

## School district will seek advice of residents on Visionary Committee

Kewaskum School District residents will soon be invited to help shape the future of the district's six schools as a Visionary Committee replaces the traditional committee structure.

Board of Education Clerk, Mary Miller said she already has about a half dozen residents who expressed interest in joining a Visionary Committee.

While board members are free to nominate candidates and district residents that have served on committees will also be invited, all residents of the school district are welcome to join if they are willing to make a two-year commitment and be able to work as part of a strong advisory group.

At its July 15 meeting the school board discussed employing a quarterly planning committee after concerns were raised regarding unselected residents serving on committees that could change district policies and programs.

Strategic planners would meet four times per year and give the community a say in devising both immediate and future plans for the district.

While the proposal to start a Visionary Committee is still in the planning stages, at Monday's meeting, ideas for that group began to take shape.

Superintendent Jim Smasal gave the board a rough draft of a recruiting statement that would help determine district resident's roles.

The committee would take into account factors including the aid formula, the state of buildings and grounds and curriculum expectations. The committee would devise one year goals and three year goals, with the one year goal being evaluated at each June meeting.

Preliminary meeting dates for the Visionary Committee are September 16, December 16, 2013 March 17 and

## Village committees kept busy during July

The Kewaskum Village Board met for their meeting on Monday, Aug. 5 and quickly learned about the heavy load of activity by several of the board's committees. From plans of changing the parking lot at the Municipal Building Annex to creatively planning for a new fire truck, committee members and staff have come up with interesting ways to cut costs and move projects forward.

Opening the meeting was Fire Chief Mark Groeschel, who during his monthly report, revealed volunteer firefighters saved taxpayers over \$1,000 by repairing a broken suction valve on one of the department's pumper trucks. The truck was taken out of service until it was fixed last Thursday.

Chief of Police Tom Bishop reported The Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse held local compliance checks at local businesses selling cigarettes and alcohol. Two village

businesses, J-Stop Citgo and The Old Hotel Restaurant and Lounge were cited for serving minors. Cigarettes and alcohol were sold by a clerk at J-Stop, while a server at The Old Hotel sold beverages to a minor.

Department of Public Works Superintendent Jerry Gilles reported that in working with wireless phone carrier Sprint on upgrading a tower in the village, very old waterlines were found in the area of the former Regal Ware factory. Gilles reported Regal Ware provided his department with valuable information leading the water department to discover lines they didn't know they had.

Sprint and other carriers pay the village to place antennas on the old water tower located on the former Regal Ware property on Second Street. Gilles said the new antenna will require Sprint to add footing reinforcement to the tower.

Administrator Matt Heiser informed the board that the state budget will increase transportation aid to

communities (for roadwork) by four percent. On the negative side, fees imposed by municipalities are now included as part of the property tax levy limits.

The village was previously considering adding connection fees to utility customers in lieu of impact fees. Heiser said he will look into how those types of fees would affect the village's levy limit.

In other business Heiser reported he is working with the village's Information Technologies provider to secure and monitor village computers. At next week's meeting, he will seek approval of an employee handbook and financial plan for the village that was presented last month.

Village Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported plans to purchase new election equipment with Washington County is progressing and expected to take place in 2015. She reported however that none of the equipment

## Jury trial expected for Shea in October

An October 14 jury trial has been scheduled for a Campbellsport man who will face homicide and injury by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle charges after a September 13, 2012 crash left two people dead and one injured.

Daniel Shea, 24, was allegedly drunk and texting during a crash that killed Paul and Joanna Grahl on Highway 45 in Fond du Lac County.

Shea allegedly admitted to a deputy on the scene that he had been texting and never saw

another vehicle approaching. The criminal complaint states that Paul Grahl attempted an evasive maneuver to avoid the collision before impact.

In addition to the deaths of the Grahls, a daughter, Esther G. Grahl, then 13, sustained serious injuries and was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend and later to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee.

