## Fire destroys Wayne home



Firefighters from eight area fire departments extinguished a blaze that left a single-family home town of Wayne a total loss early Sunday morning.

**TOWN of WAYNE-** Fire destroyed a two story single family residence early Sunday morning.

Fire departments from eight local departments helped Kohlsville Fire Department to quickly extinguish the flames inside the empty home in the 7900 block of County Road W.

The Washington County Sheriff's Department reported fire was noticed and reported at 3:21 a.m. by an individual who was grooming

snowmobile trails in the area.

The structure suffered extensive interior damage that will likely make it an entire loss. A total dollar amount of damage was not available at this time.

No one was injured. Efforts to locate the residents/owner of this property are still ongoing.

Traffic along County Highway W was restricted for approximately 3 ½ hours, while emergency crews were on scene. Due to the single

digit temperature, The Washington County Highway Department and town of Wayne also assisted keeping the road salted so those on the scene could do their jobs.

Assistance was received from Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Allenton, Boltonville, St. Lawrence, Theresa and West Bend Fire Departments.

The cause of the fire is not known and it remains under investigation at this time.

## EMT service to be discussed

The Kewaskum Fire Department will hold a community meeting to allow residents to ask questions about upgrading the department's Emergency Medical Technician service level.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel and EMT Amanda Murphy addressed Trustees at a Village Board meeting in January. At that meeting they informed Trustees that they would need buy-in from the public. That buy-in will come from a community meeting will take place during the village board meeting on Monday, March 18 at 7 p.m.

Currently EMTs in the department are at the basic level, intermediate is the next level. By step-

ping up to the intermediate level EMTs could administer an IV along with the various IV fluids and several drugs such as nitroglycerine, Narcan and 50% Dextrose in a pre-hospital setting.

Once Kewaskum begins offering the next level of service, they would be able to bill patients for the higher level of service if it's required.

Chief Groeschel explained the Department has evaluated the prospect over the last two years. To become certified, each EMT would need 100 hours of schooling over what is required for an EMT Basic. The schooling is broken up as 60 hours in the classroom and 40 hours of hands on experience in a hospital emergency room.

The EMT would then be required to pass a written and practical exam.

Kewaskum Fire Department's Rescue Squad service is paid for by the patients of the ambulance service so there will be no cost to taxpayers. Insurance costs, paid by the Rescue Squad would also remain the same.

The Fire Department's ambulance budget will cover the cost of the training for those EMTs wishing to advance their skill set. Start-up costs (equipment and drugs) would also be absorbed by the Rescue Squad.

Murphy, a paramedic for last three years, stated the program will

## Land purchase discussion to occur Monday

The Kewaskum Board of Education will hold a special meeting of the electorate Monday to ask for approval of the purchase real property.

At that meeting on March 11, electors in the Kewaskum School District may cast their vote for or against purchasing a dilapidated home at 218 First Street in the Village of Kewaskum. The house is situated next to the Kewaskum Career Academy (KCA).

"Normally you have an annual meeting and it's (land purchases) always discussed, this came up post annual meeting so we need to have the board bring it to the electorate," Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal explained of the reason for the special meeting.

Smasal stated an offer of \$44,000 has been accepted by the homeowner. If approval is given at the meeting, the district will close on the property immediately. He guessed the structure on the land would be demolished at a cost of around \$15-20,000, but did not have expeditious plans for that.

Money for the purchase will come from the projected 2012-'13 budget surplus. In February, Business Manager Paul Reichert, stated he believed the district may see a surplus of between \$80-\$200,000.

If electors do not vote in favor of the purchase, the issue becomes dead and will not be brought up in the future according to Smasal.

"We're land-locked, we need options for future growth. If we don't do this now, we lose the opportunity," Smasal said.

Questions about the purchase will be answered at the meeting and additional information regarding future plans will be provided.

## Community garden news

Greetings from The Kewaskum Community Garden! This message is intended for gardeners, affiliates and friends of the garden to update and welcome everyone to our fourth year.

January is perhaps the best time of year to spend time with the garden. This is the time to think and plan.

If you have a plot, it's only 15' x 20' and you can plant only so much. In 2012 the Kewaskum Public Library had seed catalogs. Read them, there's more than seeds.

For 2013, there's a new purple carrot and a new purple and

yellow potato. Have you seen the three foot long red bean?

Our group is has been affiliated with the Washington County Master Gardeners and now the KHS FFA. We are grateful for these wonderful group of students who tilled our plots and doubled the size of the garden last season.

We're at 21 plots. We are grateful for the input from these groups as well as the ongoing encouragement of the BUFF (Better You Food Force) Group.

Our initial goal was to provide a spot for those who didn't have space to grow as well as teach children how things grow and what's good to eat.

Our plot cost in 2013 will be \$25. Make checks payable

to Kewaskum School District Community Garden.

We will be more attentive to mulching this season. This is an excellent, water-saving practice in the garden. Grass clippings, leaves, shredded paper can be used. All breaks down into compost. Wood bark is not recommended in the garden but topping these with Cocoa bean shells prevents slugs.

If you're not aware, the Kewaskum Community Pantry welcomes extra produce. Master Gardeners has provided a

plot in the garden each year; rent, seeds, plants and labor with the produce going to the food pantry. This option is open to any group.

