Prevention network honors Carlton at annual meeting

WEST BEND- As part of the Washington County AODA, the Prevention Network has helped reduce drug/alcohol use among Washington County youth. The Prevention Network held its annual meeting at the Washington County Fair Park on Oct. 17 to not only showcase success, but also discuss goals for 2014.

Ronna Corliss, county prevention coordinator of the Council on AODA of Washington County, manages the federal grant money and distributes the funds to five community coalitions within the network. The Drug Free Community (DFC) grant funds the majority of the Prevention Network.

Coalitions are Germantown Youth Futures activity committee, West Bend A.C.T.S. (Area Communities Take a Stand), Students Taking Action Not Drugs (S.T.A.N.D), Kewaskum Cares about Kids (KcK), and Hartford Area Project Care.

The Prevention Network meets every other month with representation from each coalition.

"At this point we are able to stay in the game as far as receiving federal funding," Corliss said.

In addition, she added, DFC funding of \$23,000 went to community coalitions for their mission, which includes reducing drug/alcohol usage in youth.

DFC communities have positive results quicker than non-DFC communities on a national level. Marijuana usage was 9.9 percent lower, alcohol usage dropped 23.3 percent and tobacco fell 10 percent.

"The most effective way to provide AODA prevention within the community is through coalitions," Corliss said. "We started 10 years ago. We were ahead of the game."

From 2006 to 2012, tobacco and alcohol use in Washington County declined 14 percent for monthly usage. On the other hand, marijuana showed an alarming trend.

"Our use rates are declining slightly. It is our perception or how kids perceive how risky smoking marijuana is that is going up," Corliss said.

The Prevention Network unveiled

their new campaign designed for marijuana awareness. Other goals include lowering both usage and access of alcohol, tobacco and prescription drugs and increasing positive media for youth in pro-social activities.

In addition, each coalition gave a plaque acknowledging a member who showed an "outstanding contribution to the community." KcK member Paula Carlton, healthcare provider for Aurora Health Care, was awarded the honor by Linda Dymond of the Council on AODA.

"She has been this voice of energy, of optimism. She understands health and prevention," Dymond said. "She is so committed to the overall health

of our youth."

One of the initiatives KcK started was the parent pledge to counteract the abundance of parents hosting parties in Kewaskum. Initially 98 families signed and that number has climbed to 345, or 46 percent of total families that now network and promise not to host parties.

KcK will have a meeting at the Little Folks School House Oct. 30. Another Community Conversation by the KcK is tentatively planned during winter.

Drugs found during sweep at KHS

A Kewaskum High School student received a citation for possession of marijuana after a sweep at the school on Friday, Oct. 11. A sweep at the Kewaskum Career Academy yielded no illegal substances.

The Board of Education held an expulsion hearing Monday for the first time in two years. Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal would not confirm if the hearing was related to the drug sweep.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop reported his department assisted the Washington County Sheriff's Office's Drug Task Force with the sweep. K-9 units were brought in from Hartford and Mequon Police Departments as well as Dodge and Washington County Sheriff's Offices.

Bishop stated last fall a similar sweep took place but nothing was found.

Smasal could not comment on specifics of the sweep, but stated, "As part of our school safety plan and the commitment to keeping our environment safe and purposeful, the school district will do random dog searches periodically throughout the year."

Credit cards used on Milwaukee's north side

Vehicle stolen in village, others entered had credit cards taken

A vehicle stolen in the village was recovered 24 hours later in the City of Milwaukee. Police are still seeking suspects for two other vehicles that were entered and now have things missing.

Kewaskum's Chief of Police Tom Bishop said a vehicle was stolen and two others had things stolen after they were entered overnight Thurs., Oct. 17. Credit cards, inside wallets and a purse were stolen in two of the entered vehicles.

"Individuals entered multiple vehicles and stole multiple

credit cards, using them at various locations in the Milwaukee area," Bishop reported.

The stolen vehicle was parked off Edgewood Road. The owner of the minivan stated he had the only key in his possession at the time of the theft. Milwaukee Police located the vehicle in their city and pursued it, the driver fled the vehicle and ultimately police there failed to apprehend the suspect.

Chief Bishop reported one of the vehicles was unlocked while one vehicle was forcefully entered.

Police don't know if the crimes are related but they fol-

low similar patterns with other communities.

Kewaskum Police Officers are actively working on the cases. If you have any information please contact the department at (262) 626-2323.

Chief Bishop not only again urged residents to lock their homes and vehicles, but also added, "Please bring in your belongings, and if you see or hear anyone or anything suspicious at night, call our dispatch center. We would rather you call and have it turn into nothing than the opposite."

