School District hires Intervention Coach to implement RtI strategy

Challenging today's school districts is finding innovative ways to assess a wide variety of students' educational needs. Heidi Williams, the new intervention coach for the school district's Response to Intervention (RtI) program, is a piece to that puzzle.

Williams states educational intervention is, "when the classroom is not meeting the child's needs." RtI allows for academic growth for students on all levels of learning. Students are assessed to determine if needs are being met. If not, an intervention can be developed to address areas of identified deficiency.

Under the RtI program, interventions can be created, assessed, and changed if needed. Supporting documentation of intervention techniques tried could either eliminate or support a creation of an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). For the gifted and talented students, interventions would determine appropriate challenges.

"A lot of my job is walking teachers through the process of analyzing student work," Williams states, "That

method of analyzing work is looking at the assessment, determining the different groups, and then determining how to move forward with all these different needs."

Williams brings a variety of unique skills to help the school district utilize the RtI program as mandated by The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI). She spent 13 years at Kennedy Middle School in Germantown, life and earth science, and language arts.

After earning her Masters in Curriculum and Instruction at Walden University and a Mentoring certificate through Cardinal Stritch University, Williams became the gifted and talented technology information teacher at Fox Point Bay Side. "I was there for four years. My role there blossomed into a differentiation specialist," Williams said.

Williams applied for the position in the Kewaskum School District, because she liked the community and desired the opportunity to extend her experience into the high school level.

Her belief is children are continu-

ally learning especially with technology available to them. Williams is a board member of an International Standard and Technology Education (ISTE) sub group with an interest in computer programming.

Her technology strengths led to her creation of the STRETCH (Striving to reach every talented child) model and supporting website (<http://www.stretchinstructor.com>) which offers resources to help "teachers think about becoming a 21st century educator."

Since Kewaskum School District has signed up for a Google domain, Williams states, "I hope to bring strong Google apps for education." She hopes to help the district bring technology integration and computer science skills into the classroom.

Williams is married and has four daughters ranging in ages from 8-19. From one parent to another, she tells parents in the district, "The people that know the kids the best are the parents. I always want to work with them to make sure they help in designing the education experience for their children."

Village man receives drug charges after pot plants discovered

The Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group (Drug Unit) is requesting charges on a 42-year-old Village of Kewaskum man after removing 80 marijuana plants from behind his residence on August 21st.

The plants were at various stages of growth between 1" to approximately 5' in height. Numerous items related to growing were removed from the house, which had a hidden room apparently used to start growing the marijuana plants.

The investigation started as the result of a tip. The drug unit was assisted in the investigation by the Kewaskum Police Dept.

Charges have been requested for Manufacturing Marijuana and for Keeper of a Drug House. The man is not being identified at this time as he is avoiding police and has not yet been taken into custody.

Each plant, if grown to maturity, would normally be expected to yield a minimum of one pound of salable marijuana.



Community garden thriving in drought



A view of the Kewaskum Community Garden. Despite the drought, crops have been bountiful and included many types of tomatoes, potatoes, beans, kohlrabi, corn, peppers, eggplants, carrots, beets and much more.

The Kewaskum Community Garden (KCG) is no secret in the community. It began as an outgrowth of the Kewaskum Reads Program through the Public Library. The book *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle* by Barbara Kingsolver asked the question: Are you up for the challenge? Can your family change by deliberately eating food produced in the place where you live? This is an interesting book to read and read again.

Because Wisconsin was settled by farmers, it's our heritage to pass on. How to manage our time plus grow, then preserve our own food are particularly important skills for future generations. It's essential for our children to learn these skills as they grow which is what our forefathers did. This leads to a lifetime of good nu-

trition. Following the discussions of the Kingsolver book, Kewaskum readers decided a community garden would be a valuable addition for our area.

The Kewaskum Community Garden is now in its third year. While 2012 has seen a lot of changes, most notably the increase to 20 15'x20' plots, (in 2010, there were seven plots). This year's renters included the Boys and Girls Club and Kewaskum FFA. In addition to these groups, families rented plots and children are welcomed.

The garden has welcomed inexperienced gardeners and offered scholarships from area churches/groups to those who cannot afford their own plot. Call for information about this program. Each year has seen at least one plot for the

try.

Another welcome addition to the 2012 garden was the UW Extension Washington County Master Gardener Organization choosing the garden as a 'core' project for their volunteers. The organization adds a team of local experienced people who have completed the 12-week course of training plus 24 annual volunteer hours per year within the gardening realm.

Each year the KCG has had a 'demo' plot. This year's demo plot is garden nine. The garden was planted with corn, pole beans, yellow bush beans, eggplant, carrots, broccoli and brussel sprouts. It was mulched immediately when planted with 2-3 inches of the grass clippings and re-mulched as needed. Water was used ONLY when plants were planted, then mulched closely to the plant.

