Indians are on their way to LaCrosse's state track meet

From agony, both physical and emotional, to ecstasy. That pretty well sums up Ashlee Stahl's senior year.

The agony was associated with the Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) tear she suffered on Sept. 11 during a volleyball game, an injury that required surgery.

The ecstasy came last Thursday when Stahl cleared 5 feet, 2 inches (5-2) and finished fourth in the high jump in the Division 2 Track and Field Sectional at Whitewater, qualifying her for the state meet this weekend.

Stahl will be accompanied by three KHS pole vaulters who also advance to the state competition in La Crosse.

Sophomore Tristin Marx and senior Corey Budick finished 3-4 in the men's pole vault. Both cleared 12-6, with Marx earning the higher spot because of fewer misses.

Also earning a spot in the state field is junior Jessica Nurkala, whose 8-9 put her in fourth place in the girls' pole vault competition.

Stahl was still excited several days after the sectional. "Clearing 4-6 in conference, and that's it. Then going 5-2. It's amazing," Stahl said, indicating what helped her was being able to jump without wearing her cumbersome knee brace.

"This was my first time jumping without the brace," Stahl said, noting she talked with her doctor about it, and he said she was ready to leave it at home. "I didn't wear it, and I did a lot better."

Stahl, who plans to study physical therapy at UW-La Crosse, reported she needed two jumps to make 4-10, then cleared 5-0 on the first jump and her season-best 5-2 on the first try.

"I went out at 5-3, but I had a couple of close ones," Stahl said. "It was a real good comeback after my surgery. It felt real good."

Only one other of the Indian sectional performers, junior Stephanie Henk, came close to advancing. Henk threw the discus 101-0 to miss taking fourth place by a mere 13 inches.

Freshman Ellie Debelak turned in a good effort of 15-11 in the long jump, giving her seventh overall in the field, while Megan Ackatz cleared

4-8 in the high jump, which good for eighth place.

Also, Abby Reysen finished 10th in the 400 (1:03.97), and two KHS relays were also 10th. The 4x400 comprised of Debelak, Krystina Lepp, Amanda Plachinski and Reysen, teamed up for a 4:23.94, while Caley McClyman, Plachinski, Nurkala and April Stern had a clocking of 11:20.16 in the 4x800.

The boys' 4x100-meter relay finished 16th with a time of 46 and .87 seconds (46.87). The runners on this relay included Marx, Brandon Thull, Joey Seitz and Brandon Mikolajczak.

Senior Ted Wollner pulled a hamstring a couple weeks ago, and he was definitely missed on the relay.

Freshman Ben Watzig tossed the discus 126-05 to place 12th out of the field of 16, and Mikolajczak was clocked at 11.71 in the 100-meter dash, good for 15th.

Stahl, Marx and Burdick will all compete on Friday. The girls' high jump starts at 9:30 a.m. and the pole vault also at 9:30. Nurkala has to wait until Saturday to compete. The D-2 girls vaulting starts at 10:30 p.m.

"We'll have kiddie rides and pedal tractor pulls, and a children's ride, a 3D Simulator," Meunch said.

On Saturday night, the band Rebel Grace will play from 8:30 p.m. -12:30 a.m. There is a cover charge to get into the tent.

The fun continues Sunday with a parade at noon. The Pioneer Drum and Bugle Corps will be there, as well as many local favorites. "For the first time since the restoration," Meunch said, "we're taking the first pumper unit off the trailer for the hundredth anniversary. Belgian horses from Kettle Moraine Carriages will pull it." New KHS Principal hired, Affordable Care Act to cost district

The Kewaskum Board of Education, teachers, staff, students and residents are experiencing turbulence and preparing for more of the same after the May 28 special board meeting.

Introductions of new teachers, a new high school principal, modifications to the superintendent's contract, staff changes due to the Affordable Care Act and moving district meeting times dominated the agenda.

District parents and residents expressed their concerns about the length of Superintendent James Smasal's contract, which was discussed in closed session after public comment.

Board President Tim Ramthun assured attendees that the contract was fiscally responsible to the district and its residents.

While he couldn't disclose particulars, Ramthun said the board had done its due diligence and the contract would show support for Smasal while protecting the district.

