## Sixteen KSD teachers file lawsuit against district with WEAC over salaries

Kewaskum school teachers' salaries remain a mystery as negotiations continue. In March 2012, 16 teachers with the help of WEAC attorney Steve Pieroni, filed a Notice of Claim, stopping the School Board from setting base wages for the 2011/12 and 2012/13 school years.

On June 29, 2011, Gov. Walker enacted ACT 10, which affected teachers' salary increases. In the past, teachers were awarded a minimum of 3.8% increase of base salary as per Qualified Economic Offer (QEO). Lane and step method was used to define base salaries.

Lanes are horizontal pay raises based off continued education credits (six per five year requirement to retain license). Steps are vertical base pay raises based on years of service. A teacher could earn two increases per school year.

In 2000, credit requirements

were replaced with the Professional Development Plan (PDP); however, Kewaskum teachers could still receive base salary increases for earned credits.

Now, all 424 school districts in Wisconsin need to create new teacher salary schedules. Base pay multiplied by CPI (Consumer Price Index) give school districts the budget for cost of living wage increases without going to referendum. Districts, however, are not required to use the money for that purpose.

"When Act 10 was implemented some teachers, pursuing credits paid out in March and October for each year, got caught in the middle," Superintendent Jim Smasal said, "They were still trying to operate under the old system for their raises, but Act 10 said that was no longer acceptable." Under the old system, a total of 29 teachers would have changed lanes because of credits earned. ACT 10 ended all teachers' contracts on June

29, 2011, but those teachers believed they should be compensated based on earned credits.

"We are trying to be fair and just across the board for all 29, and we came up with a system based on the amount of credits they took and gave them a dollar amount tied to that," Smasal said.

Presently, 13 teachers are not part of the claim, and 12 have signed agreements with the promise of a one-time bonus for credits earned with checks issued. The thirteenth is out of town until August, but per phone conversation indicated they would sign.

Sixteen teachers didn't like the proposed settlement and filed a Notice of Claim, as provision of statute and ordinance required in Wisconsin prior to lawsuit. Pieroni was given a settlement offer for his clients, but rejected it.

"I was personally disappointed by

## Goedens to receive racing honors

On August 4, two Kewaskum natives will share a father and son honor like no other. Willie and Don Goeden are one of three father and son pairs being honored from the Sheboygan Fair Board as Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Racing (EWSC) champions.

Stock car racing has three categories- modified/sprint, sportman/late model, and grand national/hobby stock. Honorees this Saturday include over 100 drivers from divisions since 1960.

Willie began his affair with cars with the Joey Chitwood Show as a stunt car driver. In 1959, he started his racing career with "stocked modifieds" and racing as much as six nights a week and sometimes twice on Sundays.

In the 1973/74 EWSC modified/sprint championships, Willie won with his #1 car that was built up from two frame rails with his pit crew including sons Dave and Don, Jerry Zingsheim and Dave Wilson.

Later, Willie left the modified division in pursuit of the late model division and won the 1976 All-Pro Late Model division. In 1982, he won the Slinger Super Speedway championship with his #72 car.

Don began racing and won Rookie of the Year in 1985. Ten years later he claimed IRA (International Racing Association) Rookie of the Year in 1995 and championship in 1999. In between, he won the 1992/93 EWSC modified/sprint championship.

Willie and Don Goeden are the only father and son pair to have both won modified/sprint division championships. Don continues to race on occasion with a 360 sprint in Plymouth.

Racing begins at 7 p.m. on Saturday, August 4 at the Sheboygan Fair Grounds in Plymouth. Willie Goeden's championship cars #1 and #72 will be on display. Interviews with EWSC champions will take place during intermission.



## Kewaskum school nutrition program gets a makeover

After great debate over the future of Kewaskum School District's food nutrition program, the 2012-13 school year will offer new choices for students. Terri Miller, formerly of A'Viands, was appointed by the school board as the new Food Service Manager for the district.

Kewaskum School District contracted A'Viands in 2011 for food service when Kathy Robinson left her position as Food Service Director. Though school equipment was used, employees and menu choices were determined by A'Viands. A'Viands had problems. Children didn't agree with the menu choices. Board member, Jim Leister, tried to intervene to improve the situation, but had limited success.

At the school board meeting on June 11, a motion to renew the contract with A'viands failed 4-2. According to Troy Hanson, the school budget was down \$20,000. Revenue was

about the same, but the number of kids decreased and the school district saw a ten cent cost increase.

The failed motion ended the contract with A'Viands. The district had to make a decision on whether to find another vendor or keep the position in-house.

The school board recog-

nized the leadership experience Miller had with A'Viands and hoped to save the district time and money to find a replacement. Board President Tim Ramthun, on behalf of the district, said, "We moved to see if we could retain Ms. Miller as a food service director. She was already in the role."

Miller "appreciated all the excitement" about her coming on board after being with A'Viands for only a year.

At the school board meeting held on June 25, board members Leister and Bill Kesting motioned to offer a one-year, 220 day contract from July 1, 2012 - June 30, 2013 to Miller as Food Service Manager with a total compensation of \$53,000 and no health or dental insurance.

Her new position isn't without challenges. Food nutrition services have new regulations to follow. Miller plans to "provide a healthy and exciting environment" for students. Miller's previous experience included menu planning at the college and university level, where she planned menus with similar regulations.

Miller's appointment was approved by the school board on July 9, and Miller signed on July 10.

"I am very excited," Miller states, "I look forward to a great year."



the notice of claim," President Tim Ramthun states, "It put a barrier up between the Board and the educators with having a chance to work this out directly. Law now prohibits any direct discussion other than with the attorney."

Though the QEO provided a positive impact for teachers, a district's revenue limit was locked based off student enrollment. With over 75% of school districts losing enrollment and operation expenses increasing, schools routinely have less money to spend each school year. The district had a \$954,000 shortfall last year.

