Village approves ambulance purchase, street lights on Main

The village board okayed the purchase of a new ambulance and tackled details regarding the state Department of Transportation 2014 road project at their meeting Monday night.

After six months of weighing the pros and cons of several models, the village board gave its okay for Kewaskum Fire Chief Mark Groeschel to order a new ambulance. The cost of the new vehicle, a 2013 Lifeline, is \$181,794.

Groeschel said since June, a committee mulled over features on four makes of ambulances before settling on the Lifeline model, which has a F450 four-wheel drive, pick-up chassis. A power cot will make patient loading and unloading easier is included and minor compartment changes will allow for a street side window on the vehicle. The Lifeline's body color will be red, matching the fire department's other rigs.

The Lifeline replaces a 1999 MedTech Ford ambulance that should have been retired in 2009. Groeschel estimated the old ambulance, which has an odometer reading of 60,000 miles, could be sold for between \$15,000 and \$18,000.

It will take 120 days from ordering for the department to take delivery of the ambulance.

The fire department also has a 2005 MedTech Ambulance that recently had some engine work done. Both ambulances are used alternating each between calls.

Trustees also reviewed changes to a lift station and lighting options that will be implemented when the state Department of Transportation (DOT) begins the resurfacing of Highway 28/Main Street and replacement of the bridge over the Milwaukee River in 2014.

That project gives the village a chance to install and upgrade 35 street lights on Main Street.

Reporting on a meeting with DOT

representatives, Public Works Director Jerry Gilles said the village will have to pick up the cost of removing existing lighting and may have to pay for electrical plug-ins that are used for holiday decorations.

The board expressed a preference for the installation of more decorative lighting on 22 poles from Fond du Lac Avenue to the bridge, similar to those in the village parking lot. The remainder would match standard lighting found elsewhere in the village.

Gilles estimated costs for the replacements to be between \$181,125 and \$206,500, but the DOT and a Community Sensitive Design grant will likely cover those costs.

The DOT also turned down a request for a driveway permit that would allow access to a lift station that services four business and residential units, but the village is likely to receive a permit for a curb cut for maintenance access.

That permit will be applied for in 2014, Gilles said.

Settlement reached in claim with teachers

A notice of claim with a group of Kewaskum teachers, regarding compensation has been settled after a special meeting last month. The additional pay is expected to cost the district around \$97,000.

Originally, a total of 29 teachers were caught between March and October payouts when Act 10 (collective bargaining law) was enacted, questioning the Kewaskum University (KU) program's validity and any contractual obligations to teachers who earned their Masters' Degrees through the program funded by taxpayers. When teachers earned their Master's Degree through KU or any other continuing education source they were given a bump in pay.

Through their interpretation of Act 10, the district believed they were not obligated to honor the additional compensation to those teachers in the KU program. Teachers then with the help of their union brought a notice of claim against the district in an attempt to recover what they felt they had earned. The two sides have been negotiating for more than a year.

Throughout the negotiations process 15 of the 29 approved the District's offer and the remaining 14 held out.

The Board of Education on October 29, voted to give all 29 teachers the same settlement. All teachers were to be compensated, in full, whose salaries would have changed because of continuing education credits they received for the 2011/12 and 2012/13 school years with the stipulation this was the final offer. The decision passed 5-1 with Troy Hanson voting no. Board president Tim Ramthun did not vote.

Prior to that action, Hansen made a motion to re-offer the same settlements the other teachers had signed, but the motion failed at the special

A Kewaskum Police Officer responded to a report of a theft occurred, October 30 in the 500 block of Keller St.


A scooter valued at approximately \$70 was stolen during the time the complainant was receiving piano lessons. The thief returned the scooter the following day.



Kewaskum Fire Station remodels, adds sleeping quarters

ers and storage, two dorm-like sleeping rooms and an computer equipment room were created. Each sleeping room is equipped with a bed, a nightstand and a TV.

"We wanted to give our EMTs, who don't live here [Kewaskum], a place to sleep and have some privacy," Groeschel said. Out-of-town EMTs have been sleeping in chairs during their shifts.

With the storage room used for bedrooms, additional storage space was created by adding a second story accessed by a newly built staircase. Existing electrical and plumbing infrastructure needed to be moved.

Volunteer firefighters, who are in the trades, provided the labor for the project. Only a drywall installer was hired, since no one had that experience to offer. Supplies for the project were purchased by the rescue squad fund, since the rooms are for EMT use.

The computer room and the storage room will have nothing more added. Both sleeping quarters is expected to be completed by the end of the week.