School Board to adopt budget Monday

The Kewaskum School Board will meet at 6 p.m. Oct. 28 in the Kewaskum High School Library to pass the district's annual budget.

District Business Manager Julie Thoreson said final budget numbers would change due to a bill signed Oct. 20 by Governor Scott Walker that cut property taxes by \$100 million.

The district is waiting for final certification, which will

likely come after press time. Thoreson said it is possible aid given to school districts would lower the levy, but state general aid will again be decreasing, meaning costs will be passed on to the taxpayer, Thoreson said.

The board must adopt a budget before Nov. 1, the deadline to set the levy.

Last year's levy was \$11.473 million, and according to information from the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance website, the tax rate for the district was \$9.67 for

2012-13. A preliminary budget was approved in June. Thoreson said the preliminary budget was required by school board policy and the differences in the budget that will be adopted Monday are minimal, with the June budget being about \$9,500 higher.

She said this budget is 2.5 percent less than last year's, when the total budget was \$24.452 million.

KFD to host live fire training Oct. 31

The Kewaskum Fire Department in partnership with the Wisconsin Propane Education and Research Council (WiPERC) is holding live fire training on October 31, 2013 at 6 p.m. in Kiwanis Park. Approximately 50 firefighters from Kewaskum the surrounding departments are expected to attend. At times during the training, area residents may see flames shooting 20 feet and more into the air. Observers are welcome to watch the live fire training beginning at approximately 7 p.m., but they must remain at a safe distance from the props and water spray from the hoses.

The propane for this train-

ing is being provided by Strobel Propane Gas Company. The company is a member of the Wisconsin Propane Gas Association and participates in the propane industry check-off program which pays for this training. Strobel Propane Gas Company has been family owned for over 50 years. The company began as a jobber for Standard Oil, but is now owned and operated by Myron Strobel. He and his well-trained staff provide home delivery of heating oil, gasoline,

diesel fuel, motor oils, and propane gas to customers in the area.

The propane fire training begins with an hour of class instruction and then participants move outdoors to don their gear and divide into teams of five to work with live fire scenarios including a grill, forklift, bulk tank and propane terminal piping props.

The WiPERC contracts with FIRE LLC of Green Bay to provide the instructors.



Dear Editor-

With the federal government shutdown now officially over, brace yourself for the next round in about two months. The federal budget works like this; the fiscal year for 2014 has officially started as of Oct. 1, 2013. The shutdown occurred because congress didn't pass the 2014 budget put forth by the President in Feb.

Negotiations are currently open for the 2015 budget to which Obama will submit by the first monday in Feb. 2014. Looking back at the federal fiscal budget of 2009 which was presented by Bush in Feb. 2008 and agreed by congress before Oct. 2008 the total spending including mandatory and discretionary spending was about \$3.5 trillion.

The current budget of 2014 is about \$3.8 trillion with a total revenue of tax collections of about \$2.9 trillion leaving a deficit of about \$900 billion which is added to the total debt of about \$17 trillion. Currently interest payments on the debt are about \$230 billion annually.

Total spending when adjusted for GDP output has actually gone down and in real dollars has risen at the lowest in all recent presidencies. Any talk of the debt MUST be used as a ratio to the GDP much like your own personal debt [mortgage, car payments, etc.] compared to your earned income.

Currently that ratio is at

about 80% compared to an all time high after WW2 of about 123%. Budget negotiations must include both spending and revenue.

The debt ceiling is a completely different issue. The debt ceiling was first created in 1917 as a way for congress to control govt. spending. Since the current form of the budget process created in 1974, the debt ceiling becomes almost a moot point. The debt ceiling is much like a limit on your credit card. Raising the debt ceiling is only allowing the debt limit to be raised because of approved prior budgets whereas the money has already been spent.

The US currency is the number one choice around the world as the reserve currency to heed off recessions. In fact 62% of \$6 trillion in foreign holdings by the worlds central banks own the US dollar and 23% of our public debt is purchased from foreign investors. The US government has never defaulted on it's debt obligations [paying off treasury bills, savings bonds etc.].

According to Standard and Poors we lost about \$24 billion in economic output because of the shutdown. This lost output equals an increase in deficit and debt.

There is also something that neither party will talk about, the trade deficit. Currently the trade deficit is about \$580 billion. It is believed that about 80% of this deficit directly adds to the debt and deficit in terms

of lost jobs and lost good paying jobs with a loss of tax revenue. Bush signed 17 free trade deals and Obama signed 1 after delaying for 3 years what was passed in congress prior. As of now Obama is closing in on another one called the TPP trade deal. This is a bad deal for us. We must come together and call all of our representatives and urge a halt to this.



