Main Street utility project already over budget

Work hasn't even begun and already the village's utility project on Main Street is over budget. A week after receiving some good financial news from the DOT, the village received some terrible news that will see them paying over \$300,000 more for their portion of the project.

According to village administrator Matt Heiser, the village was to reap \$50,000 for paying WE Energies upfront and directly for lighting costs associated with the project. Heiser said the latest estimates from WE Energies for lighting was roughly \$210,000. The DOT says they will credit the village \$260,000 against work they perform on the village's behalf during the project.

The village is coordinating their own project with the DOT while the

state carries out the road reconstruction. That project of installing new water and sewer lines will be paid for upfront by the DOT and the village will pay for that project once all work has been completed.

Because the village is installing utilities under a state highway, they must follow state guidelines just as WE Energies has done in their ongoing project of installing new gas lines.

On Monday, Dec. 15, a special meeting of the village board was called because bids for the project came in over 10 percent of what was anticipated. The special meeting was called quickly, to give the DOT direction on how to proceed without causing delays to the project. Trustees had two options, accept the bids or force the DOT to rebid the entire project.

The increased expense for the village because of a DOT policy dictates

the village use a slurry backfill (a self-compacted, water, sand and gravel mix) for backfilling during their utility replacement project. This is a regulation only used in the southern region of the state. Kewaskum is the farthest north in the region, Campbellsport to the north would not be required and could use a less expensive granular backfill (sand mixed with gravel).

McMahon Group, of Neenah, who is engineering the project for the village, estimated costs for the material but their estimate was not accurate. Mick Magalski, the project engineer, explained this happened because his company had never bid a project with slurry material and the firms they consulted with had little knowledge of how to estimate such a project.

A lengthy discussion ensued on

Seibel to play in All-American Bowl Saturday

He knew the scouting report as well as any of his teammates on the Kewaskum football team. Opponents couldn't stop a determined guy with a head full of steam that ran them over on offense or shredded blockers to make the play on defense. Either way, Cody Seibel made teams pay with his bruising style on both sides of the ball.

Seibel was a combination of Aaron Rodgers with his knowledge of the game, Eddie Lacy with his north-south running style and a ball hawk like Clay Matthews wrapped up in one. And he was a highly decorated high school and college athlete that comes along once in a decade.

"He did a great job of knowing the scouting report and game plan, and then reading his keys, taking on blocks and going to find the ball and making the play," said Seibel's high school coach, Jason Piittmann.

When Seibel ran through traffic on offense and defense, he took the punishment and dished it out. Would any team be foolish to stop a charging bull? It was wise to get out of the way.

"As a running back, he was going to run people over rather than run around them," Piittmann said. "He was a punishing runner." The Kewaskum head coach wasn't the only one who marveled at the play of Seibel throughout his high school career.

"We knew about Cody his sophomore year at Kewaskum," UW-Stevens Point football Coach Tom



Suspects found after W.B. robbery attempt

Two women and one man were arrested for attempted strong-armed robbery after an incident involving a 56-year-old woman in West Bend.

According to a press release from the West Bend Police Department, at approximately 8:10 p.m. on Dec. 13, a male suspect had approached the woman and attempted to take her purse away while exiting Pick and Save on S. Main Street in West Bend.

The suspect fled after the purse strap broke, and the woman maintained possession of her purse. She was not injured.

Upon further investigation, the woman told police she no-

ticed the male standing in the entry earlier using a cellphone and followed by a female suspect who followed her in the store using a cellphone as well. It was believed a third suspect operated the getaway vehicle.

From witness statements and surveillance video, leads were developed to begin the search for the suspects.

On Dec. 17, a patrol officer spotted a vehicle matching the description, and all three subjects were identified, taken into custody without incident, and questioned by the police.

All three suspects confessed. They are in custody at the Washington County Jail with charges being reviewed by the Washington County District Attorney's office.

different options that could be taken, Village Zoning Administrator Chad Cook said he could not understand why the village was given different standards from what the DOT would be using when they replace the storm sewer lines. He explained while the village is required to use slurry backfill for the water and sanitary sewer lines, the DOT can use granular backfill for the storm water lines.

