Village water rates to increase 3.2% this week

Residents will receive greetings from the village in the form of increased water rates in the New Year.

The 3.2 percent hike will went into effect Dec. 12, after the last readings for 2012 are completed. Residents will see the increase reflected in January 2013 bills.

Rates for the average residential customer are expected to rise from \$54.63 per quarter to \$56.43. Larger residential customers will see an increase of about \$3 per billing cycle.

The average commercial rate will increase about \$14, to \$442.59, while public authority users will add about \$22 and industrial rates will rise from \$1,266.50 to \$1,308.76 per quarter.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser says a portion of the increase will help the village keep up with inflation but another justification was to finance the replacement of water pipes under Main Street, a project slated for 2014.

The mains, which were installed in the 1920s, are the oldest in the village and the work will be done in conjunction with a state Department of Transportation project.

Heiser says cost estimates for the main replacement have not been put together yet, but the board wanted to avoid a large annual rate increase.

With the exception of a nay vote from Trustee Kevin Scheunemann, the rate hike was passed with little comment at a November board meeting.

Another issue the village is a Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources rule concerning the reduction of phosphorus output. Heiser said the board and village Department of Public Works will be researching that issue before the state permit is renewed in 2014-15.

According to information supplied by the village, the last time rates were increased was 2008.

That increase was a combination of two DNR-mandated projects: the installation of a \$2.5-million lift station and a \$6.3-million water plant upgrade.

The plant upgrade came about in 2004, after construction altered water flow on Riverview Drive and a rain event necessitated the discharge of raw sewage into the Milwaukee River.

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FES principal Molebash resigns

The Kewaskum School District is short one administrator after Farmington Principal Janet Molebash abruptly resigned her post Tuesday morning. A teacher-in-charge and other principals in the district will assist with administrative duties until a replacement is named.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal made the announcement to teachers Tuesday morning. A letter went home to parents Tuesday afternoon.

"The district has accepted her resignation and wishes her the best of luck in future endeavors," Smasal said.

Molebash stated, "I am deeply going to miss all the people I've gotten to know, the staff, parents and especially the kids."

Smasal explained a plan for an interim administrator will be announced when students return from Christmas break on Jan. 2. Until that time, Jody Mundigler, a counselor, will oversee day-to-day operations at the school with the assistance of other administrators in the district.

Molebash began her employment with the Kewaskum School District at the start of the 1991-'92 school year as a physical education teacher. She became principal of Wayne and Farmington Elementary Schools in July of 2002. This past October a new principal was named at Wayne and Molebash's responsibilities included only Farmington.

Smasal stated the terms of the resignation could not be disclosed at this time. Those details will be disclosed in next week's Statesman.

A bell that has a habit of disappearing - and reappearing - can once again be found in front of the Kewaskum Fire Department.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel and his crew are responsible for its most recent absence, but after having the bell and frame refurbished, it was reinstalled in November.

Department membership agreed the bell needed some TLC after Groeschel noticed the framework holding the bell was starting to crumble.

New supports were built in Jackson from old telephone poles and the bell was sent down the street to Adrenaline Junkeez Motorsports for sandblasting and repainting.

Bjorn Haugen, who owns the business with Jeremy Leicht, said working on the bell

was a unique challenge.

Adrenaline Junkeez is more likely to use a painting process called powder coating on engine and other parts and motorcycle frames, not 1,000-plus-pound bells. Powder coating provides a baked-on finish that is more durable and stands up to the weather.

The only problem was getting the bell into the 6-by-5-foot by 3-foot oven.

"We had to flip it on its

side," says Bjorn.

To do that required the construction of a frame that would handle the bell and a forklift to place it in the oven. While a normal part spends about 10 minutes baking at 400 degrees, Haugen says the bell took two hours.

No markings gave the fire department - or anyone else - a clue to who made the bell or when it was cast, but the village was home to a foundry, Remmel Manufacturing.

And its maker and the year it was cast isn't the only mystery of the bell.

