Called back: Boehlke will try to survive Caramoan

Being on a reality show was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for Andrea Boehlke.

Until CBS called again.

The fifth-place "Survivor" contestant from a couple of years ago returned to living in a jungle setting in a fans versus favorites format. The first show from the new season in Caramoan airs Feb. 13 at 7 p.m. on CBS.

"I actually did have a great time the first time I played. It's one of those things that's really hard to pass up. It's this crazy experience you never get to do again," Boehlke said. "So when CBS asked me, I had to take it."

The town of Farmington native and Random Lake graduate couldn't reveal much about the show given it hasn't aired yet, but said she felt much more prepared having gone through it once.

"I felt a lot more prepared and I trained a lot more. The funny thing is I ate more ... the first one is oh my gosh, I'm going to be in a swimsuit and look good," she said.


This time, the hard-working girl raised on a farm now living in New York wasn't in awe.

"The first time you play 'Survivor' it's so hard to take it all in," she said. "I was more concerned about eating, how to make a fire, wow I'm on an island ... The second time you go you know about chopping coconuts, you know how to make a fire. I felt more calm and since I already had done it I knew what to expect."

This is the second "Survivor" format of fans versus favorites. Ten huge fans of the show face off against 10 veterans who have been on the show once.

Boehlke said it's those who "should know what they're doing and fans who think they know what they're doing."

Boehlke's family, already big "Survivor" fans before she appeared

"My family was ecstatic. Right away my mom said you need to come home and start training," she said.

Every day, her parents remind Boehlke's youngest sister how many days until the first show.

Boehlke is joined by two cast

mates from her season, Phillip and Francesca. Phillip got second place on the show while Francesca was first to be voted off the island. Boehlke remembers Phillip running around the island in pink underwear the first time.

Since "Survivor," Boehlke moved to New York and is now working as an entertainment host for a website

Reichert will retire from district

The Kewaskum Board of Education has accepted the retirement of Business Manager Paul Reichert. This after reconsidering action of potentially not renewing his next two-year contract.

The board began their meeting last week by reconsidering action taken in closed session on January 14 of issuing a preliminary notice of non-renewal to Reichert.

Reichert then asked to be allowed to retire from the district instead of not having his contract renewed. Board members unanimously voted in favor of allowing him to retire and later in the meeting accepted his retirement.

Based upon Reichert's 14 years of service, he was entitled to four years of insurance after his retirement, through a memorandum of agreement, Smasal explained.

The district provided an extra year of insurance at a cost of \$16,000 per year because he was partially through his 14th year. He is responsible for his portion of the premium however. The district will also provide a letter of reference.

Reichert's current contract expires June 30, 2013. According to District Administrator Jim Smasal, his last day with the district will be June 28.

The Kewaskum Board of Education will discuss the purchase of a house next to the Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA) at their meeting Monday evening. If approved, the purchase would need to be approved by the electorate in a special meeting.

Superintendent of School Jim Smasal told the board late in January the land is in close proximity to the KCA and might be a good location for offices in the future.

"We threw out an offer and

A Project for Regulatory Reform: Right the Rules

As this session started, Governor Walker, along with the leadership in the State Assembly has stated many times that Regulatory Reform was going to be a priority this session. This week I got the chance to tour the state to introduce a project for reforming the Wisconsin Administrative Code, called Right the Rules. Visiting Wausau, Green Bay and ending in Madison, I explained a comprehensive review process the Assembly will be undertaking, as well as emphasizing the importance of public input.

If you are a small business person, work in local government, manufacturing or just an individual resident of Wisconsin you are affected by these 11,764 pages of rules. Every person in Wisconsin has to deal with these 1,768 chapters of rules on a daily basis. One woman in Green Bay asked me if the code could be re-written in English, she explained that she sometimes has a hard time understanding what she's supposed to be following because the code is so complex. Her feelings are shared by many people I've talked to over the last several weeks. The labyrinth like Code is made up of rules written by state agencies that are used to enforce laws passed by the Legislature. For example, when you walk into the grocery store and look at the different types of cheese, the Administrative Code regulates the size of holes in Swiss cheese, how it should look and taste, to how it is sliced, grated, and packaged.

