## Curds return to Beechwood

**BEECHWOOD-** At 9 a.m. Saturday a cheer went up from curd connoisseurs as the door to Beechwood Cheese Factory opened and customers filed in to snap up a local delicacy.

"There was word-of-mouth, and it exploded on us," said Jay Noble, owner of Noble View Creamery and a sixth generation dairy farmer.

On August 2, Beechwood's former head cheese maker Mark Heise came out of retirement to help the brothers as they made their first test batch of cheese curds.

Noble was happy with how the curds turned out, and so was Alissa Hartmann, Kewaskum, who waited in line to pay for four bags of fresh curds.

"My dad used to bring milk here. I've been coming here since I was a

little girl," said Hartmann.

She was happy that her daughter Tenley, 9 months, will get her first taste of Beechwood curds.

"I was really bummed when they closed," Hartmann said.

Beechwood Cheese, which had been in business in the southwest corner of Sheboygan County since 1894, filed for receivership in August 2012 and closed its doors May 4 this year.

One regular called Beechwood Cheese an institution.

"It's like going to the State Fair and getting a cream puff," said Karen Piszczek, Campbellsport, who along with her husband Joe, have been curd customers at Beechwood since 2001.

William Yochem, Kewaskum, calls himself a "forever customer."

"We were raised on it as kids - I don't want to eat any other cheese," said Yochem.

Noble said his Union Grove, company joined forces with brother John Noble when he acquired Beechwood Cheese last month.

Noble said Beechwood Cheese will operate as a division of Noble View and the brothers are working together to market both brands.

On Saturday, Noble View had its Alqueria and Juustoleipa cheeses alongside Beechwood brands in the store's refrigerator case.

Customer Randy Reysen, town of Scott, touted the virtues of Juustoleipa.

He had eaten some of the Finnish-style bread cheese on Friday came back Saturday for several more packages.

"When you eat it cold it's kind of plain, but last night we had it over

## Hansen appointed pastor at Salem U.C.C. Wayne

On March 7 Rev. Ruth Hansen was welcomed to serve as Licensed Minister at Salem United Church of Christ in the town of Wayne.

"It's a wonderful blessing to be with the people of Salem United Church of Christ. They are very caring people that have a strong sense of mission," Hansen said.

Hansen served as Pulpit Supply, a position akin to substitute preacher, since October last year.

"Since last September they've been without an official pastor - that's always an unsettled time in a congregation," said Hansen, who hopes to bring stability to the church.

Since becoming pastor, Rev. Hansen's duties have increased to include planning and leading Sunday worship and special services, weddings, funerals, celebrating the rites and sacraments of the church, and visiting home bound and hospitalized members as well as prospective new members. Hansen also provides counseling and referral services when needed and participates in denominational and ecumenical activities both as a representative of Salem and the United Church of Christ more generally.

As the season moves into autumn, Hansen wants to work with the congregation to build up activities and programs, like the Women's Guild and choir.

"She is a wonderful addition to our church family," said Salem UCC Vice President Amy Gauthier.

"As mother of an 8- and 6-year-old (Samuel and Ella), she does wonderful children's sermons. She has children actively participate in services and programs," says Gauthier.

Under Hansen's leadership, Gauthier says children have participated in the Heifer Project, Blessing Bags that were sent to Chicago and the Kenya Project, which shipped donations to an orphanage.

"She is positive in her outlook. She looks for good things and expects them to happen and they do," said Salem Church Office Secretary Ruth Betts.

Hansen also wants to work together with other congregations on common interests and find what ministries in the community, like Habitat for Humanity, that might match up with the skills and interests of the congregation's members.

Hansen likes to begin each worship service with a motto of the United Church of Christ: "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you're welcome here."

She invites people from all religious traditions and those with differing theological viewpoints to attend services.

She says the church holds certain fundamental truths, such as the Trinity, "but we pretty open in many aspects of our doctrine...We don't believe that any human being knows the mind of God."

Rev. Hansen began her seminary training at Lakeland College Sheboygan and received her Master of Divinity degree at the University of Dubuque in May 2011.

Before receiving the pastorate at Salem, she served as Pulpit Supply and finished her ordination requirements.

the campfire and when it's warmed, the flavor explodes," said Reysen.

Noble View previously sent its milk to a Milwaukee cheese factory and it was returned in 40 pound blocks to its Union Grove location for finishing. Now Noble said there are plans for Noble View to move some of its production equipment to Beechwood.

While a few regulars have returned, Noble says once

production is up to full speed they would like to add 10 to 15 employees.

The factory will be making curds every Friday for retail customers, but plans are to keep a factory store curd day on the first Saturday of the month.

Other than that, Noble says the Beechwood store's regular business hours have yet to be determined.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor-

There was a recent study out of a Kansas University that stated if McDonald's would raise their price of a Big Mac by 68 cents, all McDonalds employees could double their wages including the CEO who is currently earning about \$9 million/yr.

