Hwy 28 sewer project may bring assessments to property owners

Property owners along Main Street can expect a lot of headaches with the Main Street reconstruction project in January of 2014. For some, that headache might be a migraine as village officials are considering assessing costs of bringing new sewer laterals to owners of property along Main Street.

Taking a closer look at the project after multiple changes by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the Village's engineering firm presented information in March that the previous plan to leave the existing sewer mains (pipes) in the ground and robotically reline the inside of them was more costly than installing new mains and laterals.

Prior to March of 2013 village officials told property owners only those from Fond du Lac Avenue to Railroad Street would incur assessments for new sewer laterals because the village wished to install new, larger sewer mains in that area in the event a reconstruction of U.S. Highway 45 was to take place in the future. The Village still does not anticipate any assessments for work being done on the wa-

ter utility.

Department of Public Works Director Jerry Gilles told Village Trustees Monday evening about 56 parcels will be affected when laterals (pipes) will need to be installed and connected to the new sewer mains. He expected the laterals to be between 32 and 36 feet and estimated the cost of \$62.50 per foot, per lateral. Each property has one lateral for sewer and one for water.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser said a community meeting with the property owners will be held in the future where they will have the opportunity to ask questions and voice their concerns over the project. After the information meeting the Village Board will have formal action to perform the first of two steps the state requires for assessments. This action includes a public hearing of which staff will notify property owners.

Once the project is finished and the costs are finalized The Village Board will then consider another resolution to actually assess those costs and determine how long property owners will have to pay and if interest will be charged.

The last project in which the Village Board assessed property owners

allowed up to 14 years to pay the assessment with zero interest.

Installation of the new mains will cost the village's water utility \$654,049.20 and the sewer utility \$711,892.20. Heiser reiterated that these are rough estimates and he expected better estimates as the project moved forward. He went on to say the Village Board has not decided how the project will be paid for.

There are a couple of options the village could pursue in paying for the project. Heiser explained the water utility could sustain paying for the project, but the sewer utility, which is already indebted to the village, could not.

The money the water utility does have is in the village's cash reserves, but because the sewer utility borrowed from the village's cash reserves for projects in 2006 and 2009, there is not enough to pay for the water utility's project and borrow again to the sewer utility for that portion of the project.

Heiser also said, both utilities could obtain outside financing and borrow for the project. Sewer rates may be affected.

Even if they didn't catch any fish, kids participating in Saturday's 22nd annual Jakes Free Fishing Day in the River Hill Park were all smiles.

They got a chance to wet their lines, win prizes and eat a tasty picnic lunch during the event, which is sponsored by the Gateway Gobblers chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

"A beautiful day," Jim Butzlaff, the president of the Gateway Gobblers said, referring to the weather and the turnout, which, he said, was "between 110 and 120."

The event went off without a hitch, and Butzlaff said it's because there's "lots of coordination," which starts three months before the date and includes "going around and getting organizations to donate. They help a lot. Everybody does."

One man who has helped

out for years is Don Lindquist, who donated about 100 prizes for the children. "I do this every year," he said.

The club donates the lunch for the participants and families.

In addition to Gobbler members, Butzlaff relies on help from Richard Knoebel, who orders the fish that are stocked in the river for a successful experience.

"We've been getting fish from the same place for the last 16-17 years, maybe 20," Knoebel said, reporting he gets the fish from the North Star Fish Hatchery in Montour, Iowa.

Knoebel said 400 bluegills were deposited in the Milwaukee Rivers for the event. "The largest fish caught was 10 inches long, with many in the nine to 10 inch range."

At noon, after the lunch was served, trophies and other prizes were awarded to the age group champions, including Branson Sivula, who is 11

years old.

Second 'Community Conversation' held to combat risky behaviors

Wisconsin's annual alcohol consumption is 28 percent higher than the national average leaving Kewaskum's youth with more reasons to postpone their first drink. A second "Community Conversation" was held by Linda Dymond of Washington County AODA on May 21 at the high school.

