Six will move on to sectional at Waupun Saturday

As close as it can get: Indians matmen win by one at regional

In what can be described as a thrilling photo finish, Kewaskum's wrestlers won their second straight D2 regional title Saturday, outlasting Ripon for the right to advance to the Pewaukee Team Sectional.

The Indians amassed 220.5 points to 219.5 for the Tigers in the meet hosted by North Fond du Lac. After an entire day of wrestling, Kewaskum won the title by a single point.

"Thrilling is a good word to use," KHS coach Scott Rhoads said Sunday, "It was down to the wire," he said. "We were counting on other teams to beat the Ripon wrestlers" in wrestlebacks where two Tigers were beaten, helping the Indians clinch the crown.

Rhoads is understandably ex-

cited. His team will have a chance to challenge East Troy and possibly Pewaukee or Sheboygan Falls for a chance to wrestle in the WIAA D2 Team Tournament in Madison March 7-8.

The meet also determined which wrestlers move along to the D2 Sectional at Waupun. Only the first and second moves on. For KHS, six Indian team members advance, this is down 10 from last year — including four who were champions - Joey Seitz at 145, Eric Wade at 160, Max Maertz at 170 and Garrett Buth at 285. Buth is a junior and the other three are seniors.

Seitz moved up to the 145-pound weight class for the regional after finishing third at 138 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament a week ago. The move was successful Saturday as Seitz finished 3-0 with a

bye, a 15-0 technical fall over Jordan Hardel of Berlin (1-7) and a 9-1 major decision over Ripon's Bradley Krahn (30-15) in the finals. With the three wins, Seitz improves to 33-9 overall.

Rhoads said a couple good 145s were moving down to 138 for the tournament, and, "That was part of Joey's decision (to go up). He will have an easier time to get to state" at that weight.

Concerning Wade's move to the top rung of the victory stand, he also received a first round Zach Beck bye, then took care of Mayville's Mathew Barton (11-14) in 2:52 and finished his day with a 10-2 major decision over Kody Pinch (23-13) of Waupun.

Wade will advance with a mark of 22-8. He missed several meets early in the year because of illness.

Sex offender to be released in Wayne

Residents in the town of Wayne will have the opportunity find out more information about a registered sex offender moving in their community during a meeting on Thursday.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office released information on Charles E. Buckarma, 25, who will soon take up residency at an adult family home located at 9448 County Road W, Campbellsport.

The meeting will take place on Thursday (today) at 6 p.m. at Wayne Elementary School, 5760 Mohawk Rd. in Campbellsport. At the meeting, members of the public will be provided additional information on the placement of the subject and there will be an opportunity for attendees to submit questions to be answered.

Buckarma was adjudicated of 3rd Degree Sexual Assault on March 25, 2004. The victim was a 16-year-old male who was known to him and the assault involved sexual touching and penetration. He has an offending history that includes similar behaviors.

According to information from the Washington County Sheriff's Office, Buckarma is an individual with an intellectual disability currently being held under a civil mental health commitment. Community Care, Inc., a state approved managed care organization, reports that he will be receiving support and supervision from a residential facility that has been certified. Community Care, Inc., has indicated that he will be directly supervised at all times.

Buckarma has served the sentences imposed on him by the courts



Indians wrestling team don't pass team sectional test in Pewaukee

A valiant comeback effort by the Kewaskum High wrestling team fell just short in Tuesday night's D2Team Sectional hosted by Pewaukee.

After falling behind East Troy 30-12 in a semifinal match, the Indians battled back to within two points (30-28) but Eric Doll lost by decision at 220 and Garrett Buth ended up getting pinned by Kyle Storandt in 4:35 of the 285-pound match, allowing the Trojans to hold on for a 39-28 win.

Kewaskum had no entrants at 113 and 126 pounds, meaning 12 free points for East Troy, which ended up

with nine victories, including just one pin.

Only three of Kewaskum's seniors wound up with wins, and they were not all among those one might have expected. Cody Muckerheide, Max Maertz and Jared Grady posted pins at 152, 170 and 182, respectively, helping to cut East Troy's lead.