When asked for a timeline leading up to the crash, Shea told a deputy he began drinking earlier that day in West Bend and visited taverns in Slinger, Hartford and Rubicon before returning home and setting out

again to go to a baseball game. From Shea's account in the criminal complaint, a deputy estimated the man consumed five beers, two mixed drinks and two shots between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m.

When taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for a preliminary breath test, the complaint states that Shea's breath alcohol content was more than twice the legal limit.

If convicted of the two homicide and injury charges, Shea could face up to 65 years in prison.

## Additional improvements being made to Third St

In order to extend the life of the Third Street water main replacement project, the village water utility will be paying for additional work.

At an on-site meeting August 9, the Kewaskum Village Board voted to replace curb and gutter on the south side of Third Street.

That will be added to the scope of work that includes the replacement of water main on a stretch of Third Street and replacing fire hydrants and water valves at the intersection of Third Street and Bilgo Lane.

Village Administrator

Matt Heiser said the meeting was called after some trustees voiced concerns about a section of crumbling curb and gutter, especially along Bilgo Lane, that would remain after utility work was completed and repairs made to the north side of the road.

While street side residents usually receive a special assessed for repairs, the utility will pick up the additional \$16,412, the board decided.

The original cost of the project, including the utility work was \$109,419.

Heiser said the village hopes to have the work completed before school begins September 3.

providers have been federally certified.

Washington County is expected to purchase equipment jointly with Ozaukee and Dodge counties. The village will then purchase from the county. Justmann added, the county would only purchase the equipment if it was certified.

Administrative Committee Chairman Dick Knoebel reported his committee is working on their budget for next year and has looked at changing the parking lot at the Municipal Building Annex to save money on paving. The committee is poised to change the parking scheme that would allow only handicap parking in the front of the building and then use the municipal lot in the rear of the building and remove a driveway.

Knoebel further stated that money will need to be budgeted for a new phone system at the Village Hall and that funding for the concerts in the park will be removed from the budget.

The protection and public safety committee, chaired by Trustee Kevin Schneumann, stated his committee is working with the fire department on the purchase of a new fire truck. Chief Groeschel stated they will be looking at buying a used chassis and placing new equipment on the truck. He figured this would save about half the

purchase price of a brand new truck.

Trustee Mike Berger stated the public works committee discussed assessments for the Highway 28 project and will follow past practices of assessments to property owners. He added that Gilles is preparing a five-year plan for road repairs that will be presented at a future meeting.

The Kiwanis Park Pool's negative operating budget was discussed. Trustee Craig Garbsich revealed the pool has had losses of about \$50,000 annually. The committee is discussing ideas on how to increase users of the pool. Funding of the annual fireworks display was also discussed, and it was hoped that sponsors for the fireworks could be found so the cost was not put on the taxpayers.

A replacement for Craig Gruber's position in the Wastewater Treatment Plant was discussed. Applications are currently being sought for the position.

It is hoped the new operator would start with the village in September. Trustee Joel Serwe asked if it might be possible for the village to raise revenue by performing lab duties for other communities. Trustee Scheunemann asked if it might be possible to hire another DPW crew member and outsource the lab duties at the plant.

Gilles stated the Village was investigating the possibility of performing lab duties for West Bend but it was only in the discussion stages right now.

A generator installed inside the Village Hall in 1984 is leaking oil and needs to be serviced. Gilles informed the board the cost for replacement parts are 10 times that of newer parts because of the generator's age.

Trustee Knoebel stated the generator is crucial to the village in a power failure as it runs the phone system, computers and other emergency equipment. Repairs will be performed by Lightning Repairs at a cost of \$1,660.

WE Energies was officially granted an easement in River Hill Park to install gas lines that will be moved from the Main Street bridge during the construction project. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation will no longer allow the utility to hang the pipes on the new bridge once it is installed. WE Energies then approached the village and offered \$1,400 for an easement to run the pipes in under the Milwaukee River, south of the Historical Society's log cabin museum.

