Kewaskum man injured in ultralight plane crash

TOWN of FARMINGTON- A 47-year-old Kewaskum man received non-life threatening injuries after his home made aircraft crashed Sunday, Sept. 1 in a field.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department received a report of the downed plane at 8:22 a.m. The aircraft went down in a field east of County Road XX south of Valley View. According to the caller, the pilot, Robert Granger, had suffered injuries but was conscious and alert.

The Boltonville Fire Department First Responders and Kewaskum Rescue were dispatched to the call. Deputies investigating the crash learned that the aircraft was an unregistered single seat ultra-light airplane.

Granger was test flying the airplane which had been completed in April 2012 but not flown until that day. The crash was witnessed by the pilot's 22-year-old son. Granger had taken off and was about 30 feet above the ground when the airplane banked sharply to the right and lost altitude. The right wingtip contacted the ground and caused the plane to cartwheel.

Granger was transported to St. Joseph Hospital by Kewaskum Rescue with non life threatening injuries.

Granger indicated to deputies that he had received some prior flight training but was not a licensed pilot. Aircraft in the ultra-light category are not required to be registered and pilots of ultra-light aircraft are not required to be licensed pilots, according to Federal Aviation Administration regulations.

District residents to see significant tax increase, district blames shrinking aid, enrollment

Residents in the Kewaskum School District will see about a \$95 increase in their school taxes this year as the district cuts from its budget and deals with shrinking state aid. The tax rate facing taxpayers in December is \$9.76, an over 10% increase over last year's tax rate.

At the School District's Annual Meeting on Monday, Aug. 27 Business Manager Paul Reichert gave an explanation of the budget, starting with the 2011-'12 budget results and moved into the more depressing news as the meeting wore on.

Reichert explained the 2011-'12 budget was projected to reflect a \$226,158 deficit, however unaudited figures see the district with a \$688,163 surplus. Very good news as that surplus is a placed into the district's fund balance of \$3,382,348 at the end of the surplus.

The fund balance is now the highest it has been since Reichert began with the district in 1999. According to

district policy, a minimum of 10% of the budget must be in fund balance, though 15% is recommended. The fund balance provides the district with emergency cash, reduces the cash flow loan, covers special projects and improves their bond rating. The 2012-'13 budget has 17.4% of the budget in fund balance.

Declining enrollment was the main culprit in the \$250,971 decrease in the revenue limit. Enrollment is at the lowest it has been since 2005 and has declined continually since 2009.

"We are projecting a decrease in students this fall, I will be pleasantly surprised if we stay the same, I see us declining by about 20 students. We see fewer students entering the elementary schools," Reichert stated.

Board Treasurer Troy Hanson summed it for residents, "As long as property values decline and enrollment goes down we (the district) need to get creative really quick."

Reichert admitted this was one of the largest property tax increases he's seen and it's because of the state is cutting back on educational funding.

"Last year they helped with Act 10, but we had to reduce it (the operating budget) again this year and the aid went down again. The aid is going down faster than we are cutting."

Revenues in the general fund have declined \$772,869 and expenditures have shrunk \$999,027.

The total tax levy (total amount of tax collected by the district) will be \$11,591,097, an increase of \$752,583 or 6.94%.

Frustrated by the budget Superintendent Jim Smasal stated, "We have done everything within our control to budget efficiently and effectively and have trimmed the 2012-13 budget by \$750,000. There are factors, however, that are outside of our control. State and Federal funding has been cut by 5% over the past year and that means that more local tax dollars are needed to balance the budget."

With the passed budget, the owner of a home valued at \$100,000 will pay \$976 in school district taxes on top of state, municipal and vocational school taxes.

Smasal reports his first state of the district at annual meeting

Taxpayers in the Kewaskum School District heard from new Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal give an overview of the district at the School District's Annual Meeting on Monday, Aug. 27. This was Smasal's first annual meeting.

Smasal began his comments by thanking everyone for welcoming him to the community. He stated he has met with many people around the district and has received plenty of feedback regarding the state of the school district.