Dymond is a founding member of Kewaskum Cares about Kids (KCK) started in 2005. The conversations are to help the process of making Kewaskum "the best it can be to raise healthy kids."

KCK was initially approached by the Village to encourage community collaboration for solutions and multiple members of Kewaskum's community were present. "It has to be a multifaceted approach," Dymond said.

The Council of the AODA has collected data from a developmental asset survey tool used for over 20 years. Risky behaviors rose with grade levels from 2004-2011, except smoking. "This is how I know we can have an impact on high risk behavior," stated Dymond.

Dymond hopes that the end product of these conversations will not just focus on drug/alcohol use, but all risky behaviors Kewaskum youth face to include suicide and sexual intercourse.

Participants identified key points of interest including access to alcohol, lack of role models, and parent education. In addition, the attendees determined what was needed to make a change in the community including reaching out to other community members not represented.

Such members include Washington County law enforcement, judges, local civic groups like Lions Club,

Kewaskum business owners, parents, and youth.

Paula Carlton, physician and mother of two in Kewaskum, has been involved in Kewaskum Cares about Kids (KCK) for the past two years. "I felt like it was important for parents to know what was going on in the community and be part of the solution."

The youth at the first meeting held on April 11 had been very vocal about what they have seen and experienced. At the second meeting, the youth said how some parents, teachers, and other adults look past students' use of alcohol.

Statistics reveal a youth who had his/her first drink at the age of 14 are 400 percent more likely to abuse alcohol as an adult. Each year of abstinence decreases those odds by 14 percent. Youth who drink at an early age begin to experiment with other drugs.

According to Tom Bishop, Chief of Police, marijuana is a gateway drug to stronger narcotics. "The most widely abused problem is prescription medication, which leads to heroin," Bishop stated.

Amanda Witek, a Kewaskum 2010 graduate, attended Matt Vickman's funeral after he passed away February 2 due to heroin abuse. In August 2011, Vickman had lost his best friend to a heroin overdose. "I agree we have to start backwards where it is coming from," Witek said.

Kewaskum High School has the Peers to Peers program and STAND (Students Taking Action Not Drugs). Youth are encouraged to help. Carlton said, "High school groups can influence people."

Currently Kewaskum and Hartford are part of a pilot program in called SBIRT (Screening Brief Intervention Referral Treatment) designed by U.W. Madison Medical College as an early intervention strategy.

Dymond said, "At a tenth grade screening, I had one kid admit to trying heroin. It's here. It's dangerous." Dymond emphasized the problem doesn't start at heroin; the problem starts earlier. KCK is promoting prevention and proactive efforts to reduce the likelihood of drug/alcohol use.

Matt Heiser, Village Administrator, offered to use the village's website and municipal letter to promote events to help KCK.

"It's going to take everyone to make it happen," Matthew Dunn, school counselor at Kewaskum High School, said, "Involving other sectors will ensure the efforts of success."

Another "Community Conversation" is planned for June, though a date and time has not been determined. KCK meets the second Monday of the month from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the Little Folks School House.

Students spend as pioneers with Historical Society

Despite Mother Nature's trick, St. Lucas, Farmington, Wayne, and Kewaskum Elementary Schools third and fourth graders were treated to experience farm life culture, circa 1830-1930.

"This is what we have to work with, and the kids love it," Hannah Schladweiler said recently when sharing about the upcoming annual event. That was a nice sunny day in the 80s. Three days later, Farmington, Wayne, and St. Lucas school kids got to see and feel what it might have been like working in the chilly rain on Wednesday, May 22. On Thursday, when the three Kewaskum Elementary fourth grade classes walked over to the historical society grounds, it was cool and cloudy, but still too wet to play townball, a progenitor of baseball, played mostly out east, Schladweiler explained.

Schladweiler, a graduate of UW-Oshkosh with a degree in history, secondary education, is the developer of Pioneer Day.

"The purpose was to provide something for the kids right here in the community, to get them out of the classroom and see other things. It's good for them."

