

Nurkala, Debelak and Hanson among the elite going to state



Jessica Nurkala, Ellie Debelak and Jason Hanson will be heading to LaCrosse to participate in the State Track and Field Championships this weekend.

"La Crosse, here we come" is the cry of three Kewaskum High track athletes after qualifying for the WIAA D-2 State Track and Field Championships by virtue of their fine efforts in the Whitewater Sectional Friday.

For the second year in a row, Jessica Nurkala will be representing Kewaskum in the pole vault after placing second in the sectional, clearing 9 feet, 6 inches. Sophomore Ellie Debelak is advancing in the long jump after coming up with a gigantic 17-02, missing second place by one-quarter of an inch.

For the boys, the lone qualifier is high jumper Jason Hanson, only a sophomore and already clearing 6-04, which was good for third place at Whitewater.

"Talking about peaking at the right time!" KHS coach Jerry Gosa said about the efforts of the state-

bound trio."

"I got my personal best," Nurkala beamed before starting practice Monday. "I had been making it (9-06) in practice. I don't know what it was, but I couldn't make it in a meet." Until last Friday.

Nurkala said there were six girls left after 9-0, so she knew she had to make 9-06 to advance. "I missed my first two tries at 9-3 and made it on the last one. Then I made 9-06 on my first try, and I knew I was going to state."

Nurkala will probably have to clear 10-0 to place, and she is staying optimistic. "I improved quite a bit from last year, this year I have a chance," she said.

When asked if she is nervous or excited about making her first trip to state, Debelak said, "Both!" She showed little in the area of nerves Friday, adding 9 inches to her previous best (16-05), which she posted during the indoor season.

A greater emphasis on technique helped Debelak go more than 17 feet,

according to Mike Debelak, the team's long/triple jump coach. "We worked real hard on keeping her knees high," he said. Also emphasized were "getting more pop on her takeoff," and "getting lots of height on her jump."

"I worked on that a lot. It helped me because I was more confident in what I was doing," Ellie Debelak said.

The plan sure worked as Debelak uncorked her 17-02 in the preliminaries, along with a jump of 17-01.25 and then a 16-11.75.

In the finals, she was in the high 16s and didn't take the last jump because she didn't have to," Mike Debelak said.

As far as Friday's competition, Ellie Debelak said, "Right now I'm seeded sixth. I want to place!"

The best Hanson jumped as a freshman was 6-0, so he added another 4 inches this spring and knows

Budnik resigns as Curriculum Coordinator

The exit door continues to open as the Kewaskum School District continues to be plagued by other district's snatching their top administrators. The Board of Education will vote Monday on accepting the resignation and hiring a number of new and not so new administrators.

Kewaskum Curriculum Director Darcy Budnik tendered her resignation May 27. Her last day with the district is June 30 if her resignation is approved.

Budnik stated in her letter she accepted a position with CESA 1 in Pewaukee as their Director of Teaching and Learning.

The district hired Budnik in 2010 to be the Kewaskum Elementary School Principal and by the end of her first year, she assumed her current role.

Budnik is the fifth administrator to be leaving the district this year for greener pastures. Early this year both of the district's IT administrators left for positions in the private sector. In late March Pupil Services Director Anne Ignatowski accepted a position at Nicolet School District. Last month, WES principal Heidi Williams, was offered a better opportunity with a larger school in the Waukesha School District.

"A sign of a high performing school district is attracting quality people and furthering their abilities to the point where they are being recruited or being chosen for career advancing opportunities. As much as we are sad to see them leave, we should take great pride in their being chosen for fantastic career advancements," Superintendent Jim Smasal stated.

As the board discusses Budnik's resignation Monday evening they will also discuss a replacement for Ignatowski. The district's leadership team has chosen Janis Chapman, who is currently working in the Germantown School District, as their Pupil Services Director.

"We are ecstatic with the candidate to fill the Pupil Services position and very optimistic that we will fill the Curriculum Director position with another high quality candidate given we already have 36 applicants," Smasal concluded.



