## Volunteers extend Ice Age Trail on Schaefer property

When Ice Age Trail (IAT) volunteers broke camp at Sunburst Ski Area Sunday, they left behind a segment of trail that connects 36 miles of the 1,000 mile

footpath through Wisconsin.

The 2.5-mile stretch includes land previously owned by Ray Schaefer, who died at the age of 102 in June this year.

His daughter, Audray Wiesen, Rocky River, Ohio, came out to help

with the project.

Growing up, Wiesen said she didn't do much farm work, but she did help her dad pick stones and keep the

## Loss ready to begin new Principal post at KHS

Principal William Loss hopes students sense the energized atmosphere at Kewaskum High School when the doors open Sept. 3.

"There is a lot of excitement and enthusiasm (with teachers and administration) - I think the students will benefit from that," Loss said.

Loss is one of several new faces that include two new school counselors and 10 teachers at KHS.

"I feel good about direction of our high school and having Bill at the helm," District Superintendent James Smasal said. "We're happy with some of the changes he's already implemented and other processes that needed a fresh pair of eyes. He's going to be a great addition

to our team."

In addition to eliminating the late lunch period and a building facelift, students will have the opportunity to be part of the decision making process when it comes to building operations, Loss said.

"We want to give them a choice in what they think KHS should look like," Loss said.

Assistant Principal Kristine Dreher said it's been a busy summer - more so since Loss came on board July 8.

Dreher, who served as interim principal at KHS last year and chose to return to her role as associate, describes Loss as a "collaborative, knowledgeable and innovative person."

"He is bringing a lot to the school and will do a lot to address our scores. He's a great fit for Kewaskum High

School," Dreher said.

Loss is impressed with the dedication and passion of the KHS staff.

"I wish everybody in the community could see the teachers who have been popping in to introduce themselves all summer and are stopping in to prepare for upcoming school year," Loss said.

Loss says, like his colleagues, he wants to improve education opportunities for Kewaskum students.

"We want to make KHS the best it can be," Loss said.

Loss spent 14 years teaching - at Milwaukee Public Schools, DC Everest Junior High School outside Wausau and in McFarland, Wis. He received his masters' degree from Edgewood College in 2006 and be

## Board split on approving teacher contracts

The Board of Education voted down teacher contracts that would give teachers a 2.07% raise for the 2013-14 school year and approved seven new teacher contracts at their bimonthly meeting Monday.

The board accepted two resignations. Ellen Kuphal, a KHS English teacher and H.O.P.E Club advisor cited personal reasons in her resignation letter. Kuphal is believed to have accepted a position at Holy Trinity School in Kewaskum. Heather Collien a WES 4k and second-grade teacher is leaving due to accepting a position in the Oakfield School District where she resides.

The board officially hired seven new teachers. Katie Butler, Natalie Hansen, Monica Smith and Samantha Barbian all serving as special education teachers. Merissa Seabrook, Speech/Language; Cassandra Stahl, WES 4k/second grade and Emily Garbisch as KHS English teacher.

Bryan Puls resigned as FFA advisor opening the door for newly hired Ag Teacher Shelly Oelhafen who accepted Puls former advisor position. Other extra curricular hires included Kyle Wesenberg, Head Girls Bowling Coach; Casey Scheel, KHS School Store; Nicholas Wendelborn Boys JV Soccer Coach and Stacey LaRonge KHS Chess adviser.

Negotiations Committee Chairman Troy Hanson, asked for approval on 2013-14 teacher contracts after citing the entire membership of the Kewaskum Education Association approved a contract offered by the board of education at an earlier meeting. The contract represented a 2.07 percent raise to teachers amounting to about \$118,000 increase in salaries overall for the year.

Negotiations with teachers began in May. Hanson stated the increase



## Link's Hideaway II offers up north atmosphere

Rick Rosche and Mary Steege have brought together northern cottage charm with a touch of Jackson to Link's Hideaway II on Main Street in Kewaskum.

Link's Hideaway II opened August 13 with seating for 12 at the bar and at another 30-or-so at tables located in two intimate side rooms that feature wood paneling and a fireplace.

Rosche said when they found the former McDonald's Rustic Inn at 215 Main Street, they knew it was the place for their new venture.

