Wisconsin Tourism Secretary Stephanie Klett stopped in at Sunburst Ski Area to take in a few runs in the board park Friday morning.

Before shooting down the run, Klett met with ski industry leaders and Sunburst's new owners Jen and Robert Friedl, who purchased the resort last month.

President of the Wisconsin Ski Industry Association and former Sunburst owner Jim Engel said Klett was invited to Sunburst to get a feel for the emerging tubing industry in the state. Sunburst created its tubing park in 1997 and now has 20 lanes and three lifts.

"As family recreation, tubing has

grown into an industry," said Engel, adding that another six or eight ski areas around the state have added tubing runs to their offerings.

Klett said tubing is also a stress-releasing, affordable family activity.

Although she confessed to have been away from tubing for the past 30 years and promised she would scream all the way down, Klett appeared to be having fun on the slopes.

After her second run, she hooted, saying, "I was going about 40 mph on the last run."

Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce Tourism Director Gino Giudice, Washington County Convention and Visitors Bureau Executive Director Elaine Motl, Julia Hertel, executive director of the Wisconsin

Convention and Visitors Bureau and Chet Gerlach, vice president of the Association of Wisconsin Tourism Attractions and a lobbyist for the Ski Association were among those that welcomed Klett to Sunburst.

Giudice presented Klett with a box of famous Kewaskum sausage.

"We wanted to give her something she could remember us by, I hope we left a good taste in her mouth," smiled Giudice.

Crash kills T. Wayne woman

A 37-year-old town of Wayne woman was killed early Tuesday evening in a single-vehicle crash. She is Washington County's third fatality of 2013.

Washington County Sheriff's deputies responded to the crash on Lake Bernice Drive near Western Lane at approximately 4:29 p.m. Personnel from the Kewaskum and Kohlsville Fire Departments were subsequently dispatched to the scene.

The first arriving Deputy located the vehicle overturned in the east shoulder. The vehicle had struck a nearby electrical pole and was severely damaged. There was no verbal or physical response from within the vehicle. Several downed power lines were observed lying on the vehicle, and WE Energies was immediately summoned to the scene to ensure the wires were de-energized.

After contact could be safely made by rescue personnel, the sole occupant and operator of the vehicle was found to be deceased.

A preliminary investigation into the cause of the accident suggests that the vehicle had been northbound on Lake Bernice Drive, when for an unknown reason; it left the road to the east, collided with a utility pole, and subsequently overturned.

Lake Bernice Drive between Western Lane and STH 28 was closed for over 5.5 hours to facilitate rescue and clean-up efforts. An officer from the Kewaskum Police Department also assisted at the scene with traffic control.

At this time the accident remains under investigation by the Sheriff's Accident Reconstruction Unit, and the victim's name is being temporarily withheld pending notification of family.

Last week Steve Chantelois wrote concerning gun control. He listed three points as to why guns are not the cause of gun deaths. He stated that people are "blinded by their anti-gun biases." I would not consider myself anti-gun (I myself am a hunter), but rather anti-death. He goes on to say that the media ignores the facts about guns. Well, I believe that Mr. Chantelois is ignoring the facts.

He begins by giving Australia as an example country where guns are illegal. He states that since guns were made illegal, assaults increased by 35%. What he fails to mention is that there have been less than 40 gun homicides in each of the last nine years, even as low as 15 in 2004 and 2005. I would rather have assaults than actual deaths wouldn't you? He then says that if people had guns they might not have been assaulted. Just because you own a gun does not mean you are physically and mentally prepared to kill or harm someone.

In his second point he brings up England, saying they have had over 40,000 firearm offenses. Well obviously, since guns are illegal there. He fails to mention a second fact. England had less than 60 gun deaths last year. Compare this to the United States' 10,700. Do you see the difference?

He also mentioned knife attacks, but he does not say how many deaths by knife. There have been slightly over 300 deaths. This is still less than the deaths caused by guns before they were illegal. Rescue Squad to advance service to patients

The Kewaskum Fire Department's Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) want to take their care a step further.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel and EMT Amanda Murphy last week addressed Trustees at the Village Board meeting and received a consensus to move ahead with advancing their EMT Intermediate Technician level.

Currently EMTs in the department are at the basic level, intermediate is the next level. By stepping up to the intermediate level EMTs could administer an IV along with the various IV fluids and several drugs such as nitroglycerine, Narcan and 50% Dextrose in a pre-hospital setting.

Currently, if a patient requires care above what Kewaskum EMTs can offer, a paramedic intercept from West Bend is dispatched to the patient's location. Kewaskum Rescue Squad is then billed for West Bend's service and it is passed on to the patient.

