KEYS Run/Walk titles claimed by Parsel and Miller

On a scale of 1-10, one being low, the weather for Sunday's 19th annual KEYS (Kewaskum Youth Scholarship) Run was probably in the range of three or four. Still close to 250 runners, both young and old, battled the elements to raise funds for Kewaskum High School students' scholarships. For that, we will give them a 10.

All things considered, KEYS president Jerry Gosa was happy with the turnout and is confident the proceeds will be close to what they have been in the past.

As far as the race was concerned, two men set records for the 5-kilometer course that has been used for the past several years.

Finishing first was Andy Parsel, who covered the distance in 16 minutes and 25 seconds (16:25), eight seconds in front of Andy Ruffalo's 16:33.

In third place was Dan Held, who also had a good clocking of 16:54.

If the name Sue Miller rings a bell, it should, or perhaps, more correctly, it would if her maiden name, Daggett, was included.

Miller, a current member of the Kewaskum Board of Education, was an excellent runner at Random Lake High School and Illinois State University, and she showed Sunday, she still is pretty good.

Miller was the fastest woman, running a 19:17, which put her in fifth place overall.

"She said she's been running well," Gosa said of Miller, who has won several previous KEYS titles.

Taking second among the female runners was Amy Grotenhuis, wife of KMS teacher, Jeff Grotenhuis. Her time was 19:59, and in third was Finish Line Training owner and Kewaskum resident, Terri Boden, who was clocked in 21:03.

Gosa said there was no question weather had an effect on the turnout. "Because of the rain, we had fewer walk-ups ... we still had some walk-ups though," he said, adding the economy may have kept some others away.

Looking at what the event has produced in 19 years, Gosa and the KEYS Committee have to swell up with pride.

"We're now close to \$1.3 million in (KEYS) scholarships to 446 students," he beamed, reporting the first year, 1986, there was one \$500 scholarship awarded to Rick Staehler, "now Dr. Staehler."

Next it went to two scholarships, one \$500 and one \$1,000, and last year 34 scholarships, valued at just under \$100,000, were given out.

"It's come a long way," Gosa said, "but the need for scholarships just keeps increasing. Whether it's college or technical school, the cost just keeps going up."

Gosa praised all those who worked

Village Board authorizes hail damage repairs

Contracts to repair hail damage to three village properties were signed on October 10 by Village Administrator, Matt Heiser. Repairs are scheduled to be begun this month according to Department of Public Works (DPW) Director, Jerry Giles.

Village properties that sustained damage were at the Waste-water Treatment Plant, salt shed, lower shed and waste-water utility garages at the DPW on Fond du Lac Avenue, the Lift Station near the Kewaskum Mall and Well #5 on Burr Oak Road.

Two local companies, Bunkelman Builders and Higher Ground Roofing, put in bids for three separate locations. Higher Ground Roofing won all three with a total bid of \$33,456.

The total amount of damages has not been determined. Some information, regarding the metal domes at the waste-water plant, has not been received.

Runners in the KEYS run/walk had tough competition this year. Under the guidance of Russell Thull, physical education instructor for Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools, the entire student population at Farmington Elementary participated at the first annual Mini-KEYS Run on October 12.

"The whole week, they [the kids] were amped up about it," Thull expressed.

Thull recently started promoting a new program, founded by the National Dairy Council and NFL, called "Fuel Up to Play 60," which promotes children to be active and eat healthy. Jordy Nelson, number 87, of the Green Bay Packers is the Wisconsin state representative.

The mini-run was Farmington's kick off for the popular KEYS Run/Walk that benefits the KEYS Scholarship Program. "I was hoping to run the event and get them more interested," Thull said. Wayne will be having a poster contest to kick off the program.

Both schools, however, are involved in the program with children signing pledges to be active for 60 minutes a day. Ten

students are ambassadors and help Thull plan events in support of the program.

So far, a milk mustache booth is planned for the future to support the Wisconsin Milk Marketing Board. "Other challenges are to be determined pending what our student ambassadors decide they want to compete in," Thull relayed.

