Huggett's helmet, a life-saver

Jake Huggett doesn't always listen to his older sister Abigail, but on July 3 he grudgingly strapped on his bicycle helmet before they rode to the Kewaskum Public Library.

It was raining on their return trip and Jake took the corner at Main Street and Parkview Drive a little too fast and slid under a moving semi.

Jake doesn't recall the accident, but that's not surprising - his helmet is broken and parts cracked off from the impact with the truck's trailer bed. From the damage on the helmet, Jake's mom Kerri Huggett says its likely that when he hit the side of the trailer, the helmet may have shifted and another piece broke off as he hit the ground.

"The poor truck driver said he didn't want to get out (after the accident.) He didn't see Jake on either side of the truck," says Kerri Huggett.

Because he took an extra minute to strap on the safety device, Huggett, 10, will be entering the fifth grade at Kewaskum Elementary this fall.

Jake escaped with a bump and a scrape to his forehead.

"Jake says he got hit by a semi. I say, 'No, you hit the semi,'" Kerri Huggett said.

Kerri Huggett says whenever her children leave the neighborhood on their bicycles, she makes them wear a helmet.

Since she was napping when they left, she was surprised Jake wore his helmet.

"Usually, if I don't tell him, he doesn't put on," explained Kerri Huggett.

"My sister made me wear it," says Jake, who admits he doesn't always listen to Abigail, 13.


Jake feels lucky, considering the situation could have been worse.

"The semi driver slowed down when he saw my sister," Jake Huggett said.

Kerri Huggett says Jake wants to take the helmet to school for show and tell and after that, he's consented to give the helmet to the Kewaskum Police Department.

Chief of Police Thomas Bishop was on patrol that day and hearing a call on his radio, responded to a semi versus bicycle accident.

He expected the worst, but found

Jake with minor injuries in the company of his sister and father.

"This is a prime example of the importance of wearing bike helmets," Bishop said. "It could have been so much worse."

Information from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation states child errors account for more than 90 per-

cent of all child bicycle crashes. According to statistics from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety - Highway Loss Data Institute, 67 percent of bicyclists killed in the United States in 2011 reportedly were not wearing helmets and 36 percent of bicyclist deaths occurred at intersections.

Cadet Brockman finds combat experience helpful

The majority of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps Cadets undertaking the Leader Development and Assessment Course at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash. have limited experience completing tactical operations, but for 4th Regiment Cadet Justin Brockman from Kewaskum, the events at LDAC seemed rather tame after being deployed to Iraq twice as a combat medic during Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"You really have to revert back to the basics," Brockman said. "I have to humble myself and take a whole new experience on, as well as try to share as much knowledge as I can with my fellow Cadets here. Some people don't know everything about the Army and I'm able to help them out. If they have questions, I'm always there. People have had medical concerns and instead of having to go to a medic, they come to me and I take care of them."

Brockman, a criminal justice student at Campbell University, was first deployed for a year in October 2008 as a medic and as a noncommissioned officer for his four-month deployment in July 2011. When he learned that he was going back to Iraq for a second time, Brockman was ready.

"I was ready to do my job," said Brockman. "I like doing what I do. I like helping people, taking care of people, saving lives, and working with people very closely. Both times I deployed with different groups and we were very tight-knit groups."

Brockman was relieved to come home to his five-year-old son Andrew both times, but can't deny how valuable his time was in Iraq. Brockman's experience as a medic overseas made him realize he wanted to come back and become a commissioned officer.

"I learned a lot of medical stuff, did a lot of operations, took care of soldiers, and did what I love," said Brockman. "That's why I want to continue being a medical service corps officer."



The Old Hotel is now The Ironwood Restaurant

The historic restaurant on the corner of Main Street and Fond du Lac Avenue will again see changes in the coming months as Karen Callen and Rob Geiger partner up to bring down-home hearty meals to the corner bistro.

