Dei, Sette chosen to perform at state convention

Heiser's contract not renewed

The Kewaskum Village Board on Monday, in closed session, discussed a performance evaluation for Village Administrator Matt Heiser. In open session, Trustees voted 4-3 against renewing Heiser's contract.

Properly evaluating the Village Administrator has been discussed since 2012 when the board had interest in having a documented evaluation procedure for the Village Administrator. They inquired with former Village Administrator Jay Shambau, who later that year shared with the board what is used in Calumet County, where he is currently administrator.

At the May 6, 2013 meeting, Heiser presented the board with options for his performance evaluation. At that time he suggested Trustees use a format similar to one used in the City of Wauwatosa because it seemed to have the criteria the board was looking for. Trustees voted in favor to use the Wauwatosa evaluation as a template.

Trustees would receive the evaluation form by mail, fill it out and then return it to Village Treasurer Janet Knops. The night of his evaluation, the combined results would be presented to the board.

At that May meeting, Trustee Mike Berger stated he wanted to see an evaluation that took into account the perspectives of the other department heads, similar to a 360° evaluation. Heiser explained none of the eight communities he surveyed perform that type of evaluation. Berger then suggested board members speak with department heads on their own about Heiser's performance.

Taking action on Heiser's contract Monday night, Trustees voted 4-3 against continuing the contract for six months contingent on goals and objectives being met. Trustees Berger, Kevin Scheunemann, Craig Garbisch and Joel Serwe all voted against the motion.

Scheunemann then motioned to adjourn but that motion also failed, 4-3.

A motion from Garbisch, to allow Heiser to continue as Administrator without a contract failed as well after not receiving a second motion which would have taken it to a vote.

A motion to not renew the contract passed 4-3. Trustees Berger, Scheunemann, Garbisch and Serwe all voted in favor of that motion.

Village Clerk Stephanie Justmann stated Tuesday, the Board will hold a meeting with the Village's labor attorney on Monday morning, June 24 at

A willingness to accept new challenges and take their learning outside the classroom gave Kewaskum Middle School eighth graders Erin Sette and Dalton Dei the opportunity to perform in the Wisconsin Middle Level Honors Concert at the State Music Educators' Convention in Madison October 26, 2013.

Joshua Michlig, who directs Kewaskum's sixth grade and high school bands, says this is the first time in his six years with the district that a student, much less two, has made it into the state band.

"Most schools get one kid once in a while. Those that get more than one are bigger districts - Milwaukee, Madison, LaCrosse. It's very exciting to see our hard work pay off and our students getting that recognition," says Michlig.

Michlig says a total of 120 students were selected. Sette was one of four euphonium players and Dei one of seven tuba players chosen for the honor. Another six Kewaskum stu-

dents were selected as alternates.

In April, Dei and Sette took part in the audition at Kettle Moraine Middle School in Dousman.

Both played pieces they presented during solo and ensemble in February.

"I thought it would be a good learning experience," says Sette.

"It was a challenge for me and I wanted to see if I could meet that challenge," says Dei.

Even though they were familiar with the music and both have been playing since sixth grade, vying for a spot proved to be nerve wracking.

"You could hear others playing and a lot of them were good," says Dei.

Before the students were notified separately by mail, Michlig got email from State Music Association and assembled those who tried out to give them the good news.

"It felt great," said Dei when he found he was chosen.

When Sette heard she would take part, she was very surprised and "very happy."

In August, the pieces they will play will be mailed to them so they can be

ready for their first and only rehearsal, which will take place the day before the concert.

District Board President Tim Ramthun said the news is a testament to the efforts of KMS band and choir leaders, Josh Michlig, Rachel Holmes and Andrew Dahlberg.

"Overall student talent and quality is up significantly, as are the participation numbers. The phrase, 'If you build it, they will come,' said Ramthun, who also credited KMS Principal Julie Skelton and Superintendent Jim Smasal for their support and leadership.

"The Board of Education is so very proud of these kids, their parents and their school leaders that helped support and cultivate the passion and talents to make this possible," said Ramthun.



Flag Garden returns for Flag Day



10 a.m. to discuss their options moving forward. That meeting will cost taxpayers \$210 per hour as well as any work done by the attorney.

Heiser's contract with the village began in May of 2008 when he was hired to succeed Shambeau. Heiser's contract at that time gave him an indefinite term.

The contract further stated the Village Board could terminate the contract with or without cause. If terminated without cause, Heiser is to receive three month's salary and health insurance as severance or three months notification or an option chosen by the Village Board. If terminated with cause, Heiser is entitled to nothing.

Trustee Serwe stated his reasons for voting against the contract were came down to a lack of leadership. "I have concerns about the direction the village is taking financially and the lack of leadership displayed."


Village President Andy Pesch, who voted in favor of the contract, stated he did so because there were a lot of unknowns at the time of the vote. He cited unknown costs involved in finding a new administrator and the cost of having an interim Administrator as well as the unknown cost of a possible severance package.

Knoebel stated Tuesday, he didn't think they had enough information to make a decision. "We need to explore our options, this affects everyone in the village."