In his address Smasal alluded to four pillars that are being implemented district-wide, guiding them into the future-raising expectations for everyone, being accountable, being data driven and having sustainable finances. "Everything we need to, we have to be efficient and effective," he concluded.

Being in the district since April, Smasal said he has an understanding of the mission and vision of the district and now, goal setting will be paramount. A special visioning workshop with an outside facilitator is planned for September and October. Input from residents will be accepted.

Smasal reminded residents the district discontinued outsourcing the district's food service and hired Terri Miller to oversee food service operations. All food service staff were brought in and asked to recommit themselves to the district and each did.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee has been reinvigorated. "We have a strong committee that has met often, they are a very committed group that wants a purposeful environment for our kids," Smasal continued. Four projects were completed over the summer break. Roof resurfacing was completed, parking lot seal coating was completed at each district school, a new KMS special education room was completed and a fence was installed at KES. Summer cleaning at all district buildings was also completed.

Smasal announced cleaning at Wayne and Farmington is no longer outsourced. "We reconfigured the jobs and saved \$140,000 over last year." Rick Schmidt and Doug Franzen were hired to facilitate the main-

tenance positions. "I promise you, these two men are going to do everything in their power to make this five-facility campus work as well as it possibly can." Chuck Dreher, who worked previously for the district was also placed in a lead position with the two.

The Community Garden will continue with FFA advisor Kris Beaver and community member Bonnie Wenzlaff. Beaver through the FFA, will take over the garden and make sure it runs appropriately. Financing for the garden will no longer come from taxpayer dollars. Previously water was provided at the garden by the district. The Community Pantry will also no longer receive district funding. "We heard loud and clear the community did not want taxpayer money for these projects," Smasal professed. The existing debt by the pantry was not discussed.

The Policy Committee continues to be led by Board of Education Clerk Mary Miller. All policies are cataloged on the district website <www.kewaskumschools.org/schoolboard/policies.cfm> The Insurance Committee led by Troy Hanson and Sue Miller decided recently that staying in the health insurance co-op at this time would be in the best interest of the district.

The Finance Committee led by Hanson, with the help of the board and district staff cut \$750,000 from the budget. Smasal stated the district's revenue limit is now the same as it was in 2007. The Labor Negotiations Committee is on hold until the 16 litigants hear from the district on Sept 11. A human growth and development committee is underway with board member Grace Mueller and Curriculum Director Darcy Budnik.

Smasal stated that keeping special needs students in the district is something administrators are cognizant of and are working hard to achieve. The remodeling project at KMS helped to keep students in the district as opposed to paying other district to meet the needs of these students. The district can not serve 100% of these special needs students but they are closer than they were last year.

Mention was made of the lawsuit with a former special education employee. Smasal explained court action will take

place this month. The Police Liaison Officer position will be re-evaluated. "It's no different than what we did with the cooks and custodians. We want to improve the program, make it better."

In regards to curriculum, Smasal reported there is much going on. New programs such as STAR are being implemented while other practices, including grading are being reevaluated. "We have a lot on our plate, we are pushing the envelope as far as it will go. We know you want student achievement to go up, we are going to do everything in our power to make it so."

Communication will also be improved according to Smasal. A committee, with the goal of improving communications will be led by Jeanne Jacak. "We want to be efficient and effective using The Statesman (weekly newspaper) as our partner."

Smasal ended his comments by saying, "I am very excited and thankful to be a part of the Kewaskum School District. We will make sure this a quality district for our children. Thank you in advance for your support and help. There will be rough waters ahead to navigate through but together, with all of us pulling our oars at the same time in the same direction we will succeed, because failure is not an option for our students."

Search continues for man accused of manufacturing marijuana

Authorities say they are still searching for a 42-year-old Village of Kewaskum man after removing 80 marijuana plants from behind his Nature Haven Estates residence on August 21st.

