With the dust clearing from the April 1 election, a few new faces will be joining familiar ones on county, village and school boards.

While Gerald Schulz retained his seat on the Washington County board of supervisors, newcomer Jay Fisher will join the Kewaskum School District board and Kewaskum trustees will be faced with a choice.

Below is a summary of races listing complete, but unofficial results.

Washington County Board

In District 13, Schulz retained his seat in a two-way race between himself and challenger Dick Bertram.

A former county supervisor, Bertram lost his seat after redistricting.

Before the election, Schulz, who has been on the county board for eight years, said supervisors will face the challenge of maintaining county parks, facilities and roads without raising taxes in the coming term.

As a member of the safety committee, he would like to continue his

focus on inmate populations at the county jail.

Complete, but unofficial totals from Washington County election report are: Schulz, 327; Bertram, 280.

In the Kewaskum-area county districts, Daniel Stoffel in District 10 and Michael J. Parsons in District 11 ran unopposed.

Kewaskum Village Board

After two resignations less than two before the election, incumbent Richard Knoebel, challenger David Zehren and former board member Michael Berger won trustee seats.

Ballots for the April 1 race had been printed before Berger and incumbent board member Craig Garbisch notified the village they were resigning. Berger submitted a note to the village on March 21, Garbisch, on March 20.

Richard Laubach became a registered write-in candidate March 24.

Berger can still choose to serve, but if he declines the board has two options: trustees could shrink the size of the board or appoint another person to the open seat.

Complete, but unofficial totals from Washington County election report are: Knoebel, 365; Zehren, 319; Berger, 199; Garbisch, 162.

Kewaskum School District Board

Incumbents Sue Miller and Troy Hanson will be joined by newcomer Jay Fisher on the Kewaskum District School Board while Tim Ramthun, who has served on the board for three years and was district board president, was edged out of the race.

During a March 3 campaign forum Fisher said the board needs to maintain a more global view and allow the administration to do its job.

Miller expressed interest in seeing a solid board that maintains high ethical standards and leads by example and Hanson advocated for community input at all board meetings. He said the board should act as facilitator when it comes to answers sought by the public.

A tabulation statement from the Kewaskum District shows the following vote totals: Miller, 992; Hanson, 960; Fisher 927; Ramthun, 762.

Among the final candidates for the Washington County Planning and Parks Administrator is a familiar face in Kewaskum.

Jay Shambeau, who served as village administrator between 2006 and 2008, is one of four finalists for the position.

Still a resident of Kewaskum, according to a Washington County press release, Shambeau became the administrator in Calumet County after working in the village hall.

Shambeau was a finalist for the job of Washington County manager, but in October, 2013, former Richfield administrator Joshua Schoemann was appointed to the position.

He stepped from the Calumet County position in February and Todd Romenesko is currently filling in as interim.

Other finalists include Amy Bennett, currently an associate planner with the city of New Berlin, Debora Sielski, deputy planning and parks administrator for Washington County and Mark Steward, current administrator for the city of Elroy.





Highway 28 Weekly Update

Work on the Highway 28/Main Street project is underway.

As of March 30, the contractor had three crews on site.

One team started tearing up pavement and is prepping the site for the new lift station on the old Backus land. A second crew is moving east, continuing sanitary sewer main replacement. As of March 30, they were at Kohns Citgo. A grading crew is removing pavement west of the bridge.

Businesses are reminded that they can register as being on the project route using the state Department of Transportation web site. There's a link on the Village web site at: www.village.kewaskum.wi.us or those registering can go directly to the DOT site at: www.dot.wisconsin.gov/projects/seregin/28.

As of late last week, the DOT reports they have not had any applications submitted by local businesses for temporary signs.

Those applications can be obtained at the project office or from the village web site.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop noted on the department's Facebook page, that traffic is hindering some of the work being done.

He warns drivers passing through the work zone without reason can be stopped and ticketed.

Those using the bridge should only be on Main Street from Parkview Drive to Riverview Drive and those patronizing businesses should use back roads or walk.

He expects this week that Main Street will narrow to one, six-foot-wide lane.

That lane is to be used for construction related equipment or emergency vehicles.

Remember Everyone is Valuable

As we continue to discuss respecting others it is important to realize every person has value, including one's self. This can begin with understanding self-esteem. Self-esteem is the value we place on ourselves. It is the feeling we have about all the things we see ourselves to be. There are many different ways you can make a child feel important and valued.