Board member Troy Hanson remarked that Smasal is the third superintendent since he gained his seat two years ago.

Kewaskum High School student Angela Pamperin addressed the board, saying the block scheduling that moved from four to seven classes has left teachers without enough time to prepare for classes and has added stress, disorganization and a lack of continuity.

Hanson said test scores were up and that changes

brought about by Act 10 will require an adjustment period for teachers and students.

Other audience members protested that changes stemmed from cuts made in the district, but Ramthun said modifications in personnel and processes were essential in a district that hasn't seen much change for several years.

The board also welcomed six teachers to its staff.

Jennifer Jandre is an addition to the middle school physical education staff; Scott Rhoads will have an expanded role as a middle school language and social studies teacher and Julie Kautzer will join the high school science department as a physics instructor. At Kewaskum Elementary School, Andrea Becker will take over a first grade class while Cassie Holstead moves to fourth grade to replace a retiree; Renee Veit will be a new face in the fifth grade classroom and Rashelle McCallum, who already teaches in the district, will greet students in the second grade classroom next fall.

The board also greeted William Loss, who will take over as KHS principal pending release from his contract as principal at Baraboo High School.

Loss, who started teaching in 1992, has been principal at Baraboo since August 2010 and before that served as assistant principal at Baraboo and Beaver Dam high schools.

His contract with Baraboo ends June 30.

The school's interim principal, Kristine Dreher, did not

apply for the job but will continue as assistant principal, Ramthun said.

When talk turned to the Affordable Care Act, Smasal explained that insurance changes will also change the lives of 50 food service, custodial, paraprofessionals and office staff who are not full-time employees.

The Act requires employees to have insurance if they are employed for 30 hours or more. Right now, the district is not required to offer those employees insurance.

"They are caught in the middle," says Smasal.

The solution, which will be explored further in closed session at the board's June 10 meeting, is to move about 16 of the 50 to full-time. For reasons of safety and continuity, hearing impaired specialists and school secretaries are among those being considered for full-time status.

For those 16 people, the district will take on another \$256,000 in additional costs. The other 34 employees will have their hours cut.

"These are all good people. We affect their lives and it's tough, but it's what we have to do. This has nothing to do with their performance," said Smasal.

Those attending the June 10 meeting may want to check their agendas.

Ramthun announced that future board meetings will be held at 6 p.m. instead of 7 p.m. at the district office unless otherwise noted, but Hanson objected, saying the move needed discussion before locking in a different schedule.

pumper is usually taken to parades on its trailer. The unit was restored in the 1980s, according to Meunch.

During the parade, Flight For Life will do a flyover. The helicopter will land next to the park, where people can look at it, and there will be demonstrations about how it works. The helicopter and crew will remain until 1:30 p.m.

The grill will be open again, as well as the Womens Auxiliary Sweet Shop. "They have pies and cakes, you name it," Meunch said. Two bands will play. The Goodtime Dutchmen will be at the firehouse from 1:30-5:30 p.m., and under the tent Iron Horse and the Squeezettes will take turns playing, also between 1:30 and 5:30 p.m.

At 2:00 p.m. an awards program will take place at the firehouse, when the Beechwood Fire Department will receive several certificates honoring their one hundred years of community service, from the governor's office for service, to the town, to the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs Association. There will be a history of the department and the Beechwood Fire Department Womens Auxiliary will talk, and a representative from the Sheboygan Board will be there.

"It will be a time of meet and greet," Meunch said. "We'll also be selling anniversary t-shirts and hats all weekend, and an anniversary book."

Floyd Klug, longtime department member, talked about the department. "In 1973 I bought my farm. My dad had just retired from the department, and he said, 'Floyd, you have to join - it's a very big asset to our community.' So I did as instructed. I never realized I was joining something so important. In 1979 my barn burned down in September by arson, one of the four that month, and that's when I learned how important the department and response times were. We had just gotten our pagers, a new thing, and I called in our fire about midnight and the response time was perfect. It was quite an experience. The quick response time meant it saved my animals, which meant a lot. The barn burned completely, but the buildings in close proximity were saved. If not for the quick response it could have been much worse. After that, I did everything for the department I could."