Town chairman faces charges of sexual assault, disorderly conduct

Farmington's town board chairman has been charged with fourth degree sexual assault and disorderly conduct after a March 19 incident.

A plea hearing for Christopher J. Elbe will be conducted July 16.

According to a criminal complaint filed in Washing-

ton County, Elbe, 45, allegedly made physical advances and lewd remarks during an inspection of the victim's property.

The woman contacted the town because of flooding occurring on property and was referred to Elbe, the complaint states.

The woman gave Elbe a tour and he asked to see a garage and bonus room on the property, saying he was thinking of building a similar structure. After the tour Elbe allegedly made physical advances and lewd remarks, according to the complaint.

At one point the woman told Elbe she was in a relationship, to which he allegedly replied, "So what? I'm married, who cares!"

The complaint states that after Elbe attempted to grab her she ran to her car, locked the doors and grabbed her phone. At that point, he got into his truck and drove away.

Police Dept. will have second in command

Police Chief Thomas Bishop got one step closer to having a day off when the village board told him Monday to proceed with framework that could lead to the hiring of a second in command.

Bishop said creating a non-union lieutenant position would provide continuity of command and serve as staff that could fill both administrative and patrol duties.

Now officers are appointed to command at times when Bishop can't be reached, but trustee Richard Knoebel, who held the position of chief before Bishop, said it is an imperfect system because the appointed officer changes from one day to the next and doesn't get a chance to understand the scope of day-to-day operations.

The current department consists of the chief, a school resource officer, five patrol and

two part time officers. Bishop said the village has grown but the police department is still staffed at the same level it had in 2001.

Bishop proposed a one year probationary period and he consulted with a contact who said the officer would be allowed to rejoin the union if the administrative arrangement didn't work out.

Bishop, who started with Kewaskum in 2007, was promoted from within the department, a tactic he would like to use to hire a new lieutenant.

Bishop also outlined a number of cost savings that could defray the price of the salaried position. Because the department is hiring an officer to fill Janich's position, a new officer will make about \$9,000 less, coming in at the starting pay scale. A new hire would be subject to Act 10, saving the department another \$2,200 in insurance contributions. Costs for

the lieutenant position could also be offset by a federal grant that would pay for 75 percent of the salary for three years.

The promotion would also mean the police department office could be open on weekends, eliminating the need for residents to contact the Washington County Sheriff's Department during those hours.

Bishop would also like to hire another part time officer to help fill vacation openings and weekend cover shifts, but said the board should also consider hiring another full time officer within the next three years.

At a May 19 meeting the board okayed filling a vacant full-time officer position to replace Christopher Janich and Bishop expected that position to be filled by August. He would like to then begin working on promoting an officer to the lieutenant's position.

Kohn's receives license to sell beer and other liquor

There is one more place to pick up adult beverages in Kewaskum, but a gas station that got the okay from the village board Monday night may have opened the door to more.

Kohn's Corner Mart received a license to sell beer and other liquor and board members asked if that allowance could be extended to the

other three village gas stations if requested. Geidel's Piggly Wiggly is the only other entity to hold a combination Class A fermented malt beverage and Class A intoxicating liquor license in the village.

Village Clerk Stephanie Justmann said ordinances allow one Class A license in the village for every 250 residents and thought the population would allow for four licenses to be granted.

Drug suspects arrested

The Washington County Sheriff's Office reported they have arrested three suspects after a traffic stop on Highway 45 near County Road D in the Town of Barton Thursday, May 29.

Deputies initiated the stop after the vehicle was believed to be involved in heroin deliveries. The suspects are 20-year-old and a 41-year-old male from the Kewaskum area and a 24-year-old female from the City of West Bend.

The suspects had been the subject of an on-going investigation by the Washington County Multi-Jurisdictional Drug Enforcement Group (Drug Unit). The investigation resulted in sales of heroin to an undercover police officer occurring in the City of West Bend and Villages of Kewaskum and Jackson.

The Kewaskum village board is back to full strength with the appointment of Dick Laubach as trustee.


