Scholarship awards help Kewaskum students fulfill college dreams

For some students, a college education is in their future, but college expenses are real obstacles they must face to make their dream a reality. Scholarships were awarded to Kewaskum students to support their future endeavors last week.

Bill Lickel, KHS science educator, was Master of Ceremonies. "We appreciate greatly the efforts of the people here onstage and others that has made these awards and scholarships possible," he said.

Kevin Etta and Olivia Krautkramer each got \$9,000 for their academic excellence of having the highest GPA. Jason Piittmann, athletic director and physical education educator, awarded the WIAA (Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association) Scholar Athlete awards to Andrew Buelow and Stephanie Henk.

Local scholarships began with Sharon Reichert presenting the J.O.

Reigle scholarships established in 1963 to Kevin Etta and Olivia Krautkramer.

"We had a very impressive group of young adults apply for the scholarships," Reichert stated. "All of you here students, parents, and teachers can be very proud of their achievements."

Jerry Gosa, Kewaskum Education Youth Scholarships Inc. (KEYS) president, announced KEYS Scholarship winners. The first scholarship was awarded in 1985 for \$500 and this year, 37 scholarships totaling \$105,000 were given. A total of 1.3 million has been awarded since 1985 for more than 450 grads of KHS.

"I would like to thank all the people that live in the community here, civic organizations and area businesses that have made all the contributions that make these scholarships possible," Gosa stated.

The largest scholarship was the

Tessar for \$16,000 awarded to Allyson Otten. She plans to go to University of Denver and majoring in psychology and criminology.

Oscar C. & Augusta Schlegel scholarship for \$12,000 was awarded to Cassidy Enright. She plans to go St. Norbert's college and major in biology for the pre dentistry program.

Among some of the other recipients was Emily Huiras, who received an \$8,000 scholarship by James and Ella Andre. She plans on attending Wisconsin Lutheran for nursing. The process of applying of scholarships was "a little nerve racking," but "wasn't that hard."

Though she has not participated in the KEYS run in the past, she hopes to come back this year to participate.

Kayla Oelhafen was awarded \$4,000 by the John Schmitt Memorial

WES principal announces resignation

Her resignation with the Kewaskum School District is effective June 11.

Williams has held the position of Wayne Elementary principal since the beginning of the 2013-14 school year after the former principal, John Platais, became full-time director of Educational Technology for the Kewaskum School District.

In addition to her role as principal, Williams is also the grade 6-12 intervention coach, K-12 gifted and talented coordinator and the coordinator for the district's new K-12 Destination Imagination program.

Williams said she has accepted a position as principal at Heyer Elementary School in Waukesha. She is



committed to working with Wayne's administrative team to ensure a smooth transition for everyone involved, Williams said.

The district has developed a transition plan for Wayne's 2014-15 school year, which includes having an on-site administrator at the elementary school 100 percent of the time. Tom Fischer will take over as acting principal of Wayne and will spend 20 percent of his time there, Williams said.

Fischer is, and will continue to be, the principal of Farmington Elementary School, a position he's held for the last 1 1/2 years.

Fischer, who said he focuses on open communication and student learning, has been an administrator

for nine years at both the high school and elementary level.

Joel Dzedzic will become the director of Next Generation Learning. Dzedzic has spent his entire teaching career in the Kewaskum School District and has worked as a middle school teacher, a high school interim associate principal, as well as a K-5 intervention coach, eSchool coordinator and alternative high school facilitator.

The charter school in Kewaskum is still something that Williams is rooting for, she said.

"I'm excited about the prospect of Kewaskum getting charter schools grants," Williams said. "I really hope they get it."

KHS math teacher, wife use online fundraising for dream of adoption

Mike and Shannon Hendricks received a special photo in the mail last month, a sonogram of the baby they had recently been told to expect. After doctors informed them they could not have children, the adoption process was started, with unexpected surprises.

They researched several agencies before deciding on Adoption Network Law Center (ANLC) out of California. After learning about the adoption costs to total around \$30,000, the couple created a fundraising website, on advice by ANLC, to help with the costs.

