## Destination Imagination program begins at Kewaskum schools

Elementary school students in the district are being offered a new extracurricular activity. Students will be given the chance to sign up for Destination Imagination, a nonprofit educational program geared toward "inspire and equip students to become the next generation of innovators and leaders."

The program is being piloted at the elementary schools, though the program is designed for K-12 students. Heidi Williams, principal at Wayne Elementary and a former coach of the

program in Germantown will be the coordinator for the district.

Heather Oelhafen, a board of education member, had participated in Odyssey of the Mind from which Destination Imagination stemmed. In 1997 her team took second place with a seven-foot, female, singing robot called "Staccato."

As a mother of younger children, she wondered what had happened to the program and began to inquire about it which included contacting her old coach, Connie Schulist. Odyssey of the Mind is still available, but Destination Imagination was picked due its prevalence in the region.

"I learned things I would have never learned from a fabricating perspective," Oelhafen said about her experience. "Lots of good elements that come from this go beyond the standard things you would think of."

Students will form teams of 2-7 members and will require a coach. The coach is a parent, educator, or volunteer willing to keep students on task without helping with the challenge.

Six challenges are offered, with a seventh designed for children in

## Gridiron eighth graders claim Group II title

The Northeast Group II football championship was on the line Saturday when the Kewaskum eighth graders (6-0) clashed with host Slinger Red (5-1), and what a game it was, going to overtime before the Indians prevailed 14-8.

"It was an absolutely great game," coach Jim "Jonesy" Korth said Monday, reporting Kewaskum held the ball for eight plays after the opening kickoff before turning over the ball to the Owls, who marched all the way down the field for a touchdown and kicked the two-point, extra point.

As things turned out, that was the only TD Slinger Red would score as the Indians toughened on defense and tied the score on their first drive of the second half. Tony Steger scored from five-yards out and Cole Surprenant kicked the PAT.

Slinger was threatening in the fourth quarter when Patrick Krier intercepted a pass at his own five-yard line and trying to find some running room, gave up three yards before being tackled on the two.

After using a QB sneak to move out of the shadow of their own goal line, the Indians began a two-minute drill that would include a 35-yard pass from Gabe Christenson to Surprenant, who was called on to try a 45-yard field goal with :02 left on the clock.

The ball was on target but fell a few yards short, according to Korth, who said his defense held Slinger Red on the opening series of the overtime. Then, after several runs by Krier, to within inches of the end

## Shea to be sentenced in January

A Campbellsport man entered guilty pleas to two charges stemming from a Sept. 13, 2012 crash that killed an Eden couple and seriously injured their daughter.

Daniel Shea, 25, plead guilty to two counts of homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle during a Sept. 24 appearance in a Fond du Lac County court.

According to the criminal complaint, Shea was allegedly drunk and texting during a crash that killed Paul and Joanna Grahl on Highway 45 in Fond du Lac County. Shea told a deputy he never saw another car coming but thought he may have crossed the cen-

ter line. The complaint goes on to state that Paul Grahl attempted an evasive maneuver to avoid the collision.

When asked for a timeline leading up to the crash, Shea told a deputy he began drinking earlier that day in West Bend and visited taverns in Slinger, Hartford and Rubicon before returning home and setting out again to go to a baseball game.

When taken to St. Joseph's Hospital for a preliminary breath test, the complaint states that Shea's breath alcohol content was more than twice the legal limit.

A sentencing hearing has been scheduled for Jan. 2, 2014.



In the space of a few weeks, Chaz Dreher did what some hunters wait all their lives to attain - the triple crown of Wisconsin hunting.

"It's been definitely a good fall," said Dreher, a seventh-grader at Kewaskum Middle School.

Dreher bagged a bear, turkey and deer in less than three weeks, between Sept. 8 and 28.

Dad Chuck Dreher said fellow hunter Larry Polenske transferred his tag to Chaz after he realized he wouldn't have time to go out for the hunt.

"It takes nine to 10 years to get a kill tag. Every time I see Larry I thank him for that special opportunity for Chaz," Chuck Dreher said.

Chaz said bagging his first bear was the biggest thrill.

"It was a great hunt," Chuck said.

On Sept. 8, the hunting party, made up of family and

friends from Wabeno and Laona, Wis. watched a few female sows graze at a bait station. Later a sow and a boar happened by and Chaz shot the 155-pound male.

"I was pretty sure I had a good shot," said Chaz. "He dropped right away. It should have been 300 pounds, but there wasn't one ounce of fat on it."

Chaz completed Hunter Safety classes this winter. He said the Hunter Safety class taught him to have control of the gun at all times. His dad taught him about keeping quiet.

On Sept. 21, he headed out, bow in hand, to look for a deer.

"I used to go bow hunting with my dad. I'd take a toy bow and practice," said Chaz, who has been hunting the real thing for about two years.

"At first I shot at one and missed. About 40 minutes later I heard a cracking and there they were. I let two does go by and shot the buck," said Chaz.

"A lot of people go out with a bow and are lucky if they can get a shot at a doe," Chuck said.

