## Teens injured in crash with dump truck



Two Kewaskum teens were injured after the pickup truck they were traveling in collided with a dump truck on Highway 45 at the Highway V intersection at approximately 7:23 Tuesday morning, April 8. Police say the 16-year-old operator of the pick up did not see the dump truck and turned in the path of the dump truck. Witnesses at the scene confirmed the dump truck was traveling at excessive speed and that there was nothing the driver of the dump truck could have done to avoid the crash. The driver of pick up was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital. A 16-year-old passenger was transported to Children's Hospital in Milwaukee, neither was believed to have life-threatening injuries. The 44-year-old driver of dump truck was not transported. A citation for failure to yield was issued to the driver of the pickup. Kewaskum police officers initially responded and were later joined by the Washington County Sheriff's Office. Kewaskum Fire Department and Ambulance responded, they were later joined by West Bend Ambulance who transported one of the victims.

## Destination Imagination team off to state competition

Students from each of the elementary schools in the Kewaskum School District participated in Destination Imagination (DI) offered for the first time last October. One of the six groups placed third in the regional competition March 22 and is scheduled to compete in the state competition April 12 in Stevens Point.

DI is a nonprofit educational program geared toward inspiring and equipping students to become "the next generation of innovators and leaders." Six challenges are offered, with a seventh and non-competing option for children in K5-2.

This year's challenges were tech-

nical, scientific, fine arts, improvisational, structural and service learning. In addition groups had to create a five to eight minute skit around the challenge as well as complete an instant challenge during the competition.

"From that day, (At regionals) they've been more serious and focused," Becky Shavlik said. She coached the Golden Owls at FES who took the technical challenge. Students had to design equipment to find and remove 10 objects placed at random in 16 containers.

Melanie Winkler of the Owls and fifth-grader liked DI because "I can build stuff and use teamwork and get to know others." Her team took third place and qualified for state.

"Right after regionals, we had an

impromptu meeting," Shavlik said. "We thought about what are our different senses, what are different detectors, what else is out there that we did not see yet and that's when they started thinking about what else could we do."

"I kinda felt nervous, but then I was so relieved we got at least a third place medal for the competition," Elijah Brenn of the Golden Owls said. "I never expected that we were going to make it to state."

The Golden Owls have redesigned their technical challenge and revised their skit with the same characters, but improved costumes and different

## Fire tank purchase discussed by village board

The village board tackled a busy schedule at its postelection meeting Monday.

In addition to swearing in newly-elected candidates, the board listened to reports that included a speed study at the intersection of Highway H and 45, a plan to replace an aging water tanker that could serve two departments and made modifications for a party in the municipal parking lot.

Trustees Richard Knoebel and David Zehren were sworn in, but the question of adding a seventh member to the board will be left until the April 21 meeting.

Knoebel, Zehren and former board member Michael Berger won the open trustee seats, but Berger had tendered his resignation after ballots had been printed.

Knoebel asked the board to hold off on a decision, trustee James Holland said it might be best to advertise the position and have the board interview potential appointees and trustee Kevin Scheunemann said it might be better to choose an appointee from those who ran for the office April 1.

In that election Knoebel garnered 365 votes; Zehren, 319; Berger, 199; Craig Garbisch, who also resigned from the board but was still on the ballot, got 162 votes and Richard Laubach, who became a registered write-in candidate March 24, got 94 votes.



A Campbellsport man is facing his fifth or sixth operating while intoxicated offense in connection with an April 3 crash that injured a 17-year-old driver.

A hearing has been scheduled for Keith A. Wiedmeyer, 60, at 9:45 a.m. April 21.

The OWI charge and operating a motor vehicle while revoked were requested after Kewaskum police responded to a two-vehicle accident on Fond du Lac Ave/Hwy 45 near Prospect Drive about 3 p.m. on April 3.

The complaint lists a review of Wiedmeyer's record, which includes previous convictions - for an OWI in June 1995, another for OWI causing injury in July 1997, a third for an offense occurring in 1998 and a conviction for operating with a prohibited alcohol concentration that happened in June 2011.

On April 3, 2012 Wiedmeyer's driving privilege was revoked indefinitely and he was convicted of operating after revocation in July that year in Fond du Lac County.

According to the criminal

complaint, a 17-year-old was driving southbound on Highway 45 when she was rear-ended by a vehicle driven by the 60-year-old Wiedmeyer.

