NKMSF unveils new kiosks

DUNDEE- Special video display equipment for the kiosks at the Ice Age Visitor Center in the Northern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest was unveiled during an event at the center Friday, thanks to a \$2,600 donation from the AT&T Wisconsin Pioneers.

The Ice Age Visitor Center has been greeting 25,000-35,000 visitors annually since 1981. The AT&T Pioneers recently completed the project that replaced old kiosks that had been out of order for several years.

AT&T Pioneers are current and retired employees of AT&T who volunteer their time for community causes. The state of Wisconsin has five chapters broken up into smaller clubs. The Dairyland Life Member Club area covers Fond du Lac, Sheboygan, West Bend, Berlin, Beaver Dam, Oshkosh and Stevens Point.

The project started when a neighbor of a Dairyland club member, Bev Kellin, suggested that the club could fix the broken kiosks at the Ice Age Visitor Center.

Previously, the club completed

such service projects as trail cleanups and installation of eco-boxes at the Pike Lake and Kohler Andrae State Parks, and building handicap cabins at other state parks.

Jackie Scharfenberg, who has been with the visitor center for 16 years, said when demonstrating, the kiosks are valuable to the numerous school groups the center hosts each year, "Glacier forms are subtle on the landscape and needs interpretation to teach people."

The new kiosks are now equipped with new monitors and digital players. Each kiosk plays three segments about glacier landform formations, such as how eskers were made with a visual representation.

"It was amazing how long it took, but we were finally able to get it done" said Cory Parollina, a member who coordinated the project. "It took \$2,600 to get equipment to work and fit and to do what they needed to do."

Funds to complete the project came from the Weaver Fund of the local chapter of the AT&T Pioneers with a total grant of \$2,100, the club added the remaining funds for the renovation.

Originally the kiosks were full

size televisions with three quarter inch wide tape. Not only was the tape smaller than VHS, but it had to be transferred to digital format (DVD). In addition, new monitors needed to be purchased and installed with panel modification.

The National Park Service and the state did not have funding. Due to the efforts of the AT&T Pioneers, the project was done at no cost to taxpayers. "We appreciate you for taking on a project like this," State representative Daniel LeMahieu said during the unveiling.

"Pioneers were happy to bring them back to life," Parollina said about the kiosk renovation. The project took over a year to complete. Commemorative plaques were installed at the kiosks.

The Ice Age Visitor Center is located in the Kettle Moraine Forest Northern Unit and has between 800,000 and one million annual visitors, according to Jason Quast, Assistant Forest Superintendent.

District next visioning workshop

Kewaskum's Superintendent of Schools Jim Smasal said, "Every day is an opportunity to make a difference." Even with snow coming down with the temperature, school board members, administrators, and community members came together for the second Visionary Committee on held Monday, Dec. 16 at Kewaskum High School.

Margaret Leibfried, educational consultant from MindsOn M&S Associates, LLC and former KMS interim principal, again facilitated the session. "One of the goals for this committee is to be very transparent, to give you whatever it is you need, to better understand what the concerns and issues are, or just to clarify things," she said.

At the previous meeting held on Sept. 16, participants were asked to discuss four main questions about values for the school, school appearance, future expectations and potential obstacles in attempts to generate questions. The responses to those questions were answered by the board of education and administration and compiled into a 63-page packet.

This session's agenda focused on three ideas, to which many questions from the previous meeting fell under. They were discussed as part of the interactive activities planned for the meeting. They included school facilities (policies for use), what does college and career ready mean and to

Youths charged after Engelhardt burglary

A group of 15-year-old youths from the Kewaskum area have been charged with burglary after an incident at Engelhardt Dairy in Kewaskum.

According to an incident report from police, at approximately 10:01 p.m. on Nov. 30, Kewaskum police officers and Washington County Sheriff's deputies responded to a possible burglary at Engelhardt Dairy, after a rooftop alarm had been activated. The business is located in the 100 block of First St. and fronts Fond du Lac Ave.

Officer Chris Janich apprehended two male juveniles exiting the building as backup arrived. Backpacks full of various items were removed from the suspects as they were apprehended.

Upon questioning the two

juveniles, officers discovered the subjects had been responsible for two previous burglaries at the business, and had unlawfully gone onto the premise two times prior. The second burglary included spray-painted graffiti with the words "I hate my job" as an attempt to deflect blame from them. Officers also discovered two other male juveniles had been involved previously.