Lt. Paul Buth with the Washington County Sheriff's Office stated Tuesday that a request for charges for manufacturing marijuana, and for keeper of a drug house has been prepared and is being forwarded to the District Attorney's office.

"We would expect a criminal complaint and a warrant to be issued, however that may take some time. In the mean time we will continue as time permits

and as information develops to attempt to locate the suspect," Buth stated.

The plants were at various stages of growth between 1" to approximately 5' in height. Numerous items related to growing were removed from the house, which had a hidden room apparently used to start growing the marijuana plants.

The investigation started as the result of a tip. The drug unit was assisted in the investigation by the Kewaskum Police Dept.

Each plant, if grown to maturity, would normally be expected to yield a minimum of one pound of salable marijuana.

Dear Editor and Community,
 Point-Of-Interest: Police School Liaison Officer (PSLO). A recent expression of concern was voiced questioning Board of Education action relative to the termination of the PSLO contract. Subjective and inaccurate comments were made, with several specifics withheld, all of which will be clarified here.

To begin, it is proper to remind taxpayers that every KSD program is being reviewed for its 'efficiency factor'. Board requirements of structure, quality, reporting, description, student benefit and cost-effectiveness must be met or the matter will be subject to action. The PSLO program is no exception and to be clear, communication of this intent was shared with Village leadership on a number of occasions during the summer.

History: apparently initiated in 1990 as an unfunded and simplified program with no records to verify much of anything, a 12/4/2000 letter from then Chief Knoebel to the District Office suggested with federal grant monies now available, a PSLO function with limited visibility at KHS and KMS could formally begin on 1/22/2000. At this time, the KPD would incur cost of the program, with exceptions for extra-curricular O.T. expenses estimated as \$2,500.00 annually. The 2000/01 actual was \$1,124.00. With no District records available from 2001-2004 and with federal grant money now exhausted, then Chief Knoebel submitted a second program-related letter on 5/5/2004 soliciting continuance of the program for 2004/05, with conditions. Jurisdiction limitations allowed only the facilities within the Village to directly participate. Also, costs would now shift to the District to the tune of 40% of the salary and benefits of one KPD officer. The Board approved the 5/5/2004 request... Again, with no records to substantiate what 40% cost KSD until 2009, I am not able to qualify the impact to the school operating budget, nor the program's efficiency. The third and final document is dated 10/2009, which essentially put to terms what was discussed in 2004 via contract agreement between the Village and the KSD. District records now show PSLO expense for 2009/10=\$25,479.28,

2010/11=\$26,837.08 and 2011/12=\$25,123.40.


Concern: by design, the current PSLO program lacks in many ways, up to and including structure, description, objectives, reporting, evaluation and measurement capabilities, cost-effectiveness, student support, and officer performance. Equally concerning are the limitations of jurisdiction - not all KSD facilities are included! Also, having tested response times to KMS/KHS from the points listed in the concern (without lights and a siren), timeliness was found to be exaggerated. Furthermore, follow-up comments by Village leadership indicated a clear focus only on the loss of the 40% subsidy and not on program intent. I found it more than offensive to hear that a Village review of the School Board's June 11th meeting was for them to seek an

open meeting error or conflict of interest in an attempt to undermine the Board's decision, both unfounded.


Please know that each Board member is obligated to ensure the safety and well-being of each student, as well as protecting the taxpayer. Along with my highly supportive Board and the community majority, we will continue our quest to do what is right and defend any fact-based action as proper. By terminating the existing program, the School Board and Administration are now poised to re-evaluate the program and possibly establish one that is far more efficient and enduring; with a value proposition that justifies it for all.

When Nell talked about retiring from the business on May 31, the pair decided this was a great opportunity to start a local business. Nell made sure they were licensed prior to his license expiring.

Dziedzic is familiar to Kewaskum students as a

Driver's education (classroom) training is two hours a day for three weeks, and students as young as 14 and a half can participate. Behind the wheel (BTW) training is six hours of observation and six hours of driving. Students are required to be 15 and a half with a valid learner's permit for BTW.