DOT representatives stated they do not deviate from their policies and deferred to a project in Big Bend where the community was required to use slurry. A representative stated he would take the village's request under advisement but it would require higher authority to authorize such a deviation in policy.

The DOT is concerned that the use of granular backfill would not have the compaction required for a solid roadbed base.

The DOT is scheduled to start mid-March of 2014. Most of the work in the village is set to be completed by July 3 with the exception of the bridge, which is scheduled to be completed by August 29.

While they would be required to rebid the project if the village voted in favor of that, they warned the trustees the whole project could come back higher than what has been received so far.

Trustees ultimately voted to accept the bid with a unanimous vote after two other motions died for lack of support.

Payment for the project will come from a variety of sources

according to Heiser. The village's water utility will pay for their portion of the project with cash on hand. The sewer utility will be required to borrow for their portion of the project. The portion of pavement the village is required to pay for has been budgeted. The village will have 2-3 years to re-pay the DOT for the project once it is finished. At that time, the village will do the necessary borrowing.

Increases in water and sewer rates are likely, but not until 2015. Heiser presented a number of scenarios of how increases could play out. Water rates may climb as much as three to six percent while sewer rates could creep as much as seven to 10 percent. Trustees were not happy with the projected increases and urged village staff to find another way to cover the cost of the project and not leave it to the utilities.

Not having the utilities fund the project was discussed and just placing the entire project on the tax rolls was discussed but it would still result in an increase for taxpayers.

The increase is just another hit for the Village of Kewaskum who can't seem to get their sewer rates to keep up with increased costs of operations. The Ozaukee Press reported earlier this month the Village of Belgium is having the same problems, residents there will see a 19 percent increase in their sewer rates in 2014 to pay for upgrades to their wastewater treatment plant. They expect rates to level out in 2015 but will authorize annual increases.

Charlie and Lisa Delvaux usually go on vacation to Mexico or another sunny location about this time of year, but this year is different. The couple

opened Chuckwagon's Saloon and Grill (formally known as the Bar-N-Ranch Hat Bar) on Oct. 17.

Bartending has been in Charlie Delvaux's blood with his grandparents, aunts and uncles having bars. Even his

daughter and son-in-law manage a bar. Lisa Delvaux said, "He's wanted to do it since we got married already."

But the idea didn't root for Charlie until helping his daughter and son-in-law get their bar started. "I found out how much I enjoyed it," he said.

The grand opening was held on Nov. 16 with about 200 attendees. Adam Fettig played for the event and will be returning for New Year's Eve. Also on the schedule is Margaritaville on Feb. 8, 2014 with drink specials all day.

"Everyone seems to be happy the bar is open again," Charlie Delvaux said. The building needed quite an extensive overhaul with a new roof, new windows, and a new front of the building, but the couple didn't lose the atmosphere of the place. "We tried to keep as Aggie had it," Lisa Delvaux said.

The most frequent question from visitors is what happened to the hats that the former owner had tacked on the ceiling and walls. Some were 50 years old or better dating back to WWI and WWII.

"We really did raise the roof," Lisa Delvaux joked about how bigger the bar looked with the hats removed.

A costume shop in Sheboygan acquired ownership of the more than 1,500 hats that had been removed prior to the purchase. Charlie and Lisa have begun their own collection of advertising tins.

Although the kitchen is

done, the grill will not be opening until mid-January, awaiting state inspection. On the menu are such foods as one-third pound prime burgers, sandwiches (steak, pork chop and chicken), appetizers, and a traditional fish fry on Fridays.

In the future, the couple has plans to serve breakfast Saturdays and Sundays, offer 24 campsites and add an outside bar. Meanwhile, the bar has a

pool table with pool and dart teams.

The bar and grill is open seven days a week, opening at 2 p.m. on Mon, Tues-Fri at 11 a.m. and Sat.-Sun at 10 a.m. Double Bubble is Monday through Friday from 3-6 p.m.

Mascot bill approved by Governor

MADISON—Governor Scott Walker, on Thursday, Dec. 19 signed Assembly Bill 297 into law to the delight of local school officials.