Originally installed at the village hall that was at 203 Main Street, (now the site of Smith and Hatch Insurance), when owner Dennis Butz bought the building in 2001 there was no sign of the tower - or the bell.

Kewaskum Historical Society member Dan Schmidt theorizes that when the bell was removed from the old municipal building in the 1950s,

it may have gone into storage in the garage of Harry Koch; a man Schmidt says tried to save bits and pieces of Kewaskum history.

Koch also saved a backdrop from the Opera House that he later donated to the Kewaskum Historical Society, Schmidt said.

Groeschel says the bell has been outside the fire station since he joined in 1979, and probably had a place there since the facility was completed in 1976.

Schmidt has tried to retrace the steps of the bell using village records, without luck.

Groeschel said he's also tried to research the history of the bell, but could find no reference to it either being taken down from its perch on the old village hall or it being moved. He seems to recall a member mentioning the moving of the bell may have been a school project.

Fire destroys Farmington structures

FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP- Fire destroyed two structures at a residence in the 8900 block of Fillmore Rd Saturday evening.

The Washington County Sheriff's office was contacted by one of the homeowners around 10:20 p.m. reporting they returned home and noticed a chicken coop at their residence was on fire. Prior to emergency crews arriving

on scene, the owners, Wesley Weinhold and Peggy Cadigan, reported the fire had spread to a garage on the property at 8975 Fillmore Rd. as well.

Fillmore Fire Department responded, they were assisted by Boltonville Fire Department.

The 20' by 20' structure was used as a shop and storage area. It was not attached to the residence, but was in close

proximity to the chicken coop. No one was injured, but both structures and their contents were a total loss.

The cause of the fire does not appear suspicious and is believed to be related to a heat lamp that was on in the chicken coop at the time.

Emergency crews remained on scene for several hours while the fire was extinguished.

The Zinny petal represents being "Considerate and Caring." While some girls baked, others were made handmade decorations.


After a couple hours of baking the troop then visited Beechwood Rest Home. The girls visited all the residents and gave them a bag of cookies and a handmade hand turkey deco-



Tom Knorr, one of the board members and volunteers at the pantry couldn't have been more happy with the school's donation.



Kewaskum was scheduled to play at Plymouth on Tuesday and host Waupun on Friday. On Tuesday, the Indians travel to Random Lake.

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
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

Raiders take command early

Even though it is very early in the 2012-'13 wrestling season, Two Rivers has already established itself as the frontrunner in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and beyond.

The defending EWC champion Raiders opened the current campaign by winning the annual Red Raider Invitational in Pulaski against some pretty strong programs and last Thursday, they completed dominated Kewaskum, 56-12.

"They're a very good team. They've got some good, experienced kids," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said after he watched his first 10 athletes lose, including five by pin in the first two minutes.

Starting at 170 pounds, the

Raiders quickly built up a 54-0 lead.

Finally, senior Austin Goeden put some points on Kewaskum's side of the board with a 3-0 shutout win over Chalndler Donaiti.

The Indians would also pick up victories in the final two matches. Cody Muckerheide received a forfeit win at 152, then Brett Scoles ended the evening with a 3-1 decision over Brad Dimmick.

"Brett and Austin had close matches, but they wrestled well and did a nice job," Aupperle said. "Some of those matches don't look pretty but they are wins."

Goeden (4-2), a defending EWC champion, and Donati, were scoreless after the first period. Donati chose the down

position for the second period and Goeden rode him out and pushed hard enough for a pin to get a stalling call on his opponent.

In the third period, Goeden (4-2) needed five seconds to score a reversal and again looked strong riding. Near the end of the match, Goeden picked up an additional point on Donaiti's second stall warning.

Scoles and Dimmick battled for the full six minutes in a match that included a lot of counter moves by both wrestlers. With :16 left in the first period, Scoles scooted behind Dimmick for a takedown, but Dimmick escaped with :10 left.

In the second period, Scoles (6-0) escaped with :47 left for a 3-1 advantage, and

the KHS senior and three-time state qualifier, kept Dimmick in check for his sixth win of the year.