Laubach was asked by the board to fill the open seat after incumbent trustees Craig Garbisch and Mike Berger resigned shortly before the April election.

When Mary Thiemer, 63, activities director and volunteer coordinator at Samaritan Campus, West Bend, retired in March, her fellow employees presented her with an unusual gift at a party in her honor -- more than 45 jars of pickles.

Thiemer's employment there spanned nearly 45 years, since her 1969 graduation from Kewaskum High School. According to Jessica Trapp, housing manager of assisted living at the Samaritan Campus, "One of Mary's favorite foods is pickles, so our goal was to collect 44 jars one for each year, but we collected more than that.

"She had big shoes to fill," Trapp said, regarding Thiemer's responsibilities at the Campus, which includes the nursing home and since 2006, an RCAC (residential-care apartment complex) and a 2009 addition of a CBRF (community-based residential, memory-care facility) -- all owned and operated by Washington County. The assisted living complexes are dubbed the Fields of Washington County.

Thiemer was in charge of providing activities for approximately 200 residents, coordinating about 125 volunteers and overseeing the activities of 18 organizations that come to the Samaritan Campus occasionally to provide entertainment, such as running a bingo game or a musical performance.

"I would have cloned Mary if I could have," said Ed Somers, former Samaritan Campus Administrator, who retired in September and was Thiemer's supervisor for 15 years. "She was awesome -- the hardest-working person I have known.

"I have never seen such dedication to the residents," Somers added. "Her heart was in the right place, and she always gave of herself. She did a great job with everything and gave the best effort you could

ask."

Members of the Washington County Board felt likewise. They invited Thiemer to their March 14 meeting, at which they commended her for her years of dedicated service, presenting her with a clock engraved with the years of her employment, 1969-2014.

"It was very good to be honored," Thiemer said. "I thanked them and said that while my work was challenging at times, it was truly rewarding. Every day was different."

Trapp, who worked with Thiemer for 19 years, noted, "Mary is the most dedicated staff person we have had. She took time to know all of the residents.

"Even after retiring, she has come back to help plant flowers on the patios," Trapp said. "And on May 22, she went to the greenhouses with me to pick up the flowers and then sort them. She held a flower-sale fund-raiser every year to earn money to buy the flowers for the patios."

Trapp told of one of Thiemer's recent accomplishments. Each year she would organize bussing to take Samaritan Campus residents to the Washington County Fair. Then last year, she contacted a traveling petting-zoo company from the East Troy area to come to the Samaritan Campus, rather than bussing those residents with disabilities to the County Fair.

According to Trapp, "The residents loved it."

Thiemer arranged for the event to include clowns, carnival games and even cream puffs.

Katie Braun, director of nursing at Samaritan, noted that more than 100 residents attended the on-campus fair and that it was such a success that plans are in motion to have a similar event this year.

Thiemer also coordinated the golf-outing fundraiser for the Campus, held at West Bend

Lakes Golf Course.

The Kettle Moraine Kar Klub provides many classic cars for attendees to view, during Samaritan's annual August picnic for residents and employees. Thiemer's husband, Richard Thiemer, who owns Richard's Kut & Style barbershop north of Kewaskum, is a member of the club and each year assisted his wife with the picnic.

Raised on a dairy farm in the town of Kewaskum, Thiemer had intended to work just one year at Samaritan following her high school graduation. Her plan was to enroll after that at Moraine Park Technical College (MPTC) in Fond du Lac, aspiring to become a licensed practical nurse.

However, since there was a waiting list to attend MPTC at that time, she stayed on at Samaritan, which at that time was a nursing home on the third and fourth floors and a psychiatric hospital on the first and second floors.

While continuing her job at Samaritan and raising her children, she went to night school at MPTC and earned an Associate of Arts degree in supervisory management.

Then, in 1978, Thiemer switched departments at Samaritan and began working as a physical therapy restorative aide. "I needed more of a challenge," she said. "I needed to grow."

In 1985, Thiemer became the facility's volunteer coordinator. Shortly later, Helen Weinert, the activities director, retired.