1. Offer Companionship: Time spent alone with your child is important because it builds respect, closeness and relationship

2. Share Love: Kids need to know the adults in their lives love them.

3. Use Conversation: This may seem like a no brainer, but adults often feel children will not enjoy conversing with them. This is not true.

4. Set Boundaries: This is

a tricky part of parenting: you want to offer structure and control so that your child feels secure but you want to support them by valuing and respecting them as a unique person.

5. Show Respect: When you converse with your child and in turn, listen to them, you are sending the message that you value and respect their mind.

6. Develop a track record: children usually judge adults based on previous observations of character.

As we see the importance of self-worth within people, at the Kewaskum School District we have asked, "Do our students feel valued?" Every other year, we administer the Development Assets survey to our middle and high school students. The survey gives us good information on how our youth experience developmental assets and how assets relate to their overall behavior and health. These assets are divided into two key areas: external as-

sets and internal assets.

External assets are experiences with families, schools and community. Specifically, the empowerment and support assets relate to youth feeling valued. Our middle and high school students in 2012 responded: 28 percent feel the community values youth, and 31 percent feel that school provides a caring, encouraging environment. Sixty-nine percent feel that family life provides high levels of love and support, while 28 percent reported that their parents are actively involved in helping them succeed in school.

Internal assets are the positive commitments, skills, and values that form a young person's inner guidance system. Positive identity assets closely relate to their feeling valued. Our middle and high school students in 2012 responded: 48 percent feel personal power, 52 percent have high self-esteem, 63 percent have a sense of pur-

pose, and 75 percent have a positive view of their personal future.

Youth with high asset levels are less likely to engage in high-risk behaviors and more likely to engage in thriving behaviors such as leadership, doing well in school and helping others.

Schools throughout the country understand the importance of students having a strong feeling of self-worth and value. The schools in the Kewaskum School District are no different. We understand the importance of this, and promote it on a regular basis at the schools whether formally or informally.

All of the KSD schools show the importance of self-worth, and the idea that we all have value by recognizing students in several ways. At the elementary, students are "caught being good" and are recognized in assemblies. The middle school recognizes students who show

commitment by respecting others. At the high school, students are recognized for a variety of individual and team accomplishments. These are only a few ways the schools recognize that everyone has value within the school district.

While working with the local clergy on this initiative, two simple phrases came to represent the idea of realizing everyone has value. Everyone is created in the image of God and God loves that person as much as he loves you. Kewaskum area promote this as they welcome the community into their churches and through their sermons.

Remembering that everyone has value is a concept we all can agree upon, and should be one we can help our children understand. We, as adults in the community, can model this behavior, which is one of the most effective ways to teach our children and each other.

is located near Green Bay. He worked for a time in a factory but was drafted soon after he graduated from high school.

The year was 1954 when Jacobs received the call, and quickly he was on his way to Camp Stewart in Georgia.

Being drafted was not too difficult for Jacobs, nor was basic training, because he had always kept himself physically fit.

"So many of my friends were drafted, it was no big deal," he said about receiving his notice to serve. The only challenge in adjusting to military life was, "You did not know what to expect."

Jacobs was selected to become a communication specialist.

"I went to school for Morris Code," he said, indicating, with a war going on, he had to give talks on the news and send many messages in secret code.

At one point, it looked like Jacobs was going to be sent overseas as he was named as an alternate to serve in communications there, but that never transpired.

"They kept us pretty busy in the service," Jacobs went on, reporting he was reassigned to a base in Norfolk, Va. after being in Georgia.

"The base isn't there any more," he said, noting his wife, Darlin, and he took a trip there about 10 years ago. Darlin and Roger were married while he was in the service and they

lived in Virginia the first year of their married life.

"He came home on leave. We got married. We had a big wedding and then we went back," Darlin said.

The two celebrated their 60th anniversary this past February.

When Jacobs received his discharge, the couple first moved to Oshkosh, where he joined a legion group, and then they decided to make their home in Kewaskum.

"The first years (in Kewaskum), I was pretty active" and went to all the meetings, Jacob said, but in recent years he has had problems getting around and has not been able to attend.

To this day Jacobs maintains a strong sense of patriotism. When asked if he loves America, he answered emphatically, "Yes, I do," and he feels most of the people living in the United States are still very patriotic.

Jacobs is also a grateful man and he was very happy

to accept the certificate he received from the legion post, signifying his 50 years in the organization.

"It is really nice," Jacobs said. "I had it hanging in our house and now we packed it up, and we're taking it with us."

The Jacobs are moving soon to Barrington, Illinois where they can be closer to two of their daughters and families.