The team's other seniors, Andy Pryor (132), Joey Seitz (145) and Eric Wade (160) ran into some good competition in the middle weights. Pryor lost a 10-4 decision to Ryan Engel, while Seitz was defeated by Zach Lamb 7-3 after Lamb scored four points in the final seconds. Wade came up two points short vs. Jeremy

Dedick in battle that ended 6-4.

A year ago, the same two teams met in the D2 Pewaukee Sectional with the Indians cruising to a 49-24 win after starting out 33-0.

With the loss, Kewaskum's dual meet season ended. The Indians were 7-7 on the year. East Troy moved into the finals to face the host Pirates, who pounded Sheboygan Falls, 42-17. The winner goes on to the State Team Tournament March 7-8.

More details about this match and the individual section to be held at Waupun Saturday will be published in the February 27 edition of The Statesman.

Wrestling (continued from front)

Max Maertz (21-7) returned to action after suffering a head injury in his first match at the EWC meet. There were just five wrestlers at 170 and none of them are in the same class as Maertz, who had a bye in the first round, pinned Zach Zills (10-18) of Campbellsport in :28 in the semis and then outpointed Berlin's Mitchell Kramer (24-12), 13-6 in the finals.

"He (Maertz) wrestled great," Rhoads said. "He really beat that kid (Kramer) up."

Buth (20-12) came up big for Kewaskum, giving the team extra points with his two pins after opening with a bye. In the semis, Buth used a throw to put Brady Stockwell's (18-18) shoulders to the mat in :36, and he needed just 2:44 to end the match against freshman Cody Jacobson (19-15) of Ripon.

"He pinned that kid (Jacobson) before," Rhoads said of Buth. "That helped out a ton."

Those placing were Andy Pryor at 132 and Max Hardy, who worked his way onto the varsity midway through the season.

Pryor (27-11), a conference runner-up, is having a solid senior season and continued that trend Saturday. He opened with a quickie pin in :42 over John Featherstone (4-19) of Berlin and needed just a little more time, 2:49, to take care of Jacob Johnson (14-12) of Campbellsport. His opponent in the finals was Dakota Danner of Mayville (29-4), who beat him by tech fall, 15-0.

Hardy (10-11) was mentally ready for the competition and his efforts definitely helped the Indians win the title. In his first round, he knocked off Ripon senior Chris Holland (who came in with a mark of 18-19), pinning him in 5:17 and then he knocked off the top seed, Airon

Heming of Mayville, pinning him in 5:50.

In the finals, however, it was all Reed Zietlow (25-15) of Waupun, who posted an 8-1 victory over Hardy, who is currently 10-10.

"I have high hopes for them," Rhoads said. "I'm probably counting on about four of them (to advance)."

Those taking third and just missing a berth in the sectionals included Jacob Heberer at 106, Cody Muckerheide at 152, Alex Vogt at 120 and Ben Watzig at 195. Watzig was a regional champion a year ago.

Heberer went 2-2 (two pins) on the day, losing his bid to take second when he was tech falled by Zach Beck of Ripon, 20-5.

Sectional action at Waupun begins at 10 a.m. There are now eight at each weight class, with three advancing to the WIAA State Wrestling Tournament, Feb. 28-29 and March 1 at the Kohl Center in Madison.







KMS students learn courage to stand up to bullying

Bullying, either as the bully or being bullied, affects approximately 30 percent of youth. Kewaskum Middle School seventh and eighth grade students attended the first annual "courage" retreat last week as part of Youth Frontiers, a nonprofit and non-partisan organization working with schools to help build positive communities.

"It is an identified area of need via teachers and parents," Julie Skelton, KMS principal, said. "We noticed that our kids alone for the most part make really good choices; however, when faced with

a tough choice to make when they see something happening to somebody else, they don't always know how to respond and react."

For five hours and fifteen minutes, students were engaged in games, music, small group discussion and stories in efforts to teach kids to see others differently. Youth Frontiers staff members Steph Johnson and Joe Beckman facilitated the program in the gym.

"Kids were a little skeptical coming in, but you can see that switch," Johnson stated about the students' response.

"It's really developmentally appropriate for this age range," Beckman add-

ed. Though students have changed, seventh and eighth graders are still seventh and eighth graders dealing with the same issues as their parents at that age.

About 80 percent of students are caught in the middle, fearful of speaking out and being an individual and watching in silence and feel safe as part of the crowd.