This garden has NOT been watered through the drought. The corn is not as tall but the ears are full size. The beans, broccoli and eggplant are producing now. "This is perhaps the most valuable demo yet as we have quality produce and the mulch will enhance the soil again," stated organizer Bon-

nie Wenzlaff. The key to this success is the location of the garden and its close proximity to the Milwaukee River.

Future growth for the KCG will be limited by its location. However, the FFA will begin soil testing to determine where and how it might grow. At present, over half of the plots are reserved for in the 2013 season. Reservations are taken on a first come basis, and then a waiting list is started.

Future plans call for utilizing the river for water needs. The garden is in need of some community assistance with mechanics and equipment for this project. If you are able to help, contact Kris Beaver at the Kewaskum High School (262) 626-8427 or the KCG number (262) 483-6385.

Moraine Park offering CNC Machinist Boot Camps

Moraine Park Technical College is combating the skilled worker shortage by launching manufacturing skills academies in a series of 15-week boot camps. In July, Governor Scott Walker announced a Wisconsin Workforce Partnership Grant from the Wisconsin Covenant Foundation, Inc., for Moraine Park. The College is using the \$705,647 grant to provide specific training necessary to create job opportunities at partnering businesses including Amerequip Corporation, Brenner Tank, John Crane Orion, and Mid-States Aluminum Corporation. The boot camps are part of the Wisconsin Workforce Partnership Grant and will provide skills to last a lifetime.

Four Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Machinist Boot Camp information sessions will be held on Moraine Park's West Bend campus. They are set for Tuesday, Sept. 4, from 3-4:30 p.m. and 5-6:30 p.m., and Thursday, Sept. 6, from 8-9:30 a.m. and 10-11:30 a.m. Each session

will include business partner presentations, job placement opportunities, entrance requirements, program fees and CNC Machinist Boot Camp schedules.

Who is qualified to participate in the CNC Machinist Boot Camps? Basic requirements include: people who are currently unemployed, people not currently employed as a CNC

machinist, or people employed in a field unrelated to CNC. Additionally, participants cannot be current employees of any of the four covenant grant partner companies.

FdL man killed in crash near Eden

TOWN of EDEN- A 20-year-old Fond Du Lac man is dead after a crash with a Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Deputy on Friday. The deputy required medical transport but did not have life-threatening injuries.

The Wisconsin State Patrol reported that at 9:05 p.m. on Friday, August 24, an on-duty Sheriff's Deputy was involved in a traffic crash on County Road B at County Road K. Deputy Ryan Flood was transported to St. Agnes Hospital, treated and

released. Matthew A. Koenigs was killed in the crash.

The crash is being investigated by the Wisconsin State Patrol. Weather conditions and alcohol use were not contributing factors in the crash.

Those at the scene included Eden Fire Department and First Responders, City of Fond Du Lac Fire Department, and Fond Du Lac County Sheriff's Department.

Plymouth man presumed drowned

TOWN of LYNDON- The search for a 28-year-old Plymouth man in Lake Ellen has been suspended indefinitely as of Monday. On Sunday, August 26, authorities were alerted that the man had fallen out of a boat and was missing.

The Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a mobile 911 call at approximately 12:57 a.m. Sheboygan County Sheriff's deputies were dispatched along with the Sheboygan City/County Dive Team and their support units. Also assisting were Cascade Police, Cascade First Responders, Plymouth Ambulance Service, and Fire

Departments from Cascade, Waldo, Cedar Grove, the City of Sheboygan Falls, and Town of Sheboygan Falls. The Calumet County Dive Team also assisted in search efforts.

The Sheboygan Press identified the man as James Piechocki. He remains missing and is presumably drowned.

A press release from the Sheriff's office said the investigation is ongoing and the decision to suspend the search will be re-evaluated if new information comes to light.

Lake Ellen is located in the outside the village of Cascade in southwestern Sheboygan County.



Meals on Wheels began during World War II, when canteens were delivered to British servicemen. Kewaskum's Meals on Wheels is called Washington County Senior Dining and is immediate need of drivers.

Drivers for Monday and Wednesdays had to stop delivering due to unforeseen events. Jo Hoffman, Kewaskum Senior Dining Manager, states, "It's a vital program, and it's growing. We need volunteers able to help us out, so that we could reach individuals that are in need of service."

Seniors over 60 and disabled individuals under 60 are assessed to determine not only what needs they have, but if they qualify for the program. Meals are determined by a staff nutritionist, and residents have a choice of either a hot lunch or a cold meal for dinner later.

Lloyd Spaeth and his wife Kathy answered an ad in a church bulletin for drivers and have been volunteering for seven years. Lloyd describes his experience as "very gratifying" and "you go home with a good feeling."

For many seniors, a meal delivery may be their main meal other than snacks.

Drivers also interact with residents to help monitor how they are doing as well as reporting any concerns drivers may notice. Often, drivers are the only people their clients see the entire day.

Roger Strack began delivering as a way to pay back those delivered meals to his father. After about 10 years of volunteering, "I feel like I accomplished something," he said, "Some people even wait for me to come."

