County's heroin deaths outnumber traffic deaths this year

Heroin: a big problem in a small community

Even though Kewaskum is a small community, a large threat is fast approaching. In the past five years, heroin has made a strong comeback with the help of prescription drugs in the opiate class such as Oxycontin and has been accounted as the most frequent start of heroin addiction.

Someone starts out with an injury, gets a prescription, gets addicted, can't resolve the pain, and when the prescription runs out, they buy the pills illegally. When the pill habit becomes too expensive to support, then the addict turns to heroin.

Lou Herrmann, family program coordinator for AODA of Washington

County, runs a support group for families with members with drug and alcohol addiction. "I would say 99 percent are in for heroin users," Herrmann states. "I don't see alcohol anymore."

"You build a tolerance to it [heroin] over time and you need more, and you need more, and eventually you shoot up to get a bigger rush and that's when it really gets dangerous." Kewaskum Chief of Police Tom Bishop said, "You're constantly upping your dosage, and you don't know what you're getting from drug dealers."

Addicts crave a higher dose to stop the withdrawal symptoms described as feeling 10 times worse than the worst flu ever experienced.

Mark Sette of the Washington

County Sheriff's Department said, "The drug controls the person, not the other way around which is another significant issue why addiction runs high with this class of drugs. Once a person becomes an addict, their life is about keeping the high going."

But at the going rate of \$1 a milligram, buying pills becomes expensive, so the addict begins using a far

Addicts find clever ways to get more pills. Young adults know to raid family medicine cabinets for left over medication no longer used, and steal property to pay for their habit. Reports of medications being stolen from medicine cabinets during open houses have also been documented.

Think to yourself, how many pain pills do you have left over from an injury? How easy is it for a child or young adult to have access? The problem just isn't the heroin addiction, but also the access to the prescription medication.

"The biggest thing people need to understand is it's still a drug. Some drugs are good. Some have more potential to be bad than others," Mary Simon, executive director for AODA of

Washington County, said.

"As a drug task force, it is hands down the biggest problem we are working to deal with is the opiate problem, largely because those are the drugs that are leading to people actually dying," Sette states.

The CDC and the Wisconsin Division of Public Health completed a study in 2011 that concluded the number one cause of hepatitis C infection was from people sharing needles to inject heroin. Hepatitis C kills approximately 15,000 people each year.

"We have our fair share in Kewaskum," Bishop said and relayed heroin is secondary in prevalence in the village with marijuana as the lead

cheaper opiate drug known as heroin bought in a tin foil packet known as bindle. The powder is snorted or smoked with intravenous as the last method for the quickest high.

In 2013, the number of opiate related deaths in Washington County was 11 with approximately 75 since 2008. In the past, the number of traffic fatalities in young adults outnumbered the opiate related fatalities. The trend has flipped. There have been only six traffic deaths this year.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Justice, since 1995 the number of teens, between the ages of 12-17 who have tried heroin, has seen a 300 percentage increase. The department has begun "The Fly Effect" campaign. For an interactive idea of heroin's addictive nature, please visit

WIAA to vote on new conference plan for EWC

Beginning in the fall of 2015, half of the schools currently in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (EWC), including Kewaskum, could be leaving and replaced by new members. If everything goes according to plan, the WIAA will shuffle the deck and apply the shift on four of the eight schools, moving them from the Green Bay area to another region.

The conference realignment plan will be presented to the WIAA Board of Control in Stevens Point, Dec. 6. The schools that are projected to leave are east of Lake Winnebago.

Three of the schools are located along Highway 57 and one school is northeast of I-43 and 39 miles south of the city of Green Bay. Under the new plan, the four new schools are located along Highway 41 and west of the lake, which cuts down the average travel time for Kewaskum's away contests by five minutes.