During my visits in Wausau and Green Bay, business owners in the area commented on how regulations affected their day to day business. Their com-

ments were similar to those issued in a report issued by the Wisconsin Small Business Regulatory Review Board. In a survey sent out to thousands of Wisconsin businesses, the report says that 41% of responders believe state regulations hinder hiring or expansion, and 72% say that complying with such regulations costs more than the benefits they produce.

Right the Rules is a project tasking the Assembly Standing Committees to review every single chapter in the administrative code. I'm looking forward to leading Right the Rules as a comprehensive review of the Administrative Code because some rules make it harder to do business because they are out of date, duplicate federal rules, require people to fill out unnecessary paperwork, delay projects, or add extreme costs to everyday tasks, whether it's construction, manufacturing or agriculture. The Administrative Code in Wisconsin has been created over many years, and has never, in state history, been looked at in this capacity.

The most important thing I want you to know about this project is that your input matters. A main part of the Right the Rules launch includes a website that has information on how the project works, notices for public hearings, links on where to find the Administrative Code, and most importantly, a place for your input. The website can be found at: <http://righttherules.legis.wisconsin.gov> or you can email your thoughts and concerns to righttherules@legis.wi.gov.

We want to hear from you, how you are affected by these rules, and where you are having problems. This website gives you the ability to put in writing your specific concerns and

e-mail those concerns to my office and we will pass those concerns on to the committee dealing with that rule. Our goal is to make the Administrative Code something that you aren't afraid of, something that doesn't threaten or overly burden your businesses, but something that's workable and will make Wisconsin a place to do business, create jobs, and expand your business.



This Week In our Schools

Kewaskum Middle School

Kewaskum Middle School Technology and Engineering classes have gone through a major revamping. The curriculum has also gone through some updating.

This past summer Brett Zimdars was hired as the new Technology and Engineering teacher and brought along many new ideas. Zimdars spent the past two years teaching Technology and Engineering in the Oak Creek - Franklin School District. He taught six through eighth graders traditional "shop" class skills along with engineering skills with the aid of Project Lead the Way (PLTW) curriculum.

After being hired at KMS, much to his liking, administrators and teachers asked Zimdars to come up with what he thought would be the best curriculum to lead students into the high school Tech Ed department. Being a graduate of KHS, he came in with an understanding of what the high school offers.

What he developed is a good mix of curriculum that gets students at the middle school level exposed to lot of information in multiple areas. From his time in Oak Creek, Zimdars feels that what KMS has to offer its students is one of best curriculum packages at the middle school level.

"I feel the opportunities students have here are great. Not all middle schools have what we have. I feel it is very important at this level to get students thinking and looking at things from a different perspective. I like to see the kids challenge themselves and learn, even when they make mistakes," Zimdars said.

In the past few years there has been a big push by industry to get the female population exposed to engineering. It has been proven that females look at things differently than the male population and more companies are looking for fe-

male engineers. Having the middle school classes gets every student a taste of what engineering is all about.

Zimdars explained it as, "At the middle school, I see it as every student will dip their feet into the technology and engineering water and test it out. Many go in further than just their feet. Then the high school will take them to the next level."

Currently only sixth and eighth graders get an actual class designated to them. Seventh graders get the opportunity to explore what the Technology and Engineering area holds in Extended Learning Time (ELT).

In sixth grade students explore the six simple machines that man uses in hands-on activities. Students calculate and physically experience the Mechanical Advantage each machine gives them. Then students use their knowledge to build what is called a Rube Goldberg machine. Rube Goldberg is a device that is made up of simple machines that completes a simple task. Zimdars uses YouTube videos to provide examples to his students.

"I always show the clip from the movie, The Goonies where they use a rube to open the gate for Chunk, kids love that one. I also show them a few from Pee Wee Herman. I like these because the kids have never seen them. The internet is full of examples," says Zimdars.

Students have made devices that have turned the lights off in the classroom, opened a door on a dollhouse, popped a balloon and dropped a Mentos into a bottle of Coke.

