## Demolition unearths nostalgic feelings for Main St home

"All progress is precarious, and the solution of one problem brings us face to face with another problem." This quote by the late Martin Luther King, Jr. could well apply to a July 16 and 17 happening in the Village of Kewaskum - demolition of the 159-year-old house at 418 Main St., along the Milwaukee River, near the bridge. Guelig Waste Removal and Demolition completed the project.

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (DOT) purchased the duplex in 2011, planning to demolish it in advance of the 2014 replacement of Highway 28 in the village. The demolition project, paving the way for that progress, however, adversely affects village coffers. In 2011, village taxes were assessed at \$995.83 on the house, constructed in 1875, and at

\$994.96 last year.

In addition, many present and past Kewaskum residents are saddened by the loss of the historical residence. One of them said he feels the removal of the house permanently changed the landscape of the section known as "Little Canada."

Also, some acquainted with the structure affirm it was rich in history and solidly constructed with log beams. Gert Backus, who resided in the house from 1957 to 2004, noted that the home had housed a grist mill long ago and had been moved from another location in Kewaskum with the use of just one horse. She was told that the house also formerly served as a pocket book factory.

Jerry Backus, Gert's brother-in-law, said his grandfather, the late Henry Backus, converted the building to a home. Edwin A. Backus and his wife Vinelda, Jerry's parents, owned

the two-story house later, and their four children - Edwin R. (Gert's late husband); the late Shirlee, the late Eileen and Jerry Backus were all born in the house.

When Gert and Edwin R. were married, they moved into the upper duplex, which they rented from Edwin R's parents, who owned the house and resided in the lower duplex. Following the deaths of Edwin A. and Vinelda, Gert and Edwin R. moved downstairs and leased the upstairs duplex. They purchased the home in 1962.

"We remodeled it," Gert recalled. "We installed new carpeting and windows and added a bathroom and another shower. We also had aluminum siding installed in the early 1960's."

That siding was placed over the

## Local historical documents sought for digital preservation

A new generation of Kewaskum history buffs, with backgrounds in digital photography and electronic storage of data have joined together in an effort to try and digitally preserve Kewaskum's rich history. The trio is currently working on obtaining a federal grant to digitize historical documents and they are actively seeking historical items from Kewaskum's past.

Piggly Wiggly manager Aaron Laatsch and Statesman publisher Andrew Kuehl, have teamed up to undertake the project of collecting and organizing the historical items. Kewaskum librarian Steev Baker will write a grant offering federal money to scan and upload local history documents that will be freely accessible from the internet. If successful, the Kewaskum

Public Library would receive \$1000 - \$5000 to create an online database of local historical material.

Although they have access to quite a bit of photos and documents through their own collections left by prior generations, they are actively looking for more material that could be scanned and added to the project. The group would like to have items by August 1.

The items that are being sought include: Photos, photo postcards, slides, news clippings, videos and plat maps. The group is also wishing to sit down and meet with individuals and record historical stories.

"This started after Aaron and I realized our combined interest in purchasing old post cards from eBay. One day we

started talking about our interest in digitizing our collections. The next week Steev and I had a similar conversation where he mentioned the grant, the three of us then met and decided to undertake the project," Kuehl stated.

The group is also seeking copies of a local history book, Kewaskum Then and Now, written around the time of the Bicentennial. "We want to be able to take the book apart and scan it to make digital copies," Laatsch explained.

Many items can be scanned on the spot, by making an appointment with Kuehl at The Statesman office. He can be reached by phone at (262) 707-6875. Those with questions about the project or wish to get involved can contact Laatsch at (262) 626-2662.

## Sexual offender released in county


The Washington County Sheriff's Office is notifying the community of a released sexual offender.

Matthew J. Davis, 26, was released from prison on July 9. He is currently residing at the Washington County Jail while he attempts to locate a residence and employment.

Davis was convicted of two counts of second degree sexual assault of a child; one count in Washington County on June, 4, 2008 and one count in Rock County on January 11, 2008. He will be on extended supervision (probation) until July 11, 2023 and will be monitored closely by WI-DIC Division of Community Corrections agents.

While residing in the Washington County Jail he will be chaperoned at all times when leaving the jail to seek a residence and employment. Davis will have numerous rules and restrictions to follow including wearing a live tracking GPS unit.

This sex offender has served the prison sentence imposed on him by the courts. He is not wanted by law enforce-

ment at this time. This notification is not intended to increase fear, but it is believed that an informed public is a safer public.

