Phosphorus regulations has impact

The Village of Kewaskum finds itself in the same boat as its Milwaukee River Basin neighbors and will have to find a way to comply with phosphorus regulations when its permit expires in 2015.

Dave Arnott from Ruekert/Mielke gave a presentation about phosphorus regulation compliance alternatives to the village board for Kewaskum's Waste Water Treatment Plant Monday night.

The Village has had a pass on complying with regulations finalized in December 2010 because the municipality received its five-year Wisconsin Discharge Pollutant Elimination System (WPDES) permit shortly before the rule was implemented.

Arnott said there are three alternatives, which could be used singly or in combination - watershed based alternatives, adaptive management and plant upgrades.

The civil engineering firm has worked with other municipalities on the issue but because the permit comes with a compliance schedule that stretches another five to nine years into the future, there isn't a single alternative that has emerged as a key to compliance.

"The compliance strategies used depend on the nature of the watershed," said Arnott.



Phosphorus

The Milwaukee River North Watershed is located in portions of Sheboygan, Ozaukee and Washington counties.

Once the village applies for the permit, which includes studies and report submissions to the state Department of Natural Resources, they will have to comply with Total Maximum Daily Load Limits (TMDL,) which gauge the maximum amount of a pollutant a water body can receive and still meet water quality standards. The TMDL, required for all impaired water bodies by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency, establishes pollutant reductions needed from each source to meet water quality goals, according to information supplied by the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District Web site.

The MMSD is developing TMDLs as a third party on behalf of the DNR for the Menomonee, Kinnickinnic, and Milwaukee River Watersheds and the Milwaukee Harbor Estuary.

One alternative is upgrading the village wastewater utility, incorporating filters or a filtration process that would remove phosphorus from the water, which could have serious financial implications for the village and its residents, Arnott said.

Kewaskum completed a \$6.3-million water plant upgrade after a 2004 when a combination of construction and a rain event resulted in a discharge of raw sewage into the Milwaukee River.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann voiced disgust at the fact the Village was never made aware of the pending regulations when the plant was undergoing those upgrades.

Arnott said watershed based alternatives involve im-

plementing a program where the village would be able to buy or sell phosphorus credits.

Arnott said if municipalities upstream reduce their phosphorus below permitted levels, the village would be able to buy credits. If Kewaskum improves its system beyond compliance levels, they would be able to sell credits to other municipalities.

This system applies to point source pollution - where there is a specific area of discharge.

The DNR has another strategy - adaptive management - where a municipality can work with non point sources such as farm fields to implement practices that would reduce runoff. Those reductions could be achieved by using different amounts or types of fertilizer, crop rotation practices or using buffer strips that would filter sediment and phosphorus.

Washington County Board Supervisor for Kewaskum and local farmer Dan Stoffel addressed the trustees and stated he was a member of a steering committee of a group out of Milwaukee called Sweet Water who is working on the Water Quality Trading program. Through this program municipalities negotiate with farmers upstream to put best conservation practices in place.

Scheunemann asked if the municipality pays or the farmer pays for improvements. Stoffel explained there are cost sharing programs at the state and federal level.

In the coming weeks, The Statesman will be reporting on all the various programs and alternatives for the Village.

Escaped buffalo finds its way to Highway 41 in Wayne Saturday

TOWN OF WAYNE- Washington County Sheriff's deputies on Saturday found themselves dealing with a loose buffalo on US Highway 41.

At 1:13 p.m. the Sheriff's Office was notified of a loose buffalo running south onto the highway from State Highway 28.

When the first deputy arrived he located the buffalo running south in the west road right-of-way along a fence line near Mohawk Rd. The buffalo changed directions and began running north along the fence line. It changed directions a couple more times and ultimately continued running south along the fence line.

Another deputy arrived on scene and working with the first deputy they were able

to keep the buffalo along the west road right-of-way by driving along the shoulder so the animal didn't run into traffic. The buffalo continued south to Highway D where it ran up the west right-of-way alongside the exit ramp. It ran across both lanes of Highway D onto the west road right-of-way alongside the entrance ramp for Highway 41 southbound. The animal's owner authorized the Sheriff's Office to shoot the animal to stop it from running into traffic.

