## Voters trust incumbents Oelhafen, Serwe also win

## Village will replace old sewer lines

Voters, though light at the polls, stood by their incumbents Tuesday during the Spring Election where all contested incumbents held their positions. Businessman Joel Serwe won a term as trustee in the village as a write-in candidate while Heather Oelhafen won a seat on the Kewaskum Board of Education.

### The Kewaskum Board of Education

The newbie, Oelhafen, was the top vote-getter receiving 1,511 votes. Incumbent Mary Miller received 1,168. Coming up short was John Kincaid with 1,076 votes. This is the third straight election where the board has received new faces.

### Village of Kewaskum

Joel Serwe won as a write-in candidate receiving 62 votes. He is joined by incumbents Kevin Scheunemann and James Hovland who received 402 and 397 respectively.

Also running as write-in candidates were Jean Goeden and Donald Hemauer, they received 41 and 32 votes respectively.

President Andy Pesch ran unopposed and received 505 votes.

### Town of Kewaskum

Incumbent Nancy Boden received another term as Clerk in the township after receiving 250 votes. Her opponent Sandra Pasbrig received 56 votes.

Chairman Daniel Schmidt ran unopposed and received 264 votes. Supervisors Mike Otten and Scott Wollner ran unopposed receiving 223 and 218 votes respectively. Treasurer Daniel Stoffel ran unopposed and received 283 votes.

### Town of Wayne

Chairman Carl Klemme overwhelmingly retained his seat receiving 372 votes over Andrea Feucht's 95.

Supervisors Robert Schulteis and Michael Samann ran unopposed and received 382 and 247 votes respectively.

Clerk Julie A. Kriewaldt ran unopposed and received 413 while long-time treasurer Gerald Schulz will serve another term after he also ran unopposed and received 422.

### Town of Auburn

Incumbent Merle Laatsch laid claim to victory receiving a convincing 332 votes over challenger Tim Ramthun who garnered 187.

Supervisors Joseph Woodworth and John Janz ran unopposed obtaining 350 and 366 votes respectively. Clerk Bonnie Berg ran unopposed and received 479 and Treasurer Shelby Sarauer received 473 also running unopposed.

### Town of Farmington

All seats in the town of Farmington were unopposed. Chairman Chris Elbe received 461 votes and supervisors Dwayne Wollner and Mark Foyse received 420 and 365 votes respectively.

### Statewide Races

In statewide races, as expected Tony Evers retained his seat in the race for State Superintendent of Schools over Don Pridemore.

Supreme Court Justice Pat Roggensack was victorious over Ed Falzone.

**KEWASKUM-** A crumbling sanitary sewer system will be replaced in conjunction with the Highway 28/Main Street road project.

The village board on Monday voted for the replacement after a presentation by Mick Magalski of McMahon Associates, an engineering firm the village contracts with.

Magalski estimated the replacement cost at approximately \$198,000, but he is still working with the Department of Transportation to finalize specifications.

The project will be done in conjunction with a state Department of Transportation plan to resurface Highway 28 and Main Street and replace the bridge over the Milwaukee River in 2014. The DOT expects the reconstruction to have a 25 year life.

Kewaskum Public Works Director Jerry Gilles said the present sanitary sewer would not last as long as the road. If the work is done post-construction, Magalski estimated the repair bill could rise another \$100,000.

"Our goal is not to dig up a new street," said Gilles.

Administrator Matt Heiser said the village received \$149,000 for cosmetic hail damage last year and suggested those funds could be put toward the project.

Gilles said his department reviewed a study of mains and laterals on West Fond du Lac Avenue and Main between Railroad Street to east of Stark Street two years ago and a decision was made to reline the crumbling system.

When that decision was made, it was expected material costs for the work would go down, but instead they have risen dramatically. Magalski said the cost of relining the 3,500 feet of laterals is now approximately \$100 per foot.

Because of current its condition the village is treating clean water that seeps into laterals.

Gilles says the system is old enough that there is no record of when it was originally installed. He said the first sanitary sewer was installed in the downtown area in 1929-30. Although the section east of the bridge may have been installed later, it still suffers from the same issues.

## Beechwood Cheese will close May 4, buyer sought

**TOWN of SCOTT-** Beechwood Cheese will be closing its doors May 4, but the person charged with selling the assets would be happy to find a buyer that would keep the cheese-making tradition going.

"I still hope that between now and May 4 we are able to find an interested party," said Management Consultant Laxson Boyd. "It's a great little business and I would like to see it continue."