"Part of what sold us is the atmosphere. It's got great character - there is pine on the back bar, barn boards - it has a real 'up north' feel," said Rosche.

Rosche, who runs Link's Hideaway II with Steege and her son, describes it as a "mom

and pop" place.

"It's a place you can go to eat, hang out and have a good time," Rosche says.

The couple's Jackson tavern, Link's Hideaway, opened in November 2010.

While Steege runs the Jackson establishment, she has worked the Kewaskum location a few times.

"It's going very well, everybody seems very nice and we've even had a few of our Jackson patrons stop by," said Steege.

The original Link's Hideaway is known for its burgers and Friday fish fry.

One menu item brought to the Kewaskum is called the Western burger, which is topped with a half-pound of apple-smoked bacon and shredded onion tanglers. Coleslaw, homemade potato chips or baked beans are on the side.

"You don't leave here hun-

dry," Rosche says.

Burger meals run between \$8.95 and \$10.95.

Once or twice a year, Rosche likes to change up the menu, which now includes wraps, Philly Cheese Steak sandwiches and a black forest roast beef sandwich that has sautéed mushrooms, onions green peppers and Swiss cheese drizzled with a bistro sauce and piled high on rye bread.

The Friday night fish fry starts at \$7.95 and Link's also features an all-you-can eat had-dock plate for \$10.95.

A seafood trio with shrimp, haddock and perch gives hungry diners another choice, as well as a shrimp basket and Roche's "four seasons" - grilled haddock with Italian seasoning topped with sautéed green peppers, mushrooms and onions.

"It's one of our favorites down in Jackson," Rosche said.

A children's menu is also available.

Links' Hideaway II opens at 11 a.m. Tuesday through Sunday.

On Mondays they open at 2 p.m. and Monday through Sat-

urday, the kitchen closes at 9 p.m. On Sundays, the kitchen is open until 5 p.m.

Reservations are not required, but are appreciated for larger groups. Call (262) 477-1196.

### Uncooperative victim stalled investigation

## Charges filed from December beating

After lengthy investigation charges have been filed against a 30-year-old Milwaukee man who assaulted a Hartford man outside a Kewaskum apartment building.

Charges were requested on George J.D. Ewing Jr., Milwaukee, through the Kewaskum Police Department for substantial battery, disorderly conduct while armed and second-degree recklessly endangering safety.

The investigation was set in motion Nov. 29, 2012, when the Kewaskum Police Department responded to a call in the 200 block of Knights Ave. for a male victim who was attacked and beaten.

While responding to the incident, officers discovered a 9 mm shell casing and a thorough investigation was conducted with the assistance of the Washington County Sheriff's Department Detective Bureau.

The investigation uncovered that Ewing allegedly used the butt of a handgun to strike Juston Schnorenberg, 37, in the head and while doing so, the firearm discharged.

"This is the kind of crime we don't want to see in Kewaskum," Police Chief Tom Bishop said.

A release from the Department states the assault was not a random act of violence, but that the victim and suspect were familiar with each other.

Charges were also requested against Schnorenberg for obstruction of justice.

"This could have been resolved quicker if not for the noncooperation of the victim," Bishop said.

cattle pasture clear of multiflora rose.

Last week she was back doing the same work - weeding the trail.

She said her father would have been thrilled to see the work completed.

Ray Schaefer sold the property in 2003 to the Ozaukee Washington Land Trust and the state. Wiesen said her father had talked with IAT Executive Director Mike Wollmer about the trail.

"In 1856, this was part of a land grant and after all these years, it's going back to the state of Wisconsin," said Wiesen.

While her father lived, Wiesen said he would allow people to hunt and fish on the property and would be happy to see the public using it again.

The trail building was done by an IAT mobile skills crew, during a four-day event where those certified in crew leadership worked with fellow volunteers, who learned advanced trail construction and mainte-

nance techniques.

Hundreds of volunteers placed markers, built a boardwalk and grubbed out level paths along the stretch.

Tim Malzhan, Ice Age Trail Alliance director of trail operations, said when work began he gave it a 20 percent chance of opening by the end of the project.

On Saturday afternoon, he was 90 percent sure the trail would be open before Sunday afternoon.

That doesn't mean the job was a breeze.