The bill passed by the Republican-controlled Legislature changes the process by which schools can be forced to remove race-based mascots and nicknames. Under the law, the Department of Public Instruction is given the authority to order a school to drop a mascot or nickname based on just a single complaint.

The newly passed bill requires a complainant to collect signatures equal to 10 percent of the school district's population to trigger a state review. Complainants would have to prove discrimination at a hearing.

The Department of Administration, which is controlled by the governor, would make the

final call on whether the name must go, rather than DPI, which is run by an elected superintendent.

Kewaskum Board of Education member Grace Mueller, who heads a mascot committee for the district stated, "This is wonderful news for the Kewaskum School District and approximately 30 other school districts in the State of Wisconsin. Many thanks to Governor Walker and all the legislators involved in finally getting a fair and equitable process into law, when there is a complaint regarding Mascot names. Kudos to the Mukwonago School District and their attorney Samuel Hall who stood by their students and community, overcame many obstacles, and achieved a long and arduous triumph."







Journell said. "We didn't know if we would have a chance at getting him. However, we just kept working hard in the recruiting process, letting him know what kind of impact he would make early in our program. He lived up to our expectations."

The 6-foot-3, 243-pound, 22-year-old, who graduated from KHS in 2010, made his mark at Point as a great player by the time his college career was officially done for the Pointers. Seibel made the D3football.com All-West Region Team as a linebacker. He was the leading tackler at Point this season with 103 total tackles, including 60 solo takedowns. Seibel had five double-digit tackle games in 2013. Fifteen of Seibel's tackles were for losses, which was tops in the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Add the five sacks, two fumbles forced, two fumbles recovered and an interception and you can see why Seibel's performance was the best on the team since 2010.

Last season, he was on a roll through the first five games with 57 tackles, 4 1/2 sacks and a fumble recovery, but his 2012 season ended with a broken leg suffered in the game against UW-Stout. Instead of moping and walking around depressed, Seibel tackled adversity head on.

"Cody worked every day in the strength center and in the training room to come back stronger and better than he ever was," Journell said. "His work paid off since he stayed healthy all year and performed at such a high level. He proved that he was one of the best linebackers in Div. III, and he was one of the best defensive players I've ever coached. We're going to miss him."

Not only was Journell successful in scooping up Cody, but he reeled in his younger brother, Bo. The Seibel brothers wreaked havoc on defense as they played next to each other. "We were a dominant defense this season because of Cody and Bo," Journell said. "Both are playmakers and executed the defense at a high level. Wherever the ball was, you could count on No. 8 (Cody) and No. 13 (Bo) to be there."

Cody Seibel's accomplishments in his senior year earned him a spot on the All-American Bowl all-star team. The game will be played at the Mall of America Metrodome in Minneapolis, MN, on Dec. 28. He will be on the Team Stripes side when they battle Team Stars. It will be the final football game ever at the Metrodome before the wrecking ball tears down the old facility to make way for a new one that is scheduled to open in 2016.

Tammy Seibel and her husband Jerry will pick up Bo from Point and drive to Minneapolis to watch Cody play. "We're pretty excited," she said. "We're looking forward (to the trip)." Cody's travel expenses are covered, and if he performs well in the game, there could be an in-

itation to an NFL camp down the line.

"It's always great to get postseason recognition," Journell said. "Being named All-West Region and having the opportunity to play in all-star games only helps validate our recruitment of great players to our school."

In the last four years, Seibel has been as good as advertised. "When coach Journell recruited him for Stevens Point, he knew he was getting a special type of player," Piittmann said. "Cody has been a leader for Coach Journell and has done a great job leading the Pointers' defense."

Seibel's numbers the last three seasons at Point have been steady. He played in nine games in 2010, his freshman season there, and had 37 tackles and one sack. In 2011, Seibel increased his production with 63 tackles, three sacks and a forced fumble. He was on track to surpassing his total in tackles and sacks before the injury in his junior season.

If Seibel wanted to boast about his four varsity letters each in baseball and wrestling and his three in football, the two-time all-region accolades as a fullback and a two-time first team Eastern Wisconsin Conference pick at that position and all conference in baseball as well as being a conference wrestling champion for four years straight upon arriving on campus, he could have. Instead, Seibel checked his ego at the door and played great football for the Pointers.