According to glassdoor.com an average salary of McDonald's workers is \$7.81/ hr. The average Walmart wage [according to glassdoor.com] is about \$9/ hr. Unfortunately these type of jobs seem to be some of the only ones seeing growth. There was also a recent study showing the negative economic impact from a company like Walmart.

Specifically they looked at WI, per the study as of the fourth qtr. of 2012: Data released on medicaid enrollment by employer showed Walmart ranked first with 3,216 employees and a total of 9,207 with family members enrolled in medicaid [Badgercare]. With wages as low as they are taxpayers are subsidizing Walmart employees up to and possibly more than a million a yr. in medicaid costs alone.

In the meantime the combined net worth of the Walton family is almost \$100 billion. There has been talk recently of raising the minimum wage [currently \$7.25 / hr.]. The Republicans would argue: #1 We

will either be forced to layoff workers or shorten their hours and #2 We would have to raise our prices so high we would lose customers.

Here's two things missing with this argument; #1 They never include profits or CEO salaries as part of the equation and #2 consumer demand is what creates jobs and dictates employee hours. The minimum wage was set by the fair labor stds act of 1938 another part of the FDR new deal. If the minimum wage had kept up with inflation for the past 40 yrs. it would now be \$10.74/ hr.

Higher wages = more tax revenue = less govt. assistance = more consumer spending = more job creation = less wealth disparity. There is such an unbelievable idea in our world today driven from the wealthiest with one goal in mind; maximize profits and appease shareholders and everything else be damned.

I would argue with those opposing this: Why do people earn \$10 or \$12/hr? Is it because they are just a little better employee than minimum wage? What about those earning \$14-16/hr? Are they just a step up from those below them? And on and on. The minimum wage is a starting point to which all wages originate.

## Chief's Corner

The last few months I have focused on some law or issue affecting our residents, but this time I am going to change gears and take this opportunity to explain how our department is structured and some other services we provide.

The Kewaskum Police Department provides 24 hour patrol coverage in the Village; however our office is not staffed 24 hours a day. Our dispatching is done by the Washington County Sheriff's Office, so if you need to see an officer for a non-emergency situation you can always have one dispatched to you by calling the Washington County Sheriff's Office non-emergency dispatch number (262-335-4411). If you do have an emergency, you should dial 911 and an officer will be sent to your location.

The Kewaskum Police Department employs a total of 15 employees: 1-Chief, 5-Patrol Officers, 1-School Resource Officer, 2-Part-Time Patrol Officers, 1-Administrative Assistant and 5-Crossing Guards. Our department patrols 24 hours a day, 365 days a year with only five full-time officers dedicated to patrol functions. The part-time officers and I pick up the open shifts that are not covered due to vacation, training, etc.

Officers on our department work rotating shifts; meaning their off days vary each week. Our schedule is unique in that even


with limited staffing levels; we are still able to provide a "cover" car multiple days each month. This "cover" car generally works the afternoon shift where our call volume is the greatest. Having two officers on during the afternoon shift is vital to providing adequate police services to our community and it creates a safer work environment for the officers on duty.

On top of providing police services, our department also does vehicle registrations or title transfers. This can be done in our office, Monday through Friday between 8am and 2pm. We do charge a counter fee, but I guarantee the lines will be much shorter than those at the DMV!

My goal as your Chief is to have a department that provides exceptional, professional and fair service to all residents of the Village of Kewaskum and those passing through. I also think it is important for the residents of our community to understand how our department works and why we operate the way we do. ## National school lunch and breakfast programs, special milk program information

As children need healthy meals to learn, it is the policy of the Kewaskum School District to serve all students lunch (and breakfast at the Middle School and High School) each full school day. The Kewaskum School District is eligible to receive reimbursement for part of the cost of these meals through the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI). For those students who qualify for free or reduced price meals, based on their household size and income level or due to receipt of FoodShare, FDPIR, or W-2 cash benefits, DPI will reimburse the school at a higher rate.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk if a split-session student does not have access to the school lunch or breakfast service.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used

for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children for whom households receive FoodShare FDPIR, or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, an adult member needs only to list the names of the school children, give FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number for each child, sign his/her name and return the application to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or write "none" if they do not have a Social Security Number. Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy, Becky Ehmer, Food Service Secretary

(262)626-8427 x4151 will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Jeanne Jacak, 1510 Bilgo Lane, PO Box 426 Kewaskum, WI 53040 (262)626-8427 x8005 jjacak@kewaskumschools.org.

If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household





## Indian Athletics

I would like to thank Andrew Kuehl for giving me this opportunity to be a semi-regular contributor to The Statesman. I plan to share thoughts and insights from the world of athletics as well as a few other fun things that come up as time goes along.

