Village pay up 1 percent

The Kewaskum village board set employee salaries and signed contracts in the wake of legislative changes in Madison at its December 10 meeting.

Struck from the contract between the village and the Kewaskum Police Association is a requirement that employees are to reside within 15 miles of the village limits.

The three-year contract will give full time officers an across-the-board one percent annual raise but they will also pay toward their retirement - one percent this year, two percent in 2014 and three percent in 2015. The village pays the balance to the Wisconsin Retirement System.

Monthly salaries for full-time patrol officers will range from \$3,624 for first-year employees in 2013 to \$4,886 in 2015 for officers employed five years or more. After the fifth year of service, longevity pay will increase in five dollar monthly increments for five, 10 and 15 years of service. Part-time patrol officers will receive between \$13.70 and \$18.38 per hour, depending on their certification and length of service throughout the three-year contract.

While officers are exempt from Act 10 and their negotiations were unchanged, salaries for non-represented employees - the police chief, village hall staff, department heads and now, 10 former AFSCME members in the Department of Public Works, Wastewater Treatment, Library and clerical staff, were set by the board.

When ACT 10 passed, all public employee unions were required

Spring Election taking shape throughout community

Incumbents and newcomers are lining up for municipal and school board positions in anticipation of the April 2 election.

In the Village of Kewaskum incumbent Andy Pesch is running for his seat as president, but the filing of non-candidacy by Trustee Norman Kufahl will leave an opening on the seven-person board.

Trustees James Hovland and Kevin Scheunemann have filed to retain their seats and Clerk Stephanie Justmann says if a write-in campaign does not produce a third supervisor, the board could hold a special election or make an appointment to fill the two-year term opened by Kufahl vacating his seat. The board voted to lower their salaries this year.

The village president and trustees will make \$500 per year less, with the president's salary dropping

from \$2,000 to \$1,500 and trustees earning \$1,000 instead of \$1,500. Positions also command a \$30 per diem for meetings.

The Kewaskum School Board race finds newcomers John Kincaid and Heather Oelhafen and incumbent Mary Miller vying for two seats on the seven-member board.

Board member Bill Kesting filed for non-candidacy, leaving the second opening.

Terms are three years and members are paid \$262.50 for each regular meeting attended and \$125 per day for attending all day meetings where they represent the school board.

In the Town of Kewaskum, all seats are open, including the elected positions of clerk and treasurer.

Incumbent Chairman Daniel Schmidt initially filed for non-candidacy, but turned in candidacy papers before the deadline and is running unopposed for the two-year term.

Supervisors Mike Otten and Scott Wollner and Treasurer Daniel Stoffel are also running unopposed, but Clerk Nancy Boden will face Sandra Pasbrig for her position.

Boden, who has served as clerk for seven years, says this is the first time she has faced a challenge.

All positions carry a two year term, with the chairman earning \$65 per diem and \$17 per hour for work pertaining to his position. Supervisors earn \$55 per meeting and \$16 per hour for supervisory work and the clerk earns \$15,000 annually.

In the town of Farmington, Chairman Chris Elbe and supervisors Mark Foyse and Duane Wollner are running unopposed for two-year terms on the three-person board.

Both the chair and supervisors earn \$35 per diem.

In Wayne Township, Chairman



Kewaskum firefighters claim 5th place in Toilet Bowl

Firefighters from Kewaskum and a dozen other departments in Washington and Dodge counties battled below-freezing temperatures during Hustiford's annual Toilet Bowl Water Fights New Year's day.

"Some people like to jump in Lake Michigan on New Year's Day. Firefighters like to advance hose lines in the ice," says Kewaskum Firefighter Pat Schmitt.

Schmitt was nozzle-man for the five-member Kewaskum team, in front of Dave Kletti, Zach Groeschel, Brian Fahrnow and Robbie Schultz.

Schmitt said the team enjoyed the camaraderie and fun of the occasion, as well as the challenge of working in 8-degree temperatures.

"The hose was getting very icy and slippery and our turn-out gear was getting stiff. "Between rounds I had to switch gloves. I couldn't even flex them anymore because they were frozen solid but surprisingly, the footing was not too bad," says Schmitt.

He said the team is more used to doing its water fighting in summer at Boltonville, Beechwood, Cascade, Theresa and sometimes St. Lawrence.

But aiming at a barrel poised on a line 15 or 20 feet in the air in frigid temperatures is good practice.

"People think it's a game but it's actually training, especially working in slippery conditions," says Schmitt.

The weather was responsible for shortening the rounds from two minutes to one and the usual three-minute double-elimination rounds were shortened to two minutes.