Potential volunteers are reminded that mileage is reimbursed and it only takes about one and half hours of your time. Kewaskum has an East and a West route with a varying number of residents.

Dear Editor-

As chairman of the KSD Building and Grounds Committee, I am providing this update on several items addressed during a very busy summer. To begin, our B&G organization of maintenance and custodial staff has been successfully reorganized. All roles were kept in-house and in doing so, the district saved an additional \$150,000.

The Special Education/EEN project at KMS was completed, under budget and ahead of schedule. District-wide asphalt repair and resurfacing (with stripping) as well as the protective fence at KES will also be completed before school starts. Several other projects, all with the purpose of maintaining and protecting our facilities and students, have also been completed.

Furthermore, the food service program was brought back in-house. Led by Terri Miller, the focus will be on continuous improvements in the wellness and quality

factors of our menus. Many people contributed to this current success, more than can be listed here.

The 'team' approach enabled this, and it was evident. Right person(s) at the right time in the right roles makes that difference, and we are better for it. There is no room for mediocrity or low expectation, not at this time. Dorothy and John were united in marriage on February 18, 1924 at St. Michael Catholic Church in St. Michaels.





Drivers - Be alert to children heading back to school

As last minute school supplies are being purchased, and parents anticipate the return of the school year, Kewaskum Police Department reminds village and town residents to pay attention to the roads. After Labor Day, motorists need to remember road rules for crosswalks, school busses, and school zones.

Pedestrians have the right of way in all crosswalks, if they are actively walking, per Wisconsin law. In addition to those at all schools, the Kewaskum Police Department employs crossing guards to safely guide children walking to school.

Crossing guards have the authority to stop traffic. Motorists are to yield to crossing guards holding stop signs in

crosswalks.

"If a crossing guard makes a complaint on any vehicle that doesn't follow their signs, we will issue a citation," Chief Tom Bishop warns motorists, "We don't give warnings."

The same warning applies for school busses. If a bus is stopped with lights flashing and stop sign out, motorists from both directions have to stop, unless on a divided highway. Commuters are urged to learn bus routes, as frequent stops can cause delays.

While driving in school zones, motorists should follow posted speed limit of 15 miles-per-hour during school hours and when children are present after school.

Children who bicycle

should use the crosswalks with guards. The use of bicycle helmets and bike locks are encouraged as well as registering their bikes with the police department. Bikes do get stolen and if the bike is abandoned, the police can locate the owners if they are properly registered.

Registrations are accepted at the police department during normal village hours. There is a \$5 fee and covers the life of the bicycle.

Though crossing guards and crosswalks are present, some children may still dart out into the road. Chief Bishop asks motorists to please slow down and be alert for children.

25 Years Ago

The building to the west was occupied by Ebenreiter Furniture Store and its last occupant was KB Lettering in 1987 which would now be the Terra-Cotta Tan business. The building in 1987 was owned by Gary Gavin and Don Nowak. Mrs. Nic Stoffel (Dela Marx), 98, only surviving child of Nic Marx told an interesting anecdote connected with the store. In those early days, there were quite a few passenger trains of the North Western Railroad stopping in Kewaskum. Since the store was so close to the depot and the train had to stop long enough to unload baggage, the passengers were permitted to leave the train, run over to the store for a small snack, such as an orange or such. In May of 1911, Nic Marx was succeeded by his son, John. In 1926 the store was moved just one building over to the East which, please correct me if I am wrong, would be where Players Sports Bar is located.





"Teddy's been looking good at tailback," said Piittmann.

Joyce Seitz will see time at running back as well. Blocking ahead will be Derek Aupperle and Max Maertz.

Junior Brett Boegel takes over at quarterback for Sam Olla. He was the junior varsity starter and saw a little varsity action late in games as the Indians blew out most of their Eastern Wisconsin Conference competition.

"He did a good job as JV quarterback," said Piittmann. Boegel will throw to returning receivers Hunter Flanders, who, at 6 feet, 4 inches, provides a big target, and senior Nate Krupp. Michael Holt will be another target, as will tight ends Greg Rate and Jordan Hanson.

Up front, senior and all-conference honorable mention center Justin Zolp will move to guard and will be joined by four new starters.



in last Friday's season opener against West Bend East.

The results looked much the same from years past, however, with the Indians pummeling the Suns, 31-6.

Kewaskum scored early and often on big runs and passes in building a 31-0 halftime lead and pitched a shutout until the final minute of the game.

Starting tailback Teddy

"It was a beautiful ball. He led me downfield," Krupp said of quarterback Brett Boegel. "Mike Holt made a great block."

Derek Aupperle had a 1-yard touchdown plunge and Hunter Flanders hit a 25-yard field goal as the Indians made the game a rout by halftime.

"Good start," said Coach Jason Piittmann. "We had good intensity."

The Indians' defense kept the Suns from getting anything going until the end of the first half. Even then, Kewaskum sacked the quarterback for a five-yard loss to the eight, and two plays later the Suns had

to rush to run a final play, an incomplete pass, before the break.