Recently, most of the coaches from our Kewaskum High School athletic department met to discuss some items as we embark on the 2013-14 school year. One area of emphasis was to focus on a philosophy of success. Winning is only one way of measuring success, but is often the one that is over-emphasized, particularly in youth and school athletics. There are other measures of success without having an unhealthy obsession with winning. The goal of our coaches is for our student-athletes to have SUCCESS. If we are successful in teaching and the execution of the skills needed for our respective sports, the winning will take care of itself. School and youth athletic programs are intended to be enjoyable AND educational. It can be a difficult balancing act for coaches to juggle the aspects of fun, teaching the life lessons of sport, instilling discipline and work ethic, and make kids want to come back season after season.

One way all of us can help all of our students have SUCCESS is by encouraging them to be involved in as many school activities as possible. A 2012 study by researchers at Indiana State Univer-

sity, titled "The value of Interscholastic Sports: Impact of Athletic Participation on GPA and Graduation Rates", found that students involved in athletic programs had better grade point averages than students not in athletics. It also found that two and three sport athletes have greater academic SUCCESS than those in fewer sports. I did my own rudimentary research last spring seeing how the numbers at KHS stacked up. I used data for students in ALL activities – athletic and non-athletic. On average, students in athletics & activities had a cumulative GPA almost 0.7 points higher than students not in athletics and activities. Seventy-nine percent of our 4.0 GPA students were in at least one sport or activity. Eighty-four percent of our students with 3.5+ GPA students were in at least one sport or activity. Through the first semester of the 2012-13 school year, athletic/activity students averaged four fewer absences compared to other students. I think the numbers speak for themselves. Students at Kewaskum High School involved in athletics and activities have more academic SUCCESS than students who are not in these programs.

Students, as we get the 2013-14 school year and athletic seasons started, get involved! Encourage your children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and neighbors to get involved in school activities!

member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. # Elite saves the best for championship round

Jenny Reicher's fast-pitch softball career featured nearly as many ups and downs as a Six Flags roller coaster.

A low point came midway through her senior season at Kewaskum High School when Reicher injured her elbow to a degree that her promising pitching career came to an end. There was no "woe is me" attitude from Reicher, however. She simply switched over to third base and earned a spot on the Eastern Wisconsin's All-Conference team.

Reicher's ride recently soared to new heights, as she and her Wisconsin Elite teammates, including MacKenzie Rosenthal of Kewaskum, captured the title in the NSA's (National Softball Association) Northern National Tournament held in Peoria, IL.

In a field of 16 teams, the Elite finished third in pool play and could not get past a powerful group from Fort Wayne, IN., until the double elimination championship when they beat the Stealth two straight, 8-2 and 9-5.

"We had to fight our way back," Reicher said last week after an exciting and somewhat unorthodox title run.

Wisconsin Elite is a team based out of the Fox Valley, one Reicher joined this year in an effort to prepare for her career at Concordia University in Mequon.

"I needed another team (to play with). I tried out, and I made it," Reicher said, ex-

plaining she makes weekly 150-mile round trips to Appleton for games.

Concerning how many games she has played for the Elite, Reicher said, "Probably a good 35 in league play."

"It's pretty cool because we get to play with college girls," Reicher said, indicating the league has players from UW-River Falls, UW-Green Bay, St. Norbert's College and Lawrence University.

Many weekends are spent in tournaments, but the one in Peoria is special because it is considered the Midwest nationals for women 23 and under. The tournament was scheduled from July 23-26, but Mother Nature had other ideas.

On one day, there was a six-hour delay between games, and on Friday, there was more rain, and even worse, a tornado warning.

When a siren started to blast, the umpire called the game, so the tournament was extended to Saturday, Reicher said.

Reicher played third base the entire tournament and said, "I hit pretty well ... I did struggle in a few games because of slow pitching."

She definitely was the hero in one game where the team found themselves in the loser's bracket.

"We were the home team. We needed one run to win," Reicher said, reporting there were two outs when a teammate reached with a double to keep the Elite's hopes alive.

Reicher was up next, and,

"I ripped a shot to center." Unfortunately her teammate was thrown out at home, but not to worry, the next batter singled her home. "I got the winning run."

Stealth had beaten Elite in pool play, but in the championship they were no match for the Wisconsin team, which also included Rosenthal for the tournament.

"We had lost our short-stop. We had three days to find a new one," Reicher said. She and her dad, Keith, suggested Rosenthal to the coach, and the deal was sealed.

"She (Rosenthal) bunted amazing. She got on base a lot," Reicher said. "I think the experience will help her a lot" with the rest of her high school career.

While the two young women were understandably excited to be on a championship team, probably no one was as elated as coach Bob Muhuron, who has been coaching the team for 30 years. "This was his first national championship," Reicher said.

Reicher said she had offers to play fast-pitch softball for a community college in Iowa, Daytona State in Florida and another college in Tennessee.

"I was looking at going to UW-Green Bay ... Lawrence as well," she said, but "I really think I fit in at Concordia very well. I will get a great education there."

Reicher plans to live on campus, which she said is "close enough to home and far