Different challenges offer children more chances to win prizes. Terri Miller, Food Service Manager for the district, is working with Thull to introduce children to new foods with "Taste Test a Rainbow," a healthy eating play activity, planned to start in November. Each week has a different food category, starting with vegetables, then fruits and on to dairy. Children come up with foods they want to try, so they are "learning what fruits and vegetables can do for their body," Miller stated.

At both Farmington and Wayne, Thull will be having students participate once a week in a before school, pre-lap run/walk for about 15-20 minutes.

On the website for "Fuel Up and Play 60" children can log their progress. Educators and supporters in the community can also sign up to



Mysterious creatures in Wisconsin appear to be fickle about their haunting places. Not only was the "Hook Man" seen in Boltonville, but a creature, similar to the Beast of Brey Road, apparently likes to hike in Dundee.

Two different DNR personnel at two different times saw a seven foot tall, hairy creature walking on two feet near the Parnell Tower. Another man near Ashford saw a similar creature.

Long Lake itself has also been rumored to have a monster. Witnesses reported the creature to be 25-26 feet long and as wide as a small building, with a black and yellow head.

Locals, however, know Dundee for the UFO Daze on the third Saturday in July at Billy Benson's Hide-a-Way on Boy Scout Road off Hwy 67. Next year will be the 25th anniversary.

"Something is going on here," Benson states. "We just try to get some idea of what is going on." Dundee has had

mysterious creatures, UFOs, and crop circles.

In the late 1940's, a crop circle appeared on the Jersey Flats, a DNR preserve near New Prospect. In 1995, another circle appeared in a field of cattails with an approximate diameter of 80 by 180 feet and resembled the shape of South America.

An aerial photo was taken and later disappeared, but Benson still retains a ground level photo. Benson also has a collection of photos taken throughout the years showing the mysterious spheres of light. Even Kewaskum has had sightings of these mysterious lights. Evening shift workers at Regal Ware noticed six orange lights above them. Each light went off one by one in sequence.

One incident had jets from the local Trudeau field fly into mysterious lights, but when the jets got too close, the lights disappeared. More eyewitness accounts have visual recollection of a flying object either a saucer-like or triangle in shape.

During a hunting trip in September of 1975, two men claim, "We saw an orange light and two objects hovering near an open space. It scared the living hell out of us and we ran into some pine trees to take cover. We crawled and hunched through the low pines and made it to the car. That's when the two objects jetted up and looked like shining stars just sitting there."

Recently on July 30 at about 1:15 a.m., another resident describes seeing about two

40 foot wide ships about 200 feet in the air hovering next to each other. All the lights in the house went off. The next morning, the man was not only shocked when he touched his car, but his car's battery, only a month old, was dead.

Dundee isn't the only place to find them. One woman near Western Ave. and Division Rd. in West Bend vividly recalls her encounter. "I would estimate that these objects were no more than about 200-300 feet off the ground" and "there was no sound despite the altitude."

A local dairy farmer in Dundee, in 1988, saw a 100 foot circular object drift silently over his silo. The sight scared his dairy cows back into the barn. Several other people reported seeing the object at different locations.

Robert Kuehn, who recently passed away, said in an earlier newspaper article, "UFOs often will perform if they know someone is watching." Still non-believers question the UFO sighting as a tourist gimmick.

On a blog about UFO sighting in Dundee, Aznalove wrote, "I guess you never seen UFOs. You are not open to them. You have to be spiritual and have your heart in the right place. You have to be awake. UFOs don't look anything like planes. They are right in front of you, and you won't see them. They come from a different dimension, not outer space."

The story doesn't stop in the sky. Dundee Mountain, which is a large hill in reality, has new rumors emerging.

"A lot of people think there are pyramids under Dundee Mountain," Benson relays.

Overseas findings support this new theory. Evidence has Semir Osmangic, an archaeologist, claiming pyramids are under hills in Bosnia near Sarajevo.

Many theories offer the reasons for these visitations, but involve humans being checked out by a species presumably greater than ourselves. How did the Mayans and Egyptians perform such feats of mathematical architectural genius without resources such as a computer or even a slide rule?

No one has answered that question, so the difference between believers and skeptics can be the difference between believing humans are the teachers or the pupils in our universe.

