Larger tubing area, other amenities will greet patrons this winter

## Sunburst expansion project underway

Visitors to Sunburst Ski Area this winter will notice a fresh feel, comfortable touches and streamlined procedures that will enhance their experience on the slopes.

"Sunburst has always been a family-friendly haven - that has not changed. We have that same mission to provide great family fun," said owner Jen Friedl, who purchased the resort with her husband Rob in December 2012.

Friedl said in an effort to make Sunburst a great place for customers and employees, they surveyed season pass holders, took into account the likes and dislikes of customers, including their three children and relied on Rob's experience as an avid skier and ski team coach.

The resort has experienced a facelift, but the biggest change is taking place on the slopes.

A newly-expanded snow tubing area will double to triple the number of lanes and a second magic carpet

will be added to handle upward mobility and reduce lines on busy weekends.

Improved snowmaking equipment will extend the tubing season.

Rob Friedl said that equipment would allow snow to be placed more accurately, cost-effectively, efficiently and under more marginal conditions. That means the tubing season can begin earlier and stay open later in the season while snow is put where it needs to be.

"Our goal is to have far less snow blow on Badger and Prospect roads," Rob Friedl said.

Even though lift tickets will be available at other areas of the park, the main ticket booth, nicknamed the "clock tower," will be solely devoted to ticket sales.

The patio area and fire pit has been renovated and the rental building is in the process of being completely remodeled.

Customers who rent gear can find their best fit at new serve-yourself boot-drying/warming racks before

moving to the counter for skis or all-new snowboards.

"We're trying to help increase the flow and get skiers and boarders onto the hill faster," Jen Friedl said.

Those visiting the new ski shop will find a fun, funky atmosphere that will feature Sunburst logo wear and upgraded apparel options as well as those sometimes-left-at-home items like gloves and goggles.

Before reaching the hill, Sunburst's web visitors will notice a change in mid-October, when the hill rolls out its new logo and a streamlined site.

And after a day on the hill, hungry skiers, boarders and tubers can stop at Freshies - formerly the beach house at the base of lift number two.

While there have always been snacks and food available there, the Friedls are experimenting with fresher food options like gourmet salads, sandwiches and soups.

## Town of Kewaskum addresses many issues at meeting

The Kewaskum town board tackled several issues - from complaint procedures to farming expansion - at its August 19 meeting.

The board rescinded sections of its livestock ordinance to allow for farming expansion in the township.

At a July 17 public hearing, Washington County Conservationist Paul Sebo told board members the Randy Thull farm wanted to expand their operation, exceeding a 500-animal unit limit imposed by the town. Currently, Thull's operation is spread between the towns of Kewaskum and Farmington.

While some supervisors expressed concerns at the July meeting that removing the ordinance and reverting to 25 foot setbacks would put farm operations too close to other properties, the town voted to amend its comprehensive 2035 plan, strike ordinance 17.18 and alter other sections as appropriate.

Trail building was next on the agenda as Ice Age Trail Alliance Director of Trail Operations Tim Malzahn appeared before the board to talk about a new 2.5 mile-long section of trail being constructed in the township between August 21-25.

The project area winds from the Eisenbahn Trail, past Sandy Ridge Road and County Road H. About 300 volunteers are expected to help with the work and on Saturday, Malzahn said United States Representative Tom Petri will be presented with the Vanguard Award from the North Country Trail Association, the IATA's sister organization.

Once complete, the section will be part of 36 connected miles of Ice Age Trail in Washington County.

The board also discussed the damaging effects of crops and landscape elements planted on town road

right-of-ways.

Chairman Dan Schmidt said work is underway to devise a letter to send to landowners advising them of state and local statutes.

Board members were in agreement that plantings that encroach on the right of way damages roads.

"I don't think town citizens should have to pay for one farmer who's getting an extra two bushels of corn," Schmidt said.

The town has also devised a way to address resident concerns using a complaint form.

"I don't want hearsay or emails. If it's not on here, I don't want it," said Chairman Dan Schmidt

as he held up the form.

Schmidt said once residents fill out their name, address, phone number and the nature of their concern, he will research the issue and contact them.

Forms will be made available on the town web site or can be picked up at the town community center, 9019 Kettle Moraine Drive, during business hours.

Supervisor Dan Stoffel is researching how area municipalities handle their animal licensing after a question about the number of dogs allowed by homeowners was brought before the board.

Current municipal ordinances state that if a person owns more than three dogs over five months old, they are required to obtain a kennel license.


In addition to paying a \$50 fee, kennels require a conditional use permit and may not be located in a residential area.

Stoffel will report back to the board next month.

## Ice Age Trail expansion happening this week in Kewaskum

A stretch of trail winding along the scenic glacial ridges of the Kettle Moraine State Forest represents one of the oldest sections of the Ice Age National Scenic Trail. That segment will grow for the first time in more than 30 years, and the Ice Age Trail Alliance is looking for volunteers to help in the trail building effort that started this week and runs through Sunday.

The project will expand the Milwaukee River Segment of the Ice Age Trail at the southern end of the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. The new trail will connect to the Kewaskum Segment to the west, creating a continuous 36-mile stretch of Ice Age Trail.