"I have asked students to write some of the things they have learned from making the rube machine on the board. It is just amazing to see what they write down. My last groups put things on the board like teamwork, problem solving, trial and error, hard, leadership, safety, engineering, layout, planning,

designing, measuring, adjustments and many more things," Zimdars boasted.


After building the rube machines sixth graders move on to their CO2 car unit. Within that unit students go over Newton's Laws and how they affect their lives and how they will affect their CO2 cars. Then students get introduced to sketching in the design of the car. After they have their car designed they build the car using equipment and then we race them. The last unit that sixth graders cover is flight. In this unit students gain the understanding of how flight happens and then construct a kite, hot air balloon and a water bottle rocket. About 150 students take this class yearly.

In eighth grade every student who is not in both band and choir takes eighth grade Technology and Engineering. In this class students start out by understanding Engineering and Technology. They explore different types of engineers. Then move on to the design process or problem solving process. Within that part of the class students make an egg drop device and a golf ball tower with limited supplies.

Students are then taught how to read and draw both isometric and orthographic drawings. Along with knowing how to read these drawings they also learn about dimensions. Then the students move into 3-D design for production. This is where the students get exposed to computer software commonly known as CAD.

At the middle school, students are currently using Google Sketch Up. They are shown the basic functions of the software and actual design and assemble the project that they will build on the computer. Once the students leave the computer lab they enter the woods shop.

In the shop, safety and general knowledge about wood is covered and each student constructs the project that they

designed on the computer. Currently this class is building a step stool that has a drawer in it that can help you reach those hard to reach things in your kitchen, bedroom, and bathroom or really anywhere that extra height is needed. The project is on display in the middle school office. About 150 students take this class yearly.

Zimdars pointed out that next year the high school will be running a Women in Engineering class for females only. "This is a great idea that the department has come up with and will provide a great opportunity for our girls here in Kewaskum." For more information on that please contact Pat Moerchen at the KHS.

Zimdars also has an eighth grade elective Exploratory class where students get to explore the woodworking side of things in more detail. About 60 students in this class students make an end table.

Students are introduced to how the machines work on a more advanced level than the eighth grade class that all students take. As in all of classes offered measurement and accuracy are essential, including this class. Students also figure out how much the table would cost them to build at home.

ELT is a time when students are with Zimdars to extend their skills further within Technology and Engineering. Students have built cabinets for the band and choir teachers to store their students' music. At the beginning of the year the ELT time was used to build new storage cabinets by reusing lumber that at one time made another room within the room.

"Reusing the lumber was great, we built all the storage in my classroom and made it bigger for free!" Zimdars explained.

Currently in ELT students are working on individual projects like, end tables or coffee tables. Students have even made a hamster cage. If students are not making their own project they are building Bean Bag Toss Boards that are sold. The mon-

ey raised will be used to buy new equipment or for the computer room.

A new idea that Zimdars' ELT has come up with is to build bird feeders and bird houses as a fundraiser. Watch for an ad in The Statesman in weeks to come for more information.

The room that Zimdars teaches in has gone through a lot of rearranging. Julie Skelton KMS principal stated, "When Brett was hired I was nervous as to what he would say about the room. When we went in there all he said was 'I can make this work, I just have a lot to do.' Now you walk in his room and you would never believe it was the same room, everything is organized and ready for the kids to use."

There is even a room ready for computers as mentioned. "My first big goal is to get computers in my room. Mrs. Skelton and I have applied for a grant to try and get some funding for that and we are still waiting to hear more information. Everyday I feel like a kid at Christmas checking my email to see if we got it," Zimdars remarked.

The grant money would utilized to get the room wired both electrically and data. The grant would also put countertops, carpet, a fresh coat of paint and air conditioning updates to the room. The grant from Lowe's required a parent group and volunteers on board to help do all the work as well as local companies.

"So far I have a number of parents that will volunteer, Chucker Dreher of Dreher Construction found the grant and right away said he would help. Premier Electric and L.K. Heating and Cooling are also stepping up to donate their time," Zimdars said.