The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Richard Knoebel, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Joel Serwe, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Chad Cook, Janet Knops and Stephanie Justmann. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on September 19, 2013. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Mike Berger to approve the minutes from the September 19, 2013, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to suspend the rules and bring up item A under Unfinished Business: "Discussion and possible action on rescheduling the 2013 Trick or Treat hours", second by Craig Garbisch and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Knoebel-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Serwe-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

Trick or Treat hours were brought back for reconsideration. There were concerns with having Trick or Treat on Halloween night due to it being a weekday. The traffic volume is higher during 5 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. and it is difficult for children to participate due to it being a school night. Motion by Richard Knoebel to schedule Trick or Trick on the Saturday before Halloween from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. permanently until direction from future Village Boards changes the date and time, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Chief Groeschel presented the current pay schedule for officers, training and wages and the proposed increase to take effect for the 2014 budget year.

Chief Groeschel also announced the 1985 tanker has been taken out of service. Consensus of the Board was to sell the truck as is.

Police Chief Thomas Bishop announced the department will be utilizing a new program to get information out in case of an emergency. The Nixle program will put out alerts via text message to people who participate.

Due to the retirement of the Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles, Administrator Heiser reported:

1. The DOT proposed work plan involving the alteration of facilities for the Main Street/Hwy 28 project has been approved.

2. The asphalt subsurface default on Silver Fox Drive will be repaired by the DPW crew and the asphalt will not be patched until next spring.

Zoning Administrator Chad Cook reported the installation of the banner poles on Fond du Lac Avenue is almost complete. The attachment detail with the DOT is still being configured.

Administrator Heiser reported:

1. Comments on the draft employee handbook are still being compiled. Two board members have submitted changes.

2. The computer server control in still being created by Heartland. The current security measure did not capture any data.

3. The financial plan will need to be updated to reflect the elimination of two village employees.

4. The removal of the Annex parking lot is progressing. The concrete access will be poured this week.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann reported:

Kewaskum gets sixth seed in playoffs after 28-6 loss to Plymouth

Some Kewaskum football players sobbed as they gathered in a circle after their 28-6 loss to undefeated Eastern Wisconsin Conference champion Plymouth, October 18, at the Doc Mitchell Athletic Field on Senior Night. Head coach Jason Piittmann had a private moment with the affected senior around somber teammates, who put their defeat to the side and thought about the health and well-being of their starting signal caller, who had an unfortunate incident on the field.

Quarterback Brett Boegel, at 188 pounds, was spun around and driven down by Plymouth 205-pound junior Tyler Willeford in the third quarter after an 8-yard run on a second down play at their 49 yard line. Boegel's head hit the ground. It was the last play for him. He was taken out of the game and sat on the bench with his head down while team trainers talked to

him. Boegel suffered a concussion. It's unknown if he will be cleared to play in the Indians' first round playoff game, this Friday at Wisconsin Lutheran.

"I don't have to talk about Brett," Piittmann said. "He's a senior. Brett was playing an outstanding game. He had a great week of practice. He was executing everything very well. He had a couple of great audibles. That's part of football, the hit. He got dinged, so we had to bring in (Michael) Proch(now)."

The sophomore backup quarterback came off the bench cold with hardly any time to warm up and relieved Boegel. He engineered a 13-play, 69-yard drive in the fourth quarter, ending it with a 9-yard pass to senior running back Joey Seitz with 7 minutes 37 seconds left in the game to get the home team on the board and avoid the shutout. Prochnow will be thrown into the fire if Boegel can't play.

Plymouth (8-1 overall, 7-0 conference) scored on their

second possession in the first quarter on a 1-yard run by senior running back Brad Trakel with 2:18 left. They had the short field and needed eight plays and 36 yards to get in the end zone. The PAT gave the Panthers a 7-0 lead. The visitors scored two TDs in the second quarter to extend their lead to 21-0. With 10:17 left in the half, Willeford caught a 30-yard pass from senior QB Kollin Neils. An 80-yard sprint to the end zone by Trakel broke the game open after taking advantage of Kewaskum's turnover.

The Indians (5-4, 4-3) got great field position after Plymouth's third TD of the half with a long kick return run by sophomore running back Brandon Thull at the Panthers 41. They picked up three first downs and a pass interference call on a Plymouth defender that landed them 5 yards away from the goal line. The 12-play drive ended on an interception in the end zone by Plymouth senior defensive back Collin Denzin.

