the feed industry," says Mike Otten. Recently an eighth parcel was acquired with the purchase of the adjacent Knoeck farm.







Moraine Park hosts manufacturing adventure camp

Students from area middle and high schools spent the week of June 18 through 22 at Moraine Park Technical College learning about manufacturing through instruction, hands-on activities and meeting leaders in the manufacturing business during the Toolin' It! summer camp. The camp covered a range of topics in manufacturing from computer-assisted design and CNC, to electricity and welding.

Sixteen students in ages ranging from 13 to 16 from Campbellsport, Fond du Lac, Hartford, Kewaskum, Rubicon, Slinger and West Bend filled the room on the first day of camp to learn about design. They were able to experiment with SolidWorks, a 3D mechanical CAD program.

"It's appropriate that students begin with design," said Kim Olson, a tool design engineering technology instructor at Moraine Park. Design isn't made in the shop. "Everything needs to be designed prior to being produced on the shop floor."

Tom Roehl, engineering technology instructor at Moraine Park, taught the students on Tuesday about the concept of value added. "Adding value to a piece of material is the core of how manufacturers make a profit," Roehl said. Roehl hopes that the students take away an interest in machining

as a career possibility, an understanding of the benefits of manufacturing as a career and an appreciation for how manufacturers improve our society.

On Wednesday, Mark Wamsley, electricity instructor at Moraine Park, led the students in a project where they installed wiring to make a light bulb turn on.

After discussing safety equipment and protocol on Thursday morning, the students suited up for some welding projects and worked in groups of two. When they developed enough skill with tacking two pieces of metal together, they moved on to more complicated projects like welding together a model-sized motorcycle.

"My favorite part of the Toolin' It camp was the welding day," said Scott Steger, as he showed off his freshly welded model-sized motorcycle. Steger is an eighth-grader at Kewaskum Middle School.

Moraine Park welding instructor Jeff Beach said there is a shortage of quality welders, and there will be a lot of opportunities for students interested in welding and fabrication. There's a misconception that all jobs in manufacturing are "low paying" and "unsafe," he added. "That's not the case."

The camp concluded on Friday with field trips to Craft Cast Company in Jackson;

Kettle Moraine Coatings in West Bend; and Signacast, out of Hartford.

Todd McDonald, president of Signacast, said the tour provided a way to educate students what is possible" in manufacturing. When asked what types of classes should

students pay attention to if they want to work for this company in the future he answered by saying "every skill they're teaching in school is used here" including math, science, and reading.

Nuts, Bolts & Thingamajigs is an organization that

provides manufacturing camps such as the "Toolin' It" camp to encourage students to investigate a career in manufacturing. For more information, visit morainepark.edu/toolinit.







Indians end state run in final round shutout against Sheboygan Falls

SHEBOYGAN FALLS

Another stellar season ended with heartbreak for Kewaskum's baseball team as the Indians fell short of going to state.

Kewaskum lost to its conference rival, Sheboygan Falls, 6-0, in the sectional final on Monday, completing another 20-win season too early.

"We got down early and we didn't have the bats to get back in the game," said senior shortstop Sam Olla. "We had some hard shots in the beginning but just right at people."

The Indians' hitting has been inconsistent most of the season, and on Monday it was key again. The Indians only managed three hits off of Nate Heili, the only Falls pitcher to beat them in the regular season in a 2-1 decision on June 26 in which he allowed two hits.

This time, Heili scattered three hits, five walks and hit a batter. He struck out six. Kewaskum only advanced a runner to third in the final inning.

Ace Brad Boegel started for Kewaskum for the fourth time against Falls and was taken out after allowing five runs in 1 2/3 innings and getting hurt by one of the Indians' four fielding errors on the night. Garrett Yahr went the next 4 1/3, not allowing a run.

"My pitching was off from the start," said Boegel. "They played a better game. It seemed like they came ready to play. We didn't do that very much."

Supportive hugs from family and friends did little to

console a teary-eyed team that had its sight set on advancing to the state tournament for the first time in several years. The new sectional format had Kewaskum as the early favorite with competition coming from its own Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which it has dominated for four years straight, and the Central Lakeshore Conference, a wood-bat league with smaller schools, rather than having to advance past the larger West Bend schools which had a couple of powerhouses the past few years.

If the game had a turning point, it came on a controversial call in the second inning. Mike Burdick grounded a single to right field. As he went to round first, Falls' first baseman Jake Meyer was standing on the base so Burdick shoved him. Meyer fell to the ground and was shaken up but stayed in the game.