Mike is math instructor at Kewaskum High School, and Shannon is a homemaker. They have been married for five years and have two dogs. All they want now is a family.

Other options to help cover costs were considered. "We've talked about it with people from school about a possible, some sort of fundraiser, but it is only in the talking stage," Mike stated with Shannon adding, "Feel free to give us any ideas. We're not

opposed to anything." Their fundraising effort began on Jan. 25 and has raised \$1,090. But just after two weeks, the couple was told a match between them and a birthmother in Wisconsin had been made.

"We're trying to wrap our heads around it. Our lives are going to change completely. It is great and wonderful, but instead of nine months, we had 7 weeks," Shannon said.

After the shock of finding out a match had been made so quickly, the couple took out a loan to cover the costs.

"We wanted to borrow it because we didn't want to lose the opportunity. It isn't that adoption is all about money, but they got to get paid," Shannon said.

Now fundraising efforts will be used to offset the cost of the loan or toward a different adoption if the birthmother changes her mind in the first thirty days.

Early in April, the child was born, so the waiting begins. After thirty days, the Hendricks will be foster parents for six months until November when

a court case will deem them the child's legal parents.

"If this one doesn't work we will find another option as they [ANLC] would find another one for us," Mike said.

Both of their mothers, first time grandmothers, "have been pretty amazing" helping prepare the nursery themed Noah's Ark.

"It's crazy how everything worked out," Mike stated.



Marsh excavation east of Kewaskum is ongoing and a second utility crew is completing work west of the Milwaukee River.

A seven-day closure is planned for June 2-9 at the intersection of highways 45 and 28. This closure will allow for sanitary sewer, water main and signal work in the intersection.

Around the first week of June, mass grading to the east of Kewaskum will begin. Temporary one-way signals were slated to be installed at the bridge on May 16 and bridgework started.

Work on the bridge will continue until Labor Day weekend. Storm sewer work west of the river will begin by May 19 and be about two weeks duration.

Sanitary sewer, water main and storm sewer work east of the Milwaukee River was completed on May 14.

Progress on all work along the route is weather dependent.

Army days still vivid for Gudex Memorial Day programs to be held locally

As a young boy growing up on a farm near Campbellsport, Norman Gudex never dreamed he would get to Germany, but he did, thanks to the U.S. Army.

It's not quite like the song says, "A vacation in the foreign land; Uncle Sam does the best he can; You're in the army now, you're in the army... now," but Gudex, got a trip to Europe, and he was paid for going.

Recently, Gudex was one of three men honored for being a member of the Robert G. Romain American Legion Post 384 for 50 years.

"I was drafted," Gudex said, reporting his first stop in 1953 was at Fort Leonard Wood in Missouri where he received his basic training and specialized training to become a member of the 18th Infantry's First Division.

"They called it the Bloody

One," Gudex, who now lives in West Bend, said of his group, which was sent to a base near Aschaffenburg, Germany. "This was the headquarters for the 18th Infantry."

Gudex spent 18 months in Germany, and luckily was never involved in any real dangerous situations but their mission was still very important. Most of the time, "We were patrolling the ammunition station... We had to guard that," he said.

When Gudex came home in 1955, he jumped back into civilian life, married and raised a family that included two sons. To support his family, he first worked at the Rockfield Canning Company, and after that closed, got a job with the Town of Germantown. In 1964, the Village of Germantown hired Gudex, and, "I worked there for 36 years."

Gudex never forgot his time in the service and some of the men he served with. "I had a lot of good friends over

there (Germany)," Gudex said, indicating three of his best friends lived fairly close to West Bend, in Port Washington, Saukville and Grafton.

"I kept in contact with them" for years, Gudex said, indicating all three are now deceased.

As far as his association with the Legion, Gudex first joined groups in Milwaukee and Germantown, and, "Then when I moved to West Bend, I transferred to Kewaskum" where he once served as the chaplain.

The past several months Gudex hasn't been as active as he once was, mainly because he has been helping a relative who has run into employment and housing difficulties.