Farmington residents work with Sheriff to combat burglaries

Farmington residents need to be on high alert, as burglaries continue to occur, with another shed being broken into on October 27. Todd Nelson and Bob Lynn, local residents, wanted "to educate and bring people up to speed" about what was happening in the area and organized a community meeting with law enforcement.

In a six-month time span, a total of 17 burglaries, 31 larceny thefts, and 6 trespassing/proowler incidents have occurred in the town of Farmington. A total of 31 suspicious person/vehicle situations have also been investigated.

With flyers distributed at the town hall, the school and by talking to local residents, over 90 people ranging from the southeastern area near County Rd A and M and west of Boltonville came to a meeting at the Boltonville Fire Station on November 10 with questions.

Washington County Sheriff's Deputy Ron Rewerts discussed crime prevention. He suggests that residents use the three D's which are deter, deny and delay. Make it harder for the criminals not only to have access to your belongings, but make it harder to retrieve the items and slow down their escape, by making them use more time and energy to get away, such as a locked chain link fence.

After the theft has occurred, the next phase is detection.

Though many residents had numerous questions about the rash of burglaries, not all questions could be answered. Dale Schmidt, Washington County Sheriff, said, "Some information needs to be kept confidential for the investigation."

Residents are encouraged to call the Sheriff's Office with any reports of suspicious activity, cars, or people. "We are very interested in any kinds of tips or calls about suspicious vehicles," Deputy Rewerts relays, "Let us determine if something is suspicious or abnormal."

Residents shouldn't rationalize why they shouldn't call, such as "it could be just a new newspaper delivery car." Write down license plate numbers and vehicle descriptions. Deputy Rewert states, "Residents are our eyes and ears. The more we are called, the more we come and begin to know what is normal for the area."

During the discussion, the profile of the person/people involved is considered to be a "grab and go" type burglar. Items are sought after to sell or trade for a drug addiction, with heroin appearing to be the drug of choice.

Even with the thought of dealing with drug abusers, Schmidt stated, "There is no indication these people are physically violent. They are just after property."

Nobody has been taken into custody for the thefts. To report anything suspicious, even anonymously, please call (262) 335-4411.

meeting. "All 29 were given the same settlement in this agreement," Superintendent Jim Smasal said, "because the board felt very strongly, all for one and one for all, what one gets, everybody should get." The total settlement cost would have an approximate value of \$97,000. Kim Longdin, Kewaskum Education Association President, said the settlement sent a message that "everyone is valued" and "integrity of contract is being upheld."

The 14 teachers signed an agreement on November 9. Since the 2011/12 contracts

have not been negotiated, any changes due to the settlement will not only affect those contracts, but will carry over into the 2012/13 contracts.

"Hopefully we can concentrate on what we need to do now and plan for the future. We are so far ahead of what we were four months," Smasal said.

In a statement regarding the issue, Longdin stated, "We respect the school board's decision to uphold its legal and moral obligation to fairly compensate teachers who fulfilled the requirements of the contract before it was ended."



Moraine Park offering CNC Machinist, Welding Boot Camps

Moraine Park Technical College is combating the skilled worker shortage by launching manufacturing skills academies in a series of 15-week boot camps. In July, Governor Scott Walker announced a Wisconsin Workforce Partnership Grant from the Wisconsin Covenant Foundation, Inc., for Moraine Park. The College is using the \$705,647 grant to provide specific training necessary to create internships and job opportunities at partnering businesses including Amerequip Corporation, Brenner Tank, John Crane Orion, and Mid-States Aluminum Corporation, as well as several other area business partners. The boot camps are part of the Wisconsin Workforce Partnership Grant and will provide skills to last a lifetime.

Four information sessions will be held on Moraine Park's Fond du Lac campus in December, providing more information on both the Computer Numerical Control (CNC) Machinist and Welding Boot Camps. The sessions are set

for Monday, Dec. 3 from 3-4:30 p.m. and 5-6:30 p.m.; and Wednesday, Dec. 5 from 8-9:30 a.m. and 10-11:30 a.m. All four information sessions will be held in Room O-103. Each session will include business partner presentations, job placement opportunities, entrance requirements, program fees and CNC Machinist and Welding Boot Camp schedules.

Who is qualified to participate in the CNC Machinist or Welding Boot Camps? Basic requirements include: people who are currently unemployed, people not currently employed as a CNC machinist or welder, or people employed in a field unrelated to CNC or welding. Additionally, participants cannot be current employees of any of the internship business partner companies.







I am no longer a coach and do not speak for the club. I read with dismay the anonymous authors letter to the editor regarding the Gridiron football club. While I agree with some aspects of the letter the author was so broad in their criticism and ignorant of what coaches deal with that I was compelled to respond.