Coming close to gaining a win was soph. Max Vetter, who was down 5-9 after two periods before staging a gutty comeback to fall two points short of a win in a 12-11 decision.

Joey Seitz also lost by decision, 5-2 against Chris Yauch.





there is a great deal of prep work that has to be done.

"It is always my hope people will see that I care for the subject I choose," Pennington said. "I choose them very carefully," and then she invests a year or two into research on the topic.

Of all her books, An Old Fashioned Christmas is perhaps the best seller.

"Again it has that Wisconsin flavor," she said, referring to the fact the Old Fashioned Christmas highlights Wisconsin Christmases traditions, such as Billie the Brownie and Schusters, and also the Christmas Tree Ship which sunk near Two Rivers.

Cherishing Children contains stories about Grandpa Koepke's farm in Wayne and the Serve (Pennington's maiden name) tradition of going to Lakeside Park during the holidays. "That's a Christmas tradition for 50 years," she said.

In the "Gifts" book, the introduction recalls an event

which happened to her at Skretny's Drug Store in Kewaskum which is now home to Coffee Corner Bistro. The book ends with a story about the convent in Campbellsport.

Pennington's favorite of the 10 short stories is the World War I miracle truce that took place on The Western Front in Europe on Christmas Day. The soldiers on both sides left their trenches, shared the contents of holiday packages they had received from home and lifted their voices in singing popular carols.

"That single incident is recognized as the most remarkable in world military history," she said.

Pennington is both a lively storyteller and an entertaining lecturer, making appearances at schools, libraries, historical societies, corporations, and civic organizations. She has been married to Les Pennington for over 30 years. They currently make their home in Lomira.





Thiemer's Sip 'N Snip

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Gurnee's Key Lime Cove offers the cure to a weekend trip to the Keys

Soon the familiar sounds of I'm bored will ring throughout the homes of parents everywhere as children will enjoy Christmas vacation. We'll all be sick of the cold snow and be on the look out for winter climates, little did you know the fun that awaits just an hour and a half from Kewaskum.

Recently, my family and I were invited for quick trip to check out Key Lime Cove (KLC) across the state-line in Gurnee, Illinois. Key Lime Cove is the perfect place for a few days of water fun and recreation. What we found nice was the resort-like atmosphere.

You will soon forget you are in the frigid midwest by entering the 30-acre park themed after the Florida Keys. Our visit happened just after KLC was recognized by Aquatics International for the second year in a row with the "Best of Aquatics" award in the water park resort category for 2012.

There was nothing we could have wanted in our Mangrove Suite. It was beautiful and clean, even the cold air returns were spotless! There are a total of 414 suites on the property with layouts accommodating two to as many as eight people.

My wife and I thoroughly enjoyed the ample living area away from the beds that was complete with a table, pull-out sofa and flat-screen TV. The kids fell asleep early from all the activity so my wife and I could relax, watch TV or use our iPads without worrying about waking up the kids. The complimentary wireless internet worked flawlessly throughout the resort.

The best amenity at Key Lime Cove was their Smart Band* technology. Upon check-in, Nicole and I were both given wristbands that allowed us to put our wrist near the door handle of our suite to open it. This wristband also worked as a credit card in all the restaurants, stores and game room. It was especially handy in the water-park where we rented a locker. There was no

need to worry about losing the locker key or each of us having a key to gain entry to our stuff.

We opted to not allow the kids to have this kind of wristband because we were only there for one-day. When we go back for a longer period, I will probably give one of these to the oldest. There is a \$150 daily cap to what you can spend and you must use a credit card, not a debit card.

Dinner the first night was at The Crazy Toucan Margarita Grille, which was quite similar to a Caribbean road house with its eclectic decorating and delicious piña coladas. Prices were reasonable and was perfect for families who don't mind the kids watching Disney or Nickelodeon while they eat.

Prior to our meal we had the Farmer's Platter that included deep fried corn, pickles and mushrooms, chips with cheese and bacon and cheesy crab legs.


