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Washington County fighting back against opiate and heroin abuse

Last year opiates claimed 15 lives, whereas traffic fatalities claimed only six in Washington County.

In an effort to combat the rising heroin/opiate problem a Washington County Community Forum, sponsored by Elevate and Prevention Network of Washington County, was held May 6 at the West Bend High School Auditorium.

Jeff Wagner of 620 AM WTMJ moderated the event. The panel featured 11 people, including those in law enforcement, the medical profession, family members of addicts, and recovering addicts.

"We don't have just a heroin prob-

lem. Really what we have is an opiate problem," Detective Mark Sette of the Washington County Sheriff's Department, said.

Pat Strachota, state representative and panelist, started the informative forum.

"Since 1995, teens, ages 12-19, have increased use of heroin by 300 percent," she said. "Opiate related deaths have increased substantially in our state."

Even in a small village like Kewaskum, heroin is an issue on the rise.

"We've been dealing with this easily for nearly two years or better now," said Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop. "All of our other crimes

generally are drug related. Somebody has a habit and they have to get their fix for it by whatever means necessary."

Sette educated attendees at the forum about types of heroin, delivery methods, warnings signs and misconceptions.

Other speakers included Washington County public defender Barb Privat, public defender, who said 80 percent of her case load is related to heroin.

Mary Lewis, St. Joseph's Hospital emergency room medical director, said, "Almost every day I see a patient affected by heroin one way or another."

Smooth and routine are two words that could describe Monday's Kewaskum Board of Education meeting.

Meetings will return to a once-monthly format starting June 9.

Before regular board meetings, policy, building and grounds and finance committee meetings will be held.

Reimbursements for board-member technical support and phone calls will also be taken off the budget as of June 1.

Last year those reimbursements amounted to roughly \$1,500 annually, Board President Troy Hanson said.

Board members are already supplied with iPads.

"The cell phones and internet should be our own responsibility," Mary Miller said.

Hanson also announced board member appointments to the following committees: finance/transportation - chair, Jay Fisher, Sue Miller, Heather Oelhafen; policy - chair Mary Miller, Grace Mueller, Sue Miller; buildings and grounds - chair Jim Leister, Jay Fisher, Troy Hanson; CESA representative, Grace Mueller and WASB delegate, Mary Miller.

Recognition was given to Kewaskum grad and 3.96 GPA University of Wisconsin - Whitewater student Joey Paulus and Andrew Carlton, a student ambassador at Kewaskum Middle School who was chosen represent Wisconsin in July at Fuel to Play 60 in Texas.

Fuel to Play 60 is an in-school nutrition and activity program founded by the National Dairy Council and National Football League in collaboration with United States Department of Agriculture.

Deputy helps to return missing MI man

A Washington County Sheriff's deputy may be a hero to a Michigan woman after a deputy found her missing husband traveling on Highway 28 near Wolcott Dr last week.

According to the Sheriff's Office, a deputy came upon a 68-year-old male from Coopersville, MI shortly before 2 a.m. on Wednesday, May 7,

when he observed a car traveling at approximately 35 mph. The deputy stopped the car and noted the driver appeared to be confused and said he was on his way home and should be there in 10 minutes.

The driver said he was out looking for his dog and then taking the dog for a drive. He thought he was near his home

in Michigan. Upon investigation, the driver was a missing person from Michigan.

Phone contact with the man's wife who said her husband left around 5 p.m. to look for their dog and never came back. The wife advised their children would be picking up their father at St. Joseph's Hospital where he was admitted. The vehicle was towed and the dog was transported to the Humane Society.

In response to two contributions in The Statesman May 1, 2014 "Letters to the Editor/Community" about their KAA community softball program:

A word to the Kewaskum Athletic Association (KAA): If you have the players, find a coach! Exhaust all means, including calling every parent, especially the parents of the girls that would not be playing. Let those parents know of the situation. Once you cut some-

body from participating, there's a good chance that they might not try out again because of the stigma received: "I'm not good enough."

My story: Last year I had the opportunity to help coach a Waupun Girls Softball Association (WGSA) Juniors city team (girls having completed sixth and seventh grades). A seventh grader on that team caught my attention as she not only was displaying some excellent fielding and hitting skills, but she also had an excellent attitude. As I was also currently coaching a Waupun Eclipse team (Waupun's version of a travelling softball program), I asked her why she never had tried out to be on an Eclipse team. She said, "I did. You cut me."

