Friend, mentor, teacher describes KES's Pokorski

Kohn comes back to KHS as SRO

KEWASKUM- Twenty years after graduation, Kevin Kohn has found himself back at Kewaskum High School.

Since April 3, Officer Kohn, School Resource Officer (SRO) for the Kewaskum School District, has been getting to know students.

"It gives me a different idea of law enforcement and the way schools deal with law enforcement," says Kohn, who has been an officer with the Kewaskum Police Department for 12 years.

While he is there to maintain order, Police Chief Thomas Bishop says Kohn's main duty is to build a rapport with students.

Kohn will also be a presence in the classroom when he gives his first presentation to high school students Tuesday.

He is prepared to speak on a range of topics, from information on drug and alcohol abuse to inattentive driving, texting, dangers found on the Internet and sexting.

Although his office is based out of the high school Kohn also visits the village's middle and elementary schools daily.

Bishop says he had been discussing the position with District Administrator Jim Smasal, who agreed it was a good time to make the change.

After 20 years of inspiring students and teachers at Kewaskum Elementary School, Lynn Pokorski became one of 100 that won this year's Kohl Teacher Fellowship award.

The award supports the excellence and innovation of Wisconsin's teachers.

"I wasn't expecting to be nominated, so I was quite surprised and excited to receive the nomination," says Pokorski.

KES Principal Jody Heipp nominated Pokorski for the award and second grade teacher Curt Casseta wrote one of the letters of recommendation.

"She has always been at the forefront of our district initiatives, a mentor for teachers new to second grade, a co-op teacher for a multitude of student teachers. Her attitude is positive; her take on educational issues is insightful. She is an absolute delight to call colleague and friend," says Casseta, who has known Pokorski since he started in the district in 1996.

Fellowship recipients are chosen for their ability to inspire a love of

learning in their students, their ability to motivate others and their leadership and service both in and outside the classroom.

"Her students enjoy active learning instruction and seem to thrive under her direction," boasts second grade teacher Kathleen Flaherty, who has worked with Pokorski for the past two years.

Pokorski admits the best part of the job is the children.

"I suppose it seems obvious that a teacher enjoys working with children, but it is true. It is a wonderful and rewarding experience to become a part of each and every child's life. Teachers help students grow, but students also help teachers grow to become better teachers," says Pokorski.

Pokorski inspires her students to learn by providing a safe and positive environment and mutual respect between herself and students.

She says another key to student success is creating a team of support that includes the student, their parents and family, the classroom teacher and school staff.

"The entire support team has the

same goal in mind - for the student to experience success and become a lifelong learner," says Pokorski.

Her attitude is not only evident when it comes to motivating her students, she's also had a hand in inspiring other teachers.

Flaherty says when it comes to needing answers to curriculum questions, Pokorski is also the "go-to person" in the group of second grade teachers. Flaherty says the group is goal-oriented, cohesive and fun to be around because of Pokorski.

"She is instrumental in our ability to work so well together," reported Flaherty.

For the first few years, Casseta visited Pokorski's room as the gifted and talented coordinator. Eleven years ago, when he began teaching second grade, Pokorski volunteered to be his mentor.

Through the years, Pokorski, Casseta and now-retired colleague Cheryl Ammel worked together on projects such as a second grade math night and student poetry performances

Farmington man arrested after search finds drugs, explosives

TOWN of FARMINGTON- The Washington County Sheriff's Office has arrested a 22-year-old man for manufacturing improvised explosives.

On April 5, The Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group (Drug Unit) obtained and executed a search warrant at the home in the 1200 block of Lakeview Rd. An investigation continued over the weekend.

In addition to the explosives charge, several other charges were developed as a result of the search warrant.

On April 8, Ethan Boettcher was charged in Washington County Circuit Court with manufacturing marijuana, posses-

sion of marijuana with intent to deliver, possession of drug paraphernalia, maintaining a drug trafficking place, as well as possession of an improvised explosive device.