"Cody was the heart and soul of our defense," Journell said. "He was a captain, leader, great student and a great person. We are proud of him. Cody is one of the best that I've ever coached. He understood the defense as well as anyone I've coached. He was an extension of our coaching staff on the field. He leaves a great legacy here at UW-Stevens Point and we will be able to point to him as the standard of performance we expect from our linebackers for years to come."

A remarkable guy like Seibel left some big shoes to fill on both the KHS and Point football teams. The example he set left the door open in the future for Journell to recruit outstanding KHS players. It's OK if Seibel preferred not to speak on his accomplishments and let his play on the field do the talking instead.

Fourth by Maertz is Indians' top place

No Kewaskum wrestler advanced to the finals, but five Kewaskum Indians, led by 170-pound senior Max Maertz, placed in the top eight during Saturday's annual Marty Loy Classic held in Fond du Lac.

After placing sixth a year ago, Sauk Prairie won the team title, scoring 184.5 points, and Random Lake, a Division 3 school, made a big jump from a 15th place in 2012 to claim runner-up honors with 166 points.

Rounding out the top five were Menomonie, 150.5; Hudson, 142; and Stevens Point, 140.

Missing athletes at four weight classes and coming off a very emotional week, the Indians finished 20th out of 24 with 52 points.

"The guys weren't ready to wrestle but I don't really blame them," KHS Coach Scott Rhoads said Sunday. "For our whole team, it was a really tough week. I don't think they had any energy left." Rhoads was referring to the death of Max Vetter, their wrestling teammate and friend. Vetter's funeral was held the night before the meet.

Maertz (9-4) finished 2-2 to take fourth place. He opened with a pin in 2:23 over Jesse Montez of Burlington and in the second round nipped Random Lake's Adam Risse 10-9 in a thriller.

This moved Maertz into the semifinals against the eventual champion, Ben Kostroski of Wausau, who pinned the KHS senior in 3:08. In the battle for third place, he was pinned by Menomonie's Mason Stokke in 58 seconds.

"Max beat the (Number) 1 seed (Risse). That was really big," Rhoads said, indicating Maertz led 10-5 after getting off to a fast start. "I think that was a state-level match."

Andy Pryor (10-4) had to wrestle six matches and won four of them en route to a sixth place at 138 pounds.

In Round 1, Pryor was a 5-2 winner over Sean Bodda of Oak Creek, but in his next match he lost to Trent Gottsacker of Random Lake via a 16-0 tech fall.

Then Pryor won back-to-back matches over Lucas Shenkenberg of Burlington (pin in 1:20) and Rafael Rodrigues of Fond du Lac 7-0, giving him the opportunity to wrestle for fifth place. Hudson's Yuri Bronson was the

better man on this day, however, pinning Pryor in 2:27.

"This was a good tournament for him," Rhoads said of Pryor.

A third senior, Joey Seitz (9-3), managed to place seventh by going 2-2 on the day. After opening with a 5-1 decision over Menomonie's Jacob Goodman, Seitz, who was seeded third at 145, was beaten by sixth-seeded Casey Crangle of Menomonee Falls in an 11-0 major decision.

In his first round of the wrestleback, Seitz posted a 4-3 decision over Brandon Laughlin of Oconomowoc but lost a chance to wrestle for fifth or sixth when he lost a 5-2 decision to Hudson's Sawyer Massie.

This put Seitz in the match for seventh or eighth against Goodman and because he had already beaten Goodman, Seitz won by rule.

Junior Garrett Buth (3-7) placed eighth at 285, going 2-3. After receiving a bye, Buth lost to Random Lake's Reed Anklum (pin, 3:05), then he pinned Adam Breuni of Lodi in 3:28 and Sauk Prairie's Zach Niemi in 1:48.

Buth's day concluded with two losses, both by pin for eighth place.

The final place winner was sophomore Zach Heberer, who started the season at 120 pounds but had moved down to 113. Heberer, who missed the match against Oostburg because of an injury, came into the tournament with a 0-3 record and went 2-3

on the day to take eighth.