Former partner Gary Gavin switched places with Geiger to team up with Callen and on July 15 the Old Hotel became The Ironwood Restaurant.

Plans include adding more entertainment options in the pub area and they are working on expanding the menu.

Geiger says now they are getting feedback from customers and what appetizers, entrees and desserts they

might enjoy.

They are looking to offer entrees in the \$7-to-\$15 range and an all you can eat beer batter fish special on Fridays for \$10.95.

"We want to offer a good meal at a fair price," said Geiger, who has been in the restaurant industry for well over 15 years.

Callen has a long background in the restaurant field - she started working in the same restaurant as her mother, Mary Ann Liermann, in Fredonia as a dishwasher at age 14.

In the 1990s, Callen owned the popular Eckl's Family Restaurant in Kewaskum.

"I love cooking...If people go out to enjoy a good meal, I try my hardest to make sure it is a pleasant experience," Cal-

len said.

The Ironwood's pub-style barroom seats 20 patrons at tables and another 20 at the bar.

The cozy dining room complete with fireplace seats about 40 and there is outdoor seating and an upstairs banquet hall with its own private bar that accommodates about 80 guests comfortably. The hall is available for holiday parties, showers, other events and business meetings.

The Ironwood Restaurant is open Monday through Saturday, 11 a.m. until 9 p.m. and dinner service begins at 4 p.m. On Friday and Saturday, hours extend until 10 p.m.

Callen says they plan to add Sunday hours in fall.

Blood draw to results be used in Wiedmeyer case

A motion to suppress evidence obtained from a blood draw after a Christmas Eve crash that resulted in the death of a West Bend woman was denied by a Washington County judge July 26.

Keith L. Wiedmeyer refused to perform breathalyzer and field sobriety tests and was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital where he refused a blood draw, which was then taken in the presence of the officer, according to a criminal complaint. The draw, which was taken about 90 minutes after officers were called to the scene, showed a blood alcohol level of .124.

In April, four months after the crash occurred, the state Supreme Court ruled that law enforcement needs to produce a warrant before taking a blood draw from suspected drunk drivers who refuse test-

ing.

Wiedmeyer, 34, entered a not guilty plea for nine felony charges that include homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle, second degree reckless homicide and second degree recklessly endangering safety.

Witness accounts in the criminal complaint state Wiedmeyer was traveling northbound on Fond du Lac Ave. near the Gateway Cafe in Kewaskum when he passed another vehicle, crossed the double yellow line and slammed into Matenaer's Chevrolet Cobalt.

One witness estimated that Wiedmeyer was traveling between 35 to 50 miles per hour over the speed limit and another witness stated they did not observe any brake lights on Wiedmeyer's Grand Prix before impact, the complaint states.

A trial is scheduled for October 21.

Cops are wrong to shield driver data

Bob Dreps, a veteran media law attorney, says law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin are "overreacting" to an Illinois federal court ruling by purging the names of drivers from public records.

Police in Wisconsin have begun withholding the names of drivers in police reports in response to a 2012 case involving the village of Palatine, Ill. A lawsuit there alleged that police violated drivers' privacy rights by displaying names, addresses and other personal information on parking tickets left on windshields.

"The ability to have oversight over law enforcement is pretty minimal if you can't find out who's involved (in an incident)," Dreps says. "Without names, there's no accountability."

Dreps warns that this could lead to bizarre situations in which names of some alleged perpetrators, crime victims and witnesses are kept secret while others — those without driver's licenses — appear in incident reports.

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit, which includes Wisconsin, reversed the dismissal of a lawsuit alleging that the manner in which the citations were issued by Palatine police violated the federal Driver's Privacy Protection Act. The federal law lets aggrieved parties go back four years and carries a mandatory \$2,500 per incident fine. Palatine, which was sued by a class of drivers

who received a total of 32,000 tickets, faces a potential \$80 million fine. It has appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Dreps says the ruling is not binding in Wisconsin, and does not change the state's Open Records Law. But some law enforcement agencies here are nonetheless blacking out information that was once routinely available. (Ironically, law enforcement agencies in Illinois do not seem to be doing the same.)

