## Police suspect heroin in latest drug bust

Charges have been filed against a 20-year-old former Kewaskum woman for possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Kewaskum Police Chief Tom Bishop stated his department executed a search warrant at a Courtney Lane apartment late Saturday, June 7. Once inside, police found numerous items related to heroin use.

The department is now awaiting results from the state crime lab that is testing the items to confirm suspicions of heroin.

Police discovered the stash of drug related items when the mother of one of the occupants received permission from the leaseholder to enter the apartment to retrieve her son's belongings. While in the apartment they were met by Madeline E. Lockwood, 20, who also was staying in the apartment.

After obtaining a search warrant for the apartment police located, nine metal cookers, two pouches of cotton swabs and two used syringes. In the room where Lockwood was discovered, police confiscated a cooker, a used needle, Suboxone, other numerous pills, a tie-offs, syringes and Narcan. In her purse police located used needles, a tie-off, a cooker and other items consistent with drug use.

"The topic of heroin is a big news item right now and I think that it is important for people to realize that we see it here in Kewaskum, it's not just a big-city problem," Chief Bishop stated.

Lockwood will be in Washington County court again for a hearing June 23.

## Debelak has big day in LaCrosse

Every high school track athlete dreams of making the podium in the WIAA State Track and Field Meet.

For Kewaskum High sophomore Ellie Debelak, those dreams came true Friday evening after she came up with an excellent jump of 16 feet, 10.75 inches, earning a fifth place in the D-2 long jump competition.

Jason Hanson placed seventh in his specialty, the high jump, earned two points in the event, just missing the victory stand, and Jessie Nurkala finished her career by tying for 10th place in the pole vault.

"It is nice to look back and see that some of our athletes were at or near their personal bests" in the state

meet, KHS coach Jerry Gosa said Monday morning, thrilled to get three athletes to state and be able to see them perform well.

Gosa said Debelak is an "excellent" young lady, "very respectful ... a very hard worker, and very coachable." She had an excellent day in LaCrosse, with all six of her jumps in the finals at 16-01 or better, including the 16-10.75, a 16-10 and a 16-08.

After being in the mid-15s for much of the outdoor season, Debelak soared the last week. "She made fantastic improvement," the coach said, indicating, "She and her father worked very hard on her not over striding." The extra work on technique paid off and Debelak now has a state medal.

Hanson added four inches to his

high jump this season, going from 6-0 to 6-4, which was his highest jump in Saturday's competition.

"He made 6-4 on his third attempt, which was exactly what he did in the sectionals," Gosa said. "He came up big time on that."

For a while, Hanson and his jumping coach thought he had placed sixth, but one of the jumpers had left the area to compete in another event and then have his picture taken. When he got back, he missed his first try at 6-6 and then cleared it, moving Hanson down to seventh.

Still, it was a good day and a good year for Hanson, and Gosa is confident he can do better. "Depending on how hard he's willing to work, he's got a bright future in front of him" includ-

## United for Libraries to present Public Service Award to Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner

Congressman Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Wis.) will be honored by United for Libraries, a division of the American Library Association (ALA), with the 2014 Public Service Award during National Library Legislative Day activities in Washington, D.C., on May 5.

The Public Service Award is the highest honor presented by United for Libraries to legislators who support library issues. Congressman Sensenbrenner is being recognized for the introduction of H.R. 3361, the USA FREEDOM Act, a bill proposing amendments to the USA PATRIOT Act that would continue to protect the nation's security while implementing rules to preserve the privacy of American citizens.

Co-sponsored by Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.), who will also receive the Public Service Award, the bill would require the government to make disclosures about the intelligence surveillance it conducts, and establish a process for declassifying opinions issued by the FISA court.

"This legislation is important to our Wisconsin library patrons," Wisconsin Library Association Executive Director Plumer Lovelace said, "and its introduction ensures a balance between protecting library patron confidentiality while maintaining the security of our nation." WLA President Krista Ross added, "The Wisconsin Library Association is pleased to offer congratulations to Congressman Sensenbrenner on this most deserved award. We here in Wisconsin are fortunate to have legislators in Washington who are wonderful support-

ers of libraries."

Kurt Kiefer, Assistant State Superintendent, Division for Libraries and Technology, Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, added, "It is important that Wisconsin citizens can trust their library as a safe and secure place that provides reliable access and meets their information needs. Senator Sensenbrenner's bill will help to ensure that libraries can continue to meet patrons' needs for career support, online applications, as well as resource centers for education and inspira-

tion."

