

## Doers of the word, House of Prayer marks 25 years

**KEWASKUM-** Its beginning may appear humbling, but the Kewaskum House of Prayer, which will celebrate its 25th anniversary this Sunday, July 14, has always stressed a simple yet strong message of service to Jesus Christ and to one another.

"We strive to support and encourage each other in our Christian faith and its application to our lives," Joseph Brath, the senior pastor of the church since 1992, said earlier this week about its unofficial mission statement.

The first service of the Kewaskum Living Waters Church, the original name of the congregation, was held on June 2, 1988 in the Kewaskum Labor Union Hall, with Pastor Robert Lormis officiating.

At first, Pastor Lormis officiated at services on Thursday evenings, but the next month, they added Sunday services as well.

Pastor Brath and his wife Joan came to Kewaskum in September of 1990. Pastor Brath served as assistant pastor to Pastor Lormis until 1992, when Lormis and his wife Laura felt they were being called to an evangelistic field.

"He (Lormis) stayed until Easter Sunday of 1992," Pastor Brath said,

noting that is when he was elevated to senior pastor.

Already the congregation had moved its services to its current site at 100 Clinton St. "The building was purchased by Living Waters in January of 1989," according to Pastor Brath, who said, "It took a lot of remodeling" first to construct a sanctuary and fellowship hall and later classrooms and an office.

"On May 21, 1989, the first service was held in the building," Pastor Brath, who is from the Mayville-Iron Ridge area and lived in Horicon prior to coming to Kewaskum said.

Pastor Brath said his church has approximately 50 members, including a couple that has been active since it was started. They are Harlan and Trudy Weisser. Another longtime member is Bonnie Scheifelbein of Kewaskum.

The Weissers like the smallness of the congregation. "You get to know everybody," Trudy Weisser said, adding, "Pastor Joe is a wonderful teacher."

The name of the church was changed from Living Waters to House of Prayer in 2005. It is a branch of the House of Prayer in Horicon and also the House of Prayer in Slinger is in its fellowship.

Since the congregation is small, Pastor Brath has also worked various

jobs outside the church until several years ago when he received a very important phone call with an offer for him to become a chaplain for an assisted living home.

Pastor Brath said, "It was a God-invented job," and his wife said, "It fit like a glove."

Pastor Brath now serves as chaplain for Kettle Moraine Gardens in Kewaskum, Belgium Gardens in Belgium, Cedar Grove Gardens I and II in Cedar Grove and Serenity Village I and II in Slinger.

"When they (Senior homes) have a chaplain on staff, that means a lot to people," Joan Brath said.

"I also do a Bible Study once a week at Autumn Oaks in Slinger," Pastor Brath said, indicating he and participating residents go over one chapter every week, an opportunity not many people have today.

Sunday's celebration will include a 10 a.m. service, followed by a light lunch, and an open house from 12:30 to 2 p.m. There will be music on the grounds, a slide show depicting the early days of the church, and a 2 p.m. service, featuring the founding pastor and Pastor John Beauprey from the Horicon House of Prayer. The festivities will close with cake and coffee fellowship.

## Indians clear first hurdle of tournament

**KEWASKUM-** After the regional opener here Tuesday evening, there were as many fans wishing coach Doug Goring good luck as there were congratulating him.

The congratulations were for the Indians' 5-1 victory over Random Lake, moving them into the regional final against either New Holstein or Howards Grove.

The good luck was referring to Goring's scheduled knee replacement surgery, which was to take place Wednesday at St. Joseph's Hospital.

The fourth-seeded Indians team gave him a winning send-off, but as has been the case in recent years, it wasn't the easy win one might have expected against the 13th-seeded Rams, who ended their year at 6-15.

"It's (first tournament game) always the toughest game," Goring said, indicating for a while the Indians were playing like no one wanted to make mistakes and no one wanted to be a hero. "You're always on pins and needles."

The score was 3-1 after the fourth, then the Indians added a 2-run cushion.

"As we forced situations, I think that helped us," the coach said, referring to some dropped balls by the Rams. "We got some breaks with the miscues they made."

After a scoreless first, the Indians scored two runs in the second with just one base hit. Ram starter Reed Ankum was working with two outs when he hit Hunter Demmon with a pitch, then Sam Schlosser blooped a single just over second base, and Ethan Vetter reached on an error to load the bases.

Leadoff man Jacob Hardy followed with what looked to be a routine grounder, but the third baseman couldn't handle it and two runners came home.

In the fourth, KHS added another run on a pair of walks, a stolen base and a sacrifice fly, which allowed Hardy to race home from third.

Singles by Chad Ray, Ethan Vetter and Hardy (RBI) helped to put runs No. 4 and 5 on the board. They too were unearned because of an error after two outs.