Kewaskum dropped the next three weight classes at 145, 155 and 167 giving New Holstein 12 more team points. Ron Leinen received a forfeit for Kewaskum at 185, setting the score at 30-27, Indians' favor. It was up to the heavyweights to determine the team victory for the night. The long lived rivalry of Jim Tikalsky and Dennis Aupperle once again took place and for the fourth time in the last two years, Aupperle came up the winner, leading 9-1 before pinning Tikalsky in 5:10. Final score was 36-27, Kewaskum.

75 Years Ago

December 31, 1937

I'd love to get back into it, but to be honest, I really have no idea what the equipment is worth. The woman is selling all her equipment and spare glass for \$300. It seems like a reasonable price, but how can I tell? I certainly hate to pass up a good deal. How do you know what is a good price when you really have no idea what things are worth?

Cash: Before you start up your stained glass hobby again, you may want to invest in some first aid equipment. Considering your past experiences, it seems like it might come in handy.

Carry: Although you may not know the value of all the equipment for sale, you are on the right track. The start up cost for many hobbies can be expensive if you try buying everything new. Sometimes finding a person like this, who is selling their whole collection, is the best way to begin at a reasonable price.



Nine Kewaskum wrestlers placed among the top four of their respective weight classes, still the Indians fell short in their bid to finish second in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament held in Kewaskum last Saturday.

Two Rivers ran away with the team title, amassing 221.5 points with six champions and three second places. Sheboygan Falls surged into second (148 points) with a good showing in the finals. The Indians were third with 138, followed by Campbellsport and Kiel, tied with 103 apiece.

Two Rivers also won the dual meet title, going 7-0 in EWC completion, while Kewaskum was second at 6-1.

The Indians came away

without a single champion, something that has not happened in at least nine years.

"The first round started off well, and the next one not so well," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said afterward, "and in the finals, we ended up 0x4."

"Two Rivers has got a nice team," Aupperle said, complimenting the Raiders for successfully defending their title.

Seniors Brett Scoles and Logan Dreher, along with juniors Joey Seitz and Max Maertz, all advanced to the finals.

The toughest loss was the one suffered by Scoles (29-3), who had beaten Mitchell Lambrecht of Sheboygan Falls a week ago 4-1 but lost to him in Saturday's rematch 3-1.

"Brett had been rolling along... A lot of guys have been rolling along," Aupperle said. "I think his second and third peri-

In the second period, Lambrecht decided to let Scoles go with 1:08 remaining and used several defensive maneuvers to fend off Scoles' takedown attempts.

Scoles got in on two single leg tries in the third period. Once Lambrecht used a "Wizzer" to counter and the other move was thwarted when the official called a questionable stalemate.

Scoles, who is ranked No. 3 in Division 2, was seeking his third EWC crown after winning at 125 and 145, respectively, his sophomore and junior seasons.

Dreher (15-9) breezed to the finals, with a bye and a pin in 3:16 over J.J. Siefert of Plymouth. Then he drew the tough task of trying to keep Campbellsport's Ryan Costello, who recently dropped from 132 to 126 pounds, from winning a fourth EWC crown.

Dreher was aggressive off the whistle, shooting in for a single leg drop and picked Costello off the mat. When they came down, however, Costello had somehow applied his vaunted "cow catcher" move and pinned Dreher in 17 seconds.

"He's in with a beautiful single, and bingo, 17 seconds it's over," Aupperle said, but, "He (Dreher) was in good spirits afterward."

Seitz (21-14), after opening with a pin in 3:41 over Charles Menke, avenged a loss to Waupun's Kevin Messer but could not come up with the second against Jay Wallace of Kiel in the finals, losing 11-12.

Aupperle praised Seitz for the way he changed strategies to beat Messer. "That was a good match," he said, after watching his man use an escape and three takedowns in the second period for a 6-1 lead. The final takedown came with two seconds left in the period, helping Seitz to a 6-5 victory.

Maertz (11-6) fell to Brandon Broetzmann 7-2 in a match that was tied 2-2 at the second of the second period.