The first deputy was able to drive past the running buffalo and position his squad alongside a guardrail approximately one-half mile south of Highway D. He exited his squad and shot the running buffalo three times, putting it down.

The buffalo had escaped from a farm on Highway W in Fond du Lac County at approximately 11:00 a.m. It ran west into a wooded area near St. Kilian and couldn't be located until the Sheriff's Office received the initial report of the animal running loose. In total the buffalo ran approximately 7.5 miles before it was put down.

There were no injuries or property damage associated with this incident.

Fellow Citizens:

Gun control? How about some crime control?

A major part of our problem is the emotional, hand-wringing response of those mental midgets, so programmed against the weapon that they look right past the degenerate who misused it.

So, let's examine some of the facts being ignored by the "major media," and those groups blinded by their anti-gun biases.

1. Australia - "We must bring crime under control." Some conclusions: 1. We've seen no evidence that

stricter gun controls would have prevented any of the mass shootings and bombings in this country in the past 15 or 20 years. 2. Is the current mentality, related to gun ownership any different than that used in the Salem Witch Trials? 3. Our experience with alcohol prohibition should give us an unmistakable clue about "reducing crime." 4. Common sense, alone, should direct our attention, not to the gun but to the mental deviate who misuses it...nothing is more inviting to this creep than a sign... "Gun Free Area."

Ben Franklin probably said it best, "Those who can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety, deserve neither liberty or safety."

LeMahieu leading charge on regulatory review

MADISON- Rep. Dan LeMahieu and a group of Republicans are out to change state government one rule at a time.

On Monday, Assembly Republicans launched a website, <http://righttherules.legis.wisconsin.gov>, which will track the regulatory review process and give the public a means to share opinions on specific rules and regulations.

LeMahieu, co-chair of the Joint Committee for Review of Administrative Rules, supports Gov. Scott Walker's position for regulatory reform.

"I plan to work to eliminate rules that are inoperative, don't protect the citizens of Wisconsin and fix the rules that are interfering with Wisconsin's ability to move forward," said LeMahieu in a press release.

Speaker Robin Vos said the 11,000-plus pages of administrative code regulate everything from the size of holes

in baby Swiss cheese to the way pillowcases are packaged. Wisconsin Assembly Republicans will officially begin a comprehensive review of 11,000-plus pages of the state's administrative code next week with a goal to eliminate regulations that restrict job growth and aren't essential to public or environmental protection.

Vos believes it to be the first such regulatory review in Wisconsin's history.

"These regulations are put in place by agency officials or bureaucrats in order to provide specific instructions on how a law should be carried out. These rules have a major impact on our daily lives, our homes and businesses. Frequently, these regulations drive up the cost of doing business and that cost gets passed on to you," Vos said.

The review committee consists of LeMahieu, Republican co-chair Dean Kaufert, Rep. Tyler August and Democrat representatives Gary Hebl and Robb Kahl.







The Kewaskum Village Board Monday night set the 1987 tax rate and it reflected some confusing numbers. While the village's gross rate dropped 4.9%, or \$1.34 from \$27.42 in 1986, to \$26.08 in 1987, the net rate after the state tax credit, increased 1.95%, or 45c, from \$23.05 in 1986 to %23.50 in 1987. Village Administrator explained that the gross rate decrease was the result of taxes levied by the Kewaskum School District dropping considerably. He noted however, that while the school district will realize a substantial increase of 19.9% or \$122,566 in state aids for 1988, that increase will affect property owners because the state tax credit will be proportionately reduced to offset that increase. He said other taxing agencies have also increased their rates.

"I would say Cody Muckerheide's match was the match of the night," Kewaskum coach Dennis Aupperle said after-


ward. "For him to step in and pin that kid (Sandoval). That was huge!"