Officer Janich spoke with the other male juveniles who were identified. Both confirmed previous burglaries, but failed to tell police. Both were released to their parents with charges being referred to juvenile authorities for burglary.

The juveniles apprehended at Engelhardt Dairy are being charged with three counts of burglary for each building entry and one count of criminal damage to the property.

define "the Kewaskum difference."

Administration put the data together with the intent, according to Smasal, "to help the Board link with its public to come up with better solutions, more buy-in, so they feel like they not only have more opportunity to be listened to, but a chance to see if they can give better ideas. The more ideas we have, the more likely we are to have better solutions."

During each discussion, participants were asked to move to a different table to work with new people. An administrator at each table took notes, and the answers were reviewed in a large group discussion.

Members of the school board sat together, answered the same questions and compared their answers with what other groups brainstormed.

"This is part of the byproduct of pulling away from the standard process we had in place before," Board President Tim Ramthun said about the committee.

The majority of the groups came up with similar bullet points such as "the Kewaskum difference" meant all students would be challenged and has a vision of a more rigorous curriculum. College/career readiness meant encouraging academic risk and having a strong guidance office.

Prior to the discussion, however, the visionary committee did not expect the packet provided to participants would open a lengthy discussion about the information that apparently required more discussion.

Neal Ware asked "Is it cast in stone these are the ultimate

answers or are these going to be fine tuned by the board, by the administration, by this committee."

Smasal replied, "Questions were asked to the community members. If a question was asked, it was tried to be answered. Whether you agree with the answer or whether you disagree with the answer, it was answered. That doesn't mean that is the way it is. Now where you go with that answer is up to the community, up to the board, up to the administration, and up to try to look forward."

After more lengthy discussion about other items such as ACT scores, accountability, and Build Your Own Curriculum (BYOC), Smasal proposed for anyone with questions to write them down with a promise to make them a priority at the next meeting.

Debbie Mielkie, a parent, has always been a part of her children's education. "There is a lot of opportunity for improvement and growth, and I think as a whole it would be great to come together so we are all on the same page," she said. "This is our vision. I want to make sure it's not pushed aside."

As the visionary session concluded, Smasal said, "I thank you and I hope you realize the board was here listening intently, looking for your ideas and also trying to solve and talk about these things together."


He also acknowledged Mielkie's comments and encouraged participants to ask questions and voice concerns to answer either at the next meeting, but preferably prior so the information can be included in the next packet.


Ramthun added, "I think it is very important that we as a leadership team not only make sure to give the opportunity to the community, but that we respond in a way that satisfies them."

Don't let your tree burn your home down

The Campbellsport Fire Department (CFD) would like to wish you and your family Happy Holidays. We have some safety tips to keep you safe this holiday season. Statistics show the holiday season poses the highest chance for structure fires and the CFD wants to ensure you do not become part of that statistic. Follow these safety tips to keep your family safe during this holiday season.

- When choosing a real tree select one that is fresh with green needles.
- Cut 1-2" from the stump before you put it in the stand so it absorbs water.
- Keep the real tree 3 ft away from heating sources and open flames.
- Add water to the tree stand daily.
- Inspect electrical wiring for damage before decorating.
- Follow manufacturer instructions when decorating.
- Use UL approved electrical

equipment when decorating for Christmas.

- Turn off Christmas lights when leaving or going to bed.
- Get rid of the tree right after Christmas or as soon as it starts to dry out.
- Keep decorations clear from exits and exit pathways.
- LED lights use much less energy and are much cooler, keeping you safe.

One of every three Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems. Christmas tree fires have a high chance to be deadly. A heat source too close to a tree causes 1 in 5 fires.

Francis family begins international adoption process

Everyone has a wish list for Christmas, but for one couple with Kewaskum roots, their list includes having a child. Amanda and Wally Francis III have been in the process of

adopting a child from Poland and found a creative way to help with the costs.

The process started over a year ago. Amanda Francis spent many months researching adoption agencies. In May, the couple sent in their

application to St. Mary's International Adoption, based out of North Carolina.

"The Polish program is small," Wally Francis said. "There are more orphan children in Poland than other countries."

