Thompson will challenge Baldwin in U.S. Senate race

Superintendent looking to success this school year

EDITOR'S NOTE- This is the second part to our series of reports on Back to School as students return to classes in the Kewaskum School District.

When Jim Smasal became Superintendent of Kewaskum School District, he started looking for ways to help the district's schools succeed. Smasal has created four pillars of success he feels are needed for the district.

Expectations need to be raised for everybody in the district including support staff and administration. In addition to staff, Kewaskum schools also need to create and design student learning that is college and career ready as Wisconsin adopted Common Core Standards on June 3, 2010.

"We need to give the opportunity to succeed," Smasal said, "It's very important."

Expectations need to be balanced with accountability. Smasal said, "We have to define what they are expected to do, define what you want kids to know and learn." Measurements, such as ACT scores and graduation rates, are predictors of success used to mea-

Tommy Thompson will challenge Tammy Baldwin in the U.S. Senate race in November. Locally however, it was political newcomer Eric Hovde who was the favorite. Thompson and Baldwin are vying for the seat vacated by retiring Herb Kohl who's held the seat since 1989.

"The election went really smooth with a relatively low voter turnout. By the small number of new voter registrations it is fair to say the routine, regular voters were out to vote for this election," stated Village Clerk Stephanie Justman

The village had 27% (683) of their registered voters turnout Tuesday. The village registered nine new voters.

In the village, Hovde received 224 votes, Thompson 159, Jeff Fitzgerald 120 and Mark Neumann 91.

Farmington Clerk Chris Schellinger called the election "un-eventful" however, she stated the turnout was "higher than expected." Of the 2,453 voters, 31.6% or 775 voters turned out.

Hovde was the favorite in Farmington, garnering 274 votes; Fitzgerald 172, Thompson 169 and Neumann 115.

Kriewaldt stated 456 ballots were cast in her township.

Hovde was again the favorite there with 162 while Fitzgerald received 124. Thompson was next with 101 and Neumann bringing up the rear with 50.

The town of Kewaskum also chose Hovde as their favorite giving him 97 votes. Fitzgerald was next with 65, Thompson next with 60 and Neumann with 30.

Thompson will challenge Baldwin on Tuesday, Nov. 6 in the General Election.

The Statesman will have biographies of all the candidates in the Nov. 6th election closer to November.

Hail storm takes it toll on Kewaskum residents

Though it isn't completely unusual to have snow during the warmer months in Wisconsin, Kewaskum residents received some unwelcome weather. On Tuesday, August 7, a hail storm struck the area with some hail reaching the size of golf balls not seen in the village for decades.

Damages to homes and cars were numerous around the village. The south-side of the village received the worst of the damage. Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club and Geidel's Piggly Wiggly all noted damage along with parts Hwy 45, all between 4 - 4:30 p.m.

Hail is formed when water droplets mix with ice. Updrafts during a thunderstorm allow layers to be added, much like candle dipping adds wax layers, until the hail is heavy enough to fall. Multiple updrafts, similar to tornado conditions and cool temperatures can keep these pellets in the

air for a larger time resulting in larger hail.

Dennis Butz of Smith and Hatch Insurance Company states residents should call their insurance agent for property damage concerns and get an adjuster to come out to start a claim. His company has about 25 claims ranging from roofs, siding, and cars. Residents shouldn't let any repairs start without a claim.

Tom Kudek of Auto Body Dynamics said he's had about 75 people come in for repair estimates for hail damage on cars. Kudek asks people to be patient. It will take a couple months to get through everyone.

Numerous companies going door to door offering repair services for homes has been reported. Residents should seek out local and/or reputable business. Larry Bunkelman of Bunkelman Builders, in its third generation of family ownership in the village urges residents to use local contractors and check with the Better Business Bureau.

Bunkelman stated that he's met with insurance adjusters and knows when they are looking for so he's able to help his customers in that respect. "Call your insurance company first," he stated.

Bunkelman went on to say that he is unaware of any shortages in supplies needed to fix damage. An average roof job performed by his team would take about a week. He also explained residents should make sure the contractor they choose can do the entire job as some can only do roofing, siding or windows. He along with many local contractors can handle any type of repair and provide quality craftsmanship. Chad Cook, Building Inspector for the village, wants people to know that a building permit is required in the village for roof replacement. He also stated residents in the village with questions are welcome to contact him at the village hall by phone (626-8484) or in person during normal business hours (7:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.).

Former janitor cited for theft at KHS

Kewaskum Police Department was called to investigate a crime in progress at Kewaskum High School on July 30, at 8:28 a.m. Elizabeth Mikkelson was seen placing full garbage bags in her car trunk, and other employees felt her behavior was suspicious.

Mikkelson originally refused to cooperate with a school employee to open her trunk; however, she eventually did comply with the request.

Inside the garbage bags were microfiber towels, cleaning supplies, and brand new garbage bags. According to the police report, Mikkelson said she took the bags to throw them into the dumpster. Police Officer Luke Wilhelm noted to

get to the suspect's car you had to pass the dumpster.