"That was all momentum (by the Panthers)," Piittmann said. "What was the score at that point, 14 (to zero)? So it's 14-7 if we catch that ball (instead of the interception) or 14-6. And all of a sudden that's a huge swing from 21-0 at half that's huge."

Seconds before the half ended, Piittmann yelled at one of the officials for not placing the ball on the ground and letting the clock run out without Plymouth punting and giving Kewaskum one more possession.

"I'm not going to comment about the officiating in the newspaper," Piittmann said.

Trakel's third TD came with 5:10 remaining in the third quarter on a 60-yard run to give the Panthers a 28-0 advantage. With a comfortable margin by Plymouth late in the game, both teams took their starters out to prevent further injuries heading into the postseason. Kewaskum would've had a playoff game in the first round against a low-

er-seed team even if they beat Campbellsport and Two Rivers but lost to Plymouth. Instead, they will be a sixth seed.

The third-seeded Vikings (6-3) in any other year would've won the Wisconsin Little Ten Conference but not this year. They have a QB in Logan McShane who can run and throw. He threw for more than 1,500 yards and rushed for more than 1,000 yards in the regular season and had a QB rating of 123. Runningback Terrance Ward almost cracked the 1,000-yard mark, falling 4 yards shy, yet he still averaged 111 yards a game on the ground. Receivers Anthony Carver and Jacob Frey had 432 and 388 yards, respectively, with averages of 20.6 and 19.4 yards per catch.

All Kewaskum can do is give it their best and leave it on the field, with or without Boegel.

Lady Indians end season with win at home, grueling EWC conference match

Nothing stopped the Kewaskum volleyball team from giving it their all and leaving it out on the court last week. Their last five Eastern Wisconsin Conference matches included a home contest, Oct. 15, at the KHS Fieldhouse on Senior Night and the conference tournament in New Holstein, Oct. 19.

The six seniors honored before last Tuesday's match against Two Rivers were as follows: middle hitter Kayla Oelhafen, middle hitter Katrina Freund, setter Heather Johnson, libero Paige Becht, outside hitter Cassidy Enright and outside hitter and likely all-conference pick Steph Henk.

The end of the road on the volleyball side for those seniors at the high school level was fast approaching. They had fun on and off the court and will ponder their futures that may or may not include volleyball. It's uncertain if the other five seniors have plans to play beyond high school but Henk will continue to play with her club team in West Bend and in college. "I think everyone will miss it," Henk said. "They all love volleyball. I don't know about the other girls, but I play club, so I'll be continuing and will be playing at (University of Wisconsin) La Crosse next year."

She recently met with the coaches there and is looking forward to playing at the collegiate level.

Two Rivers didn't put up a fight in the first game as they lost to Kewaskum 25-15. The Indians led by as many as 12 points in the second game at 15-3 before the Purple Raiders rallied to reduce their deficit to single digits in their 25-17 loss. In game three, Kewaskum, already up 2-0, lost their focus on the court, which showed with some players out of position.

"A couple of missed serves and mental errors," Kewaskum coach Joe Moser said. "Sometimes we play down to the level of competition. We have to work on not doing that. A couple of kids were in new spots. Our middle hitter who doesn't normally serve and a setter playing on the right side ... We had a few people playing in different spots and it made us look a little goofy. They got it together and came back and put it away in three."

The Indians won the series 3-0.

Last Saturday was a different story at New Holstein for Kewaskum in the EWC tournament. They had to play entire matches, which ranged from three to five games, against four teams, as did the seven other conference schools. Giving the Indians liver to eat in the early morning was the last thing they expected instead of sausage, eggs and pancakes. That what it was like facing the first opponent in Waupun on Court 2 in the high school gym for the green and white. The Warriors won 25-20, 25-17 and 25-12. On Court 4 in the middle school gym, the Indians were defeated by Kiel 25-19, 25-21 and 26-24.

There was a bright side, although briefly, in Kewaskum's match against Plymouth in the third match on Court 1 in the high school gym. The Indians got off to a great start and beat the Panthers in the first game 25-20. Plymouth got back down to earth to win the next three games 25-13, 25-21 and 25-13 and the series 3-1. In the final game on court three back in the middle school gym, Kewaskum took an early 10-6 lead on Sheboygan Falls. The Falcons made up for it with a 16-point turnaround to go from four down to 12 up in winning the first game 25-13.