"In 1986, they planned to make the volunteer coordinator position part-time," Thiemer said. "But I was informed I could become the activities director and take on the volunteer coordinator position, so that I would not lose my full-time status. One consideration for working full-time was that I needed the health-insurance coverage, because my husband is self-employed."


Thiemer agreed to accept the dual roles. However, "I had to work with a consultant for two days per week for one year and then for one day per week another year," Thiemer explained. "Wisconsin's Department of Health and Human Services mandates an activity director have two years experience in the activities department, and I did not have that."

What has Thiemer enjoyed most about her employment at Samaritan? "Helping people have something to make them happy -- to smile or laugh -- to give them a purpose," she said. "My goal was to improve their lives."

Apparently she achieved that goal. For example, one male resident, with disabilities, in his upper 80's, came to visit Thiemer in her office on a daily basis. "He has no family, and we would share baseball and farming stories, since we were both raised on a farm," she said.



"Before I left, he brought me a retirement present and card and said, 'I won't live much longer, I think once you're retired, I will die.'"

Thus, Thiemer has continued to visit him in her retirement.

Braun is not surprised. "She considered every resident special," Braun said, "and she was very involved in their lives. It has been a pleasure to work with her."

"Mary tried to make the activities special. She was incredibly dedicated and hard-working and was always looking for new activities," Braun added.

For example, last year, Thiemer applied for a state grant through the Music and Memory Initiative, a program for those with memory loss. Samaritan was one of the organizations accepted and received more than \$800 worth of equipment to start the program. They received 15 iPods, which were programmed with favorite songs for 15 residents. The idea is to connect these residents with special memories, as they hear their favorite songs.

"The residents like to gamble," Thiemer said. "We have a game with wooden horses on a race track. They bet on the horses and roll dice to determine the

winner. Bingo is another popular activity, with prizes awarded to winners."

She admitted there were challenges entailed with her work. "The constant multi-tasking is challenging," Thiemer said. "Being in charge of staff schedules, activities, volunteers, fund-raising and serving on various committees kept me busy."

Thiemer plans to be present in July for Samaritan's golf outing at West Bend Lakes Golf Course and in August for the annual Samaritan picnic.

In her retirement, she has a new endeavor. "Since my retirement, I have a new chicken-raising hobby. I have seven hens and a rooster, which are really my pets," she said.

Thiemer has also traded her car for a 2005 Ford Mustang convertible. In addition, "We do plan on taking some short trips," she said. "My husband belonged to the Jaycees years ago, and we have friends all over the country."

"It was a good turnout," Shelly Oelhafen, FFA advisor, said.



Improvement was the key for KHS trap team

It was another successful year for the Kewaskum High trap team. Not only did the team draw larger numbers — there were 55 students, including nine girls, out for the activity — but it showed plenty of

improvement.

“I was nervous in the beginning of the season. We weren’t getting any wins,” said head coach Brian Taylor, but as the season went on, “We just kept getting more birds” and some wins, including one big one in the Kettle Moraine Trapshooting Conference

One of Kewaskum’s five-

man teams scored 241 points in that competition to edge Beaver Dam which came back to win both the KMTC overall title and what is termed the state competition at the Mayville Gun Club. (Taylor indicated this is just another of the invitationals and not a state meet like the ones held in others sports.)

There were 17 teams (from

the North and South Divisions) in the KM competition, which was held May 17 at the Fox Valley Gun Club in Omro. Kewaskum wound up with 241 birds, two better than Beaver Dam (239) and three ahead of the Daniel Boone (238) team.

Rounding out the top five were West Bend (236) and Berlin (235).

In the conference test, there were four shooters tied for first play with perfect scores of 50, and one of the four was Brandon Brzozowski of Kewaskum.

There were 14 shooters who missed just two of their 50 shots and were tied for sixth place. Nick Beine, Justin Limberg and Gatlin Volm of Kewaskum were among that prestigious group of shooters. Taylor had praise for all four.