The process to adopt a Polish child has been not only time consuming, but expensive, with the total cost from start to finish expected to be between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

"There was a lot of discussion and a lot of prayers," Wally Francis stated. "It's a tough decision to make."

To help raise the funds, the couple had two bowling fundraisers in October that had 50/50 raffles and a silent auction. In addition they had a puzzle piece fundraiser where people can buy a blank piece of a 288-piece puzzle to decorate.

Wally Francis said the 3ft by 5 ft puzzle would be put together and hung in the child's room to let the child know these are all the people that helped bring you here. Puzzle pieces are still available.

After the adoption is complete, the couple has decided to continue the annual bowling fundraiser for a small non-profit organization they plan to start to help raise money for another couple interested in adopting internationally.

From Nov. 27 until Dec. 6 the couple had an online auction with items donated from local companies, friends and families. Any item that did not sell will be rolled over to an eBay auction that Wally Francis manages.

On their BlogSpot, www.

expectingfrompoland.blogspot.com, their adoption journey thus far had been documented.

A PayPal link is also available on the BlogSpot for direct donations, and the couple teamed up with Amazon as an associate program that allows the couple to receive a partial percentage of any purchase made off a keyword search started by a widget.

The couple is waiting on the last United States document, called the I-797, for clearance to bring a child into the country. Then their paperwork is sent to Poland to be reviewed. Afterward a child is picked and the referral with the child's information is sent to the couple for acceptance.

Then the couple will need to schedule two trips to Poland to bring home the child. The first visit will last about a week to meet with the child and the second, for four to seven weeks, to finalize the child's immigration with two to six months in between visits.

In the meantime, Wally Francis said, "We've been trying to learn some Polish. We want to keep the Polish heritage in front."

Wally Francis is of Polish heritage, and in August, the couple traveled to Pulaski to attend a Polish workshop to start.



25 Years Ago

September 9, 1988

Tuesday night's meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board was more than just a meeting, it was a very special event. For Donald Hlavaty it meant the end of a 27 year career in law enforcement, 21 of which were as an officer and chief of the Kewaskum Police Department. For Richard Knoebel it marked the start of a new chapter in his law enforcement career as he was sworn in as the new Chief of Police, succeeding Hlavaty who retired last week.

The Chevrolet-Pontiac-Canada Group of General Motors has announced that Robert R. Kern has been assigned as Chief Body Engineer for current and future intermediate model vehicles. Kern will be responsible for managing the design and development of the vehicle structure, interior, exterior, air conditioning, engine cooling, safety restraint, and door systems. His responsibility will include design of the current 1989 models as well as advanced developments of future models extending through 1993. Prior to this assignment, he has been involved with managing interior system designs on the Caprice, Firebird, Camaro, Fiero and Corvette models, as well as directing advanced developments for interiors on all CPC models. Kern graduated from Kewaskum High School in 1964 and is a 1969 alumnus of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Mechanical Engineering. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Kern of Kewaskum and currently lives with his wife and four children in Clarkston, Michigan.

After a public informational hearing held during a special meeting last Wednesday night, the seven members of the Kewaskum Village Board unanimously voted to scrap plans for an industrial park in the northwest portion of the village and instead put the land up for sale as a prime site for private residential housing. The decision came after Village Administrator Dan Schmidt presented the board with a report on problems and options for the 23-1/2 acre

parcel of land which had been purchased two years ago with the idea of creating an industrial park to attract new businesses and jobs to the village. The discussion was a result of the fact that the village has not been able to resolve some problems with the Town of Kewaskum regarding traffic useage on Old Fond du Lac Road. Since several hundred feet of the road are within the township's jurisdiction, there was reluctance by town officials to permit heavy trucks to travel on their portion of the roadway. That resulted in the placing of load limit restrictions on the Town's section of road. The Township requested an environmental impact study of the road at a cost of \$16,000 to the park's developmental costs. By the time the report was received, one potential tenant had withdrawn their offer to purchase a large parcel of land in the industrial park and went elsewhere, and the second prospect placed their plans on hold. Administrator Schmidt explained the three options open to the village were to continue to try meeting with the township in the hope of resolving the road problem, complete extension of the industrial park road and drop development plans for the time being or look toward residential development of the land. The board opted unanimously for the third option.

