World Trade Center artifact to find permanent home in Kewaskum

After two years of work, the Kewaskum Area Arts Council Inc. is pleased and excited to announce that two pieces of steel from the World Trade Center has been designated for Kewaskum.

These artifacts from the tragedy of 9/11 will soon have a permanent home here in memory of Andrea Haberman and all those that were lost on that infamous day in New York City.

The exact date of arrival has not yet been determined and the transportation situation is being worked on by Gordon Haberman, father of Andrea. More information will be given to the paper when it becomes available.

Haberman, a graduate of Kewaskum High School had flown from Chicago to New York on her first business trip ever for her company, Carr Futures.

All artifacts from the World Trade Center are distributed with the understanding that they will be cared for and displayed in an appropriate manner for public viewing. They are given to communities courtesy of the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey and displayed in memory of the 2,752 victims.

There are three types of artifacts that come from the Port Authority, bare steel, steel with remnants of primer coat and steel with concrete accretions.

Business Manager to start

While the Kewaskum Board of Education approved a contract for a new business manager at Monday's meeting, a second agreement for high school principal may have to wait a while longer.

Julie Thoreson joined the district as business manager.

"I'm very excited to be part of a dedicated team of educators, administrators and board members," says Thoreson.

Thoreson has been comptroller for the Germantown School District for five-and-a-half years. For 13 years previously, she worked in a number of positions with the Wauwatosa School District before becoming the district's accountant.

"Julie has 18.5 years of excellent experiences in two different school districts. This, coupled with her fantastic references and great interview, made her an outstanding candidate," says Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal.

Thoreson replaces Paul Riechert, who is retiring after 14 years in the district.

Kewaskum man arrested for 8th OWI Schumaker to be ordained Saturday

A Kewaskum man has been charged with his eighth OWI after Kewaskum Police responded to a call and found the man lying on the ground near his home next to a pile of vomit.

The Kewaskum Police Officer was called to the 600 block of Main St., at 6:31 p.m. on Saturday, April 27 for a subject doing a "burn-out" with his vehicle. Upon arrival, the officer found Dean Allen Pintor, 47, with a female who was attempting to move him into a residence. The officer attempted to question Pintor who smelled of intoxicants and required assistance in relaying his name to the officer.

During the questioning, Pintor a third subject at the residence became agitated with the officer and began shouting obscenities. As this occurred a deputy from The Washington County Sheriff's Office arrived and drew his taser on Pintor who then complied with the Kewaskum officer's requests. The officer then located the

keys to a 1967 Chevrolet Chevrolet on Pintor. Tire marks in the driveway of the residence were also noted.

A second deputy arrived and arrested the third subject who had multiple warrants for his arrest. He was transported to the Washington County Jail.

Pintor, who refused a blood test, was taken to Aurora Medical Center in Hartford, while a deputy obtained a search warrant for the blood test. While enroute to the hospital and while there, Pintor threatened the officer multiple times with harm and stated, "I've done five

years in prison for drinking and driving, what's another five? When I get out, I'm going to find you and put a bullet in your explosive head." Two Hartford Police officers were also requested to assist at the hospital.

Results from the state crime lab have not yet been returned, however Pintor has been charged with Disorderly Conduct and Operating While Intoxicated, 8th offense. He also received a municipal citation for noise with an auto. A hearing in Washington County Circuit is scheduled for June 12 at 2:45 p.m.

In the Service

Heather M. Schaller has received an Army ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Corps) scholarship to attend Marian University. Scholarships are awarded on a merit system in areas such as academic achievement, extracurricular activities, physical fitness, specific performance or accomplishment, leadership abilities, and personal interviews. Scholarship recipients are enrolled as members of the ROTC Corps of Cadets.

The scholarship entitlements include tuition and fees and an allowance of \$600 per semester for educational assistance, textbooks, supplies and equipment, and a monthly stipend for up to 10 months of each school year during the first year at the host college or university.

Upon graduation from the host college and completion of the ROTC program, the student cadet receives a bachelor's degree and a commission of second lieutenant in the Army. All scholarship students incur a military service obligation of eight years, which may be fulfilled by either serving on active duty or in the Reserve Components of the Army.

Schaller is the daughter of Patty and Jeff Schaller of Random Lake. She graduated in 2009 from Kewaskum High School.