Sex offenders have always lived in our communities; but it was not until the Sex Offender Registration and Community Notification Law was enacted that law enforcement was able to share this information with the community.

former wood siding, with the original logs underneath the wood siding.

Gert enjoyed the sturdiness of the log-beam structure. Their grandchildren Joey and Jennifer looked forward to coming to the house frequently. When he noticed the log beams in the basement, Joey asked his Grandma, "Why are all those trees in the basement?" said Gert, who since 2004, had resided in a Kewaskum apartment.

"Since my husband was born and raised there, he was very attached to the house," she added.

One of her finest memories while living at 418 Main Street was the couple's receipt of a Beautification Award in 2000 from the Kewaskum Woman's Club. "The award was given for colors and lawn ornaments," she recalled. "My husband kept the lawn groomed faithfully."

The demolition project of July 16 and 17 tugged at Gert's heartstrings. "I didn't know about it until my son Lee came home and said, 'There is a crane in the yard,'" she noted. "It made me cry when I saw them take out the cupboards that I had saved for."

She watched the demolition with her former neighbors, Mike and Judy Berger and Verla Bilgo.

Gert's family wanted a memento of the house that symbolized a fond memory. "There was a cubby hole under the front entrance that the kids used to play in," Gert recalled. "My nephew Jim [Gaffke] was able to retrieve the door to the cubby hole."

Jerry Backus, now a Neokosa resident, was born in the Main Street house in December 1936. He spent 20 years there before being drafted

into the U.S. Army. Following his two-year stint, he returned to Kewaskum and spent four more years in the house, then moved to Wisconsin Rapids.

"I never heard about the demolition until yesterday (July 16) when my nephew Lee Backus called me," Jerry said. "I am very disappointed. As big a lot as that is, they could have moved the house further back."

He was one of the children who played in the cubby hole under the porch. "We kept our boots there," he said.

Jerry shared some of his favorite memories of the state-ly home, that is now reduced to rubble and logs.

"I enjoyed fishing for northern out of the window on the back porch," he said. "Everybody told me it was possible to do that. So I gave it a try."

He pointed out that the back yard had once housed a salvage yard.

"There are old autos buried in the yard," he said. "They popped up once in a while."

Jerry reminisced about the annual visits by St. Nicholas.

"He used to come down the hallway in a black robe and would crack a whip," Jerry said. "You'd be surprised how scared we kids were. We would hide behind the davenport."

The Bergers, Mike, a village of Kewaskum trustee and local historian, moved from Milwaukee to a house across the street at 417 Main St. in 1973.

"They are widening the bridge and moving the centerline of the bridge nine feet north to make it more of a standard width," Berger said, "and they are putting a retention pond on the property at

418 Main St., so the house had to be razed."

Now that the house has been removed, "It creates a nice view when I look up the river," he said.

In 2004, Gert sold the home to local real estate developer Gary Gavin. The following year, he sold it to Jake Peterson.

"Jake liked being by the water," she said.

The final sale was to the DOT two years ago.

"It would have been good if the house could have been moved," Gert said.

Gert's nephew, Eli Gaffke, a Wabeno resident, stayed in the house at 418 Main Street for several months back in 1967 when his house burned. He liked ice skating on the river.

"We fished for carp too," he said. "There also used to be a pond in the yard, and we'd catch frogs there."

"We had seven of us playing in the cubby hole under the front entrance," Gaffke added.

His grandma Vinelda held sheephead tournaments at the home.

Gaffke also regrets the demise of the house.

"It would be nice to have it stay," he said. "It was a landmark. But it was just 10 feet from the road."

Although the crane has rendered the historical house at 418 Main St. to bricks and mortar, the memories that the close-knit Backus and Gaffke families hold dear of their time spent in the home, as well as those of other residents affiliated with the house, cannot ever be pulverized.

Construction is set to begin on Main Street starting at the intersection of Fond du Lac Ave. and Main St. In February of 2014.



## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor-

So now we have a new \$70 billion bi-annual state budget. Walker signed this at a place of one of his donors of \$40k for his recall election, more of the "pay to play" politics.

I wonder what I could get if I took him out for a Culver's but-terburger? The passage of this budget in the legislator stunk to high heaven of back room deals with campaign donors out of the public eye in the middle of all night passage behind closed doors. Transparency? Public scrutiny?