Once Kewaskum begins offering the next level of service, they would be able to bill patients for the higher level of service if it's required.

Chief Groeschel explained the Department has evaluated the prospect over the last two years. To become certified, each EMT would need 100 hours of schooling over what is required for an EMT Basic. The schooling is broken up as 60 hours in the classroom and 40 hours of hands on experience in a hospital emergency room.

The EMT would then be required to pass a written and practical exam.

Trustee Dick Knoebel asked if the EMTs were willing

to go through the additional training.

"All but one in a show of hands. All you need is one intermediate EMT and one basic EMT to run at the higher level," Chief Groeschel replied.

Kewaskum Fire Department's Rescue Squad service is paid for by the patients of the ambulance service so there will be no cost to taxpayers. Insurance costs, paid by the Rescue Squad would also remain the same.

The Fire Department's ambulance budget will cover the cost of the training for those EMTs wishing to advance their skill set. Start-up costs (equipment and drugs)

would also be absorbed by the Rescue Squad.

Murphy, a paramedic for last three years, stated the program will pay for itself in two years if they do nothing but start IVs for patients.

"To go ahead, we need buy-in from the village," Chief Groeschel reported. He went on to explain statutory requirements require the village to pass a resolution in support of advancing to the EMT-Intermediate Technician status for the ambulance service.

The Village Board is expected to take action on that resolution at the meeting, Monday, February 4 at 7 p.m.

deaths can be traced to the Cartel. The police and local governments are so corrupt (often bribed by the Cartel) that the gun laws are not even enforced. So in reality there are no gun laws. Colombia and Mexico are horrible examples.

In the second part of his third point he talks about Switzerland. It is an exception to the normal because of how unique its gun laws are. No, they do not have strict gun control, but they do have strict gun regulations as far as purchases. They are also unique in that every male between 20 and 30 must serve in the military. They are provided with their guns and are trained to use them because they do not have an active militia (the exact reason our 2nd Amendment was made). We've learned from history that Switzerland and its people are very peaceful.

Finally, some conclusions: Japan, the UK, Australia, Canada, Israel, and Germany all have strict gun control laws. All had less than 60, with most less than 40, gun deaths last year. Once again compare this to United States' 10,700 gun deaths. There is a direct correlation!

Gun control laws are not the full answer however. We need stricter regulation and a reorganization, especially in the ATF (Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms) Agency. The ATF has only 2,500 members, the same number they had in 1972. The

head of the ATF also has two full time jobs. How can we expect his full attention to the ATF?

Another key thing that hinders the ATF is an act passed by Congressional Republicans, specifically Jim Sensenbrenner and Todd Tiahrt of Kansas. The Tiahrt act was jammed into a completely unrelated bill. It prohibited the ATF from tracing back deals in the Federal Registry of Gun Transactions in order to find corrupt dealers. It also prohibited the ATF from inspecting gun dealers' inventories. Gun dealers are also not required to keep track of inventory and transactions. This act was reviewed and approved by none other than the NRA. It makes one wonder what their real intentions are?

Lastly, he continuously brings up the mental state of the killers. First of all mental health is not even a factor in most gun homicides. It only seems like a major reason because of mass shootings. Yes, these mass shootings may not have happened if the shooter received mental care, the same free mental care provided by the new healthcare. But it seems the same people fighting against gun control are also against Obamacare.

In order to fix our gun problem we need to fix the laws and regulations governing guns, as well as the organization that's suppose to be controlling them.

There are five male roles. Patrick O'Reilly is a singer who is rather suspicious and mysterious. His character is 30 years or older and uses Irish, German and New York dialects. Ken De La Maize is

an archetypal older director, bombastic and egotistical. Eddie McCuen is an out-of-work comedian who unwittingly becomes the romantic lead. He is very charming and likeable in his mid-20s to mid-30s. Roger Hopewell is a mid-30s and up, composer who is quick-witted and highly-strung. Finally a murder mystery is not complete without a tough, no-nonsense undercover cop, Michael Kelly.

The other four roles are female. The first character being, Elsa Von Grossenknueten, the eccentric and wealthy owner of the mansion. Nikki Crandall is a chorus girl but she is smarter than she looks. Marjorie Baverstock is a mid-40s and up, Broadway producer. She is full of theatrical gestures and language. Lastly there is Bernice Roth a perpetually intoxicated lyricist. She is Roger's musical partner and foil.

The director for this production is Bruce G. Bradley. He is originally from Wales but has made a home in Wisconsin.

Those auditioning should come prepared to perform a one-minute monologue, preferably comedic. This may be from a published or an original piece. Because the show has characters with different

dialects, the director may ask people to demonstrate their dialect capability.