The EWC currently consists of Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Plymouth, Waupun, Sheboygan Falls, New Holstein, Kiel and Two Rivers. According to the realignment plan, Kiel, New Holstein, Sheboygan Falls and Two Rivers will be exiting while Kettle Moraine Lutheran, Ripon, Winneconne and Berlin will enter.

At a Kewaskum Board of Education meeting, Oct. 28, Kewaskum Athletic Director Jason Piittmann, presented the plan to board members. He spoke about the WIAA plan in an "apples-to-oranges" way. If the plan is approved, it's unknown whether if the EWC will be given a new name.



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Serwe resigns from Village Board

The Village Board in Kewaskum has one less Trustee after the resignation of one of the board's newest members. The board on Monday voted to accept letters from the public to fill the vacant seat.

Joel Serwe tendered his

resignation Friday and cited family and business responsibilities as his reason for resigning.

"I can no longer commit the time necessary to properly serve the citizens of Kewaskum," Serwe stated in his letter to board members and Administrator Matt Heiser.

Serwe was elected as a write-in candidate this past April.

Local maple leaf spotting is fungal

If you've been finding black spots on your maple leaves, don't panic.

Southeastern Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Forest Health Specialist Mark Guthmiller said a fungus called tar spot is responsible but its effects are mainly cosmetic.

"It's generally not a health issue, but it can cause early browning of leaves," Guthmiller said.

According to information

from the Horticulture division of the University of Wisconsin - Extension, tar spot is a common, fungal leaf spot disease that affects silver, big leaf, mountain, red, Rocky mountain, sugar, and sycamore maples as well as box elder, willow and tulip trees.

The disease starts as yellowish spots and progresses until the infected area becomes raised and turns black. Tim Beyer, DNR forester for Sheboygan County and the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest said over past few months, he's had a

few folks ask about the nickel to quarter-sized black spots.

He said tar spot tend to be found in backyards, not in the Kettle Moraine Forest's natural stands.

Village Building Inspector/Zoning Administrator Chad Cook recommends thoroughly raking and removing all leaves from the area to minimize the likelihood of the tar spots returning next year.

Cook said the Village of Kewaskum DPW will continue curb side leaf collection until the leaves have fallen.

er. "We are a small town, so obviously we don't see as much," but Kewaskum does.

A Kewaskum couple in 2005, Gary and Heather Dam, were arrested for burglary for items they sold in Racine to support a heroin addiction.

Jamie McKeever of Kewaskum, 25, and mother of two died of a heroin overdose in 2009.

In 2011, Stephanie Bailey was a chaperone for Wayne Elementary School when another parent found her passed out on the bathroom floor due to heroin. She had no prior criminal record.

And, two weeks ago, on October 23, Michael Landry and Tiffany Becker were arrested and charged with multiple drug possession charges that include pills and heroin. A two-year-old child was in the home at the time.

Even with media coverage, Sette stated, "It's somewhat concerning the general public has that shocked deer in headlight look about the heroin problem that is going on around them."

"It's an epidemic. It's so out of control. I don't think people know what to do anymore," Herrmann said about heroin addiction. She has seen the trend of most users between the ages of 18-26 with a few in their early thirties.

In addition, Sette adds, "There is also a social stigma. There should be an equal social stigma, between the pills and the heroin." Most people do not equate taking pills not prescribed to them as negatively as using heroin bought off the street, but both are drugs with the same physical effects on people. "That is a mentality shift that we need to change," Sette encouraged.

Warning signs for an opiate addiction includes poor performance, withdrawal, abnormal aggressiveness, lack of hygiene and property loss (addicts will steal from anyone).

"People need to be responsible with them [prescription drugs]," Simon encouraged. The AODA of Washington County has a prescription drug inventory card to keep track of these narcotics. "We want to help individuals realize these are drugs and abused drugs. We need to keep them out of the hands of people that abuse them," Simon added.

AODA of Washington County offers a support group for addict family members every Wednesday from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at their Jackson Office.