As a result of the investigation the Drug Unit seized

986 grams (approximately two pounds) of high grade marijuana, two firearms, \$10,892 in cash, a 2001 Ford Ranger pickup truck, and a 2006 Yamaha ATV. Materials for making pipe bombs including pipes with end caps and powder were seized but no live devices were located at the home.

Value of the two pounds of marijuana would be approximately \$9,000. Additional charges related to the weapons are likely.

Boettcher is not the owner of the home. According to authorities, the homeowners are not expected to be charged with any crime in relation to this investigation.

Severe weather spotter training at Kewaskum Fire Dept.

On Monday, April 22, 2013, a presenter on behalf of the National Weather Service (NWS) will conduct Severe Weather Spotter Training at the Kewaskum Fire Dept. located at 1106 Fond du Lac Ave. in Kewaskum, WI. Two identical sessions will be held - an afternoon session from 1-3 PM and an evening session from 7-9 PM. This training is free, open to the public and does not require any pre-registration.

This is a basic level class that includes video and photos of past weather events and recognition training on weather features that are indicators of severe weather potential. The causes and dynamics of differing forms of severe weather and safety issues will also be discussed.

This training is recommended for members of local police, fire and EMS depart-

ments as well as amateur radio operators and anyone else with an interest in weather. There will be ample time allowed for questions.

This training is sponsored through the cooperation of: Village of Kewaskum, Washington County Office of Emergency Management, Wisconsin Emergency Management, Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association and the National Weather Service.

The seminar will feature Skip Voros, Executive Director of the Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association (MASA). The Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association (MASA) [pronounced "May-sah"], established in 1992, and incorporated in 1995 is a Wisconsin registered non-profit and I-R-S 501(c)3 tax exempt corporation operated for charitable, educational, and scientific purposes. Their mission is to lessen the burden of the Nation-

al Weather Service (NWS) essential severe weather training and SKYWARN programs. To do this MASA has established a long and strong working relationship with the NWS by providing on-going severe weather awareness and training to all interested parties.

Let me start off by thanking The Statesman for teaming up with our department to provide this column to our great community. I think this is a great way to make sure that our police department is open and communicating with the public that we serve. My goal is to provide a column on a monthly basis to inform and educate our community about the activities and services our department provides, and to educate about new laws, ordinances or any other topic relevant to the quality of life we share.

This first article is actually to explain a weekly addition to The Statesman. We have teamed up to bring you our weekly dispatch blotter. The newspaper will be printing calls our officers have handled over the last week. I, along with the newspaper, believe that there is a general interest in what we are doing and hopefully this will give the readers an idea of what it is their officers do on a daily basis.

There are certain services we provide on a daily basis that will not be published every week; such as nightly building checks and vacation house checks. Each month, after my report to the Village Board, The Statesman will print a total of these types of calls.

Please also understand that by the nature of our profession, not every call we handle is fit to be shared with the public, and thus it will not be provided. This is not because our intention is to keep things out of public knowledge, but to protect the privacy of those involved. There is also a good chance that something might still be under investigation. Furthermore, not every call for service we handle is nearly as exciting or glamorous as you may see on the hit TV show "COPS", but they are calls we respond to and services we provide to the community because at the end of the day, someone has to, and we are that someone.

My hopeful objective in providing this information is to bring awareness to the criminal activity in the Village, and hopefully bring down crime with the awareness and assistance of our residents. Overall, Kewaskum is a great place to live and raise a family, but we, like other small communities, have our fair share of issues to deal with. With your help, working with our officers and myself, I hope to make this Village an even better place to live than it already is.

Barton man to face felony child abuse charge

A hearing for a 21-year old town of Barton man facing a charge of felony child abuse will take place in a Washington County court at 9:45 a.m. April 16.

On March 20, a charge against Jesse J. Byers was changed from intentionally causing bodily harm to a Class C Felony, causing great bodily harm when he allegedly broke the arm of his two-and-a-half-week old daughter.

If convicted, a criminal complaint states Byers could face up to 40 years in prison and a \$100,000 fine.

When Byers and the child's mother brought the baby to St. Joseph's Hospital November

16 she was diagnosed with a fractured left arm.