The Kewaskum Historical Society held their 14th Annual Early Farm Days celebration on September 11 on the west side of River Hill Park. There will be food, refreshments, entertainment and visitors will be able to view gas and steam engines, miniature engines, old farm equipment and antiques. The award-winning museum and reconstructed 1847 log cabin will be open for viewing.

St. Matthias Mission Church in the Town of Auburn, Fond du Lac County, has been approved by the State Historical Society as an Historic Site. The extensive research and final nomination was presented by

Shirley McArthur of the North Point Historical Society. This rural Catholic Church in the heart of the Kettle Moraine, is celebrating its 125th Anniversary this year with a special Mass on September 11.

Kewaskum's new A.F.S. student for the 1988-89 school year is Ra'ad Hijazi from Irbid, Jordan. Ra'ad is now at home in Kewaskum with his host parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Domasky where he is teaching them the Arabic language and how to make a few Jordanian foods.

The Memories column this week showed the 1935 Badger State League Baseball team and a panoramic view of the baseball field (now the site of the Kewaskum Elementary School) with large crowds filling the grandstand and bleachers. 





Not the best week on the court for Indians

Last week the Kewaskum boys basketball team was thrown off guard, not once, but twice.

First they found themselves on the short end of the stick with the Warriors in Ozaukee that ended 54-53. When the Panthers came, the Indians found themselves in a 70-28 blowout.

What was supposed to be a 7:30 p.m. game at Ozaukee, Dec. 10, didn't happen. According to Kewaskum coach Keith Traska, the Indians' game against the Warriors took place earlier and the Ozaukee girls team took that time slot to play against visiting Oostburg.

Kewaskum entered last week with a 3-1 overall record and a 1-1 mark in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. The best-case scenario had them winning at least one of two games last week. To find out what went wrong, you have to start with the nonconference game against the Warriors.

Without the Indians being at full strength they couldn't operate in the way that they wanted. Three starters were unavailable at the Ozaukee game, and it showed. The eight

available players, according to Traska, played their hearts out and worked a little overtime. They all but had the game won, that was, until Ozaukee senior Andy Richter made a fade-away three-point basket with time running out in overtime.

"Those eight guys put up a heck of a fight," Traska said of his players. "The entire game was back and forth."

Kewaskum led 15-8 in the first quarter and held a slim 25-23 advantage at halftime. They had a 10-point lead in the second quarter but trailed Ozaukee 34-32 at the end of the third quarter. Ozaukee's biggest lead in the game was four points. The Indians scored 10 points in the final period of regulation and the Warriors scored eight to force the game into overtime.

With 10 seconds remaining in overtime, the Indians led by five points at 53-48. The Warriors made their first three of the game to cut the Kewaskum lead to 53-51. After the Indians turned the ball over with 3.7 seconds left, Ozaukee got it back and set up a play for Richter. He made the desperation three from the corner for the game winner.

Greg Rate scored a game-high 19 points for Kewaskum and grabbed 13 rebounds.

Karter Guth added 13 points and 12 rebounds and Michael Prochnow chipped in with 11 points. He was 5-for-6 from the free-throw line in the fourth quarter and in overtime.

It wasn't pretty at the KHS Fieldhouse Dec. 12. Visiting Plymouth did what they wanted to do on the court all night, and it was as if Kewaskum never showed up to play. The night ended with a 70-28 blowout win by the Panthers.

Plymouth's Kolin Neils erupted for 23 points. Derek Schulz and Rate each had six points for the Indians. No Kewaskum player scored in double figures. They scored only three points in the first quarter and five in the fourth. In the second and third quarters, the Indians scored 10 points in each quarter.

Through six games, Rate leads the team in scoring with 11.3 points per game and his 9.7 rebounding average leads the EWC. Jason Hanson is second on the team in scoring with an average of 8 ppg and Charlie Witek's 6.8 ppg is third on the team.

Kewaskum sits in the middle of the pack with their 1-2 conference record and 3-3 overall.

Lemke ends football career on high note

It was a storybook ending to his collegiate football career. Lakeland College senior Cody Lemke, a 2010 graduate of Kewaskum High School, went out as a winner on a big stage.

Lemke's North team beat the South 10-7 in the NCAA D-3 Senior Classic all-star game held in Salem, Virginia on Dec. 14.