Beechwood Cheese, which has been in business in the southwest corner of Sheboygan County since 1894, filed for receivership in August 2012. A March 18 auction of the company at the Milwaukee Athletic Club did not yield a sufficient bid.

Court appointed receiver and Milwaukee attorney Seth Dizard informed the court that there had not been a sale and

was granted permission to try and market the assets. Boyd's firm, Wadsworth Whitestar, is retained by receivers to provide management services during receivership, help find prospective buyers and sell assets.

After reviewing the ongoing cost of operations, Dizard made decision to cease operations effective May 4.

The company has 17 part time employees, Boyd said.

Court documents state the cheese company and Bullpen Enterprises 1598 LLC owe more than \$960,000 to Port Washington State Bank.

Boyd said between now and May 4, the cheese factory will continue to produce fresh curds on April 6 and again on May 4, the final day of operation.

In meantime, the store will continue with normal business hours and will discount its inventory.

## Shea hearing postponed

**FOND DU LAC-** The case against a Campbellsport man facing six felony charges has been delayed.

Daniel Shea, 24, was scheduled to appear in a Fond du Lac County courtroom March 28, but apparently the plea was not heard and hearing has not been rescheduled.

Although the district attorney and court clerk offices would not release information regarding the hearing, a March 28 article in the *Fond du Lac Reporter* states that Shea did not appear because both the district attorney and defense attorney were seeking additional information about the crash that left two people dead and one injured.

Shea was allegedly drunk

and texting during a crash that killed Paul and Joanna Grahl of Eden.

The incident occurred on a September 13, 2012 on Highway 45 in Fond du Lac County. Shea allegedly admitted to a deputy on the scene that he had been texting, and because he was looking at the screen he never saw another vehicle coming but that he probably crossed the centerline.

The criminal complaint also states that Paul Grahl attempted an evasive maneuver to avoid the collision before impact.

In addition to the deaths of the Grahls, their daughter, Esther G. Grahl, then 13, sustained serious injuries and was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend and later to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee.

When asked for a timeline leading up to the crash, Shea told a deputy he began drinking in West Bend and visited taverns in Slinger, Hartford and Rubicon before returning home and setting out again to go to a baseball game.

From Shea's accounts, a deputy estimated the man consumed five beers, two mixed drinks and two shots between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m., according to the complaint. When taken to St. Joseph's Hospital a preliminary breath test, the complaint states that Shea's breath alcohol content was more than twice the legal limit.

## Grothman, Kaufert unveil tax credit for private school tuition

Senator Glenn Grothman and Representative Dean Kaufert announced today they will be reintroducing a bill providing a tax credit to parents of children attending schools that are not currently publicly supported - private schools. While the current public schools are supported by taxpayers to the tune of \$10,000 - \$15,000 a year per student, parents who send their children for an alternative education receive no public assistance.

"As well-funded public schools continue to have their funding increased, private schools are continually crowded out of the equation. Private school attendance has fallen from 147,000 in year 2000 to 123,784 last year. Also, 23,200 of these students are choice students. If we do not act quickly the situation will continue to get worse for private schools. In my own district, private schools in Belgium and Random Lake have recently closed," commented Grothman.

The bill will be phased in beginning taxable year 2014, but will ultimately give \$1,500 tax credit to parents of elementary students and \$2,500 tax credit for each child attending to high school.

Kaufert said, "I have been a supporter of this tax credit for many years to help families who choose to send their children to a private school. I think it would be a positive step forward in giving parents throughout Wisconsin more educational options for their education."

"People talk a lot about diversity - now is the time to recognize that not all parents want their children educated in schools run by the current public school establishment. A credit equal to less than a fifth of what we give public schools seems to be a very modest proposal. I look with anticipation at future revenue estimates to see if this is something that can be placed in this budget," added Grothman.



Terlinden won the honor of choosing Wayne Elementary School and Zion Lutheran Church Community Hall to each receive \$2,500 through the Monsanto Fund's Ameri-

ca's Farmers Grow Communities.

Last Tuesday, Wayne Elementary School students got a chance to see that community in action as Terlinden passed on the donations.

Terlinden says Jim Gulke, agronomy and seed sales specialist at United Cooperative in Hartford, urged him to enter the contest.

One farmer is selected in each of 1,271 eligible counties

in 39 states to designate funds.

This is the third time Terlinden has won and the third

time he has directed the donation to Wayne Elementary, where his children and five of his grandchildren attend, or have attended school.

Launched in 2010, the program allows farmers to enter to win a \$2,500 donation that goes toward a community nonprofit organization, such as 4-H, FFA, schools, fire departments and other civic groups, but because Washington County suffered drought conditions in 2012, Terlinden was eligible to direct a second \$2,500 donation to the Zion Lutheran Community Hall, which is used as a meeting place for local snowmobile and 4-H clubs.