According to news reports, the Marathon County Sheriff's Office, Wausau Police Department and more than a dozen police agencies in suburban Milwaukee now withhold personal information obtained through state Department of Motor Vehicle records — including the identities of people arrested.

Dreps says the federal law was aimed at preventing states from selling their drivers' license database to vendors, not keeping the public from knowing the names of people in police reports.

"The case doesn't have anything to do with public records," Dreps says. "It has to do with parking tickets left on windshields."

Dreps is representing the New Richmond News, which is challenging the decision of local police to remove names from two accident reports and a report involving the theft of gas from a Kwik Trip.

In a letter to the paper's publisher, Steve Dzubay, New

Richmond Police Chief Mark Samelstad said he wouldn't put the city at risk "by releasing certain information to the public that has been restricted by state or federal courts."

State Attorney General J.B. Van Hollen issued an opinion in 2008 that Wisconsin law enforcement agencies do not violate the Driver's Privacy Protection Act when they release records that contain drivers' personal identification. But some agencies are no longer heeding that advice, and Van Hollen's office now says it is waiting for the courts to clarify the Palatine decision.

On April 23, the lawsuit filed by Dreps on behalf of the New Richmond News was moved from St. Croix County Circuit Court to U.S. District Court in Madison.

Perhaps a federal judge or the U.S. Supreme Court will clear things up and allow police in Wisconsin to keep their black marking pens where they belong — in the drawer.

The Hearing Loop pipes sound directly from the microphone into the hearing aid, eliminating the background that normally muddles everything up.

Hearing aids help the 67 year old Kewaskum women despite her severe hearing loss. They're of little help however, in large buildings.

As she was struggling to

hear Bible readings, the choir, and sermons at church, she remembered she had T-coils. When she pressed the button on her hearing aid, it was like the speaker was talking directly into her ear.

She was amazed that it worked and was able to hear every word that was spoken. It was an emotional experience for her.



Christ in Wayne and graduated from West Bend West High School.







Organizers say auction breaks all records, even with fewer animals

Bidding was lively at the Washington County Fair Junior Livestock Auction July 25 - so lively that sale prices broke all records for the second year in a row.

Meat Sale Auction Chair Jim Hawig said in the 11 years since he started running the sale, prices were the highest ever paid.

Last year's sale brought in a little over \$173,000, but with about 20 fewer animals coming up for auction, beef cattle, sheep and swine were sold for a little more than \$209,000.

"When we found out what the totals were, nobody could believe it," Hawig said.

He said the number of new registered bidders also increased by 25 or 30.

Top bidders were Bayland Buildings, which bought 4H Myraneer John Falk's champion pig for \$13 per pound, Amanda's Christmas Company, which purchased Kewaskum


4-H'er Mikayla Dogs's grand champion lamb for \$18 per pound and West Bend Plastics, which bought Slinger FFA member Lillia Janz's champion beef for \$4.50 per pound.

Competitors receive the largest share of the price. Hawig said five percent of the proceeds are used to promote the sale and one percent goes into a fund used by junior exhibitors to purchase pens, gates and other equipment used at the fair.

Hawig said sheep went for exceptionally high prices this year, something he credits to new auctioneer Bob Johnson. Johnson, who is an auctioneer in Rock County, also helps at the State Fair sale.

"Prices for (sheep) went from \$18 a pound to \$16 to \$11 to \$10," said Hawig.

Hawig has a long history with 4H and the fair. He showed as a youngster and his four sons also competed and he has been on the board for the Meat Animal Sale for the past 25 years.



As my last year of showing at the fair, I would like to thank all the buyers, the bidders and the Kewaskum FFA that supported me over the past seven years at the Washington County Fair.





