

## St. Lucas worship place celebrates 100 years

St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kewaskum launched a year of celebration recently, starting with the 100th anniversary of the laying of its cornerstone.

After the congregation's building committee took a huge step in 1912 to recommend the construction of a new church at its current site on Parkview Drive, the project was begun with an estimated price tag of \$10,500.

A vote to build the church was passed 30 to 19.

Rev. Tim Henning is not certain how many were in the congregation when the church was erected. He and

others are aware, however, of the dedication of the parishioners during that time because, while the actual cost rose to \$15,000 (including furnishings), individual parishioners and various organizations dug in to pay off the extra debt within the next two years.

The new cornerstone was laid on June 22, 1913, under the direction of Pastor Frederick Greve, who served the people at St. Lucas for 37 years before ill health forced him to retire.

The original plans called for the church to be completed by Oct. 1, but a series of delays postponed completion until January of 1914, and on February 1 that year, the church was

officially dedicated. Morning and afternoon services were conducted in German, and the evening service in English.

Pictures and accounts of the church in 1914 indicate the street in front of St. Lucas consisted of gravel and dirt, so people undoubtedly traveled to the Sunday services in their horse-drawn carriages or Model As if they owned one.

Two current parish members, James Zautner and Jim Fischer, own vintage models of these vehicles and on the day of the cornerstone centennial, drove them to the service.

## Village ... ts Impact ... moratorium

Village of Kewaskum Trustees interested in stimulating some growth in the village have taken action to place a one-year moratorium on the village's collection of impact fees. A public hearing to amend the ordinance was held Monday evening and Trustees were set to vote on enacting the ordinance.

Impact fees are a method municipalities can use to help pay for costs of infrastructure due to growth of the community. The fees, only applicable on new construction, are collected at the time a building permit is issued. The money collected can only be used for needs outlined in a plan written when the fees were adopted. If the money is not used in a specified time frame, the money must be returned to the property owner who paid the fee.

Kewaskum has collected three impact fees, one each for sewer, water and parks. They began collecting impact fees in 2006. The sewer impact fee for a typical single-family home was \$2,283. A water impact fee was \$3,672.56 The parks impact fee was \$1,337.

Trustee Joel Serve brought the idea to the Village Board for discussion at the June 17 meeting. Village Attorney Gerald Kiefer, at that meeting, advised the board on their options. He advised the board to adopt either a one or two-year moratorium.

Kiefer explained their action would not trigger repayment of any fees that have already been collected. He reminded Trustees the only way a fee is refunded is by not spending the money for allowable purposes within the time-frame set forth in state statutes.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser added that building permits in the village are valid for two years, so someone could take one out now to avoid the impact fees and then build when the moratorium ends.

Regarding other communities that charge impact fees, no two are really the same. Neighboring Campbellsport, to the north, charges two fees; one for water and the other for wastewater (sewer) based on the size of the lateral from the home to the main. Taking the typical one inch lateral, Campbellsport charges \$2,250 for water and \$2,375

Woodland Creek Supper Club, formerly known as the Fin 'n Feather in New Prospect, has new owners, a new menu and a facelift, but visitors will still recognize the park like patio, laid back atmosphere and mementos of its past owners and customers.

The restaurant and bar reopened June 12 with owners Daryl and Heather Frey and general manager Jessei Kassens ready to greet hungry and thirsty patrons.

Kassens says the first week brought in the curious and campers from surrounding lakes.

She hopes the great service, great food and fantastic Old Fashioneds will bring those initial patrons and their friends back again and again.

Having worked in the restaurant field for more than two decades Daryl Frey, who owned the Fire House Restaurant in Saukville, sold the business to his partner.

After a few months off, he was looking to get back in the

game and when his real estate agent said the Fin 'n Feather was up for sale, Frey thought it was worth a look.

"I've always been an 'up north' type person," says Frey.

On April 5 this year the sale was finalized and work began to transform the bar and restaurant.

New carpeting, décor, painting and refurbished barstools reflect an upgraded image with backwoods flair.

The Milwaukee River winds behind the restaurant and the property's garden can be viewed from many of the dining area's 28 tables that are arranged in three separate rooms.

Frey says in the next few weeks, the outdoor dining area should be ready to go.