The Kewaskum Village Board will meet Monday evening at 7 p.m. in the Village Hall.

## B&G Club to begin before school program

The Boys and Girls Club of Washington County got the okay to run before-school activities at Kewaskum Elementary School, but the program might not begin when school opens Sept. 3.

At Monday's Kewaskum Board of Education meeting, board members gave the go-ahead to the Club Executive Director Jay Fisher, but Fisher must go back to his board of directors before the program could be set in motion.

Fisher said the directors meet September 18, but he would try to open the program before then.

Fisher approached the

board with the idea last month but had to wait until the August 12 meeting for district board approval.

The before-school program will be available to first through fifth graders between 6:30 to 8:45 a.m. during the school year. Fisher said the cost to families would be \$10 per week and would include breakfast.

Kathy Mertz, head of the KES nutrition staff, said she would be happy to make breakfast for club members.

Two current before-school child care options serve about 100 children and cost parents either \$6 or \$7 per day, depending on the provider.

As part of the approval, the board agreed to revisit the pro-

gram at its one-year anniversary.

Six years ago the Boys and Girls Club started an after school program in the village. Of the five club sites in Washington County, Kewaskum's is the only one run out of a school.

The district currently contributes \$5,000 annually to the club, but Administrator Jim Smasal said the before-school program would not cost the district any additional funds.

Fisher said while it costs \$50 per year for a Boys and Girls Club membership, that fee has been waived for about 21 percent of Kewaskum's club members.

Expecting parents ponder what to name their newborn child. Many will pour through magazines or the Internet in search of something quite unusual, so that their child's name may display uniqueness. Others may choose a name from a favorite sports or Hollywood celebrity.

It is also not uncommon for parents opting to name a son after the father. At the birth of a son in March of this year, Henry and Jeanna Schacht chose to do just that - name their son Henry. What is unusual, however, is the fact not only is newborn Henry's father Henry, his grandfather is Henry. As is his great-grandfather, his great-great grandfather, his great-great-great grandfather and yes, even his great-great-great-great grandfather was named Henry Schacht. In case you have lost track, this makes little Henry Griffin Schacht the seventh in a long lineage of family history.

Henry Schacht the first was born in Darmstadt, Germany in 1825. He immigrated

to the United States in 1851 where he settled in the Town of Trenton. There he began farming and raised his family. His son, Henry George, moved to the Town of Farmington as he began his family. He told his father he wanted to farm where there was "better land." Consequently, in 1892, he purchased 120 acres on Highway H from the Ross Family.

Henry George made many improvements to the property, as well as raising 10 children, the middle one being Henry Adolph. Henry Adolph took over the farm on Highway H when his parents chose to retire in 1924. His firstborn was a son, whom was named Henry Peter.

After Henry Peter married, he bought a farm near Beechwood, where he and his wife Marion still live and are now retired. Besides farming, Henry Peter worked at the West Bend Company for 39 1/2 years. They raised five children, the oldest being Henry Lee.

Henry Lee always

dreamed of farming on his grandfather's land, so in 1972 he began farming operations back at the family homestead on Highway H. Here he still lives and farms the 120 acres of "better land" with his wife Susan. He was also blessed with three children, the oldest being Henry Andrew.

And this brings us up to the youngest Henry Schacht family of today.

Henry Andrew works as a lineman for WE Energies and lives with his wife Jeanna in Kewaskum. "Part of every father's dream is to have a son. We were blessed when our daughter Ryleigh, (age 3 1/2) was born, and blessed again when our son was born. It means a lot to me to be able to carry on the family name," Schacht said.

What's in a name? If you ask Henry Peter, Henry Griffin's great-grandfather, he will tell you it's everything. With tears in his eyes, he adds "I had hoped the name would keep running. I am grateful I got see Henry number seven."



## This Week In our Schools

Kewaskum Schools embark on e-Learning

Today's K-12 education system is rapidly changing to meet the needs of today's diverse learners and maximize the use of technology. One way of doing this is to offer an online component, which not only uses the natural tendency of young people to gravitate towards anything technological, but can expand their learning opportunities tremendously, when used effectively.