It was a game of runs for both teams in the second game. Kewaskum used a 6-0 run to

lead 11-9 and Falls responded twice with a 10-0 run to lead 21-11 and closed out the game with a 4-0 run to win 25-16. The Indians held a slight advantage in game three until Falls tied the game at 11. The Falcons never gave up the lead, pulling away after the last tie at 15-15 to win 25-20 for a three-game sweep.

By the time all of Kewaskum's matches ended around 3:20 p.m., the girls were exhausted and appeared to have lost some energy after a grueling day on four different courts without much of a break and walking the equivalent of a city block from the high school to the middle school gym and back.

"It's not like a (regular season invitational) tournament match either where you win two (games) and you're done," Moser said. "You have to play at least three and against Plymouth we go four. That's another one. It just adds up to these kids that are playing all day long. We had about a 20-minute lunch break. And by the time you walk out to the bus to get your sandwich, you walk back in (and play again). It takes a lot of time."

Henk was glad it was over so she could go home and get some sleep. Henk never came out of any of the 13 games she played.

If the Indians stay focused on the task in their playoff match at Campbellsport, they can advance to the second round. Last year Kettle Moraine Lutheran ended their season. "We just have to play positive and be confident in our abilities," Moser said. "When we all play well, we're a very good volleyball team. But we can all play poorly or negatively and let those negative errors get to us, and then we get into a funk that we just can't get out."

The Indians finished their regular season record at 11-25 with a conference mark of 3-11.

Illness takes a toll on girls' team

For the past couple of weeks, the Kewaskum girls' cross-country team hasn't been 100 percent, and still evident last Saturday when the Indians had hoped to sneak into the upper division of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Championships at Fond du Lac County Park near Waupun.

The girls fell a little short of earlier expectations — placing fifth with a score of 152.

At the finish line, Two Rivers left little doubt which team would take home the championship trophy. The Lady Raiders swept the top five places, led by Kristy and Carly Terp, who covered the 4,000 meters in 14 minutes and 46 seconds (14:46) and 15:08, respectively. They had first, second, third, fourth and fifth for a perfect score of 15 points, and in case one of them would have slipped up, their sixth runner finished seventh overall.

Plymouth finished second overall at 49, followed by Kiel, 83 points and Sheboygan Falls, 114.

After the Indians came Waupun, 164; New Holstein, 193; and Campbellsport, 218.

Kewaskum was led by sophomore Emily Krier, who turned in a 17:04, good for 18th and out of the running for a spot on the all-EWC second team by four places.

"Emily was starting to get sick," Backhaus said. "She was pretty unhappy and I told her if she did her best, that's all I could ask."

Caley McClyman had another very solid run, finishing 21st in 17:36. The Plachinski sisters, Amanda and Haley, finished in 34th (18:55) and 38th (19:12) while freshman Sydney Rosenthal took 41st in 20:03.

"Caley ran well," Backhaus said, indicating her time was her best of this year, and, "She's getting where she should be."

Newcomer Ellie Debalek,

who has been slowed by a bad cold, turned in a gutty effort but was far off her regular time. She finished with a 21:48, good for 48th.

"She was so congested, she could hardly breathe," Backhaus said, reporting had he known her cold was that bad, he may have held her out of the competition.

The race for the boys' title was also a runaway with Two Rivers making it a sweep for its program. The Raiders came in with 32, 36 points ahead of Waupun. Campbellsport took third at 72, followed by Kiel, 84; Plymouth, 109; Sheboygan Falls, 165; and Kewaskum, 186. New Holstein did not have enough runners for a full team.

Matt Kuik, a consistent winner for Waupun, all season, was convincing in his effort to win the individual title. Kuik was clocked in 16:50 in the 5,000-meter test, 14 seconds ahead of Nathan Grall of Two Rivers.

Senior Josh Fiebig led the Indian squad, covering the course in 19:04, which placed him 22nd overall. Usually Fiebig and fellow senior Jared Sanborn run very close to each other but in this meet, Fiebig was 16 seconds out front. Sanborn had to settle for 28th.

"He (Fiebig) wasn't happy. He wanted to finish better, but he ran well," Backhaus said. "So did Jared."

Kewaskum's other counters, Zach Heberer, Zach Staehler and Zach Geidel were far back in the pack with respective times of 22:09, 23:06 and 23:15, respectively. Backhaus praised the senior Staehler for his efforts in his first year out for the sport. "He gives it his all," Backhaus said, optimistic the other two will move up considerable next fall.

The Indians will be involved in a Division 2 sectional in Shorewood at Kern Park Friday afternoon. The girls' race is at 4 p.m. and the boys at 4:45.