While this is not a musical, this show has some characters that are very theatrical and sing randomly in the show, so people will be asked to sing a few bars of a favorite song, unaccompanied. The director will also be working with those auditioning, doing some short improvisations and having them read from the script.

KES students send Sandy relief

Third graders at Kewaskum Elementary School learned first hand about a national event while helping victims involved in the event at the same time.

After returning from Christmas vacation they finished a project to help the victims of Super Storm Sandy, which devastated the east coast on October 29, 2012, leaving many homeless, by sending pajamas and books for children.

"I had heard about (the organization) Pajama Day before," Mrs. Deb Hubbard, one of three third grade teachers, said. "After discussing the storm and its effects in class, we decided this would make a good community service project and told the kids. I went online and worked directly with the national group to send relief specifically to New York."

The students normally do a gift exchange in the classroom. The Pajama Day project, which includes books as well as new sets of pajamas, took the place of a gift exchange amongst each other. "The kids were excited when we told them," Hubbard said. "We had no complaints."

All three classes met together in the Large Group Instruction area on the first morning after vacation to share their donations. One of Hubbard's

students, Courtney Duern, said she picked out a pair of pajamas to send. "I hope (the recipients) will feel pretty good," she said when asked about sharing with those in need.

Holden Serwe picked out an activity book and a Christmas book to send. "We're helping the people," he said. "They lost everything."

Isaac Schmidt from Mrs. Kim Gutjahr's class shared that his mom picked out things to send to a girl. Sierra Heipp from Mr. Mick McClone's class said that she picked out pajamas for a girl, and four books.

All the classes were eager to share with the storm victims, they told the adults in the room. One student heard about the storms over the Internet, and another from television news even before their teachers talked about it in class. How would they feel if that happened here? "Awful!" was their collective reply.

And how do they feel about sharing with those in need instead of each other? "Good!"

The third graders collected forty-two pairs of new pajamas and forty-one new books. Hubbard's next step is to report to the program coordinator who will direct her regarding shipping. Costs are expected to be covered by teacher donations or possible help from other

concerned funding sources.

The Pajama Program (www.pajamaprogram.org) was founded in 2001 in New York City, New York by Genevieve Piturro, a former businesswoman and volunteer with other non-profits. It is a not-for-profit organization directly benefiting and serving the underprivileged and those youngsters living under difficult circumstances. Since its inception, the Pajama Program has grown to include a literacy program and has chapters throughout the United States, including Milwaukee. Over two million pairs of new pajamas and books have been given away so far. The organization is run by a board of directors as well as an advisory board with such luminaries as New York congresswoman Nydia Velasquez, singer Patti LaBelle, and Ivana Trump.

Although the Kewaskum teachers wanted to directly support victims of Hurricane Sandy in New York, if they decide to do a service project with the Pajama Program again, Hubbard said they might work with the local Wisconsin chapter. Individuals are also welcome to donate through online giving at the Pajama Day web site.

This week: In our Schools

The Kewaskum Elementary theme, Learning is an Adventure, is echoed daily in first grade. The students are introduced to many powerful learning tools that will guide them through their education.

In first grade, the adventure begins as they learn about the animal kingdom. Students are learning about the different animal groups (reptiles, amphibians, fish, birds, insects, and mammals). The skills reinforced include categorizing, comparing, and contrasting the different characteristics of these six animal groups.

The first grade team of teachers, which includes Mrs. Drost, Mrs. Holstead, and Mrs. Kasten, cannot emphasize enough the importance of the home-school connection where the "Adventure in Learning" continues. As part of project-based learning, the first grade students research animal habitats, take the information they learned home, and create a diorama of the habitat of their chosen animal with their families. Families know and understand how the students are assessed, as a rubric for the project is sent home with each child. As a parent, knowing what the expectations are, make the project much easier to complete.

The first graders have many opportunities to utilize technology in their learning adventures. The students are "Math Magicians!" With this computer program, students

go beyond paper and pencil learning to progress at their own pace as they master addition and subtraction facts. Technology is also utilized by listening to stories on a variety of audio devices. This allows the students to practice what they have just learned in the classroom at their own learning pace. It builds comprehension and word identification skills, which are so critical to their learning adventure and success.

Monthly visits from Lac Lawrann Nature Conservancy add to the adventure of first grade science curriculum with hands-on learning about the different Wisconsin animals and habitats. Did you know the groundhog has three names? They can be called groundhogs, woodchucks and whistle pigs. They also have a plunge hole and a bathroom.

The learning adventures continue with character development. Jody Heipp, KES Principal, is proud of how the KES first graders, as well as the other students, have responded to the S.M.A.R.T. (Students Making A Responsible/Respectful Team) positive behavior intervention program. "It truly has become a significant part of our learning community. By their actions, students are proving learning can be an adventure and that good behavior is rewarding," she explained.

