Trustees hear 10-year financial plan for Village

Village Trustees received better news on a picture of the village's financial situation moving forward into the next decade as they plan for the future.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser at Monday evening's Village Board meeting laid out a 10-year financial plan for the village.

"We know there are financial pressures coming, the premise of this is to make it simple so people can look at it and understand it at a glance," Heiser stated as he started his presentation. He also explained the plan is a working financial document that can be changed as Trustees or Taxpayers see fit.

He went on to explain the plan uses the 2013 budget as a starting point, meaning anything in the 2013 budget, remains in the plan. This included staffing at current levels, a portion of the levy being used for debt on the Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) District, a small amount of road work and the sewer utility's annual payment to the general fund. The plan

does not take into account any future growth that is already occurring (four new home starts in 2013).

State aid remains as it did in 2013, that number could increase or decrease in the future. Another unknown in the plan are costs associated with the implementation of the Affordable Care Act scheduled now for 2015.

On the expenditures side, the largest chunk of the pie is the TIF shortfall. The plan assumes no development in either of the village's TIF districts. Heiser explained because the debt was backloaded, payments will increase annually into the future. In 2014, the village will realize a \$146,205 shortfall and annually increase. By 2023, if no development occurs the shortfall will be \$462,197.

Heiser went on to announce his plan provides for \$100,000 annually for street repairs. These types of repairs would be included in the tax levy. He noted the debt on the Fire Department's truck will be paid in 2019 and in 2020 additional money could be borrowed for larger street projects.

The Public Works and Services

Committee will meet today, (Thursday) and begin working on a five-year road plan as well as a five-year equipment replacement plan that will be discussed at a future meeting.

The plan also allows for financing the future capital needs of both the Fire Department and Public Works Department. A total of \$96,000 annually is allotted for equipment replacement. The oldest piece of equipment in the Fire Department is 1980 tanker truck while the DPW would like to see a 1979 Ford Tractor replaced.

Heiser said his plan works by finding ways to add revenue to the budget and he anticipates making staffing cuts. He expected that half-way through 2014 up to four positions would not be rehired for as people retire or move on to different employment opportunities.

"The Village Board is already exploring early retirement for some staff members so it is possible the cuts could be accomplished via attrition," Heiser reiterated.

The first of the four positions was eliminated when the Village Hall receptionist, Betty Bakken, retired.

B&G Club may expand programming

The Boys and Girls Club of Washington County may be expanding its programming to include before school activities at Kewaskum Elementary School.

At Monday's board of education meeting, Boys and Girls Club Operations Director Jason Presto and Executive Director Jay Fisher talked about offering programming for first through fifth graders between 6:30 and 8:45 a.m. during the school year.

Fisher said the cost to families would be \$10 per week and would include breakfast.

Two current before-school child care options serve about 100 children and cost parents either \$6 or \$7 per day, depending on the provider.

If the club offered breakfast, meals would be obtained through the district and the choice would be extended to the other child care services.

School superintendent James Smasal said because the village has no other options - no YMCA, recreation center or standalone Boys and Girls Club - the district has a moral obligation to give students a place to go.

Six years ago the Boys and Girls Club started an after school program in the village. Of the five club sites in Washington County, Kewaskum is the only one run out of a school.

The program will come before the district's August 12 meeting for a vote.

Moe's work never went unnoticed

Heiser estimated this is saving the village about \$55,000 per year. The target date for the second position is January 1, 2014. The target date for the third position is July 1, 2014 and the final position would be eliminated by January 1, 2015. By not refilling these positions Heiser expected the village to save \$105,000 by the end of 2014 and \$210,000 annually by 2015 and through 2023.

"At one time the administrator wore more than one hat, that might be something we have to look at in the future," Heiser explained. He eluded to possibly making the clerk's position a part-time position.

Tax increases will also in-

crease revenues in the village. Heiser stated he believed the level of taxation in 2013 would suffice to take the village thought until 2017. He anticipated then proposing a three percent increase in 2018 and another three percent in 2020.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann stated he wanted to see a more aggressive repayment plan from the sewer utility in year 2014, '15 and '16. Heiser said that amount may be adjusted, but it would require an increase in sewer rates. Trustee Mike Berger said he thought raising any utility rates was a bad idea at this time.

The village's cash reserves fluctuate throughout the draft

plan. However, they remain consistently around \$300,000. Some years show using the reserves while others add to the reserves.

Heiser said he would ask for formal adoption of the financial plan at the second meeting of the board in August.

"I consider this generally good news, it allows the village to meet its obligations and it's responsible to the taxpayer because we're not asking for a tax increase for a few years. This plan has us moving forward in a worst case scenario with the TIE," Heiser concluded.

view Drive on June 28, 1994.