Wiedmeyer stated in the complaint that he sneezed a few times and when he looked up, the victim's vehicle was in front of him and he was unable to stop.

The 17-year-old was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital for injuries.

The complaint notes that the officer attending the scene said he detected the odor of marijuana emanating from inside the van Wiedmeyer was driving. Wiedmeyer allegedly failed field sobriety tests and blood tests are pending analysis at the State Crime Laboratory, according to the complaint.

A witness told police she was a few car lengths in front of the 17-year-old's vehicle when she saw the victim's car flying across the road and crossing onto the west side of the highway, the complaint states.

The witness stopped at the scene and allegedly observed the driver of the van wobbling and swaying back and forth. While a search uncovered 1.01 grams of marijuana, Wiedmeyer denied smoking it on that date, but said he was on several medications for other issues and had been advised by a doctor not to drive.

In December last year Wiedmeyer's son, Keith L. Wiedmeyer, 35, was found guilty of homicide by intoxicated use of vehicle and second-degree recklessly endangering safety and sentenced to 28 years in prison followed by 15 years of extended state supervision.

Police Chief Thomas Bishop said a speed study will leave the posted speed limit at the 45/H/Badger Road intersection unchanged, but the signal times have been altered.

Bishop said the majority of crashes at the intersection involve southbound vehicles turning from Highway 45 onto Highway H and the state Department of Transportation plans on adding reflective back plates and a flashing yellow turn arrow.

Stepped up enforcement in that area will continue, Bishop said.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said his department has been working on replacing a tender/tanker truck that was sold in December.

USA Tanker created preliminary drawings for warning lights and a tank costing \$102,000, which is \$27,000 more than a 2013 estimate the department has.

That cost does not include a chassis. Groeschel has been checking trade and other publications only to find suitable chassis are costing between \$35,000 and \$45,000 without

the modifications needed by the department. Those chassis are highly desirable and bought of the market so quickly, it is difficult to wait for a regular board meeting so trustees could approve the matter.

The Firefighter's Association would be willing to purchase the chassis - if one can be found, Groeschel said.

The Association paid for air packs and resealing station flooring - both two-year-projects on the village budget - and the village paid the Association back.

It may be possible to share a portion of the cost with the village Department of Public Works, which also has an aging tanker.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann wanted to see the item to return to the public safety committee to review how

the costs might be split.

The board ruled that if a chassis could be found and the Association was willing to pay the bill, other details between the fire and public works departments could be worked out.

While Party of the Pavement won't take place this year because of Main Street construction, the Grand Larsony Benefit Car Show will.

The board received a request to allow the show to be held in the Annex parking lot. Originally, organizers had wanted permission to close off First Street and Railroad Street up to Second Street. Because of traffic concerns, the request was modified to close the road up to First Street.

Last year, the benefit raised approximately \$9,000.



## Highway 28 Weekly Update



Traffic flow and garbage pickup along the Highway 28 construction route were hot topics at Monday's village board meeting.

Several who live or work along the route voiced their concern over detour postings and the number of vehicles using the thoroughfare in spite of "road closed" signs.

Main Street resident Mike Berger said vehicles coming from the north side of the village that are traveling south on Highway 28 are confronted by a "road closed" sign, but there is no notice posted there of an alternate route.

Police Chief Tom Bishop said they've only issued one ticket for traveling on Main Street but have made numerous contacts with drivers to notify them there is no through traffic.

### Trash pickup

Public Works Coordinator Chad Cook said those on Main Street may have to find different locations to leave garbage carts as work progresses on laterals that zigzag village streets.

"So far we have gotten everybody's garbage picked up, but it has not been smooth or easy," Cook said.

The village will explore options with Advanced Disposal and will keep the lines of communication open to village residents.

Owners that move cans from their home and businesses may want to mark them so they can distinguish the cart from others at drop off points.

### Change orders

The village also presided over its last change order for the project Monday. Before turning over change orders for the \$8 million project to the village public works and services committee, the board OK'd substituting ductile iron for PVC connections that run from water mains. Cook said it would cost \$2,600 more for the upgrade, but could save money in the long run, using the example of what would happen if a fire hydrant was struck by a vehicle.

In that scenario, PVC would be more likely to crack, requiring underground digging to replace the connection.