Unfortunately, it is true. The Athletics, 35-8, hit a little speed bump in their championship game of the Plymouth Tournament and against Slinger in a Rock River game.

Fortunately, they did rebound on Sunday in a home game against the Hustiford Astros, but it took some late-inning heroics to pull off the 8-7 comeback win.

Hustiford exploded for five runs in the third inning for a huge 5-0 lead.

Hardy, Boegel gain top spots on All-EWC team

After a late surge that netted a second place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, the Indians baseball team was rewarded by having several players named to the all-conference team.

Senior Jake Hardy was a unanimous first team selection in the outfield, while junior Brett Boegel earned a spot on the first team as a utility player.

Named to the second team were pitcher Mike Holt and outfielder Nick Banks. Both are seniors.

As expected, Plymouth, which ran the table against EWC teams this summer, gobble up a lot of all-conference medals. Pitchers Ryan Schieble and Matt Rhude were both selected to the first team, while four others, including catcher Luke Held, infielders Zac Cain and Clay Henning

and outfielder Tyler Willeford joined their teammates.

The pitchers are seniors, while Held and Henning are juniors and the other two are sophomores.

Sheboygan Falls' Nate Heili was selected as the MVP of the league.

Hardy, the Indians' top vote getter, finished fifth in batting in the EWC with a .397 average. He had 23 hits in 58 at bats, with six doubles and 13 runs batted in (RBIs). His speed was a definite asset, shown by the fact he stole seven bases and was thrown out stealing only once.

Hardy struck out just six times and drew four walks.

"Once he got into the leadoff spot, he did a great job for us," coach Doug Gonring said. "He got on base for us a lot, and he was a steady influence at the plate."

After starting just seven games as a junior and getting six hits, Hardy finally was a full

time starter this summer, and Gonring said, "I was real happy to see Jake's accomplishments get some praise."

Boegel was the perfect candidate for winning the spot as utility player. After playing right field for two years, Boegel moved to shortstop, and, "He helped our infield get a whole lot better," Gonring said, pointing out Boegel also came up with three saves, "and then at the end of the year, had an excellent (pitching) performance to beat Plymouth."

Boegel hit a crisp .355, going 19x54 with six doubles, one triple, one home run and 14 RBIs.

"I can't say enough about Brett. He and Sammy (Schlosser) provided some good gloves in the infield," Gonring said.

Holt had a rather slow start, but rebounded with some big wins down the stretch and ended up 6-3 against EWC foes with a shut-

out over Kiel.

"As he got his arm in shape, he was one reason why we turned the second half of the season around," Gonring said.

Holt pitched 36 and 1/3 innings, giving up 38 hits, 26 runs, including 17 earned runs for a 3.28 earned run average (ERA). He struck out 26 and walked 23.

Banks manned center field for the Indians and was a solid hitter in the No. 2 spot, batting .321 with 18 hits and eight RBIs and one triple.

Gonring called Banks a "steady outfielder with a good arm," adding, "He got valuable playing time (as a reserve) last year and parlayed that into a solid senior season."

Senior Zach Hedlund and the freshman Schlosser were given honorable mention.

Hedlund finished with a 3-1 record and an ERA of 3.93, giving up 31 hits and 16 earned runs. He struck out 20.

"He did a good job as a second pitcher for us," Gonring said, calling Hedlund the team janitor because, "He would do everything the other players didn't. He was a joy to have on the team."

"Schlosser has a bright future ahead of him," Gonring said, pointing out the team had 25 double plays this year, including 11 in the conference which his freshman second baseman had a hand in.

Schlösser only batted .188, but Gonring said he is a hard worker and believes he will improve offensively.

Gonring complimented all his seniors, Hardy, Banks, Holt, Hedlund, Chad Ray and Ethan Vetter, for "sticking together" and for "helping the younger players become part of the team."

Kewaskum finished 13-5 in EWC play and 16-10 overall.