The menu had an array of choices, I tried the lime ginger crusted chicken, complimented by couscous and greens for \$13.99; Nicole had the pineapple shrimp skewers, served over a bed of jasmine rice topped with orange ginger sauce for \$16.99.

The rest of the choices on the menu included a page of appetizers, a few salads, burgers, other sandwiches like the Avocado BLT, Chipotle Chicken Wrap, Little Havana BBQ Pork with Swiss Cheese and pickles and entrees such as fajitas, tequila lime fettuccine and Jamaican-Me-Crazy BBQ Chicken. There was also a complete children's menu.

Another restaurant we wanted to try was the Cove's take on the classic American diner experience that was to be offered in D.W. Anderson's Eatery, however during our stay the doors were locked each time we tried to visit.

Before our tour of the inner workings of the water-park we stopped off at Island Confectionery for the advertised Starbucks coffee and found a huge selection of candy, pastries and the coffee.

After our tour, we headed over to the Crazy Toucan for a less than stellar breakfast experience. Just when I thought they had cameras watching our every move, making sure our trip was amazing we ended up waiting 15

minutes for a table in an empty restaurant. I will say, the hash browns were awesome, when you're used to getting burned, dry shredded spuds, a decent side of potatoes can put a smile on your face.

The kids had the waffles and omelets while Nicole was a little more adventurous with the Shrimp and Egg White Frittata which she was disappointed in because it was lacking in the taste department. I agreed it needed something to make it pop besides the Roma tomato slices. Both boys enjoyed their meal as did I, playing it conservative and trying the omelet, ham and hash browns.

Our tour of the 65,000 square-foot water-park was quite informative. We learned that the cleaning didn't stop at the hotel but continued with the interesting way water is kept sanitary. Safety is also top of the list at KLC through the unique methods employed by their lifeguards.

Before starting their shift, or when ending it, lifeguards perform a CPR insurance. Throughout their employment at the resort, life saving skills are kept fresh by additional in services that include training in and out of the water. While on duty you won't see lifeguards looking bored like is evident at many other water-parks. Like clock-work you will see lifeguards performing a "bottom scan" ensuring that all

layers of the water are safe, guards do this throughout their shift by crouching down and watching right in front of them.

Chief Engineer Robert Williams, KLC's ecological expert, explained they are the only park to utilize corona discharge ozone. The ozone molecule is a very powerful oxidizer and sanitizer, killing pathogens and micro contaminants faster and more effectively than anything else available. When sanitation is complete the ozone returns to oxygen. Ozone gives water a better smell and clarity than chlorine or UV treatments because it produces no by products. Ozone removes soaps scum, oils and chloramines (that chlorine smell).

That same fascinating tour is offered before the water park opens on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Guests on the tour hear from managers of the aquatics staff and take a walking tour of the pump room under the water park. The science of the resort's ozone technology is discussed and guests have the opportunity to ask questions.

Our tour ended with Hunter, my 11-year-old turning on the pumps, which he learned "turned

on the water park" and readied it for guests.

We spent the entire day in the water park and enjoyed each of the 12 slides including the Hurricane Vortex, a 45-foot high, 140-foot long ride that Hunter somehow got me to go on twice. I don't know how he got me on it even once after hearing on the tour that you can reach speeds of 40 MPH while circling in the vortex. He had a blast, I needed a breather after.

My other son, Riley, 6, spent most of his time in the Tsunami Washout Wave Pool. Thanks to the Y's swimming lessons he fared well. He occasionally left to join me on the 560-foot long lazy river that is the KeyLime Creek.

We all enjoyed time in Toukie's Big Deluxe activity pool. We also played a few rounds of horse in the the sport pool. The Lil' Limers Play Pool is perfect for toddlers.

Nicole and my favorite part of the water-park was the almost only Key Lime Grotto that someday we will take advantage of when our children are too cool to hang with or be seen with us at the water-park.

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



Many of the various pools are handicap accessible with various lifts available. Water temperature in all the pools is 86.6°F and the water-park temp, similar to the humid Florida Keys is 87°F.