Pam Berres, Kewaskum fourth grade teacher, agreed. "Every day they ask when they get to come," she noted. "[Pioneer Day] goes well with our pioneer unit. They love the make and take crafts, rope and candle-making, because they get to keep something. On the tours, they're always full of questions." Berres has been bringing her students here since the first event four or five years ago.

Historical Society member Dean Schmidt, showed the students how the fanning mill operated. "Its purpose is to clean grain before planting." The kids were running barley seed through the fan. "The chaff and weed seeds are cleaned out," Schmidt explained. "My favorite question is when I ask what barley is used for. Most of them know it's often in bread. Once in a while someone knows it's also in beer. I send them home with

Kudek in court

A 39-year-old Kewaskum man who allegedly carjacked a truck from a West Bend dealership will undergo a mental exam before returning to court July 1, court records show.

The examination was ordered after Scott Kudek entered a plea of not guilty by reason of mental disease or defect during a May 30 court appearance.

Kudek and Kayla Goemer were both charged for the January 30 armed robbery of a pickup truck from the West Bend Russ Darrow dealership.

Goemer will face sentencing July 26.

According to a press release from the Washington County Sheriff's Department, Kudek

and Goemer entered the dealership and asked for a test drive. The pair was accompanied by a sales associate and as they neared the intersection of Highway 144 and Highway A, Kudek allegedly took out a knife and held it to the neck of the salesman.

When they reached Jay Road in the town of Farmington, Kudek stopped the truck and told the victim to get out. Later, the suspects stole gas from a station and fled the area.

The victim flagged down a passing car and contacted the Sheriff's Office.


In the early morning hours of February 3, the suspects were arrested by Hillborough County, Fla. sheriff deputies at a hotel.

Herriges in national competition in Washington with MSOE

There aren't many college students who wouldn't enjoy taking a vacation after finishing their final exams. Free vacations are even better because students don't usually have an abundance of spending money.

Michael Herriges, a 2009 graduate of Kewaskum and soon-to-be graduate of Milwaukee School of Engineering (MSOE), didn't plan his itinerary to Seattle, Washington, but he and some fellow classmates certainly earned the trip they were on recently.

MSOE's team finished second in the steel bridge building of the recent American Society of Civil Engineers' Great Lakes regional competition, qualifying them for the national competition at the University of Washington.

"I'm excited about it," Herriges said last Friday, referring to the trip to Washington, a state he has not visited before.

Herriges explained the competition is conducted by the ASCE, a student organization which has a chapter on the MSOE campus.

Larger universities have tryouts for the competition, but Herriges said at his school, putting in a lot of time on the project and participating in the practices determines who will be on the team.

The teams designed and constructed a concrete canoe and a steel bridge for the competition. MSOE's canoe finished third while the steel bridge was judged as the runner-up. The top two finishers automatically advance to the finals in Seattle.

"We do all of our own design and fabrication," Herriges, who is majoring in Architectural engineering, said.

The steel bridge is 17 feet

final places. MSOE didn't have to worry because they had the fastest time in the regional, a time of 6 minutes and 37 seconds (6:37).

"Purdue had a 6:38, so we just beat them ... Madison was next at nine minutes," Herriges said.

When the team gets to Washington, it will be competing against 50 schools in North America, according to Herriges, who said in addition to timing, the gselection (vertical movement of the bridge with load action down on it) of the bridges is important in determining the winner.

This is the third year in a row MSOE's team has advanced to the nationals.

The concrete canoe design and construction team normally has a team that races the craft against others in the competition, but, "This year we didn't race because of bad weather," Herriges said, noting that might have hurt the team from University of Wisconsin- Madison more than MSOE because "They have phenomenal racers."

Herriges plans to work on a master's degree in structural engineering next year.





Packers' Harris expected at Ehlers benefit

Dave Ehlers always wanted to bring the community and church together, but as is often the case with faith, it happened in an unexpected way.

Ehlers, 48, is slowly recovering from a stroke and while the road may be long, he isn't alone.

Friends, strangers and acquaintances have rallied together to host the Dave Ehlers Family Relief Fundraiser on June 23.