The bar, which seats 26 patrons, still has a strip of wood with embedded artifacts of the past owners and patrons that is accented with a dark stone surface.

The supper club offers fine dining in a casual atmosphere, nightly specials and a full menu, from homemade appetizers like crab cakes and

garlic shrimp to sandwiches, burgers and wraps to steak dinners, chicken Oscar, lobster, eggplant and chicken parmesan and vegetable pomodoro.

Frey says unlike most supper clubs, they also offer pizzas, which he hopes will become a favorite of boaters and campers in the area.

## New sports conference possible for Indians

The winds of high school athletic conference realignment are starting to blow, and when the dust settles, Kewaskum High School could find itself in a league with some old rivals and several new ones.

The word could be used above because talks of moving some schools from one conference into another are still in the early stages, according to KHS Athletic Director Jason Piittmann.

Enrollment plunges have prompted talk of realignment. One example is New Holstein, which experienced a big decline to a current enrollment of 341, smallest in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, which Kewaskum is currently a member of.

Piittmann reported on a meeting that took place recently with all the ADs from the EWC, including Deb Hauser, the Associate Director of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA), who is calling it the "Green Bay area alignment." Hauser, who is in charge of realignment at the WIAA, was at that meeting.

"She was kind of updating us and getting our input" on proposals included in that alignment, Piittmann said, indicating she also touched on "where to possibly look to go from there."

The original proposal pretty well "blows up what we currently have," Piittmann said. "Four of us would go one way, and four would stick together."

The four that would stay together are Kewaskum, Plymouth, Campbellsport and Waupun, and Piittmann said, "The original proposal also had Winnebago Lutheran Academy, Ripon and Berlin with us" in a seven-team league. The first four schools are all within 30 miles of each other, while the other trips to Ripon and Berlin would be a

bit longer.

"Now the new idea would take Winnebago Lutheran out and put Kettle Moraine Lutheran (in Jackson) in and also Winneconne," Piittmann said, noting WLA's enrollment is only in the mid-300s, while, "KML is thought to be a better fit."

Concerning how far it is from Kewaskum to Winneconne, Piittmann said, "Only about an hour or so."

Except for Plymouth, the schools would be very comparable in size, according to Piittmann, who said Kewaskum and Waupun would each be just under 600 students, while the others would be between 428 (KML) and 585 (Ripon). "Plymouth would be the largest at 900," Piittmann said.

"It's not a bad grouping for us," Piittmann said. "Travel would be pretty much a wash with Two Rivers out. The big concern we have is some of those schools do not have boys' or girls' soccer."

Piittmann said some schools in the Packerland and Olympian Conferences have combined in some sports but not all. "We might have to look at that idea," he said, indicating also that none of these new schools have summer baseball.

Piittmann said he has kept the Kewaskum Superintendent of Schools abreast of the new proposals. I talked with Mr. (James) Smasal about it, and he has spoken to Deb Hauser. He's OK with it."

Piittmann stressed at this point nothing is definite. "This is a long way from being final," he said. "Probably a 2015 implementation at the earliest."

Kewaskum entered the Eastern Wisconsin Conference in 1980. "We have had little changes (since then)," Piittmann said, referring to the year Chilton left the EWC and Campbellsport came in, "and we had Waupun coming in six or seven years ago" when Manitowoc Roncalli left.

for wastewater (sewer). Jackson, to the south charges two impact fees; one for water, \$820; and one for police and fire protection at a rate of \$1,430.

Heiser reported that the City of Hartford does not call what they charge impact fees. They call their fees utility connection fees which allows them to escape all the clauses of the impact fee laws.

Trustee Dick Knoebel asked if there have been other communities who have suspended fees. Heiser explained only one in the entire state has taken such action, that being the town of St. Joseph in St. Croix County.

According to minutes from their (St. Joseph) town board meeting in

January of 2013, the community had suspended collection of the fees in 2012 and voted in favor of continuing their suspension of fee collections through 2013. It was noted that the suspension did not yield increased development there.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann explained that he didn't see the suspension as a cost to the village, but as an investment for tax base for the future.

Village resident Frank Beesten was the lone village resident expressing concern over enacting the moratorium. He felt the village was giving away money by not collecting the fees.

