## Kewaskum bowling team heads to state

By finishing fifth in a recent team sectional competition, the Kewaskum High School boys bowling team stamped its ticket for the state meet, which is being held this weekend in Weston, located near Wausau.

This is the third year in a row KHS has advanced to state, a pleasant surprise for coach Art Marquardt, who reports he has just one senior on the squad, which is dominated by sophomores.

"If we bowl well, hopefully we'll get to TV in the finals. That's our goal," Marquardt said Sunday, indicating he plans to take nine bowlers to the tournament and figures most of them will get the opportunity to bowl.

Austin Ksioszk is the lone senior on the team and currently has the top field percentage, which is based on the number of strikes and spares compared with the number of frames bowled during the season.

"It's like a batting average," Marquardt said, reporting Ksioszk's field percentage is right around 80. "He's our captain and probably our most consistent bowler," the coach went on. "I think he was probably in the top seven or eight in the conference."

Sophomores Hunter Demmon and Kenny Ellis are next in line, according to Marquardt, who said, "They finished pretty close to each other."

## Robbery suspects back in WI

Escaping to warmer climates worked out badly for a Kewaskum man and woman who are facing an assortment felony charges in Washington County.

According to information from the Washington County Sheriff's Department, Scott Kudek and Kayla Goemer, suspects in the January 30 armed robbery of a truck from a local car dealership were returned and appeared in court on Feb. 18.

Court records show both were charged with operating without owners consent while possessing a weapon, second degree reckless-

ly endangering safety and felony bailjumping. They were being held in the Washington County Jail on \$65,000 bonds.

During Goemer's appearance, three other cases carrying an assortment of charges were heard: obtaining a controlled substance by fraud, receiving stolen property, possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia, bail jumping, possession of a controlled substance and four counts of delivery of narcotics dating between May and December last year, according to a Washington County Sheriff's Department bulletin.

One case against Kudek - obtaining a controlled substance by fraud

and receiving stolen property - was also heard and a warrant issued, the bulletin stated.

The original charges were filed after Kudek, 39 and Goemer, 24 stopped in at the Russ Darrow dealership in West Bend and asked to take a 2012 Dodge Ram 1500 for a test drive.

The pair was accompanied by a sales associate during a test drive and as they neared the intersection of Highway 144 and Highway A, Kudek allegedly took out a knife and held it to the neck of the salesman, a Sheriff's Department press release states.

Goemer, who now lives in Allenton, was ordered to have no contact with Kudek and will appear in court again on Feb. 27.

Kudek's next court appearance is on March 27.

## Construction meeting set for WIS 33 project starting in Washington County

Crews are preparing to roll out the orange barrels on a \$6.2 million project on WIS 33 between US 41 and County Z in Washington County starting in mid-March announced the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT).

The public is invited to a construction kick-off meeting on Wednesday, March 6, 2013 between 4 and 7 p.m. at the Addison Town Hall, 127 First Street in Allenton, WI. The meeting will be an open house format. The meeting site is wheelchair accessible. If you are hearing impaired and require an interpreter, please request one using the Telecommunications Relay System (dial 711).

A presentation will be given at 6 p.m. detailing the construction schedule and stages. Members from the WisDOT project team will be on hand to answer additional questions.

The 4.6 mile project is divided into two segments:

**Resurfacing** - Starting at US 41 to 0.5 miles west of WIS 144 intersection. The resurfacing segment will include milling the existing pavement, asphaltic overlay, beam guard replacement, intersection improvements, shoulder widening, pavement marking and new signs.

**Reconstruction** - Starting at 0.5 miles west of the WIS 144 intersection to County Z. The reconstruction will expand the roadway to a four-lane divided segment including curb and gutter, storm sewer, beam guard, pavement marking and new signs.

The existing Park and Ride lot located at the US 41 interchange will be closed and reconstructed as part of the project.

The contractor, Musson Brothers, is expected to complete work by October 2013, weather permitting.

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

## Telestroke program at St. Joseph's Hospital increases access to stroke specialists

A new telestroke program at Froedtert Health St. Joseph's hospital increases area residents' access to board-certified stroke specialists at the Froedtert & The Medical College of Wisconsin academic medical center in Wauwatosa.

St. Joseph's Hospital is now equipped with a portable cart that holds a PC, a high-definition camera and twin monitors. Using secure videoconferencing technology, a Medical College of Wisconsin stroke-specialized neurologist appears via monitor at the bedside to perform a stroke-specific neurological exam. Telemedicine capabilities also enable the neurologist to view CT images and other test results in round-the-clock, real-time video consultations.