Ehlers would enjoy seeing the community come together for a cause, but he never expected he would be the cause.

At 48, Ehlers was discovered unconscious in his hotel room while attending a plumbing seminar in Green Bay in February. While he was found in time, it wasn't before the stroke began to take a serious toll.

His stepdaughter Jeri Riner says he was on life support for 12 days.

Initially the prognosis was poor, but gradually Ehlers began to show signs of improvement and recently moved to Cedar Community for speech and mobility rehabilitation.

"He's been so positive in his outlook. He's improving every day," says Riner.

In the course of his work, Wayne Sargent has become acquainted with Ehlers, who is the plumbing inspector for the City of West Bend. Sargent agreed to step into the job on a temporary basis while Ehlers undergoes rehabilitation.

The cost for long term care has exhausted Ehlers' health benefits and while coworkers wanted to help out, they didn't know how.

Sargent did.

As a board member, Sargent has helped at the Kewaskum Chamber of Commerce's Party on the Pavement; he's coordinated Volunteer Kewaskum and the

annual Green Bay Ultimate Packer Fan Connection.

"I thought it would be great to see if we could get a Packer player to come in and do nine holes of golf to raise money," Sargent said.

Green Bay Packer running back Dajuan Harris agreed.

Tom Fabitz took charge of coordinating the barbecue, which will be held in River Hill Park at noon.

"I'm retired and when Wayne asks for help I say, 'Why not? I'm not one to sit around,'" says Fabitz.

Ehlers' pastor and friend, Rev. Troy Swenson at St. Lucas Lutheran Church, is also pleased to lend a hand.

"Dave and his wife Beth are strong Christian people that are going through a tough time," says Swenson.

Swenson says Ehlers was close to completing courses at Martin Luther College in New Ulm, Minn. to become a staff minister (similar to a deacon) before the stroke.

"David has an amazing faith - it's always first and foremost and he has a wonderful way of relating Jesus Christ in his daily life," says Swenson.

Considering the number of lives Ehlers has touched in a positive way, Swenson suspects there will be a good crowd at the golf outing and barbecue.

Riner says her mom Beth, who is dealing with her own health concerns, has been brought to tears by the support and prayers and her stepfather is in awe of the response the family has received.

"The community has been unbelievable," says Riner. "I'm so proud to be part of it and I'm sure he feels the same."

Kewaskum Elementary School followed a special program this year. "On the very first day of school this year, September 4, 2012, our new SMART (Students Making a Responsible/Respectful Team) was introduced to the students through an assembly," Jody Heipp, Principal, said.

Part of learning how to be responsible and respectful was shared through reading Carol McCloud's book, *Have You Filled My Bucket Today?*

What does it mean to fill someone's bucket? Fifth graders responded.

"You do kind stuff," Maisie Osuski said. "You hold a door open for a little kid."

"You be nice to someone," Grace Kjer added.

For one teacher and one special class at KES, these lessons became a mission this past school year.

In the first part of November, fifth grade teacher Jeanne Wheeler's husband of twenty-eight years, Richard (Rick) was hurt in a car accident and needed surgery. Wheeler made plans to be away from her class for a couple of days during this time; Rick unfortunately passed away on Tuesday, November 13.

Rick Wheeler, owner and operator of Wheeler Tile & Home Improvements, was a master craftsman who excelled at ceramic tile and installation, as well as making tables and lamps, according to his obituary. He also donated tiles to the school for various uses, particularly art projects.

One of those projects was a beautiful inlaid mosaic table that Wheeler's students created in Henke's art room, using some of the tiles. It was also a

secret the nineteen fifth graders kept with zeal for months.

"Coming back was so hard at first," Wheeler, who returned in January (after being away six weeks), said.

"It felt like three months," a student said.

"It was only six weeks," Wheeler said. "But they really helped me. They really cared about me."

Marty Heiser offered Wheeler a hug.

"When we knew Mrs. Wheeler was going to be gone to the hospital with her husband, we watched Peter Pan, and we had a bag of marbles to keep close to us," Taylor Schultz shared.