Steep trails had to be leveled on the west side of Sandy Ridge Road, revealing powdery soil that required shoring up with native timber. Malzhan said that stretch would have to be monitored for erosion.

On the other hand, work on the 170-foot boardwalk went smoother because of dry conditions, but getting the lumber to the location proved a challenge, Malzhan said.

The trail, which runs from near Highway H to Glenbeulah,

is owned by the state and the IAT partners with the Department of Natural Resources to maintain the property.

Jason Quast, acting superintendent of the Kettle Moraine State Forest Northern Unit, said not only do state forest visitors discover the trail, those who come to hike discover the state forest.

"Some people come specifically to hike the Ice Age Trail and for the remote camping," said Quast.

The Ice Age Trail is one of 11 National Scenic Trails. Established in 1958, the Ice Age Trail Alliance is a nonprofit volunteer organization that works to create, support and protect the Ice Age Trail.

## Group strives for quality education

Concerns about Kewaskum School District students have led parents, business leaders, taxpayers and educators to form a watchdog group, Quality Education for Kewaskum Students that has been meeting since May.

"We feel that district leaders are not properly focused on our kids' best interests," said Mugs McFadden, a representative for the group. "We understand the financial realities facing the district, but encourage careful consideration of programming that benefit all students, such as retaining experienced teachers, limiting class size, and increasing support for gifted and special needs kids."

McFadden has lived in the district for 42 years; her three children graduated from KHS and two are teachers in other districts.

McFadden said several teachers left the district this year.

District Administrator James Smasal said five have been retirements and 10 educators were added as replacements for teachers that left.

Act 10 and the Affordable Health Care Act have created changes that have affected districts across the state.

While Smasal said the district has a bit more freedom in offering packages to teachers, Act 10 also makes it easier for teachers to be mobile.

He said the biggest reason teachers gave for leaving during exit interviews was geography.

"They're finding jobs in districts that are closer to where they live," Smasal said.

In addition, seven new positions have been created, adding two middle school teachers and an elementary school teacher, due in part because of reduced paraprofessional time

and a change in scheduling. The district has also experienced reduced paraprofessional time in the special education department, necessitating the hiring of three new teachers that will be used to facilitate the district's special education co-teaching model.

Three teachers added were for personnel issues, Smasal said.

McFadden said the group, which wants to get the board, administrators, teachers and parents working together, plans to monitor school board meetings and district activities and will make suggestions for improvement.

Smasal said he knows of the group, and invites its members to join the district's Visionary Committee.

"The Visionary committee sounds promising - if indeed everybody works together and it isn't just a top-down committee," McFadden said.

While the Visionary Committee will meet quarterly, McFadden says Quality Education for Kewaskum Students tries to meet at least twice a month.

For the Visionary Committee, residents are asked to make a two-year commitment and expect to set goals that will be evaluated each June.

The first Visionary Committee meeting will begin at 5:30 p.m. Sept. 16 at the KHS Cafeteria with a half-hour social. The meeting will begin at 6 p.m. and conclude at 8:15 p.m. From 8:15 to 8:30 p.m., the next agenda will be discussed.

was the maximum allowed under Act 10.

"We asked for it to be skewed so we could bring teachers' salaries on the bottom end up, and those on the higher end wouldn't receive as much to get everyone closer to the current marketplace. We have to compete with the marketplace, that's who sets the salaries, Random Lake, West Bend and Campbellsport. We want to retain and gain the best and the brightest," Hanson said after the meeting.

Vice President Jim Leister stated he was not ready to vote on the issue and wanted to table any action. He alluded to not knowing how the budget looked as a reason for his hesitation.

"We said we were going to get this finished before the start of the school year, the market value of our teachers is more of an issue than our budget. We have to get the best staff we can get for those dollars," Hanson stated.

Board member Grace Mueller seemed confused after Hanson's comments about market value as she thought waiting was also a good idea as home values were on the upswing.

Hanson made a motion to accept the contract and received a second from Mary Miller.

Discussion continued, "We're moving exactly where we want to be," Sue Miller added.

Heather Oelhafen cited

her newness to the board and processes and desire to discuss the contracts further.

Mary Miller then called the vote. Hanson, Sue Miller and Mary Miller voted in favor while Leister, Mueller and eventually President Tim Ramthun voted against the contract. Oelhafen abstained - an abstention is counted as a no vote.

