Mueller resigns from Board

Kewaskum Board of Education member Grace Mueller has resigned according to information released from the Kewaskum School District.

After speaking with legal counsel Superintendent of Kewaskum Schools Jim Smasal released the following statement Tuesday, "Grace Mueller has informed the School District that she is ending her association with the Kewaskum School Board."

It is unknown when the resignation becomes effective or when the district received her notice of resignation. The Statesman has requested a copy of the resignation.

Mueller was in the end of her first term on the board. She was elected in April, 2012. She won a seat alongside board member Jim Leister. The pair unseated Stephen Jensen in a primary and then board president Bruce Braidigan.

Smasal also stated, "Anyone interested in fulfilling the final 10 months of her term can send a letter of interest and any other materials they feel would be of value to their candidacy to the School District Office, Attention Jeanne Jacak by June 13."

Board members will review the applications, and may interview any applicants who they feel would be best qualified to fulfill Board member duties.

Mueller was asked to comment but did not return a call placed to her on Tuesday.

Community begins a conversation about taking steps to better Kewaskum

Community members took to heart to old adage of "it takes a village to raise a child," at the KHS library May 20. With the aid of a federal grant, Kewaskum Cares about Kids (KCK) held a Community Conversation to help Kewaskum start little changes to make positive impact for the youth in the community.

Linda Dymond of Elevate Community Resource Center and KCK member said, "In all the years I have been in the AODA, some things have gotten better. Tobacco. Less kids are smoking. Alcohol and binge drinking is going down with our teens, but the flip side of that is the scarier things we are seeing."

These things include marijuana use, prescription drug use, snorting of

pill and trying heroin.

A group of four teens from the Peers for Peers group at Kewaskum High School stated they knew someone who used marijuana.

When Dymond prompted the audience for show of hands who knew someone with a heroin addiction, many hands were in the air.

"We are not immune here," Dymond stated. "Everything in the big city is right here in Kewaskum."

Detective Mark Sette of the Washington County Sheriff's Department spoke about the rising opiate and heroin problem including overdoses

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop presented the numbers of tickets given in Kewaskum in the past year. A total of 22 tickets were issued for possession of drug paraphernalia for example. Other tickets included possession of mushrooms, cocaine,

THC, and possession of controlled substance near a school.

There have been two arrests for keeper of a drug house.

"We see a lot of it. It's in Kewaskum," Bishop said. To further add to the point, he added when Sette spoke of heroin users, he thought of 10 people in 10 seconds he knew abused the drug.

"When you go to meetings like this you find out how prevalent and easily accessible these things are," Kewaskum School District Superintendent Jim Smasal said. "It makes you shutter. It's hard to fathom how easy it can be."

But the community conversation was not just about drugs. Other high risk activities affecting youth were discussed including truancy, sexual

Korean War Veterans honored in Fillmore

"There is no starker image of the value of freedom and democracy verses dictatorship

than the 38th parallel, an invisible line that today separates the North from the South," Victor Shier said about the Korean War. Shier and Jim Dieringer

led the Memorial Day Ceremony at Turner Hall in Fillmore to honor those who fought in the Korean War.

After the Presentation of the Colors, and the Kewaskum High School Marching Band playing the national anthem, Dieringer welcomed a packed Turner Hall. "There are many of them who lost their lives just so we could be free," he said.

In the Korean War, 132,000 came from Wisconsin, 8,001 reported dead, 4,286 wounded, 111 prisoners of war (POW) with half dying in POW camps, and 84 listed as missing in action (MIA).

On a table laid an article from the Tomahawk Leader about Einar Ingman who received the Medal of Honor for "indomitable courage, extraordinary heroism and superb leadership "for taking over the two machine guns that pinned down his company.

Bernice Wendel's late husband, Allan, served in the war. She submitted photos to Farmington Historical Society that he had taken during the war to include in the program. In her hands, she held a letter he had written. She still has all the letters he wrote.

She and Allan had only been married three years, when he had been drafted. "It was like the end of our life at that time. We were immediately separated," Wendel said.

Don Herriges, a Korean Veteran, said during the recognition of Veterans: "We were all hoping we'd make it, and here I am standing."

Dan Ebert never fought in Korea. He was a mechanic, in Japan, working on cargo planes to move troops and supplies to Korea.

"I was lucky enough to escape a hand grenade blast otherwise I would be gone," Richard Herriges, in the army for heavy artillery, said. "It was a whole lot of fighting going on when I was over."