Some key issues: Refusal of Federal money to expand Badger Care [ultimately leaving about 85k people without] costing taxpayers more in the end of up to about \$120 million over two yrs., the \$650 million income tax cut [benefitting mostly the wealthy], app. \$200 million going to voucher schools, stricter controls on local govts. The

last item I find ironic and hypocritical. It has been the GOP agenda of smaller govt. and local control, now they have done just the opposite.

The rejection of the Federal money for Badger Care is not only just plain fool hearty and incompetent because it will cost all of us more. Voucher school expansion: \$200 million [some will say up to \$400 million or more] TAXPAYER money going to in many cases "for profit" schools with NO public oversight, NO public school board meetings, NO teacher requirements or credentials, NO requirement for special needs students [such as speech and hearing therapists, etc.], NO transparency of test scores, attendance, racial breakdown etc. These voucher schools are "for profit" online schools like [k12.com] started by a banker, connections academy [run by a corp. investor, real estate devel-

opment] and religious schools.

Again this is an attempt to "privatize" and "profitize" govt. for payback of political campaigns to big business, and education is very big business. Consider this: According to most recent US Census bureau data, more than \$7 billion spent for back to school supplies, 77 million people enrolled in school, more than 50 million enrolled in K-12, more than 100k schools, more than 7 million teachers, about \$10k per pupil spent.

It seems clear to me we have lost the sense of why public education was important in the first place. Thomas Jefferson first suggested the usage of taxpayer dollars to educate the general public not just the privileged elite. We have decided it is better to profitize our kids future and the future of our society with no regard to global competitiveness.







## Fechter, Krupp laud All-Star experience

Even though they were not on the winning side, recent Kewaskum High graduates Alex Fechter and Nate Krupp enjoyed the experience of playing in the 37th annual Wisconsin Football Coach-

es Association Charity Game Saturday night at Titan Field on the UW-Oshkosh campus, and they received good reviews for their efforts.

For the record, the South All-Stars won the Division 1-3 game over the North by a score of 45-19. Looking at one fact, it might not be terribly hard to understand why the

South was favored.

"They had 17 D1 (Division) athletes (college recruits) on their team, and we had five," Krupp said Sunday night, quick to add that despite an advantage in talent and size, "We went out there and fought pretty hard."

Krupp, who played safety for the North but tried as a wide out at UW-Stevens Point this fall, said a few miscommunications were to blame for a couple of the South's early touchdowns. "In the second half, we picked that up," he said.

The players only had six days of preparation after arriving in Oshkosh on July 14. Both felt they came to camp in good shape.

As Fechter put it, "I've been working out every day since my freshman year."

Fechter, 6-foot-1 and 245, saw plenty of action at defensive tackle.

"We split time. There was one other guy at my position," Fechter said. "I had one tackle for a loss and a couple assists. The South had a lot of good athletes. They brought it to us, I guess."

Krupp, 6-3 and now 180 pounds didn't start, but was in the game about 75 percent of the plays after that, according to KHS football coach Jason Piittmann.

"I believe I had about six of seven tackles," Krupp said.

And what did they like best about the experience?

For me, it was the game. It was the whole reason we were there," Fechter said, adding, "I made a lot of good friends. I will probably stay in touch with them through Facebook and Twitter."

Krupp enjoyed the "the group of guys. Everybody got along. There was no clashing at all. It was a good time."

Both players will be at football camp on August 17, Fechter at UW-Whitewater and Krupp at Stevens Point.

Fechter will join fellow KHS grad, Joey Paulus, who is starting his senior year at Whitewater, and Krupp will be among three former KHS grads at Stevens Point.

"Yes, I know Bo (Seibel) and Cody (Seibel). I know Cody Nuernberg as well," Krupp said.

Cody Seibel, a linebacker, is starting his senior season

after breaking a leg at midseason a year ago. Beau is a junior linebacker and Nuernberg is a candidate for the starting quarterback position this fall.

Krupp has already met his roommate, Brit Vernon, a running back from Stillman Valley High School in Illinois.

"They did a real nice job," Piittmann said about his former players.

About Fechter, the KHS coach said, "He was in a tough spot ... held his own against some of those huge South kids."

Krupp "stuck his head in there and made some tackles," Piittmann went on, indicating the North head coach, Bruce Larson of Summerset, and an assistant, Rice Lake's Dan Hill, said the two "were great to work with ... worked hard."