"They were happy thoughts," Wheeler said.

"The fact that I had a wonderful, awesome sub who stayed the whole time helped me feel better so I didn't have to think about who was going to be there today," Wheeler added. "My fifth grade partner teachers, Bonnie Schultz and Julie Dehring, really helped by lesson planning for my sub and supporting me. My principal, Jody Heipp, was always there to help when needed—KES has fantastic staff who really pull together for each other."

About art class, Wheeler said, "I knew this class had made the table. And they never, not even once, spilled the secret."

The secret? The table was to be a special gift, but one that would benefit the school as well.

"Mrs. Henke asked me for some more tiles," Wheeler said. "So on January 18 I went into the pole barn to look for some. It had been the first time I'd gone in there, and I just cried."

Once the tiles were at school, the team went to work. Faith Mertzig said, "We were in groups, and we each came

up with a design. We all picked pieces from each one to use. Miss Gavin, (Wheeler's) student teacher, helped us."

Peyton Donath, Brady Stern, and Brandon Schreffler broke up the tile with a hammer, through a towel. "That's the perfect trio for it," Wheeler said.

"Mrs. Henke drew the design and we had to fit the pieces in it like a puzzle," Osuski added. "It was hard. Ben (Menzel), me and Kyle (Schmidt) came up with the heart design, because Mrs. Wheeler's husband died. We put wings around it, like an angel."

Emma Vlotho said that Henke cut out the shapes of the design. "We decided which ones fit and what didn't. Then we took them off and she put glue on."

Henke also decided on the colors, Mary Green said. "We didn't care that much. We were working on other projects, and we'd be called over to add on some tiles, whatever fit."

"Every time we finished a section, we'd have to press on it with this board to make it even,"

Osuski said.

"Then we added black grout," Collin Keller said.

Menzel reminded the group that purchasing the base of the table was a team effort, too. (Patty) Schrieber in the office donated the table, and Henke's father built the wood support around the mosaic.

What Wheeler didn't know was that Brady Stern's mom, Cathy, was plotting with all the fifth grades and the staff to purchase the table and give it as a gift. With the help and permission of Heipp, Stern sent a letter home to the students, asking for donations. "Four hundred and ninety dollars came in," Brady said.

On April 12 at the Hoop and Holler fundraiser, Collin Keller's dad bid on the table during the live auction. "I was working at the refreshment table, and when the bidding got to four hundred dollars, I thought, wow."

Keller won at five hundred dollars, but the secret had to be kept another month until the May 15th Bucket Filling assembly. "We were really hyper and

excited all day," Menzel said.

Heipp had the fifth graders come forward during the assembly, along with Wheeler, who tried to stay in back. "They kept urging me forward, and I had no idea what was going on," she said.

"The assembly was set up on purpose not only to present the table to Mrs. Wheeler as a surprise, but was a true-life example of being bucket-fillers," Heipp said. "We are so blessed to have such kindness in our great school and community."

The gift was accompanied by a lovely over-sized card with all the student's signatures.

"I don't know how I would have gotten through this without them," Wheeler said. "I'll keep the table here through the end of the year, then take it home. The best part is, they did this for no reason. They took all these mismatched pieces of tile, flat and shiny, and made something beautiful of it."

"We over-filled your bucket, like a dump truck!" Heiser said.

"You sure did," Wheeler replied.

a pocketful of souvenir seeds to grow." The other machine Schmidt showed was the popular hand-crank corn grinder.

Schladweiler, in prairie dress under a warm coat, had her group of students lined up to dip tallow candles. Each dip in the hot kettle of lard makes the candle grow fatter. Her friend Amanda Bates, also in a costume Schladweiler made, helped out. Members Phyllis Schmidt and Emma Marcus wrapped the finished product with a note for the students to take home. Kewaskum Frozen Foods generously donated the tallow (rendered animal fat). "The point of making candles is to figure out not what a candle is, but to learn that candles are made from tallow."