One by one Korean War Veterans stood and told their stories. The audience hung on every word they said and followed with a round of applause.

Following the ceremony, the Honor Guard led veterans and guests outside. After a 21 gun salute and KHS Band member, Kenny Ellis, played taps, attendees were asked to pick a flower from a wreath to place on a veteran's grave.

Meanwhile Ebert tolled the bell 67 times. One for each of those vets "who found their resting place here."

From the young and old, attendees lined up to pick a flower. Multiple flowers laid on graves, some for remembrance, some for respect, but all for honor.

Ann Enright of the Farmington Historical Society stated the flowers were "to follow the tradition of school children and to do something in our own little community. We can't give too much honor."

School District hires outside firm for new staff salary schedule

Kewaskum School District staff could soon be working under a new compensation model meant to attract and keep quality instructors. The district approved the hiring of an independent firm to assist in developing a new salary schedule for staff.

The Board of Education will hire Waukesha-based MRA, a not-for-profit employers association that will help the district build a new salary schedule from the ground up for teachers in the district. The process is expected to last about a year.

The district also reviewed a proposal from Verisight of Milwaukee with offices throughout the United States. At the April 28 board meeting District Administrator Jim Smasal stated district staff followed up on references for both companies. Nothing negative was found for either company, however it was made clear that MRA offered a more hands on approach of gathering and providing information while Verisight relied heavily on district staff to complete the process.

The board at that meeting authorized spending up to \$25,000 on the compensation model work. Hiring MRA was approved on a 6-1 vote with Grace Mueller voting no.

After spending the \$25,000 the Board may or may not approve additional work from MRA. MRA is paid per hour on a floating scale based on work they complete.

At the meeting Board Member Heather Oelhafen wanted to see MRA working on a salary

model for support staff. She was told that once a compensation package for teachers was complete, the district could work internally on a plan for support staff based off MRA's plan.

"MRA will compile requests from staff, administration, the community and the School Board itself to generate a fair compensation model," said Kim Longdin, a teacher and union president for the Kewaskum School District.

It is believed MRA will offer a non-biased perspective while encouraging staff participation. By seeking stakeholder input, distributing surveys, compiling data, creating potential compensation models, seeking feedback and adjusting to suggestions, MRA will help the district build a compensation model that everyone is satisfied with, according to MRA.

Hiring outside help is crucial for the district, Longdin said. It could be too challenging for staff, administration and board members to find the time to work on it, especially since no one has experience in creating a salary schedule, she said.

Having the ability to move forward with a new model is thanks to Act 10, Longdin said. The act, which took effect in June 2011, states that districts are no longer obligated to maintain the "step and lane compensation" that was once required. In the former model, the steps represented years of experience, while the lanes indicated an increase in professional education, such as the number of credits teachers obtained toward renewing their license or obtaining a master's degree.

That model is no longer sus-

tainable due to a steady decline in district funding, Longdin said. The old schedule was also unclear, and that's something that has to change, she said.

The new compensation model will clearly let teachers know how they can obtain salary increases, Longdin said. A set of clear salary guidelines could potentially help attract and retain high-quality educators.

That schedule should be clear and precise - not vague and ambiguous, Longdin said.

"This component within Kewaskum School District has been missing for several years," Longdin added. "Teachers have been stuck. Right now, realistically, the bulk of KSD's teachers have been frozen for four years. The cost of living obviously doesn't decrease, so financially there have been struggles for many educators and their families."

That stuck feeling can ultimately lead to experienced teachers leaving, she said. Instead of staying in the Kewaskum district, they leave to teach in another area, which usually either hires at a higher wage or has a clear-cut process for salary advancement, Longdin said.

Longdin said she's hopeful for an end product that will satisfy teachers, administrators, parents and the public.

"I hope working together to create a salary schedule that makes our district attractive to educators and honors experienced Kewaskum staff builds a bridge between administration and staff," she said.

West Bend man killed in Scott crash

A 22-year-old West Bend man is dead and two others were injured in a drunken crash early Saturday morning, May 24, in the Town of Scott.

The crash occurred around 1:10 a.m. according to reports from the Sheboygan County Sheriff's Department on Cranberry Road near the County Highway D intersection. Sgt. Brad Jorsch stated it was believed the driver was traveling in excess of the posted speed limit.

The driver, Christopher J. Goneau, was flighted from the scene after rescue workers freed him from his vehicle. He died later that morning at Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee.