As a fourth grader, she had tried out for Waupun's first 10U travelling team. That tryout had 26 fourth and fifth grade girls competing to make the team, 13 of them fourth graders. After being unsuccessful in finding a coach for a second team, I fielded 15 girls for our team, cutting 11 girls. One of those cut was the seventh grader I mentioned above. She continues to play on a WGSA city team, but never again tried out for the Eclipse. And I don't think any of the other 10 that were cut has tried out, either. I now try to remember that fielding players for a high school team begins at an early age!

A word to the two young girls that didn't make the team(s): WOW! And I quote from the first article: "We are allowed to practice, but we can't play in a game." The opportunity to develop as a softball player is waiting for you to take advantage! Go to those practices ready to learn. Be a sponge, absorbing everything that the coach is making available. Then go home and practice what you just learned.

Since your parents don't want to be your coach (quote: "KAA claims they couldn't find enough coaches to coach three teams."), ask them to play catch with you! Ask them to hit you some grounders! Ask them to pitch to you so that you can improve your batting skills! I promise you that at the next practice, the coach will see the improvement!

Brunner ends bid for assembly seat, supports Ramthun

The race for the soon to be vacated 59th District Assembly seat became smaller last week after candidate Mark Brunner of Kewaskum announced he was dropping out. Brunner added he will be supporting another local candidate, Tim Ramthun of Campbellsport.

"After entering the 59th Assembly race for the Republican nomination early in February, I have decided today to bow out early as well. I entered the race with the intention of winning the nomination in August, but have come to the difficult decision that it would not be God's will for me after all. My current workload and family obligations made raising the needed funds and spending the obligatory time campaigning very difficult," Brunner stated in a press release Wednesday, May 7.

Brunner also added, "I

am also pleased to announce that I will be supporting Tim Ramthun in his candidacy for the 59th Assembly District."

"I was deeply moved by the news and most humbled by the commitment of support and confidence from Mr. Brunner," stated Ramthun. "I see Mark as a critical part of my campaign going forward, all the way to Madison. His wealth of knowledge and many capabilities are too valuable to leave idle - he will continue to make a difference for the needs of the many with me," concluded Ramthun.

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The 59th District encompasses municipalities in Washington, Fond Du Lac, Sheboygan and Calumet counties.

Common Sense Citizens of Washington County will host a political forum for the public at West Bend Moose Lodge's upper level, Wednesday, May 28 at 7 p.m. Invited candidates include, Jesse Kramer, Ralph Prescott, Bill Savage, Ramthun and sixth Congressional candidate Glenn Grothman. The West Bend Moose Lodge is located at 1721 Chestnut St., West Bend.

The Republican Primary for the 59th District Assembly race will be held Tuesday, August 12 and the general election will be Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Her son has battled heroin addiction and she has attended funerals for other hospital staff that have lost family members due to heroin.

Diana Ciriacks has a son confined in prison, and she told her story. Her son started with marijuana his sophomore year in high school, but graduated to using inhalants, cocaine, opiates and several other drugs.

"The more we tried to spend time with him, the more he would distance himself," Ciriacks said.

Heroin doesn't discriminate. An addict isn't a junkie or a big city problem. "We've started to see some pills get through to high school students, which a little is concerning," Bishop said.

"The best solution to an opiate addiction is stopping it before it happens," Sette stated. This means education. A Washington County Heroin Task Force first met in March 2014 to discuss how to combat the rising opiate/heroin epidemic in Washington County. Shirley Miller, jail captain for the Washington County Sheriff's Department, stated, "Everyday we have heroin withdrawal going on in the population."

In efforts to educate the

community, the Heroin Task Force planned the community forum after success with similar forums in Fond du Lac, Ozaukee and Waukesha counties.

Ronna Corliss, county prevention coordinator, of Elevate said at the forum, "We will continue to meet until we see the change we are working toward. Tonight is only the first step to change."

The goal is to create action plans to address the four pillars of drug addiction: advocacy, prevention, treatment and enforcement. At the forum, Strachota spoke about the Heroin Opiate Prevention Education or H.O.P.E. legislation Governor Scott Walker signed April 7.

This legislation is designed to help both law enforcement and drug addicts fight the heroin epidemic. State Rep. John Nygren, R-Marinette authored the legislation after his daughter became addicted.

She is currently incarcerated because of her drug use.

According to the National Safety Council (NSC), the United States takes up only 4.6 percent of the world's population, but consumes 80 percent of the opiates and 99 percent of the world's hydrocodone an

opiate found in Vicodin.