"We're trying to make a connection between the grain, the people, and the animals, from planting to harvest to using grain, not only to feed the animals but our families with the grain and the milk, eggs, meat, and so forth," Eva Harvey, long-time member of the historical society, said. "We're trying to close the circle. From my experience as a mom on field trips, too often kids are fed only parts of knowledge and to really learn it you need to see it in the loop, in the cycle of life."

The group has discussed having live animals at the event, to talk about feeding them and how animal products are used, such as lard and tallow, but so far that hasn't been possible.

Harvey showed the students the art of baking cornbread in a Dutch oven over a fire. Kiley May of Danielle McCain's class mixed dry ingredients. "We have cornmeal and salt and baking powder," she said. Harvey, who used lard in the recipe, also discussed what kind of eggs could be used. Chickens weren't the only source of fresh eggs. She had duck eggs to show the mixed group of fourth graders.

Engelhardt Dairy donated milk for the students to have with their cornbread treat at lunch.

Ron Marcus, Kewaskum Historical Society curator, Payden Salm and a couple of neighbors helped the students make rope. Each could take home a finished piece. Nikki Senoracki of McCain's class said,


"It was really fun to attach the rope to the machine and twirl the handle."

Inside were two tour groups being shown through the levels of the main museum. Dan Schmidt, former Village of Kewaskum Administrator and Historical Society President, showed the upstairs filled with village artifacts while Matthew Harvey showed and explained the machines and tools in the lower level.

Another activity included trying out a wooden yoke to carry buckets of water. "It's easy!" claimed Alyssa Butz.

"We have this huge space and buildings. We want to do a lot more for our community," Schladweiler said. "That's when I started targeting the schools." The daughter of Eva and Matt Harvey, she grew up attending living history encampments and visiting Old Farm Days. She now volunteers as a docent at The Wade House in Greenbush where she learned about several of the games.

"Providing this opportunity helps with the budget. It costs

Farmington and Wayne schools the bus rental, but basically, Kewaskum Elementary, nothing, as they walk here."

The Historical Society sponsors this program, but is short on manpower. Schladweiler is grateful for the help they

Important local issues once again drew voters to the polls for the Kewaskum School Board race at Tuesday's Spring Election. Unofficial counts show a close race in the contest for the seats. Neal Weare pulled off a narrow victory beating Ed Slegler, 1,189 to 1,179 to win the second open position on the board. Derry Amundson, who withdrew from the race but whose name still appeared on the ballot, garnered 634 votes. On the first of two advisory referendums, electors voted to keep Beechwood Elementary School closed by a vote of 1,643 to 1,593. On the second referendum, electors voted to keep sixth grade students in the Middle School by a vote of 1,346 to 839.

Despite excellent weather, Tuesday's election drew considerably fewer voters to the polls than the 1984 contest. Locally, former trustee Richard Schlice, who was defeated in his bid for re-election to the Kewaskum Village Board last year, fared better in Tuesday's election. Schlice edged out incumbent Richard Schmidt, 387 to 351, to regain a seat on the board. Incumbents Howard Laubenstein and Thomas McElhatton were successful in efforts to retain their positions on the board, with Laubenstein receiving 448 and McElhatton garnering 404 votes.

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

The way his girls played in their two Division 2 tournament contests last week, Kewaskum coach Luke Piwoni would probably like to extend the Kewaskum girls' soccer season another two weeks.

"They really started playing good team soccer," Piwoni said Sunday evening. "I was so proud of the effort ... the girls had so much energy and were so excited. To come back from three (goals) down was tremendous."

The KHS coach was referring to Saturday's second round game at Waupaca, which Kewaskum lost 4-3 in overtime. The loss eliminated the Lady Indians from further tournament action. Waupaca moves on and will play Winneconne in the sectional semifinal on June 6.

"They were a real good team. They were the No. 3 seed," Piwoni said about the Comets.

Kewaskum didn't start well, giving up two, first-half goals, but in the second half, they were like 'Superwomen.'

Following an hour and a half weather delay, the Indians got on the board in the 55th minute when Shannon Miller scored an unassisted goal.