Moe recalls how Mrs. Dennis Backhaus and her youth group volunteered to help out, and several school groups planted tulips near the sign.

Since '94, Moe was the primary volunteer who weeded and watered the planter near the sign. "I used to walk up there with my wagon to water," she said.

Moe was a dedicated teacher at Kewaskum Elementary School for 33 years, first for the seventh and eighth grades, then finishing her career as a second grade teacher. She and her first husband, Howard, lived on Riverview Drive, across the street from the sign.

An interesting sideline is that Howard's father, Otto Backhaus, owned some land on Riverview Dr., and Howard donated that part of it to the village. "I thought it would be a nice place for the sign," Moe said.

While Moe was ready, willing and able to help, in recent years, she has slowed down and giving up watering.

The village's Department of Public Works crew has done some work on it, but Administrator Matt Heiser said the village would be very happy if an individual or a group would step up and volunteer. Anyone interested to continue Moe's work should call the Village Hall at 626-8484.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor-

To understand the recent state budget signed by Walker, one needs to understand the ideology of the Republican party. For more than 30 years since Reagan, the GOP has embraced the economic policy of "supply side" economics and in the words of Reagan "trickle down" economics. George H.W. Bush while running against Reagan in '80 termed the idea "voodoo" economics.

It works by supplying the rich [job creators] with tax breaks, cuts, credits and subsidies with the idea that they will create jobs. Also during this time there was a major shift in power given to the banking industry with de-regulation. What this did was allow for more borrowing for people. The obvious problem with this is it creates an illusion of wealth for people when in most cases all it really does is burden people with no real wealth and a lot of debt.

A recent survey showed nearly half of Americans with

less than \$500 of savings. This coupled with the dismantling of labor unions [another GOP platform policy] now more than 30 years later we have a society with a huge wealth and income disparity.

The idea of supply side economics isn't solely embraced only by Republicans, unfortunately many Dems have also followed suit.

What is the problem with this idea? We live in a society with a middle class [much different than China]. That means the economy is driven by consumer spending [mostly from the middle class, real wealth not masked wealth with more borrowing]. The real job creators are the middle class, not the wealthy. This is called demand side economics. Those with internet access should watch a YouTube video Nick Hanauer speaking at a TED conference about this.

Republicans here have embraced more of this supply side agenda in this recent budget, with the more than \$600 million in income tax breaks. For example, someone earning about \$50k a year will receive a \$100 tax break, those with earnings over \$315k will receive a \$1,500 tax break.

This coupled with regressive taxes such as sales and fees and even some property taxes exacerbates the wealth disparity. Is there any wonder why this state ranks 44th in job creation and a struggling economy? When you understand this is the #1 goal of the GOP, everything else seems to make more sense.


WB man arrested here for 5th OWI

National night out is designed to: (1) Heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; (2) Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime efforts; (3) Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community relationships; and (4) Send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

A block party for our whole community will be hosted Tuesday, August 6, 6-9 pm at St. Lucas Lutheran Church and School, 1410 Parkview Drive. Parkview Drive will be closed down and activities will take place in the church parking lot and the school grounds. Handicapped Parking will be available along the alley between Parkview Drive and Bilgo Lane. Bring a lawn chair and stay a while. Food and refreshments will be available.

Free entertainment for children will include a bounce

house, various games, and Dizzy Dee, a clown famous for her balloon art as seen at Party on the Pavement this year.

The Kewaskum Police Department and Kewaskum Fire Department will have equipment on display. Various volunteer groups will lead children's activities.

The River City Irregulars concert band will perform a traditional band concert at 6:30. The Kewaskum Big Band will follow at 8:00. Both groups will perform in the church parking lot.

Even if you aren't able to make it out to these events, turn on your porch light, sit outside, visit with your neighbors, and take a stand against neighborhood crime and drug abuse.

National Night Out, 'America's Night Out Against Crime,' was introduced by the Association in 1984. The program was the brainchild of NATW Executive Director Matt A. Peskin. In an effort to heighten awareness and strengthen participation in local anticrime efforts, Peskin felt that a high-profile, high-impact type of crime prevention event was needed nationally.

While the traditional 'lights on' and front porch vigils remain a part of NNO, activities have expanded considerably over the years to include block parties, cookouts, parades, visits from police, festivals, neighborhood walks, safety fairs, contests, rallies and meetings.

Girl Scouts, Kewaskum Community help Humane Society

The Holy Trinity School fifth and seventh grade Girl Scouts annual service project, which this year helped the Washington County Humane Society, was completed on recently when the scouts delivered over 100 donated items to the humane society in Jackson.