Others who hit 46 or more of the clay pigeons included: Greg Martin, 47; Paul Fieweger, 47; Taylor Trepes, 46; and Brad Ray, 46.

“Oh yeah, it was a good day for us, definitely!” Taylor said. “We had 241 out of a possible 250.”

Leading the KHS girls’ team were Katelyn Verhaalen and Melissa Taylor, who hit 45 and 43 of the 50 target, respectively.

“Our girls really shot well

there,” Taylor said.

Kewaskum is one of nine teams in the South Division which also includes Campbellsport, Beaver Dam, Hartford, Flyway Clay Slayers, Ozaukee Youth Trap and West Bend. There are also eight teams in the Northern Division.

Kewaskum finished fifth overall in the conference standings. They finished 4-4 in dual meets and fifth in birds shot, 1,773, which comes out to an 88 percent accuracy figure. Brzozowski had the ninth best scoring average in the conference, hitting 44.9 out of every 50 shots in the meets, while Limberg was tied for 17th at 43.9.

The female rankings were dominated by the Indians, with Verhaalen and Taylor 1-2 with averages of 39.6 and 39.4.

Top JVS included: Mitch Engelman, Tabitha Schicker, Jeremiah Jurss, Zach Staehler and Jamie Taylor.

Kewaskum was tied for 14th with Random Lake at the Mayville competition May 18. Both teams had 442 birds. Beaver Dam won with a 479.

The team members will gather for an Awards and Fun Night June 9 at the New Fane Sportsmen’s Club.







Kewaskum's tennis season came to an end last Wednesday as its sectional qualifiers were defeated in the first round of action in East Troy.

Bille Lehmann had a tough draw in the first round, going up against Sebastian Lauterbach of Big Foot/Williams Bay. Lauterbach defeated Lehmann 6-0, 6-1 and eventually wound up in second place behind Cecil Lingard (21-4), a freshman from Madison Edgewood.

Earning a number two seed in the Division 2 softball regionals and a first round bye was a good thing for the Lady Indians, but against visiting Grafton, seeded third, they weren't ready to play in the second round, even after the game was postponed a day because of rain.

What the Blackhawks did in their 30-0 first round thrashing of Brown Deer wasn't impressive. Shutting out the Indians, 13-0, at Kewaskum Kiwanis Community Park, May 28, shocked the home team in more ways than one.

Kewaskum coach Jeff Gosse didn't sugarcoat it when it came to how his team performed on the field and at the plate. "We led off with a triple (in the second inning)," he said. "We got (freshman Jenna Koglin) on third base and we couldn't execute her, couldn't get her home and that took the energy out of us. (Grafton) came up swinging the bat, and I think that took all the air out of us."

Grafton got on the scoreboard in the first inning when Samm Maglio came across the plate on an error for a 1-0 lead. After that three-bagger by Koglin in the second, Laura Weishan fouled out, Melanie Juech struck out and Maddie Kries ended the inning on a 4-3 groundout.

The Blackhawks broke the game open in the third inning with eight runs that put the Indians away for good. Nine straight Grafton batters reached base safely after the first out. Julia Kluck went to second on a throwing error by Kewaskum and to third on an infield single by Maglio.

"You can see the heads go down," Gosse said. "There was some mental mistakes being made, errors that we don't normally make and confusion on where to throw the ball. It was just one hit after the other. They were finding the right field hole. We weren't hitting our (cutoff players). And when we did hit our cuts, we didn't know where to go with the ball."

The 9-0 lead by Grafton at that point took the wind out of the sails for Kewaskum. During that long inning by the Blackhawks, Gosse was asked if he thought about changing pitchers. Koglin warmed up near the Kewaskum bench as a possible replacement for Trepes but Gosse stuck with his ace.

"During that inning where she got beat up," Gosse said, "I thought about taking her out just to give a change of pace and bringing Jenna in."

Kewaskum left ducks on the pond in the third through sixth innings, stranding six runners and each time the inning ended on strikeouts. They left eight runners total on base.