Heiser said moving the jurisdiction for change orders to the committee will allow changes to be OK'd faster than waiting up to two weeks for the next board meeting.

### Construction update

The sewer lift station was installed the week of March 28 and the majority of pavement in the village portion of the project has been removed.

During the next two weeks installation is expected to continue on mainline water and sanitary sewer mains.

The contractor will begin installing sewer and water laterals when a section of the mainline has completed testing. Frontier Communications has informed the state Department of Transportation that their work on rural sections east of Kewaskum is expected to last into late April or early May.

Residents with questions regarding the locations of new sewer or water laterals should contact the village hall for information.

The DOT reminds drivers to use caution at the intersection of highways 28 and 45. Traffic signals are in the process of being retimed to allow for a longer green on Highway 45; however, trucking for the early portion of the project is entering and leaving at that location.

All work progress is weather dependent.

Business meetings are being held at the village hall every two weeks and area residents are welcome to attend. The next meeting is 11 a.m. April 16.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser plans on asking for email addresses so project meeting notifications can be sent to interested parties on a timelier basis.

Peace Church on Main St. has offered up their parking lot to an residents patronizing businesses on the eastern end of town any time except during their Sunday morning worship service. Their lot is accessible from First St.

## Chief's Corner

By now everyone is aware that our long awaited construction of Main Street is finally underway. This hasn't come without issues and concerns. Let me try and clear up some of the questions we have been getting from those who live in and around Kewaskum.

Main Street is closed to through traffic and to some extent even impassable in areas. In order to access the many businesses on Main Street drivers need to utilize the side streets and the municipal parking lot downtown. This will most likely require some walking to reach your destination, but at least it appears to be warming up finally so hopefully that won't be such a difficult proposition – maybe it will even be welcome after this winter.

We have seen cars attempting to drive down Main Street during the nighttime hours. The status of Main Street being closed is not determined by whether or not workers are present or the time of day, the road is closed until the project is completed.

The issue of most concern for the construction crews as well as residents is traffic over the bridge. The bridge is open to local traffic only; which has been defined as Village of Kewaskum residents. There is a large amount of daily traffic that goes over the bridge and we had to set certain parameters in order to decrease the traffic flow as much as possible without completely shutting down the bridge. Those of you who do not live within the village limits should be using other routes of travel. I understand the inconvenience and hardships this places on a lot of people who live just outside of the village; however we needed to have some tangible way to gauge who is 'local' and who is not. The more cars that

drive over the bridge on any given day increases the amount of work stoppage for the crews working there. Furthermore, I need to be concerned about the safety of the construction crews as well and the best way to keep them safe is to limit the traffic near them as much as possible.

Closing such a major artery in our village has forced traffic to be backed up in other locations as well, especially before and after school. I urge those of you bringing your children to school to give yourself more time, exercise patience, and try an alternate route if possible. From our schools there are four access points to Hwy 45 – First St, Second St, and two on Old Fond du Lac Road. Hopefully dispersing the traffic will help decrease the back up times.

I am confident that as this project moves along some issues will work themselves out as people become more accustomed to the road closure. We have already worked with the DOT to address some of the "kinks", such as the timing on the traffic lights on 45 and 28. We will continue to try and improve what is a difficult situation, but ultimately we are all going to be inconvenienced in some way and I will not be able to have solutions to all of the issues that arise from this project. I need to try and balance the needs of our residents, business owners, and the construction crews in an effort to keep this project moving on a specified timeline while respecting the needs of our community. It's not easy, but eventually this project will be completed and we will be able to enjoy a smooth ride from one side of the Village to another.

I look forward to meeting the voters of the remainder of the 6th District in the next months to persuade them to send me to represent them in our nation's capitol."

Petri, 73, has served in the sixth Congressional District since 1979. Prior to serving in Congress he was a member of the Wisconsin State Senate serving the 2nd District.

The sixth Congressional District includes the counties of Ozaukee, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Winnebago, Dodge, Green Lake, Manitowoc, Marquette, Columbia, Waushara and Milwaukee.

Grothman stated although he doesn't currently live in Petri's district, he intends to move to Campbellsport.

Information from Petri was not available at press time.





## Since his service days, Herriges stays clear of boat rides

Raynor Herriges' two-year stint in the U.S. Army took him to Fort Knox in Kentucky, Fort Sill, Oklahoma and then on to Germany where he served in the artillery on border control.