The child was referred to Children's Hospital for further diagnosis of the injury and an evaluation for suspected child abuse, according to a criminal complaint.

Those records indicated reason given for the fracture - that the child's are had been tangled in a blanket - was not consistent with the severity of the injury.

The complaint states that in the early hours of Nov. 15, Byers became frustrated when his daughter would not stop crying.

He allegedly told an officer her picked her up and her left arm got caught in a blanket. He heard a "pop" and the girl started crying, according to the criminal complaint.

When confronted by an officer about the truthfulness of his statement, Byers said he lied about how the baby sustained her injury.

He said that she the child was crying and would not put her arms down at her sides in order to allow him to swaddle her. The complaint states he got frustrated and grabbed the girls upper arms and forcefully drove her arm into the bed while rotating his hand upward until he heard a "pop" coming from her left arm and the girl began to cry.

The complaint states he knew what he had done was wrong and woke the mother, but admitted to an officer that when he talked to her, he lied about what had happened.



Not only did opposing Eastern Wisconsin Conference coaches notice their excellent play, top Wisconsin high school football coaches saw the talents displayed by Alex Fechter and Nate Krupp on the gridiron last fall, earning the two Kewaskum High athletes to be selected to participate in the WFCA (Wisconsin Football Coaches Association) All Star football game.

Both continue to work out in anticipation of the July 20th game at Titan Stadium in Oshkosh that will put their Division 1-3 North team vs. the South, but all invited players are also expected to do some fundraising for the major charitable partner of the WFCA, Children's Hospital of Wisconsin.

The two attacked the assignment like they do completing a 300-pound bench press. They organized and hosted a brat fry at Walmart this past Saturday in hopes of raising money for the hospital.

When asked how the event was going early Saturday afternoon, Fechter said, "Very good. We had to go back in the store and get more food."

"We're just having a good time with our families," Krupp said, reporting the two were being assisted by their parents. Krupp estimated the two made a couple hundred dollars, which will go to Children's Hospital.

Both take an impressive list of credentials into the all-star contest and also to their respective college football camps. Fechter, a 6-foot-1, 240-pound tackle, won All-EWC honors as a defensive and offensive tackle, and he was the conference's Defensive Lineman of the Year, along with winning all-area and all-region honors and

honorable mention on the all-state team.

Krupp, a lanky 6-3, 175-pound wide receiver and safety, was also honored as a first team pick offensively and defensively, and he too was cited in the area and region voting.

"I'm going to UW-Whitewater," Fechter said, indicating he made visits to UW-Oshkosh, UW-Stevens Point and Bemidji State in Minnesota before making the decision. At Whitewater, he plans to study Health and Human Performance in an effort to become a strength and conditioning coach for a college.

Krupp's choice is UW-Stevens Point. "I just liked the coaches and the campus," he said about making his selection, with the intention of earning a degree in Exercise Science. "I know some players up there, and I have a chance to make an instant impact" because two wide receivers are graduating.

Fechter said the coaches have indicated, "They'll use me as a hybrid ... half linebacker and half defensive line."

Krupp will be on defense as a safety for the all-star game but said, "I'm playing wide receiver" at Stevens Point.

Fechter explained each high school coach in the state can nominate two players for the game, then selected all-star coaches watch game films to determine which 165 players will be invited to play on the two teams.

"I wasn't even nominated at first," Krupp said, adding, "When I made all-region, coach (Jason) Piittmann decided to nominate me."

"I was very excited (to be invited)," Fechter said.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," Krupp said. "You get to play with the best players in the state."

If people in the area would like to help Fechter and Krupp reach their contribution goal for the hospital, they may send checks to them in care of Piittmann at KHS, 1510 Bilgo Lane, Kewaskum. The checks should be made out to the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association. The pair will also host another brat fry at Kewaskum's BP gas station on April 27.





and were interviewed by Bishop and school administrators before Kohn was chosen.

"I think he's a great fit for the school district," says Bishop.