With just such an effective use in mind, the Kewaskum School District will begin offering an online component beginning at the start of the 2013-14 school year.

Online learning, also known as virtual school, or e-Learning, has many different looks. Some students enroll in complete online programs where all of their courses and interaction is through the virtual environment. Another look to online learning is blended or hybrid online learning.

In this type of environment a student may have some courses online, yet at the same time, have some courses at the "brick and mortar" school. A third view could be a student who attends a regular (brick and mortar) school class, but certain elements of that particular class's coursework is done online, outside of the school.

The vision for Kewaskum's

online learning component is in the early planning and implementation stages, but hopes to offer the best of both the virtual and physical school environments. The flexibility and potential for online classes can be hard to beat, because students can "attend" class on their schedule and while the offerings are still limited, the potential for new courses is huge if the district does not need to worry about minimum class size.

Another advantage of taking online courses through the district is that the student will then have access to all of the resources and extracurricular activities that are such a critical part of our community and student life.

"Our goal is to be a community school, a central hub where members of the community come together," stated Jim Smasal, Superintendent of Schools for the district.

The Kewaskum e-School will offer area students both opportunities.

This fall, the district will be looking to enroll students from the community who have submitted Open Enrollment paperwork to the Wisconsin Department of Instruction. Some Kewaskum residents have enrolled at Wisconsin Virtual Learning which is operated by the Northern Ozaukee School District.

There are roughly 30 dif-

ferent virtual charter schools throughout the state of Wisconsin. The district has researched different online learning venues that could be utilized to offer online education. Based on a number of factors, the decision was made to join the Wisconsin eSchool Network (WEN). The Wisconsin eSchool Network is a non profit organization that partners different districts to allow for the sharing of teachers and students across districts.

During the first year of the program Kewaskum will utilize strictly network teachers with intentions of selecting interested members of the Kewaskum staff over the next year. The Wisconsin eSchool Network currently serves grades 612, with plans to expand to the lower grades in the future.

On Monday, Aug. 19, at 6:30 p.m. there will be an informational meeting held in the Kewaskum Elementary School cafeteria. Parents and families of students who have open enrolled out of the district and would like more information on the program are encouraged to come and learn more about the Kewaskum eSchool. ## 25 Years Ago

According to a Washington County Sheriff's Department report, the accident occurred at the intersection of Highway 144 and Highway H, when Russell Volm, 18, stopped at the intersection. After stopping for the stop sign, he proceeded east to cross Highway 144, when his motor again began to stall and he struck the northbound Abitz vehicle causing it to slide sideways into the southbound lane where it was struck again, this time broadside on the passenger side, by a semi-trailer truck. Wendt was to have stood up for Abitz' wedding on Saturday and Friday was also the eighteenth birthday of Volm.

In another accident on Friday night, Herman J. 

Garbisch-aye, Knoebel-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Serwe-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the proclamation presented to Jean Moe for donating her time and talents to maintain the flower bed on Riverview Drive, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported on the public education that is required for the reduction of chloride in the water. The information has been distributed through the village newsletter and by advertising in the newspaper.

Zoning Administrator Chad Cook reported on the Third Street reconstruction progress. The new water main has been installed and is in the process of receiving a safe water test. The crew has now started removing pavement, curb and gutter.

Administrator Heiser:

1. Reported on the progress of the employee handbook. The handbook is relatively complete, one chapter needs to be written and various follow up information needs to be researched.

2. Reported other software options for computer security are being investigated. One alternative being looked into is to lock down the computers where history cannot be deleted.