He didn't mind the two trips south. Going to Germany was another story for Herriges, one of the three members of the Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 384 honored recently for being a member of the organization for 50 years or more. Herriges hit the 60-year mark in the organization.

"We didn't fly in those days. We went by ship ... 17 days going over and 22 coming back," Herriges said recently. Since that trip, "I get sick when I see water. I don't go anywhere near any that's bigger than a bathtub."

To Herriges, the boat ride was a lot more dangerous than his assigned duty, although he did admit there were nights when "There was a lot of machine gun rattle" his group could hear.

Herriges nearly got drafted near the end of World War II, "but they stopped drafting then, so I was one of the first

ones when the Korean conflict broke out. They took me and Roger Hawig."

While the two entered the Army together in September 1950, Herriges said, "We never saw each other after that."

So it was off to basic training and advanced training for Herriges, for eight months, then he spent 16 months in Germany. He was with the 631st Artillery, which originally came out of Wiggins, Mississippi.

"We made \$56 a month to start out with," Herriges said, reporting those who were drafted with him didn't start out as privates, just recruits, but, "I ended up getting to be a corporal."

Herriges farmed with his father for many years before being drafted. He also worked for the Lomira Oil Company for a year and when he returned, he went back to his old job for a year before coming to Kewaskum where he started Herriges Oil.

Herriges had planned to settle down before he was drafted. He had already found the woman he wanted to marry, Patricia Hanrahan, and she faithfully waited for him the two years he was away.

"She wrote to me every

day," Herriges said about his late wife, indicating they were married the year after he got home.


Concerning the trip home, Herriges said he recalls when the announcement was made that his group was leaving.

"I said, 'I think I'm going to walk back.' Of course he had no choice and hopped onboard with the rest of the soldiers and managed to survive the trip, despite not eating for three or four days at a time.

Herriges said when you did eat, and the ocean was rough, there was the problem of food trays sliding up and down the dining tables and also of others nearby not being able to keep down their food. Needless to say, Herriges was happy to get back to Wisconsin and start his family and business on Fond du Lac Avenue, which is a landmark in the village.

He joined the Legion and maintained his membership since then, although he currently doesn't attend the meetings because of difficulties getting around.

And does Herriges think there is still a lot of patriotism in America? "I think so," he said, but, "Our patriotism guy

died recently ... Elmer Hallen."

Herriges said he is very proud to have served his country and proud to be honored by the Legion and

has the commemorative certificate on display in his recreation room.

"It's pretty nice," he said.

## 60th Anniversary



parts to match their new 'secret' idea.

"We're destined for more points this time," Shavlik said. "We really made it technical this time."

The Kitty Fighters of FES, coached by Chris Bolek, took the structural challenge. A structure less than 120 grams and no more than 9 1/2 inches tall had to be built and placed on a base and topped with a pressure board. The challenge was to see how much weight the structure could hold.

Fifth-grader Jada Straight, from the group said, "It makes you think about other people's ideas and not just your own." The team took sixth place.

WES team "Noah's Ark" took the structural challenge as well and at competition they learned their structure did not meet compliance and had an hour to modify to reduce it by 1/2 inch.

The students succeeded and the structure still held 135 pounds and placed fourth.

"That was impressive, because they really had to think on their feet," Heidi Williams, principal of WES, coach, and coordinator for DI in the district, said. "It was awesome for our first year out, because we competed against three other German-town teams who have been building structures for years."

The team from KES took the improvisational challenge and placed fifth. A WES team placed 10th with the scientific challenge. The rising star group of younger chil-

dren put on a circus.

During competition students see how other students solved the same problem, had different stories and created different structures, and see their not just their own competitors, but middle and high school.

All the fifths graders said they want to do it again according to Williams. Some children who saw it for the first time at a WES trial competition want to participate next year. DI will be offered to KMS students in the 2014/15 school year.

With all the interest from students, volunteers are needed to be coaches next school year. Coaches can be a parent, an educator, or anyone willing to keep the students on task without helping them. Since January, the teams practiced five hours a week split into two after school practices a week.

The Golden Owls are working every day after school to prepare for the state competition.

"The first year doing Destination Imagination, you can't prepare parents until they actually see it. You can't prepare coaches until they actually experience it. You have to experience it before you know what it is like," Williams said.

