## KMS remodels for special education students' needs

## U.S. Senate Republican Primary Tuesday

Republicans will decide Tuesday, who will run against Democrat Tammy Baldwin for the U.S. Senate race in November. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. in the Republican Primary Election.

According to Village of Kewaskum Clerk Stephanie Justmann, there is no voter ID required, except for first time voters who are registering. Absentee ballots need to be handed your municipality's clerk no later than 5 p.m. on Friday, August 10.

Candidates for the republic primary are Jeff Fitzgerald, Eric Hovde, Mark W. Neumann, and Tommy G. Thompson.

Fitzgerald is married and has two children. He graduated from University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor's of Science in Journalism. Being involved in governing bodies has been a way of life with being re-elected to Wisconsin State Assembly since 2002 and currently speaker of the assembly for 2011/12.

Fitzgerald has several issues he hopes to address as a senator. He would like to introduce a tax system to offer a competitive edge for U.S. bases companies against foreign companies. Education is important with a focus on returning more flexibility to the state and local levels. For the economy, Fitzgerald would like to expand domestic and natural gas exploration to reduce foreign dependence.

Hovde's life outside politics includes family with wife, and his two children. He is a graduate of University of Wisconsin with a degree in Economical International Relations. Hovde is also co-founder, with his brother Steve, of The Hovde Foundation which promotes clinical research for multiple sclerosis and helping people in crisis such as neglected children.

Hovde has an eight point economic plan and tax plan. The plan in-

With special education laws continually being updated, the Kewaskum School District wants to accommodate needs of all special education students. Construction for a new special education room at the Middle School began on July 18, completion is expected by September 1.

The special education team, Anne Ignatowski, Director of Pupil Services along with the Building and Grounds Committee came up with a plan to create a special education resource room. A sensory room, already available at KHS and KES, was included in the design. The proposed idea utilized existing space and used available federal money.

According to Superintendent Jim Smasal, the plan was "creative with federal money without putting

a tax burden on local taxpayers" as the school district tries to keep the education of special education students in-house.

Special education students will have a living environment area, which provides them the ability to learn how to function in familiar environments. A sensory room allows students a place to rest after becoming over stimulated. After DPI (Department of Public Instruction) approved the budget proposal on May 8 for project reimbursement, the district started looking for bids for asbestos removal and architectural design. Veolia was selected from three vendors for asbestos removal and completed removal on July 12 and 13.

WB Corp of West Bend was selected as the general contractor, and contract approval was unanimously by the school board on July 9. After air quality checks passed, construction

began on July 18.

Plans included district requirements the total cost of the renovation was to stay under \$100,000 and must be completed by September 1. Additionally, adequate space will be available for custodians and a new teacher's work room will also be finished.

From the front of the school, custodian space and a teacher's lounge area are being combined with a handicap accessible bathroom installed. Within this new room, the sensory room is located. The existing bathroom outside the room will remain the same.

Teachers' workroom area will be relocated to the counselor's room and includes a kitchenette. Room for the counselor will be moved to a room at the back of the building. Custodial services will be relocated to the old special education classroom.

## Stellpflug remembered as Kewaskum butcher

It could not have been easy, moving a family of six kids at the time—one of them as young as 11 months—to begin a new, unfamiliar business in a community which was equally unfamiliar.

But the greater New Holstein area is thankful John and Harriet Stellpflug made that decision back in 1963. The foundation they laid here—including son Mark and his wife Dianne—is a big part of the reason why New Holstein today has a grocery store the calibre of Stell's Piggly Wiggly. At the time, New Holstein's gain was Kewaskum's loss.

Both John and Harriet grew up in Kewaskum and actually first met as first graders at Holy Trinity School in 1930. The school was run by Agnesian nuns. The mothers of both John and Harriet also started at the same school in the same grade back in 1889.

Year after year John and Harriet attended school together, but it was their junior year of high school in Kewaskum when they really started going together. Harriet was a farm girl, having grown up on one of the largest dairy

farms in the Kewaskum area.

### In the butchering business

It could be said that John was involved with animals as well, only on a different end. His father and mother were butchers as had been his grandfather and grandmother and the family operated a meat market in downtown Kewaskum.

Like most family businesses then and now, the

children are often expected to do what they can to help out. John joked that he helped out "when my dad could catch me." He does recall getting a bicycle at the age of nine so that he could deliver meat to his father's customers in the village. "Now you're a delivery boy," his dad said upon presenting him the bike. By 14 he received his driver's permit to use a car to deliver meat around the area during

daylight hours.

Most of the meat market's deliveries were to village customers as rural residents often butchered their own animals. One exception was during threshing time as meat had to be delivered for the many men working out in the fields.