The five-point, 150-pound buck was his third.

He caught the buck in the liver and called his dad and Uncle Doug Bilgo to help him track the deer until it was too dark to see.

"We found him in the morning, about 30 yards away from where we (stopped tracking)," Chaz said.

The next week he got a hen turkey when his father flushed the three toms and about 18 hens toward him.

"He shot the hen because there are so many; it helps keep the population lower. For 12 years old, he's got a very good game management system in his head," said Chuck.

He isn't hanging up his gun or bow just yet. Chaz plans to see if he can bring home a duck, geese or pheasant - "All three if I'm lucky."

## Edgar Allan Poe Tales of Horror in Kewaskum

With Halloween approaching, Kewaskum Library is one of many in Washington County participating in THE BIG READ celebrating Edgar Allan Poe. Book discussions and a variety show have already past, but residents still have another chance to become reacquainted with this well-known author.

The BIG READ is a granting program of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest. Schauer Arts Center applied for the grant for the first time in 2012.

Schauer Arts Center received a \$10,000 grant and took the lead organization role. Book discussions were required, but the communities would decide which activities to do. Robyn Wilkinson, director of marketing, said, "The grant allowed us to reach a wider range of people and organizations."

Poe was chosen because not only he offered a variety of choices, but also he had the most familiarity. His themes correlated with the season of Halloween as well.

Libraries were not the only groups involved. Washington County and Hartford historical

societies, Lac Lawrann Nature Conservancy, Kewaskum Theatre, UW-Washington County and UW-Extension 4-H Youth Development created events.

Even Terror on Rural Street, a haunted house in Hartford, dedicated two rooms to Poe.

On Sept. 24, the Kewaskum Book Club had a discussion on Poe. Though the members did not read all the same short stories, there was good conversation. "We did quite a bit of discussion of Poe's own life," Connie Zemlicka said. "We also talked about how much richness was in his vocabulary."

Not all of the members like Poe's works. Members also discussed how Poe inspired Stephen King. Kewaskum Library Director, Steev Baker, admitted at the Poe Variety Show when he read "The Pit and the Pendulum" as an adolescent that was the first time he had been scared by something he read.

The Poe Variety show was on Sept. 30 in the Kewaskum Theatre. Five members of the KHS Drama Club and fans of Poe themselves, performed "Annabel Lee," a poem by Poe. Writers read poems that Poe's works had inspired.

At the end, Baker presented four short films based on Poe's

short stories. "It was definitely fun putting it together. It was great to get the creative community for it, like writers and an acting group," Baker said.

The films were The Simpsons Treehouse of Horrors version of "The Raven," "Vincent" by Tim Burton, a 1953 version of "The Tell Tale Heart" which was the first horror animation, and a production by Ray Harryhausen of the "The Pit and the Pendulum."

"The short films were not easy to find. I really had to scour through a lot of things. It was harder to find than I thought it would be," Baker said. "I looked at it as a challenge to find some unique things I didn't think anyone would have seen."

Joshua Kane will be doing a short performance of Poe's works with a discussion afterward at Kewaskum Public Library Thursday Oct. 17 at 7 p.m. On Friday, Oct. 18, the Schauer Center hosts Kane's full performance of Poe's Tales of Terror.

Kane tailors his performance for the Big Read as he is very familiar with the program. "Joshua Kane has such a presence about him. If he is like that in person, I can only imagine how powerful his performance is going to be," Wilkinson said.



grades K-2. The six challenges are geared to target a specific part of a curriculum and the correlating standards of performance and content. The challenges have specific components and rules to follow.

This year's challenges focus on technical, scientific, fine arts, improvisational, structural and service learning. Younger students (K2) participate but do not compete in the Early Learning Challenge.

"It's everything from academically based STEM to art and problem-solving. Things they wouldn't generally have in a normal classroom. It brings learning together," Oelhafen said.

Interested students and coaches would need to submit their interest to their building principal this week, so teams could be formed by the end of the month. Teams would start meeting once a week, but as the regional competition, scheduled for March 22, 2014 approaches, the teams would need to meet more frequently.

Each meeting/practice is about 90 minutes to two hours, but the weeks before competition could require a longer time.

"It takes months to design your solution because there is a lot they have to build and create," Williams said. In addition, the teams also need to perform a five to eight minute skit designed around the challenge.

Skills acquired by students include, but are not limited to troubleshooting, play writing, improvisation, time management, math/budgeting skills, test taking and physical science. Creativity is essential and is part of the judging criteria.

The program is also a healthy competition. After the regional competition, students can move forward to compete at a state and global level.

Those students interested in forensics in middle school would find the experience as good preparation.

At the competition, teams will be given an instant chal-

lenge, unlike the central challenge the teams had already completed. In the instant challenge, students are given three 15-minute challenges where teamwork is essential.

"You really want to work with your team to develop teamwork to be able to go in and do this [instant challenge] together on the spot," Williams said.

Oelhafen presented the program to the leadership committee in March 2013 and had them perform an instant challenge. After being placed in teams, they were asked to create the tallest structure they could with a handful of paperclips, rubber bands, a deck of cards, scissors and a ruler.