Schmitt said it's been sev-



eral years since the Kewaskum department participated in Husty's winter water fights, but back then there was a group of Kewaskum firefighters that battled below-zero conditions as well as opposing teams.

Hustiford Firefighter Matt Pieper says they've never cancelled a match due to cold weather.

"This has been one of the colder years, however we have had years with wind chills well below zero," says Pieper.

Kewaskum came in fifth, behind first place Woodland, second place Pewaukee and Stone Bank, whose team came in third.

"At least we lost to the top teams," said Schmitt.

Other departments that participated included Jackson, two teams from Allenton, Juneau, Ashippun, Knowles, Mayville, Ixonia and Fox Lake.

The water barrel fights capped off a day of Toilet Bowl festivities, including the coronation of King Shane Strassman and Queen Kayla Will, a parade and a no-helmet, no-pads football game between Hustiford High School alumni.

Proceeds from the event are used for HHS scholarships and Fireman's Hall, Pieper said.

Driver in drunken crash remains jailed, texting, drinking causes of crash

A West Bend man remains in the Washington County Jail facing felony charges stemming from a Christmas Eve crash that left Pamela Matenaer dead and two others injured.

Keith Lawrence Wiedmeyer, 34 was charged with homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle, a count of first degree recklessly endangering safety and two counts of causing injury/operating under the influence during an initial appearance in Washington County Court Dec. 28. If convicted, Wiedmeyer could face up to 25 years in prison for the homicide charge.

A \$250,000 cash bond was set and a hearing scheduled for Feb. 13.

The three-car crash occurred about 9:50 p.m. on Fond du Lac Ave. near the Gateway Cafe.

Witness accounts state Wiedmeyer was traveling northbound on Fond du Lac Ave. near the Gateway Cafe in his black Pontiac Grand Prix when he passed another vehicle, crossed the double yellow line and slammed into a Chevrolet Cobalt which held Peter, Mark and Pamela Matenaer.

According to the criminal complaint, Wiedmeyer told an

officer he had been drinking earlier and was texting while driving before the crash.

A witness account estimated that Wiedmeyer was traveling between 65 and 80 miles per hour in the 30 mph zone and another stated they did not observe any brake lights on the Grand Prix before the crash.

When the Kewaskum police officer arrived, the door of the driver side of the Cobalt was crushed and the driver, Mark Matenaer and front seat passenger Peter Matenaer appeared to be injured. Pamela Matenaer was sitting in the rear driver's side seat and did not respond to questions. All three were transported to St. Joseph's Hospital. Pamela Matenaer was then flown by Flight for Life to Froedtert Memorial Hospital in Milwaukee.

Administrative Lieutenant Martin Schulte said Wiedmeyer was placed on hold at the scene of the accident and taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for a blood draw and for attention to his injuries.

After being treated Wiedmeyer walked out of the hospital, according to Schulte.

It wasn't until Matenaer died, at about 12:45 a.m. Christmas Day, that Kewaskum Police arrested Wiedmeyer at his sister's residence in Campbelsport.

Aspiring TIF developer now facing fraud, money laundering charges in CA

SACRAMENTO, CA- The man with plans for Kewaskum's TIF District in 2005 now faces federal charges for his alleged role in running a multi-million-dollar insurance fraud in California. The TIF District currently remains in foreclosure.

Gregory J. Chmielewski, 43, El Dorado Hills, was arrested on Oct. 24 in Arizona according to a press release from the U.S. District Court in Sacramento. He was charged with 24-counts of mail fraud and money laundering. The indictment from February 17, 2011, was sealed until Chmielewski's arrest in Arizona.

According to the indictment, Chmielewski set up a professional employer organization called Independent Management Resources (IMR). He solicited Indian tribes to partner with him and provide employee insurance coverage and other employee services at a reduced cost, using the tribes' sovereignty status. Chmielewski marketed the "Tribal" insurance coverage to California employers with high workers' compensation liabilities, claiming that it provided significant savings over traditional workers' compensation coverage. According to the indictment, after getting clients, Chmielewski then began diverting and misappropriating millions of dollars from IMR accounts for his personal use.


This case is the product of an investigation by the United States Postal Inspection Service, the Internal Revenue Service, Criminal Investigation, and the California Department of Insurance. Assistant United States Attorneys Lee S. Bickley and Todd Leras are prosecuting the case.

"Preying on California employers while profiteering on the reputation of a Tribal nation to commit insurance fraud is deplorable," said California Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones. "This joint investigation and pending prosecution of Gregory Chmielewski sends a clear message that defrauding Californians for personal gain will not be tolerated."

