Admin. Heiser made at-will employee

The Kewaskum Village Board met Monday morning in a special session and immediately went into closed session to discuss with their labor attorney two personnel matters.

Coming back into open session, Trustees took action to invoke the Chief of Police to investigate a charge of misconduct against a village staff member. It is unknown how long the investigation will take. Due to the sensitivity of the matter, there was no additional information given.

In the second item, Trustee Kevin Scheunemann amended his motion from a meeting on Monday, June 17. In that meeting he made a motion to not renew Administrator Matt Heiser's contract with the village. Heiser's contract did not have a clause making it renewable, instead it was an indefinite contract. Voting with Scheunemann were Trustees Craig Garbisch, Joel Serwe and Mike Berger.

Scheunemann's amendment made Heiser an at-will employee of the village. This type of employment relationship allows either party the ability to immediately terminate the relationship at any time with or without any advance warning and with no subsequent liability.

Attorney Nancy Pirkey, who represents the Village in labor issues, stated after the meeting, that ultimately, the motion terminates Heiser's contract after six months.

Village President Andy Pesch stated he was not able to elaborate on either situation at this time. Heiser also deferred comment to Pirkey.

Shaske hired as Wayne Clerk

The Wayne town board announced a new date for its planning commission meetings and appointed a new town clerk at a special meeting held Tuesday, June 18.

The board chose Cindy Shaske to finish former clerk Julie Kriewaldt's term.

Kriewaldt was elected in April and her term, now taken over by Shaske, ends April 20, 2015.

The board received only one resume and interviewed Shaske Monday evening.

Kriewaldt, who held the position for four years, accepted a full time position as clerk in the town of Erin.

"I will do everything I possibly can to make it run as smoothly as when Julie was here," Shaske told the board.

The clerk's job includes payroll, accounts payable, licensing, election administration, budgets, state reports, record administration and management duties.

Kriewaldt will stay on as assistant clerk to train Shaske in the position.

Shaske has an associate's degree

in accounting from Moraine Park Technical College and a Bachelor's degree from Silver Lake College in Manitowoc.

The lifelong Wayne resident currently works at Cedar Community in the home medical equipment department and plans on doing both jobs.

The board also approved moving

planning commission meetings from Tuesdays to coincide with regular Wednesday night board meetings.

Special commission meetings could be called when the group needs to examine larger issues, Town Board and Planning Commission Chairman Carl Klemme said.

The next board planning commission meeting will be held on July 17 at 6:30 p.m., with the town board being held immediately afterward.

Local historical documents sought for digital preservation project

KEWASKUM- A new generation of Kewaskum history buffs, with backgrounds in digital photography and electronic storage of data have joined together in an effort to try and digitally preserve Kewaskum's rich history. The trio is currently working on obtaining a federal grant to digitize historical documents and they are actively seeking historical items from Kewaskum's past.

Piggly Wiggly manager Aaron Laatsch and Statesman publisher Andrew Kuehl, have teamed up to undertake the project of collecting and organizing the historical items. Kewaskum librarian Steev Baker will write a grant offering federal money to scan and upload local history documents that will be freely accessible from the internet. If successful, the Kewaskum Public Library would receive \$1000 - \$5000 to create an online database of lo-

cal historical material.

Although they have access to quite a bit of photos and documents through their own collections left by prior generations, they are actively looking for more material that could be scanned and added to the project. The group would like to have items by August 1.

The items that are being sought include: Photos, photo postcards, slides, news clippings, videos and plat maps. The group is also wishing to sit down and meet with individuals and record historical stories.

"This started after Aaron and I realized our combined interest in purchasing old post cards from Ebay. One day we started talking about our interest in digitizing our collections. The next week Steev and I had a similar conversation where he mentioned the grant, the three of us then met and decided to undertake the project," Kuehl

Forest Superintendent leaves for Green Bay

On Monday, June 17, Jerry Leiterman, Superintendent at the Kettle Moraine State Forest Northern Unit took on a new challenge as supervisor for the state's Northeast District Parks, Forests and Trails in Green Bay.

Saturday, June 15 was his last day at Kettle Moraine.

Visitor Service Associate Joan Neis has worked with Leiterman for nearly two decades.

"He was always there to help you out if you needed it. We'll miss him here, but he's moving on to bigger and better things," says Neis.

Leiterman will carry fond memories of the people and life-long friendships made at the park.

"The change is very bitter-sweet," he said.

In the interim, Assistant Su-

perintendent Jason Quast will be handing inquires regarding forest operations.

Quast has worked with the department seasonally since 1999. When he began working with Leiterman as assistant superintendent in September 2002, Quast only had 14 months of full time experience.