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## Third Street reconstruction project underway

Crews endured less than ideal weather conditions on Monday as construction began on the first road project in the village of Kewaskum since 2009. Residents along 550 feet of Third St. will have water mains replaced and new asphalt by the middle of August if all goes well.

The project starts at the intersection of Third St. and Bilgo Ln. and follows an easterly path around a curve, ending 20-30 feet south on Parkview Dr. That stretch of road is heavily travelled during the school year as parents and students commute to village schools.

The project originally began as a resurfacing project but in February at the advice of DPW Director Jerry Gilles the Village Board decided to spend between \$75-\$80,000 to make water main improvements while the road was under construction.

Woleske Construction Company of Green Bay was awarded the contract with a low bid of \$109,419. Camp-

bellsport's Mueller Excavating came in with the second lowest bid of \$143,768.75. The village's engineering firm, Ruekert Mielke said they had no objections to using Woleske Construction.


Asphalt work will be completed by Payne and Dolan of Fitchburg. Ptaschinski Construction of Beaver Dam will install concrete and Gary's Landscaping of Campbellsport will perform restoration work.

The water main portion of the project will be paid by the village's water utility. Gilles in February, stated the water utility has about \$453,000 in cash available for projects.

The asphalt portion of the project was budgeted for in the 2013 budget.

Gilles was pleased to report the construction manager was able to relay water in a number of different directions so that residents and the schools would be without water for hours, not days.

Depending on the weather cooperating Gilles said asphalt is expected to be completed the first week of August.

## Contract for SRO reached between school and village

The Kewaskum School District and Village Police Department have reached an agreement for the School Resource Officer (SRO) contract the two units of government work together on.

In September of 2012, the Kewaskum School District did not renew their contract with the village where the police department supplied a police officer to work within the school buildings in the village. The program was set to end on June 30, 2013.

In February, Board of Education President Tim Ramthun stated he consulted with Washington County Sheriff Dale Schmidt about the possibility of utilizing their department as a way to provide coverage at all the district schools. Schmidt stated he was willing to discuss options with the district at that time. In March Schmidt initiated a program at Wayne and Farmington where a deputy visits those schools.

The School District and Police Department began working together in spring to come up with a mutually beneficial arrangement. In April, The Statesman announced the change of the SRO from Officer Barry Granrath to Officer Kevin Kohn. Kohn has been a member of the department since 2001.

"From a security standpoint, it is important that the police department has an officer on scene immediately in case there is any threat to the security of students and staff at the schools. As we have seen over

the last decade or so, nobody is immune from the possibility of an attack and a quick response is crucial in those types of situations," Kewaskum's Chief of Police Tom Bishop remarked.

The School District approved a two-year contract at their meeting on Monday, June 24. The Village accepted the contract at their meeting on Monday, July 1. The contract will begin on August 1, 2013. The previous contract did not have a renewal process whereas this one is renewed every two years.

"The majority of issues that we see that affect our young people will affect both the police department and the school district. Both the school and the

department benefit from having an officer in the school. The school benefits from the presence and security aspect and the department benefits from the positive relationships the officer can build plus being able to handle situations without removing an officer from the road," Chief Bishop continued.

The school district will reimburse the village \$27,000 in the first year of the contract and \$40,000 in the second year. The school district's portion of the wage goes up in year two to make it more of a 60/40 percent split. Chief Bishop stated that in the next contract it is likely to be more of a 50/50 percent endeavor between the two entities.

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## Chief's Corner

I hope everyone had a safe and happy Independence Day! I would like to thank the Kewaskum Fire Department for doing an outstanding job on the July 3rd Independence Day Celebration in Riverhill Park. It takes a lot of time and dedicated volunteers to make the celebration a success and they did so once again. I would also like to publicly thank our Auxiliary Police Officers. They volunteer their time to assist our department in traffic control and creating a police presence in the park and around the Village. They also did an excellent job once again!

The topic I want to focus on this month is a problem we continue to see, primarily on the east side of town; the number of feral cats we have. I have received a number of complaints over the last two summers about people who are feeding these cats. It is important to know that feral cats are not domesticated cats and should not be treated as such. Feral cats are wild animals and feeding them is not any different than feeding raccoons or some other type of animal. These cats cause a nuisance for neighbors who have to deal with having these cats in their yards, on their decks or porches because they will hang around wherever there is food.


The only way to truly eradicate our feral cat problem is by

stopping the reproduction of the cats. The Washington County Humane Society will spay or neuter feral cats free of charge; however the residents in town must first live trap the cat and then bring it to the Humane Society. After the Humane Society has spayed or neutered the animal, the resident must pick up the cat and return it back to the location where it was found. The Humane Society will dock one of the cat's ears to indicate that cat has been spayed or neutered. This will prevent the reproduction of the cats and eventually eradicate the problem. This is a program that worked well in the Village of Jackson but it does take some time and dedication to the problem.