The next session starts on October 1 and runs through Oct 19. Student drivers are to attend Monday through Friday from 6 p.m. - 8 p.m., a time

designed to accommodate those students participating in extracurricular sports.

The complete course is \$330 with half due prior to driver's education and the balance due prior to behind the wheel. Other options available include classroom only at \$175 or behind the wheel only at \$270. Most students however take the complete course.





The Y encourages area families to address healthy living during childhood obesity awareness month

WEST BEND - September is National Childhood Obesity Awareness Month and the Kettle Moraine YMCA — a leader in youth development and healthy living—wants to help families in Washington county and surrounding understand the risks of childhood obesity and how to incorporate regular physical activity and healthy eating into their lives.

Childhood obesity rates have soared over the last few decades. Obesity now affects 17% of all children and adolescents in the United States - triple the rate from just one generation ago, according to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention. More alarming, obesity puts children at risk for chronic diseases often seen in adults, such as high cholesterol, cardiovascular disease, high blood pressure and type 2 diabetes.

"At the Kettle Moraine YMCA, we want families to understand the risks of childhood obesity and the lifetime benefits of eating right and getting physically active," said Robert Johnson, Executive Director

of the Kettle Moraine YMCA. "Small changes can make a big difference when it comes to healthy living and the Y is a great place for families to get started."

This health crisis sheds light on the need to provide children and parents with the resources and the support they need, emphasizing that small steps can lead to sustained changes to reverse the childhood obesity trend. The following tips can help families live healthier:

1. **Eat Healthy:** Make water the drink of choice (supplemented by 100 percent fruit juices and low-fat milk) and have fruits and vegetables available at every meal. Snack time should include foods that contain whole grains and lean protein instead of saturated and trans fats.

2. **Play Every Day/Go Outside:** Kids and adults should have at least an hour a day of unstructured play outside (when possible) and break a sweat at least three times a week by getting 20 minutes or more of physical activity.

3. **Get Together:** At least once a day families should dine together, with kids involved in meal preparation and clean up. In addition, adults should spend one-on-one time each day with their kids.

4. **Reduce Screen Time:** Time spent in front of a television, computer, cell phone and video game should be limited to two hours per day.

5. **Sleep Well:** Kids and adults need to keep a regular sleep schedule—10-12 hours per night for kids and seven to eight hours for adults.

The Kettle Moraine YMCA offers programs such as Fit Kids Fit Families and additional youth wellness programs. These programs have helped children and families add more physical activity into their daily routines and support them as they make healthy choices, all while having fun and enjoying their time together as a healthy family.



After almost three hours of discussion and input from the audience, the Kewaskum School Board last Wednesday, voted four to three to re-open Beechwood School and return all the remaining sixth grade students to the elementary schools, effective the beginning of the 1987-88 school year. In spite of heated vocal objections from teachers, three board members, former board members a Town of Farmington official, and numerous parents, the two motions passed. The first one covered the opening of Beechwood for grades one through six, with kindergarten and special ed going to Farmington, and the second motion transferring the remaining sixth grade classes back to their boundary elementary schools.

While the audience for Monday night's regular scheduled meeting was considerably smaller, the Kewaskum School Board still drew a barrage of fire from angry, upset parents and teachers who opposed the board's decision last week to re-open Beechwood School and shift all the sixth grade students back to the elementary schools. *NOTE: Judging by the pages of Letters to the Editor in this edition, there were a lot of irate readers!*

night on the John Oelhafen farm, Route 2, Kewaskum, located north of Kohlsville in the Town of Wayne. The loss was estimated to range from \$30,000 to \$40,000. Also lost was approximately 160 ton of chopped and baled hay, some grain and oats, all milking equipment, all other equipment and supplies. The fire on the farm of Oelhafen, who is town chairman of the Town of Wayne, was discovered by Wilmer Herman, Kohlsville fire chief, as he returned from a fire meeting. Eldor Wulff, a neighbor, also noticed the blaze. The Oelhafen family were all away from home at the time of the blaze. Herman immediately summoned firemen. The flames spread so rapidly, however, the firemen had all they could do to save the Oelhafen residence, which was in danger of being destroyed. Cause of the fire was not determined, but the Oelhafen said the flames spread so rapidly and the heat was so intense that firemen and neighbors were unable to enter the building to save any cattle or equipment.