Later, he entered St. Francis Seminary in Milwaukee where he has studied for the past several years.

The ordination Mass will be held at 10:30 a.m. Milwaukee Archbishop Jerome Listcki will be the main celebrant at the Mass.

The three other men being ordained are Deacon Patrick Burns, Deacon John Paul Mitchell and Deacon Arulananthan Ponnalyan.

Schumaker's first Mass, which he is calling a Mass of Thanksgiving, on Sunday, May 19 will be celebrated at St. Michael's Church, 8883 Forest View Dr. at 2 p.m.

A reception will follow the Mass. All are invited to attend. According to Colleen Schumaker, Fr. Philip will serve as associate pastor at St. John Vianney Catholic Church in Brookfield.





Learn to Swim Program

Skills: Breath control and submersion, underwater swimming, buoyancy on front and back, changing directions and positions, treading, swim on front, back, side and learn to help others.

Level 3 - Stroke Development

Requirements: Passed level 2
Skills: Students will refine deep water entry and exiting, submerge and retrieve objects, rotary breathing, survival float, front crawl, back crawl, butterfly, lifejacket use and treading water.

Level 4 - Stroke Improvement

Requirements: Passed level 3
Skills: Dive from side of pool, swim under water three body lengths, breast stroke, front crawl, butterfly, elementary back stroke, compact jump with lifejacket and diving safety.

Level 5 - Stroke Refinement

Requirements: Passed level 4
Skills: Perfect front crawl, back crawl, breast stroke, and butterfly, swimming under water, open/flip turns - front and back, pike and tuck dives, survival swimming and rescue breathing.

Kewaskum's Dzik is ambitious with antlers

On a bad-weather day at their Lake Alice, Tomahawk, cottage, Vaughn Dzik decided to accompany his wife, Sharyn into town.

Little did he know that trip

would turn unleash his imagination.

While stopping at local shops Dzik spied a \$3,000 life-sized, underwater-themed diorama of a musky coming out of the center of a hollow stump under water.

He admired the scene, so

he set about creating his own. Dzik removed a stump out of his lake, and then proceeded to catch a musky off the end of his pier with his wife, who netted the fish. The musky was then mounted by a taxidermist to Dzik's specifications.

In a corner of his

Kewaskum home's lower level are mounted fish, stumps - even the back of a boat with the name "Lake Alice" stenciled on it.

"It's still a work in progress," says Dzik.

But his desire to create a blend of northwoods-western-rustic-cool didn't stop there.

The lower level is filled with artifacts fashioned by Dzik - an oak-slab table depicting buffalo and an iron horse, a lamp with an eagle etched into the glass and a chandelier made from an 1879 ox yoke.

When local builder Tony Limbach gave him some shed deer antlers, it gave Dzik more ideas.

He calls Limbach a "salt-of-the-earth" guy. "He is the most honest person I know," says Dzik, who incorporated antlers into wall sconces, lamps, fireplace tools, candleholders, photo frames and chandeliers.

Even the lampshades carry his north woods touch - when lit they reflect silhouettes of wildlife and trees.

Along the way, he found out that drilling through the antlers to wire for electricity was an amazing amount of work.

"You have to drill them

out section by section and save the powder from drilling. After the holes are made, you have to mix the powder with epoxy to fill the holes," says Dzik.

The hardest part of creating with the antlers is balancing them for use in sconces that feature World War II issue snowshoes as a base.

"Antlers are like snowflakes and fingerprints; no two are alike," says Dzik.

Over three years ago, Dzik sold, and retired from his business, Eye Deal Optical, but he's busier now than ever was.

Last summer he began working on his art in earnest and now he has enough that he's considering selling part of his collection under the name "Your Northwoods Connection."

When asked how he could part with something that took long hours to craft, Dzik replies, "Never love anything that doesn't love you back."

Dzik plans on selling his creations in prices that range from \$50 for a candle holder to \$1,000 for a chandelier.







Farchione Memorial, Lowe's assists in funding KMS project

Jeff Grotenhuis, KMS Physical Education and Health Teacher, received a grant last October from the Michael Farchione Memorial Foundation, and recently, a Lowe's Toolbox for Education grant from the Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation, to work on the athletic field behind the middle school.

