Kewaskum assists Campbelsport firefighter in morning fires



Firefighters from Kewaskum assisted Campbelsport Fire Department at two fires occurring nearly simultaneously shortly after 8 a.m. Thursday, Aug. 16. Storms that hit the area are believed to have played a role in the two fires. The first fire broke out after lightning struck a barn in New Prospect (shown above). The second fire occurred at N643 Moraine Drive where a utility shed was ablaze. Upon arrival at N538 County Road SS, firefighters found the barn fully engulfed in flames. Mutual aid was requested from Eden, Cascade, Kohlsville and Theresa. Only firefighters from Kewaskum were requested at the Moraine Dr. shed fire. One firefighter was transported to St. Agnes Hospital in Fond du Lac, he was later released. Firefighters were on the scene until after noon. Thunderstorms rolling through the area this morning have created extra work for local fire departments and utility crews.

Kewaskum Police Dept. purchases new firearms

When Kewaskum Police Department hired two new officers in June, the age of service firearms became apparent, and a decision was made to find replacements. Chief Tom Bishop looked into testing two different firearm models, the Smith and Wesson M&P and the Glock.

"The ones we have now are from 1991, so it is time to update the service firearms," Bishop stated. Replacement parts are either hard to find, or no longer available. When new officers started, holsters for service firearms were no longer available because the model had been discontinued.

Both firearms had night sight, a feature current service firearms do

not have. Chief Bishop decided on the Smith and Wesson, for a total cost of \$4,933 for 11 firearms and holsters, 10 tactical weapon lights and includes trading in old weapons.

Kewaskum Police are looking forward to the new firearms expected to arrive at the end of August into early September.

New KMS principal looks forward to being part of community

EDITOR'S NOTE- This is the third part to our series of reports on Back to School as students return to classes in the Kewaskum School District.

When asked why she chose Kewaskum Middle School, Julie Skelton, the new principal, said, "Coming to a smaller district is something I had wanted to do. While I appreciated my time in Oshkosh, I felt removed from it, because it was so far away. Here I feel I can be a better part of the community, and I have the opportunity to become more involved."

Community and involvement are key words for Skelton's plans for the middle school with values learned from experience. After years in an elementary school setting, Kewaskum offered Skelton the middle school opportunity for professional development, and an option she had been discussing with Oshkosh.

After graduating from Campbelsport High School, she attended St. Norbert College. As a cheerleader, her coach emphasized community involvement. "Our coach held us to a very high standard," Skelton said, "It opened my eyes to how volunteering can influence your community."

Skelton completed her Masters of Education with an emphasis on technology at Marian University in Fond du Lac. She coached cheerleading through the wildcat program at Campbelsport for seven years while teaching.

After starting the principal program, Oshkosh Schools hired her as curriculum support and principal at Jefferson Elementary. By her second year at Jefferson, she traded her curriculum support position for the district's ELL (English Language Learner) coordinator and overseeing four translators and 14 ELL teachers.



Scrap metal stolen from Wayne town hall

The town of Wayne has been battling ongoing thief of scrap metal at the town hall. The Washington County Sheriff's Department was called out Saturday, August 11 after town employees noticed the shed had been broken into.

Usually scrap metal outside the shed had been stolen, but thieves broke the lock to

steal scrap metal from inside. The theft occurred sometime between 7 p.m. on Wednesday, August 8 and August 11 when police were notified.

Copper wire and aluminum were taken. A night deposit box was also taken when the thieves ripped it off the building. A total of \$267 of damage was estimated including money in night deposit box, repair of lock, and value of stolen metal.

Local recyclers were contacted for follow-up to see if anyone has tried to recycle similar amounts of metal. No suspects have been identified at this time.

To The Editor:

I am writing in regards to the Kewaskum School Board's decision to discontinue the School Resource Officer program. In my opinion they are making a mistake that could have dire consequences. We started the program because of the various school shootings that were happening around the country. The police department and the school board felt we needed added protection that would have an officer available in the school in the event of an incident. Since the program started there have been many incidents in the school that were handled in an expeditious manner to stop them from escalating. A prime example of this was when a student brought a firearm to the school. The school resource officer found out about it and went to the classroom immediately. The resource officer was able to take the firearm away from the student without incident. There have been many occasions when a fight would start, and having the officer in

the school it did not escalate into something more serious. The School Resource officer is also available to talk with students, parents and the staff if they have questions or problems. He is also a resource for teachers to use in their classrooms.