No motion to table was made.

After the meeting Oelhafen said, "There are several reasons I abstained in the vote last night. While attempting to get questions answered, another board member 'called the question' meaning all discussion had to cease and a vote immediately taken. People that know me, know that I genuinely value the great teachers of this district. It boils down to my due diligence could not be completed in the abbreviated regular board meeting last night; thus the reason I abstained."

"We had this in the budget already," Hansen reiterated.

Teachers did not receive any raise in the 2011-12 school year and a 1.25 percent increase in 2009-11.

Contracts will again be discussed at the Sept. 9 meeting.

Hanson after the meeting stated the charge to have contracts negotiated was given at the May 28 meeting when teachers were given a one percent raise for the 2012-13 school year.



## Indians showcase big play abilities

Just one game into his varsity football career at Kewaskum High School, sophomore Brandon Thull has earned the handle of "game-breaker."

In a matter of 27 seconds last Friday night, Thull, a 5-foot-9, 170 pound running back scampered for two touchdowns, one a 51-yarder, to break what had been a 19-14 game wide-open. The final score was 33-14 in the Indians' favor.

"In the beginning, I was a little jittery," Thull admitted afterward. "I tried hard to pick it up."

And pick it up he did, to the tune of 111 yards in the second half and 160 yards in the game on just 11 carries. Thull's first TD covered 18 yards around the left side of his line with 6:11 left to play, and the second, which featured a couple broken tackles, was the big gainer, starting right up the middle. It came at the 5:44 mark.

"The linemen made huge holes for me," Thull said, indicating Eric Limberg and Garrett Buth opened the hole on the sweep.

Setting up the second TD was senior defensive back Matt Ringwell, who jumped high to intercept a Seth Schrank pass on the first play after the kickoff.

Ringwell was definitely one of the standouts for the Indians on defense. He added a second interception with 4:00 remaining to end any chances of a Suns comeback.

East, which was winless the entire 2012 season, looked impressive in the first half, moving the ball effectively on the ground and taking advantage of some shoddy tackling by the Indians.

After the Indians went three-and-out on its first possession, the Suns drove 55 yards in nine plays to get on the scoreboard first. Nick Casper, a 160-pound running back went the final 2 yards, with Ian Loveland tacking on the point after.

Kewaskum came right back with a score of its own, needing just six plays to go 57 yards. Senior Joey Seitz got the TD on a 3-yard plunge. Thull set it up with a burst to the outside for 38 yards to the East 2. Charlie Witek's first kick was good.

The score stayed at 7-7 until 7:35 remained in the second half. On the first play after an East punt, it was Seitz, who wound up with 148 yards

in 16 carries, showing his speed, going around the left side for a 68-yard TD.

This time Witek missed the PAT, but it didn't hurt the Indians, who used a Seitz interception to set up shop at the East 41. Three plays later, QB Brett Boegel hit Witek for an 11-yard TD pass.

Kewaskum tried for the 2-point conversion but Thull was stopped short of the goal line.

East put together a long and exciting drive right at the end of the half. Facing a third and 21 situation at Kewaskum's 41, Schrank scrambled and eluded a sack attempt and at least three other tackles as he sped down the right sideline for a score with: 37 remaining.

Loveland's kick made the score 19-14 at the break, which is where it stayed until Thull's two late scores.

The two teams traded punts in the third quarter, and Boegel was stopped on a fourth down try at East's 11-yard line.

After that, the Suns picked up three first downs to the KHS 47-yard line before committing back-to-back penalties (delay of game and procedure) which halted their drive toward a tying touchdown.

Kewaskum wound up with 405 yards of total offense, 343 coming on the ground. East had 237 yards in total offense, including 63 from senior Jonah Maas.

Defensively, Matthew Elbe sacked Schrank twice, while Greg Rate and Josh Rahlf each got to him once. Ben Watzig was credited with 11 total tackles, while Rahlf was in on 10.

"An opening win is always nice," KHS coach Jason Piittmann said, quick to add, "There are a good number of mistakes we have to fix."

A couple costly penalties bothered Piittmann, but not as bad as giving up a touchdown at the end of the first half. He said he would have felt a lot better "if we wouldn't have given up that stinker run at the end of the half."