"We're out there, spring and fall, using the grounds for sports. It's in really bad condition," Grotenhuis said. "There's too much mud, which makes the area slippery, it's uneven, which creates safety issues for the kids in athletics. There are bare spots that make it hard to mow."

Grotenhuis, along with Doug Franzen, Maintenance Technician at the district, are getting a late start due to the rainy early spring. "The space will be tilled and graded, or leveled, and we'll seed the area with grass and a nursery crop of winter wheat." Franzen has been instrumental in coordinating the project, Grotenhuis said.

Mike Farchione Foundation Board Events Coordinator Pete Hesprich, said the winter wheat provides insulation for the new grass and erosion control. Pete, and Donna Hesprich, foundation secretary, joined Joel Dziedzic, Kewaskum High School Associate Principal, and president of the foundation, and Grotenhuis to discuss the project. Aaron Seiser, Hesprich's son, was Mike Farchione's closest friend.

Mueller Excavating Inc. from Campbellsport has been hired to perform the laser grading and ground preparation. West Bend Elevator, Inc., particularly Doug Gonring, has been helpful in recommending seed and fertilizer for the field, which will be used for the seed, care, and upkeep of the grounds.

Grotenhuis learned of the grant through Dziedzic. The Farchione Foundation has been a major factor in getting this project off the ground. "I didn't know Mike," Grotenhuis said of the foundation's namesake, "but I have every indication that he was just a wonderful person. It's really neat that the Foundation has been able to keep Mike's memory by providing different groups with funds."

"I sent Mr. Dziedzic a let-

ter outlining what I'd like to do with the funds. I said any contribution you can make would be appreciated."

Hesprich said he felt this was a great opportunity to help the community. "This is what we do."

He expects the athletic grounds to be ready when school begins again in September, 2013.

Michael Farchione (1981-2006), a 2000 graduate of Kewaskum High School, was an outstanding athlete, according to the farchionememorial.com website. He won the Wisconsin State Wrestling Championship in his class in 2000, and was studying to become a teacher at UW-Oshkosh when he was involved in a car accident that

took his life.

"Mike would help anyone any time," Pete Hesprich said. "If you met him, you couldn't help but like him. We help all over the county, as well as up in Winneconne, where he was a wrestling coach. Somebody knows somebody, we help out. We do it for the right reasons."

The Hesprichs, along with Pat and Rich Farchione, Mike's parents, Sara Giza, and Scott Wilkonn, make up the Michael Farchione Memorial Foundation board, which began in 2007. According to Pete Hesprich, the Foundation has dispersed over \$30,000. "We started small, and we've been growing every year. It's really neat. People call us, asking how they can help, when they know we have an event."


"It's tragic, what happened to Mike," Grotenhuis said. "But really cool how they're teaching people who never knew him what kind of person he was."

"The sponsors help make events successful," Dziedzic said.

The two major fundraisers for the foundation, besides individual donations, are the annual Friday of the Memorial Day weekend brat fry at Kewaskum BP gas station on the south side of Kewaskum. The brat fry is held between 7:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.; call ahead to go orders are taken by calling Peter at 262-510-1009.

The other major fundraiser is an annual golf outing at Hon-E-Kor Golf Club in Kewaskum, held on September 14, 2013, which includes a raffle and auction. Pledge forms are available through the Foundation or their website www.farchionememorial.com

"Basically, it's the community helping out the school district," Dziedzic said. "The district and the kids will have something to be proud of."

In some sections, children were blown off of their bicycles. Kewaskum firemen who answered a call to a chimney fire at the Albert Koepke farm had to hang on to avoid being blown off the roof.







Baked Apple Pie Layer Bars

Servings: 16

- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- Milk
- 2/3 cup crushed corn flakes
- 1/2 cup Tree Top or Seneca Apple Sauce
- 5 cups sliced, peeled apples
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Glaze:

- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Sift together flour, sugar and salt. Cut shortening in with pastry blender or two knives. Put egg yolk into measuring cup and add milk to make 2/3 cup. Add to shortening mixture. Mix just enough until dough shapes into a ball. Roll out half the dough into 15 x 11-inch rectangle. Transfer to baking sheet. Cover with corn flakes. Mix apple sauce together with apple slices, and add mixture on top of corn flakes. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over apple mixture. Roll out other half of dough for top crust. Place over apples. Pinch edges together. Beat egg white until stiff and spread on top crust. Bake in hot 400°F oven for 40 minutes. Cut into 16 squares.

