Village's piggy bank could be empty by mid 2014

The Kewaskum Village Board received some sobering news Monday night at the request of their freshman Trustee. If estimates hold true, the Village will spend through their cash reserves by the end of the first quarter of 2014.

As his first order of business, newly elected trustee Joel Serwe requested a revenue/expenditure projection from now until 2017. Those findings, though early estimates, show the village's cash reserves running a half-million dollar deficit in 2017.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated his projection was based on revenues remaining flat and include spending \$1.3 million on road and water/sewer utility repairs in conjunction with the Main Street reconstruction project set to start early in

2014 (the state will pick up a large portion of the roadwork, but not all of it and the village is responsible for all sewer/water infrastructure); a TIF district debt payment (increment is based on current levels), an annual \$40,000 payment from the sewer utility to the general fund (the village's sewer utility borrowed from the general fund to pay for infrastructure for the TIF district), this year's ambulance purchase (money paid by users of the ambulance service are placed in the general fund) and phasing out an administrative position at the village hall.

In 2012, as expenditures ballooned beyond revenues; it is believed the village started dipping into the nearly \$1.2 million in reserve as shown on a hand-out given by a Trustee at the meeting.

It is unknown the exact amount of cash in reserves for the village. Heiser

did not return a call after the meeting to explain this. It is also unknown for sure when the village began using their reserves to fund daily operations in the village.

It became clear in order to pay for the Main Street improvement projects the village will need to borrow for almost all of it.

Trustee Mike Berger inquired about the village's borrowing limits, as he believed the village's debt capacity was currently at 70% right now.

There are different avenues the village can use for borrowing. Revenue bonds, which are repaid by user fees (water/sewer customers) do not count against a municipality's debt capacity. General obligation bonds are repaid by taxes and do count against the debt capacity of a municipality.

The familiar face that greeted visitors at Kewaskum's village hall for the past 23 years, Betty Bakken will retire May 17.

As administrative assistant, Bakken says she always tried to treat each person who appeared at the village hall with respect and patience and give them information in a timely manner.

"I really enjoyed working with the customers," says Bakken. "There are some very good natured people in the Village of Kewaskum that I will miss."

Bakken says what she will also miss the camaraderie of people in the police department, library, Department of Public Works and wastewater treatment facility.

Kewaskum Library Director Steev Baker calls Bakken a good friend.

"Over the years, she and I have had all kinds of discussions about everything from art and music to politics and religion. She's just that kind of person - someone easy to talk to and always has a kind word and a good story to tell. I'll miss her," says Baker.

Bakken started work at the village hall on May 7, 1990 and three days later, she missed her only weather-related day off work during her career.

"There was a terrible snowstorm. There was no power at the village hall and the roads were blocked. Nobody was getting through," says Bakken.

Then-administrator Dan Schmidt called her and said she shouldn't attempt the drive from her Campbellsport home.

During her time at the village hall, Bakken learned the ins and outs of village government.

"Betty was always willing to help others. She was helpful to my family and me during our relocation to

Chief's Corner

This month, from May 20th through June 2nd, is the national campaign of "Click it or Ticket" which the Kewaskum Police Department will be participating in. Our goal and reason for being a part of this campaign is to bring awareness to safety belt use and to increase the use of a safety belt for those who live, or are travelling through Kewaskum.

Safety belt use is essential in reducing the number of traffic fatalities every year. According to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, approximately one out of five motorists do not buckle up and more than half of the drivers and passengers killed in Wisconsin traffic crashes in 2011 were not wearing safety belts.

A big part of our enforcement will be focused on young, new drivers. Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for teens and young adults nationwide. On average, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, a motorist age 19 or under in Wisconsin is killed or injured in a traffic crash every one hour and 36 minutes. Only about 72 percent of drivers ages 16 to 25 buckle up, which is the lowest safety belt use rate of any age group in Wisconsin. Last year, in an effort to try and influence these statistics, our department was stopping cars as they left the high school parking

lot when we saw people in the vehicle not buckled up. This is an event we will be doing again this year as I strongly believe that we need to do everything we can do to increase seatbelt use and lower the amount of deaths for this age group.

On another note, summer is finally here (I think...) and that means more families will be out walking and riding their bikes. Please slow down and watch for children running, biking, and playing. Remember to stop at the police department and get a bike license for your bike. The cost is only \$5.00, it is good for the life of your bike and it will assist us if your bike is ever lost or stolen.