Klug was an active firefighter, in management as a supervisor, and also president of the department from 1986-1997. He retired after twenty years in 1993. "I try to help financially," Floyd said. "I've paid for bands, and bands in part for the picnics. I was always on parade committees. I'm enjoying every minute of it."

Glenn Linzmeir, president of the Wisconsin State Fire Chiefs Association, said, "It's an honor and a privilege to go into any local community who's celebrating such an anniversary. What this means is that a hundred years ago someone in the community recognized the need for fire protection and they

basically came out and volunteered and built that organization. A lot of sweat equity goes into an organization like this. There are 855 fire departments in Wisconsin, with a fire chief in charge of the majority of them. It's always a great honor for me to go into the local communities and present a certificate to these departments, so that not only the community residents, but those who pass through can see what a great honor it is to have a fire department that ensures the safety of the local residents and businesses, and recognizes the service a fire department provides."

Michelle Ringwald is the current president of the Womens Auxiliary. She began her current term last January and has been a member of the auxiliary for the past five years. "Not all fire departments have auxiliaries," Ringwald said. The Beechwood Womens Auxiliary helps at the various fundraisers, such as the March smelt fry, running the famous sweet shop and children's games at the annual fireman's picnic, and the November fundraiser. They also hold popular community events on the holidays. "We do an Easter egg hunt on the Saturday before Easter, and since it started in 1986, Breakfast With Santa is huge. It grows every year. We serve 400 or so."

The purpose of the auxiliary is to provide support to the fire-fighters. "We'll go and prepare food or take stuff to a fire if we have to. Next year will be the 40th year." Since its inception through the efforts of Virginia Benzschawel and Marjorie Krahn in 1974, the membership numbers have stayed roughly the same, according to Ringwald. "There were about twenty-five members then; we still have about twenty active members." Since 1974, over \$60,000 has been raised for the department. "We give the firefighters money every January at the appreciation party for whatever they need." For the hundredth anniversary, the auxiliary has purchased years of service pins for each member. "We have many other surprises coming," she said.

New Scott Township board chairman, Randy Narbotovics, said, "We have a great team and great team members, including the ladies auxiliaries, who are very active and willing to see the town prosper."

"It's not just the department members who put their time in; there are plenty of community members who also offer their assistance to help run the hamburger and beer stands at the picnics. There's good camaraderie in the whole community. The fire department building is also used for events, and the Beechwood Fire Department is one of our emergency shelters for the town, as well. One of the more important activities over the past decade has been writing grants," Narbotovics said. "Those grants reduce the burden on the taxpayers. We've gotten gear and equipment, and it's nice when a person can take the time to write up and apply for those grants. Fire de-

partments don't just put out fires. There's a lot that goes into maintaining one."

The Beechwood Fire Department is located on County S in Beechwood.

History of the Beechwood Fire Dept.

The Beechwood Fire Department was first organized in 1913, and in June of 1914, the first firehouse was built of a stone foundation and wood logs, eighteen by thirty feet. All the labor was donated, according to the website history. The parcel of land was in Section 17, and the owner eventually sold it to the department in 1939.

Dances were a popular way to raise funds. The first one was held July 11, 1914. Weekly baseball games between fire departments, and refreshment sales funded the department for many years. The first picnic was held on August 13, 1915. Six years later the department purchased its first vehicle: a Jeffrey motor car that was remodeled into a fire truck.

Another vehicle was added in time, a 1938 Ford truck that was also remodeled. This truck was used until 1967. Other equipment included the five-hundred-gallon pumper and chemical tanks.

Another parcel of land was purchased just south of County S in July 1940 to supplement the small lot on which the building stood. The lot was used as a park for picnics with baseball games, water fights, and a wooden dance floor was built to be set up for each open-air dance. Later, a pavilion was built, a well drilled, and indoor plumbing and a beer stand were added. In 1955, another three acres of

land was purchased at the corner of County Roads S and A for a baseball diamond still actively used today.

Other equipment has been added through the years. In 1954 a 1949 Studebaker truck with a 1250-gallon water tank, a 1955 Chevrolet 1600-gallon water tanker, and a used utility vehicle from Kewaskum Fire Department in 1969, and a portable pump.