"I want to try to get back," Gudex said, referring to the regular Monday meeting. "I miss it," he said, indicating he wants to renew some past friendships.

Concerning the current patriotism in America, Gudex, now 83, feels it is still very strong, but he does have a bit of beef with some politicians. "I just hate how Washington is taking care of the disabled veterans. I don't like that. After all, they served their Country and I'm proud of them."

Gudex was very happy to receive his 50-year award from the Legion, which he has on display in his living room. He recalls the reaction of his son when he first saw the award. "My son said, 'Dad, is that ever beautiful!'"

"I didn't remember any of it," said Matthew Ringwyl looking at a small stuffed white tiger. His letter to his future self was still legible, but he didn't want to know what he wrote.

Unclaimed bags included Bryane Wolf, Cody Peters, Reid Stettler, Rodney Leep, Max Maertz and Marissa Dorzok.

Sadly one unclaimed bag was for a classmate who had been adopted and had

changed her name. No one knows what happened to Cali Weiley. Among her items were a journal and two books: Nancy Drew, "The Puzzle at Pineview School" and "The Hungry Thing."


The greatest treasure found was Polly the parrot to which found its way into a student who had a clean desk.

50 Years Ago

December 13, 1963

stayed overnight with friends in Madison. Mr. Rose became ill and was taken to Madison General Hospital where everything possible was done to save his life, but to no avail and he passed away early in the afternoon.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Roger Kudek, West Bend, on December 6. Bruce were born to Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Muckerheide, West Bend, on December 11 and to Mr. and Mrs. David Jung, Route 1, Kewaskum, December 8.

It is about 30 feet tall and is illuminated with approximately 125 red and green lights.

A memorial scholarship is being established in memory of the late Clifford M. Rose, who served as teacher, high school principal, and superintendent of schools in Kewaskum over 30 years.

The balance, or 89¢, goes to the state, county and schools as shown: The state's share is \$.01; the county's share is \$.20; the school's share is \$.68 and the village's share is \$.11.



Opportunity to advance to third stolen by Cougars

There was an opportunity to move into the third place slot within the Eastern Wisconsin Conference last week, but Kewaskum's softball team was not able to take advantage.

The Indians won eight games in a row before they played their nearby rivals with a chance to improve on their position.

Campbellsport is no longer an easy win as they are on track to win the conference title. The Cougars made sure the Indians didn't assume it would be another cakewalk at their place in a doubleheader May 15.

The Indians needed a split or a sweep to take over sole possession of third in the EWC.

"We thought we could get

the win or two wins out of the series so we could move up in the standings," Kewaskum coach Jeff Gosse said. "Mathematically, we were still in the race for the conference title. A loss (in the first Campbellsport game) took all of our hopes of that away and we're going to be looking down at sitting in fourth place."

Both Kewaskum and Plymouth had the same conference wins ending last weekend but the Panthers were 7-4 and the Indians 7-5, putting them a half game back. Both teams split their season series. Instead of winning one or both games against Campbellsport, they lost 3-1 in the first game and 15-8 in the second.

"The first game we played well," Gosse said. "After a disappointing loss, it was hard to rebound for the second game, and that was a letdown. The

girls realized that the chances for the conference title was gone and there was a letdown afterwards and it showed (in the second game)."

Both games at Campbellsport were played at Columbus Park instead of the elementary school. The field conditions were unkind to both teams.

"It was different," Gosse said. "It was the much deeper diamond than we're used to playing on. It took some adjustment by both teams. The wind was really carrying out, so there were a lot of fly balls hit and a lot of doubles in that game."

Gosse rested some of his varsity players and gave playing time to the JV members in the May 17 Waupun Invite. The Indians were defeated by Wisconsin Lutheran 7-1 and future conference member

Winneconne 15-8 and beat Laconia 12-2 to go 1-2.

"We gave a lot of the younger kids a look at (varsity competition)," Gosse said. "We played a very good pitcher from Wisconsin Lutheran, so I thought it was a good opportunity to give some of the varsity girls a little rest and take a look at some of the younger girls to see what they could do against a really good pitcher; to take a look at what we can expect from them in the future."