For the past eight years, Bishop said Officer Barry Granrath has been the district's SRO.

"He did a great job. (Granrath) really built up the position and made it into what it is today," says Bishop.

Through an intergovernmental contract, Bishop says the district pays 40 percent of the SRO wage while his department picks up the extra 60 percent.

"Now is a good time for a switch, Kevin can get his feet wet in the next couple of

months and have more training this summer," says Bishop.

But there is still a question on whether Kohn will return to his new beat - last summer the Board of Education voted to terminate the contract, Bishop says.

That contract is set to expire at the end of this school year.

Bishop says if the district board doesn't renew the contract or get an alternative in place, there won't be a school resource officer next year.

Kohn introduced himself to the Board of Education at Monday's meeting. He informed the board that he is currently in uniform at the school which is new to students, he is unsure if he will

continue in uniform or not.

Campbellsport's SRO from Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office is in uniform daily, with the exception of Fridays. Other district's with and SRO vary according to Kohn.

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


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25 Years Ago

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

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Richard Knoebel, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Norman Kufahl, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. 

Beyond having one of the top pitchers in the conference, this year Kewaskum's fast-pitch softball team has a little depth on the mound.

Jenny Reicher, a former conference player of the year and two-time first teamer, returns for her senior season, and she'll be able to keep her arm fresh since the Indians aren't fielding a junior varsity team.

Numbers are down a little bit as 20 girls are out for softball, but that means Coach Jeff Gosse has three backup pitchers to give Reicher a well-needed rest, especially given the season is already bunching up due to weather.

Adding to the Indians' strength up the middle is sophomore McKenzie Rosenthal, who moves from third base to shortstop this season. She comes off a stellar defensive year in which she only made three errors.

"McKenzie had a real good year at third last year," said Gosse. "She's really improved her arm strength over the off-season. Real smooth, good range."

At second base is Cassidy Enright, back for her second year of starting.

"She's real steady," said Gosse.

In center is the speedy senior veteran Mallorie Kreis.

"She's got speed; she can run stuff down," Gosse said.

Behind the plate, after years of being spoiled with all-con-

ference players and depth, is sophomore Melanie Juech. She played on varsity last year in the outfield so she has some upper-level experience.

At third will be senior Erica Chesak, who missed most of last season due to injury. She played some varsity ball at catcher as a sophomore.

At first is returning starter Taylore Kohn. Joining Kreis in the outfield is Lindsay Winkler. The third spot is up for grabs.

Behind Reicher on the mound are Kohn, Winkler and Maura Roberts, who are expected to see work in non-conference games.

"What will really help our season is having Jenny there, and having other pitchers available," Gosse said. "I don't have to pitch her into the ground. I can march three, four pitchers

out there at the varsity level."

At the plate, Gosse said he is going to try Reicher at leadoff, and he expects big things from Chesak and Winkler.

On the bases, the Indians will be on the move, especially with the depth of a 20-player roster.

"We have young kids that have speed we'll be able to use as pinch runners," Gosse said.

In the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, Gosse said he expects Plymouth, second place at 11-3 last year, to be a favorite. Defending champion Waupun (12-2) is always tough, and then Gosse said he'd like to see Kewaskum in the mix. The Indians were 10-4 in the EWC last year and 16-8 overall.

"We've got the physical aspects to play good ball but can they handle the mental aspects

of playing varsity?" he said of his team. "If they can, we should do real well. All these girls will be learning as they go."

The go, unfortunately, has been delayed a bit by the daily monsoons this week.

The Indians are scheduled to start the season at home against Plymouth on Thursday, followed by hosting Howards Grove for a double header on

Saturday.

The scheduled season opener against Sheboygan Falls was canceled, as was a game against Hartford and a double header against Waupun has been canceled with no make-up date yet.

After finishing 4-10 in the EWC and 4-19 overall, Kewaskum has no place to go but up. "We should be able to score goals easier this year" and that could equate to more wins.

The Indians were scheduled to start their season at Waupun on April 9th and host Campbellsport on Thursday, April 11th, weather permitting.