Through the prompt work of Charles Miller, manager of the store, and the help of the local fire department, the fire was extinguished before any damage was done to the building, with the exception of a small hole in the roof.

About 25,000 fingerline perch were planted in Forest Lake and Lake Bernice on Tuesday afternoon of last week by the Fond du Lac conservation warden, along with sportsmen of the vicinity. They were shipped by the state conservation committee from Antigo in a large oxygen tank truck.

Workmen under the supervision of the town board of the Town of Ashford are constructing abutments for a bridge over the river west of the Village of Elmore, to replace the one which collapsed early in spring.

ception of Port Washington. K. Honeck Jr. was on the hill for Kewaskum and allowed only three scattered hits while his teammates were pounding out 13. He put up a fine pitching performance in striking out 23 enemy batters.

100 Years Ago

August 24, 1912

A farmers' organization was organized in Groeschel's Hall when about 35 farmers of this community assembled for the purpose of forming an organization. The name adopted was the Kewaskum Agricultural Society. Officers chosen are: President, F.C. Gotsleben; Secretary, Franklin Backhaus; Treasurer, John Opgenorth; Vice President, Louis Backhaus; Sergeant-at-Arms, Joseph Honeck.

That the village has a craze for automobiles is shown by the number of car owners. At present there are 17 owners.

Michael Geidel, one of the oldest residents of this community, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jacob Becker, at the age of 79.

August 31, 1912

William Heberer purchased the 127 acre farm of George Perschbacher.

John F. Schaefer was at Milwaukee Monday and returned with a new Overland automobile which he delivered to the Oeder brothers east of the village.

John Marx had the interior of his grocery store greatly improved by having a number of shelves installed. He is now in a position to carry a much larger stock.

Lightning struck the barn of Joseph Honeck, located 3-1/4 miles southwest of Kewaskum, doing considerable damage.

Three cows belonging to Louis Klein, south of the village, were struck by the afternoon northbound passenger train and instantly killed.



Indians' busy win produces history-making win

Up, then down, then back up again, all within a matter of five days. Yes, it was a roller coaster week for the Indians girls tennis team, which pulled off an upset win over Sheboygan Falls, got shut out by highly regarded Plymouth and then bounced back with some good efforts at the six-team, Hononegah Tournament on Saturday.

Amber Flasch and Jessica Etta continued their successful run with a third place at No. 3 doubles, while Mallory Kries and Maddy Kreis moved up to No. 1 doubles for the day and placed fourth, while Ashley Schiller and Gabrielle Wade teamed up to take fifth at No. 2 doubles.

Kiera Kuehl faced the biggest uphill climb, going against all the Nos. 1 players. She battled hard to take fifth.

In Tuesday morning's match, the Indians pulled off a huge upset, nipping host Sheboygan Falls, 4-3 in an Eastern Wisconsin Conference dual meet.

"For the first time in at least seven years, we have defeated the Falcons," coach Fehlhaber beamed.

The Indians pulled off two singles wins, by Strigenz and newcomer Courtney Schmidt, and got wins from the Nos. 2 and 3 doubles teams.

"JV sensation Courtney Schmidt, playing in her first varsity singles match ever, notched a win at No. 4 singles and sealed the victory," Fehlhaber said, reporting Schmidt defeated Kate Bassuener in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4.

Strigenz, in her No. 2 spot, started off with a 6-3 win over Erica Duda and then dominated her opponent in the second set, 6-1.

Mallory and Maddy Kreis playing at No. 2 doubles, were 7-5, 6-4 winners over Emily Schaefer and Sam Silarien.