"Research shows that the telestroke approach is effective in bringing timely, appropriate treatment to patients, including cutting edge endovascular therapy, resulting in better long-term outcomes," said John Lynch, MD, medical director for neurosciences at Froedtert & The Medical College. "This is an excellent example of delivering the right care at the right time in the right place. Telestroke enables us to standardize on best-practice protocols for

acute stroke care at all of our hospitals and assures we transfer only the targeted subset of patients who would benefit from endovascular therapy."

Physicians in the emergency department use telestroke in situations that require an extra level of expertise in making a diagnosis or treatment plan. The remote stroke-specialized neurologist may make a recommendation to administer or withhold the clot-busting agent, tPA. Or the specialist may advise that the patient be transferred to the academic medical center campus for more advanced care, such as clot retrieval.

"We've had excellent collaboration with stroke specialists at Froedtert academic medical center," said Dr. Mary Lewis, medical director of the Emergency Care Center at St. Joseph's Hospital. "Telestroke capabilities bring an added level of expertise, allowing us to offer patients an extra level of care closer to their homes."

UW-Washington County will present *Dead Man's Cell Phone* on Friday and Saturday evenings, March 1-2 and March 8-9 at 7:30pm in the campus theatre. Written by Sarah Ruhl, the engaging and thought-provoking comedy is directed and designed by Brad Ford, UW-WC Communications and Theatre Professor. Assistant Director is Dan Kaneiss.

*Dead Man's Cell Phone* begins with an incessantly ringing cell phone in a quiet café. Jean, a restless young woman at the next table (played by Melissa Hammen, West Bend) has had enough of the unanswered ringing and finally explodes into full confrontation with the owner of the phone, Gordon Gottlieb (played by Ben Popies, Jackson). Jean soon discovers, however, that Gordon is not afflicted with rudeness, but that he is dead. As the phone continues to ring incessantly, Jean

finally answers it and soon finds herself enmeshed in his life and consoling several characters, including Mrs. Gottlieb, Gordon's domineering and self-absorbed mother (played by Mary Buchel, Brookfield); Hermia, his emotionally disenchanted wife of ten years (played by Angela Emanuel, West Bend); his nice guy brother, Dwight (played by Kris Holly, West Bend); and even a mysterious mistress, Carlotta (played by Dinah-lee Torres, West Bend).

Also performing will be The Ensemble which includes Emi Geohagan, Hartford, and Kayla Kiser, Germantown.

The entertaining comedy explores many questions to be considered in this world of constant digital communication and fixation with wireless devices. While cell phone technology brings us together, it also winds up transforming the nature and quality of our

The other two starters are Jake Neuenfeld and Austin Grichtmeier, who are also sophomores, meaning Kewaskum should have a good team for another two years beyond this one.

The others selected to go along are juniors Zach Staehler and Tiler Ellenberger, and sophomores Max Heiser and Michael Krahn.

"The two juniors will probably bowl a lot," Marquardt said.

Prep bowling in Wisconsin is divided into team and individual competitions, and there are two divisions, one for schools over 1,000 students and one for schools who have an enrollment of less than 1,000.

Teams from both divisions compete against each other, however, until the state tournament.

Kewaskum was one of 22 teams in the District 7 South Sectional, which in-

cludes schools such as West Bend West, Grafton, Hartford and Cedarburg. The top seven earned berths in the state competition. That number included three from Division 2 and four from Division 1. West Bend West won the overall team title.

Each starter bowls two frames per game, and there are rules regarding making substitutions.

While the team didn't qualify, the Kewaskum girls will be represented in the state individual competition by senior Kierra Kuehl, who did an admirable job leading a young group of bowlers this year, according to Marquardt.

### Open Enrollment Students Find a Second Chance at KCA

People say the years in high school are the best four years of your lives, but in reality that saying doesn't apply to every student. We don't like to admit it, but students all over deal with poverty, the death of parents and loved ones, drug and alcohol abuse in the home, family and health issues and bringing these problems to school can make it difficult to succeed.

Being a high school student can be very difficult, and having another choice and a second chance, can make all the difference to these students. Ultimately, the difference may be between adding one more

drop-out to our communities or helping that student get ready for a more successful future. Many students from outside of the district have found this difference at Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA).

Most kids don't think about what high school they're going to attend, but the kids who attend KCA from outside the district have had to think about it. There are multiple reasons why these students come to KCA.

Some students didn't like the structure of their high school; they couldn't concentrate in a big class full of kids or get the attention they need-

ed from the teacher because of the large number of students. Other students come to KCA for a second chance. One student said, "I didn't want to drop out" and found KCA to be a "great option." Another student admitted that she "needed credits and online school wasn't a good option" and "she was not about to go back to [her old high school.]" They attend KCA to get a better insight on school and to earn a diploma.

KCA offers a lot of different opportunities for learning. Teachers work with students on their learning style. Students are able to do their work at

their own pace so they are not rushed, which students really like.