With the recent shootings around the country it is even more important to have the officer in the schools. This gives the ability to respond quickly in the event an incident would occur in one of our schools. Response time is critical in a serious incident and every second counts. If an officer has to respond from the road it could take five to ten minutes and that time lapse would be critical. We also have a unique situation in Kewaskum in that our schools are close; this allows the school resource officer to respond to any school in a short time. Having the resource officer in the school is also a deterrent to many possible incidents that could occur.

Everyone always thinks that shootings and other serious

things never happen in a small town but in my 38 plus years in law enforcement I learned that you never say never. I would urge the school board to reconsider their decision and reinstate the school resource officer program.



At Jefferson, she focused on parent involvement and community support such as Boys and Girls Club, though business involvement like Junior Achievement was utilized. Skelton was the district liaison and worked with the Wisconsin Planning Commission for the Safe Route to School Program.

With Jefferson named a school of recognition numerous times, the school applied for a grant and received funds for reading, professional development, math professionals and technology. Grant money allowed Jefferson to purchase many things to help student instruction including iPads.

With the middle school building now having wireless capability, Skelton looks forward to being able to use new technology. Which technology

paths will be used has not been decided.

Some changes will be available for KMS for the 2012/13 school year. As previously published, a new special education resource room is under construction to enhance the education of special education students.

Brett Zimdars has joined the KMS staff. He will be teaching Technical Education, which he has taught for two years at Oak Creek. "We are very excited to have him bringing a wealth of knowledge in the middle school areas of technology," Skelton said.

Available after school will be an extended learning time similar to tutoring for students. Students will receive extra help in specific areas or skills needed in addition to normal class time.

25 Years Ago

June 19, 1987

The Village of Kewaskum can look forward to a summer of dirt, dust and inconvenience as reconstruction and resurfacing of Highway 28 (Main Street) is set to begin next month. Work on the project, which runs from Highway 45 to Highway 144 is expected to begin July 17 with some portions of the work to run into 1988. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt stated that the contractor, Payne and Dolan, will attempt to keep Main Street partially open to at least local traffic for the three to five weeks worth of roadwork within the village. Schmidt noted however, that the work on the Main Street Bridge, over the Milwaukee River, will not be done until next year. Because the bridge will be widened by moving the sidewalks to the outside of the support pillars, work will be delayed until 1988. The total cost of the project will be 886,000, with the village's portion to run \$46,000, plus the cost for manholes, striping, and other related items.

The building which housed the Rosenheimer Department Store for over 75 years has been saved from destruction and given a chance at new life. Earlier this year it was decided the building would be torn down after attempts to sell the property had failed. Demolition had begun and it looked like the big red brick building constructed in the early 1900's would follow the same fate as the old Kewaskum Bank building, reduced to a pile of rubble. A strange turn of events has given the old Rosenheimer building a reprieve. Jeanne (Yeadeke) Griep of Mayville and her husband, Tom, came home after having passed through Kewaskum not long ago. Tom casually mentioned to Jeanne that the big old department store was being torn down. She asked just what building he meant and he said Rosenheimers. Mrs. Griep, who lived in Kewaskum until she was 16, said she remembered shopping in the store and just could not see letting the building be torn down. So after some negotiating, they managed to halt the demolition and buy the building. Work then began to give the building a new lease on life and a new name. No major changes are planned for the exterior, however, the interior is being remodeled to house a new business which Griep is starting. She will be selling antiques and collectibles and the building's new name will be The General Store Antique Mall.

Dave Nigh announced this week that Kewaskum Frozen Foods has purchased the business known as Papa Ron's Pizza and took over on May 18. The purchase of Papa Ron's is an expansion of Kewaskum Frozen Foods, noted Nigh, stating the plan is to become actively engaged in promoting pizza sales for fundraisers. The pizzas will be made at Kewaskum Frozen Foods in Kewaskum.

The 25th annual Krazy Daze sidewalk sale sponsored

by the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce will be held Tuesday, June 23. The big event of the year runs from 8 am to 8 pm and features super discounts and special buys. The silver anniversary of this big event would normally have been held after the picnic, however due to the resurfacing of Highway 28, which is scheduled to start sometime in July, it has been moved up. Krazy Daze also always offers a wide variety of food with the many outdoor sale stands and specials offered at the restaurants and taverns. In the evening there will be outdoor live music until the wee hours for your listening pleasure. Come and join the fun! (NOTE: This was actually the precursor of today's Party on the Pavement in Kewaskum. Good things DO come back to the community.)