Principal John Platais says the school has no spe-

cific plans on how this year's donation will be used, but previous donations from Terlinden have been used to purchase Promethean boards. The boards contain a built-in hard drive that stores images, graphics and videos that can be dragged and dropped from the drive to the board. The board can also be written on using an electronic pen that works like a computer mouse.



distribution system. A PWS that exceeds a specified frequency of total coliform occurrence must conduct an assessment to determine if any sanitary defects exist and, if found, correct them. In addition, under the new treatment technique requirements, a PWS that incurs an E. coli MCL violation must conduct an assessment and correct any sanitary defects found.

### How has the public notification requirement changed?

The revised rule is eliminating monthly public notification requirements based only on the presence of total coliforms. Total coliforms in the distribution system may indicate a potential pathway for contamination but in and of themselves do not indicate a health threat. Instead, the RTCR requires public notification when an E. coli MCL violation occurs, indicating a potential health threat, or when a PWS fails to conduct the required assessment and corrective action.

### The Kewaskum Water Utility

The utility has undertaken several projects in recent years with the objective of operating a safe system, and prior to these

regulations has conducted assessments and followed the philosophy as guiding factors in the operation and maintenance of the water utility. The utility has been aided by the Department of Natural Resources water supply district engineer conducting surveys.

Some of the projects undertaken to identify and fix, or maintain our system in recent years are:

The 1929 number 1 water tower roof was replaced with a new roof, which is welded instead of riveted, venting was replaced and screens installed to present day standards. The riser pipe was insulated and reduced in size to prevent winter cooling of the water and help maintain the tower.

The ground storage reservoir at the number 1 site had a new rubber roof membrane installed, replacing the built up roof that had been in service.

The ground storage reservoir at the number 3 site had a new rubber roof membrane installed, replacing the built up roof that had been in service.

The #1 water tower paint system was inspected, interior and exterior.

The #3 water tower paint system was inspected, interior and exterior.



Just like kids at Christmas, the Kewaskum High trap shooting coaches could hardly wait to put their "new toy" together.

Head coach Jim Schaub, along with several assistants including Dennis Gundrum, Brian Taylor, Chris Weishan and Tanner Schaub, spent a couple hours at the Kettle Moraine Sportsman's Club Sunday, setting up the new DryFire simulator that just arrived in Kewaskum.

The purchase of the new equipment was made possible by the Kewaskum Booster Club, which, true to its word, works to provide funds to offset the cost for KHS-related activities.

"We went there (the Booster Club meeting) Monday (March 18) night," Schaub said, indicating the club voted to purchase the \$3,500 piece of equipment, which will help the students improve their shooting and save money.

The screen on the wall is 4.5 feet by 14 feet, according to Schaub, the team's coach for all its six-year history.

"It looks like a field with woods behind it," Schaub went on, explaining there is a laser red dot, which simulates the bird, "and there's a laser in your gun."

With the DryFire, five shooters can be practicing at the same time. "You shoot a regular round of 25," Schaub said. "It's pretty high tech. It shows where you shot ... It's an instant feedback.

No more will the trap team have to be concerned about the cost of practicing. The students will not have to pay \$6 to \$8 for shells or the \$2.50 the club charges for a round of 25.

Having five students be able to practice at once is im-

portant, especially considering Schaub and his assistants are working with a squad of 63, including eight or nine girls.

Schaub was almost amazed when someone pointed out to him that 63 participants represent 10 percent of the current population of the high school.

The KHS team not only has good quantity. It has exhibited good quality as well. "We won conference last year," Schaub said. "I'm not sure where we finished at state.

What is nice about trap shooting competition is all the participants get to compete, with the five with the best counts added up for the team score.

A perfect score would be 125, and, "We shot a couple 117s and 118s," Schaub said, noting the conference includes teams from Lomira, Campbellsport, the Daniel Boone Club near Richfield, Hartford Union High, Ozaukee and West Bend, although its team is not affiliated with the high schools there.

While many of the spring sports at KHS have been hampered by the snow and unseasonably cold weather, the trap shooting team has been practicing for several weeks and was slated to open its competitive season on March 26 vs. Hartford.

"We want to say a big thank you to the Booster Club for purchasing this," Schaub said on behalf of the students and coaches.

Jacky Herriges said the club was happy to help because "It really is a good coaching tool."

Herriges, the outgoing president of the club, said, "We're really helping a lot of kids at one time. They have more kids in trap shooting than they have in football right now."