We didn't have time to take advantage of the luxurious, two-story, Paradise Mist Spa or the adjoining Enchanted Lagoon Kids Spa. We definitely, will look into this for our return trip, well for Nicole and I, The boys didn't see the fun in manicures and pedicures.

PEANUT BUTTER-TOFFEE CHEESECAKE BROWNIE

- 1 box (19.5 ounce) Pillsbury chocolate fudge brownie mix
- 1/2 cup Crisco vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup water
- 2 eggs
- 1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 bag (8 oz.) Heath milk chocolate toffee bits
- 1 cup milk chocolate baking chips
- 3 tablespoons whipping cream

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly spray 13x9 inch pan with no-stick cooking spray.

In medium bowl, stir brownie mix, oil, water and eggs 50 strokes. Spread in pan; set aside.

In large bowl, beat cream cheese with electric mixer on medium speed until fluffy. Add milk and peanut butter; beat until smooth. Stir in one cup of the toffee bits. Spread evenly over batter.

Bake 30 to 40 minutes or until cheesecake layer is set and edges are light golden brown. Cool 30 minutes. Refrigerate 40 minutes.

In small microwavable bowl, microwave chocolate chips and cream uncovered on High 40 to 60 seconds or until melted; stir until smooth. Spread over cheesecake layer. Sprinkle with remaining toffee bits. Cool completely. Store covered in the refrigerator. Makes 36 brownies.

BANANAS FOSTER BARS

(Makes 16 2-inch bars)

Ingredients:

BARS:

- 1/2 cup (one stick) butter, softened
- 1 cup dark brown sugar, packed
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon dark rum or 1 teaspoon rum extract
- 1 cup flour
- 1/8 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup bananas, diced
- 1/2 cup (2 ounces) pecans or walnuts, chopped

FROSTING:

- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter at room temperature
- 4 ounces cream cheese, softened
- 4 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon rum or pure vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1-2 cups confectioners' sugar, sifted

Directions:

BARS:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly butter and flour 9-inch-square pan.*

In large bowl, beat together butter and sugar with electric mixer until creamy. Add egg and rum; mix to combine.

In small bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon and salt; gradually add to butter mixture. Mix in bananas and pecans; stir to incorporate. Pour batter into prepared pan and spread evenly. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Remove pan to a wire rack to cool completely.

FROSTING:

In large bowl, combine butter, cream cheese, sugar and extract with an electric mixer. Beat until light and fluffy. Add cinna-

mon and one cup confectioners' sugar; blend until smooth. (Careful: overmixing will cause separation). Add additional confectioners' sugar to create desired consistency.

Spread frosting immediately over cooled bars. Cover and store bars in refrigerator for up to three days. when ready to serve, cut bars into two-inch squares.

* For a thicker bar, use an eight-inch pan.

ALMOND BUTTER BUCKEYES

(Makes 4 dozen candies)

Ingredients:

CANDIES:

- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened
- 1-1/4 cups almond butter*
- 3 tablespoons dark rum or 1-1/2 teaspoons rum extract
- 1 teaspoon almond extract
- 3-3/4 to 4 cups confectioners' sugar, sifted

COATING:

- 12 ounces bittersweet chocolate, chopped

Directions:

CANDIES:

In large bowl, combine butter, almond butter, rum, almond extract and confectioners' sugar

using electric mixer. Dough will be smooth and firm. Shape dough into one-inch balls; place on parchment-lined baking sheets. Refrigerate until firm, about 30 minutes.

COATING:

Melt chocolate in shallow, microwave-safe dish. Heat 30 seconds; stir; then continue in ten-second intervals, stirring after each cook time. Chocolate should be melted and smooth.

To dip balls, insert a toothpick about 1/2 inch into the ball, dip into melted chocolate, leaving a small circle of dough visible at the top, and place on parchment paper to dry until chocolate is firm. Repeat with remaining candies. Store in airtight container for up to three days.