A lack of coaches postponed the Kewaskum teams from beginning practice until December while other schools had started as early as October. With more volunteers, Williams could support the coaches more in the future. "We're really hoping for more volunteers next year," Williams stated. "I think the enthusiasm will grow."

## Registration for fall begins at UW-WC

Registration for fall classes at UW-Washington County begins next week. New students who have applied and already been accepted, can register beginning Friday, April 11.

Returning students can register a few days earlier, with the date dependent on the number of completed credits. Students with 40 or more completed credits can register on Monday, April 7; 24+ credits on Tuesday, April 8; 12+ credits on Wednesday, April 9 and 0+ credits on Thursday, April 10. Registering early helps assure students to get in the classes that they need to complete their degree.

Beginning with the fall semester, students are no longer required to make a \$100 advance tuition deposit. A new Terms and Conditions (TAC)

process is replacing the deposit. Students will need to agree to the TAC for the fall semester before enrolling in a course at UW-WC. By clicking on the "I agree" button, students will be allowed to enroll in a class. The change was made throughout all of the UW Colleges as the deposit created a barrier to enrollment for some students. With removal of the advance deposit, that barrier is removed. Tuition remains low.

## Reicher gets to tour the bases on her first collegiate hit

It's not likely Jenny Reicher will ever forget her first hit as a collegiate softball player.

The former Kewaskum High ace, both on the mound and at the plate, smashed a home run in Concordia University's 5-4 loss to UW-Superior (in the Finlandia Dome, Marquette, MI.) March 1.


"I did think it was gone," Reicher said of the blast which cleared the fence in left-center, and she was quick to add, "I almost went back-to-back" as she hit a long fly ball that nearly cleared the wall in her next appearance.

For the season, Concordia is 12-10, including a 6-2 mark in the Northern Collegiate (NAC) Conference, and Reicher's statistics until April 1 were pretty impressive. She was batting a hefty .365, with 23 hits in 63 trips to the plate, 16 runs, eight doubles, eight RBIs (runs batted in).

For her efforts during the week of March 17-23, Reicher was named as the NAC's Position Player of the Week. During that period, while the Falcons were on their spring trip to Clermont, Florida, the Concordia rookie batted .455, going 10x22, with three doubles and three RBI. She scored one run and had one hit in each of the six games during that time.

The adjustment from high school to college hitting has not been a challenge for Reicher, who admits the collegiate game is "definitely a quicker game, and it's more competitive than high school." She started out batting sixth in the Falcons' order but has moved up to the more prominent No. 3 spot since there.

Reicher did need a little time to adjust her defensive game, mainly because she switched positions. Originally she was slated to be an outfielder, but after several games was

moved to the infield.

"I actually started in center field and I'm at shortstop now," Reicher said, adding, "I don't know if that's where I will be for the rest of the season."

Last week, the Falcons took conference games from Milwaukee School of Engineering and Alverno College. In the opener of the doubleheader versus Alverno, Reicher went 3x4, with a pair of doubles and a single.

On Sunday (April 6) Concordia split with host Madison Edgewood College (3-4 loss in 10 innings and 5-2 win) and Saturday split with Rockford University in games played in Mequon. The visitors won the first game 6-5 in 11 innings, but Concordia won the second game 6-0 on a two-hit pitching effort by Jamie Schuh. Reicher struggled a bit in the four games, going 0x7 versus Edgewood and 1x8, so her batting average dropped to .308.

Reicher said the trip to

Florida was very enjoyable.

"It (the weather) was beautiful. It was in the 70s and 80s," Reicher said, noting her parents and brother accompanied the team on the trip, as did many other families, so, "We had a lot of support."

Support has come from others as well.

"I have great coaches and great teammates," Reicher said, indicating the coaches have been pleased with the progress the Falcons have made from their initial games to now. "So far, I think they are happy with what we are doing," she said.

While at Concordia, Reicher is minoring in retail management and majoring in business management and majoring in her goal set on obtaining her MBA in business from the school.

The Falcons were slated to play a doubleheader versus Wisconsin Lutheran College April 9 and will travel to Fond du Lac Saturday to face Mari-University in games at noon and 2 p.m.

## A fast start for Debelak in Oshkosh

Sophomore Ellie Debelak came up big for the Kewaskum girls track team April 1 in the 37th annual Oshkosh High School Invitational held in Kolf field House on the UW-Oshkosh campus.