"It's important when you're trying to educate the community to stress these medications need to be locked up. When finished using them bring them to the police station for disposal or take them to a drop off," Bishop said. In addition, just because a parent trusts his/her child, doesn't mean a friend can be.

Arrests involving heroin possession have been made in Kewaskum, but distributors of the drugs remain. "You arrest somebody to get them off the street, but somehow there is someone there to pick up that slack where they left off, so it is an ongoing battle," Bishop said.

Wagner awarded Elevate the Right Stuff Award for the forum. Wagner stated, "It was eye opening. Over 1,000 people attended. More communities need to be doing this. This is a problem people need to be aware of."


Prior meetings identified five key issues for youth: adult role models, consequences for actions, community events, limiting access to drugs and

Local snowboarders earn honors in Colorado

For three young Kewaskum snowboarders, spring break always seems to end up in the same place — Copper Mountain, CO.

It doesn't get old for Cayden and Rylie Dwyer or Ayrton Lehmann. Getting to Copper Mountain for the United States Snowboarding Association's Nationals is their annual goal and the trip was very productive for all three this year.

Rylie Dwyer, just 9 years old and a third-grader at Kewaskum Elementary School, made the medal stand in the Rail Jam, taking second place in the Grommet Girls Division.

Dwyer said she has no fear attempting tricks on the rails or in the other events, mainly because of her experience in the sport and the help she receives from her coaches.

"I think I started snowboarding when I was five," she said, adding, "I have two good coaches who help me, Brittany and Adam" whose last names she did not know.

Concerning which of her tricks helped her win the silver medal, Rylie said, "I did an Indy-grab" when coming off the box.

When she got back to school Rylie was treated as

if she had won an Olympic medal.

"They said 'Good job,'" Rylie remarked, and she was proud of the fact she also finished eighth overall in the Grommet group.

Lehmann, an eighth grader at Holy Trinity School, did the best of the three in overall competition, finishing sixth out of nine in the Breaker Boys division for boys 12 and 13.

While some like to specialize in one or two events, Lehmann competes in all five, and he qualified in all five for Nationals this year. His best events were the Rail Jam and the Slalom. He was 16th in both.

Slalom was the first of the races and Lehmann posted times 27.36 and 26.95., earning 865 points.

In the Rail Jam, the 16th was worth 610 points.

Slopestyle was another good event for Lehmann, who finished 19th out of 64 boarders with his score of 59.00, which comes from his time and points awarded by the judges for the jumps he does. He also made the upper half of the field in halfpipe, 25th out of 57th.

Bordercross was a bit of a challenge for Lehmann, who wound up 39th in that event.

"I think I'm getting better," Lehmann said last week, indicating this was his fourth year going to Nationals and, "This year ... and last were probably the most fun."

Looking at his results, Lehmann said his biggest im-

provement came "in the half-pipe and slopestyle events" adding, the snow was the best they have seen in recent years.

Concerning summer workouts, Lehmann said, "I try to get on a trampoline every once in a while but not as often as I should."

It was a year of adjustment for Cayden Dwyer, who moved up a division to Youth Men. The 15-year-old, who is being home schooled said the competition was "a lot harder," but he responded with an eighth place in the Rail Jam, an event he earned a third place medal in during the 2013 competition.

The event is scored on difficulty of the tricks, consistency and style and Dwyer decided to be as consistent as he could while limiting his big tricks.

"I did one big trick on the down rail ... a back 270 on and a 270 off," Dwyer said, adding, "I also did a 360 over the very big 'bonk.' I don't think anyone else did a 360."


All this after part of his binding broke in the prelims causing Dwyer to think he hadn't made the finals.

"It was pretty crazy," he said.

As far as the rest of the events, "Dwyer said, "I didn't do so hot in the other events," indicating he is more of a specialist in Rail Jam and slopestyle."

That didn't keep him from having a good time, however. "I had a blast," he said, adding, "I was proud of my sister. She did excellent."





KHS kickers pick up two more victories

It was a case of more "feasting" for Kewaskum's soccer team last week.

The Lady Indians started off with a 6-0 shellacking over Brown Deer Monday (May 5) and three days later secured a season sweep over Eastern Wisconsin Conference foe Waupun with a hard-fought 1-0 victory.

Those two decisions give Kewaskum a mark of 3-2-1 in the EWC and 8-4-1 overall.