"It's about standing up and making good choices. It's being able to have the courage to do those kinds of things," Skelton said. "The idea of the retreat is to get kids to understand what other kids are going through, and also know how to respond."

High school juniors and seniors identified as good role models were trained to be small group leaders. Darcy Schraufnagel, a junior, said. "I thought I could share experiences with them and show them you can be yourself and still be a leader."

During the lunch break, Paige Becht, senior, talked to Beckman about her interest in working for Youth Frontiers in the future. "I wanted to help make a difference. It would be a good way to leave to help the middle schoolers," she said.

The reaction by students was positive. Many tears were shed, both by boys and girls.

At the end, students were asked to make a statement of courage either for them or to make the school a better place.

"What you heard the kids say was beautiful and inspiring," Johnson said. Some students said things the teachers could never have predicted, according to Beckman.

At the eighth grade retreat, teachers received a standing ovation started by one student and left the teachers crying.

During advisement (similar to homeroom at KMS), staff will do some follow-up over the remainder of the year that is provided by Youth Frontiers. Parents were also sent home information for follow-up as well.

"We are trying to shift our culture right now to make that unwanted behavior absolutely unacceptable, so instead of kids looking and saying I am not sure what I should be doing about that, to that is not acceptable," Skelton stated.

The program is part of a series for multiple grades, KMS made the decision to begin with the seventh and eighth grades. In the future, only seventh grade students will take part in the retreat.

"We are trying to get it beyond here, but we are starting here," Skelton said.





West upends Lady Indians in nonconference game

The Lady Indians had the opportunity to make it two wins in a row against visiting West Bend West, last week but the Spartans didn't go down without a fight, resulting in a 39-33 loss for the Indians.

Kewaskum hosted the Feb. 11 nonconference game. Both teams played to an 8-8 tie in the first quarter. The Spartans outscored the Lady Indians by seven points in the second quarter (15-8) to lead at the half 23-16. Freshman guard Mikayla Dogs scored 10 points in the half but had a quiet second half with four points to lead Kewaskum with 14. She made seven of her 14 free throw attempts.

The green and white outscored West 17-16 in the second half, but they gave up 10 second quarter points to sophomore guard Libby Brugger (four points) and senior forward Celina Wanta (six), which gave West some breathing room. Brugger led all scorers with 18 and Wanta added 10. Kewaskum didn't box out enough to grab defensive rebounds and the offensive boards by West gave them some extra possessions.

"We gave up offensive rebounds," Kewaskum coach Kory Dogs said. "We gave up

offensive rebounds off free throws. I talked to a women's college coach that I know really well. I asked her, 'How do you get girls to rebound?' She said, 'You can do rebounding drills every day in practice, but if they don't want to rebound, they're not going to rebound.'"

If West would've made more than nine free throws in their 28 attempts, the victory margin would've been much bigger. Or, the outcome would've swung in Kewaskum's favor if they converted on more than 10 of their 26 trips to the line.

Stahl had a rough night in the game. West focused on containing her and dared the rest of the Kewaskum team to beat them. She was the target in West's defensive game plan and scored only two points on a basket with 2 minutes 50 seconds left in the game.

"Every time I got the ball, (West) would say, 'Shooter,'" Stahl said. "Basically, every single time I would get the ball, they would be on me right away. It was really hard."

The Spartans made it tough on the Lady Indians to move the ball around with their defense and making it hard for Stahl to get open. "Whenever I was open, I would call for it," Stahl said. "And (my teammates) would look at me and look the other

way. And they would try to pass it to me but it would be too late."

In the end, the pressure defense by the Spartans created lots of turnovers and not being patient on offense were some reasons Kewaskum lost a game that was still within their reach in the third quarter when junior center Erin Matusinec made 1-of-2 free throws to cut the West lead to 23-22. The Spartans scored nine unanswered points for a 32-22 advantage and kept Kewaskum at bay down the stretch.

"Every turnover and every offensive rebound is more shots for them and less shots for us," Coach Kory Dogs said. "It's simple math." Kewaskum is handcuffed on the offensive end when their best player is unable to score on a consistent basis. "I'm sure that teams that scout us don't see our best scorer," he said. "And, when they put pressure defense on us, sometimes you can show up and can handle it, but more often than not, we have trouble with it. And then when we play a little faster, which is too fast for us, we have turnovers. When they don't practice at that speed all the time and the game is at that speed, you're going to have mistakes."