Also remember that pedestrians have the right of way in crosswalks and vehicles must yield to them; however, this only applies to pedestrians once they enter the crosswalk. As a driver, you do not need to stop for a pedestrian waiting on the sidewalk for a safe time to cross; in fact this action can cause accidents as motorists around you don't always know why you are stopping in the roadway. As long as pedestrians select safe times to cross, and drivers are alert and safely yield to them, we should be able to avoid any tragic outcomes.

Let's all have a fun, but safe summer! Enjoy!

Berger continued by asking where the money to repay any sort of borrowing for that project comes from. Village President Andy Pesch explained that a large portion of the project's costs would be repaid from the village's water and sewer utility. Berger than questioned if water and sewer rates would again need to be raised to which he received no answer.

Serwe asked Heiser when village staff started preparing the board for these types of shortfalls. Heiser reported the board first approved the Main Street project costs recently so this is the first time the board saw the numbers presented.

"Craig's been asking for a long time already what this was going to cost and we never got an answer," Berger added.

"The whole problem is, in past years we don't plan for anything, we don't put money away for anything," Trustee Craig Garbisch said.

Berger added, "We've

known the Highway 28 project was going to take place 15 years ago. We didn't put any money aside for it."

Heiser responded by explaining the village did set money aside, "We had a quarter of a million dollars set aside, the general fund lent that money to the sewer utility and it's not available now."

Serwe asked what was being set aside for other road projects. Heiser explained that the projections followed the 2013 budget which included \$25,000 annually for roads.

Garbisch quickly responded, "Which will get us no where."

Pesch added, "To put it aside, it has to come from somewhere."

"We're scared to make any drastic cuts on this village board, somewhere along the line we gotta do something," Garbisch followed.

Serwe remarked, "We can't borrow on money borrowed,

where are we going to end up?"

"I like Kevin (Scheuneman)'s idea maybe we declare bankruptcy," Garbisch concluded.

Serwe reminded the board that 2018, '19 and '20 are much worse. "The TIF shortfall is \$2 million," he added.

Berger interjected, "Where are we going to get the money to pay the TIF principal and interest?"

Breaking the silence, Serwe added, "We need \$10 million in development just to break even."

Serwe then asked when the budget process begins to which Heiser answered "typically in July."

"I don't think we're typical anymore," Serwe quipped. "Either we're going to cut what we want or we're going to cut services we need. That's where we're at, we probably should look at cutting what we want instead of what we need, that people aren't going to like."

The discussion ended without a clear picture of how the village was going to handle their financial situation.



Debra Yenter is happy to spend another Mother's Day with mom Olinda Niemi.

She has a special place in her heart for her mom, who is 84 and lives at Jackson Crossings Retirement Community in Jackson.

Niemi's first husband, the Rev. Miles Bruemmer passed away, she raised Yenter, her two sisters and a brother alone.

"She has the true heart of a servant. Her whole life she has genuinely cared about others tirelessly," says Yenter, who lives in the town of Farmington and is married to Dan Yenter.

The couple has a son, Miles, named after his grandfather.

"She's a wonderful daughter - she's my youngest," says Niemi.


So it's easy to see why she was concerned when last summer, her daughter noticed she was out of breath and her heart would pound, even when she wasn't exercising.

Irishman McKenna stood out among Kewaskum's Germans

It is well known Kewaskum and the surrounding area are heavily populated by people of German heritage.

Occasionally an Irishman has been known to sneak in via one of the side roads, and once, about 40 years ago, the Village Board even hired an Irish attorney to take care of their legal matters. The association lasted nearly three decades.

That Irishman was Roger W McKenna, who lived in the area from 1959 until his unexpected death on April 30 at the age of 83.

McKenna was a native of Random Lake, and he never ventured far from his Sheboygan County roots, the place where his great-grandfather and other ancestors settled after coming from Ireland.

"They (great-grandfather and his brother) went to Canada, and then came into New York" in the 1850s or 1860s, McKenna's son, Shawn, said, indicating from New York the family came to Sheboygan County.

McKenna's life's path would take him from Random Lake to Milwaukee, then DePere, next to Port Washington and finally Kewaskum.

Law was not McKenna's original vocational path. After attending grade school, he left his older brother, sister and his mother — Roger's father died when he was just two years old — to go to St. Francis Seminary to discern whether or not he wanted to be a Catholic priest.

"He went there for four years of high school and two years of formation," Shawn McKenna said, and at that point, left St. Francis to attend St. Norbert College in DePere. It was there he completed his undergraduate work.


Many people may not know that McKenna was quite an athlete in his day, playing for the high school at St. Francis and for the St. Norbert Green Knights.