3. Presented a breakdown of the Village's short-term financial plan. The plan starts with the 2013 budget as the base amounts. The plan covers the TIF shortfall, budgets an additional \$100,000 annually for street projects, incorporates the paving expense for the Main Street project and takes into consideration a major street project of 1.5 million dollars, perhaps Edgewood Road, in 2020 and equipment purchases of one million dollars starting in 2015. The known contributions to cash will come from the vacant Administrative Assistant position, TID debt that is currently covered by the tax levy, debt that will be retired and the sewer utility repayment to the General Fund. Additional contributions to cash needs will come from the elimination of an additional three positions and a tax increase of 3% in 2018 and 2020. Therefore, resulting in a cash balance that will fluctuate according to expenditures and revenue projections. Items not taken into considerations is the affect a 20% reduction in staff will have on services offered to residents, assumes no development in the TID, unknown future of state aids and health care costs, and does not include any growth in the tax base.

4. Reported on vacation days that will be taken in July.

5. Reported on the press release for the Impact Fee moratorium.

Richard Knoebel, Chairperson for the Administrative Committee, scheduled the next meeting for July 25, 2013 at 9:00 a.m.

Kevin Scheunemann, Chairperson for the Protection and Public Safety, scheduled the next meeting for July 25, 2013 at 10:00 a.m.

Mike Berger, Chairperson for Public Works and Public Services, announced the next meeting is scheduled for July 18, 2013 at 10:00 a.m.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the July 23, 2013 meeting has been cancelled. The next meeting has been scheduled for August 13, 2013.

Craig Garbisch, Chairperson for Park and Recreation scheduled the next meeting for July 24, 2013 at 8:00 a.m. Trustee Garbisch also reported on the July 10, 2013 meeting. Completed projects at Kiwanis Park were reviewed and a strategic plan for the park

system was discussed. Mike Berger, Representative for the Library Board, reported the circulation for June was 4,046 items. The biggest increase was in internet usage.


## WASTEWATER LAB TECHNICIAN/OPERATOR

# Younger Goeden back behind the wheel

When his former car owner, Bob Walldan, retired at the end of the 2011 racing season, Kewaskum's Don Goeden was without a permanent ride.

Goeden, the Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Association's Modified champion in 1992 and '93, ran occasional shows last summer, but he was watching from the sidelines this year until recently.

A call from Bob Hood of Waukesha put Goeden on the track again, and he has made the most of the opportunity in the metallic red No. 10W car.

On Saturday night, Goeden started on the outside of Row 8, passed 11 cars in the final 13 laps of the 25-lap Sprint Car A-Main to finish fourth overall.

Goeden, the eventual winner Kyle Marten of Sheboygan Falls and runner-up Danny Schlafer put on quite an exciting show, weaving their way through traffic to the front on the Sheboygan County Fairgrounds track that was not real conducive to passing on this night.

"The inside and the middle" were the places to be ac-

ording to Goeden, who said, "I was able to pass four cars on one lap, splitting the middle through them."

On his first night in the car, Goeden won a heat race, then may have been a little anxious in the main when he was involved in two cautions.



"The next time I will be in the car is August 17," Goeden said, indicating it looks as if he was to compete in several other shows on the Plymouth dirt track during the month of September.

Goeden said Hood and his wife have owned the car three of four years and "love to go racing."

"He's got a couple of crew guys, and we have a couple ... we work well together," Goeden said, indicating



Hood's crew members and brother, Dave, Brian Stern and Terry Weber deserve a lot of credit for the expertise they provide in setting up the car.

"It's a lot of fun talking to all the guys and competing," Goeden said. "Being back at Plymouth brings back a lot of memories. They put on a good show up there."

The August 3rd show was

called the Night of Champions. During the intermission close to 50 former champions, from the old Modified, the Late Model and Sportsman Divisions were introduced.

Goeden and his dad, legendary Willie Goeden, were one of four father-son champion duos. Willie Goeden also captured the Modified crown in 1973, '74, and '81.

Other past champions from the area included: Tim Thompson, Terry Chesak, Paul Pokorski, Frankie Heimerl.

A random drawing was held to determine honorary starters for the feature races, and Willie Goeden was picked to drop the green flag for the Late Model National race.