It was that kind of day for the Indians and a bad way to end their season. Grafton scored four more runs in their half of the sixth to advance to the next round.

Trepes pitched 5 and 2/3 innings, giving up 11 earned runs on 13 hits with two walks and five strikeouts. Koglin pitched to one batter in the Grafton sixth and got the last out in the inning. She was 1-for-3 and Juech was 1-for-2 with a walk as was junior McKenzie Rosenthal.

Kewaskum finished with a 16-9 record and had a 9-5 mark in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, good for fourth place.

Indians suffer pair of one-run defeats

Kewaskum baseball coach Doug Gonring wasn't in a talking mood Friday evening. Gonring likes his teams to play smart, errorless ball and he didn't think the Indians did either in their 4-3 loss to Sheboygan Falls (1-0, 3-1) in the opening game of their Eastern Wisconsin Conference season.

The box score shows a pair of errors by Kewaskum but mental baseball errors don't show up there and in this game they were costly, according to the coach.

It would have been nice to

have the second nonconference game before going into EWC play, but rain wiped out Tuesday's scheduled game with Pewaukee — it will be made up June 12 at Pewaukee — so the Indians were still a little green when they faced the Falcons.

One player in midseason form was senior pitcher Brett Boegel, who gave up just one earned run in five innings on the mound. Boegel struck out six and didn't walk a single batter.

Boegel did give up six hits to the winners, who were led by Eric Klemme, Mike Roeder, Jake Wiesenthal and Nate Heili, who went 2x3 and pitched six strong

innings to notch the win.

Falls pitched up a single run in the first, using an infield single by Wiesenthal to plate Heili, who opened the game with a single to center field.

Kewaskum answered when Bille Lehmann and Andy Pryor drew back-to-back walks, Boegel hit into a fielder's choice, erasing Lehmann, followed by a clutch RBI single by sophomore Michael Prochnow.

The top of the order came through again for the Falcons in the third when Heili singled and Roeder was the recipient of an error at third. Klemme followed with a single, loading the bases, and Wiesenthal picked up his

second RBI with a sacrifice fly.

The Indians tied the game at two-all in the fourth, thanks to an RBI single by Devyn Zillmer.

Sheboygan Falls went back on top for good in the fifth when Heili beat out an infield hit, advanced to second on a wild pitch and scored on Roeder's single to right.

The Falcons added another run in the sixth off reliever Demmon Hunter when Ryan Schmidt grounded out with the bases loaded.

Down 4-2 in the bottom of the sixth, Kewaskum had its chances as the Falcon infielders booted two balls, putting Zillmer and Lehmann aboard and a throwing error allowed Zillmer to score, but Heili got the next two Indians, Pryor and Boegel, to strike out looking.

Wiesenthal was called on to finish up the game for Heili and he had a 1-2-3 inning.

Kewaskum hosts defending EWC champion Plymouth Thursday afternoon at 5:30 p.m.

On Saturday, the Indians lost another heart-breaker, this time a 7-6, 10-inning game to host West Bend East.

Early errors by the Suns and the hitting of junior catcher Dean Schlice allowed Kewaskum to take a 6-5 lead after four innings, but the Suns tied the game in the bottom of the seventh and won on a walk-off single by Turner Pruett, scoring Gavin Forster.

Singling in the third and fourth innings, Schlice went 2x2 with four RBIs for Kewaskum, which had just five hits in the game.

Hunter Demmon took the loss after pitching the final 2 1/3 innings. Pruett threw one inning of shutout ball to pick up the victory.

"We started out doing some things pretty good and then we started doing things badly," Gonring said Monday. "We were up 3-1, then dropped a two-out pop up that led to three runs."

Still, Gonring is encouraged.

"It was a good ballgame. We're getting better," he said, noting. "Pitching isn't going to be a problem all season. It's our hitting and our ability to catch pop ups."

Gonring predicts once school is out the players complete other activities, "The mindset of baseball will get better."

The loss dropped the Indians' record to 0-3 on the year.

Indians work overtime for win over Campbellsport