Maybe Dundee Mountain's reputation, as sacred to Native Americans, has leads to follow. After all, Lizard Mound County Park in Farmington has its mysteries to unravel.



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Native Indians from Ecuador's Rainforest to present at UW-WC

UW-Washington County (UW-WC) is arranging a special presentation by two natives from the Tsáchila Nation in Ecuador on Monday, October 29. The presenters are Henry and Diana Calazon, a married couple from a small and indigenous tribe, who will share insights into the history and culture of the Tsáchila Indians of Ecuador's western rainforest. The Calazon's will also address some of the challenges they face to survive as an indigenous nation and their survival in the 21st century. The presentation which will take place in room 305 at noon will include a slide show, video, Tsáchila handicrafts and possibly a music or dance demonstration. Admission is free and no reservations are needed.

The Tsáchila Indians live on seven small reservations near Ecuador's fastest growing city, Santo Domingo de los Tsáchila, and they are the last living descendants of the Yumbos, a pre-Hispanic people. While almost unheard of in the United States, the Tsáchilas are a tiny, but well-known ethnic minority in Ecuador.

The visit was arranged as a result of Anthropology Professor, Dr. Ron Lippi, of UW-Marathon County, who met the Calazons during a trip to Ecuador in 2006. Lippi has played a key role in bringing the couple to the United States on cultural visas. During their visit, the Calazon's are also presenting at the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington D.C.

as well as several University of Wisconsin campuses. The couple is also meeting with leaders of Wisconsin Indian tribes to forge bonds of friendships and discuss topics of mutual concern. According to Lippi, "It is estimated that 2,500 Tsáchilas are living today. They are a very pleasant people trying to navigate the turbulent waters between assimilation and cultural preservation. They are eager for people around the world to learn about them - just as they wish to learn about us."





September 4, 1987

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held last Friday for Kewaskum's newest and largest residential housing complex. The \$1.3 million project, known as Rustic Timbers, is being developed by owners Tom and Debbie Timblin of rural Kewaskum. The project will contain 36 apartments of which 32 will be two-bedroom units and four will be one-bedroom. Construction of the complex will be done in two phases. The first phase, expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by January 1, 1988, will consist of 20 units, 16 two-bedroom units and four single bedroom apartments. Phase Two will be started in the spring of 1988 for the completion of the final 16 two-units. Rustic Timbers will be located on a new street being built by Timblin, Courtney Lane, directly west and within walking distance of the Kewaskum Mall Shopping Center.

Village residents will see an increase in their water bills for the last quarter of 1987. Effective October 1, rates will go up approximately 60% according to Village Administrator Dan Schmidt. While that sounds like a whopping increase, Schmidt noted that increase actually works out to be an average increase of 14¢ per day more than customers are presently paying. Schmidt explained the last time the village had increased its water rate was in 1982. Had they had a yearly increase over those past five years, the rate would have gone up 8% annually. Schmidt also reminded the board that the village had made over \$1 million in improvements including a new well, watertower, and reservoir. That was all paid for through the TIF District program.

- Leaf Green, Black and Brown Icing Colors

Prepare and roll out cookie dough following recipe instructions. Cut cookies using the Graveyard Cookie Cutter Set. Bake and cool.

Using icing colors, tint buttercream. Ice all cookies using a spatula. Pipe the outline of the tree with tip #22 brown buttercream icing. Tint coconut flakes green using icing color; sprinkle over base cookie. Attach all cookies to base cookies with icing.

- 1 jar (about 7 ounces) marshmallow crème
- Violet and Orange Icing colors
- 4 cups popped popcorn, divided
- White Candy Melts
- Candy, melted following package instructions
- Large Candy Eyeballs
- Animal and People Faces Sprinkle Sets, candy corn, Jumbo Confetti Sprinkles
- Green and Black Candy Strings

Spray Dimensions Multi-Cavity Mini Pumpkin Pan cavities with vegetable pan spray.

In large microwave-safe bowl, microwave marshmallow crème 1 minute at 50% power. Remove bowl from microwave and divide marshmallow crème in half; stir icing color into each half (tint slightly darker than how you want your finished treat to look). Stir 2 cups popped popcorn into each marshmallow mixture until evenly coated. Press popcorn treat mixture in bottom cavities only of pumpkin pan to 1 1/2 in. deep; reserve some unmolded popcorn. Let set; unmold.