Passengers included a 21-year-old Jackson man who was ejected and trapped under a tree that was struck by the vehicle. He was transported via Flight for Life Helicopter to Froedtert Hospital with serious injuries. A 21-year-old West Bend man sustained moderate injuries and was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend.

Assisting at the scene were Beechwood and Batavia Fire Departments, Batavia First Responders, Random Lake Fire Department Jaws of Life and ambulance, Plymouth and Kewaskum ambulances and Flight for Life of Fond du Lac and Milwaukee.



Large turnout for river clean-up





Highway 28 Weekly Update

Construction activity resumed after the Memorial Day weekend.

Sanitary sewer, water main, and storm sewer work east of the Milwaukee River was completed on May 14, but marsh excavation east of Kewaskum still ongoing.

A second utility crew is completing work to the west of the Milwaukee River. Storm sewer work west of the river was expected to begin May 19 and last for about two weeks.

Temporary one-way signals were installed at the bridge and bridge work began. The expected completion date for that work is Labor Day weekend.

A seven-day closure of Highway 45 at Highway 28 is expected to begin June 2. During that closure sanitary sewer, water main and traffic signal work will be performed at the intersection.

When the intersection reopens June 9, Highway 45 will have stop signs controlling traffic until new signals can be placed.

activity and suicide.

"We need to pay attention to what is going on in the community," Dymond said.

Kewaskum is thriving in certain areas. Students do place high value in helping others. Kewaskum gives youth leadership opportunities.

The flip side is 15 percent of juniors have shoplifted, 12 percent of freshmen have carried a weapon to school, and 14 percent of juniors have attempted suicide.

Participants of the forum separated into five groups determined from data collected at the last meeting: access, education, community events, consequences and adult role models. After 20 minutes of discussion, each group talked about possible, small ideas to implement change in the community to provide youth a more positive environment.

Such ideas included to start a positive shoutout in the schools, and educating youth about mental health issues.

Each group will meet throughout the summer to determine an action plan and goal with the hope of implementation in the fall.

"It was an eye opener. It was worse than I thought," Laurie Beimborn, district volunteer director, stated after the meeting. "We got to come up with a way to help them."

On the district level, Smasal stated, "Whatever falls under that umbrella with the school system, we have to make a commitment to the students to try to work with them on it."

But for the participants of the community conversation, the work has only begun. "We're going to take our community back," Dymond said.





Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office and at the Municipal Building on May 1, 2014. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to approve the minutes from the April 21, 2014 meeting, second by Dave Spenner. Voice vote, motion carried.

President Pesch opened the public hearing on the Class "B" Retail Fermented Malt Beverage and "Class B" Retail Intoxicating Liquor License to Bootleggerz Saloon, Bootleggerz Saloon LLC, Agent Cheryl Denning, 215 Main Street, Kewaskum for the period of May 6, 2014 to June 30, 2014. No public comments were received.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to close the Public Hearing, second by Dave Zehren, carried by roll call vote. Laubach-aye, Knoebel-aye, Zehren-aye, Pesch-aye, Spenner-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0)

President Pesch also opened the public hearing to levy special assessments upon property located on Main Street for special benefits conferred upon such property by the improvements of the sanitary sewer laterals according to specifications contained in Chapter 94 "Utilities" of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum. Administrator Heiser provided the history of the Main Street project. The project was initially proposed to only replace the sewer main between Fond du Lac Avenue and Railroad Street and the Board anticipated special assessments for sanitary sewer laterals at that time. When the project expanded in April 2013 to include all sanitary sewer main along the project route the Board still anticipated special assessments for the sanitary sewer laterals. Mike Berger, 417 Main St., if the village would pay for the sewer laterals to property owners

it would increase the water and sewer fees for all users.

Bonne Zanow, 745 Main St., In the engineer's report the Moraine Condo Association was listed as receiving 10 laterals when in reality there is one lateral that serves the ten condos.

Allen Feyereisen, 626 Main St., The temporary lateral installed at my house plugged and caused flooding in my basement, the actual cost of the sewer lateral would be helpful, where will the bike path be marked and will curb and gutter be replaced where the road is being resurfaced.

Jodi Strobel, 336 Main St., The exact cost to install the sewer lateral would be helpful in order to budget for the expense. The garbage issues are finally being resolved on Main Street.