Indians match last season win total after passing Raiders

Kewaskum boys basketball coach Keith Traska was in a much better mood last week than in the previous two weeks. His team matched last season's overall win total with seven with a chance to surpass that in the final week of the regular season.

The Indians went out with a bang on Senior Night, Feb. 13, at the KHS Fieldhouse, against Kiel. All five seniors started the game and Traska said they played great. Josh Rahlf, Eric Limberg, Greg Rate, Derek Schulz and Karter Guth helped contribute to the 57-53 Kewaskum win.

"Overall, we had all eight guys show up and play hard for four quarters," Traska said. "Normally we have one bad quarter, but we held it together all game. This was the type of game we have been looking for all year. And if we can keep playing like this, we might be able to play for a couple of more weeks (in the postseason)."

Even though Kewaskum escaped with a four-point win, Traska said they could have made the margin bigger if they made more than 10 of their 23 free throws, an area that they struggled with all season. Making six of eight three-point shots kept the Indians in front. Rate's 10 points and eight rebounds led Kewaskum. Cory Stern,

Schulz and Mike Prochnow each had eight points. Charlie Witek finished with seven. Limberg and Brady Hanson scored six points each and Guth finished with four. Limberg had five assists in the game.

The overall team effort in Kewaskum's final home game of the season that ended in a victory snapped an eight-game losing streak and gave them relief from their performances in the previous three games, all losses.

"(Feb. 3, at Cedar Grove-Belgium), we played one of our worst games of the year," Traska said. "We were outstuffed and outplayed in all aspects of the game. We were only down by one at the half (22-21) and still played without passion and didn't box out and didn't take care of the ball. We had 19 turnovers in the game and only forced 10. We tried to make them take outside shots and pack it in, but we were unable to do so as they only had to make one shot outside of 12 feet, so even our defense was not productive."

Rate led the Indians with 12 points and eight rebounds. CG-B outscored Kewaskum in the second half, 37-20. A tough practice the day after Kewaskum's 59-41 defeat was a reminder to go hard the entire game and not take plays off. The effort was much improved Feb.

7, at undefeated conference leader Plymouth.

"We struggled at the start of the game with turnovers and settled down eventually, Traska said. "Overall, the improvement we showed from the first time we played them to this time was much better. We were even complimented by many of their fans on how we played and the improvement in our program."

The Indians lost by 42 points in their first meeting at home against Plymouth, Dec. 12 (70-28), but played better in a 58-41 loss. Witek led the team with 13 points and Guth chipped in 11. Traska said that Guth could've scored "around 20 with the number of missed shots in the paint."

The 81-44 loss at Kettle Moraine Lutheran Feb. 11, wasn't even worth mentioning but the Indians got a taste of what they will look forward to against their future conference opponent in a couple of years. Rate led Kewaskum in scoring in that game with 15 points and Witek added 11.

The Indians drew the No. 5 seed in the Division 3 playoffs and will play at No. 4 Winnebago Lutheran, Feb. 25, at 7 p.m. Lutheran had the same overall record as Kewaskum entering this week and got the higher seed. Maybe it was because they beat North Fond du Lac in

a head-to-head matchup and Kewaskum didn't. The winner will play at Oostburg, who received a first round bye, Feb. 28, at 7 p.m.

"I know Winnebago Lutheran is big," Traska said. "They have a very good point guard. They're kind of like us. They've been kind of up-and-down this year. I think it will be a real good matchup. Both our teams match up well in terms of size. We had some very comparable games against some teams."

Get past the Vikings and the Dutchmen awaits the Indians.

"They're a very good team," Traska said of Oostburg. "We try not to look ahead. We have a chance. Of all the teams (in the regional) that match up in terms of size, I know we can do it."

Kewaskum stands in fifth place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference with a 5-7 record af-

ter last weekend with Kiel, New Holstein and Sheboygan Falls below them. The Indians were set to play at Waupun, Feb. 18, and at Sheboygan Falls, Feb. 20. If the green and white win one of those two games or lose both, they are likely to stay in that position because Campbellsport is expected to beat Kiel and Waupun is expected to beat New Holstein Thursday night. Kiel and New Holstein have four conference wins and Falls won only three conference games.