To reach the finals, Maertz also avenged an earlier loss to Plymouth Jakob Ohman, beating him 5-3 in the semis.

In the dual meet, Ohman

won 8-7. "He got down 8-0 (in the first meeting)," Aupperle said. "(This time) he got the first takedown and kept himself in good position."

Taking thirds were Zach Heberer at 106, Nick Bier at 120, Austin Goeden at 138, Ted Wollner at 182 and Garrett Buth at 285.

Heberer (15-11) turned in a gutsy performance in the battle for third, pinning Eric Luna of New Holstein in 2:43 after suffering from the effects of the flu.

Bier (16-9) battled Nick Stahl to the wire, losing 5-3 in the semis before winning 13-9 to gain third.

Goeden (26-8), attempting to win a second EWC title, lost a heart-breaking 2-1 decision to Chandler Donati of Two Rivers in the semis. Donati, then eventual champion, got his winning points with two seconds to go in the match.

Wollner (15-12) placed in the top four for the first time pinning in the first match, losing by quick pin to Waupun's Brady Huenink in the second and then pinning Kyle McCarty of SF in the finale.

Buth (14-9) received a bye, was pinned by the eventual winner in the semis and finished the day with a win by pin in :41 over Tyler Testroete of SF to take third.

Aupperle said while some athletes experienced disappointment, they must put it behind them and "head for new seasons. It's pretty much a new season."

Kewaskum is hosting a Division 2 regional (starting at 10 a.m.) involving teams from Grafton, Wisconsin Lutheran, Plymouth, Milwaukee Lutheran and Pewaukee.

Gonring taking aim on a career in golf

When Tony Gonring was ready to graduate from Kewaskum High School last spring, one might have thought his next step in life would have been to enroll at Concordia University in Mequon to study and play baseball for the Falcon program where his father, Doug, is an assistant coach.

Young Gonring surprised a lot of people when he announced he would attend Carthage College in Kenosha and go out for the school's golf team. While he lettered four years in the two sports and enjoys both, golf is No. 1 as far as Gonring is concerned, to the point he would like pursue a career in the golf business.

Wisconsin's weather doesn't allow for year-round golf, nor does it have specialty schools which prepare young men and women for golf careers.

South Carolina, now that's another story. It's a hotbed of golf with year-round possibilities for playing and several schools tailor made (excuse the pun) to help Gonring reach his future goals.

At the semester, Gonring left Carthage and headed for the Professional Golf Career College in Bluffton, South Carolina, which is close to Hilton Head.

And how did Gonring learn about this school? "I talked to a friend who goes here," Gonring said earlier this week via phone from South Carolina. He was referring to Riley Hansen, a graduate of Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School in Jackson, who shares Gonring's passion for golf.

Gonring arrived in Bluffton on December 27 and started school five days later. "I go to school from eight until noon" five days a week, Gonring said, indicating his current courses include Principles of Salesmanship, Golf Teaching, Golf Operations, Golf Fitness and Rules of Golf.

"There are 18 people in my class and thirty some in the class ahead of me," he went on, noting the school currently has a total enrollment of 100 from all over the Country.

There are around a dozen teachers on the staff, and Gonring said, "I believe all of them are PGA (Professional Golf Association) certified.

The entire program is completed in 16 months time, with courses rotated on a four-month basis. After the course is completed, the school helps participants find jobs in the golf business.

There are some perks in going to the school in Bluffton, namely getting to golf on Tuesdays at a variety of nearby courses. Gonring explained the students sign up each week for

the courses that are offered, and they have the opportunity to sign up for golf instruction as well.

"The school pays for all the golf and instruction," Gonring said.

There are also match play tournaments conducted for the students on a regular basis and a tournament at the end of each semester.

Knowing Hansen was a big

help for Gonring. "That made it a lot easier for me... I met his friends and now I have friends from my class," he said, pointing out there is just one other participant from Wisconsin.

"Everything is going pretty well," Gonring said, indicating he did like Carthage, but, "When I talked to my friend, I thought this was a good fit for me."