* You may substitute peanut or cashew butter for almond butter; omit almond extract if you use a substitution.





Cinnamon Christmas Tree

Spray counter lightly with non-stick cooking spray. Combine rolls together and roll into a 12x 18-inch rectangle. Spread with 1/3 cup butter, sprinkle on cinnamon and brown sugar. Fold 12-inch sides in to make a triangle, overlapping edges. Leave 1-inch uncovered along bottom. Cut off bottom inch of dough and roll as a cinnamon roll to use for tree trunk. Place tree on sprayed cookie sheet and position trunk under bottom of tree. Using a clean ruler, mark branches every 1 1/2-inches and cut with scissors or pizza cutter. Twist each branch several times and curve upward. Cover with sprayed plastic wrap. Let rise for 40 minutes or until double in size. Remove wrap. Bake at 350° F for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Frost while still warm; sprinkle with almonds and decorate with maraschino cherries.

Combine frosting ingredients. For thinner frosting, add additional milk or water.



Christmas Tree Pizza

- 16 Rhodes™ Dinner Rolls, thawed to room temperature
- 1/2 cup Alfredo sauce
- 2 cups grated mozzarella cheese
- pepperoni (2 sizes)
- green and yellow peppers
- red pepper flakes

Place 16 rolls on a sprayed baking sheet in a pyramid shape starting with one at the top, two under it, three, four and the last row five rolls. Leave some space between the rolls. Flatten and press rolls together to form a tree shape. Leave the outside edge slightly rounded so the sauce and toppings do not run off. The trunk of the tree is one roll placed under the last row of five. Tuck it under and flatten. Poke rolls several times with a fork to prevent bubbles from spreading and pre-bake at 350°F 10-12 minutes. Remove from oven and allow to cool. Spread Alfredo pre-sauce over the pizza, and sprinkle with cheese. Decorate as desired with pepperoni, peppers cut into different shapes and red pepper flakes. Bake an additional 10-12 minutes or until cheese is melted and crust is golden brown.


Spray counter lightly with non-stick cooking spray. Flatten each roll into a 4 1/2-inch circle. Place circles on sprayed baking sheets. Cover with plastic wrap and let rest 20 minutes. Remove wrap. Dip 4-inch cookie cutters into flour and cut desired shapes out of each dough circle. Pre-bake at 350°F 8-10 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool. Top each one with pizza sauce, grated cheese, red and green pepper strips and pepperoni pieces. Bake for an additional 6-8 minutes or until cheese is nicely melted.

Roll a large dinner roll into a club shape about 5-inches long. Place in the middle bottom of a large sprayed baking pan to be the bottom of the tree trunk. Roll all remaining rolls into 18-20-inch ropes. Fold the ropes in half pinching ends together. Twist each one 5 or 6 times and place the pinched ends of 4 of them on the trunk with the branches angled down. The remaining 4 branches will make their own trunk by overlapping each other in the center of the tree. Space the branches so they will not touch when they rise. Cover with melted butter. Sprinkle heavily with green and white decorator sugar. Bake at 350°F 10-15 minutes or until slightly golden brown. Cool and decorate, as desired, with candy stuck onto tree with frosting gel.

CREAM CHEESE CHRISTMAS COOKIES**Ingredients:**

1 cup butter, softened
1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese
1 cup white sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup green sugar crystals
1/2 cup red sugar crystals
1 cup pecan halves

Directions:

1. Cream together the butter and cream cheese. Add sugar and vanilla; beat until light and fluffy.

2. Combine the flour and salt; gradually add to creamed mixture, beating until well blended. Stir in chopped pecans. Cover bowl with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 15 minutes.

3. On four sheets of aluminum foil, shape dough into four 6 inch rolls, 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap each roll tightly in foil and refrigerate over night.

4. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Line cookie sheets with foil. Remove rolls of dough from refrigerator one at a time. Coat each roll with red or green sugar crystals; cut dough into 1/4 inch slices.