The Public Service Award is given annually by United for Libraries to a legislator who has been especially supportive of libraries. The first award was presented in 1989 to Congressman Major Owens (D-N.Y.), the only librarian serving in Congress. Other recent awardees include Rep. Jeff Fortenberry (R-Neb.), Rush Holt (D-N.J.), and Raul Grijalva (D-Ariz.). ## Chief's Corner

As summer begins in Kewaskum that also means a number of summer-time events begin as well. I wanted to take a moment to remind everyone of the events along with the rules and regulations that go with them.

The parks are now open and in full use. Please remember that dogs and other pets are not allowed in Village parks. Furthermore, vehicles are not allowed in Kiwanis Park beyond the parking lot. A park is an area where children and adults alike should be able to play and have fun without having to be concerned with vehicular traffic. You are allowed to drive up to the pavilion to drop off items (if they are too heavy or there are too many to carry) or to drop off a disabled person who is unable to make the long walk if necessary; however, you must return your vehicle back to the parking lot immediately. Too often we find people who drove up for this reason and the vehicle remains parked there. You can be cited for driving and/or parking beyond the parking lot in Kiwanis Park. Of course, driving up into the park should be a last resort. If you have other means for getting people or items up into the park you should always do that before resorting to driving.

The Fourth of July is also just around the corner and I would like to remind everyone that the possession or use of fireworks in the Village is prohibited. Any type of firework that explodes or leaves the ground is illegal. Sparklers are legal, but they are not allowed in the park on the night of the Village's fireworks due to the chance someone could get burned. On that note, the fireworks display is still on for July 3rd. Main Street will still be closed which

will create some traffic issues so I urge all residents to please walk down to the park if possible.

With summer comes summer vacation for our community's children. I feel compelled to write about a tragic situation that occurred this week in my hometown of Waupun. A five year-old boy was playing outside when he darted out into the street from behind a parked vehicle and he struck by a vehicle. He is in serious condition at Children's Hospital. The parents were outside with their children at the time of the accident, just not in a position to prevent this from happening. Having small children of my own makes this story really hit home. Reports state that it isn't believed that the driver of the vehicle did anything wrong and that this seems to be truly a tragic accident, but it still made me to feel a need to discuss the issue of slowing down, especially as summer break starts up.

In today's society we are always in such a hurry to get from point A to point B that going the speed limit and stopping completely at stop signs seems to be too inconvenient to do every time. Hearing a story such as this is a sobering reminder that it doesn't matter how late you are for your appointment or how important that event is that you need to get to - slow down and drive safely. Children aren't always looking for cars like we wish they would, so we need to put the burden on us to drive with caution and keep an eye out for children playing. Hopefully, by doing so we may be able to prevent such a tragic situation from occurring.

Our goal is to prevent another tragedy by sharing this video that promotes safe, responsible driving.

This video was a collaborative effort by some of the survivors of the crash, Gregg Burmeister the video producer, and Coach Jeff Sauer, former University of Wisconsin Hockey Coach, who is involved with the teenage driving safety initiative. We would like to thank Sheriff Mylan Fink, Deputy Nick Evans and the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Department, Judge Dale English and Brian Oestrich for their cooperation with this driver safety video. Thank you to Randall Thiel, Steven Fernan, and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction for giving every high school principal in the state access to this educational video. Special thanks to all EMT's and First Responders for the services they provide to those in need.

The video producer brings the viewer back to the morning of the crash. This may be difficult to view by those individuals whose lives have been touched by any of these young women who were in this crash. As difficult as this is, it is extremely important to watch, discuss, and share the powerful message for everyone to drive responsibly.

Probably the most important historical lesson anyone can learn revolves around WW2 with Hitler and Nazi Germany. And probably the most informative source of information on this comes from a man named William Shirer. His most notable literature is called "The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich."

He was born in America, started reporting for the Chicago Tribune with the Paris edition while living in Paris in 1925. He married an Austrian woman. He spent many years living in Nazi Germany in the 30's.

In 1919 following his service in WW I, Hitler joined the German Worker's Party, which later became known as the National Socialist German Workers Party. In 1925, after a riot he helped coordinate, he was arrested and thrown in jail. There he wrote an autobiography titled "Mein Kampf". In there you start to see his views of an Aryan only race and anti-Jewish sentiment.

Hitler gained complete power in Jan. 1933. In March, he enacted the "enabling act" which amended the German constitution to enact laws without legislation and other party support. Soon after on May 2 1933, according to Shirer, "I watched as on the next morning the German police, the SS and the SA occupied trade union offices through the country,

confiscated their funds, dissolved them and arrested, beat and shipped to concentration camps the unions' leaders."