"This project is a unique opportunity for volunteers to experience the place where the Ice Age Trail has its roots and extend the oldest section of the Trail," said Tim Malzhan, IATA Director of Trail Operations. "The event is going to have some highlights on and off the Trail, too."

The evening of Friday, Aug. 23, folk singer and songwriter David HB Drake will present a "Gather the Family" sing-along for volunteers of all ages to enjoy.

On Saturday, Aug. 24, U.S. Rep. Tom Petri will visit the work site to join volunteers in

the trail building effort. Petri will be accepting the Vanguard Award from the North Country Trail Association, recognizing his long-term support of National Scenic Trails and leadership in the trail community. The North Country Trail, another National Scenic Trail, passes through Wisconsin in the northwest part of the state.

During the project, volunteers will construct new trail, cook meals, upgrade trail signage, and enhance the Ice Age Trail's visibility. No previous experience is necessary, and there will be roles for all ages and abilities.

Volunteers will gather Wednesday through Sunday mornings at 8 a.m. at Sunburst Ski Area in Kewaskum. Trail work ends by 5 p.m. each day and Sunday at noon. The IATA provides food, tools, and campsites free to all who volunteer. 

# Indian Athletics

In this column, I would like to follow up on the SUCCESS philosophy and the data I shared regarding the study done by Indiana State University and my own simple research of our own Kewaskum High School data.

As I stated last time, our KHS athletic department met before the start of the fall seasons and discussed a number of issues. One of the areas we talked about was the overemphasis that some place on athletics over academics. We occasionally hear someone say that athletics can be a particular student's "ticket out of here." While that can be true, it is much more likely that our students can earn academic scholarships rather than athletic scholarships.

To my knowledge, there are only seven four-year colleges and universities in Wisconsin that offer athletic scholarships - NCAA Division I schools: UW Madison, Marquette University, UW Milwaukee and UW Green Bay; NCAA Division II school: UW Parkside; and NAIA schools: Cardinal Stritch University and Viterbo University. The rest of the colleges and universities in the state are NCAA Division III schools that cannot give athletic scholarships. The four NJCAA Division III schools in the state (Madison Area Technical College, Milwaukee Area Technical College, Mid-State

Technical College and Western Technical College) also cannot give athletic scholarships.

A majority of our students who attend post-secondary schools do so at colleges and universities in Wisconsin. A great majority of the schools don't offer athletic scholarships, but ALL of them offer academic scholarships and awards.

We have data that shows that students who participate in more athletics and activities have greater SUCCESS in school than those who participate in fewer or no extra-curricular programs. We need to keep in mind that we must emphasize the academic SUCCESS for our students.

Each March we see television commercials by the NCAA during their Men's Basketball Tournament broadcasts, about how there are more than 400,000 NCAA athletes and that almost all of them will be going pro in something other than sports. The same can be said for high school students getting athletic scholarships - few of them will be going to school on an athletic scholarship. Let's keep the focus of education-based athletics where it is supposed to be - on the education - and see our students have great SUCCESS!

## Wilde's 107 paces Kewaskum's scoring





## Wendelborn eager to take over soccer reins

After playing on the varsity team for four years and graduating from Kewaskum High School in 2009, Nate Wendelborn never lost touch with his school's soccer team.

"I followed the team and how they were doing," Wendelborn said Sunday night. Because of that continued interest, he knew Luke Pivoni was leaving the team as head coach and decided to apply with Athletic Director Jason Piittmann for

the job.

Midway through June, Wendelborn was told he was selected as the new coach. He brings with him a solid prep career, two years of collegiate soccer at Concordia University in Mequon and plenty of experience beforehand, first with the YMCA program in West Bend and from age 12 with the West Bend United team.

Wendelborn, who is a customer service manager at the First Bank Financial Center in Mequon, is eager to get started. He realized not being a teacher in the building might pose a challenge but has spent time this summer "reviewing things with Luke," working closely with Piittmann and picking the brains of some of his former coaches.

Already Wendelborn is familiar with some of the seniors who will be this year's leaders.

"I had a contact day, so I got to know a lot of the players," he said, indicating he also participated in last year's Senior Recognition Night when he, John Kenworthy and several others, made short videos for the individual players to tell them what to expect at the next level, to wish them good luck and to give them a "shoutout for their strengths" on the soccer field.

When asked how many players have signed up for the

sport, Wendelborn said, "We have about 23 right now, but I'm always looking for more." One of the 23 is junior Brian Wendelborn, Nate's brother.

Concerning returning lettermen, Wendelborn said, "I think we have five."

One thing he doesn't have right now is an assistant coach. The school is still looking for someone to serve as the JV coach for the sport.

With his work schedule, Wendelborn moved the practice schedule back to a 4 p.m. start. "We will practice every day from 4 to 6 p.m.," he said, adding his goal is to develop an explosive offense.

"We're really going to work on keeping with the powerhouses in the league ... Plymouth, Sheboygan Falls

and Two Rivers," he said. "It may not happen this year ... maybe next year."

"I want our kids to be scoring goals and not always playing defense," Wendelborn went on. "Primarily we want to come out and score goals in the first five minutes of the game" and continue to push hard until the final second.

Kewaskum will open its 2013 campaign August 22 (today), hosting Columbus in a nonconference game at 4:30 p.m. Two days later, the Indians travel to Berlin for a tournament starting at 8 a.m.