During the 1950s, the fire department trucks were kept in Fritz's garage during the winter, where the siren button was located. Large fires merited a twelve-time siren blast, while a small one meant a four-time blast.

In 1957, smoke masks were purchased and the dial system for reporting fires was introduced.

By 1969 the department needed more room and began using the Sauter garage on the southeast corner of A and S as the firehouse. A few years later the siren button was placed in the Beechwood Rest Home, where it was tested each noon. Improvements were made to the hall, and in 1974 the Womens Auxiliary was formed. The Auxiliary provided drapes and kitchen equipment, and took over the annual picnics a year later. They supported the firefighters through food, fundraising and service projects.

Firefighting was not the only service provided by the department over the years, as a storm in 1976 that took out power for several days left the community heatless as well. The firemen hall was used as a place of warmth and provided food, earning letters of commendation from the town of

Scott Board and the telephone company.

In the later 1970s, the rapid communication system of radios and pagers were purchased, which meant the firefighters no longer had to rely on pushing the siren buttons. In 1972, radio pagers were put into service. Turn-out gear, a safe and a camera were purchased, as well as further improvements to the firehouse, and courses, CPR and basic firefighting training classes were brought established.

In 1986, the town of Scott underwrote a loan to build a new firehouse for \$75,000 east of Fireman's Park. The previous firehouse was sold to the Beechwood Rest Home. The new building was eighty-four by forty-eight feet and had five bays. Four years later an addition to be used as a meeting room and a kitchen was added, completed much by volunteer labor. The addition was dedicated on May 19, 1991.

Growing pains during the decade demanded more storage area, more equipment, new cooperative emergency service units: the EMS and First Responders. Another addition was added in 2000 to provide a mezzanine, larger office, storage for the antiques and two more bays.

A back-up generator was put in so the firehouse could be used as an emergency shelter for the community.

Over the past decade, grants have been applied for to help purchase gear, equipment, and even a pumper truck. A department chaplain, Rev. David Schlieter of New Horizon United Church of Christ, serves as needed.

Dolly Ramthun was in for a huge surprise during Kewaskum's Memorial Day parade when a fragment of her past rolled up with street with her great-grandchildren in tow.

The surprise came from her son Tim Ramthun, who turned down the street with a wagon hitched to her husband Eldon "Ellie" Ramthun's restored 1943 Ford 9N tractor.

The tractor was resurrected from 15 years of being "out to pasture" on Dolly and Ellie

Ramthun's farm on Auburn Ashford Drive by members of Kewaskum High School teacher Bryan Puls' outdoor power and motorsports class.

"The last time I sat here was 20 years ago," said Ramthun as he sat in the driver's seat, listening to the engine rumble.

Ramthun was humbled by the talent and grateful for the support of FFA educators, students, staff and administration who all contributed to the final product.

Puls said Ramthun had approached him two years ago about restoring the tractor, but because of logistics, it didn't turn up for use as a core project until the 2012-13 school year.

Ramthun, who is the Kewaskum Board of Education President, enlisted the help of fellow board member Jim Leister to spirit the tractor away from the farm while Dolly distracted her husband. Creating a diversion wasn't Dolly's only part - she also contributed financially to the restoration.

KHS Seniors Austin Ksio-

szk, Adam Waala and Steve Canales tore the disintegrating tractor apart and gave it a new life - completely rebuilding the engine, rewiring, sanding, priming and painting.

Along the way, about a dozen other students joined in the effort.

Puls says they honed their mechanical and research skills as well as learning how to troubleshoot problems, work as a team and trust each other.

Canales was at the lineup of Monday's Memorial Day parade to see his creation chug to life.

He said it was worth the number of broken bolts it took to get to this point.

"It runs, it's great and the hard work paid off," says Canales.

Ramthun, who drove the tractor as a kid, was hoping to present the restored vehicle to his father on his 79th birthday May 4, but Ellie passed away November 2 last year.

"I miss my dad," he said quietly before heading out of the school parking lot to join the procession.

The class has two more tractors they plan to complete restoration work on.

Indians have foot in the door for golf sectional

No one could touch powerful Sheboygan Falls in a Division 2 golf regional hosted by the Falcons last Tuesday (May 21), but Kewaskum reached its goal of qualifying for the sectional by finishing fourth in the competition.