The project began in May when the Girl Scouts held one of two Girl Scout cookie sundae bars, featuring chopped up Girl Scout cookies as the toppings. The first sundae bar followed the Holy Trinity School spring program and the second took place at dismissal time on the last day of school, June 6. The \$88 in pro-

ceeds from the two events was earmarked for the purchase of pet supplies and cleaning supplies needed by the humane society.

On May 31, the troop of five girls, Maya Butschlick, Morgan Goeden, Brooke Lisko, Madeline Heltemes, and Samantha Heltemes and their advisor, Lisa Heltemes, started a month long campaign to collect donations at the Kewaskum Piggly Wiggly. The previous month, the scouts met with Geidel's Piggly Wiggly owner, Mike Geidel, and presented a list of ideas to promote their project. Geidel granted the girls permission to carry out all of their sugges-

tions. The girls hung signs at the checkout counters and in the pet supply and cleaning supply aisles; provided flyers

for the store to include when bagging groceries; made a dog house shaped collection box for the store's entryway; put a fish bowl on the service counter to collect monetary donations; and handed out flyers while asking for the support of the store's customers as they entered the store during the peak shopping time on a Friday evening.

Thanks to the generosity of Piggly Wiggly and the Kewaskum community, 50 pet and cleaning items were collected in the donation box and \$186.66 was deposited in the fish bowl. The scouts were able to purchase an additional 50+ items with the donated funds, along with the money earned from the sundae bars.

Heltemes said, "This was a great experience for the girls. They were able to see how a small group can rally the support of many."

The girls also learned how volunteers, like themselves, make a difference in the lives of the humane society animals and their future owners.

The response of the volun-

teers accepting the donations at the humane society solidified how much these volunteers care about the animals they look after on a daily basis and how appreciative they are of all donations.

Debbie Block, Community Relations Coordinator, took the girls' photo for their Facebook page and said she wished she could recognize every donation in their newsletter, right down to the children who come in with their allowances.



25 Years Ago

April 29, 1988

Administrator Penny Kleinhans advised the Kewaskum School Board Tuesday night that she is resigning to accept the position as district administrator of the Menomonie Area School District. In a formal letter addressed to President Ralph Horner and submitted at the special meeting, Kleinhans advised the board that she will be ending her tenure with the school district effective June 30, 1988.

Governor Tommy Thompson has approved a \$857,000 contract to resurface eight miles of WIS 144 between West Bend to the north county line in Washington County, just north of Boltonville. The contract includes plans to widen the roadway, pave the shoulders, improve the intersections, upgrade the beam guard and increase the pavement banking of some curves, according to Harvey Shebesta, director of the Department of Transportation's Waukesha district, which includes Washington County. The highway will be widened to 24 feet with six-foot shoulders, three of which will be paved. Paving the shoulders gives motorists more room to maneuver in emergencies and a safer area for driver pullover.

Formal groundbreaking ceremonies were held Thursday, April 21, for an addition to the Beechwood Rest Home. When completed, the nursing home's present residents will be transferred to the new wing. The present 26-bed facility will then be renovated and made available for retirement living quarters for elderly people who do not need nursing home services but are no longer able to maintain a residence of their own. That facility is anticipated to be able to accommodate 12 to 15 residents. Completion of the new wing is targeted for October 1.

Steve Redig of the Kewaskum FFA has been nominated to receive the State FFA Degree, the highest degree awarded by the Wisconsin Association of FFA. Steve is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Redig of Kewaskum and is currently attending classes at Moraine Park Technical School in Fond du Lac.

Several of Kewaskum's Johnson School Bus Services' drivers were recognized for their safety records and years of service as part of Governor Tommy Thompson's proclaimed Wisconsin School Bus Driver Recognition Week. 

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After thrilling upset win over Plymouth, Indians come up short against Falls

CAMPBELLSPORT- After putting together an impressive run of 10 victories, the Indians baseball team (16-10) couldn't get No. 11, falling to Sheboygan Falls and ace pitcher Nate Heili 3-1 in the Sectional finals here Monday afternoon.

"We had opportunities ... just didn't put the ball in play," KHS coach Doug Gonring said.

The scenario is familiar. Heili and the Falcons turned back the Indians' bid to advance to the WIAA State Summer Baseball Tournament last year. What made it different was the fact the Indians first had to past top-seeded Plymouth (24-4) just to reach the finals.

Behind some excellent pitching by Brett Boegel and a stellar defensive, the Indians, who had lost to Plymouth three times this season, pulled off a 4-0 upset, sending the Panthers packing.

Now all that stood in their way of a trip to Kapco Park was Sheboygan Falls, a team they had beaten twice and overtook for second place in the final week of Eastern Wisconsin Conference action.