Even though it was never formally said, Quast considers Leiterman a mentor and he sees his own resource and personnel philosophy as a reflection of lessons learned from the superintendent.

"Supervisors and managers are made, not born. Jerry was very accommodating and very patient when I first arrived," says Quast. "He knew the property inside and out and was able to guide me through its geography and managing staff and resources."

Suppressed blood draw considered in Xmas crash

A motion to suppress evidence obtained from a blood draw will be considered before Keith L. Wiedmeyer faces a drunken driving homicide charge in October.

When the crash that killed Pamela Matenaer and injured Peter and Mark Matenaer occurred December 24, 2012, Wiedmeyer told a Kewaskum police officer he had been drinking but refused taking a breathalyzer test or performing field sobriety tests, according to a criminal complaint.

Wiedmeyer was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital where he refused the blood draw, which was then taken in the presence of the officer, the complaint states. The draw, which showed a blood alcohol level of .124, was taken about 90 minutes after officers were called to the scene.

Court records from a June 19 appearance show that Wied-


meyer's attorney filed a motion to exclude the blood draw. An oral decision on that motion is expected by July 24.

In April, four months after the crash occurred, the state Supreme Court ruled that law enforcement needs to produce a warrant before taking a blood draw from suspected drunk drivers who refuse testing.

Wiedmeyer, 34, entered a not guilty plea for nine felony charges stemming from the crash that include homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle, second degree reckless homicide and second degree recklessly endangering safety.

Witness accounts in the criminal complaint state Wiedmeyer was traveling northbound on Fond du Lac Ave. near the Gateway Cafe in Kewaskum when he passed another vehicle, crossed the double yellow line and slammed into Matenaer's Chevrolet Cobalt.

A jury trial is scheduled for October 21.



On a gorgeous Sunday afternoon in June members of the Farmington Historical Society and the Boltonville Sportsman's Club joined together to share memories and future plans for the historic Boltonville Mill Pond.

With the beautiful pond and a roaming deer for a backdrop, Ellen Kesting, who lives in the Harlow Bolton home next to the pond, emceed a program of pond history, beginning with Corey Fay sharing about the development of the mill pond and race to run the gristmill, which is still in business as Tom's Country Mill LLC.

Dan Plzak shared next a brief history about the Sportsman's Club, and Dennis Fechter with Boltonville Fire Department, discussed how the fire department uses the pond, as well as the importance of the department rating to keep local residents' home and business insurance lower.


Ann Enright took over to host the part of the program devoted to sharing memories of life on the pond. Shirley Birkholz, long-time resident of Boltonville, talked about swimming and sunbathing, and catching frogs. Ice was a necessity in pre-refrigerator days, so "making" ice was a long-remembered activity. Great blocks of ice were cut with saws in the winter and stored in a

nearby shed between layers of sawdust for year-round use in local groceries and taverns.

Kevin Fay, Sportsman's Club President, shared about the need to have the pond dredged. Fund-raising activities are underway to pay for the more than \$100,000 project that may be delayed until 2014.

Curt Yahr talked about his memories of the mill opening the mill race gates, and of fishing and hunting activities around Boltonville Pond, as well as tree-planting. Ken Belger shared memories of fishing with his father and Joe Enright reiterated the importance of the pond both to the community and the fire department.

The younger set also recalled spending lazy long sum-

mer days swimming and playing. Kelly Enright Goeden said she wished her children could experience the same wonderful times she did as a child, and Josh and Peter Kesting talked about catching crayfish and frogs, and a particular duck who took up residence for a couple of seasons that would chase people around the pond. They also took great delight in their potato launcher, a big slingshot which they'd load with potatoes to shoot at boaters. "We only aimed at relatives," Peter Kesting said.

A beautiful display area of

seasonal photographs, animal life, historic and present-day artifacts such as ice tongs and skates created by Anne Panzer, was set up in the shed. A picnic followed, in the spirit of the community picnics once held annually by the Sportsman's Club.

Chief Muench is Beechwood's best kept secret

It's a rare occasion for residents of Beechwood to have a dignitary present in their unincorporated community. But June 20 was no ordinary day.

That evening, Wisconsin's First Lady Tonette Walker paid a visit to the Beechwood Fire Department. She was on a secret mission, resulting in making the volunteer department's centennial year even more special.

She presented a Wisconsin Heroes Award to Mark Muench, 46, Beechwood's fire chief for the past 21 years, and a 28-year member of the department and a First Responder. Mark is a third-generation firefighter in Beechwood, following in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, the late Leroy and Milton Muench. Mark's stepson Andrew Haugen, 23, is also a firefighter in Beechwood.