Attach 2 popcorn ball halves together on one edge, using unmolded popcorn to prop opposite edge open. Using melted candy, attach Candy Eyeballs and sprinkles and candy corn teeth, and Jumbo Confetti nose. Attach candy strings for hair.

Peanut Butter 3D Sandwich Cookies

Makes about 1 dozen sandwich cookies

- 3/4 cup solid vegetable shortening
- 1/4 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1/2 cup firmly-packed light brown sugar
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- Buttercream Icing
- Kelly Green, Orange Icing Color

Preheat oven to 325°F. Spray 3D Sandwich Pan with vegetable pan spray.

In large bowl, beat shortening and peanut butter with electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add brown sugar and granulated sugar; mix well. Add egg and vanilla, mixing until smooth. Add flour; mix well. Press dough into pan cavities, filling 2/3 full.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove from pan to cooling grid; cool completely.

Meanwhile, tint portions of icing green and orange. To assemble cookies, spread icing on half of the cookies; sandwich with second cookie. Pipe details with icing.

Even though she did not qualify, senior April Gilane ended her prep career on a high note, starting out with a


sizzling 43 on the front nine and combining that with a 52 for a 95, her best score of the season.

Indians head to playoffs after win

It wasn't exactly a mandate, but Kewaskum's football team got a much-needed victory headed into the playoffs after losing two straight for the first time in nearly a decade.

The Indians hung on, 14-7, last Friday against a Sheboygan Falls team playing for a playoff spot.

"It was a battle. Falls played really well. They were playing to get into the playoffs. We had to come up with some big plays," said Coach Jason Piittmann.

None were bigger than linebacker Teddy Wollner forcing a fumble in the final minute of the game and Joey Seitz recovering it. Falls had the ball inside Kewaskum's four yard line and was attempting to head in for the tying score.

The Indians struck first in the second quarter. Quarterback Brett Boegel

underthrew his favorite target, Nate Krupp, a little bit and the senior wideout beat out the corner for the ball and took it to the end zone for a 20-yard score.

In the third quarter, Kewaskum recovered a fumble in Falls' territory and Wollner later scored from one yard out. Falls got on the board with a five-yard touchdown pass in the final quarter before its game-tying drive was halted with the fumble.

The game didn't exactly feature much offense. Seitz led Kewaskum with 58 yards rushing. Boegel threw for 43.

The Indians had their own fumble on the Falls' 10 after a 12-play drive, and blew another scoring opportunity.

"We left some points on the field a couple of times," Piittmann said.

But the victory rights the ship heading into postseason.

"It was very big. It helps us with our seeding. A win's a

win. You feel better going into the playoffs with a win than a loss, definitely. especially losing two weeks in a row," said Piittmann.

The Indians, 6-2 overall and 5-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, drew a 6 seed. They head to No. 3-seeded Seymour on Friday.

Seymour is 6-1, its only loss a 12-7 game to powerhouse West DePere in the Bay Conference. Seymour has racked up more than 2,000 yards rushing and 34 touchdowns on the season, to Kewaskum's 1,300.

"They're good. They like to run the ball. They've got a couple of good backs, a couple of big lineman," said Piittmann. "They're aggressive on defense."

For Kewaskum, health has finally improved. Alex Fechter is expected to play, as is Derek Aupperle.

Now in the second season, some of the earlier mistakes

must be cleaned up.

"We've got to be efficient on offense. We can't have wasted possessions. Possessions have got to at least improve field position if nothing else. We can't have three and outs," said Piittmann. "We have to put teams in positions when they have to put together drives to score on us. When we force teams to do that they'll make mistakes."

Seymour is west of Green Bay, and Piittmann said the bus ride won't be any different than when the team plays at conference foe Two Rivers.

Notes: Kewaskum is the only team in the county that has made it to the playoffs

every year since 2005, and one of two in the EWC (Plymouth). The Indians and Germantown are the only teams in the county that qualified for the playoffs this year.