"He was a lineman," Shawn McKenna said. "When he was at St. Francis, he made the (Milwaukee) Journal's All-Conference Team ... I think it was 1947. I've seen the certificate."

McKenna honed his talents at St. Norbert's, helping the Green Knights to an undefeated season in 1950, his senior year. He was very proud of that feat, and well he should have been. There were just a handful of collegiate football teams who went undefeated that year, including Florida State (8-0), Lehigh (9-0) and Wyoming (10-0).

The Knights started off the season with a 26-6 win over UW-Milwaukee, then ran off six more wins: 20-0 over Quincy College; 26-0 over St. Joseph's; 35-20 over Great Lakes; 17-14 over St. Ambrose; 42-7 over Louis College and 23-7 over Loras College.

Many a time during that year, No. 62 was opening holes for the Knight backs to run



through.

One of McKenna's teammates was Norbert Weinberger, who currently lives in Leroy after growing up in Mayville. "I was a running back, and Roger was the center," Weinberger said, recalling how good a blocker McKenna was. "Oh yeah, he was consistent, and he was always there."

Weinberger said it wasn't just the fact St. Norbert's went unbeaten that year but, "We got a lot of notoriety because we were the only Catholic College in the United State to go unbeaten and untied," pointing out Notre Dame had several unbeaten seasons in that era but not in 1950.

Until recent years, McKenna still enjoyed attending the Alumni games in DePere. "They honored all the former players who were there. He liked that a lot," Shawn McKenna said. "We made it a point as a family to go up there once a year. After my mother (Audrey) passed away, we didn't go every year."

Both men attended the first game at the new Schneider Stadium in 2010. Because of McKenna's leg problems, "I helped him on and off the field," Weinberger said, indicating a year ago, they were part of the group that treated a mutual friend, Fr. Robert Berghammer, to a birthday breakfast in Lomira.

McKenna attended one semester of law school at Marquette, before transferring to Wisconsin where he finished work on his degree. For a while, he worked as an insurance adjuster for State Farm Insurance, according to his son, who said, "Then he decided to hang up his shingle," a shingle that was on display for Friday's wake.

McKenna was rarely without a cap denoting his favorite sports teams, like the Brewers, Badgers and Packers. Still, given the choice, he preferred the Kewaskum Athletics to the Brewers, according to Shawn McKenna, who said when he would come from Milwaukee to visit his parents and they weren't home, he would buzz

over to Kiwanis Park, and that's where he would find them, watching the A's.

"He was a world class heckler, too," Shawn McKenna said, recalling how his dad would rattle his nephews when they played for Port Washington High and Port's home talent baseball team.

"He liked to play baseball, too," Shawn McKenna said, noting his dad played for the Bank of Kewaskum after moving to the area.

No question, McKenna's favorite day of the year was March 17, St. Patrick's Day. Shawn McKenna said his parents often went to the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Erin, and they spent two weeks in Ireland in the 1990s. In recent years, Shawn would cook up a big batch of corned beef and cabbage for his dad for that day.

McKenna's law office was housed in at least six village buildings, including the building that now houses Bartelt Insurance Agency, the Candy Tree, Silbernagel and Jasen (the former West Bend Savings and Loan and the Van Ess Professional Building on Fond du Lac Avenue.

Even after he retired in 1998, he did some legal work and tax preparation work for a number of people, including the late Fr. Victor Kemmer. "Fr. Kemmer insisted that dad would do it," Shawn McKenna said, even after McKenna's eyesight began failing.

McKenna's Catholic faith was also very important to him, and when he could no longer drive, members of Holy Trinity or St. Michael parishes, Geri and Barry Murre, and Eileen Petrie, would take him to Mass.

In addition to helping at St. Matthias and Holy Trinity parishes, McKenna "was a big supporter of St. Lawrence Seminary," helping to raise funds for the school.

"He left some big shoes ... It's going to take a while to fill them," Shawn McKenna said.

With her husband Gary also retiring, the couple, who has two grown children, plan on doing more traveling, visiting family in the La Crosse area and adding more camping and fishing trips to their schedule.

"I wish Betty all the best in her retirement years and hope that she enjoys the next chapter in her life," says Shambeau.



Safe Boating Week: Life jackets worth your life to wear every week

MADISON -- It's the preventable death that haunts survivors. That's what National Safe Boating Week is all about - making the life-saving habit of putting on a life jacket every time you board a boat.

"Safe boating means making it a habit to put on your life jacket - and making sure everyone in your boat has one on, too - before you turn the key and pull your boat from the dock," said Roy Zellmer Department of Natural Resources conservation warden and boating law administrator. "The belief you will be able to get the jacket on as you fall over the boat's side for whatever reason is unrealistic."