Trustee Joel Serwe stated he wanted to see 20 new homes built to in-

crease the tax base. "That money will be here forever, when that home is built those taxes are here forever." He also pointed out those new homes are new customers for the water and sewer utility as well which has the opportunity to lower water and sewer rates as new customers are added to the system.

"You're talking about losing the impact fees on a house, but we don't even know that house will be built. We're trying to promote some type of movement," Trustee Mike Berger added.


Scheunemann stated he wanted to see a two-year moratorium, but he would be willing try it for a year if his

fellow Trustees felt that was the better option. "I think a one-year test run would be a great thing for the village."

Scheunemann motioned to have the board look at 12-month moratorium and Trustee Serwe seconded the motion bringing it up for a vote that passed. That action allowed the board to hold a public hearing set for Monday evening and then take official action on the ordinance.

Heiser stated Monday morning he believed the ordinance would pass. The Statesman will post what action the Village Board took on their Facebook (statesman publications)/Twitter (statesmannews) feed Tuesday morning.

## No ordinary marathon for Drexler

Dave Drexler, retired Kewaskum High School Technology Education teacher "has no idea" how many marathons he has run during his long history of distance running, but ask him which was the toughest one, and that's easy. It was the marathon he ran recently on the Great Wall of China.

Not too many people can run over nine hours in one stretch, but that's how long it took Drexler to cover the 26-plus miles, and he was among the top 20 finishers.

What made this race so much more difficult than those held in Chicago or northern Wisconsin, or New York City or even Boston? The answer is simple. For nearly all of the Beijing Marathon, the runners were going up or down on steep grades and they were running on rocks on the narrow trails that made up the course.


Originally, Drexler and members of his family had signed up for a 10-day trip to see China, but he said, "Then I looked up when the marathon was" and found two dates, May 1 and May 18.

Drexler decided to combine distance and pleasure and run on the early date in the Beijing Marathon, and, of course, continued to train as he has done since his days in high school and college.

Drexler left for China four days before the race. "With all the traveling, you want to have a couple days for acclimating" to the visiting country, he said.

"Team Drexler" — his wife Cori and four siblings also took part in shorter races — was ready to go on race day, but Drexler said he had a two-hour bus ride to reach the start of the marathon.

"We were a group of seven," Drexler said, reporting most of his brothers and sisters walked in shorter events, and, "We had a great experi-

ence."

So what was the most difficult part of this marathon? "The wall!" Drexler said with a chuckle. Even after doing a lot of training on steps. He said one look at it, and he said, "This is going to be tough."

"You can't imagine the steepness," Drexler went on, indicating some of the grades were 70 and 80 degrees. Plus, "all the steps were different sizes," the depth changed, and some of them had actually worn away. "The stones were all broken up ... You had to be careful," especially when the path made a turn.

Luckily the altitude turned out not to be a problem since the wall is only at 3 to 4,000 feet above sea level.

While Drexler is normally able to finish a marathon in three and a quarter to four hours, this one took nine hours and 15 minutes to complete. While his time may seem high, he said he finished 17th overall and perhaps was tops in his age group.

The winning time was 6 hours and 17 minutes, much

longer than the time of 3 and one half hours it took to win the other marathon in China, which was run on a flatter surface.

So how did Drexler feel the day after the race? "Sore, very sore," he said, especially in the calves and quads.

Still, Drexler was glad to have had the experience, and to have spent a week in China where the group visited the Forbidden City, temples, the home of the Terra Cotta Soldiers and Shanghai.

"Another one to check off the bucket list," he concluded.

## Committee structure will change in School District

The only school district in the area and quite possibly the state, that has community members making decisions affecting policy, finances and buildings will soon change.

Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal advised the board to adopt a structure known as Committee as a Whole. In that setting, the whole membership of the board sits as a committee and operates under informal rules.

Smasal stated each of the district's seven committees, Building & Grounds, Finance, Negotiations, Policy, CESA, WASB, and a resurrected Special Education committee will each have a liaison. That liaison will take it upon them self to investigate information to present to the entire board as decisions are made.

Other committees such as the Insurance, Mascot and Human Growth and Development would revert to being ad-hoc committees.