After receiving a bye, Heberer lost an 8-2 decision to Lake Geneva Badger's Alex Martinez, then defeated his next two opponents, Cole Johnson of Westby in 1:52 and Stevens Point's Nate Duffert via an 8-0 major decision.

Heberer (2-6) then was pinned twice in a row, first by Hudson's Mitch Fanning (2:07) and then by Menomonie's Joey Ford (3:42) to take eighth.

Eric Wade (3-2) came into the tournament with a perfect 2-0 mark, not enough for a seed, which hurt his chances of getting a place. After posting a pin over Perez of Mosinee (5:03) in the preliminary round, Wade lost to Jacob Vogel of Denmark, 8-3 and dropped a tough 5-4 decision to Badger's Tristan Steiner to end his day.

Results on the other Kewaskum wrestlers are as follows: 106 — Jacob Heberer, 1-2; 126 — Alex Vogt, 0-2; 152 — Jake Keller, 1-2; 220 — Dylan May, 0-2. Kewaskum had no entrants at 120, 132, 182 and 195. Keller was substituting for Andy Buelow, who is out with an injury, and Collin McCarthy was home sick.

"Buelow hurt his knee at Oostburg. He's still recovering from that," Rhoads said, doubtful he will be ready for the Oshkosh Lourdes On The Waters Tournament Friday and Saturday.

Is there light at the end of the tunnel for the Kewaskum girls' basketball team? Only time will tell. And whatever becomes of the 2013-14 season for the Indians, you can't fault them for not giving it their best despite having a patchwork roster.

Trying to learn a new of-

fense is as hard as trying to notch their first win of the season. For whatever reason, the points aren't piling up and neither are the wins.

This season isn't a lost cause, and it's highly doubtful that the Kewaskum girls will go winless. They are 0-6 so far, but the outlook in the Indians' game at Campbellsport, Dec. 10, was positive, according to interim head coach Kory

Dogs.

"We got off to our best start of the year and led 10-6 after the first quarter but we didn't have a field goal in the second quarter, only a few free-throws, so we dug ourselves a hole in the second quarter," Dogs said.

After five straight turnovers to start the third quarter, Kewaskum settled down. In the fourth quarter, the Indians couldn't get the ball to drop in the basket. According to Dogs, the team shot 1-for-22 from the field in the second and fourth quarters.

"We need to find a way to score," Dogs said. "The girls played better and gave a great effort though. We need to play more than two quarters of basketball to give ourselves a chance to win."

At Plymouth, Dec. 13, Kewaskum trailed 15-0. Dogs said they gave up too many offensive rebounds early in the game and missed some open shots. The Indians cut a 30-13 deficit down to 12 in the third quarter on two three-point baskets by sophomore Haley Kleinhans. But Plymouth pressured Kewaskum, and that resulted in easy baskets, which gave them a big lead. Kleinhans and Mikayla Dogs had six points each and sophomore forward Sophie Lightner and Dogs led the team with seven rebounds each.

"Even though our record and stats may not show it, but the offense is improving and the effort has been there for the most part," Kory Dogs said. "We just need to do a better job of protecting the ball, our shot selection and start knocking some shots down. Then again, I guess that can be expected with a young team."

Kory Dogs said that the schedule isn't doing them any favors, and he said that the girls have stayed positive and focused on getting better every day. The Indians notched their first wins of the season in 2012-13 at the Milwaukee South Holiday Tournament over the Christmas break by beating Milwaukee North and Milwaukee South.

In Kewaskum's game at home against Waupun, Dec. 19, the green and white were challenged early. "We did a good job of handling their press and trap defense early and also moved the ball well and made some good passes, which led to some early scores," Dogs said.

The Indians had an early lead in the first quarter and trailed 13-11 entering the second quarter, despite turning the ball over eight times in the quarter. Kewaskum was ice cold from the field, shooting 1-for-13, with the only basket, a three-pointer, coming from Mikayla Dogs. "We dug ourselves a hole, which we've been doing all too often this season," Kory Dogs said. The halftime lead for the Warriors increased to 12 points.