At first it did not appear

that John would carry on the family business as he went off to Marquette University in Milwaukee after graduating high school. A semester into his freshman year, however, his father suffered a stroke. While his father survived the stroke, John said his mother "was






### DALE L. WILKE

Dale L. Wilke, age 61, of Milwaukee, formerly of West Bend, passed away peacefully on Wednesday, July 25, 2012 at Zilber Family Hospice in Wauwatosa,

He was born on December 30, 1950 in Sheboygan to the late Marlowe and Vera (nee Gatzke) Wilke. Dale graduated from Random Lake High School in the class of 1969. Following graduation, Dale began working for the Gehl Company in West Bend. During the Vietnam War Dale left the Gehl Company and served his country honorably in the United States Navy on the U.S.S. Coral Sea. After his discharge, he returned to the Gehl Company and was employed there for many years until they closed.

Dale loved the Packers and Brewers, and especially enjoyed playing catch with his many nieces and nephews.

He will be greatly missed by his two sisters, Darlene (Gordon) Wieck of Plymouth and Diann (Patrick) Routh of Orlando, FL; his brother, Darrel (Theresa) Wilke of Random Lake; many nieces; nephews; cousins; other relatives and friends.

a pretty strong woman," his services were needed back home at the family business. "It must have been part of the divine plan," John said.

### Happy to come home

John was not all that upset to have to leave college because, after all, there was that young woman named Harriet back in Kewaskum. "I was in love at the time—still am," he said. "I didn't mind coming home and going to work."

It was 1944 when John returned home from college to help his mother. John did a lot of slaughtering at the two slaughterhouses the businesses had, one of which had been built by John's grandfather. The business was known in part for the blood sausage and blood and tongue sausage they made.

John's dad died in 1947, and in 1948 he and Harriet were married. John took over the butcher shop in 1948, renting for a couple years while he saved money to make a downpayment on buying the building and the business which he eventually did.

Over the next 15 years the meat market continued in business, and John and Harriet set out on the business of raising a family. In order they produced Jack, who is a dentist in Beaver Dam; Mary, who resides in California; David, an attorney in De Pere; Mark of New Holstein; Luke, a defense attorney in Minnesota; Rob, who is deceased; and Jane of McFarland. They have given John and Harriet 18 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

### A chance at a supermarket

Already in the early 1960s John said he "could see the small meat markets were going by the wayside." Most communities had small storefronts at which people

could buy groceries, usually several such places. But now a new creation was coming along the supermarket and they usually included meat departments which competed with the stand-alone meat markets.

John was familiar with a man by the name of John Dunn, who was the development manager of SuperValu stores in the Green Bay area. Dunn told the Stellpflugs he would help them open a supermarket in a community if they wished to do so.

"New Holstein is not the only place we looked at," Harriet said, pointing out that Fond du Lac, Port Atkinson and West Bend the latter being closest to their hometown of Kewaskum were also under consideration. In the end, Dunn and New Holstein banker/developer Adelph Langenfeld helped steer the Stellpflugs north.

Asked if it seemed foreign to operate a supermarket after only knowing the meat business, John said, "Business is business." Harriet had a different take on that, however, pointing out that John rarely did the grocery shopping in the family. "He did not know spaghetti from macaroni," she said.

### Helping at the store

But they learned together. "Right away I was involved in New Holstein doing the front end work," Harriet said, referring to the financial aspects of the business.

Those were hectic times as the couple already had six of their seven children, with Rob being just 11 months old when they moved here and Jack, the oldest, was in eighth grade. "It was a merry-go-round," Harriet said. The older children helped babysit the younger ones, and Harriet said their neighbors were always tremendous help then and today.

John and Harriet said their children always knew where they would be working on their days off from school. They were paid for their work, but not any more than any other employees. Harriet said the children did not protest working at the store and even seemed a bit competitive about it. "If my brother started when he was 9, I can start at 8," Harriet said she recalled hearing.

The Stellpflugs were proud of their children then and are rightfully so today. John said their philosophy was simple with their children: "As long as you know you're doing your best, that's what we ask of you," he said.

Asked about his years in the grocery business, John said, "I loved it. I love it all. The best things were the people I dealt with."

### Not always easy

On the other hand, John said, "It wasn't all sunshine and roses." He remembers one time he was at home in the shower when the phone rang. He got out of the shower to talk to a woman who could not get to the store that day and wanted a case of margarine set aside so that she could get it at the sale price which was going to expire that day.

"You usually laughed," at such incidents, John said. "Eventually," Harriet added.

The Stellpflugs' SuperValu store was 5,300 square feet when it opened. Today's Stell's Piggly Wiggly measures about 40,000 square feet.