"We can't afford to pay people like we paid them in the

past," Smasal said, "Because there is no money."

Even though ACT 10 eliminated the QEO revenue limit, school districts are still given the same amount decided upon in 1992. If state funds are available for an increase, it is a flat fee per child across the board and doesn't take into account a district's change of needs since 1992.

Rules for defining base salaries were not set until March, so 2011/12 teacher contracts are being negotiated. Until those are completed, the 2012/13 contracts are on hold. With roughly 80% of the annual budget for personnel, creating base salaries to attract the best young teachers as well as retain

seasoned teachers needs to be decided.

According to Ramthun, base wage for 2011/12 and 2012/13 school years cannot be negotiated until all 29 settlements are signed.

"We are working hard to address it the best way we can," explained Ramthun. "We would like to find middle ground. They deserve respect, yet we have to work within our means for the good of all, not just a defined group."

Pieroni was asked to comment on behalf on the teachers he represents, however he was unable to comment due to being out of his office.





Seth Bartelt, 13, described the county fair experience as working all summer for 15 minutes of glory. Living on his family's town of Wayne farm, he says that showing livestock is a "fun experience, though you do a lot of work hoping to end up on top."

His lamb was sold for \$7.25 per pound to Dave's Excavating and his steer went for \$3 per pound to his aunt and uncle Rick and Beth Steiner. According to Bartelt, his steer under finished because the heat affected the steer's behavior including eating.

His rabbits placed well; however, claiming grand champion of fur and reserve of breed Mini Rex.

Four years of showing experience as reference, he felt the auction sales were amazing. Though some funds will be used for future animals and personal items, money from the auction is for college. Savannah Dei started 4-H

as soon as she could. Nine years later with sisters, Aubrey and Katelyn, her family is one of the most competitive in the county.

Now, she searches for 'the best make and model' of livestock. Dei began showing only pigs, but after seeing Brock May's success in claiming titles of grand champion steer at the state fair, she decided to pursue showing cattle. Now it is has become a passion.

"I spent more hours than last year on chores," she said, "but it was definitely worth it." Her steer claimed the title of grand champion and sold at auction to Farmer's Implement for \$2.75 per pound.

Her pig placed as reserve grand champion. Farmer's Feed and Grain purchased it for \$5.75 per pound.

The youth learn how a business runs as auction profits will often be used to pay off costs from feed and other necessities for her multiple livestock. If anything is left over, it will go toward next year's animals.

Dei is thinking about showing lambs next year, but has not made any decisions.

Youth showing livestock learn lessons described by Michael Schladweiler, 18, as playing football, because "you practice and practice, but when you play the game, you either win or lose." Schladweiler along with many other youth in Washington County entered livestock in the county fair in hopes of winning top honors.

Schladweiler lives on his family's farm and has been entering livestock in the fair for over seven years. "With so much time and effort you put in," he said, "it makes you feel good that it pays off."

Raising animals means a lot to him. Though he recently graduated from Kewaskum High School, he hasn't decided his career path and taking some time off. Money from the auction is being saved for future college expenses.

pound by Helena Chemical at the livestock auction. His pig was named Reserve Champion Barrow and at auction it brought at price of \$4.75 per pound by Bunzel's Meat Market.

Ashley Thiemer, 18, became attached to her pig "Margaret". She lives on a hobby farm just outside of Kewaskum with her family. Twice a day she would walk and talk to her pig and Margaret knew her name.

"She was my baby," Thiemer said, "my dog. She would follow me around." Though she became attached to Margaret, it wasn't as bad as the first year she showed animals when she cried as it was time to say goodbye.

When Thiemer was young, she would walk through a barn holding her nose because of the smell. By sixth grade, when her dad asked if she would like to show a pig at the fair, she was interested and decided to try.

Thiemer's pig sold for \$5 per pound to her grandfather



## County Fair Auction a surprise success

Washington County Fair Livestock Auction totals exceeded expectations. This year's auction had the second most successful year with

average per pound increases across the board.

"I was impressed by everything that went down," said Jim Hawig, sales committee chairman. "With the way the economy is today, it is

hard to sell anything."

Out of the 39 lamb available, a total of 34 were selected. Jillian Bingen's grand champion lamb sold for \$988 at a price of \$6.50 a pound with United Cooperative as the purchaser. Bingen also took the second highest total of \$540. Kewaskum Frozen Food was the buyer.

Average price for lamb was \$3.97 per pound with a total of \$18,174.25 collected.

Beef prices fetched an average of \$1.93 per pound with a total of \$91,793.75. A total of 35 cattle out of 55 were selected. Savannah Dei took top prize at \$2.75 per pound for

her 1365 pound steer. Farmers Implement purchased the grand champion steer.

Lillia Janz's reserved grand champion steer took second and shared Dei's \$2.75 per pound. Thunder Pallet bought the steer.

From the swine category, top sale was held by Clarissa Janz. A 268 pound grand champion pig brought in \$2,144 and bought by Thunder Pallet. Second highest was taken by Savannah Dei with her reserved grand champion pig claiming \$5.75 a pound and purchased by Farmer's Feed and Grain.


Average price for pig was \$4.19 a pound with a total of

\$55,987.25 collected from 50 selected from 90 available.

According to Hawig, though the number of available livestock went down about 12 animals, total sales increased due to highest prices per pound. Steer per pound averages went from \$1.46 to \$1.93. Swine averages went from \$3.29 to \$4.19. Lamb averages went from \$3.45 to \$3.97.

With the highest total in auction history being \$173,000, this year's auction was only \$5,000 behind in sales at \$168,000. "The auction went excellent," said Hawig, "It couldn't have been better."