Waupun kept the pressure on against Kewaskum and forced the Indians into 23 turnovers between the second and third quarters. The Indians cut the Waupun lead

down to eight early in the third quarter, but in the end, they were worn down and lost, 63-28.

"We shot 11-for-39 from the field and 4-for-13 from the line and turned the ball over 35 times," Dogs said. "You aren't going to compete in many games turning the ball over that much, especially when we've been struggling to score. We need to work on improving our passing and ball handling to minimize our turnovers and start getting some shots to drop for us."

Mikayla Dogs led the Indians in scoring with eight points. Junior guard Jess Fieweger and sophomore guard Sami Wiskirchen had five points each. Wiskirchen also had 12 rebounds and played her best game of the year, Kory Dogs said.

The team will welcome back junior Erin Matusinec, who was nursing a back injury and has been cleared to play for the first time this season. Dogs said she will help on the inside game on both ends of the floor.

In a show of respect for a loss in the KHS family, the Waupun freshman, JV and varsity teams chipped in and bought cards that were signed by the players and coaches on all levels and offered their condolences to Max Vetter, a KHS student, who recently died. Each card was given to the KHS girls teams before each game.

Kewaskum High School accepted the abrupt resignation of Head Coach Mike Kleinhans on Friday, Dec. 13 after their game at Plymouth. Kleinhans cited family reasons for the resignation.

Cougars upend Indians at home

Life hasn't been easy for the KHS boys basketball team lately, but they're still trying to figure things out before the year ends. A promising 2-0 start in nonconference play and winning their first Eastern Wisconsin Conference game of the season against New Holstein was followed by four disaster defeats. The Indians are 3-4 overall and 1-3 in the conference.

Like every one of their seven games so far, Kewaskum got off to a great start. Then somewhere before halftime, the Indians were struggling to keep up. And when the second half flies right past them, it's too late to recover. Then the game is out of their reach.

The home game against Campbellsport, Dec. 17, was another one that featured a dominant player from the other team. The Cougars won 47-36. The Indians had trouble stopping the other team's best player in the last three or four games.

"We played tough most of the game," KHS basketball coach Keith Traska said. "We came up short due to turnovers. We had 17 turnovers just in the second half. We only had six in the first half, but we missed way too many

shots near the basket. Then again, a player like Isiah Daniels will do that to a team on the inside."

To let Daniels rule the paint and score 27 points in the lane on the court as a visiting team is inexcusable. "Isiah dominated us on both sides of the ball," Traska said. "He is a great inside presence, and we weren't able to contain him."

Daniels had only four points in both the first and fourth quarters of that game. In the second quarter, you could have replaced his name on the visitors' scoreboard because he outscored the Kewaskum team by himself. It took three Kewaskum players to score their five points in that quarter. Daniels scored all 11 of Campbellsport points in the second quarter and eight in the third quarter. That post defense with 6-6 Jason Hanson and 6-4 Greg Rate need some help in guarding the painted area.

The Campbellsport faithful showed their support by wearing green as the KHS family dealt with the loss of Max Vetter, a student and athlete at the school, who passed away recently. "I do want to thank the Campbellsport fans for coming to our place and wearing green to show their support for us, as (Dec.

16) was an incredibly tough day," Traska said. "Our players played their hearts out, but in the end, Campbellsport was the better team, and congrats to them on a solid win." The Indians' game that was originally scheduled Dec. 20 at Waupun will be played on Feb. 18.

Through seven games, Rate leads the team in scoring with an average of 10.9 points per game and rebounding with 9 a game. Charlie Witek is second in scoring with 7.3ppg and Hanson is third with 7.2ppg. As a team, the Indians are shooting 56 percent from the field (84-for-150) and are 56-for-104 in free throws made (54 percent). Their three-point shooting is bad (4-for-15, 27 percent). Opponents outscored Kewaskum 308-292 in the seven games. The only positive is the rebounding advantage that the Indians have over their opponents at 8.3 (27.7rpg to 18.4rpg).

Entering next year, the Indians must find a way to rebound from tough losses, but luck may be on their side. They start off the New Year with games against New Holstein, Sheboygan Falls and Kiel. Winning all those games will get the team back on track.