The scissors and ruler couldn't have been part of the structure. Williams judged the results.

Within a few days Oelhafen received the call from Williams stating \$5,000 was being provided to start the program. Budgets vary for each challenge.

"I am really happy that they decided to bring it back. I hope we get enough teams," Oelhafen said.



However, the new proprietor will not operate a harness shop but will start a new business in the building instead, announcement of which will be made later. contribute to this bit of history, but this harness shop was as stated, located on Fond du Lac Avenue, on the corner of what is now First Street and Fond du Lac Avenue. That residence was later occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Buczek, who lived in the residence and owned and operated Buczek's Tap, right on the corner. The business was later owned and operated by Gloria and Norbert Serwe and family, who were famous for their Friday Night Fish Fry business and sandwiches served in the tavern. These are the only two that come to mind prior to the building being purchased and razed by one of the dairies, I think Kemps, located to the east of the building.)

Weber of Newburg said that there are 24 active cases of scarlet fever in the village. There were no new cases up to Tuesday. No deaths have resulted, although several of the cases are considered critical. Most of the persons struck by the fever are from 16 to 35 years old.

July 23, passed away the same evening only four hours later.

# Purple raiders reign in Indians

**TWO RIVERS** - What began as a 90-minute trip north with an opportunity to challenge Plymouth for a share of the EWC championship at home this week and earn a first-round home-playoff game instead became a nightmare for the Indians Friday. They couldn't stop Two Rivers and their read-option offense and lost 35-14.

Kewaskum's (5-3 overall, 4-2 conference) offense was stuck in neutral while the Purple Raiders left the Indians in the rearview mirror in the first half. Two Rivers made the most of their productivity in the first 24 minutes. They got 207 of their 231 yards from the air in 35 plays compared to the 41 total first half yards (34 rushing, seven passing) in 16 plays for the Indians.

"It was a combination of things," Indians Coach Jason Piittmann said of the team's inability to move the ball downfield. "We moved the ball OK to start with. It's been our M.O. (modus operandi) all season. We get moving and all of a sudden we make bad mistakes, whether it be penalties or turnovers or something and then things kind of snowballed."

Two Rivers (7-1, 5-1) had great field position throughout the half and tested the

Indians' defensive backs downfield all night as senior quarterback Dexter Smith threw to five different receivers. And when Smith wasn't throwing the ball, he ran from the pocket for big yards.

"We gave them a short field and then they got up and we're in a hole," Piittmann said.

The Indians have been shut out in the first two quarters before, but they haven't experienced a 21-0 halftime deficit this season. Smith scored the game's first touchdown in the first quarter on a one-yard run with 6:39 remaining. A two-point conversion made it 8-0. Senior receiver Tyler Kust caught a three-yard pass from Smith with 3:56 left in the second quarter and just before the half Smith hit senior receiver Brett Slaby in the end zone with a seven-yard strike with seven seconds left in the half.

Kewaskum got their offense out of neutral and had good field position at their 35 after the second half kickoff by Two Rivers went out of bounds. Sophomore running back Brandon Thull got 51 yards on the first three plays of the drive to put the Indians in the red zone to the Two Rivers 14. Senior quarterback Brett Boegel got the Indians on the board in the third quarter with a pass to senior receiver Matthew Ringwell for 10 yards on

a fourth and goal with 9:03 left. Kewaskum trailed 21-6 after the missed PAT.

"We started to press a little bit and we just struggled," Piittmann said. "We probably doubled our offensive output with our first series in the third quarter."

After holding Two Rivers to a three-and-out in their next possession, Kewaskum fumbled the ball twice, losing it the second time when Boegel was blindsided and hit from behind from an unblocked Two Rivers defender and lost the ball. The Raiders turned the Indians' turnover into another score with 5:02 left in the third quarter on a 9-yard run by Smith to give the home team a 28-6 advantage. He scored again from three yards out for a 35-6 lead with 1:10 left.

In the final quarter, Boegel connected with sophomore receiver Charlie Witek from 22 yards and Thull completed the two-point conversion on a run with 6:23 left in the game for a 35-14 deficit. Without that TD by Kewaskum to begin the second half, they would have been staring at a running clock and a 35-point disadvantage. In the second half, by WIAA rules, if one team has a lead of at least 35 points, the clock will continue to run unless there's a time out, when the quarter ends or if the losing team scores to make the

margin less than 35 points.

"Our kids don't give up," Piittmann said. "They fight. That's one thing that we've always (told) our kids, to never throw in the towel."

If the Indians beat Plymouth at home this Friday, the best finish for them would be second in the conference and the Panthers will at least share the title with Two Rivers, assuming the Raiders beat New Holstein. If Kewaskum loses to Plymouth and Campbellsport beats Kiel the Indians could fall behind the Cougars, even though both teams will have 4-3 conference marks. Campbellsport would move above Kewaskum in the standings because they beat the Indians in a head-to-head matchup. The green and white could open up the postseason on the road, Oct. 25 or 26, depending on where they're

seeded.