Also honored with a 50-year certificate of membership was Raynor Herriges. His military story will be featured in the April 10 edition of the Statesman.

Jim Dorn, the current commander of the Robert G. Romaine Post, presented the certificates to the men.

"Being a member for 50 years is quite an accomplishment," Dorn said during the March 31 presentation, adding, "It's quite an honor to know them."

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

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

New ideas in the business curriculum at Kewaskum High School

To celebrate National Career and Technical Education (CTE) month in February and to highlight the importance of CTE classes for student success in business and industry. Two teachers, Tim Rohlinger and Casey Scheel, at Kewaskum High School introduced a new Junior Achievement (JA) curriculum into their personal finance classes and piloted the Extreme Yard Sale.

JA is a nonprofit organization supported by businesses for education by helping teach skills in financial literacy, work readiness and entrepreneurship. Kewaskum was one of four schools in Southeastern Wisconsin to try to the new curriculum.

"It was a way to help them out and for us to get some up-to-date, current topics, curriculum type things," Rohlinger said.

Some of the changes included more in-depth coverage for subjects such as ethics and credit score. The new curriculum is a combination of a traditional teaching method and an interactive project based learning method which made the delivery different from previous years of teaching JA.

"They did some really good things in the pilot, and there are things in the old one I would take back, but it is a pilot and I gave them that

feedback," Rohlinger said.

Students' knowledge was tested voluntarily by completing an online financial literacy certification test through W!SE- Working in support of education- out of New York. Only about 90 percent students from the first semester took the test, and those who passed will receive a certificate. The test will be offered to second semester students.

Rohlinger also enlisted first year teacher Scheel into his idea of "The Extreme Yard Sale" for the business concepts class. Students had learned communication skills such as interviewing, and phone calls in personal finance, but the sale introduced students to the communication needed for sales and marketing.

In one class only, each student needed a minimum

of 5-10 items to sell for another person. They had to set the prices, market the sale to the community, and sell the items.

"The kids were overall pretty good with coming up with the strategies they did create," Scheel said.

When people came and negotiated with the students, it was a "rude awakening" according to Scheel. "They really didn't know how to respond to it." He hopes the experience taught the value of face to face communication.

"One thing that did pop out with some of the students was their personalities, and how they were dealing with customers," Scheel added. "They were pretty quiet in class, and they got out there, and they weren't shy to say what they had or offer deals."

The extreme yard sale will return in the fall of 2014 with some minor changes with plans to include another class. Other formats are being looked into for the future as well.

Both classes taught by Rohlinger and Scheel are eligible for college credit through Moraine Park Technical College, if the students register.

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

Seibel shares experience at All-American Bowl

An assistant Kewaskum football coach said that Cody Seibel, in his opinion, was the best player he ever saw coming through the program. Seibel would probably put up his unbelievable work ethic against any current or past Kewaskum male athlete. Participating in sports and staying active was a natural for him throughout his young life.

"I started playing sports at a very young age," Seibel said recently. "The first sport I ever played was baseball, starting out in T-ball. Then, when fourth grade came around, I picked up wrestling and in fifth grade, I started playing tackle football. I played these sports until my senior year of high school."

The 2010 KHS graduate and UW-Stevens Point student played in the All-American Bowl, Dec. 28, at the Metrodome in Minneapolis, MN, an all-star game showcasing talent from the Div. II and Div. III levels. Seibel played outside linebacker and

got in on some special-team action. His college coach, Tom Journell, endorsed him.

"If your coach thinks you're good enough to play in the game, he will send in your name and nominate you to play," Seibel said. "Once he has sent your stuff out, the scouting committee for the game will go through all the players that were nominated and pick out the best players that they want to play in the game."

Seibel made the 42-man roster of Team Stripes, who played Team Stars.

Seibel's selection to the All-American Bowl capped an outstanding 2013 season as the Pointers' linebacker and a comeback from an injury he suffered in the 2012 season.

"It has been a long journey coming back from the broken leg from last year," he said. "It took a lot of rehab and hard work to get back to where I was and to increase my performance. It was just as hard mentally as physically to come back from the injury."

Seibel's superb athletic tal-

ents as a running back and linebacker on the Indians' football team landed him on the radar since his sophomore year. He was recruited to play linebacker and preferred to play that position in college.

"Coach Journell was not the only coach to recruit me," he said. "There were quite a few schools trying to recruit me and get me to play (at their schools). When I visited the campus here at UWSP, I really liked it and met some of the guys and really liked the guys and coaches. Also, coach Journell stayed on me pretty hard and came to wrestling meets to watch me. I just decided that UWSP was the best fit for me."