At 5-foot 9 and 180 pounds Lemke isn't the biggest kid, and he didn't win any honors while playing at Kewaskum High School, but what he did have was a lot of heart and a great love for the game.

"Losing our last game in high school kept me motivated to keep playing," Lemke said Saturday evening after returning by plane from Virginia.

Lemke saw some action as a freshman at Lakeland, which is located near Howards Grove. He moved into the starting lineup in the defensive backfield as a sophomore, earning honorable mention in the Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference (NACC) that year.

During his junior season Lemke improved to a point where he garnered second-team all-NACC honors, but the Muskies didn't fare well, finishing below the .500 mark.

And this season? That's when it started to look like the fairy godmother was waving her golden wand over Lemke and his Musky teammates. It was actually hard work that helped

the Muskies to a successful season. The regular season went well, very well in fact, and then came the invitation for Lemke to play in the all-star game.

And was Lemke surprised? "I was shocked actually," he said, but proud to accept after the work he put in to help Lakeland make a huge turnaround. "We went from 2-8 last year to 7-3," he said.

Lemke said he and his brother flew to Salem early Wednesday morning. The whirlwind trip included practice time, a banquet and the game.

"We flew back this morning at 6 (a.m.)" and were waiting for their parents to get back home after a 15-hour car trip. "They're almost home," he said.

Concerning the game, Lemke said, "I didn't start," but it was no big deal because, "We switched off, so everyone got equal playing time."

Lemke got in some good hits, too. "I don't know what the official stats say, but I was in on three or four tackles," and he was on the winning side.

Lemke said the North scored the lone TD of the game in the second quarter on a long pass play and the field goal came sometime in the third quarter.

"It was a good game," he said, especially considering his North defense posted a shut-out.

Lemke and his brother also enjoyed their time at the banquet, which was held in the

Salem Civic Center Thursday night.

"They cooked southern style food for us," and each player was presented with his game jersey, Lemke said.

Lemke played an integral role in Lakeland College's best season since 2005 and recently he was named to the all-NA-CC defensive team. Lemke was cited as a first-team defensive back.

Lemke and teammate Trevor Tanck, a junior from Bailey's Harbor, combined for 109 tackles this season and 5.5 sacks. Lemke was credited with 70 tackles, including 44 solos, 26 assists and 7.5 tackles for losses. He also broke up seven passes.

When asked which was his best game of the season, Lemke said, "Pretty early in the season ... I think it was the third game (versus Alma College). We won by one point, 21-20, and I had 17 tackles and one forced fumble. It was fun!"


He completed his career with 184 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. Lemke also broke up 17 passes in his career, intercepted two passes and forced three fumbles.

Lemke is an accounting major at Lakeland. He is convinced he made the right choice in going there.

"The people are very friendly, and you get to know your professors," he said, indicating he will graduate next December from the school.

Even though his Kewaskum High School wrestling team fell behind Campbellsport 36-12 after eight matches, coach Scott Rhoads was optimistic the Indians would win and they did, 40-36, in an Eastern Wisconsin Conference match held Dec. 10 in Kewaskum.

"I was pretty confident. I knew what I had coming up," Rhoads said after the Indians evened their EWC record at 1-1.

First came 138-pound senior Andy Pryor, who piled up 15 points to win a convincing 15-3 major decision over Levi

Feucht. That started a KHS run of five straight wins, including pins by Joey Seitz and Max Maertz at 145 and 170, and an injury default victory by Eric Wade, who was seeing his first action at 160.

Seitz ran his season record to 6-1 with a quickie pin over freshman Chad Wolf-Flasch, while Maertz, 5-2, made quick work of Zach Zills, who CHS coach Mark Peterson moved up a weight to keep from having another forfeit. Maertz needed just 1:34 to pin his opponent.

Wade tied up early with A.J. Morris and used a throw to put his Cougar foe on his back. When the two came down, however, Morris' left arm was in

a bad position, and hit the mat hard. It was evident right away he had sustained a serious injury.

Rhoads said it appeared the arm was broken right above the elbow. After being attended to by the KHS trainer, Morris left to seek medical treatment.

The 22 points earned by Pryor, Seitz, Wade and Maertz, along with a 9-5 win by Andy Buelow at 152, gave the Indians a 1-point lead with one match remaining between the Indians' Cody Muckerheide and Cody Kollmansberger, a senior-sophomore matchup.