"As soon as we got that goal, we played with a ton of energy," Piwoni said, reporting Miller scored the second goal five minutes later when the keeper played off her line and the KHS senior took advantage of it. "Shannon played a beautiful shot," which sailed past the keeper's outstretched hands.

At 70 minutes, Jeray Riffel tied the score, with the assist coming from Miller. "It was just a dump pass by Shannon, and Jeray let it rip," Piwoni said, noting Riffel "has the best leg on the team, by far."

"The last 10 minutes were just crazy minutes of soccer," Piwoni said, and neither team could score but the Comets

broke the tie with a goal just two minutes into the extra period.

"Emily (Kohler, the KHS keeper) came out. It appeared she had the ball but it just popped out of her hand, and they had a girl there and she put it in," Piwoni said.

Stephany Haack was cited for her work on defense during the second half. "She really gave us a boost back there," Piwoni said, also praising Becca Strigenz, who was moved up to forward for the game. "She led the offensive push."

On Thursday, the 11th-seeded Indians had another long bus ride, this time to face sixth-seeded Freedom. The Irish were in for a real surprise after they took a 1-0 lead in the 12th minute. They got a big dose of Miller, who posted her third, three-goal "hat trick" of the season to pull off the upset.

Miller scored at 14 minutes off a direct kick, and again it was her accuracy that was the key as she placed the ball high and in the far corner of the net.

"There was no way the keeper was going to get that one," Piwoni said, reporting Miller kicked in her third goal during the 49th minute on a nifty pass from Strigenz.

"She's had eight goals and three assists over the last three games. She finished strong," Piwoni said about Miller, the team's offensive leader.

KHS had concluded the Eastern Wisconsin Conference season on May 28 when it traveled to Two Rivers and handed the Raiders a 7-0 defeat.

Once again, Miller was instrumental in the victory, scoring three goals. Also getting in the scoring act were: Sarah Boettcher, Riffel, Val Schiebel and Heather Nielsen.

The win gave the Indians a 3-4 record in the EWC, and Piwoni said that was good enough to place fifth. Overall, Kewaskum finished with a 5-15 mark for the year.

No places for young Indians at state meet, coach hopeful for the future

LA CROSSE- Being on the big stage of the WIAA State Track and Field Meet might have been a bit overwhelming for the four Indians representatives.

Ashlee Stahl was unable to duplicate her season-best in the high jump and did not place in the Division 2 high jump competition. She cleared 4-feet, 10 inches (4-10) and finished 15th in the field of 17 jumpers.

Pole vaulters Corey Burdick and Tristin Marx cleared 12-6 and 12-0, respectively, which was good for 13th and 14th, respectively, while Jessica Nurkala cleared the opening height of 8-06 to place 15th in the girls' pole vault.

"He had some pretty good vaults at 13 feet," vaulting coach Josh Parrent said of Burdick, who "just wasn't finishing at the top" of those attempts.

When asked if he thought Burdick might have been a bit nervous competing in front of a crowd of several thousand, Parrent said, "I would think all of them were a little nervous. It's not like any track meet they've ever been in."

Marx made the opening height of 12-0, then he, too, had a couple of good jumps at 12-6, according to Parrent, who said, he had Marx go with his longer pole for the final two attempts.

On try No. 2, the standards were a little deep, so Parrent had them moved forward, but then Marx "ended up hitting the bar on the way up." This was just the second time Marx used the longer pole, and he needed more experience with it, Parrent said.

"To get to state as a sophomore is amazing," Parrent said, noting he checked over the records and found Marx is the best sophomore vaulter at Kewaskum High School in 20 years. "He could do amazing things in the next two years, if he wants it bad enough."

Nurkala added nine inches from last year to this year, according to Parrent, and even though she only made one height, "Once again, she's only a junior."


With more strength, Nurkala can go another foot higher next year, Parrent said.

"It was amazing she (Stahl) made it (to state)," KHS head track coach Jerry Gosa said, referring to the fact she came back from tearing her ACL (Anterior Cruciate Ligament) in September.