Within three weeks collective bargaining and strikes were outlawed. Hitler declared May Day, (the day of National Labor) and also created a so-called labor front. Shirer reported "Like so much in Nazi Land, the 'Labor Front' was a swindle. It did not represent the workers" he protested: "It took in not only wage and salary earners, but also the employers and members of the professions. All had to join. It was he concluded, "in reality a vast propaganda organization and, as the worker soon found out, a gigantic fraud."

Hitler was a master of deception and propaganda. In fact, his third in charge Joseph Goebbels sole responsibility was propaganda. Early on, Hitler understood the importance of appealing to the Christians. He writes about it in Mein Kampf and in speeches. He won the support of the Archbishop of Munich and the Protestant Neimoeller. His rise to power can also be contributed to the reparations imposed from the "Treaty of Versailles" which amounted to many billions of dollars and the effects of six million unemployed after WW I.

Is there a political party today that displays any of these traits of power, control, deception and propaganda? If so please explain.

The most basic fundamental way to prevent this is fair elections and the right to vote. We the people, right? Allowing unlimited dollars and catering to lobbyists and restricting voting undermines the democratic process, however that is precisely the direction of the current group of Republicans running this state.



Imagine if you will a regional dispute involving extended families. One accuses the other, tempers flare and the situation escalates so dramatically that people are killed in great numbers. Who loses?

When couples divorce, it is the children who are the most impacted - and they are marked for a lifetime. But when the entire adult population of a family is dead, who takes care of the children? No one. They are homeless orphans wandering around looking for food and shelter, often sick and dressed in rags, dying from malnutrition and disease.

This was the case in Kenya in 2007-08. The dispute was over national elections. Two tribes/people groups thought the election process had been unfair and began fighting. Death and destruction followed all over the country. There are locations that still bear the physical scars of the devastation five years later. Imagine the emotional scars of the people ... and the children.

Many children gravitated to the farmer pastor and his wife (Peter and Anne Wanyonyi) for refuge. She believed the Lord had sent them to be cared for and brought into the church.

Because there was no orphanage home and only a rented church building, some came to live with Peter and Anne, while some went to live with members of the church, following the biblical mandate issued in the book of James, chapter 1, verse 27 to "... look after orphans..." This arrangement began with five children; today there are ninety at Upper Room Grace Ministries' Toll Station church

and another 42 orphan children distributed to some of the fourteen churches under his oversight.

These 90 local orphans of elementary school age are brought together daily at the church for lessons, food and clothing. Medical attention is provided by a nurse from the congregation as needed; three teachers and one cook volunteer their time to tend to the children.

Because the congregation is very poor, Peter primarily feeds the orphans out of his own pocket from the produce on his farm. It has been a labor of love for Peter and Anne. Through the process they have been stretched, tested and refined, growing in their

faith for God's provision and demonstrating to the church by example that what the Lord mandates He also finances.

In 2012 the Lord blessed the church with land and a corrugated metal school building was constructed for the children. Part of Peter's vision was to construct an orphanage where the children could live, as some of their host families' circumstances were not idyllic.

By 2013, five of the earliest children had advanced beyond the mandatory elementary education and could not afford to go to high school. However, between private donations and bake sales at churches in two American states, by August all the funds

needed to send those five to high school for the next year had been gathered. They were instructed to thank God daily for the provision and to pray for those who had made it possible.

When the orphanage building was built, the vision included those five living there and overseeing the younger ones, pouring into the children all the instruction that the church had given

them over the past five years.

In early September 2013 Peter shared his vision for the orphanage in its entirety, outlining what was yet required to fulfill the vision and the cost of each component. It seemed like a daunting task, but when God has a plan, He makes a way for it to come to pass.

## Mixed results for Indian sluggers

In a nonconference baseball game played Saturday in Mequon, Homestead High School was a little more serious about winning than visiting Kewaskum (1-5).

Saving their regular pitches for games in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, the Indians used three others who haven't seen much mound action this spring, resulting in a 13-0 loss which went with Homestead's Jared Stieve the entire way.

Stieve limited the Indians to a pair of hits, including a leadoff single by center fielder Bille Lehmann in the first inning.

Stieve struck out five and walked none in picking up the victory. He had plenty of offensive support. The Highlanders came up with 10 hits and broke the game open when they scored eight runs the second. The big hits in the inning were an RBI single by Stieve and a three-run homer by Trevor Cho.

Derek Schulz started and took the loss. He went 1 2/3 innings, giving up six runs. Lehmann took over and gave up the homer to Cho. He went 2/3 of an inning, and Matt Ringwell

finished up the game, going two innings, giving up five hits and five earned runs.

"The game got out of control, and he (HHS coach Ernie Millard) didn't want to use a whole lot of pitchers," KHS coach Doug Gonring said. "We weren't very good."