Etta and Flasch continued their winning ways, posting a 6-0, 6-3 victory at No. 3 doubles.

With this win, the Indians

In the title match against Hartford, Moser said he tried two different rotations but with so many new players chemistry was hard to come by so quickly.

The 6-2 offense - Moser switched from a 5-1 once Heberer was lost - is still figuring itself out with Heather

Johnson and Marissa Stahl running the show. They at least know who to set most often - 6-foot-1 Anna Aycock in the middle.

"They started finding Anna at this tournament and you could see the smiles on their faces when they set her one and Anna destroyed it," Moser said. "I think they were more excited about the kill than Anna."

Moser said that's what the offense continues to work on, getting it to the first team all-conference player.

In back, Moser said first team all-conference libero Kelsey Phillips is playing "awesome."

"I don't know how she gets up so fast to pick up these balls. She's flying all over the place," he said.

The Indians are 2-2 in the EWC, behind 4-0 Waupun and Plymouth. After Thursday's rematch, Kewaskum plays Tuesday at rival Campbellsport.

NEW HOLSTEIN - OK, so Kewaskum's football team didn't specifically ask Coach Jason Piittmann to run it harder.

But the Indians did say they were out of shape two weeks ago in the second half against West Bend East, when they were outscored 6-0.

"I take that as, 'Coach, condition us more,'" said Piittmann.

Last week, it paid off, though it hardly mattered on the scoreboard. The Indians stomped over, plowed through

and ran past an overmatched New Holstein team in a 51-0 drubbing.

Kewaskum built a 49-0 halftime lead with a blocked punt, interception, long punt return and an offense that could score on nearly any play from anywhere on the field. Defensively, the Indians gave up one first down in the first half and dropped two more interceptions as the Huskies' offense did well to break the huddle but not much after that. Kewaskum held them to 57 total yards and most of that was in garbage time.

Teddy Wollner had 138

yards rushing and three touchdowns on runs of 58, 14 and nine yards. He only carried the ball 10 times.

Joey Seitz had a 27-yard touchdown run and Derek Aupperle a 31-yard score on a dive play up the middle that he broke to the outside while tacklers fell off of him.

Nate Krupp got his second interception in two weeks, this one a leaping grab across the middle, pulling it down with one hand and taking off downfield to set up another touchdown.

Most starters sat the rest of the game, a familiar occurrence

the past few seasons against weaker Eastern Wisconsin Conference teams.

"The backs are running real good and the line is blocking real good," said quarterback Brett Boegel. "It made my job easy."

Boegel started the scoring with a three-yard run up the middle and later hit a wide open Hunter Flanders in the corner for an easy 17-yard score.

"That was nice. The corner bit," Boegel said.

The offensive line regularly opened up holes the team bus could have driven through. The

Indians racked up 265 yards rushing, the vast majority in the first half.

"In practice we've been working hard," said lineman Alex Fechter. "Everyone knew the rules. Everyone stepped the right way. We dominated."

It would have been Kewaskum's second straight scoreless second half, but Josh Rahlf caught the ankles of New Holstein's quarterback in the end zone for a safety in the fourth quarter.

Piittmann said his team has some talent but it lacks the depth it enjoyed the past several seasons. This year, more players are going both ways. With leads of 31 and 49 points at halftime it hasn't mattered so far.

For those EWC opponents licking their chops after Kewaskum graduated nearly 20 starters from last year, the Indians aren't exactly down.

"I think we're going to come out and we're going to prove them people wrong," said Fechter.

"We're just going out there playing Kewaskum football," said Boegel.

Piittmann was pleased with the second-half improvement from two weeks ago.

"The kids took to heart that we did not play all that well last week," he said, "and it showed. We didn't stagnate."

Kewaskum's next chance to avoid stagnation comes Friday at home against Kiel (2-0), which beat Waupun, 32-7, and Howards Grove, 27-14, this season.