John and Harriet did a little work for the new store when it first opened, but Harriet said she was not about to learn the new computer system and knew it was time to retire.

Recent mobility issues have made it difficult for John to get to the store much these days. When he was a more frequent visitor he would sometimes give Mark a word or two of advice. "Whatever it is that doesn't look right, I'll tell him," John said. But he readily admits Mark "is a much better grocer than I'll ever be."

He still runs into people who talk about his store and has to remind them, "It's not my store."

Maybe not on paper, but every foundation was built by someone.

**EDITOR'S NOTE** - Long-time Kewaskum residents will remember John who passed away, July 25. It was our intention to re-publish this story shared with us by a reader prior to John's death. John and his family were an important part of Kewaskum's history. We wish the Stellpflug family our deepest condolences over their significant loss.

## 25 Years Ago

## 25 Years Ago

June 22, 1962

The Kewaskum area was rocked by one of the most severe windstorms in many years early Sunday evening. Tornado-like winds lashed the village suddenly and unexpectedly leaving a widespread path of destruction and extensive damage. Some of the damage caused by the fierce, howling storm included a smashed trailer, part of a roof blown off, many roofs damaged, a large tent torn apart, numerous trees twisted off, injuries to a family of golfers, silos blown down, wires downed and boards, branches, toys, garbage cans, lawn furniture and other loose objects flying through the air. The "twister" threw a scare into local people and sent many of them scurrying into their basements and other protective places to escape the fury of the storm. Although it might have not been officially a tornado, it was as close to one as Kewaskum's residents care to get. Several persons reported seeing a

funnel-shaped cloud south of the village heading in this direction. They said as it approached Kewaskum the funnel flattened out and seemed to spread out into two directions. This probably is true as the brunt of the storm struck just south and north of Kewaskum while the village escaped with very little damage.

OFFICE OF THE WASHINGTON COUNTY CLERK TO THE ELECTORS OF WASHINGTON COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary to be held in Washington County on the 14th day of August, 2012, at which the nominees for the offices named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, in the sample ballot below.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the elector provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the

ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the elector shall select the party of his or her choice.

Where optical scan voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the party of his or her choice. The elector shall then fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote under the party of his or her choice. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the party of his or her choice. The elector shall then touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote.

To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If an elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initiated by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in marking his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth and properly deposit the ballot.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly. After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

## Injury sidelines Brettingen in finale Halverson claims state trapshooter title

While the NFL, collegiate and high school football seasons are just getting started, Stefanie Brettingen's year as quarterback of the Wisconsin Warriors concluded recently, and not the way she wanted it to.

First, Brettingen and the Warriors missed advancing to the championship game of the Independent Women's Football League (IWFL), and on July 27, her West team ended up on the short end of a 20-18 decision to the East team in the annual All Star game played in Texas.

"It was a close game, but I couldn't play in the second half," Brettingen said. "I got knocked out of the game a concussion."

Brettingen said she and the other two West QBs alternated in the first half. "We didn't pass very much. I think I got to throw the ball only twice," completing one of them.

After being diagnosed with the concussion, Brettingen was taken to the locker room for a while before coming back out on the field to watch from the sideline.

Brettingen said the two teams took opposing philosophies into the contest, noting the West coach was set

on getting all his players on the field, while the East leader had three quarterbacks but played just one in an effort to win.


Referring to the 45-17 loss to the Sacramento Sirens, Brettingen said, "I did OK ... I had two touchdown passes, probably 150 yards passing," but the Warriors just could not contain the Sirens' potent attack.

"At half, I think it was 24-12 ... I think that's the closest we got," Brettingen said, reporting the Sirens didn't fare as well in the title game, losing to the Montreal Blitz.

With a little rest, Brettingen is over her concussion and was ready to report to the team's first mini-camp. "I'll be at our workout on Monday (Aug. 6)," she said, indicating recruiting for the 2013 season has already begun, tryouts will be held in October and full practices will start in December.

"We're not the most talented team, but we are the most disciplined and in the best shape," she said, also praising the coaching staff, especially head coach Tom Handziak. Handziak played collegiate football for Jack Harbaugh (father of professional coaches John and Jim) and was recently named as the honorary coach of the All-American women's team, which, she said, was "a nice honor for him."

As far as the team's move to playing their games at Greendale High School, Brettingen said, "We had a nice fan base, and next year that

## Halverson claims state trapshooter title

Since the age of 11, a town of Kewaskum resident had been practicing his trapshooting skills. Carl Halverson claimed the 2012 veteran doubles trap shooting state title at Waukesha Gun Club on July 20.

Halverson was awarded a glass etched trophy provided by Tesker naming him doubles champ and will have his name published as a winner in the 2013 program for the 114th Wisconsin State Shoot.