In what could be termed an early Eastern Wisconsin Conference showdown game, host Plymouth was limited to just three hits Thursday, June 5 but aided by six walks and four Indians errors, the Panthers edged Kewaskum 3-1.

Dean Schlice started and took the loss for the Indians, who dropped to 1-2 in EWC play. Schlice went three innings and while he limited the Panthers to one hit, a single in the third, he was hampered by wildness and defensive miscues. Schlice walked five in the three innings.

The Panthers scored on a run in the first and the other two in the second.

Hunter Demmon came on in relief in the fourth, went two innings and gave up just one single.

Jake Richards picked up the win for Plymouth. He allowed just one run more than 5 1/3 innings, struck out five, walked six

and allowed three hits.

Matt Olig came in for the last five outs.

The score was 3-0 going into the top of the sixth when the Indians got on the board via three walks (one intentional) and an RBI single by Matt Hetebrueg. There were two Indian runners on base when Olig got the final out, striking out Brett Boegel.

In the seventh Olig struck out the side to end the game.

At Two Rivers the Indians jumped out to a big lead and never looked back, posting an 11-0 win in five innings via the 10-run mercy rule. It was Kewaskum's first victory of the year.

No question who were the stars at the plate for the Indians. The junior Demmon went 3x4, with a double and pair of RBIs for the Indians. Hetebrueg drove in three runs, two on his second-inning single and another in the fifth on a sacrifice fly.

Three other players, Michael Prochnow (2B), Dylan May and Dalton Poole, each had one hit. Prochnow went four innings and didn't give up a single hit. May finished up the game and gave up one hit.

After sweeping Campbellsport during the regular season, the Kewaskum girl's soccer team could not get the trifecta last Thursday, June 5, suffering a disappointing 2-0 defeat at the hands of the Cougars who moved on to the division three regional semifinals against Plymouth.

The Indians had trouble mustering up much offense in the season-ending contest and it didn't help that top scorer, Jeray Riffel, was on the sidelines the entire second half and spirited defender, Kaila Kirst joined her after suffering a thigh injury.

Both Campbellsport goals were scored in the second half after the two teams played to a stalemate in the first when Kewaskum could not take advantage of having the wind.

Tiffani Anderson scored the first goal at 56:16 after taking a pass from Langdon Donigan. Anderson had gotten past a couple KHS defenders and when goalie Emily Koller came out to deter her, she drilled the ball into the left corner of the net.

Anderson's second goal, at 73:25, came after she kicked the ball, which hit the bar, came down and went in the goal. The assist came from Brooke Birschbach.

The Indians only had a couple threats in the second half, but KHS coach Luke Piwoni said from the beginning there was no sense of urgency.

"Even in the first half, you could tell we weren't all there," Piwoni said. "They (Cougars) came to play. Hats off to them."

Being a young team, Kewaskum didn't have much experience playing without two of its leaders and that hurt, physically and emotionally.

Kirst played an outstanding first half.

"She played really well," Piwoni said. "She faces a lot of pressure. She was really busy."

Riffel had an ice pack on her ankle and could only watch the second half from the sideline.

"She was injured Tues-

day (a 1-1 tie with Sheboygan Falls)," Piwoni said. "In the first half, she was playing with a lot of pain. In the second half, she just couldn't go."

"It really hurts our offensive push when she's not in there," the coach went on about Riffel, who scored 18 goals and added a half-dozen assists this spring.

Becca Strigenz, Molly Schulteis, Lizzy Bauer and Heather May tried to pick the offense up but shots were not on target or no one was in front of the net to help out on several of the pushes.

Still, the KHS coach was pleased with the progress the Indians made to finish at 11-9-2 overall. When asked if he thought this was possible when practice first started, he said, "Yes, but a lot of things had to go right ... They had to mature."

"As a team we set some goals. One of our goals was to have a winning season. They wanted to have a statement year," Piwoni said.

Kewaskum only loses reserve Molly Werner and senior defender Olivia Krautkramer, who started playing the sport when she was a freshman and came a long way to become a defensive starter and team captain.

"It's definitely disappointing," Krautkramer said, "but for most of the girls who will play next year, it was an eye opener. It will help them push forward and do better next year."

In the 1-1 EWC-ending tie with Falls, Strigenz scored the Indians' lone goal with the assist coming from Riffel.

"They (Falcons) scored in the first minute," Piwoni said. "It was good to see us fight back and get our goal."

Kewaskum ended conference play with a mark of 5-5-2, good for fourth place.

Piwoni praised Sami Kirst for her consistent play during the season.

"Look what she's done at center-midfield," he said. "Some days she does all the dirty work. She plays great defensively and distributes the ball well."

Campbellsport battled hard versus Plymouth Saturday, losing 1-0 in the regional finals.