According to school officials, Ms. Mikkelson's suspicious behavior has been a point of interest in the past. Mikkelson's position was eliminated during recent budget cuts. Her last day with the district was scheduled for August 3.

Her personal locker was searched on school premises and nothing suspicious was found. Officer Wilhelm issued Mikkelson a citation for theft of property. Reichert stated in the report, the school district will be pressing charges.

A full investigation by the Kewaskum School District has not been completed, so no comment is available at this time.

KPD to crackdown during 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over'

Kewaskum Police will be out in force along with other law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin and the rest of the nation for the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" crackdown on drunk drivers from Aug. 17 to Sept. 3, which includes the Labor Day weekend.

Drunk driving continues to be prevalent, persistent and deadly on city streets and rural roads throughout Wisconsin. Last year, 225 people were killed and nearly 3,000 injured in

alcohol-related traffic crashes in Wisconsin. There were more than 35,000 convictions for drunk driving in Wisconsin last year.

The Kewaskum Police Department believes in the importance of keeping the roadways safe from intoxicated drivers. Drunken driving accidents are entirely preventable and by preventing and removing these individuals from our Village streets, lives will ultimately be saved.

sure both expectation and accountability.

Using data for assessing education is another element of Smasal's plans. "We need to be data driven, have good assessments and good systems to determine whether we are being successful or not."

"We can't hope that what we do will work, we need to know it is going to work," Smasal said. If something doesn't work, the data can show why, and it can be fixed. There can no longer be hoping things would work out, if they aren't,

they need to change.

Lastly, Smasal would like to find long term financial sustainability for the school district to do the aforementioned. A \$900,000 budget cut needed to be made for the 2012/13 school year. Any surplus in last year's budget had to be put in a fund reserve to offset unexpected future costs to the district.

"We have positioned ourselves to embrace the challenges that the future is going to hold," Smasal ends, "With every challenge comes opportunity, and

we are going to try to take advantage of every opportunity we can."



Bausch continues with Olympic bid

Watch the Olympics? The next one could include a local star, and she's counting on your support.

Lauri Bausch, a 2003 co-valedictorian of Kewaskum High School, is training to compete in skeleton, which has competitors riding on their stomachs down a bobsled track reaching speeds past 80 mph.

Bausch has been training in the area since March, doing the typical Olympian's schedule. She trains at 4 a.m. for two to five hours per day, six days a week, and works two jobs to support herself and her craft.

"I've been bouncing between doing sled pushes on the turf and using the weight room at Concordia, to running hills or sprinting on the track at Kettle Moraine Lutheran, to throwing med balls and doing some of my conditioning and lifts at Pleasant Valley Tennis Club, and even a few lifts at the West Bend YMCA when

schedules conflict," she said.

Bausch works an office job in Germantown and bartends a few times per week in Jackson. "It's taken a lot of discipline and structure to make it all work while finding time to recover," she said.

Bausch's fundraiser is Saturday, Aug. 25 at Jackson Pub. Live music runs from 2-6 p.m. featuring TJ Scott. For \$20, get all-you-can-drink domestic taps from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. or 3-7 p.m. A 50/50 raffle and prize auction will be held. Bausch said she barely had time to squeeze in another fundraiser this year, she picked up a protein sponsor from Illinois called Xtreme Formulations and a clothing sponsor called N.E.W.D. that will eventually develop a line to benefit Bausch's training.

"While it's been hard to find people wanting to use me as their tax write-off, it's cool knowing that others are enthused about what I am doing," she said.

Bausch will return to Lake Placid Olympic Training Center in New York to train in

September.

"I feel that I would be more physically and mentally prepared for this season's National Team Trials if I returned to Lake Placid for three weeks of push training," she said. "While I'm out there I will compete in National Push Championships and do my annual combine test (sprints, long jump, shot toss, squat and power clean testing), but my main focus is to get some solid weeks of push technique training in when there will be coaches there to provide me with constructive criticism."

Bausch is no stranger to competitive sports. Softball, basketball, volleyball, track and field, soccer, tennis have filled her life. She is a certified strength and conditional specialist and holds a degree in kinesiology with a focus on human performance/sport performance from the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

She tried skeleton while

interning at the Lake Placid in 2009. She was hesitant but it was love at first slide.

Skeleton athletes push their sled for 50 meters to get a running start before jumping onto their stomach for a breath-taking ride down a bobsled track, slightly shifting their bodies to negotiate turns. Runs are timed to 0.01 seconds. Bausch caught on quickly and qualified for the 2010-11 National Team Trials, and has been training ever since.

Now, she's going for a

bigger prize: the Olympic team and the 2014 winter games in Sochi, Russia.


Bausch said she watched the summer version when she gets time.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported on the amount of water usage due to the dry conditions. On average 9.5 to 10 million gallons of water are used per month. In May 11.5 million gallons were pumped and in June 11.9 million gallons of water were pumped. The ground water level and static level has remained constant during the dry weather. No major change in water usage has been noted. Fire Chief Groeschel expressed that some of the static water supplies that are typically used by the fire department in the case of a fire are very low and in some cases completely dry which will result in the usage of municipal water.