Bishop is looking into get-

ting a drug drop box for the police station lobby in 2014 to offer residents a means of disposal of unwanted prescriptions. People can also call pharmacies and hospitals to ask about disposal. Twice a year Washington County offers a drug collection day.

Sette suggests that dissolving the pills in water and dumping on cat litter can keep the pills out of reach of addicts if a person doesn't want to hold on to the pills for any reason. Flushing down the toilet is not recommended due to contamination of water supply.

If you suspect a neighbor is drug trafficking, please call either your local police department, the Washington County Sheriff's Dept and ask for the drug unit or call the tip line.

20th KEYS Run/Walk one of best ever

Jerry Gosa and Jennifer Gerhartz are pleased to report this year's KEYS (Kewaskum Youth Scholarship) Run, held Oct. 13, and was one of the best ever.

"I believe we're over \$22,000 (raised), which makes it the fourth best year in its history ... and it's close to one, two and three," Gerhartz, the chairman of the race for the past three years, said last week.

Gosa, the president of KEYS, also beamed about the success of the run, which helps Kewaskum High School seniors further their educations. In addition to all the runners who contribute entry fees, Gosa noted, "We get a lot of help from (business) sponsorships. We've been fortunate we've kept nearly 100 percent of our sponsors."

This was the 20th year of the KEYS Run, and Madison's Grant Mickesh set a record for the men, covering the 5 kilometers in a time of 16 minutes and 10 seconds (16:10).

Gerhartz, who was at the finish line, said Mickesh was far out front in the race. "No. 2 was at 16:53," she said, referring to Andrew Parcel, who had won the event in 2012. Jesse Boegel of Kewaskum was third with a time of 18:31, followed by Brian Wendelborn of Kewaskum, who had a clocking of 18:59.

The women's champion was Sue Millek (no address available), who posted a time of 18:35, with Katie Wondra of Fond du Lac second in 19:27.

When asked if anyone has participated in all 20 races, Gosa answered affirmatively. "Orion Gonwa."

Gonwa, of Wayne, is the son of Bob and Carol, employees of the school district. Bob, who also has been in all 20 of the runs, works at Kewaskum Middle School, while his wife works in the administrative office.

Gosa went on that Orion Gonwa, who finished ninth (26.29) in the 19-29 age group, has always been there to help when the track teams sell cookies at the high school football games.

There were also some pretty impressive times turned in by up-and-coming athletes.

10-year-old Caleb Grutenhuis, had a clocking of 20.17 for the 5k. "That's cruising," Gosa said.

There were five girls in the 8-year-old division. Tessa Tannies of Campbellsport was the fastest of the group. She finished in 33:34.


Three 70-year+ women entries finished the race, led by Judi Albiero, who was timed in 51:37. Among the elder male runners, Jerome Kubicki of Chicago finished first in 37:52.

The race started and finished at the high school again this year. "It's just a lot better for us," Gerhartz said, indicating the school venue provides a big parking lot and rest rooms. "And it (the run) is associated with the school."

Gosa remembers the first year of the run. He estimated there were 300 participants this year, and participation increased steadily until the recession in 2008. This year's total of 834 runners/walkers shows a reversal of that trend.

"Everyone was thrilled. It was a great day. Everything went smoothly," Gerhartz said.

Next year's event will take place Sunday, Oct. 12, 2014.


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
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Dreher family hosts hunt for terminally ill teens

A Kewaskum family helped make a dream come true for two Mississippi children in mid September.

Randy and Wendi Dreher, their extended family and friends helped Laurin and Christopher Curtis bag two bears in the near the Nicolet National Forest near their Wabeno land on September 14. The pair were part of the Make-A-Wish Foundation.

It started with Crandon Conservation Warden Brad Dahlquist, who has been helping terminally ill children with their "dream bear hunts" for a few years, working through the Wisconsin-based United Special Sportsman Alliance and the state Department of Natural Resources "learn-to-hunt" program.