First let me respond to the accusation that coaches playing students that have behavioral or academic problems throughout

the season. It is not the coaches responsibility to discipline kids that are having problems in school or outside of school. It's up to the parents to decide whether or not they should participate in these extracurricular activities. The coach's are not privy to the school records or problems outside of football practice. Kewaskum gridiron football is a private football club and is not beholden to the Kewaskum athletic code of conduct. Unless specific information is communicated to the coaching staff from a position of authority or parent or guardian, everything is hearsay. Grid Iron coaches are people of great integrity and we have always strived to instill integrity, sportsmanship and leadership in the young athletes we coach.

Two former Indians help UW-Oshkosh Titans reach new heights

This has been a history-making year for the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh football team. Helping the Titans to a perfect 10-0 regular season and its first-ever NCAA III playoff appearance are two Kewaskum graduates, Brandon Peter and Nick Olla.

Peter, a 6-foot 2 inch, 280-pound senior, is the starting right tackle for the Titans, and the multi-talented Olla, a 6-0, 200-pounder, is the team's backup quarterback, behind All-American Nick Wara, and a wide receiver.

Unfortunately, only Peter will be able to play this Saturday against The College of St. Scholastica of Duluth, MN. Olla was injured in the recent victory over UW-Whitewater, an injury that required surgery this past Thursday.

Peter has beefed up a bit since his high school days. "I think I was about 260 in high school," he said, crediting the Oshkosh weight training program for the additional size and strength. "Our program is a lot better here than I had in high school."

Those who know football quite well might say a team's right tackle is its best blocker, but Peter isn't so sure about that as far as he is concerned. Still the Titans rushed for





1,617 yards in the seven WIAC (Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference), leading Peter to say, "It's working, whatever we are doing." (Plus the entire offensive line won NCAA III honors after the Titans beat UW-Eau Claire.)

"The 'we' in that statement means lots of young men worked hard to turn around the program and now are basking in its success.

"I started two games as a freshman," Peter said, reporting the team was 4-6 that year and again his sophomore year. Then came the breakout 7-3 in 2011 and now the perfect 10-0, including the win over defending national champion, UW-Whitewater.

"It was unbelievable. It was something we worked for all year," Peter said about the 28-13 victory over the War-

hawks.

Peter, who is majoring in criminal justice, knew early on he wanted to play collegiate football. "I've wanted to ever since I played fifth grade football (in Gridiron)," he said, and choosing Oshkosh over other schools was a matter of his major and that Oshkosh "is somewhat close to home but far enough away to feel you're in college."

Peter is ready for a tough week of preparation for St. Scholastica, which started soon after the first round match-ups were announced. "We watched a little film on them last night (Sunday)," he said.

Peter is confident the Titans will do well. "As long as we play to our potential, we're going to be tough to beat," he said. "Our quarterback is one

of the best in the country. That will help us."

"I'm doing good ... I'm back in school, just resting," Olla said Sunday night, concerning the ACL (Anterior Cruciate Ligament) in his right knee that was repaired. Now he has a matched pair because the ACL on the left knee required surgery his freshman season.

The injury occurred when "a defensive back from Whitewater tackled me low. His helmet hit my knee," Olla said.

And did Olla know the injury was serious? "Yes, I did," he said. I remembered from last time."

Olla, who played in seven games, was having a good year helping the team whatever way he could.

When the season started, Olla told his coach, Pat Ceroni, I like being the backup quarterback, but I want to play."

The wide receiver was an option, and Olla took it. He wound up catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns, running for 70 yards and one TD and completing 2x7 passes for 20 yards.

Olla has been very excited to see Oshkosh turn its program around. "When I came here, they were 4-6," Olla said, recalling how some people in Kewaskum questioned his decision to attend UW-Oshkosh

rather than Whitewater or other programs.

"I think we've showed we got a great group of guys," Olla said, pointing out, "Our last conference championship was 1972 ... we tied for the title in 1976."

Olla won't be able to play in Saturday's noon game at J.J. Keller Field on the UW-Oshkosh campus, but he will be on the sideline watching with great anticipation.

"It is hard, but I get to watch my teammates ... I get to watch my roommate, Brandon Peter from Kewaskum," Olla said, indicating the team's success this fall has created quite a buzz around the campus.

And, as soon as he is able, Olla said he will begin the rehabilitation process on the knee. "I'll probably get cleared (to practice) in August," Olla, who is majoring in special education, said, "Playing quarterback next fall. That's the goal."

A total of 32 teams start out in the NCAA III playoffs. If the Titans defeat St. Scholastica, then they will face the winner of the Bethel University (Minn.) vs. Concordia University of Chicago on Nov. 24. That game would also be played in Oshkosh.

Young Holy Trinity volleyball team takes first place