Anyone who lives on the east side of town or who has ever been driving around during the nighttime hours knows just how serious of a problem we have. There are a lot of cats running around town and living in the sewers, under decks or other structures. Unfortunately this is a community problem that can only be solved by having everyone in the community assist in the catch, spay / neuter and release program offered by the Humane Society and by NOT feeding the animals.

## Gruber resigns from Village Water Utility

After 19 years as a village employee, Water Utility employee Craig Gruber tendered his resignation. The resignation came less than a week after the Village Board, along with the Chief of Police, concluded an investigation into allegations of misconduct.

On Monday, June 24, the Kewaskum Village Board, in a special morning meeting directed Chief of Police Tom Bishop to investigate an allegation of possible misconduct. The following Monday, July 1, Trustees met in closed session with the Chief. They ended that meeting back in open ses-

sion and took no action on the investigation, but deferred to holding a possible meeting on Monday, July 8. That meeting was cancelled on July 5.

Gruber in a letter to the Village Board, resigned his position as of Friday, July 5 at 3:30 p.m. He gave no reasons for the abrupt resignation.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated Tuesday he had no comment on any possible connections between the two matters.

Also at the July 1 meeting, Trustees also tabled action on spending \$6,000 in software to block certain websites and viruses on Village computers. The software also monitored

what internet websites the user visited.

Heiser stated Tuesday the village is looking into what the City of West Bend uses in their Information Technologies Department. He noted however in 2009 the village budgeted for such a purchase but did not go through with it due to budget cuts. Further review will take place at future Village Board meetings.

know us. We would like to meet you," Pastor Brath, now assisted by Pastor Dennis Heimermann and his wife Jodi as youth ministers, said.



Mike Berger, Chairperson for Public Works and Public Services, reported on the June 12, 2013 meeting. Two of the ordinances do not include a review of the public facilities assessment that was done in connection with adopting the Village Impact Fee Ordinance. Kiefer recommended the Village Board adopt the ordinance providing for a twelve month suspension of collection of impact fees. He stated this is a reasonable amount of time for suspension without including a review of the existing public facilities assessment. If the Village Board does consider adopting an ordinance with a two year suspension he suggested including a review of the public facilities assessment. A public hearing is required to amend the Impact Fee Ordinance. The Indians provided plenty of fireworks during the week of the Fourth of July, starting off with a sweep of Two Rivers, followed by a nail-biter over Campbellsport and a second sweep, this time over visiting New Holstein.

The clincher was Saturday's 4-2 victory over Falls, a game that had been postponed on July 3 and may have helped saved pitching arms for Kewaskum's regular season finale.

Kewaskum started off with a bang Saturday, pushing four runs across the plate in the first and using good efforts by starter Brett Boegel and reliever Mike Holt to keep the Falcons at bay.

Kewaskum finished at 13-5 in league play while Falls dropped to 11-7.

The first frame went like this. Jake Hardy took first after being hit by a pitch and quickly stole second. After moving to third on an error, Nick Banks came through with a clutch single for the first run. Banks also was successful in his steal attempt, and Boegel helped his own cause with an

For the year, Boegel has a sparkling .69 earned run average (ERA).

Holt came in to mop up in the seventh. He allowed two hits in the seventh but with Falcons on first and third got the final out on a pop up to Sam Schlosser.

On Friday, the Indians beat New Holstein 5-2 and 5-4 in a seesaw game.

Kewaskum had just five hits, two by Boegel, who had an RBI triple.

Holt tossed a four-hitter for the win.

In Game 2, the Indians scored two runs in the bottom of the sixth to erase a 4-3 deficit. Hardy had two hits, scored twice and had an RBI.

Reliever Dean Schlice picked up the win, going the final three innings.

On July 2nd, Kewaskum gained a season sweep on Campbellsport in a 3-2 contest. The Cougars were held to three hits by Boegel, who pitched the complete game for the win. Al Zommers had one of the hits, a solo homer in the sixth.

The top two men in the Indians' order, Hardy and Banks, went 2x4.

On July 1, the Indians climbed to the .500 mark (9-9) with a pair of wins over visiting Two Rivers (4-14). Both contests were close until the Indians exploded for big innings.

In the opener, Mike Holt was aided by a 7-run sixth inning, en route to a 13-3 victory. The nightcap went just five innings as the Indians scored eight in the fourth and won 10-0.

Holt picked up the first win, giving up just two hits in four innings. Boegel had three extra base hits, including a home run in the first.