The sophomore Kollmansberger scored first on a take-

down midway in the first period. Twice Muckerheide was able to stand on his opponent but failed to score either time, so the match moved to the second period at 0-2.

Kollmansberger took the bottom position, and Muckerheide controlled his head and far elbow and turned the move into a near fall and a 3-2 advantage.

Kollmansberger battled off his back and countered a couple other offensive moves by Muckerheide until the buzzer sounded.

The excitement was building in this winner-take-all match and Muckerheide secured the 6-2 win with a takedown with :14 left after Kollmansberger had intentionally let him go.

Rhoads figured his man would come through, saying, "Cody's good at that. He's a wrestler who needs to be pumped up. When he gets 'em going, he does just fine."

Muckerheide admitted he had a few butterflies.

"Yeah, I was nervous," he said.

About the final takedown, Muckerheide said, "I just hooked my hand around his leg and pulled him down."

Campbellsport has no seniors this year, so Rhoads tipped his hat to its wrestlers.

"They were mentally prepared," he said, indicating his Indians may have been a little overconfident after their efforts at Slinger last Saturday. "We came out a little soft," he said.

The Indians were also missing Garrett Buth, who had some wisdom teeth pulled Wednesday and Zach Heberer, who has a

muscle pull in his back.

On Thursday, the Indians posted six pins but gave up eight in a 48-36 nonconference loss to host Oostburg.

Seniors Andy Pryor, Joey Seitz, Eric Wade, Max Maertz and Cody Muckerheide all earned six points for their team via pin. Seitz had the fastest, putting away Connor Gasbarro in a brief 42 seconds to improve to 7-1 on the year.

Freshman Jacob Heberer had the other pin at 106.

Muckerheide and Wade are unbeaten with respective marks of 3-0 and 2-0.

Several Indians team members receive EWC accolades

Seven athletes from the Kewaskum High School football team highlighted the fall sports season. They earned first, second or honorable mention postseason honors from the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

Their individual recognitions were great, but it didn't make up for a disappointing end of their 2013 season. The team that's coached by Jason Piittmann had a winning record in conference and made the playoffs for the ninth straight year.

Sophomore running back Brandon Thull and senior defensive back Matthew Ringwell were first-team All-EWC. Senior defensive end Greg Rate, senior Joey Seitz and sophomore offensive tackle Sam Fechter were on the second team. Seniors Eric Limberg and Brett Boegel made the honorable mention team. Ringwell was also named to the Wisconsin Football Coaches Association All-Region teams.

The varsity team, with only 10 seniors on the 50-man roster should be better next year because the 17 juniors on this year's squad will be seniors and

the 22 sophomores will be juniors. There was only one freshman on varsity.

With the help of those 10 seniors, the Indians won four of their first five regular season games, but they went downhill in the second half of the season by winning only one of their last five, including a 35-0 shut-out loss in the first round of the playoffs to Wisconsin Lutheran.

Kewaskum's record on their home field was 2-3. The Indians lost a non-conference game to Port Washington and conference games to Campbellsport and Plymouth. They beat conference foes New Holstein and Waupun. The Indians were better on the road with a 3-2 mark with conference wins at Sheboygan Falls and Kiel and a non-conference win at West Bend East. They lost at Two Rivers and at Wisconsin Lutheran. Kewaskum finished tied for third in the conference with Campbellsport with a 4-3 record.

The leading varsity rusher for the Indians was Thull with 927 yards in the regular season, with 710 of those yards coming in the conference and 42 yards in the playoff game with six touchdowns overall. Seitz

was second on the team with 523 yards overall and 305 in the conference with five TDs.

Boegel gained 421 yards on the ground with 388 of them in conference play and crossed the end zone four times. Boegel passed for 742 yards in all games and 597 in the EWC. He was not cleared to play in the playoff game because of concussion-like symptoms suffered in the last regular season game against Plymouth.

Seitz was the leading receiver on the team with 248 yards on 17 receptions and a touchdown. Ringwell caught 19 passes for 205 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore Charlie Witek had 13 receptions for 180 yards and four touchdowns.

As a team, Kewaskum rushed for 1,887 yards and passed for 779 yards. Thull was second in the EWC for rushing yards and Boegel was fifth in passing.