By jumping 15 feet, 11.5 inches (15-11.50) in the long jump, Debelak finished second, giving the Lady Indians their only eight points in the competition.

Waukesha Catholic Memorial won the team trophy after piling up 48 points, 12 more than runner-up Two Rivers (36). Kewaskum wound up tied for 26th overall.

"She is doing well," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said about his sophomore standout, who, March 28 won the 55-meter dash (7.95 after a 7.88 in prelims) and the long jump (16-05.5) and also took second in the 200 (29.7) in a JV Raider competition held at Sheboygan North that drew some very strong teams.

Debelak was an eyelash away from adding more points in the 60-meter dash in Oshkosh. Her time of 8.58 seconds was a mere 0.01 second away from qualifying for the finals, meaning she had the ninth best time in a field of 76 runners. Points were awarded to the top eight in each event.

Kewaskum had a couple

other near misses in the high jump where sophomores Kristina Lepp and Megan Ackartz tied for ninth place with five others after clearing 4 feet, 8 inches (4-8).

Jess Nurkula also had a good outing, going 8-0 in the pole vault, which put her in a tie for 10th place.

Other notable efforts came in the 4x200 relay where Debelak, Ackartz, Lepp and Abbey Reysen combined for a 1:56.62, good for ninth place and the 1,600 where Emily Krier placed 14th with a time of 5:41.16.

Both Kewaskum teams are scheduled to compete at Oostburg in the first outdoor meet of the year Friday, April 11.

Whenever the weather and the field conditions are favorable for the Kewaskum softball team, they will unleash their barrage of hits and lockdown defense on the two teams in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference they tried to keep up with last year.

With four seniors lost to graduation from the 2013 squad, the upperclassmen will have to set the example for the five freshmen and two sophomores on the varsity and keep the junior varsity fill-ins up to speed.

The Indians will contend for a conference title again this year and three of the nine juniors will lead the way. First team all-conference picks, outfielder Lindsay Winkler and catcher Melanie Juech along with honorable mention infielder McKenzie Rosenthal, will do their best to right the ship for a team that finished 12-7 overall and 9-5 in the league behind Waupun (13-1) and Plymouth (12-2).

"The goal is to compete for a conference title," Kewaskum coach Jeff Gosse said. It will be a tough hill to climb once again for the Indians. "There are three teams that we have to be aware of. Waupun is the favorite. Plymouth and Campbellsport (are the others)."

Kewaskum had the Cougars' number the last five years. They outscored their rivals to the north 52-16. "We beat them each time," Gosse said. "We beat them last year, the year before and the year before that. Three years ago we won our conference championship and we won it by sweeping Campbellsport at the end of the year."

That two-game sweep was important in the 2011 season because the Indians held a one-game lead over Waupun and needed to beat the Cougars twice to win it outright. They beat Campbellsport, 3-2, at home, May 24 and shut them out, 4-0, May 25, on the road. With a 10-2 conference record, the title was theirs.

Gosse is expecting a lot out of his three captains, Winkler, Juech and Rosenthal. The coach enters his thirteenth season with high hopes.

"They have to lead this year," he said. "The three girls are three-year varsity players. They're leaders already. They've taken the leadership role over and they had some great mentors from the seniors for the last couple of years. They understand expectations we have and they have to relay the expectations to all the younger players."

Every player on the Kewaskum roster will play a role in determining how far the team will go and the expectations also apply to the five freshmen and the two sophomores as well as any JV players who are called up to fill in the gaps.

"We use our JV squad as a minor league team," Gosse said. "When we have girls who are injured, they will move up. When we have girls who miss games due to vacation or other events, we'll move JV players up to varsity."

With a variety of Kewaskum girls playing for club softball teams, there's enough talent on the roster to compete and be one of the favorites in the conference.

"We have numerous girls that are playing club ball," Gosse said. "There will be two freshman players starting on varsity,

so they both are club team players. A couple of other girls are playing club ball. Five of our six pitchers are playing club ball. It's a great benefit for those kids on club teams to have access to gyms over the winter and they

can work on honing their craft during that time"

According to Gosse, the Indians will be aggressive on offense and fundamentally sound on defensive execution. He expects the players to pay

attention to game situations on the bases, at the plate and on the field. And if all according to plan, the green and white can hang another banner in the KHS Fieldhouse.