Laurin, whose illness affected her eyesight, had a device hooked to her scope, but after educating the pair on bear ecology and harvest, the Curtis kids trips to the tree stand came up empty.

That's when Randy and Wendi's son Logan said Dahlquist contacted the family.

"They had to leave by midnight on Saturday," Logan said.

Logan said the kids joined between 25 and 30 members of the Dreher clan and that morning, Laurin's wish came true when she took down a 238-pound black bear.

"She was very happy. She couldn't thank us enough," said Logan, adding that the average size of a Wisconsin black bear is 140 pounds.

Christopher killed a 142-pound bear at the end of the day.


"All heck broke loose when four bears came to the bait and the dogs chased them in different directions," Chuck Dreher said.

After Christopher shot his bear, Dahlquist got the animals registered, dropped off the brother and sister with their father for the return trip to Mississippi and returned to help the Dreher family look for their dogs.

"He's not your typical law enforcement officer," said Chuck Dreher.

By Sunday morning they had rounded up two dogs that spent the night in the woods, Wendi Dreher said.

Megan Dreher summed up the experience, "This was such an awesome experience to be a part of. To be able to watch the enjoyment on these kids faces, and see the joy and emotion on their parents face was totally priceless. Be thankful for the things you do have, the friends and family in your life, and most importantly your health."

Local Veterans share what Veteran's Day means to them

Americans have always fought for their freedom since the time of the Revolutionary War. Veterans fought to protect that freedom while active duty personal carry on the tradition. Kewaskum Middle and Kewaskum High School will be having programs to commemorate the sacrifices they had made for their country.

Veterans Day was originally "Armistice Day" when an armistice or an agreement to stop fighting had been made between the Allied nations and Germany in World War I on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918.

Alvin J. King, after losing his nephew John Cooper in World War II, proposed the idea of renaming the day to "Veterans Day" in 1953 to honor all veterans of all the wars. President Eisenhower had officially changed the name in 1954.

John Berres of Farming enlisted in the army in 1972 during the time of Vietnam. "It really didn't matter where they put me." He was trained as a helicopter mechanic, but was not deployed and continued his military service as a member of the Army National Guard until 1978.

"What Veterans Day means

to me is some people better than me risked everything to allow me to have what I have," Berres said.

Nick Garbisch of West Bend served two tours - one in 2007 in Iraq and in 2009 in "everywhere." He signed his papers to join the Marines before he graduated high school. "I was just doing my part and serving my country," Garbisch said.

Elmer Hallen, a World War II veteran, had been drafted and served as part of the Army Amphibious Tractor Battalion in the Pacific Theater running the Landing Vehicle Tract (LVT) to move soldiers on and off the islands.

"To me, we're honoring all the heroes (what I mean is everyone that I mean is a hero) and we don't ever want to ever forget them," Hallen said. "These guys gave their lives so the kids today can live free, and they gave their lives without any hesitation."

Don Seil of Kewaskum was drafted in 1942 and part of the European Theater in the air force during World War II. "I remember that day when I walked out my front door on Dec. 22, 1942. I never forgot the look on my mother's face," he said.

His job included making sure communication over the Teletype remained operational, first in England and later in France. When asked about his

thoughts on Veterans Day, he replied, "We thought that would be the end of war and right after that Korea and Vietnam came along and now we are at war all the time. There is no end to war anymore. There just isn't any."

"I want people to know how many people are out there who put their lives on the line," Garbisch said. "There are more people out there than you know."

There are approximately 22.2 million soldiers according to the Department of Veteran's Affairs and 1.6 million of them are women. Of those, 3.4 million sustained a service related injury, and 260,000 veterans will be homeless this year.

"The armed forces need people in the kitchen, people that can give supplies, teach the school," Berres said, "And you have people that are willing to dodge bullets."



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
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Freshman volleyball team ends with 7-6 record