Smasal went on to say however the committee liaison wants to handle things for their committees is up to them. "We are not excluding anyone, we are restructuring it in a way to make

it more efficient and more valuable. This is a way we can be efficient and use people's time effectively," Smasal explained.

Freshman board member Heather Oelhafen was not convinced this was a good strategy for Kewaskum. Her concern was if a board member would fail to do their due diligence.

It was noted the largest change will come to the Policy Committee, where it was decided the district would outsource organizing and updating the district's policies.

Administrative Assistant Jeanne Jacak stated Smasal, Clerk Mary Miller and herself would do the legwork with the company and then make the board aware of changes at the monthly meetings.

The company doing the work Neola, would charge the district \$8,000 to start and then an annual fee of \$1,900 for maintenance.

The Board approved the new committee structure on a motion by Vice President Jim Leister and a second by Mary Miller. Oelhafen voted against the change.

Smasal later stated the new structure will start in August.

## St. Lucas

"That was pretty cool," Rev. Henning, who has been an associate pastor at St. Lucas since 1991, said, noting it put a perspective on how people traveled a century ago.

Rev. Henning and Rev. Troy Swenson, who came to St. Lucas in 2008, currently serve a parish that numbers 950, including some who are second and even third-generation members.

"The Meilahn family," Rev. Henning said after thinking of long-standing members, adding, "and the Schaub family has been here since the church was built."

Other familiar names, like Klukas, Backhaus and Schultz come to mind.

Concerning the oldest member, until early June, that would have been Ray Schaefer, but he passed away on June 3 at the age of 102.

"He (Schaefer) was older than the church building," Rev. Henning said. "He was active right till the end."

As far as the official 100th year celebration service and dinner, Rev. Henning said, "We're going to do that in February. This is a series of celebrations."

During the weekend of Saturday and Sunday, July 27-28 the congregation will pay tribute to its 80-year old pipe organ, a Verlinden-Weick-

ert-Dorndoff pipe organ purchased for \$2,800 in 1932.

"We've used it every week, for every service" since it was installed at the church, according to Rev. Henning, who said, a special organist, Charles Bonow of Louiston, MN., will present concerts that weekend.

"He (Bonow) was a Lutheran minister who now does organ recitals" around the country," Rev. Henning said, adding, "There will be a lot of hymn singing as well."

St. Lucas currently owns two parsonages and since 1976 had operated its own school. "We have about 110 students K-8 (kindergarten through grade 8)," Henning said.

On the weekend of the centennial of the cornerstone, Rev. Henning's message centered around "Christ being the cornerstone (of life) from 1 Peter. "The foundation of our lives is Jesus," he said. "That is the symbolism of the cornerstone of the church."

Parishioner Jay Shambeau was impressed by Rev. Henning's words, "This is a great reminder of the 100 years of blessings we have received worshipping at this facility," he said, adding the cornerstone should be an indication of much more than a physical building.


This year's event also offered additional free things for the youth such as bracelet making, bouncy house and Dizzy the Clown.

It was at this point Gonring called on Michael Prochnow to take the mound.

"Little Michael Prochnow, a freshman, came in and got the save," Gonring said, reporting he got the second out on a fly out, and the game ended in dramatic fashion when Bille Lehmann made a diving catch on a ball hit to left.

"We scored two big runs in the top of the seventh," Gonring went on. Ethan Vetter led off with a walk and promptly stole second. Hardy

followed with an RBI single, then Nick Banks laid down a successful bunt, and Brett Boegel reached on an error that allowed Hardy to score.

Kewaskum outhit Kiel, seven to four, with Banks contributing three of those hits, two on bunts.

The Indians led 5-3 in the fifth when the skies opened and shut the game down for the next 40 minutes.

Gonring said the grounds crew did a nice job getting the field ready for play, but for a while he wondered if his team was mentally ready to resume the game.

"Like Yogi Berra said, the game's never over until the fat lady sings ... Well, she about started singing on us," Gonring said, adding, "We did just enough to win."

Hunter Demmon started for the Indians but when he hit two batters to open the fourth, Gonring brought in Zack Hedlund, who lasted until the top of the seventh.

On Wednesday, the Indians used a stellar pitching performance by Boegel to stay close to the unbeaten Panthers for five innings before falling 9-1.