Seitz led the defense with 89 total tackles. Sophomore Benjamin Watzig had 56 tackles, good for second, and Ringwell was third with 57. The Indians' defense allowed 118 points in conference, which was second to Plymouth. They also finished second in total yards

Pantry customers thankful for service

Once in the Village of Kewaskum, there was a single mother of three young children who lived at the motel, visited the Kewaskum Food Pantry and requested only pop top canned goods since she only had

information and names are kept anonymous, volunteers get to know the families.

"We used the food pantry two years ago and did get back on our feet for a while. Now with a job loss and mounting medical bills, we are back at the pantry. They remember us and treat us like old friends. We couldn't survive without the pantry," said a community member who uses the pantry.

Shelves are stocked from collections of food from various locations in the area such as Holy Trinity/St. Michael Parish, Piggly Wiggly and Peace United Church of Christ. Throughout the year, various organizations, such as the Boy Scouts, have a major collection drive for both monetary and food donations.

A poster board on a back wall has sticky notes as a reminder of all the major food drives in the community for the year. The months of January, February and July have none. The food pantry is in need of food and donations throughout the year, particularly during the summer months, when children don't have school for a source of meals.

"The hardships we are going thru without having work make it necessary for us to use the pantry. Some weeks we don't even have enough money to buy milk and bread. Try telling that to your kids. The pantry is a 'godsend,' another family said about the pantry.

Recently at a Halloween Dance, Kewaskum Middle School students collected 240 items and a parent donated 85 cases of canned vegetables.

Fourth graders, under the guidance of art teacher Peggy Henke at Kewaskum Elementary School, made pins and magnets to sell and raised \$3,000 two years ago, \$6,000 last year, and hope to increase this year. Those funds were used this year to give needy families a Thanksgiving dinner of turkey, stuffing, potatoes, vegetables, pie, rolls and gravy.

The Knorrs keep an eye on sales and stock up on food using the funds raised. "Every week I shop at Piggly Wiggly. They give us deals and bargains," Tom Knorr said. "We try to be frugal with the money people give us."

Foods in high demand are cream soups, chunky soups, cereal, spaghetti/pasta sauce, and canned fruit.

The pantry has anonymous donors, like one individual who brings in a car load every week. Some people just drop off a bag of items each week. Every Tuesday, a volunteer brings in bakery items from Sendiks and Pick and Save for families.

The Kewaskum Food Pantry is open every Tuesday and Thursday (except if falls on a major holiday or severe weather) from 4:15 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Families are allowed to come once a week. An individual writes down his/her name and how many members in the family. A volunteer calls the name and goes around with him/her with a cart and helps pack the items while the

person shops.

Families are encouraged to "take enough for what you need for a week," though volunteers have seen individuals offer not to take something in order to leave it for someone they felt could use it more.

"I don't need to visit the pantry every week as I sometimes pick up an odd job here and there, but when there is no work, we couldn't survive without the pantry. That's where we get 80 percent of our food," another pantry user commented.

Kewaskum Food Pantry has been seeing new families come through the doors. "Any community should have a food pantry. There is a need for it," Tom Knorr said. The pantry serves those in the Kewaskum School District and any member of a church that supports the Pantry.

Non-perishable and perishable items are accepted, but perishables, such as dairy and meats, go quickly. All items that

"It's not about shopping, not about gifts; it's about Christ's birth," said Moser.





are donated are inspected and expired foods are removed for safety precautions.

"Most people don't know once a food is expired, it has already been on a shelf for three years," Barb Knorr said.

About one-third of the food received is expired and cannot be used. "Just because they have financial problems, they shouldn't be treated like second class citizens," Tom Knorr said.

More than food is available for families. One year the Kewaskum Police Department donated small stuffed animals just in time for St. Nicholas's feast day. Toys are donated, so for some families, the children still have a Christmas.

Peace United Church of Christ knits hats and mittens for

families to take if needed. "There's always something different coming in," Barb Knorr said.

"At the end of a two hour shift of giving out food, some of our volunteers are tired and many of them have been doing work for three, four or more hours to get things ready to giving out the food," Tom Knorr stated. "But when we turn out the lights, until the next time, we all have that good feeling inside that today we made a difference in a family's life. We made it possible for them to have one less thing to worry about, 'what can I set out for meals tomorrow'."