One of the things that Seibel will always cherish is playing next to his brother, Bo.

"It was awesome playing next to my brother," he said. "We experienced it for one year in high school and I am very grateful to have that experience again in college. Not many brothers get to play next to each other in high school and college. As brothers playing out there, we just have that special bond between each other. It doesn't matter how close we are with the other guys, it just doesn't happen with them as it does with my brother."

In the summers of Cody Seibel's freshman and sophomore years at UWSP, he worked during the day at Manowske Welding in Fond du Lac, where his mother, Tammy, works. Afterwards, he drove to

Kewaskum to work out and got in some additional work twice a week at the House of Speed in Green Bay and squeezed in some time to play softball. After Seibel's junior year, he spent the summer in Stevens Point, working for protective services on the UWSP campus. He still worked out in Point and Green Bay.

The sociology major is keeping himself busy with school, his on-campus job and staying in shape. Seibel hopes to go into the law enforcement field.

The Seibels, which include Bo, and parents Jerry and Tammy enjoyed whatever little experience they had in Minneapolis. The Mike Farchione Memorial Foundation sponsored Cody's trip. "The support from the people who have sponsored the trip has been amazing," Cody said. "This trip wouldn't have been

possible without their support. I am very thankful for their support."

Unfortunately, the trip was short-lived for the Seibels in the Twin Cities.

"With the Metrodome being torn down (Dec. 29), there was a very tight schedule of events," Tammy said. "We arrived (Dec. 27) at approximately 4 p.m., and by the time we checked in and attended a banquet (for the players), we felt there wasn't much time to enjoy any sightseeing. We did see the outside of the Mall of America but did not enter the mall itself."

There wasn't any time to hang around after the game either, which ended in a 17-17 tie. "They were having ceremonies after the game for (Vikings) season ticket holders," she said. "Therefore, we had to be out of the Metrodome 30 minutes after the game ended."

Bauer falls one point short of wrestling title

After breezing through his first three matches, Eric Bauer had a tough go in the finals of the 97-pounds weight class at the WWF Kids Folkstyle State Tournament this past weekend in Madison. Jon Bailey of the La Crosse Area Wrestling Club was just a single point better than Bauer in the finals, winning by a score of 3-2.

Kewaskum's other qualifier, 100-pound Alex Deheck (2001-02), lost his first two matches and did not place.

Bauer, who placed fifth at state a year ago, started with a convincing and very quick 1:15 pin over Kaden Piechocki of Shiocton in the opening round and followed that match with a comfortable 4-0 shutout over Ethan Heil of the Edgar Youth Wrestling Club.

In the semifinals, Bauer again posted a quick pin, knocking off Pittsville's Hunter Grimm in 1:27 and earning a spot in the finals.

In the first period, Bailey managed to get a takedown for a 2-0 lead, but Bauer tied the match in the second when he chose the neutral position and also scored on a single leg takedown.

Bailey had the choice for the third period and took the down position. The two battled for nearly 45 seconds in the same position and some thought a stalemate had been called.

Bauer finally let Bailey go with 15 seconds remaining, feeling he could still get a takedown for the win. He tried another shot but had not gained total control as time expired.

Both wrestlers had entered

the finals without giving up a single point.

This was Bauer's sixth year going to state, and he has placed all but one year. He won a title in 2009, has taken fourth once, fifth once and second twice. In addition to being a member of the local wrestling club, Bauer also wrestles for Ringers in Germantown.

Like Bauer, Deheck is in the seventh grade at the Kewaskum Middle School. He may have been the victim of a tough draw and the long season.

"He had the champion in the first round," Mark Deheck, one of the coaches of the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club, said of his son Alex's 8-1 loss to Bryce Bosman of Luxemburg-Casco.

In the wrestleback, Deheck fell victim to Carter Paulson of Rice Lake, who beat him 7-0.

"I was disappointed, not only as his dad but as his coach," Mark Deheck said, quick to add, "It's one of those things ... It gets to be a long season, especially for the middle school kids. They've been wrestling for six months now."

Braeden Scoles, who lives in Kewaskum but wrestles for Ringers, finished 1-2 in the 72-pound weight class (2003-'04). Scoles started out with a 6-2 win over X-Factor Elite's Brant Cracraft 6-2 before losing back-to-back matches, eliminating him from the competition.

In the quarterfinals, Scoles was pinned by Kole Marko of Amery in 1:35, and then in a consolation match, was pinned by Dakota Doescher of Pecatonica-Argle Youth Wrestling in 1:20.