Wendi Dreher, 229, 227 Main St., It's important to know the cost of the sewer lateral installation as soon as possible. Some projects like this have not been assessed and I am wondering why the residents are being assessed this time. The communication with the Main Street project manager has been good and you can stop at the DOT office and ask questions anytime.

Patrick Gill, 622 Main St., Why was the road resurfaced instead of reconstructed east of the bridge so the curb and gutter would be replaced. I have had the use of my driveway for only one day.

Indians have trouble versus EWC track powers

A win in the pole vault and three second places highlighted the efforts of the Kewaskum girls' track team in last week's Eastern Wisconsin Conference championships hosted by Two Rivers.

Steady Jessica Nurkala posted yet another first place in the pole vault, clearing 8'6", 6 inches higher than her teammate, Sarah Kosterman, who made 8'0", a one-foot improvement over her previous best. This event produced 18 of the Lady Indians' 72.50 points in the meet.

The host Raiders captured the team title with 144 points, while Plymouth was second with 122. Next came Kiel, Sheboygan Falls and Waupun in a tight race for third, 119 to 11 to 110.5.

Kewaskum placed sixth in the competition.

"I was glad the girls scored 72 points," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said. "They ran well. The girls in the two relays ran better."

Ellie Debelak and Megan Ackatz had two of the second places, Debelak's coming in the long jump where she covered 15-07.50 on her best jump. Debelak was sitting in eighth place after the prelims, then went all-out in the finals to claim the runner-up spot.

Ackatz and three others cleared 4-10 to tie for second, and the nod went to Ackatz. Kristina Lepp added an eight place in the event by clearing 4-4.

The other second place was posted by the 4x400-meter relay quartet of Debelak, Natalia Luedtke, Lepp and Reysen, who is coming closer to being 100 per-

cent physically after she had to miss several meets early in the season. The four combined for a good time of 4:09.91.

"They dropped over seven seconds (in their time)," Gosa said, praising the three sophomores and the freshman Luedtke, who dropped six seconds in the 400 since the start of the season.

Another good relay event for the Lady Indians was the 4x200 where Haley Kleinhans, Ackatz, Kosterman and Lepp carried the baton the two laps for a time of 1:55.83.

Reysen also contributed a sixth in the open 400 (64.09), while Debelak finished fifth (13.75) in a strong 100 field and Lepp had a good race in the rugged 300 hurdles, taking fifth with a time of 52.27.

Emily Krier, who is a regular on the soccer team and had competed in several of the bigger track meets took an eighth in the 1,600, with a 5:42.58 clocking and she came back later to take fifth in the 3,200 (12:25.17).

Other top-eight finishes were: triple jump — Kleinhans, fourth, 30-06.5; 100 hurdles — seventh, Beth Dinero, 19.82; and eighth, Abby Ashauer, 21.21; 4x100 relay — sixth, Kosterman, Ellie Landreville, Ackatz and Kleinhans, 58.39.

The KHS boys also had one win in the EWC test as sophomore Jason Hanson cleared 6-3 to win the high jump.

Gosa said Hanson also won the event in the EWC Freshman-Sophomore Meet with a personal best 6-4, showing he may be ready to challenge for a top place in the regional and sectional competitions.

Hanson also took third in the 800, with a time of 2:06.84.

Those two events repre-

sented 16 of Kewaskum's 57 points in the meet.

Another Indians sophomore, Brandon Thull, captured second in the long jump and helped the 4x100 relay team (Gavin Schreier, Brandon Mikolajczak, Ben Watzig) to a third place with a time of 46.18.

In the long jump, Thull was in sixth place after the prelims, then uncorked a jump to 19-06.75 to take the runner-up spot. Thull also placed fifth in the 100 (11.95).

Other top-six finishes included: 110 high hurdles — Derrek Brock, fifth, 18:23; 4x200 relay — fifth, Schreier, Brady Hanson, Jake Hrica and Mikolajczak, 1:38.96; 4x400 relay — Brady Hanson, Kevin Etta, Charlie Witek, Jason Hanson, 3:45.09.

Both KHS teams finished second in the Freshman-Sophomore competition, with the girls scoring 136 points and the boys 111.

"Over 90 percent of our (varsity) teams are freshman and sophomores," Gosa said, reporting it was pretty amazing the girls' 4x100 relay team dropped more than two seconds from the varsity conference meet to the Frosh-Soph meet, posting a 55.76, while the 4x200 dipped down to a 1:54.8, two days after coming in with a time of 1:55.83 at Two Rivers.