On May 19 the Indians played a doubleheader at Sheboygan Falls, one of which was a makeup game. If it were up to Gosse, he would prefer to play those games at Kewaskum Kiwanis Park instead of an hour north because KKCP has lights.

"I can understand why

(Falls) wants to have the games," he said. "I have no problem with that. Our diamonds have lights, theirs don't. We got to rush to get those two in (before it gets dark)."

Gosse and other coaches he talked to wished the spring softball season started a little later and ended somewhere in June because weather conditions would have been more favorable, but that's wishful thinking. He said his team played about 16 games in the last two weeks, so it made sense to play some girls from the JV to rest his varsity that he will need to count on in the postseason.

The Indians have a first round bye as the No. 2 seed in their regional and will play the winner of Grafton and Brown Deer May 27.

Track teams struggle in team events

Depth is the key to doing well in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays, and depth is one thing Kewaskum's track teams do not have.

Try as they might the Indians could not keep up with the likes of Plymouth and Sheboygan Falls, who won the boys' and girls' titles May 13. Plymouth nipped New Holstein 97-96 for the boys' crown while the Indians used a win in the high jump to finish seventh with 48 points.

Sheboygan Falls piled up 116 points in the girls' competition and the Lady Indians were sixth with 53.50.

Jessica Nurkala, Sarah Kosterman and Amanda Plachinski took home gold medals for winning the pole vault, with a combined 22 feet (22-0). Nurkala cleared 8-6, while Kosterman went more than 7-6 and Plachinski made 6-0.

KHS also posted a second in the 800 sprint medley relay with Ellie Debelak, Kosterman, Natala Luedtke and Abby Reysen turning in a time of 2:1.49.

Next best were a pair of thirds, coming in the high jump and the 4x400 relay. In the high jump Kristina Lepp and Megan Ackatz cleared 4-6 and 4-4 while Abby Ashauer made 3-10 for a total of 12-8.

In the relay, it was Debelak, Luedtke, Lepp and Reysen carrying the baton for a time of 4:24.66.

The hurdles also had a good outing, claiming a fourth place in the 300 shuttle. Lepp, Ashauer and Dinara Beth were the runners in the event in which each girl runs 100 hurdles.

The boys' best effort came in the high jump, led by sophomore Jason Hanson who cleared 6-3. Hanson's younger

brother Brady helped out with a leap of 5-8 and Charlie Witek made 5-06.

The sprinters had another good outing. The quartet of Gavin Schreier, Brandon Mikolajczak, Ben Witek and Brandon Thull combined forces for a time of 46.76 in the 4x100 relay, good for second place. Schreier, Brady Hanson, Derrek Brock and Mikolajczak were clocked in 1:37.69 in the 4x200, earning a third place, while the sprint medley foursome of Thull, Mikolajczak, Christian Bocher and Witek covered the two laps in 1:41.16, the fourth fastest time in the event.

At the annual Vanderpan Invitational Plymouth won both ends of the meet, with the boys piling up 177.5 points and the girls 159, five points ahead of Sheboygan Falls.

Kewaskum's boys hit 64 points. Thull had the Indians' lone first place coming in the long jump where his best leap was 18-09.

Jason Hanson went 6-3.5 in the high jump for second place and a third place was claimed by the 4x200 relay comprised of Schreier, Mikolajczak, Brock and Bocher, who posted a time of 1:39.82.

The Lady Indians earned 56.5 points, with 15 of those points coming in the pole vault where Nurkala finished first (8-6) and Kosterman (7-0).

Debelak raced to a time of 13.76 in the 100-meter dash, good for second overall. Reysen also had an excellent 400 race, hitting the finish line in 64.41, and the 4x200 relay (Halley Kleinhans, Ackatz, Lepp and Kosterman), 1:57.31.

Kewaskum will be at the Division 2 regional hosted by North Fond du Lac Tuesday, May 27.