5. Place on prepared cookie sheets; top each cookie with a pecan half. Bake for 15 to 18 minutes or until bottom of cookie is lightly browned when lifted.

SOFT CHRISTMAS COOKIES

3 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup margarine, softened
1 1/2 cups white sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Directions:

Sift flour, baking powder, and salt together, set aside. In a large bowl, cream together the margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs one at a time, then stir in the vanilla. Gradually blend in the sifted ingredients until fully absorbed. Cover dough, and chill for 2 hours.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Grease cookie sheets. On a clean floured surface, roll out small portions of chilled dough to 1/4 inch thickness. Cut out shapes using cookie cutters.

Bake 6 to 8 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are barely brown. Remove from cookie sheets to cool on wire racks.

SWEDISH CHRISTMAS COOKIES**Ingredients:**

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons ground cardamom
1/4 teaspoon fine salt
1 cup unsalted butter, (2 sticks), at room temperature
1 cup confectioners' sugar
1 large egg, room temperature

1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract
1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest

Colored sanding sugars or chopped toasted pecans

Directions:

Whisk the flour, cardamom, and salt in a bowl.

Put the butter and confectioners' sugar in a food processor, and process until smooth. Pulse in the egg, vanilla, and lemon zest until combined. Add the flour mixture and process to make a soft buttery dough. Divide dough in half onto 2 (12-inch long) sheets of plastic wrap, using the plastic, shape into rough logs. Refrigerate the dough logs for 30 minutes until just firm enough to shape into uniform logs, 8-inches long by 2-inches in diameter. Refrigerate until firm, at least 2 hours or overnight.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.

Scatter either the sanding sugars or toasted nuts on a work surface and roll the logs until completely coated. Cut into 1/4-inch thick cookies and space about 1 inch apart on parchment-lined baking sheets. Bake until golden around the edges, about 20 to 25 minutes. Cool cookies on the pan on wire racks. Store in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 2 weeks.

CRANBERRY CRUNCH BARK

1 pkg vanilla bark or 1 lb of White Melting Chocolate
3/4 cups almonds, coarsely chopped or slivered
3/4 cups sweetened dried cranberries
2 cups Rice Krispy cereal

Melt white chocolate in microwave careful not to burn. Add in most of the cranberries, most of the almonds and all of the cereal. Stir into the melted chocolate and then pour onto a piece of wax paper. Immediately sprinkle with remaining nuts and cranberries, press lightly into bark. Let stand overnight or insert into freezer for approx 10 minutes. Break apart into bite size pieces, serve or wrap for a great Christmas gift.

EASY OREO TRUFFLES**Ingredients:**

1 (16 ounce) package OREO Chocolate Sandwich Cookies, divided
1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
2 (8 ounce) packages Semi-Sweet Baking Chocolate, melted

Directions:

1. Crush 9 of the cookies to fine crumbs in food processor; reserve for later use. (Cookies can also be finely crushed in a resealable plastic bag using a rolling pin.) Crush remaining

36 cookies to fine crumbs; place in medium bowl. Add cream cheese; mix until well blended. Roll cookie mixture into 42 balls, about 1-inch in diameter.

2. Dip balls in chocolate; place on wax paper-covered baking sheet. (Any leftover chocolate can be stored at room temperature for another use.) Sprinkle with reserved cookie crumbs.

3. Refrigerate until firm, about 1 hour. Store leftover truffles, covered, in refrigerator.

TOFFEE BUTTER COOKIES**Ingredients:**

2 1/2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1 cup butter, softened, no substitutes
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
1/2 cup toffee bits
1 egg
2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, beat together with electric mixer, butter and powdered sugar, add egg

and vanilla, beat until fluffy.

Add flour, baking powder, baking soda and toffee bits, beat at low speed until well combined.

Use a medium cookie scoop or a tablespoon full rounded into balls and place 2 inches apart on greased or lined cookie sheets.

Bake 10-12 minutes or until cookies are starting to brown on the edges. Cool on cookie sheet for a couple of minutes, move to wire rack to finish cooling.