According to one open enrollment student at KCA, the expectation is that you will have "time to work and be independent." You are able to work on things individually or as a group. A lot of students like and need to work with teachers one on one, which means you are usually able to get help, when you need help, without hassle. Learning to be independent and how to seek help when you need, it will be two of the most useful skills in their future.

What does going to KCA make them think about the future? According to a majority of these students, KCA helps you put more focus on your future goals, and if you work hard, it helps you move ahead towards graduation. The fast-

er you move ahead, the more you look forward to college and start looking for a career field. Nearly every single student that attends KCA talks about their future and going to college or tech school.

One student says, "It has shown me that I am actually able to get caught up in school and follow my dream."

Without this kind of opportunity in Washington County, these students would be dropping out of school. KCA gives students a second chance to get an education without having to be in the traditional high school setting. While these four years may not be the best years, it can help their future be brighter.

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



# Scoles ends prep wrestling career with third at state, Seitz takes loss in prelims

**MADISON**—Wrestling is a sport where emotions can reach the top of the mountain, then sink into a deep pit and climb back up the mountain again, all in a matter of a single day.

Such was the plight of Kewaskum High School senior Brett Scoles, competing in his fourth and final WIAA State Wrestling Tournament last Friday and Saturday.

Scoles, suffered a devastating 8-5 loss in the semifinals, erasing his chances for a state title. He did bounce back Saturday, however, gaining two victories to finish third at 160 pounds in the Division 2 competition.

This was the third time the Indians standout earned a spot on the state podium, after finishing fifth his freshman year at 103 pounds and second his sophomore year at 125.

"He finished strong," coach Dennis Aupperle said. "Obviously, if you're not in the finals, you're not going to finish first or second, but if you've put in enough work, you want to get third. He did that. He did a great job!"

Scoles drew Ellsworth junior, Gabe Frandson, in the semifinals, and until the final 10 seconds of the second period, he was in good position to win the match as the score was 3-3, and he had the choice for the third period.

In an instant, however, Frandson took control of the match, with a throw for a takedown and a nearfall, giving him an 8-3 lead over Scoles. It was the only nearfall Scoles gave up the entire year.

"I don't know how he (Frandson) did it," Aupperle

said. "It looked like he (Scoles) was going to take him to his back, and all of a sudden, the kid (Frandson) put him to his back."

For the final two minutes, Aupperle thought his man "got a little rattled" because of the deficit, managing just an escape with 1:48 left and later getting a stalling penalty as Frandson was definitely in a defensive mode.

"Two (matches) tomorrow ... (he's got to) finish strong," Aupperle said. "What do you do? You can't change it."

And finish strong Scoles did, using a single leg takedown and an escape to top Cody Nyhagen 3-1 of Saint Croix Falls in the first wrestleback, then beating Jaden Boivin of Marinette, 4-1 for third place.

Frandson wound up winning the title over Gabe Frandrick of Somerset, 5-4.

Aupperle had high praise for Scoles and the career he put together. "Kids like this don't come around every day," he said, indicating Scoles was in

the weight room nearly every day at 5 a.m. "He's definitely a leader... a quiet leader. The kids look up to him. He's got a great work ethic."

Scoles finished with a mark of 139-29.

"It felt real good," Scoles said after defeating Joe Conklin of Lodi in the opening round. In that match, Scoles had a single leg takedown, a double, a throw, a nearfall and an escape to score his points.

For the second year in a row, Junior Joey Seitz (29-17) lost his opening-round match and was eliminated from the tournament.

Seitz's opponent, Marshall's Devon Weber, came up with a big fireman's carry with :26 left in the first period, turning it into a takedown and near fall for a 4-0 lead.

Seitz had his choice in the second period and picked down. Several times he stood on Weber but could never score any points.

After letting Weber go in the third period, Seitz aggressively attempted several takedowns and with :45 to go nearly had

a head throw but Weber countered and won the match 5-0.

"I needed to get my hips away. I was able to turn, but I didn't get my hips away, and he was able to catch a leg," Seitz said.


About his throw attempt, Aupperle said, He almost drove him right through to his back, but the kid is tall and a little stronger than Joey."

"It was close (for the throw attempt)," Seitz said. "He was sucking my elbow in. I tried to go for his cross ankle ... He was just ready for it, I guess."

Weber lost his next match and did not place.

Aupperle was also proud of the way wrestlers from the Eastern Wisconsin Conference performed. "The conference did awesome. Our sectional did awesome," Aupperle said. The EWC had two champions, Ryan Costello of Campbellsport and Waupun's Brady Huenink and had eight others place in the top six.

Costello breezed through the tournament and finished his career with 162 victories.