Playing on its home course, the Bull of Pinehurst Farms, Sheboygan Falls was an easy winner, coming in with 320 strokes, 46 fewer than runner-up Oostburg.

Cedar Grove-Belgium and Kewaskum finished in a tie for third place at 375, two shots ahead of Kettle Moraine Lutheran.

The Indians lost in a play-off to Cedar Grove-Belgium, but at least they got their foot in the sectional door. (The sectional will be held at the Badger Creek Golf Course in New Holstein on May 28.)

"Our goals this year were to be in the top four in conference and qualify for the sectional," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said Sunday. While they stumbled down the stretch of the EWC battle and took fifth, the Indians recovered and earned the right to

move on to the sectional for the first time since 2009.

Sheboygan Falls' Matt Andrews captured the medal, firing a 5-over par 77 on the day, three shots ahead of his teammate, Matt Bachmann, who had an 80, and four ahead of another Falcon, Connor Clark, who posted an 81.

Low for the Indians was senior Adam Waala, who made great progress this spring despite less-than-ideal conditions because of all the rain that fell in the state.

Waala was tied for eighth place at 88. He started out with a 42 on the front side and finished with a 46 for his total.

Mike Holt, another of the KHS seniors, came in with an 89, starting with a 43 and slipping three shots to 46 on the back nine.

All the rest of the Indian counters, Sean Murray, Nick Banks and Dustin Heberer, carded 99s. The 17th and 18th holes were disastrous for Heberer and Murray, who shot 51 and 53, respectively on the back nine.

"We were in pretty good position at the turn," Eichstedt said about his team, which had a collective 179 on the front side.

The situation took a downturn on the back nine as Holt and Murray took sevens on the par-3 10th hole, and there were a pair of high scores on No. 13 as well.

Then, according to Eichstedt, two of his players took 10s on the par-5 No. 17, and one took a nine on No.18, which plays to a par 4.

"I thought we shot ourselves out of it," Eichstedt said, but others also slipped on the second nine, and the Indians ended up in a dead heat with Cedar Grove for third. The tie-breaker was which team had the best score on the back, and that was the Rockers, 184 to KHS' 196.

Realistically, Eichstedt said it will be difficult for the Indians to compete with Falls, Catholic Memorial and St. Catherine's of Racine, but, "we'll give it our best shot and see what happens."

The Waukesha Catholic Memorial and Cudahy regionals also feed into the sectional at Badger Creek. The top two teams and top three individuals not from those teams advance to the WIAA State Golf Tournament, June 3-4 at University Ridge in Verona.

Lady Indians get down and dirty against New Holstein

"It was a good shot, very similar to the one at Mayville (on May 20)," Piwoni said about Boettcher's goal. "Sarah's really good at staying home in the middle... the girls are starting to find her."

Piwoni went on, "I actually thought Jordan Donnelly played a real good game. She stepped to the ball and stopped New Holstein's attack."

Also cited for playing "her best game of the year" was outside defender, Steffany Haack. "She was very aggressive," the coach said, further noting young Kohler continues to improve in goal. "She is getting more confident coming out of the goal more."

Piwoni further commented, "It was good to see Ana Gerhartz back on the field,"

referring to his No. 1 goalie at the beginning of the season, who was injured in the game against St. Mary's Springs and on crutches for a week. Gerhartz saw time at forward and outside midfielder.

Kewaskum got off 10 shots in the game, compared with 15 for the Huskies, who improved to 3-2-1 in league play.

Kewaskum had two other games last week, a 2-1 loss to host Mayville and a 9-0 decision to Sheboygan Falls.

Against Mayville Boettcher tied the game on an assist from Shannon Miller in the 65th minute but the Cardinals came back with the game-winner six minutes later.

"It was a rough night," Piwoni said about the shutout loss to the Falcons, defending EWC champions for the past three or four years and currently tied with Plymouth for the top spot this season.

Kewaskum, currently 2-4 in the EWC and 3-14 overall, is at Two Rivers on Tuesday and travels to Freedom for the opening round in the WIAA Division 2 regional on Thursday.