"We won but it was a close 1-0," KHS coach Luke Piwoni said after returning from Waupun. We had over 20 shots on goal. Their keeper had 17 or 18 saves, and most of them were very difficult," Piwoni said. "She (Jenna Hilt) kept them in the game."

Jeray Riffel scored the lone goal unassisted. It came in the 14th minute. Piwoni said Riffel ran down a loose ball, got past a defender and when the keeper came out, drilled the ball past her into the net. This was Riffel's 16th goal of the year.

Concerning Waupun's shots, Piwoni said, "They had

a couple of chances," but most of the time, the Indians were controlling the ball.

Waupun's keeper punted several balls all the way to the 18-yard line, with KHS' keeper, Maddy Longdin, running them down and starting offensive surges again.

Defensively, Piwoni cited Hailey Herges and Kaila Kirst for good plays, adding, "I thought Heather May played a nice physical game ... We really needed that."

Against the visiting Brown Deer Falcons, Kewaskum scored two, first-half goals, and near the end of the game exploded for four more to secure the victory.

Junior Becca Strigenz beat the Falcon keeper for goal No. 1 which came in the 13th minute. Lizzy Bauer was credited with the assist.

Three minutes later, it was Maddy Longdin finding paydirt after Jeray Riffel put the ball in scoring position.

For the next 50 minutes, the scoreboard stayed at 2-0 but then the Indians went on perhaps their biggest scoring spree of the season.

At 68 minutes, Riffel scored her 15th goal of the

year, and just a little over a minute later, Strigenz tallied her second of the afternoon, then three minutes later Bauer got into the scoring act, and finally Strigenz earned the three-goal "hat trick" with a score in the 76th minute.



Rough start for Lady batters

It was a rough start for the Kewaskum softball team in their first two games of the season. They've since moved on and improved.

Playing against conference opponents and losing both by an average margin of seven and-a-half runs (a 10-run loss to Waupun and a five-run defeat to Plymouth), the Indians regrouped and won four in a row in nonconference wins at Slinger (3-2) and Random Lake (10-4) and a doubleheader sweep at home against Kiel (7-2 and 15-4).

Splitting their last four games (losses to Wrightstown and Waupun and wins over Rosholt and Plymouth) brought Kewaskum's record last week to 6-4 so far and 3-3 in the conference. Inexperience and lineup shuffling contributed to some of the early struggles.

"We're young," said Kewaskum coach Jeff Gosse. "We had players missing. We had to work through a lot. A lot of the inexperience was on the ball diamond and we took our lumps."

During the Indians' four-game win streak, they outscored their opponents 35-12, a 23-run advantage and averaged 8.9 runs a game. After the young ladies got over the hump, they played better as a team and, according to Gosse, are showing signs of putting it together while

he threw the underclassmen into the fire of varsity competition.

"Now we're sort of settled in," he said. "The younger players are getting experience and they're starting to understand how fast the game is up to varsity. We have players that fell back into the positions they were to be playing in. We're starting to play some good ball now."

Freshman Breanna Trepes leads the Indians with a .458 average. Her on-base percentage is one of the highest on the team at .581 and her slugging percentage is .417 and those numbers are among team leaders with at least 20 at-bats. She has 11 hits and her four doubles are tops for the Indians.

Abby Weinert is one of two players with 30 at-bats along with Melanie Juech, one of the tri-captains. Weinert leads Kewaskum in hits with 12 and has a .400 average. Juech is productive. She's tied for third on the team in base hits with eight and is one of two players on the squad with a home run, even though her .267 average hurts her OBP (.312) and slugging percentage (.300).

The Indians have six players who scored at least five runs this season. Trepes (10), Maddy Lehman (10) and Lindsay Winkler (13) are posting double digits in total bases.

One thing that Kewaskum had to work out earlier in the season was establishing team chemistry and it had to start

with the juniors since there's no senior leadership.

"The juniors are starting to come on their own as leaders," Gosse said. "The younger kids are starting to figure it out more. We're a lot more focused. The girls are starting to understand that they have to come to the game with a businesslike attitude."

The responsibilities of the junior captains in Winkler, Juech and McKenzie Rosenthal to get the rest of their teammates on the same page wore them down a bit.

"The leadership was kind of thrust upon them," Gosse said. "They're learning and they're coming into their own. It was not what I expected. I thought we would be better off than we are right now but we had to deal with a lot of different things this season so far. We've weathered the storm and now hopefully we come out of it."