National Safe Boating Week, May 18 - 24, is the last full week before the much celebrated Memorial Day weekend, which typically kicks off the summer recreational and boating. And Wisconsin is well known to the boating community thanks to its 15,000 lakes and 84,000 river miles enjoyed by nearly one million state boaters and thousands of visiting tourists ranking Wisconsin in the top five nationally for registered boats.

Zellmer said of the 23 boating fatalities in Wisconsin last year, 18 were drowning and only two of the victims were wearing life jackets. From 2007-2011 there were 67 people who drowned in boating incidents in Wisconsin and 91 percent of them were not wearing life jackets.

"This mirrors the national statistics from the U.S. Coast Guard, which show over the past few years that 90 percent of all boaters who drown were not wearing a life jacket," Zellmer said. "Wearing a life jacket is one of the simplest ways to save lives while boating. Having a life jacket with you, but not wearing it is like not wearing your seat-belt in a car - by the time you realize you need it, it's too late to put it on."

Life jacket regulations - canoes and kayaks included

The U.S. Coast Guard and Wisconsin laws require vessels less than 16 feet in length to be equipped with one Type I, Type II, Type III or Type V personal flotation device, more popularly known as a life jacket, for each person on board.

"This also covers canoeists and kayakers," Zellmer says. "Each must carry a wearable life jacket or personal flotation device (PFD) for each person on board."

Vessels 16 foot or more in length must be similarly equipped and there also must be at least one Type IV -- or throw-able -- PFD for the boat. In order to be an acceptable, Zellmer says, each PFD must meet these recommendations listed below.

Be approved by the U.S. Coast Guard.

Be in good condition with no tears, rips, broken straps or snaps. Use a squeeze test on kapok PFDs to check for punctures in the inner plastic liner. Be the right size for the intended wearer.

Be readily accessible, which means it may not be stowed in plastic bags, in locked or closed compartments or under other equipment.

PFDs come in a variety of shapes, colors and materials. Some are made to be more rugged and last longer while others are made to also protect the wearer from cold water.

To view the different types of U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets, search the DNR website for "PFD."

"No matter which PFD you choose, make sure you get the one that's right for what you plan to do, what type of vessel you are going to use and the anticipated weather conditions," Zellmer says. "Always look for the United States Coast Guard approval number on any PFD you buy."

Stay sober, get safety smart - and get your life jacket
Zellmer says National Safe Boating Week also is a good

time to review other important safety items for boaters. These include:

Complete a safe boating course. In 2012, the DNR Boating Safety Education Program sponsored 201 boating safety courses plus 25 online classes and certified 11,676 students. There are currently 611 active instructors certified to teach boating safety in Wisconsin.

Equip and inspect your boat before hitting the water.

Make sure you travel at the safe speed for your water conditions and surroundings - and that includes other vessels on the water around you.

Help other boaters in distress.

Stay sober and wait until safely back at home to have any alcoholic beverages.

"Mixing alcohol with a high-speed motor on a watery track is a recipe for disaster," Zellmer said. "We would like to make 2013 the safest boating season ever. We can do it if everyone follows safe boating practices."

Better efforts highlight KHS results at Pewaukee meet

While the Kewaskum High track teams were not among the leaders in the annual Altheimer Invitational in Pewaukee, a week ago there were several very encouraging individual efforts.

Host Pewaukee won both ends of the meet, the boys scoring 159 points, 64 ahead of Greenfield, while the Lady Pirates scored 118 in their winning effort, with Elkhorn next at 107 and Greenfield third with 94.

The Kewaskum girls placed seventh in the field, scoring 54 points behind a win in the discus and seconds in the 4x200 relay and the high jump.

Stephanie Henk missed several meets while she was on a family vacation, but she returned to competition with a bang, winning the discus with a throw of 103 feet and 9 inches (103-9). Henk also picked with extra points with her fifth in the shot put (29-09.5).

"Stephanie Henk did two feet better in the discus," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said about the team's ace in the weights.

Senior Ashlee Stahl continues a successful run in her specialty, the high jump, where she cleared 4-8 to tied for second.

Then there's freshman Ellie Debelak, who continues to shine in a number of events. Debelak came up with a personal best 15-10 in the long jump, which was good enough for third place.

"She's added a foot in a week," Gosa said about Debelak.

Debelak also led off the all-freshman 4x200-meter relay team, which took a second place. Debelak, Megan Ackatz, Haley Kleinhans and Kristina Lepp, all freshmen, combined for a time of 1:57.15, which was three seconds faster than their time in the Washington County Meet.