Each week for the rest of the school year Kewaskum Principals will share what is happening in the classrooms of their buildings.

2013-2014 Public School Open Enrollment

Open enrollment applications for the 2013-2014 school year can be submitted to Wisconsin public schools during the period of February 4, 2013 to April 30, 2013 (4:00 p.m. deadline). Wisconsin's public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend public school in a school district other than the one in which they live.

Under the full-time public school open enrollment program, parents must apply during the application period to the school district they wish their children to attend. Early and late applications are not accepted. The forms are due in the nonresident school district no later than 4:00 p.m. on April 30; a postmark will not meet the requirement. Hand-delivery of application forms to the nonresident school district is strongly recommended.

Any students attending a nonresident school district under a "Tuition Waiver Due to a Move" must apply for open enrollment in order to attend the nonresident district in the 2013-2014 school year.

Parents may submit applications to no more than three nonresident school districts for each child during the open enrollment application period. Submitting more than three applications to nonresident school districts will result in all applications being invalidated.

Parents may request enrollment in a specific school or program in the nonresident school district; however, enrollment in the requested school or program is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed.

Forms must be filled out completely and accurately. An inaccurate or incomplete form may result in denial of an application. Parents will be informed by June 7, 2013 whether their open enrollment applications have been approved or denied.

Transportation is the responsibility of the parent. However, some school districts may elect to provide partial transportation. Parents with questions about transportation should call both resident and nonresident school district offices to find out if any transportation will be provided. Reimbursement of some transportation costs is available for low-income parents whose children are eligible for free or reduced-price lunches under the federal school lunch program.

Students attending the Kewaskum School District under open enrollment must reapply the February before entering grade 6.

Parents may apply for their children to attend 4-year-old kindergarten under open enrollment only if the resident school district also offers a 4-year-old kindergarten program for which the child is eligible.

Open enrollment application forms may be obtained from any public school district, from the Department of Public Instruction, or from the DPI's open enrollment Web site. 
Together they started a family and Romilda enjoyed many happy years raising their children, traveling and spending time at their cabin up north. Romilda's grandchildren were the love of her life.

Strong finish earns Indians 2nd in EWC duals

After being beaten decisively by Two Rivers in the opening meet of the season, first place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference was pretty well out of the question for Kewaskum's wrestling team, but the Indians never lost sight of taking second.

Running off six victories in a row, including a 39-30 decision over Sheboygan Falls last Friday night, Kewaskum ended with a 6-1 EWC record to earn the runner-up spot. Falls was third at 5-2.

"A good dual," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said, rattling off the names of his winners, especially Nick Bier and Logan Dreher, who scored confidence-building wins, and two of his captains, Brett Scoles and Austin Goeden, who are building momentum for the upcoming tournament season.

In the headliner match at 160 pounds, Scoles (27-2), currently ranked No. 3 among Division 2 wrestlers, drew Mitchell Lambrecht, an honorable mention pick.

Neither man scored in the first period. Lambrecht appeared to be in position to earn points when he applied

a cradle on Scoles early in the second, but the two went off the mat before any points were awarded. Lambrecht stayed in control until late in the period when Scoles stood on his much-taller opponent, turned into him and took him to the mat for a reversal.

With three seconds remaining, Lambrecht exploded off the whistle to earn an escape, putting the second at 2-1, but Scoles applied a tilt for a 2-point nearfall in the third for a 4-1 win.

"He's (Lambrecht) tough. He's got a different style and he's so tall and long," Aupperle said, indicating Scoles did well to overcome these challenges.

Goeden improved to 24-7 with a 6-1 decision over a spunky Sean Mattek. Mattek's escape late in the first period was the first point Goeden has given up since Dec. 29 in the On the Waters Classic.

Those getting pins for KHS were Bier at 120, Joey Seitz at 145, Max "the birthday boy" Maertz at 152 and Garrett Burth, who iced the match with his 10-second pin at 285. Kewaskum also picked up a forfeit at 106.

"They have a couple guys out," Aupperle said, including

Brandon Broetzman ranked No. 7 at 152 pounds.

Aupperle was pleased with the effort turned in by freshman Ben Watzig at 195, who lost just 1-0 after just recently coming out for the sport. "He's got a lot of potential."

Scoles and Goeden will both take perfect 7-0 records into the EWC Tournament this Saturday, while Dreher is 6-1; Maertz 4-1, Bier, 5-2; Butch, 4-2; Grady, 4-2; Cole Schiebel, 4-2; Zach Heberer, 3-2; Ted Wollner, 3-3; and Andy Pryor, 3-3.