We also started a scholarship program last year, where a church sponsored a plot for a family unable to afford their plot. Call and ask for more information.

We did have some tomato blight in the garden last season, many tomato plants and every tomato left in the garden suffered. Volunteers attempted

to remove as many as possible and get them out of the area completely. However, be aware, it's wise to not plant tomatoes in the same spot this year. If volunteer plants come up, remove them. If you begin to experience the blight this year, it's best to remove the entire plant immediately.

## Guest Editorial: Don't hike the cost of Public Records

A ruling last year by the Wisconsin Supreme Court involving the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel became the focus of attention Feb. 27, when a state Assembly committee held a public hearing on a bill, AB 26, that would drastically increase the cost of obtaining public records.

The bill, if approved, would let custodians of public records charge a fee for redacting sensitive information. It was introduced in reaction to the court's ruling that such fees are not allowed under current law.

I spoke at the hearing against the bill, as did representatives of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association and Wisconsin Freedom of Information Council. Among those in speaking in favor were representatives of the Wisconsin Counties Association, League of Wisconsin Municipalities, and University of Wisconsin-Madison.

The proponents argued that they incurred huge costs reviewing and redacting records, especially for voluminous requests.

But this is a function that public officials are paid to do. And, in fact, the Open Records Law currently allows custodians to charge requesters for the cost of locating the records when the fee exceeds \$50. In addition, requesters already are paying for copying costs.

Last year alone, the Journal Sentinel spent more than \$22,400 to obtain open public records and database searches, and over the last five years we've spent more than \$86,000 on public records requests.

Those totals do not include legal fees. Adding more fees on top of what already is required in the statute will put many record searches out of the reach of many news organizations, let alone the general public.

Moreover, the Journal Sentinel routinely works closely with record-keepers to make sure our requests are focused, narrow and specific. We are a news business that wants to obtain records as

soon as we can. It is not in our best interest to burden record-keepers with unnecessary work that would delay the release of records.

It is the responsibility of record-keepers to maintain orderly records so they can be retrieved effectively and efficiently. Many record-keepers in Wisconsin and elsewhere already have converted records to digital formats in ways that keep sensitive material in specific columns so that information can be redacted with a keystroke.

We suggested several ways that custodians could reduce the cost of redacting, from putting more public records online to allowing clerks at lower pay to do the redacting.

Among the most poignant testimony came from a Madison woman who said she wasn't affiliated with any organization. The parent of a child with special needs, she has made a number of records requests of her local school district, and has encountered what she already feels are excessive costs.

Should public records be available only to those who can afford to get them?

The public owns and has the right to see the records of its government, with a few reasonable exceptions. Public records do not belong to administrators and bureaucrats — some of whom, experience tells us, would use these proposed redaction fees to hide problems and keep taxpayers and voters from learning about potentially embarrassing or even incriminating documents.

For our democracy to work, people must know what their government is up to. We need openness and transparency. Adding another cost to gain access to public documents increases the potential for abuse, waste and ineffective management, at all levels of government.



"They grew up this weekend," says boy's coach Art Marquardt. "There were a lot of positives that came out - the team got little bit better focus and understanding of the game."

The KHS team, consisting of senior and team captain Austin Ksioszk, juniors Zach Staehler and Tiler Ellenberger and sophomores Hunter Demmon, Kenny Ellis, Austin Grichtmeier and Jake Neuenfeld, formed one of the 50 boys teams in Division I and II that began competition Friday.

Wisconsin prep bowling is divided into team and individual competitions in two divisions - one for schools over 1,000 students and another for schools with less than 1,000 students enrolled.

The KHS division II team advanced to fourth place, behind Cambridge, Chetek-Weyerhaeuser and Port Washington.

Marquardt said the boys worked well as a team.

"They each had a part in what we did," says Marquardt.

The team missed Sunday's qualifying round by 10 or 12 pins.

"It happens," Marquardt said. "They are already looking forward to next year. They talked like they haven't finished business."

At state Friday evening Kuehl had to compete against 61 other girls. She placed 12th with a score of 556 after three games and was among the top 16 who earned the opportunity to bowl again on Saturday night. The scores were combined from Friday and Saturday, and Saturday she got a 642 making a total of 1,198 for six games.

Kuehl's fourth place advanced her to the televised show on Sunday morning which will air on April 20th at 11:30 a.m. on Fox Sports. In that game, she bowled a 210 against the fifth place individual to keep her fourth place. She went against Brittany Smith, the third place finish and was defeated with a 215.

This is the 4th year Kierra has been able to attend State competition. 3 years ago, KHS Girls bowling team took 1st place, 2 years ago, they got 2nd place, and last year they placed 3rd. What sport can you say that ...that many times a team from KHS has gone to state...and taken that many trophies in a row.

"She did an outstanding job. She was very composed and bowled better on each step of the competition during the weekend," said Marquardt, who coached Kuehl during the championship.

This is the third year KHS advanced to the state competition as a team.

Kewaskum was one of 22 teams in the District 7 South Sectional. That division includes West Bend West, Grafton, Hartford and Cedarburg.