"That's their personal best," Gosa said. "They're starting to understand the importance of handoffs."

Other top-six finishes included: 5th by the 4x400 (4:32.58) quartet of Debelak, Lepp, Samie Wiskerchen and Abby Reysen; 5th by the 4x100 relay (56.13) comprised of Ackatz, Henk, Jenne Fisher and Heather Johnson; and 5th by

Lauren Treptow in the discus (79-1).

In the boys' competition, Kewaskum paced seventh with 42 points. Ten of those points came from freshman Jason Hanson, who won the high jump by clearing 5-8 and another eight came in the 100 where Ted Wollner hit the finish line in a time of 11:85, just .05 behind the winner, J.K. Wilkofski of Union Grove.

"Ted is still injured," Gosa said, reporting freshman Ben Watzig took his place on the successful 4x200 relay, which placed third with a time of 1:38.28. Others in this relay were Brandon Thull, Joey Seitz and Brandon Mikolajczak. The same group added a sixth in the 4x100 with a 48.71 clocking.

"With Teddy, they could have easily been second" in the 4x200, Gosa said.

Watzig also chipped in with a fourth in the discus (116-09), and Gosa said Hanson had dropped five seconds, from 2:20 to 2:15.78, in the 800, taking seventh, right behind junior Andy Buelow, who was sixth in 2:14.78.

Stahl has been jumping all year with a huge knee brace on. "It's getting better," she said of her repaired knee but admitted the brace sometimes hits the high jump bar.

Looking ahead to the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet on May 14 at Plymouth, Stahl said, "There's two good girls in front of me" from Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls, but she's hopeful to go 5-0 or even 5-2 at the meet.

Freshmen Ellie Debelak, Abby Reysen and Megan Ackatz continue to shine. Debelak finished second in the long jump, going 14 feet, 5 inches (14-05), which was a good effort, considering the wet conditions on the runways. Debelak also led the 4x400 relay team to a third place. Along with Kristina Lepp, Haley Kleinhans and Reysen,

the group came in with a time of 4:40.85.

Debelak also added a sixth in the 100-meter dash (14.19), while Reysen placed fourth in the 400 (1:06.21).

Neither team managed a score in the opening half. The Cougars broke the deadlock on a goal by Tiffany Anderson at 47:28. Assisting on the play was Brooke Birschbach.

The score stayed at 1-0 until the 70th minute when Campbellsport converted on a second-chance opportunity after a stop by Emily Koller in front of the cage.

"She (Koller) came out, stopped that shot, but we didn't have enough weak-side coverage, so they got one anyway," Piwoni said.

Kewaskum actually had one more shot on goal than Campbellsport, six to five, but couldn't convert.

"Our defense overall held very well," Piwoni said. "I thought Anna did a nice job in goal. I think she had nine saves."

The Indians had just two shots in the game vs. the Ledgers. Piwoni said, "We had opportunities but we weren't able to put shots on goal."

The Kewaskum High golf team ended a long week on a high note Saturday, placing second in the Badger Creek Classic held near New Holstein.

The four Indian counters came in with a 350, 24 shots behind Campbellsport (326), which had the top four individuals, led by Caleb Galligan's medal-winning 7-over-par 79.

Kewaskum came home with one medal from senior Adam Waala, who shot a personal-best 18-hole score of 43-40—83, good for a tie for third place.

Next came Dustyn Heberer, Mike Holt and Sean Murray with 89s.

"Waala played his best round," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said. The round included a birdie on his first hole (No. 13) and three straight pars from No. 16-18.

Friday the Indians were at Hawthorne Hills for the annual Port Washington Invite, which was suppose to be an 18-hole competition but was shortened to nine holes because of rain.

KHS placed ninth out of 15 teams at 57-over par. The teams proximity to par was used to determine scoring because all the competitors played different nines (Nos. 2 through 10, No. 3 through 11, etc.)

Holt's 5-over-par was sixth in the field.

On Wednesday, the Indians were in Green Lake for the Lawsonia Tournament and did not fare well. Holt and Murray partnered for an 89-95—184, while Banks and Waala shot 94-103—197. The winning score was a 171.

On Tuesday, the Indians started off pretty well in a rare Eastern Wisconsin Conference "doubleheader held at the Badger Creek Golf Course

in New Holstein.

In the first match, hosted by New Holstein, the Indians were fourth at 178, but on the back nine, the Indians ballooned to a 192, putting them in seventh. (The second match was hosted by Kiel.)


The medalist was Matt Andrews of Sheboygan Falls, playing in the fourth position.