This prompted a several-minute conference by all three umpires. The final decision was to call Burdick out and throw him out of the game for malicious play. Kewaskum Coach Doug Gonring argued defensive interference to no avail, and the Indians lost any momentum a one-out single would have given them.

"Most ridiculous call for three umpires. The defensive player should be the heck out of the baseline," said Gonring.

Down 5-0 and already in a nearly insurmountable hole - these teams combined to score eight runs in three games against each other coming in - that took major air out of Kewaskum's tattering sail.

"It's just how that situation changes the whole

thing," said Gonring.

After relying on pitching all year, including two complete-game performances from Boegel against Plymouth and Falls that won conference in the final week of the regular season, the Indians' defense and hitting didn't step up when it needed to most.

The Indians weren't as sharp from the start, although Yahr only allowed one hit and two walks while whiffing four. In the field, the Falcons made zero errors to the Indians' four which led to four runs. At the plate, the Falcons racked up eight hits to Kewaskum's three. "We went silent. We didn't hit the ball," said Gonring. "They made every defensive play."

Olla lined out to third to start the game, and Yahr clocked a long fly to left field caught near the fence in the second inning. The Indians' hits came on an Olla groundball single to center, Burdick's grounder through the right side and a Nick Banks soft liner to left center.

After two strikeouts, Kewaskum loaded the bases in the bottom of the seventh but grounded out to end the game. It all ended too early. Kewaskum finished the season 23-6 and with its fourth straight conference title at 16-2.

"I'm just sorry that we couldn't make it to state," said Olla. "That was one goal I had and I couldn't accomplish it."

Boegel, one of the best players in school and conference history, said Kewaskum baseball has meant a lot to him.

"It sucks that I have to go out this way and the seniors have to go out this way," he said.

But he started some lifetime relationships.

"I made some friends I'll never lose," he said.

Kewaskum 9, Two Rivers 0

In the Monday semifinal earlier on the weekend, the Indians cruised past Two Rivers but couldn't get the 10th run to end the game early in the heat.

Olla was 2-for-5 with two RBIs and two runs. Yahr was 1-for-2 with two RBIs and a run. Boegel and Burdick each had a hit and RBI, and Boegel scored twice. Tony Gonring had a hit and two RBIs, and Bryce Thull had a hit.

Brett Boegel pitched the first three innings, allowing five hits while whiffing three. Yahr pitched two and allowed two hits and struck out three. Zach Hedlund pitched one and allowed one hit while walking one and whiffing two. Gonring pitched one inning and allowed one hit.

Kewaskum 3, Howards Grove 2 (July 13)

That nail-biting, hair-losing, late-inning drama that characterized Kewaskum the past couple of seasons finally made an appearance this year as the Indians won in the final at-bat.

"They finally jumped around like they won something," said Coach Gonring. "They haven't even done that for conference."

Tied at 2-2 in a pitchers' duel that on paper had Kewaskum easily winning, the Indians entered the seventh inning having to score or go into extra time.

Of course they started off with two strikeouts. Then, Tony Gonring, on a 3-2 count

and down to his last strike, punched a line drive single to center.

Up came leadoff hitter Olla, who, on 1-0 count destroyed the ball on a hot line drive. But it sailed foul, just off the left-field line. He wouldn't make that mistake again.

On the next pitch, Olla smashed a line drive to right center. Gonring, one of the team's fastest runners, was going on contact and never stopped. He scored without a throw as fans and the Indians went ballistic.

"The first pitch I was looking middle in and I just hooked it foul," said Olla. On the second, "I just sat back and took it to right center. I thought it was going to hit the gap and he was going to score."

"I had no idea where it was going," Gonring said of Olla's hit. "I was going to score. I almost tripped around second, though."

Gonring described his key at-bat when he got to 3-2.

"I know I didn't want the umpire to call me out. I was thinking just fouling it off if it was close," he said. "It was a curveball, a meatball."

His dad said that speed at the bottom of the order helps.

Tony's at-bat was huge - gets that big hit," he said. "That's why I've had Tony batting in the 9 hole, so we can start with the top of the order." Boegel went the distance, allowing six hits and two walks while whiffing 11. For Howards Grove, Ashton Holzman allowed nine hits and no walks in 6 2/3.

Burdick, Gonring, Olla and Yahr each had two hits.