Knoebel also spoke highly of Heiser, "Matt always has the best interest in mind of all the village residents while working for the village." Before serving as a Trustee Knoebel worked for the village for over 30 years as a police officer and later Chief of Police, four of those years with Heiser as his boss.

Prior to becoming Administrator, Heiser served as Village President from 2003-'08 and as Trustee from 2000-'03.

At the start of 2013, Heiser was given a 1% raise, making his salary \$84,596.






VILLAGE BOARD MEETING MAY 20, 2013 7:00 P.M.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Richard Knoebel, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Joel Serwe, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Jerry Gilles, Mick Magalski from McMahon Associates and Stephanie Justmann. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on May 16, 2013. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Craig Garbisch to approve the minutes from the May 6, 2013 meeting, second by Mike Berger. Voice vote, motion carried.

Peggy Kober, representative of the Bridget Center, requested to have the fee waived for the use of the Annex Building. She volunteered to pay a percentage of revenues for the use of the building. Peggy Kober stated that in past events the Bridget Center has contributed 20-25% of revenues toward facility use. Concerns discussed included the amount of times it will be used, if a fee is charged for the Bridget Center services and if accepting the percentage of revenues is in fact a fee adjustment rather than a waiver. Motion by Richard Knoebel to allow the standard fee to be waived but accept the 25% of Bridget Center's revenues as reimbursement for a six month trial period, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to have staff draft an ordinance to allow Low-Speed and Neighborhood Electric Vehicles on streets posted 35 mph or lower, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried. (Richard Knoebel

Director of Public Works:

1. Presented the revised estimates of probable costs for the Main Street/Hwy 28 project. The water and sewer estimates were reviewed including the 20% contingency fund for unknown costs and the cost to abandon a sanitary sewer.

2. Mick Magalski, Engineer from McMahon, gave a DOT update on the Main Street/Hwy 28 project. The DOT will only install the sewer lateral up to the lot line and the property owner will be responsible for obtaining a private contractor to install the lateral from the lot line into the house. The Village has obtained permission from the WisDOT Secretary to use an alternate method of installing the sewer main instead of using the costly slurry method. Every alternate method of installation submitted to the WisDOT has been rejected.

3. Reviewed the State Municipal Agreement for the Hwy 28/Main Street project. Municipal funds will be needed for the parking lanes and for removal of the old lighting along Main Street.

4. Reported on a leak detection that was performed by the Water Department on Braatz Drive. It was determined, by using a service through the Rural Water Association, there was a leak in the area of 530-540 Braatz Drive. A water main break was also repaired at the intersection of Werner Drive and Homestead Trail.

Administrator Heiser in the absence of Zoning Administrator Chad Cook reported twenty-one building permits were issued for the month of April 2013.

Administrator Matt Heiser reported on the status of the 9-11 Haberman Memorial. The artifact from Ground Zero will be delivered this year. Motion by Craig Garbisch to confirm allowing the memorial to be erected at Kewaskum Fire Department, seconded by Richard Knoebel. Voice vote, motion carried.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann announced the Board of Review had been scheduled for May 22, 2013 at 1:00 p.m. One objection form has been filed and will be heard by the Board of Review.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the next meeting is scheduled for May 28, 2013.

Mike Berger, representative for the Library Board, reported on the May 16, 2013 meeting. The circulation for April 2013 was 3559 items compared to 2887 in April 2012.

Matt Heiser, representative for the Mid-Moraine, reported on the May 8, 2013 Legislative meeting. Glenn Grothman was the guest speaker and legislative priorities were reviewed. The next Dinner meeting will be hosted by the Village of Fredonia on May 22, 2013.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the Proclamation for Norman Kufahl recognizing his years of service on the Village Board, seconded by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Jim Hovland to approve Resolution #2013-04 Surplus and Overdrafts, seconded by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried. (Vol. R4, pg. 1447)

Motion by Richard Knoebel to approve allowing St. Lucas to close Parkview Drive from First Street for one block to the north on August 6, 2013 for National Night Out, seconded by Mike Berger.

Voice vote, motion carried.

Mick Magalski, from McMahon Associates, reviewed the summary of additional design related services not included in the Proposal Agreement accepted by the Kewaskum Village Board on September 21, 2009. Additional services are for lift station design, additional sanitary sewer and laterals, utility coordination, boring under the Milwaukee River, coordination and plan specifications for contaminated soils and plan revisions. Mick also reported there may be additional work that cannot be quantified yet including planning a detour for utility connection work at the intersection of Fond du Lac Avenue and Main Street when utilities. Motion by Richard Knoebel to approve the proposed agreement amendment for McMahon Associates and to cap the additional service costs at \$25,000, seconded by Andy Pesch and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Knoebel-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Serwe-aye, Scheunemann-nay, Hovland-aye. (6-1-0)

Administrator Heiser introduced for discussion the budget process timeline. Items discussed included known inaccuracies for certain revenues and expenditures which the Village must wait for from outside sources. During the budget process it was requested to have the department heads submit a capital replacement schedule. A comprehensive capital needs list for all Village departments was reviewed at the Visioning Session in February. Direction of the Board was to submit preliminary budgets for review by the Standing Committees by the second week in July.