The Wisconsin Heroes Award, which the First Lady presents in person each month, since its initiation in 2012, recognizes an outstanding Wisconsin resident who is making a difference through volunteer endeavors -- an ordinary person doing extraordinary things -- going the extra mile to take a

stand for causes he or she believes in.

The award, a handsome plaque, is a symbol for saying "thank you" to the volunteer for his or her willingness, compassion and commitment for the betterment of Wisconsin. These Wisconsin Heroes positively impact the lives of their neighbors, community and state.

Lori Muench, Mark's wife, a teacher at Barton Elementary School, nominated her husband for the award, via an online application. She received a phone call June 5 that Mark had been selected to receive the award.

She is thrilled. "I am very excited and proud of him for his years of dedication," she said. "He puts his heart into everything he does. He is a hands-on chief, right there working with department members. He never makes his group do something he would not want to do." It wasn't easy, but Lori's family and Beechwood Fire Department members kept the award ceremony a secret.

Each year, a silent auction is held at Barton Elementary School as a fundraiser. One of the prizes is a ride in a Beechwood Fire Department truck. This year's ride will take place June 30. But Mark was told that

event would be held on June 20. So he headed to the fire hall, gearing up for the ride.

Meanwhile, several department members, Muench family members, friends and media representatives gathered at the fire hall, which was handsomely decorated in red, white and blue crepe paper and balloons. Tonette Walker, her Chief of Staff Tiffany Black, and a security member arrived a few minutes before Mark and Lori did. Within minutes, Mark opened the door to the shouts of "Surprise!"

The First Lady approached him to inform him of the reason for the gathering and why he was selected to receive the award. She listed information Lori had provided on the application.

Mark has written grants that resulted in the receipt of \$315,000 for fire equipment updates.

He works besides his fellow firefighters, making sure the hoses are rolled up and the generators are repaired.

For the past several years, he has assisted with fundraisers -- can collections and brat fries -- obtaining scholarships for children to attend the Wisconsin Alliance for Fire Safety Burn Camp for Kids, located in East

Troy. Last year's scholarship was for \$1,000.

He checks on elderly loved ones regularly and volunteers at Lori's school, assisting with the silent auction and hunting for Monarch butterflies and countless other tasks.

"He has dedicated his entire life to his hometown," the First Lady said. "Thank you so much for all you do for Wisconsin. I appreciate all of your efforts."

The baffled fire chief shook Walker's hand and said, "I didn't think this was going to be here. Thank you."

He then hugged Lori.

As the group lined up to enjoy a light supper, the First Lady discussed details of the Wisconsin Heroes Award. She said she had attended a meeting of First Ladies. "Two of them -- one from Rhode Island and the other from Louisiana -- were already granting such awards," Walker said. "I thought this would be a nice way to focus on volunteers who go beyond the call of duty."

Thus, she initiated the award program here in Wisconsin. She encourages Wisconsin residents to nominate such volunteers online to receive a Wisconsin Heroes' Award. She has an advisory council of women

who read the nominations and select the winner.

"I stay neutral," she said. "But I present the award, and it is always a surprise to the recipient."

Not all recipients are adults. "I presented one to a teenager, 17, who organized a food drive," she said.

The beaming fire chief sat at the table, about to begin his meal and reading the inscription on his plaque. "This is a big shock," he said. "I never had a clue."


He added that when the Beechwood firefighters take students on fire-truck rides, they wear their department polo shirts. However, he had been asked to dress up that night and wondered why. He was told that parents of the children who were to take the ride had requested he dress in his uniform, so they could have photos of him in his official attire.

As to what he finds the most rewarding aspect of firefighting, he said, "I enjoy helping people when I'm needed."

A town of Scott high-way foreman, Mark has four step-children. In addition to Andrew, mentioned above, they

Butterfly release tradition continues at Cedar Community

Ruth Schwichtenberg kept two monarchs close to her heart as she waited for the moment to set it free during the Cedar Hospice Butterfly Release Thursday.

One she would release in honor of her husband Vern, who died 16 years ago, and another was for a dear friend, William Kleinert, who passed away in July last year.

Visitors ate picnic lunches, listened to music and wrote notes on boards that bore the names of loved ones who they gathered to honor. Before the release, they assembled near a tent in Dandelion Park on the Cedar Community grounds for

a short program.

"Thank you for sharing this special moment with us," said Cedar Lake Hospice Assistant Director Lisa Lipski.

A symbol of hope, spirit and rebirth, Chaplin Bev Hansen paralleled the life cycle of the butterfly with the departed, saying the cocoon is not a forever tomb and, like the butterfly, we will all emerge a changed and beautiful creature.