About the breakaways by Thull and Seitz, Piittmann said, "They both have that capability."

For the most part he was pleased with the line play because both feature newcomers in starting roles. "We're young," Piittmann said.

Kewaskum will entertain Port Washington this Friday night.

Graduation has taken a toll of the Kewaskum Indians football team, but coach Jason Piittmann, starting his 11th season at the helm, figures there is enough remaining talent, plus help from newcomers that the Indians will be a top challenger for the Eastern Wisconsin title.

Gone from the team that had to settle for third place (behind Plymouth and Two Rivers) in the EWC are all-conference two-way tackle Alex Fechter and end/defensive back Nate Krupp, along with running back Ted Wollner.

Those are big shoes to fill, but Piittmann has 13 lettermen, including seven starters back. At the top of this list is senior Brett Boegel, who brings both toughness and talent to the very important quarterback spot.

Last season, Boegel (6-foot-0, 188 pounds) passed for 1,118 yards and rushed for two touchdowns. His experience and his size are a plus for the Indians.

Senior tight end Greg Rate will give Boegel a big target to throw to. Rate is the only returner who received any all-conference acclaim. He received honorable mention for his work at defensive end in 2012, and Piittmann feels his participation in a winter sport have helped him improve.

"He does have good hands," Piittmann said of the 6-4, 195 pounds Rate, adding, I think

basketball really helped him." As far as a feature, Piittmann is looking at 150-pound senior Joey Seitz, who started several games near the end of the year.

The fullback spot will be "either Max (Maertz) or Ben Watzig," according to Piittmann, who said the 190-pound junior Watzig is "quite strong." "We are going to be variable," Piittmann said about his offense set, which will include some split back, and, "We might see some Power I and Wishbone," depending on what the other team gives the Indians.

In the "O" line will be Eric Limberg (6-0, 185) at center, Garrett Buth (5-10, 300) and LJ Pinchard (5-6, 255) at the guards and Sam Fechter (6-2, 240) at tackles, with Matt Ringwell (5-11, 155) at split end. Limberg and Ringwell are seniors, while Buth and Pinchard are juniors, and Fechter is a sophomore who started a year ago as a freshman and more

than held his own. "We've got some nice size," Piittmann said, looking at the fact his interior five average 236 pounds.

Piittmann said in the scrimmage at Random Lake, Boegel "looked pretty good and the offensive line as a whole," adding Seitz and sophomore speedster Brandon Thull "ran pretty well." Defensively, it looks like Rate and either Collin McCarthy (5-11, 184) or Matthew Elbe (5-9, 221) at the ends, Fechter at one tackle and junior Brad Peterson (5-10, 210) at the other.

The linebacking corps will include Maertz and Limberg on the outside, Seitz and Watzig on the inside, and junior Bille Lehmann (5-9, 158) and Ringwell at the corners and, the safety will be Andy Buelow (5-8, 150).

"We're going to have more guys playing both ways," Piittmann said, indicating the team does not have the depth it has featured in the past, with only 10 seniors. "The numbers are

down and some smaller classes are coming through," he said.

One question mark coming into the season was finding someone to replace Hunter Flanders, the Indians' place kicker the last four years. "It looks like it will be (Charlie) Witek," Piittmann said. The sophomore Witek, played with on the junior varsity team last season.

As far as who will be good in the EWC, without hesitation, Piittmann looks at defending champion Plymouth. "Plymouth will be tough, and Two Rivers lost a lot but they should still be pretty good," he said, indicating also three teams, Kiel, Waupun and Two Rivers all have new head coaches, although the new man at Two Rivers, Kevin Schillcox, was the

offensive coordinator last year. Kiel's new coach faces the challenge of starting without a freshman team this fall.

Concerning his team, Piittmann said, "I think we should be able to compete with the top tier of the conference."

While this looks like it good be another good season for KHS, it could be an important one for Piittmann individually because he is closing in on 100 wins, as he starts the season with a 91-23 record.

Jason Last, Nick Kreif, Bobby Bannasch, Nick Whalen, Andy Dahlberg, Casey Scheel and Gary Mays will assist Piittmann. Mays, Whalen and Dahlberg are all new to the program.