A matchup between Heili (7-0) and Mike Holt, who tossed 13 scoreless innings last week, had pitchers' dual written all over it, but Heili looked sharper right from the first pitch, and the Falcons gained a little confidence, scoring a single run in the bottom of the first.

After getting Jake Hardy to ground out, Heili struck out Nick Banks and Boegel in what would be the first of the 13 Ks he would record on the day.

Holt would walk Heili to

start the game. His courtesy runner, Nick Peterson advanced to second on a bunt and held to third on Jake Meyer's single, then scored on a long foul out by Mike Raeder.

A pair of walks to Chad Ray and Andy Pryor put runners at the corners for KHS in the second with two away, but Heili would get Sam Schlosser to strike out looking for the third out.

Holt had a much better second, putting the Falcons down in order, giving Kewaskum fans reason for optimism.

It didn't last long, however, as the Falcons added a single run in the third on a ground rule double by Heili, followed by Ryan Halverson's RBI single past third base. The throw was too late at home, but Ethan Vetter threw a bullet to Schlosser at second in time to gun down Halverson and prevent another possible run as Meyer followed with a single before Mike Raeder struck out.

Heili was in a zone during the third and fourth, striking out five of six batters he faced. He started the fifth with his ninth and 10th Ks, but then loaded the bases with walks to Schlosser and Hardy surrounding Vetter getting hit by a pitch.

Nick Banks had been a hero vs. Plymouth (double for 2 RBIs) and Howards Grove (2x3) but he couldn't get the trifecta, as Heili struck him out with three pitches, the final strike coming on a change-up.

Gonring had pulled Holt after three innings, calling on sophomore Dean Schlice in relief. Schlice walked a pair but got out of a jam when he caught a popup by Jacob Brading and doubled off Josh Rostek at first.

Schlice gave up a walk and single to start the fifth, then Hardy was called to the mound, and he gave up a single to Halverson to load the bases.

Meyer made the first out on an infield fly, then Raeder hit a grounder to first, allowing Ryan Schmitt to score.

The Indians were down to their final six outs, and now the question was whether or not they would score, but could they come up with a hit.

No hit in the sixth, but KHS did get a run via Boegel who drew a leadoff walk, then Bille Lehmann hit a ground ball that was mishandled by the shortstop, and Ray got hit by a pitch to load the bases.

Matt Ringwell made the first out, popping out, then Pryor hit a bunt down the first base line that scored Boegel and pinch hitter Austin Tennesies struck out to end the inning.

In the seventh, Vetter walked and Hardy hit a little "nubber" to third which the third baseman bobbled, putting two aboard. While several reporters at the game called the play an error, tournament officials determined it was a single, which broke up Heili's no hitter.

Banks bunted them to second and third, but Heili got Boegel to line out to right, and the game ended when Heili struck out Lehmann looking.

The Falcons mobbed Heili for his one-hitter, and Indians fans applauded their team for their efforts and the improvement they showed throughout the season.

"We didn't get a hit, but look at what happens when you play decent defense," Gonring said, praising his seniors and criticizing the current sectional

format.

"Those six (seniors) did nothing but help us get better," Gonring said. "They were leaders, and we will miss them."

The coach went on saying he took Holt out because, "I think fatigue set in (with the heat.)"

"I just don't like this format," Gonring said, indicating a team is excited after posting a big win, "Then you cool down and later have to get going again." He said he would much prefer the two-day set up from the past.

When another reporter asked about Heili's performance, Gonring said it was no surprise. "He's done that for what, three years?!"

Still Heili walked seven, so the opportunities were there, Gonring, who had surgery last Wednesday and came to the game with a walker, said.

Against Plymouth, Boegel was in control from start to finish, throwing 67 pitches, including 47 strikes. He allowed just four Panther hits.

"Brett pitched a wonderful game," Gonring said. "He wanted this game."

Gonring said he let the team decide which pitcher to go with, and while he might have leaned toward Holt, said the decision "worked out for us."

The Panther coach called for a suicide squeeze, but Jake Richard failed to his bat on the ball, and Henning was an easy out (tagged by Schlice.)

Kewaskum added three insurance runs in the seventh on successive singles by Vetter and Hardy, a double by Banks (2RBIs) and an infield error.

Kewaskum was missing a starter and reserve for Monday's game via a family vacation and a retreat. That prompted some position shifts, moving Schlosser from second to short, Vetter from catcher to second, Lehmann in right and Schlice at catcher.

Gonring praised their efforts, especially Schlosser's, who may be small — he is listed on the program at 4'-7" and 85 pounds — but handled everything that came his way.

"Sammy has gotten the job done for us. He turned nine double plays this year," Gonring said.