A rogue monarch flitted over visitor's heads as Caleb Folks played the song "Butterfly Release."

"It's a special time to heal and remember," said Tracey MacGregor, director of marketing and communications at Cedar Community.

After the program partic-

ipants gathered in a field and sounds of wonder and applause were heard as the monarchs paused on hands, heads and clothing before rising to the sky.

MacGregor said they heard about the release, which has been done at a hospice in Florida for the past six or eight years.

The Cedar Hospice hosted their first butterfly release in September last year, with 220 butterflies and about 250 people attending.

Before this year's event, 290 butterflies were sold and 340 attendees were preregistered.

Between nursing, hospice and chore services, Cedar Community Home Health and Hospice serves about 200 people per day in both the campus setting and the community.

Fellow firefighters present were thrilled for their chief. "Our chief does a lot and is good to be around," said Assistant Chief Scott Krahn.

"He puts in extra personal time, more time than any of us," said Rich Goebel. He organizes the meetings and has a good handle on procedures, including county procedures."

Larry Gessner noted, "He is easy to get along with, yet runs a tight ship. He is very knowledgeable."

Little Folks opened in the town of Wayne in 1997 and has

always worked towards quality. In 2001, they proved to be a top notch daycare. Sargent had applied to and was accepted into the quality enhancement grant program in Washington county. At that time, Washington county had 32 State licensed child care facilities. Out of those 32, Little Folks along with 20 other centers applied. 

The road machinery was moved to the town of Wayne from Allenton last week Thursday. At present there are about six teams and 15 men engaged in the work. In a short time Mr. Cameron expects that there will be about 15 teams and 25 men working. Together with the county and state aid, the town has raised \$6,000 to defray the expenses, which will all go towards building the road from Joe Campbell corner to Wayne Center, about two miles in length. How long it will take to complete this road is hard to tell at the present writing. After the completion of this road, the

machinery will be moved to the town of Kewaskum, where a state road has been surveyed on the south end on the Fond du Lac Road. \$1,500 will be spent in building this road.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Richard Knoebel, Andy Pesch, Joel Serwe, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Mike Berger was excused and absent. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Jerry Gilles, Chad Cook and Stephanie Justmann. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on May 30, 2013. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The water utility performs multiple tasks in various departments and operations are intertwined providing a more efficient process and service. Each well house and pump station inspection includes disarming the system, reading meter hours, well gallons pumped, weight of fluoride is calculated, application dosage in recorded on the daily DNR log sheet and the alarm is reactivated. The overtime hours are contributable to water main breaks and snow removal during off hours due the volume of traffic in the business district.

3. Reported there are 56 property owners on Main Street

that will be affected by Hwy 28/ Main Street project.

There was more than enough drama in the games played by the Kewaskum Athletics during the past week.

The As managed to go 4-0, but needed a two-run rally in the bottom of the ninth to nip Rubicon 4-3 on June 23, a day after edging Mt. Calvary of the East Shore League 3-0 in a first-round S.W.A.B.A. tournament game and three days after using a grand slam homer to defeat the host West Bend Benders, 4-2.

The only breather came on June 17 when Kewaskum pounded Lannon-Sussex 13-2 in a Tri-County Nite League game.

With these victories, the As are sporting a glossy 22-2 record and stand atop both the Rock River-North League, currently at 8-1, and the Tri-County Lakes League at a perfect 8-0.

The As certainly needed the win over Rubicon because it keeps them a half game ahead of both the Red Sox and Brownsville.

Rubicon scored single runs in the fourth and fifth innings off of As' starter Jim Ziegler for a 2-0 lead.

Adam Sarauer cut the lead in half with a two-out, RBI single in the sixth, but Rubi-

con added another single run in the bottom of the sixth to push the lead to 3-1.

Brad Young got the rally going when he was hit by a pitch, and he eventually came around to score on an Austin Sarauer fielder's choice. Sarauer was able to advance to second base on the play thanks to a wild throw. In the win over Mt. Calvary, Adam Sarauer's bases-loaded double broke a scoreless tie in the bottom of the sixth.

Brad Young finished off his complete-game shutout in the seventh to preserve the win. It was Young's (7IP, 3 Hits, 4 K's) second win of the year.

Zagzebski's walk-off grand slam gave the As a dramatic 4-2 win over West Bend 7up. The As' struggled mightily all game long failing to come up with the clutch hit throughout, but Brad Boegel had another excellent appearance on the mound to keep the As'

in the game until the very end. Boegel gave up just one run over eight innings of work.