Combine confectioners' sugar and lemon juice to make glaze. While hot, drizzle glaze over top.

Apple Tortellini Salad

Servings: 6 to 8

Dressing:

- 3 tablespoons Tree Top Frozen Concentrate Apple Juice, thawed
- 3 tablespoons light corn syrup
- 2 teaspoons brown sugar

To prepare salad, cook tortellini, drain and cool by rinsing pasta under cold water. Shake gently to drain thoroughly. In a large bowl, combine tortellini, apples, salad greens, strawberries, celery and scallions. Toss salad gently with chilled dressing. Serve chilled. If desired, sprinkle with pine nuts.



Spiced Pork and Apple Burger with Maple Dijon

Servings: 6

- 3 tablespoons maple syrup
- 2 tablespoons spicy brown mustard
- 2 pounds ground pork
- 1/2 cup Tree Top Natural Apple Sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard



Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land. No person shall be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board, or by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.02 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Wayne has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph, which provides exceptions for person using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (2), Wis. stats.

Administrator Matt Heiser: 1. Reported on the \$6500 dividend that was received from the League of Wisconsin Municipal Insurance.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported on the April 2, 2013 Spring Election. The election workers were Gayle Van Ess, Ruth Lorbiecki, Gina Raether, Elvira Nigh, Steve Baker, Lavern Geidel, Karen Schaub, Patrick McFadden, Darlene Walls and Eileen Petri. There were 664 voters and one incident reported. The newly elected Village President is Andy Pesch and elected Trustees are Kevin Scheunemann, Jim Hovland and Joel Serwe. The Oath of Office has been administered.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the next meeting is scheduled for April 23, 2013.

Norman Kufahl, representative for the Library Board, reported on the April 15, 2013 meeting. The circulation for March 2013 was 6333 items compared to 6306 in March 2012.

Matt Heiser, representative for the Mid-Moraine, requested to defer his report on the April 11, 2013 Legislative Committee meeting.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the Certified Survey Map for James D. Reigle 694 Edgewood Road to split tax key #V4-018300F to add .901 acre with tax key #V4-0615 to create Lot 1 a 1.590 acre parcel. The remaining .269 acre will be combined with tax key V4-018300B001, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried. (Mike Berger recorded as nay.)

Administrator Matt Heiser introduced the request by Nature Havens Estates Condo Association to dedicate the water and sewer utility to the Village. He reported on the requirements needed before a request by the Nature Haven Condo Association to accept the dedication of utilities can be granted by the village. The record drawings or "as built" need to be completed and a utility easement has to be drafted. He reported that the typical role for the Village was to review items submitted by subdivision developments and that it was the subdivision's duty to prove the needed documentation. He also reported that the documentation applied to the entire PUD rather than the Nature Havens Estates Condo Association. Administrator Heiser stated that for those reasons staff was recommending denial of the request. David Spenner was present for the Nature Haven Condo Association on their request to have the water and sanitary sewer dedicated to the Village. Spenner's points of concern included: (1) the developer's

agreement dated June 9, 2006 states there will be no deviation from the developer's plans, (2) the water and sewer still have not been dedicated, the agreement is between the developer and the village and not with the residents of the Nature Haven Estates II and (4) no occupancy permits and building permits were to be issued until the final acceptance of the improvements within the development. Attorney Kiefer reiterated in order for the village to accept the dedication the record drawings and the utility easement will both need to be completed and approved by the engineer. He also reminded the Board that both documents will apply to the entire Nature Haven development. Motions by Kevin Scheunemann to table the dedication of the water and sanitary sewer within the Nature Haven Estates II until the approvals are received from the engineer, second by Norman Kufahl. Voice vote, motion carried. (Mike Berger recorded as nay.)

Zoning Administrator Chad Cook introduced the cost estimates that were obtained for the banner poles on Fond du Lac Avenue. A temporary fix of the current poles would include excavation around existing poles; straighten poles to plumb; installing rebar and concrete foundation around both poles at an approximate cost of \$1,000.