If convicted, Chmielewski faces a maximum statutory penalty for each count of mail fraud of 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine or up to twice the gain or loss from the offense. The maximum penalty for money laundering is 10 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine or up to twice the gain or loss from the offense. The actual sentence, if convicted, will be determined at the discretion of the court after consideration of any applicable statutory factors and the Federal Sentencing Guidelines, which take into account a number of variables.

Attorney Bickley stated this week Chmielewski remains in custody without bail. A status hearing is pending for Feb. 1.

Two companies with ties to Chmielewski, United Construction and Bullseye Construction brought forth elaborate plans to develop the land with

stores, office buildings, a hotel and restaurants after buying the property from Gary Gavin. The transaction to purchase the land never occurred and the land is

currently in foreclosure owned by a subsidiary of BMO Harris Bank.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser said Monday he believed the land was still tied up in the foreclosure lawsuit, it was to go a sheriff's sale in August 2012. He explained last he knew the bank wanted to update assessment data on the properties. "The Village is working to remove itself from the foreclosure lawsuit," he added.

Kewaskum's Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) District is located at the most southern limits of the village and remains vacant. Early in 2012 the village took steps to declare the TIF "distressed" giving the village more time to collect tax increment from the district.

The theme of this consistently amusing comedy explores many questions to be considered in this world of constant digital communication and fixation with wireless devices. While cell phone technology brings us together, it also winds up transforming the nature and quality of our most important connections with other human beings. Author, Sarah Ruhl, also wrote The Clean House (2004) and In the Next Room (2009) and was twice a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize. Ruhl tends to shuffle between

the surreal and the mundane in her plays. Dead Man's Cell Phone was first performed in June 2007 by the Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company and premiered in March 2008 in New York via Playwrights Horizon.



Village Administrator Matt Heiser says non-representative employee wages were frozen in 2009, 2010 and 2012, but in 2013, non-union-represented employees will receive a one percent wage increase. The village pays half of the non-union pension payments, or 6.65 percent, for non represented staff.

25 Years Ago

November 20, 1987

Following public hearings held during Monday night's meeting, the 1988 general and departmental budgets for the Village of Kewaskum were unanimously approved by the Village Board. The 1988 budget of \$1,017,792 will carry a rate of \$7,083 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for the village's portion of the total levy. Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt said he was still missing some figures, including the actual state aid amounts, however preliminary calculations indicate the village's total levy will be around \$22.07 per \$1,000, down about 98c from the 1987 levy of \$23.05. In other action, the trustees approved a recommendation from the Fire and Police Commission to hire two additional part-time officers. The village received 27 applications for the positions, 12 individuals were interviewed. The board approved the hiring of Steven Seitz of Kewaskum and Steven Riffel of West Bend to fill the posts.

The 1987 Kewaskum Area United Way fund drive has reached \$29,557, which is 92.3% of its goal of \$32,000. Gerald Gosa, co-chairperson of the 1987 fund drive, said that while the drive did not attain its goal, the drive did collect \$2,230 or 8% more than collected in 1986.

Debbie Felix of Kewaskum, a senior 5-10 hitter, who has played some solid volleyball during her career in high school, was selected for first team honors on the Eastern Wisconsin All-Conference team. Kewaskum's Jenny Schuster, a three-year regular setter, received honorable mention in the voting. Serving and setting were Schuster's strong points.

Even though Kewaskum failed to win a game and finished last in the standings, the Indians did receive some honors when the Eastern Wisconsin All Conference football team was selected by the coaches last week. Kewaskum's Eric Pearson, a 6-0, 160 pound senior, earned a berth at linebacker on the second team. Robbi Hron also received honorable mention as offensive guard.

The Kewaskum Indians boys basketball team started off their 1987-88 season on a good note with a hard fought 56-45 victory over the Lomira Lions there on Tuesday night. The Indians, under new head coach, Dale Schatz, started out like a house on fire, hitting the boards and pushing the ball inside to the likes of Joel Fleury and David Harju, on route to a 12 to 4 first quarter advantage. Fleury, a 6-6 senior center, scored eight of his game-high 20 points in the first frame, and Harju, a six foot senior forward, asserted himself on the boards to help the Indians to the early lead. The victorious Indians were led by Fleury, who also had seven rebounds, and Rob

Baitinger, who had 11 points and three steals.

The Kewaskum girls varsity basketball team won their first game of the 1987-88 season against Slinger by a score of 54-40. There are four returning letter winners. They include: senior Debbie Felix, a 5'10" forward; senior Brenda Theusch, a 5'7" guard who was picked last year on the second team all-conference squad; junior Jenny Schneider, who is a 5'6" guard, and sophomore Pam Osterbrink, a 6'0" center.