West Bend 7up added a run in the top of the ninth to go up 2-0 and appeared to be on the verge of knocking off their local rivals.

Conference realignment may be coming for Indians

The winds of high school athletic conference realignment are starting to blow, and when the dust settles, Kewaskum High School could find itself in a league with some old rivals and several new ones.

The word could be used above because talks of moving some schools from one conference into another are still in the early stages, according to KHS Athletic Director Jason Piittmann.

Enrollment plunges have prompted talk of realignment. One example is New Holstein, which experienced a big decline to a current enrollment of 341, smallest in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which Kewaskum is currently a member of.

Piittmann reported Friday on a meeting that took place recently with all the ADs from the EWC, which is one of those included in what Deb Hauser, the Associate Director of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), is calling the "Green Bay area alignment." Hauser, who is in charge of realignment at the WIAA, was at that meeting.

"She was kind of updating us and getting our input" on proposals included in that alignment, Piittmann said, indicating she also touched on "where to possibly look to go from there."

The original proposal pretty well "blows up what we currently have," Piittmann said. "Four of us would go one way, and four would stick together."

The four that would stay together are Kewaskum, Plymouth, Campbellsport and Waupun, and Piittmann said, "The original proposal also had Winnebago Lutheran Academy, Ripon and Berlin with us" in a seven-team league. The first four schools are all within 30 miles of each other, while the other trips to

Ripon and Berlin would be a bit longer.

"Now the new idea would take Winnebago Lutheran out and put Kettle Moraine Lutheran (in Jackson) in and also Winneconne," Piittmann said, noting WLA's enrollment is only in the mid-300s, while, "KML is thought to be a better fit."

Concerning how far it is from Kewaskum to Winneconne, Piittmann said, "Only about an hour or so."

Except for Plymouth, the schools would be very comparable in size, according to Piittmann, who said Kewaskum and Waupun would each be just under 600 students, while the others would be between 428 (KML) and 585 (Ripon). "Plymouth would be the largest at 900," Piittmann said.

"It's not a bad grouping for us," Piittmann said. "Travel would be pretty much a wash with Two Rivers out. The big concern we have is some of those schools do not have boys' or girls' soccer."

Piittmann said some schools in the Packerland and Olympian Conferences have combined in some sports but not all. "We might have to look at that idea," he said, indicating also that none of these new schools have summer baseball.

Piittmann said he has kept the Kewaskum Superintendent of Schools abreast of the new proposals. I talked with Mr. (James) Smasal about it, and he has spoken to Deb Hauser. He's OK with it."

Piittmann stressed at this point nothing is definite. "This is a long way from being final," he said. "Probably a 2015 implementation at the earliest."

Kewaskum entered the Eastern Wisconsin Conference in 1980. "We have had little changes (since then)," Piittmann said, referring to the year Chilton left the EWC and Campbellsport came in, "and we had Waupun coming in six or seven years ago" when Manitowoc Roncalli left.

Wade paces trap team in state competition

After a couple weeks of waiting, the results of the 2013 State High School Trap Shooting meet are finally available.

The results of the May 17, 100-bird competition aren't what the Kewaskum coaches had hoped for, but having one team among the top 20 was still a good accomplishment.

KHS #3 finished in a tie for 17th with 430 points. The Indian shooters missed 13th place by just two points.

ing a score of 94, placing him in a tie for 25th overall out of a total of approximately 1,123 shooters. Wade started out with a perfect core of 25, and followed that up with three 23s in a row for his total.

The following shooters who achieved "Letter Recognition" during the state shoot; Brzozowski, 91; Jake Reck, 91; Greg Martin, 90; Travis Trapp, 89; Ethan Vetter, 88; Chad Ray, 87; Jared Sanborn, 86; Joe Ballard, 85; Trevor Melzer, 85.

Individual girls' awards went to Serena Vetter who was Class C Champ, Jessica Cotter who was Class E Champ, and Courtney Schmidt, who was Class G runnerup.

"We wrapped up the season last Tuesday evening

where we handed out five special awards," Taylor said, reporting team MVP honors went to Wade, who posted a season average of 21.6 (out of 25), while Sanborn was team high boy with a 21.04 avg. and the team high girl was Melissa Taylor with a 17.63 avg.

The Most Improved Shooter was Brady Weinert, who had an 8.92 avg. increase over the year. Named as Rookie of the Year was Brzozowski, with a 20.94 avg.

Melissa Taylor was recognized by taking 5th place among all the girls in the entire conference with a 74% hit average.

Kewaskum, which has won four of its last five, improved to 6-4 in the EWC and 6-8 overall. Falls is now 9-5 in conference action.

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
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