Administrator Heiser introduced the request from Trustee Serwe on implementing an Impact Fee moratorium. Administrator Heiser reviewed the Impact Fee schedule for park, water and sewer according to individual subdivisions. Some of the Impact fees for certain subdivisions have already been paid by the developer. The Impact Fee schedule was established by Needs Assessments that were completed by the Village according to state statute. Impact fees that are not spent on the defined needs within seven years of being collected must be refunded. Per the advice of Village engineers, Ruekert & Mielke, Heiser reported that the Village has the following options if the Board wishes to change impact fees: Impact fees should be collected and spent according to the Needs Assessment or discontinued and returned; they should not be suspended. In addition, Ruekert & Mielke advised they can be supplemented by the Village or the Village could offset the fee by reducing other fees, for instance building permit fees or a new needs assessment could be completed and the fee schedule adjusted. Direction of the Board was to look into a 24 month moratorium and to clarify how it would affect money that has been already collected and spent and money that has been collected and not spent.

Wayne Sargent presented

a proposal from Outdoor Lighting Construction to install banner poles on Fond du Lac Avenue. The proposal includes two wooden poles, backfill, an upper and lower wire and pole guys with adapters if needed for approximately \$3,400. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the proposal for Banner Poles and allow civic organizations to install the poles, motion died for lack of a second. Motion by Richard Knoebel to allow civic organization to install the Banner Poles at no cost to the Village, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Mike Berger to accept the request from the Women's Club to display their awards inside the Annex Building, seconded by Joel Serwe. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Craig Garbisch, second by Jim Hovland to approve the issuance of an operator's license for 2013/2014 as listed. Voice vote, motion carried. No objections were noted by the police department.

Indians have clean sweep over Kiel

The Kewaskum Indians baseball team had just enough offense and more than enough good pitching last Friday to take both ends of a doubleheader against visiting Kiel.

In the first game, Brett Boegel came on in relief of Zach Hedlund to hold the Raiders at bay for a 5-3 victory, and in the nightcap, it was senior Michael Holt tossing a two-hit, 5-0 shut-out.

The two wins gave the Indians a 4-3 mark in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, 4-7 overall and moved them into third place. Kiel fell to 2-4 and 4-8.

"It's starting to come, but we have to have more urgency on offense," coach Doug Gonring said afterward.

"Brett really threw a good game," Gonring commented about the right-hander's efforts in the final four innings. Boegel faced just four batters in the fifth and three in the sixth and the seventh. He only gave up one hit, while striking out three.

Kewaskum fell behind after the fourth when Kiel used three hits, a walk and wild pitch to chase Hedlund. The big hit was Carter Voelker's single that scored two.

Boegel came on in relief and got out of the inning on a ground out and a 6 to 4 double play.

The Indians had scored single runs in the second (RBI single by Jake Hardy) and third (RBI double by Chad Ray), then they got a pair in the fourth on two walks and RBI singles by Boegel and Bille Lehmann.

Gonring was able to breathe a little easier after his Indians added an insurance run in the fifth. Hunter Demmon singled after one out, stole second and moved the final two bases on a pair of groundouts.

KHS wound up with 10 hits, two by Hardy.

In the nightcap, Holt went the distance and posted the team's first shutout of the year. He struck out four and walked four.

Only one Raider runner reached second base. That was Terren Driscoll, who reached on an infield single and stole second in the second inning.

Holt threw 77 pitches, according to Gonring, who said his senior starter was able to get the Raiders to pop up a lot, and, "When the ball is in the air we do well."

The game was scoreless until the fifth when the Indians pushed three runs across as Ray walked, Schlosser reached on an error, a sacrifice bunt, wild pitch, a safety squeeze by Matt Ringwell and another wild pitch.

Kewaskum got the bases loaded in the sixth on a single by Dean Schlice, walk to Ray and an infield hit by Lehmann, then Kiel committed two errors,

making the score 5-zip.

"It was nice to be on the receiving end once," Gonring said, noting another highlight, in addition to the pitching and the successful squeeze, was "Deano (Schlice) caught his first varsity game."

In its June 11 game at Sheboygan Falls, KHS jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the top of the first, but the hosts came back with six in the first two innings and another six in the bottom of the fourth toward a 14-4 win.

Five Indians pitchers took a turn at trying to stop the Falcons without much success. Hedlund started and took the loss. He lasted just 1 2/3 innings, giving up five hits and six runs, but only two of them were earned. Demmon, Schlice, Hardy and Lehmann followed, and all but Demmon gave up two or more runs. Six errors also hurt the cause.

Boegel continued to shine at the plate. He had two of the team's four hits, including an RBI double in the first. Designated hitter Bryce Thull followed with an RBI single, and he later scored on an error.

Nate Helli struck out 10 and gave up just four hits.

"That was just a bad day. We were only down 6-4 and we give up eight runs," Gonring said. "It was kind of sloppy."
